BOA approves sale of \$8.2 mil in bonds, to revisit donation, wastewater agreements

Salado aldermen at their Aug. 20 meeting approved the issuance of \$8.2 million in bonds for the construction of a sewer system authorized by voters in November 2014. The issuance of the bonds came three days after village aldermen approved a Donation Agreement and a Wastewater Services Agreement with The Sanctuary Development Company.

Aldermen will consider amending the Wastewater Service Agreement, Donation Agreement, and Deed Agreement with the Sanctuary Development Company during a called meeting 6:30 p.m. Aug. 27.

According to City Manager Kim Foutz, the Sanctuary Development Company has asked for an extension on the deadline to approve the Development Agreement and Public Financing Agreements from Sept. 3 to Sept. 30.

In the Wastewater agreement and Donation agreement, a deadline of Sept. 3 was put in place for the approval of a Development Agreement and the public financing agreement.

Aldermen will also discuss the proposed Development Agreement with the Sanctuary Development Company on Aug. 27.

When approving the issuance of the \$8.2 million in bonds for the sewer system project, aldermen were given good news by the financial advisor.

The bonds will be 20 years at 2.94 percent fixed interest rate with interest only paid the first year, requiring a debt services tax rate of \$0.1396 per \$100 valuation.

In the first year of the bond, the village will make an interest-only payment of \$231,704.67. In years two through 20, the annual payment will range from \$560,000 to \$575,000.

American National Bank is the sole purchaser of the bonds and because they were purchased by one entity, "the Village did not have to pay to have a bond rating," according to Chris Lane, financial advisor to the Village.

Lane reported to aldermen that Bellaire, which has a AAA bond rating, recently issued \$7 million in bonds at 3.3 percent. "The rate you are getting is very good," she said.

"There is one bond holder, which is good for you if you should want to pay them off earlier," she said, adding that the "bank is not paying for insurance because they don't need that, they are doing their own credit review on this."

In other business regarding the sewer, aldermen approved an interlocal agreement with the Central Texas Council of Governments to administer the \$1 million Department of Commerce Economic Development Agency grant for the construction of the sewer system for the business district. The Village applied for \$1.5 million in EDA grant money but was finally approved for \$1

million in federal grants. EDA guidelines require that a Development District provide administration for their grants. The Central Texas Council of Governments is a development district and meets the requirements to fulfill this function. The cost for administration is \$40,000.

Aldermen also approved a contract with Kasberg, Patrick and Associates Engineering Consultants (KPA) totaling \$735,500 for design, bidding and construction administrations services for part of the sewer system.

KPA will design the EDA Projects that include Phase IA the Main Street gravity sewer and the Phase IB Main Street Lift Station and Force Main (\$319,800. KPA will also design other parts of the collection system, including Phase IF the Salado School road gravity sewer, Phase IH West Village Road gravity sewer and Phase II S. West Village/Thomas Arnold Rd. Gravity sewer, totaling \$93,300. Final design of the sewer system designed by KPA will total \$413,100.

Not included in this is the design of the system from the Lift Station at the Stagecoach Inn location, the collection system on Royal Street and the construction of the 300,000 gallon per day wastewater treatment plant. These portions of the overall project will be designed by Pape Dawson Engineers, which is part of the agreements between the Village and Sanctuary developers.

SISD to consider bus cameras

Salado ISD Trustees will consider at their Aug. 31 meeting, two interlocal agreements with the Dallas County Schools that will put cameras on all Salado school buses.

The cameras will be used to capture evidence of violations of state school bus stop arm laws. The Village of Salado Board of Aldermen adopted an ordinance in May creating a civil offense for school bus stop arm violations and enacting a \$300 for those violations that are captured on school bus cameras.

In return for installing the cameras, enforcing the violations and issuing and collecting the fines, Dallas County Schools (DCS) will collect 75 percent of the fines it successfully collects. The remaining 25 percent will be divided equally between the Village of Salado and Salado I.S.D.

The DCS school bus camera program includes installation of the equipment, provide a certified

law enforcement officer to review images of potential violations and issues notices of violations for the school bus stop-arm violations, designate hearing officers, provide testimony and video evidence of violations and collect any civil fines, penalties and costs.

The program is not without its controversy.

Dallas County Schools, an intermediate educational institute that implemented the school bus stop arm camera program in its fleet of more than 2,000 school buses. The cost for implementing the program, according to an investigative report of the program by NBC Channel 5 (Dallas-Fort Worth) reporter Scott Friedman, topped \$75 million, including \$25 million for installing the program at other school districts around the state.

DCS used bond money to pay for the program, which may have led to a lower bond rating last year.

Dallas County Schools is the only vendor for Force Multiplier Solutions BusGuard cameras in

Texas. The website for the program states that: "The Stop Arm Camera Program from Dallas County Schools offers all Texas school districts a simple way to put this advanced technology to good use. It's surprisingly affordable, too. In fact, in most cases the equipment is paid for by the ticket revenue it generates."

The website states that a third of stopped school buses are illegally passed each day, according to the National Association of State Directors of Pupil Transportation. The Texas Transportation Institute at Texas A&M University calculates that there are 16,450 violations each day in Texas for 2.96 million violations.

For more than 500 Salado ISD students and for an estimated 23 million students nationwide, the school day begins and ends with a trip on a school bus.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the greatest risk is not riding the bus, but approaching or leaving the bus.

School budget, tax rate hearing set for Aug. 31

Salado ISD Trustees will conduct public hearings on the proposed 2015-16 budget and the proposed tax rate of \$1.2755 per \$100 valuation at 6 p.m. Aug. 31 at the Salado Civic Center. Salado ISD Trustees proposed the \$13.2 million for 2015-16 school, an increase in expenditures of 12 percent.

The proposed budget anticipates an increase in enrollment of more than 6 percent, to generate \$4.7 million in state revenues based on the weighted averaged daily attendance. This increase in state revenues represents more than a 21 percent boost over the \$3.7 million in state revenues last year.

The proposed budget will maintain the local maintenance and operation (M&O) tax of \$1.04 per \$100 valuation and lower the debt service (I&S) tax from 25.14¢ per \$100 valuation to 23.55¢ per \$100 valuation.

Maintaining the \$1.04 M&O rate will generate \$7.23 million in local property tax revenues for the operating budget. Last year, the \$1.04 M&O rate generated \$7 million in local property tax revenues.

The budget increases instruction expenditures to \$7 million to accommodate a new teacher pay scale that increased pay 1.8-9.4 percent, depending on years of experience.

Instruction expenditures are about \$813,000 more than 2014-15, an increase of 12 percent. Instruction costs are 53 percent of the total budget.

Curriculum and Staff Development increases by more than 33 percent to \$100,474.

School Leadership increases to \$868,813, or 12 percent, due in part to the addition of an assistant principal at the intermediate school. School Leadership costs are 6.6 percent of the total budget.

Student Transportation costs increase to \$566,961, about a 29 percent in-

crease, and includes the purchase of a new full-size bus and a smaller bus. Transportation costs represent 7 percent of the total budget.

Co-curricular and Extra-curricular expenditures increase 22 percent from \$772,926 to \$907,855 in 2015-16. This represents 7 percent of the total operating budget.

Plant maintenance and operation will increase by more than 67 percent in the proposed budget. A large part of the \$607,000 increase is due to the installation of a new phone system for the schools. Total costs for plant maintenance and operation is \$1.6 million, or 12 percent of the total budget.

The budget cuts payments to fiscal agents from \$651,075 to \$225,750 in 2015-16.

In addition to the general operating budget of \$13.22 million, the district will maintain a debt service budget of \$1.36 million in expenses.



A proposed design for the improvement of Main Street will include sidewalks and trails and parallel parking on Main Street. According to City Manager Kim Foutz, Texas Department of Transportation has informed the Village of Salado that it will not allow nose-in parking on Main Street when it resurfaces the street in 2016.

Public input sought on Main St. proposal

Main Street property owners, local residents and business owners are invited to public meetings for the first phase of the Main Street Improvement Initiative 5:30-7 p.m. on Aug. 31 and Sept. 1.

The Village of Salado will take public input concerning a proposed plan for the addition of sidewalks, walking paths, necessary drainage and parallel parking lanes within the 100 foot right-of-way on Salado's Main Street.

The infrastructure work on Main Street is the first phase of the Village initiative, which is based upon the work of Texas A&M

University engineering students through the Texas Target Communities program.

The plan will help make Main Street safer and more pedestrian friendly, according to City Manager Kim Foutz.

It calls for two vehicle lanes of 12 feet in width, bicycle lanes of 3 feet in width and parking lanes of 7 feet in width to allow for parallel parking.

When TXDOT has completed the I-35 expansion and resurfaces Main Street, it will no longer allow nose in parking along its right-of-way, Foutz says.

Outside of the parking lane will be 12 feet of "bioswale," or drainage which will also separate vehicular traffic from pedestrian traffic.

The proposed concept design will have a 6 feet wide sidewalk of concrete and a 4 feet wide trail of crushed materials. Finally at the outermost edge of the TXDOT right-of-way will be a 4 feet strip for plantings and trees.

According to Foutz, the Village will apply for the funding of the sidewalk and trail when TXDOT resurfaces Main Street.

No Trophy for You

NFL quarterbacks fear Pittsburgh Steelers linebacker James Harrison. So should participation trophies, the ubiquitous trinkets given to children for merely showing up and rounding out the rosters of local sports leagues.

The other day, Harrison learned that his sons had brought a couple of them home and was none too pleased: "I came home to find out that my boys received two trophies for nothing, participation trophies!"

He swiftly returned the offending tokens and explained himself on Instagram: "These trophies will be given back until they EARN a real trophy. I'm sorry I'm not sorry for believing that everything in life should be earned and I'm not about to raise two boys to be men by making them believe that they are entitled to something just because they tried their best."

Harrison can be forgiven for having any touchy-feely sentiment wrung out of him by clawing his way to the top of the most punishing meritocracy in all of sports. He was signed by the Steelers as an undrafted rookie, got cut multiple times and considered quitting and becoming a truck driver like his dad, until he finally caught

on in the NFL, where they don't honor you for participating.

Most people are still with Harrison, if a Reason-Rupe poll from last year is to be believed. It found that 57 percent of people think only winning players should get trophies, putting a clear majority on the side of the atavistic impulse to reward only victory.

The trophy has gone from exceptional reward for excellence, to nice gesture, to practically an entitlement. When a cash-strapped Little League in Oklahoma canceled its participation trophies a couple of years ago, one parent complained, "Thanks little league for failing my son and disappointing him as well."

Writing in The New York Times, author Ashley Merryman cites a Southern California branch of the American Youth Soccer Organization that distributes about 3,500 awards per season, with about a third of players getting two awards each. Local branches of the soccer outfit, according to Merryman, spend as much

as 12 percent of their budget on trophies.

The popular i9 youth sports league exemplifies the award-happy times. As a newspaper report explained, "To protect the other children's self esteem, there are no MVPs. Every player is given a sportsmanship award, a participant award and a celebratory icon in their online i9 'Trophy Case.'" What, no ESPY Arthur Ashe Courage Awards?

There is such a thing as winning and losing, and excelling and failing. It's OK for kids to understand that, and in fact, if they don't, they are going to be shocked by life. There's no reason to try to hide it under a raft of automatic trophies that will never be as valued as something truly extraordinary or truly earned.

Participation -- and effort -- should be its own reward. No one gave us trophies when my Little League team scuffled to a pathetic losing season on the dusty neighborhood ballfield. We participated, we got humiliated, and we moved on, having indubitably established what James Harrison said of his sons' unearned trophies: "Sometimes your best is not enough."

have been able to reduce the tax rate is because over the last four years we have refinanced over \$15 million of previous construction bonds from an average interest rate of 4.83% to an average interest rate of 2.79%, saving the tax-

payers in our district a total of \$2,883,237 – an average of \$144,162 per year for the next twenty years.

We were also able to significantly increase our

The Texan was testifying against a new rule

requiring corporations to reveal the gap between their CEO's pay and what their workers get. It's "demagoguery," Gramm grumped. Then he lurched into the abyss of absurdity by wailing that overpaid corporate chieftains are actually — get this — victims of public bigotry.

"The one form of bigotry that is still allowed in this country is bigotry against the successful," the multimillionaire snarled.

To prove this bizarre claim, Gramm cited the specific case of his buddy, Ed Whiteacre, who re-

tired as CEO of AT&T in 2007. The exec was widely condemned for grabbing a \$158-million retirement package for himself as he went out the door.

Gramm practically wept as he related the sad story of Whiteacre's heartache. The guy was actually underpaid, wailed Gramm: "If there's ever been an exploited worker, he was exploited. It was an outrage!" This was odd, since the former senator had never previously expressed the slightest concern about exploited workers.

Perhaps Gramm could run a telethon to support ex-executives like Whiteacre, who suffer such soul-crushing bigotry. Please give till it hurts. And don't laugh, for Phil really feels the pain of the rich.

teacher salaries for the second year in a row. Our salaries for teachers with less experience are still behind the largest districts in the area, but our salaries for teachers with more experience are closer to those districts' salaries. The graphic shows a comparison of the 2015-2016 teacher hiring salary schedules for teachers in Salado as compared to the three largest school districts in Bell County, based on their years of experience, and a comparison of our teacher salaries with all of the school districts in Regions 12 and 13 (Waco and Austin area) with between 1,000 and 2,999 students.

That is because those districts benefit from an economy of scale based on their larger size and they also receive a significant amount of weighted state and federal funding as a result of their more diverse student populations.

Our goal is to continue to increase our teacher salaries every year so we are able to recruit and retain the very best teachers.

KPA will also put together bid package for \$10,000 for the Village, as part of the contract approved on Aug. 20.

The final division of basic services provided by KPA will be construction administration services totaling \$110,300. This included \$59,100 for construction administration of the Phase IA, \$15,800 for Phase IB, \$16,000 for Phase IF, \$11,600 for Phase IH and \$7,800 for Phase II.

Total cost for basic services is \$533,400.

Additional services agreed to in the contract

total another \$207,100 and include \$50,000 for easement field notes and sketcher, \$2,000 for boundary survey for the lift station site, \$4,200 for the evaluating of the low pressure systems and \$17,700 for the planning, bidding and administration for decommissioning the Stagecoach Wastewater Treatment Plant. KPA will also provide on-site representation for the EDA Grant projects \$75,000 and Bond Projects \$40,200.

KPA will also provide a plan review on behalf of the Village for "Sanctuary WWTP Design by Pape-Dawson" for \$18,000.

artists, fiber artist, wood carvers and more.





Salado Eagles will kick off the 2015 football season 7:30 p.m. Aug. 29 at University of Mary Hardin-Baylor's Crusader stadium against the Troy Trojans.

Salado will run a 3-4 defense under defensive coordinator Larry Moore and co-defensive coordinator Josh Dillard.

The Eagles will continue to run the spread offense under Brent Graham, who will be offensive coordinator as well as head football coach.

two, becoming a Red Dirt/Texas Music circuit mainstay known for high-energy shows, and that intensity is found on AVIATOR as well, on tracks like "It's Too Soon," "Golden Shackles" and an album ending "Studio A JAM" not to be missed.

"The theme is, essentially, following direction, trusting in yourself, and new beginnings," LaRue says. "A lot of it is

spurred from divorce and open-eyed ways of looking at things, be it relationships or just the world as a while."

But while AVIATOR was crafted at the tail end of some personal upheaval, LaRue took comfort and energy from reteaming with creative partners from previous projects, such as songwriter Mando Saenz and the producers of his last studio record Velvet, veteran hit makers Frank Liddell and Mike McCarthy.

The term "organic" gets used far to frequently in music today, but it is hard to find a more apt one to describe Liddell, McCarthy and LaRue's process

making AVIATOR. From recording analog on two-inch tape, to one-take performances by world-class studio musicians gathered as a band, AVIATOR's tracks crackle with an energy you're only going to find from hard-fought teamwork forged in the studio.

It's a process LaRue knows runs counter to the "record today, release later today" modern day music business machine. "I understand it, that people want the product and artists want to get it out there as soon as possible," he notes. "But that kind of goes against what the natural way of letting art happen."

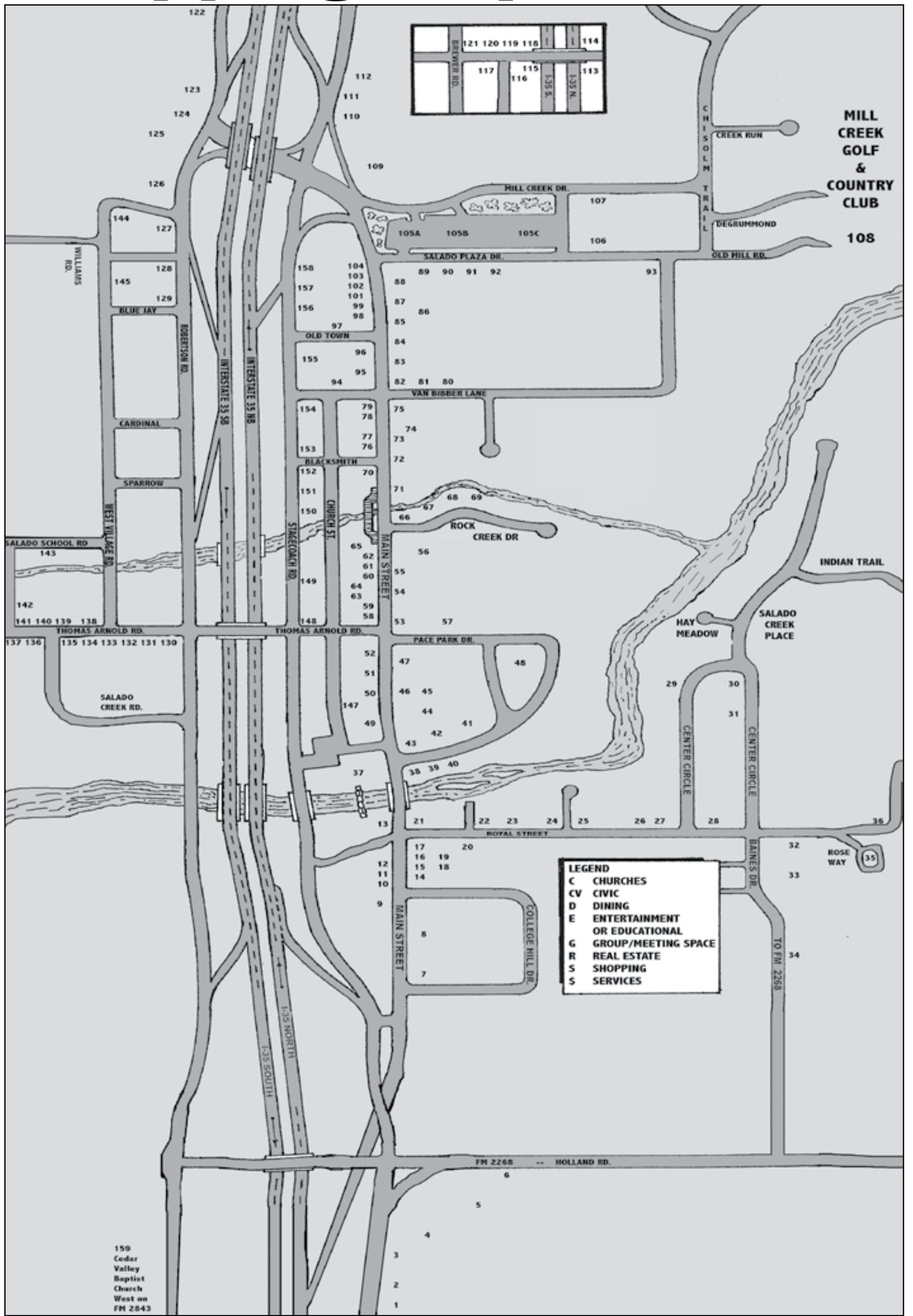

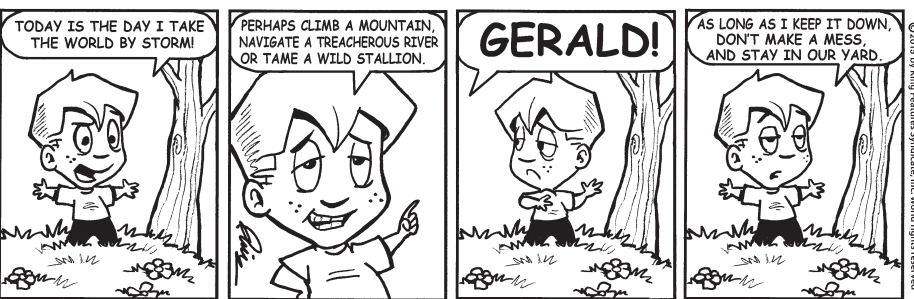

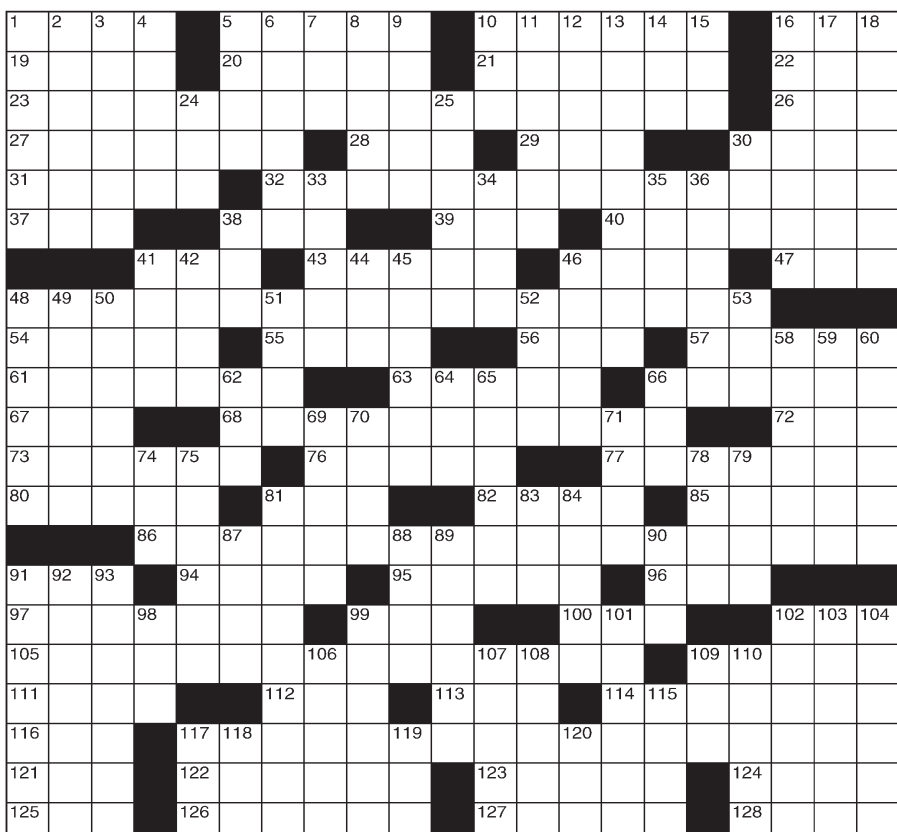

Texas Vehicle Registration Renewal Still Available Online with Two Steps, One Sticker

Texans are encouraged to renew their vehicle registration at Texas.gov

Texas.gov and the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles (TxDMV) are reminding all Texans that the online option for renewing a vehicle registration is still available. With the launch of the new Two Steps, One Sticker program on March 1, 2015, vehicles must first pass an inspection. When ready, Texans can head directly to Texas.gov/Driver (www.texas.gov/driver) to complete their renewal.

The process for taking care of a vehicle registration renewal online is very straightforward:

1. Get your car inspected. The inspection station will provide you with a Vehicle Inspection Report for your records. This information is also sent automatically to the state's database. (Note: From March 1, 2015 through February 29, 2016, you may renew your registration without passing a new inspection if your vehicle already has a current, passing inspection unless your inspection and registration stickers expire in the same month. Visit www.twostepsonesticker.com for more details.)

2. Go online to renew your registration. Texas.gov/Driver is the easiest way to access the online service. Your inspection information will already be in the system and you can finish the renewal in just a few minutes.

3. Receive your

sticker in the mail. After verifying your renewal, the county tax office will mail the registration sticker to you.

"We want Texans to have access to TxDMV services around the clock," said Executive Director Whitney Brewster. "The time-saving process of online vehicle registration renewal allows you to take care of business when and where it's convenient for you."

In partnership with TxDMV, Texas.gov processed nearly three million online vehicle registration renewals in 2014, and all 254 counties in Texas offer this convenient, secure service.

Consumer Alert: In order to safely take care of your government business online, beware of unof-

ficial, look-alike websites operated by private organizations that may charge unnecessary fees for services or information. Instead, make sure you are using the State's official website, www.texas.gov, or an official state agency website to complete your online transaction. To access an official website, enter the URL in the address bar at the top of your Internet browser (e.g. Internet Explorer, Mozilla Firefox, Google Chrome, etc.) instead of entering the address in a search engine bar (e.g. Google, Bing, Yahoo, etc.). Aldermen put off action on landscaping

Salado aldermen postponed action on proposed Landscaping regulations following a public hearing on the proposed ordinance Aug. 20.

On a motion by Fred Brown, aldermen approved postponing the adoption of the change and appointing a committee with business members to review the proposal. Earlier in the week, the Planning and Zoning commission voted for approval of the proposed ordinance.

After an initial look by the P&Z commission, language in the ordinance applying it to single family residential was struck out of the proposal.

Other language, according to City Manager Kim Foutz, that required the landscape designers or landscape architects to design a Landscape Plan was also struck from the proposal.

Four people spoke during the public hearing: Dave Broecker, Pat Broecker, Linda Reynolds and Tim Fleischer.

Dave Broecker told aldermen that as a property owner, he did not want a "city administrator, et al, tell me what kind of trees I can plant or what kind of shrubbery I can plant on my property."

Pat Broecker said that

in reading the proposed changes, she felt it was "pretty dictatorial.... We are told we have to dig a hole so many feet from the foundation and the hole has to be 'X' amount deep." She added that requirements for certain kinds of mulch and certain kinds of edging was not appropriate for Salado.


"Salado will typically do the right thing," she said, without being told to do it.

Linda Reynolds recalled that the City of Temple installed landscaping in its medians at a cost of about \$100,000. "They put in irrigation, hired a maintenance crew and the darn things died," she said. She added that a landscaping ordinance was not necessary because "most businesses will want their property to look nice and will act accordingly."

Tim Fleischer told aldermen during the hearing that there was not buy-in from the business community on the ordinance. He said that in lieu of putting in these regulations, the Village could educate property owners and businesses about xeriscaping practices and deer resistant plants. He added that the regulations requiring irrigation are similar to those in other communities that are drinking up "as much water as they can get their hands on."

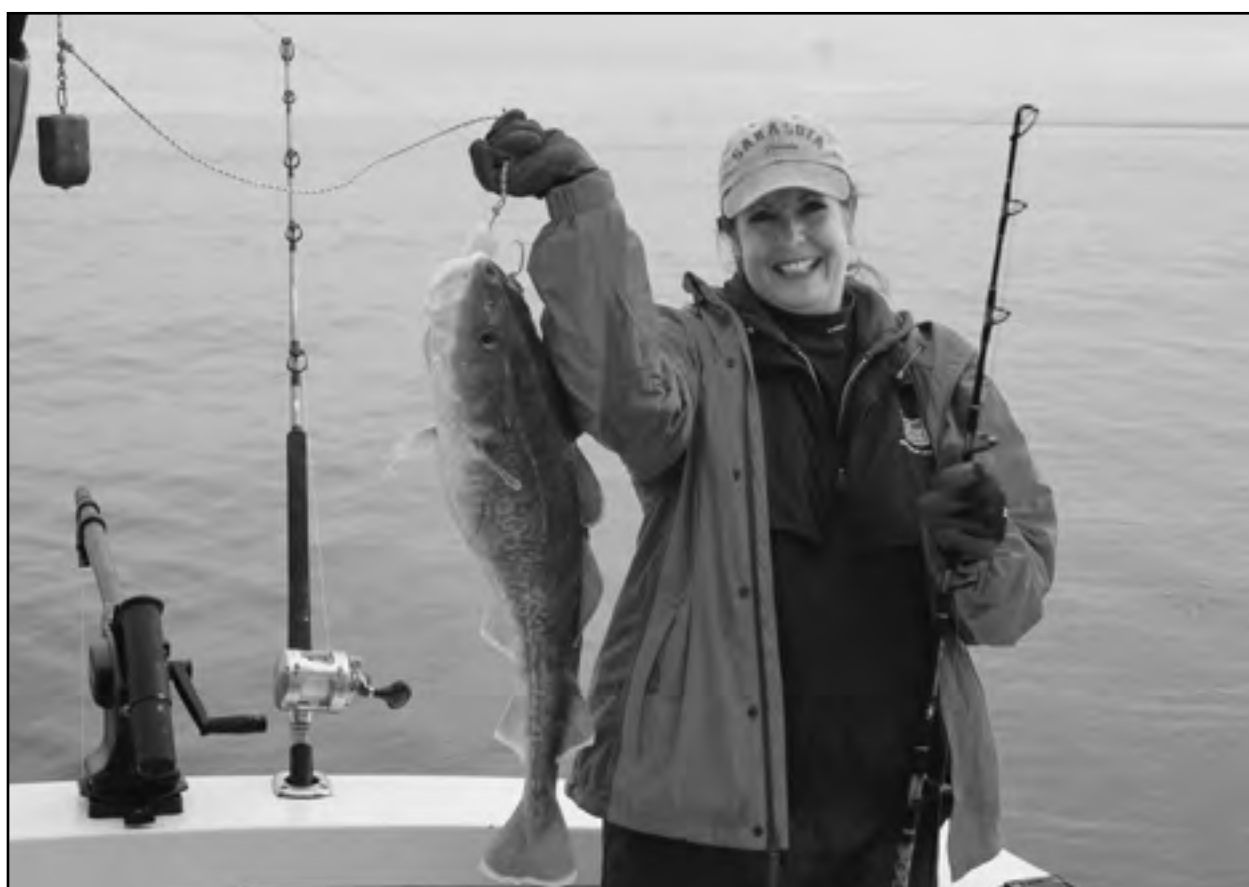

Hunting, Fishing Licenses on sale now

Sportsmen gearing up for the upcoming fall hunting seasons are reminded to renew their licenses for 2015-16. The current year Texas hunting and fishing licenses (except year-to-date fishing licenses) will expire Aug. 31.

Every year, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issues about 2.5 million hunting and fishing licenses through the agency's 28 field offices, more than 50 state parks and at over 1,700 retailers across the state. Licenses may also be purchased online through the TPWD website at www.tpwd.texas.gov/buy or by phone at 1-800-895-4248. Call center hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Please note that there is a required \$5 administrative fee for each phone or online transaction but multiple items can be purchased during a single transaction occasion for the \$5 fee. The online transaction system is available 24/7. For online and phone orders, a physical license will be mailed within three business days. During that time period, a transaction receipt will be provided via email that will be sufficient proof of hunting license that can be used for dove hunting, though it will not be allowed for the



take of fish or wildlife that require a tag.

Hunting and fishing regulations for the new season can be found in the 2015-2016 Outdoor Annual, available in booklet form at license retailers and digitally online at www.outdoorannual.com. Hunters and anglers can also download the free 2015-2016 Outdoor Annual mobile app on their Apple or Android devices.

Mandatory Hunter Education Certification

In addition to a hunt-

ing license, anyone born after Sept. 1, 1971, must successfully complete a hunter education training course or purchase a one-time deferral good for one license year in order to hunt legally in Texas. The certification is valid for life and is honored in all other states and provinces. Last year, TPWD certified a record 72,000 hunter education students, yet Texas game wardens still issued more than 3,400 citations and warnings last

fall for hunters not meeting hunter education certification requirements.

Getting certified has never been more convenient. Hunters who need hunter education certification have several expanded contemporary options including a streamlined, one-day basic course and an option for anyone 17 years of age or older to take the hunting safety training completely online. A combination online home study and 4 to 5 hour skills

field day course is also offered. More information on hunter education certification is available online at www.tpwd.texas.gov/huntered.

Bird Hunting Requirements

A Migratory Game Bird endorsement and Harvest Information Program (HIP) certification are also required to hunt dove or teal in September. HIP certification involves a brief survey of previous year's migratory bird hunting success and is conducted at the time licenses are purchased. Duck hunters also need to purchase a Federal Duck Stamp. The cost of the duck stamp was increased this year to \$25, plus applicable state and federal fees.

There are other mandatory endorsements to consider at the time of license purchase. An Upland Game Bird Stamp (\$7) is required to hunt all non-migratory game birds, including turkey, quail, pheasant and chachalaca.

Texas Parks & Wildlife Magazine's Hunting Forecast

The Texas Parks & Wildlife magazine's free digital hunting issue will be available starting August 15. This special issue includes the 2015-2016 hunting forecast for deer, dove, ducks and more. Wild game recipes and other tips are also included. It can be downloaded as a free app on

iPad or iPhone or viewed as a digital version online starting August 15 at www.tpwdmagazine.com/hunt/.

Big Time Texas Hunts

Lifetime Licenses

Hunters and anglers can also take care of their licensing requirements for life with the purchase of a \$1,800 Lifetime Super Combo, or they can enter for the chance to win a lifetime license through the department's Lifetime License Drawing. Entries for the drawing cost \$5 each and may be purchased at license retailers, by phone or online at www.tpwd.texas.gov/licensedraw. There is no limit on the number of entries that may be purchased. Winners will be drawn on Dec. 30, 2015 and June 30, 2016. If you enter by Dec. 27, 2015, you will be eligible for both drawings.
