### **P&Z** reviews draft landscape regs

Planning and Zoning commissioners reviewed a draft Landscape Ordinance July 21 before aldermen will consider the Ordinance at a later meeting.

Commissioners questioned city manager Kim Foutz about the Landscape Ordinance during the workshop, bringing up concerns with enforcement and specific requirements of the proposed ordinance, which will supplement the Zoning Ordinance.

The Planning and Zoning Commission will make a recommendation on passage of the Landscape Ordinance to the Village of Salado Board of Alder-

According to the draft that P&Z commissioners reviewed at the workshop, a landscape plan must accompany all site and/or construction plans submitted to the Village for all Multi-Family and Non-Residential Use projects. "Landscaping plan must be prepared by a person knowledgeable in plant usage and landscape design," the draft states.

The draft ordinance references a "Landscape Standards Design Manual," which will include the list of permitted species of trees, shrubs, vines, ground cover and turf.

General requirem include one that states that more more than 50 percent of the required trees and shrubs shall be of the same species without approval of the administrator.

Soils and mulch must also meet the criteria specified in the Landscape Standards Design Manual.

Landscaping shall be separated from vehicular use areas by barriers of raised concrete curbing. Landscape beds shall be separated from sod areas by barriers that include steel edging, masonry or another equivalent durable material. "No plastic materials shall be allowed," according to the draft or-

dinance. The draft ordinance creates a Sight Visibility Triangle and states that nothing shall be erected, placed or allowed to grow that will impeded vision in the Sight Visibility Tri-

Artificial plants are not allowed.

Landscaping placed in utility easements or public rights of way do not count toward the minimum landscaping requirements.

Requirements for planting of trees are these: Must be 7 feet minimum in overall height and a minimum of three inches in caliper at the time of the planting; must be planted in a pervious area no less than four feet wide measured from the center of the tree and 60 percent of required trees must be evergreen with year round foliage.

Shrubs must be a minimum size of three gallons and planted in a pervious area of no less than three feet from the center of the

shrub and no less than 80 percent of shrubs must be evergreen.

Vines must be a minimum of 30 inches in height at the time of planting and must be used in conjunction with fences to meet screening and buffering.

Turf must create 100 percent coverage within six months of planting. Solid sod must be used in areas swales, slopes and other areas subject to erosion, In areas where solid sod is not required, annual rye grass seed must be sown for immediate effect.

Groundcovers: Weed barriers shall not be used in conjunction with groundcovers, but newspaper or other natural covers may be used to facilitate weed control. Ground covers must be spaced within six inches of each other at the time of planting.

The Landscape Ordinance requires the planting of two large replacement trees for every protected tree that is removed. Protected trees are defined in the Landscape Standards Design Manual.

The draft ordinance defines the Sight Visibility Triangle as an area 15 feet by 15 feet located near a street, alley or driveway intersection in which no structure or landscaping can be installed to obstruct views between 30 inches above grade and eight feet

For non-residential areas, the Landscape Ordinance requires a minimum of 30 percent total site area to be landscaped "and must be irrigated." Areas in the public right-of-way do not count towards the minimum landscape requirement. All areas of site not covered by the building, pavement or similar permanent improvements "must be landscaped with trees, shrubs, turf and/or groundcover. A minimum 15 percent of the 30 percent of the landscape area may be tree mulch, river rock or granite mix.

Plants from the approved plant list must cover 85 percent of the required landscape area and at least 75 percent of the landscape area must be located in the front and side

A Landscape Buffer is required adjacent to any public street right of way. The buffer requires one large tree to be planted (three-inch diameter minimum) every 30 feet along the frontage of public street right of ways. In the Historic District, trees must be plant in regular intervals, not clustered.

The buffer allows four ornamental trees or two medium canopy trees for each large tree under power lines.

Except for within the Historic District, the Landscape Buffer requires berms "not less than 24 inches more more than 48 inches in height at no more than a four to one slope."

### TXDOT Town Hall meeting tonight to discuss traffic flow changes

Construction will begin the construction of the Salado Plaza section of the I-35 expansion through Salado in August.

To prepare Saladoans for the changes in traffic flows required for this construction, Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) will host a community meeting 6-8 p.m. July 23 at the Salado

High School Cafeteria.

The first half hour of the meeting will allow citizens to look over the schematics of the plans for the I-35 overpass at Salado Plaza which will be a complete reconfiguration of this section of the project.

The plans call for Salado Plaza extending west past Main Street, intersecting at the northbound access road and passing under I-35 and connecting to the southbound access road on the west side of the interstate.

Maps of the new traffic flows for Main Street, the access roads and the intersections of Salado Plaza Dr. and Mill Creek Dr. into North Main will be on display.

Lead Mobility Coordinator and Jodi Wheatly I-35 information specialist are expected at the meeting.

TXDOT may announce plans to meet a new scheduled completion date of Dec. 31 2015 for the expansion project through Salado. At the last town hall meeting, the completion date was pushed back from to August 2016.

### Aldermen reject feeding, hunting measure to manage deer population

Salado aldermen rejected an ordinance at their July 16 meeting to regulate the feeding of whitetail deer and to implement a Managed Lands Deer Permit (MLDP) program in the village limits on a 2-3 vote. Aldermen Amber Preston-Dankert and David Williams voting in favor and aldermen Fred Brown, Frank Coachman and Michael McDougal voting against the propos-

According to the language of the ordinance, the feeding of deer "has been shown to increase the concentration of deer in the area of feeding, thereby increasing the likeli-

ing tick-borne disease in pets and other wildlife and increasing damage to vegetation and landscaping in

The rejected ordinance also states that feeding deer "has been shown to encourage deer to remain in an urbanized area and to become reliant on nonnative food sources that may not be sustainable or

"We're not allowing bow hunting inside the Village of Salado," Dr. Preston-Dankert said as she stated that she wanted to clear up misconceptions about the proposed program. "Any homeowner, regardless of the size of their property, may bow

### With \$1 mil fed grant, total sale of bonds may be lowered to \$7.4 mil

With a \$1 million economic development grant and cuts in the proposed construction of sewer lines and property purchases, Salado aldermen may issue for sale \$7.4 million in bonds for the construction of the sewer system and

plant. If aldermen approve the sale of the bonds, the debt service schedule for the 20-year payout of the bonds will call for interest-only payment in the

ment by the year 2035.

The interest rate will be determined at the time of the sale of the bonds. Chris Lane, financial advisor for the Village told aldermen that the 20-year bond would have a fixed interest for the first 10 years and refinance after that most likely with variable rates for the next two five-year periods.

The bonds may be sold as low as 3.136 percent, according to Lane who said that she recently sold 15 year bonds for Liberty

first year and a debt retire- Hill at 2.52 percent. A \$7.4 million debt service for interest only at 3.136 percent would require an annual payment of \$232,064. Bell County Tax Appraisal District recently issued its preliminary values for the Village of Salado at \$172 million in freeze-adjusted taxable values. At that value, one penny on the tax rate will generate \$17,200 in revenue. This would require 13.5 cents on the property tax rate to retire the interest alone on \$7.4 million in indebtedness.

Based on the current preliminary values and retiring \$305,000 in principal in the first year of retiring debt in 2017 would require a tax increase of 31.22 cents on the tax rate. This is based upon no change in taxable values.

The Village is lowering the amount of bonds being sold from the \$10.55 million to a possible issue of \$7.4 million for the construction of the sewer system in part because of the \$1 million economic

hunt within the city limits during the season if they have the permits necessary to do so."

While it may not reduce the population of white tail deer, regulating the feeding of deer can decrease dense population pockets and the inherent problems with those pockets.

The ordinance regulates the hunting of whitetail deer within village, restricting it those who are allowed to hunt under the MLDP program.

Other possible population management efforts could be moving deer from the urban area to rural areas or sterilizing deer to control the expanding population.

Dr. Preston-Dankert said that programs to trap and relocate have shown a survivability of 10-20 percent in the first year and are very expensive to man-

Sterilization programs are perhaps the most expensive program to implement with limited success as well.

But killing deer will reduce the size of the population in over-populated areas and improve the overall health of the herd.

According to Texas Parks and Wildlife website, a sustainable population of deer is one deer per every 10 to 15 acres. The Village of Salado is just over two square miles in area (with 640 acres per square mile). With 1,280-1,500 acres of land within the city limits, the healthy deer population would be somewhere around 100 deer based upon the TP&W calculations for the Hill Country region (Bell County being its northernmost county).

A census of the deer population in the Village of Salado has not been It is one completed. of the first steps in implementing a Texas Parks and Wildlife department Managed Lands Deer Permit (MLDP) program.

The MLDP program would allow an extended hunting season and remove the bag limits for those hunters who are issued special MLDP permits. Participation would be voluntary for land owners in the Village limits.

"Bow hunters would have to notify the village that they will be hunting on their property," Dr. Preston-Dankert said of the MLDP program. "Currently they don't have to do that. Also no one can hunt on their property without being registered under the MLDP program. This would let us know who is hunting and where they are hunting."

Bow hunters who would like to be permitted under the MLDP program would have to meet certain qualifications and could do so on Fort Hood.

development grant that Salado was awarded earlier this month. The economic development grant requires a match of \$1.1 million by the Village of Salado. Funding will be used to construct a sewer collection line and lift stations for Main Street. This section will serve as the spine for establishment of Salado's first city-wide sewer system.

Aldermen also struck some expenditures from the proposal, including a \$666,000 expenditure for a gravity line from west Royal to a lift station near Salado Creek. The estimate for construction of the 300,000 gallon per day plant was also lowered to a total of \$3 million, including the design and construction costs. According to the village engineer Kasberg, Patrick and Associates (KPA), those costs totaled about \$4 million (\$3.6 million for construction and an additional \$300,00 for design).

The letter of intent between the Village of Salado and Sanctuary stipulates that the Sanctuary would design the treatment plant and delivery system from south of the Salado Creek.

Also possibly being removed from the proposal is purchase of additional line for a future or alternate wastewater treatment plant on the west side of I-35.

Landscape screening of a continuous hedge or shrubs, earthen berms or retaining walls up to four feet in height are required in these instances: parking lot or vehicular use area; fuel pumps visible from the direction of traffic flow; vehicle drivethrough windows facing the street or traffic flow.

Landscaped parking islands are required in all parking lots and count toward the required minimum landscape area.

A curbed interior landscape island of 170 square feet, 10 feet minimum width back of curb to backof-curb is required for every 10 parking spaces with a tree planting. Parking spaces are typically 8-9 feet in width and 18-20 feet in depth. At the maximums, for 1.800 square feet of parking spaces, 170 square feet of curbed interior landscape island

Terminal End Islands are required in the ordinance. All parking rows must terminate in a curbed

landscape island of a minimum of 360 square feet in area with a minimum of two trees planted.

Median Landscape Islands must be located after every third parking bay and along primary internal access drives.

The Landscape Ordinance also has Residential Front Yard Landscaping Requirements to apply to single family residences. duplexes and townhouse.

clude a minimum of two large trees of at least two inches in caliper or one tree of at least four inches in caliper seven feet high. A minimum of one tree for each 50 feet of lot width measured along the front lot line.

For duplexes where parking is provided in the front vard, an eight feet landscaped setback shall be required between the property line and the nearest side of the parking pad.





### In Memoriam of Dr. Christopher Spradley April 12, 1973-July 17, 2015

In each of us, there remains a child. As we pass through the years of childhood, we are told by society to grow up, to be a man or to be a lady and to put down childish things.

For many of us, we learn to stifle that child, to set him in the corner and let the grown up do the talking, as it were.

Not so with our beloved Chris Spradley. He carried the childlike awe and excitement for life, for today, for tomorrow and for tomorrow's tomorrow in his heart, on his face and in his open love for the ones he called friends and family.

Dr. Spradley ... perhaps the only ones to call him Doctor were his patients at Scott & White... but to the rest he will always remain Chris. Chris attacked life. He relished life. He shared life.

Dr. Christopher Spradley's life ended at about 1 a.m. July 17, 2015 as the result of a tragic accident on the property that he and his life partner Will Lowery had recently purchased. Chris Spradley was born in Nacogdoches to Tucker Randall and Christi Spradley on April 12, 1973.

That's the official record of it.

But the record in the hearts of his friends and his family is that he died while sharing the joy and the awe of his life with good friends.

Perhaps this awe-inspired life of Chris's is the result of his having been dealt a tough hand from the start of it. A congenital heart defect almost guaranteed that his life would be cut short and full of pain. And it was full of pain. Chris carried the visible scars of open heart surgeries performed on him as a child. He also carried the internal pain of arthritis. But you would not know this from his smile. As a result of this, Chris was called to medicine, to healing others.

After graduating from his hometown high school, Robert E. Lee High in the east Texas town of Tyler, Spradley went on to Texas A&M University, where he graduated in 1995 with a bachelor of science degree.

He then went on to the Texas A&M University System Health Science Center College of Medicine in College Station to earn his Doctor of Medicine in 2000. After a residency in internal medicine at Scott & White Hospital through the Texas A&M University System Health Science Center, he became a Fellow in Pulmonary, Critical Care and Sleep Medicine at Scott & White Hospital, Texas A&M Health Science Center.

He specialized in critical care medicine, pulmonary arterial hypertension, medical diseases of the chest, sleep disorders, right heart catheterization and palliative care.

That is the official record of Dr. Chris Spradley. The unofficial record is this: he was a healer. Nothing pleased him more than to announce his arrival home to his husband Will with the words: "Good news! No one died today."

Home for Chris was the Inn. He and Will have owned Inn on the Creek since 2005. They have expanded the property over the years to include one of Salado's favorite places to gather for a bite and a drink, The Shed, and the elegant Alexander's Distillery, both of which were jewels in his eyes. He loved the partnership of business ownership with his husband Will Lowery.

As a business owner, he was an avid believer and supporter of the Village of Salado. He was very excited about the next chapter of the Inn on the Creek and wanted to share that good news with everyone.

Chris met his husband Will 14 years ago, while working on his residency, and the two never part-


Will and Chris lived for their family. Chris is survived by his husband Will Lowery, his brother Matt and sister-in-law Kelly Gilliam Spradley, his grandmother Neta Hanna and his uncle and aunt David and Becky Hanna.

### Hillary Against the Uber Economy

Grandmothers know best, as Hillary Clinton has put it in tweets, but judging by her latest economic speech, they don't necessarily get or like

The ride-sharing service is synonymous with the new efficiency and convenience enabled by information technology, and is anathema to regulators and entrenched interests everywhere. Add to the list of its critics the presumptive Democratic presidential nominee.

Hillary Clinton didn't mention Uber by name but warned about the disruption caused by it and other companies in the so-called sharing economy. Her husband wanted to build a bridge to the 21st century; Hillary worries about the downsides of "advances in technology and expanding global trade."

Republicans would be foolish not to welcome a contrast with Hillary over some of the hottest companies in the world. The Bush campaign let it be known that Jeb will order an Uber ride in San Francisco during a campaign swing there.

In the liberal imagination, the sharing economy is hurting workers by substituting part-time, contractor work for higher-paying full-time jobs that come with the full panoply of traditional benRich Lowry



efits and protections. This line of attack creates the impression that these new firms are sucking workers from stereotypical 9-to-5 jobs so they can be dispossessed by tech-savvy entrepreneurs. But obviously something is drawing workers to this kind of work.

In a study for Uber, Princeton University economist Alan Krueger found "drivers who partner with Uber appear to be attracted to the platform in large part because of the flexibility it offers, the level of compensation and the fact that earnings per hour do not vary much with hours worked, which facilitates part-time and variable

Uber is really a paragon of choice. Its drivers decide when or if they are going to work, and customers call it up at will. It cuts out the middleman in the form of the shabby. highly regulated taxi cartels more concerned with their own interests than customer satisfaction or convenience.

And that gets to the real issue, which is control. The sharing economy tends to do an end run

around regulators, and to challenge entrenched business interests that benefit from a cozy relationship with government.

As a disrupter of sclerotic practices in the economy and government, the sharing economy is predictably the subject of a furious regulatory and legal counter-assault. Uber has been a target in cities around the country, and abroad.

Presumably the CEOs of sharing-economy companies in the U.S. don't have to worry about being hunted down and jailed (at least not until Bernie Sanders is president). But when Hillary pledged to "crack down on bosses who exploit employees by misclassifying them as contractors," it was clear what she was talking about. She is signaling her intention to declare open season on innovators not to the liking of the regulatory-business complex.

One would think that new services that link up workers and customers in creative ways would be welcomed, not feared. But Democrats are increasingly the party of economic nostalgia. They still want that bridge to the 21st century; they just want to travel the other way.

### Republicans want to humiliate low-income households that qualify for aid to access the Internet.

Being poor means a life of sacrifices, frustrations, and constant struggle. So what is it about Republican officeholders that causes them to go out of their way to make life even harder for low-income people?

Luckily, they're outnumbered that on five-member panel and

were outvoted. But they then demanded a requirement that low-income families must publicly reveal that they are poor to qualify for this benefit.

The FCC's two Scrooges are subjecting these families to a daunting and humiliating bureaucratic process, which will prevent many kids from getting the Internet access that everyone needs for education success.

### Village approves incentive plans

On the same day that Clark Lyda purchased the Stagecoach Inn restaurant, motel and conference center property, the Village of Salado approved a Master Development Plan and Master Development Agreement with Stagecoach 1943, LLP on July

The Salado Board of Aldermen unanimously approved a Master Development Plan with Stagecoach 1943, LP, followed immediately by approval of a Master Development Agreement and a Tourism Marketing Agreement with Stagecoach 1943.

In the Development Plan, the developer will make a minimum capital investment of \$7.5 million in the Stagecoach property. The developer will add 38 rooms to the property, bringing the total to 120 rooms. The property will be a four star property, according to the presentation on the plans for Stagecoach Inn.

Phase 1 of the Plan will be the renovation and redevelopment of the historic Stagecoach Inn on Main Street. Phase 1 will include redeveloping the retail spaces on the west side of Main Street into a 5,0000 sq. ft. conference

According to the Development Plan, the final design of Phase 1 will be completed by the end of 2015 with work commencing in 2016. The developer will prove to the Village of Salado its financial capacity for the redevelopment of the Mixed Use Development.

Phase 2 of the Development Plan will be the expansion, renovation and

redevelopment of the hotel property, including the addition of 38 rooms. The entry into the hotel property will be on Main Street, according to the plan. The plan will include addition of a full service fitness center, a mineral pool with spa and a landscaped courtyard with an outdoor event and activity center.

The developer, according to the Development Plan, will provide its final design and prove its financing of the second phase of the project by the end of 2017. The expansion of the hotel will be completed by July 2019.

City manager Kim Foutz said that the dates are conservative estimates.

Parts of the package of incentives include these:

• Allowing the developer to use his own independent third-party inspector at his own cost for all inspections.

• The Village agrees to allow the developer to lease the parking lot along the creek at \$1 per year with the option of purchasing the property for \$1 at the completion of Phase 1. The Village would maintain all easements for utilities and public access.

• The developer will pay \$500 month for wastewater for two years or until completion of the sewer system when rates would be set.

The Village also ap-

proved a Tourism Marketing Agreement with Stagecoach 1943 LP that would rebate the local hotel occupancy taxes that the Stagecoach generates above its historic baseline for 10 years on a declining scale. Under the marketing agreement, the Stagecoach Inn would present its marketing plan to the Board of Aldermen each year.

The 10 year scale would be this: 70 percent in year one, 65 percent in year two, 55 percent in year three, 50 percent in year four, 45 percent in years five through seven and 40 percent in years eight through 10.

### Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

A player seldom gains by making an opening bid out of turn, but here is a case where the offender reaped a rich harvest.

East was the dealer, but South opened the bidding with one heart before East had a chance to act. The Laws of bridge specifically cover this irregularity. The out-of-turn bid is canceled, and the player whose turn it was to call may then open the bidding or pass. Subsequent penalties may apply, depending mostly on the action taken by the player whose turn it was to call in the first place.

In this case, East elected to open with four diamonds. South, aware that his partner, in accordance with the Laws, would have to pass at his first turn to bid, boldly bid four hearts, which West of course doubled.

The bidding: South West East 1 ♥ (out of turn) Pass Dble Pass Opening lead — king of clubs. Everybody passed, and

West led the king of clubs. It is true, in a sense, that West had five trump tricks and East had three diamond tricks. But despite that, South wound up making the contract!

He won the club lead with the ace and played a trump to dummy's ace, learning that

West had all seven missing trumps. South then cashed four spade tricks, discarding his remaining club as West helplessly followed suit. After ruffing a club at trick seven, South's last six cards were the K-J-9 of trumps and 10-7-3 of diamonds, while West held the Q-10-8-7-6-5 of trumps.

Declarer now led a diamond, forcing West to ruff and return a trump to South's K-J-9. Declarer then led another diamond, forcing West to ruff and lead still another trump to South's K-J.

The lasting effect of the deal was that South vowed not to tempt fate ever again by bidding out of turn, while poor West promised to be a little more cautious with his penalty doubles in the future!

### **TSCRA Reflects on 84th Texas Legislative Session**

This year started off on a busy note as the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) tracked legis-



Over 6,400 pieces of legislation were filed by state legislators and TSCRA leaders and staff tracked over 600 bills and resolutions of interest to ranchers and landowners.

lation and worked with

We were actively involved with more bills this session than ever, proving there are a growing number of issues impacting our members. This is why it is extremely crucial for us to keep these important matters on the radar of elected officials whom we have worked to build and maintain relationships with over the years.

As we expected, a central topic for TSCRA this session was water. We aggressively moniand weighed-in on numerous pieces of legislation related to groundwater rights and ownership issues. TSCRA played an active role in opposing legislation that would have infringed on Texans' constitutionally protected groundwater rights. Thankfully, we succeeded in preventing bills from passing that would have ultimately threatened or taken away local management of groundwater.

Additionally, TSCRA

represented private property owners this session by being directly involved in many discussions associated with eminent domain legislation. We successfully worked with other landowner groups to block legislation that would have allowed certain entities to misuse the power of eminent domain to drill allocation oil and gas wells on land that many have worked tirelessly and sacrificed to own.

Further, I was proud to see a balanced budget pass to provide necessary funding for some very important needs in Texas.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) received a 52 percent increase in general revenue funds as a result of Proposition 1 passage in November 2014. Texans will have another opportunity to vote on an additional constitutional amendment this

add another \$2.5 billion transportation toward needs in Texas. We have supported these efforts as our state continues working to meet growing mobility needs. TSCRA will work to ensure that rural Texas gets its fair share of these dollars.

Also, the Texas Anmal Health Commission (TAHC) received a 27 percent increase in general revenue funds and 27 new full-time employees focused on border disease issues and feral swine disease response. These additional resources are crucial to protect the cattle industry from devastating animal diseases.

While this year's session has ended, our work continues as many state agencies focus on implementation of the new policies signed into law by Governor Greg Abbott. TSCRA is already closely working with agency leaders and staff to conscientiously implement these new laws. We will make sure rancher's and landowner's best interests are taken into serious consideration as we work through this process.

The next legislative session in 2017 seems like a long time away, however it will be here before we know it. TSCRA is already discussing key legislative

November, which could items and looking forward to having more of these conversations at our fall Policy Conference in September and throughout the next two years.

> Most importantly, we greatly appreciate the efforts of the many TSCRA members who reached out to us and their state senators and representatives to support or voice concerns on legislation this session. You were instrumental throughout the entire process and we greatly appreciate your willingness to help in these vital efforts. We will need this same amount of attentiveness and participation from members during the interim and for sessions to





### Tips to keep in mind when door-todoor sales representatives start knocking

BBB offers advice about door-to-door sales this summer

If you live in a home, chances are you have talked to a sales representative eager to sell you cleaning supplies, cosmetics or magazine subscriptions. This summer, Better Business Bureau serving Central, Coastal, Southwest Texas and the Permian Basin advises you to be on guard the next time sales representative

knocks on your door. According to the Texas Attorney General, under Texas law, a door-to-door seller must advise you verbally and in writing that you have a right to cancel the sale within three days. The sales representative must also give you a contract or receipt stating the date of the sale, the name and address of the merchant and a statement of your right to cancel the contract, which includes the address where you send your cancellation notice.

BBB offers these tips for consumers to consider if or when a sales representative comes to your

Know who you are buying from. If you purchase from or contract with a local business, you can probably return the product or dispute the work done. On the other hand, if you buy from a "fly-by-night" sales representative, you take the risk of never seeing that person

Do your research and ask questions. Always ask for a physical address and for references, and take time to check the information out. According to the Texas Attorney General, businesses in Texas are required to register with the Secretary of State. You can check with the Secretary of State or your BBB. Resist pressure to "buy now." Don't be pressured

to take advantage of a time-sensitive offer, like "once in a lifetime" or "today only." Instead do some comparison shopping and take time to decide whether you want the product being sold. For a business you can trust, check out BBB's Accredited Business directory at checkbbb.org.

Know your rights. The Texas Business & Commerce Code states that you have three days to cancel a contract for goods or services sold to you, regardless of whether you have received the goods or services. Keep your receipt or contract and a copy of your cancellation notice. Remember, you are not obligated to return goods to the seller until you have recovered either your money or your agreement to pay money.


