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BOA sends water agreement back to Sanctuary developer

Aldermen will consider, at their Sept. 17 meeting, approving a Wastewater Services agreement and Land Donation agreement with Sanctuary Development Company LLC without stipulations in it concerning annexation of the property into the Village of Salado.

After the board of aldermen (BOA) discussed the changes made to the Wastewater Services agreement by attorneys for Sanctuary Development LLC, it voted unanimously to direct its attorney Leah Davis to submit the Wastewater agreement that she submitted on Sept. 14 to Sanctuary with change in the document to refer to the discharge point and the costs for extending that point. The motion required Sanctuary to sign and submit the agreement to the village attorney by no later than 5 p.m. Sept. 17.

"This is not what we agreed to," Fred Brown said of the Wastewater agreement submitted back to the BOA from Sanctuary following a contentious Sept. 10 meeting. "These changes are not what Robert Sulaski agreed to."

Brown said, "Here we are again" with an agreement that does not reflect what was verbally agreed to by both parties.

Citing language in the section 1.9 of the wastewater agreement, Village attorney Leah Hayes told aldermen that "What they are saying is that if all of what they describe as the other related agreements -- the donations agreement, the tourism marketing agreements, the development agreement, the Chapter 380 economic development agreement -- if those agreements for whatever reason fail to come to pass, we still have a commitment to provide them with the services of wastewater."

"Give us the development rights we have requested and we will do the annexation," Robert Sulaski told aldermen Sept. 10, during a terse discussion of agreements between the Village of Salado and The Sanctuary.

Sulaski has stated that without a development agreement that allows Sanctuary to "develop the way we want to develop it," then the property will not be annexed into Salado.

Among other changes to the Sept. 14 agreement was removal of tying the date of execution to the transfer of the permit. "It is tied to the date of the execution of the agreements," Hayes said.

The wastewater agreement presented to the BOA includes language on Annexation Matters: that the Village agrees not to annex the property for 45 years except through the related agreements and acknowledges that the site donated is for agreement not to be annexed.

"That was what I received at 5 p.m. today," she said.

Hayes told aldermen that "references to annexation being a condition for providing wastewater service have been removed from the agreement."

Further, references to higher rates for sewer services being charged to properties that are not in the city limits have been taken out of the document, she said.

Hayes said that after consulting with bond counsel, a provision relating to fees, rates and charges that "would include applicable capital recovery fees for those in the city limits and those outside the city limits" were deleted and replaced with the term "impact fees."

The BOA instructed Hayes to include language about the discharge point of the plant and the costs of moving it. They instructed her to insure that the cost of conveying the effluent from the plant across the property to the discharge point chosen by the Sanctuary would be paid by Sanctuary.

After hearings, budget set for adoption

Salado aldermen will adopt the 2015-16 budget and set a tax rate of \$0.339 at their 6:30 p.m. Sept. 24 meeting.

The board conducted tax rate hearings on Sept. 10 and on Sept. 15. Aldermen also conducted a budget hearing on Sept. 15, at a special called meeting.

The board must adopt its tax rate no later than Sept. 29, and send notice to the Bell County Tax Appraisal District. The proposed tax rate is just below the roll-back rate, but represents an increase of 15.85 cents over the current rate of \$18.1 cents per \$100 valuation.

The 2015-16 tax rate represents the first year

that the Village of Salado will have a debt service tax rate.

During the Sept. 10 hearing on the tax rate, resident Linda Reynolds told aldermen that although she is not directly affected by the tax rate increase "I feel very strongly that my neighbors are already being affected by it." She told aldermen of a neighbor with "three little ones" who she says has moved because of taxes.

"The next door neighbor's house is up for sale," she said, adding that the board should "keep that in mind, whatever decision you make." She added that the budget shows \$40,000 in expenses "for the sewer system we have taken as a gift. I hope that at some point those who are using

it will pay for it."

During discussion of the hotel motel funds budget, alderman Fred Brown asked city manager Kim Foutz if it was too late for him to include a motion to draw down the \$120,000 fund balance in the hotel motel funds by \$50,000 in the next fiscal year.

"This is not the time to be sitting on money," he said. "We need to be marketing and advertising to bring people to this town."

Brian Sunshine, during the public hearing on the tax rate Sept. 15, stated that when he moved to Salado in 1997, "Salado was a village before there was a government. Now it is more of a government than a village."

He said that when Salado incorporated it was

on the promise of operating on sales taxes. "Then sometime in 2006 to 2008 we added a property tax of 4.5 cents. Then it went to 12 cents and last year to 18.1 cents. Now it is increasing to 33.9 cents," he said adding that it will increase even more the following year to pay down the bond. "We will be in the same tax rates of Belton, Temple and surrounding cities with little show for it."

"I am not here to say we don't need taxes," he added. "I am here to say you do a very good job of raising them."

Later, in the budget hearing, Sunshine questioned the \$61,000 in the capital outlay for streets. "This year, there was \$400,000 for streets."

I-35 NB lanes closed overnight Sept. 20

Texas Department of Transportation has set a full mainlane closure for the northbound lanes beginning at the North Main Street exit to half a mile north of FM 2484. The closure will begin at 10 p.m. Sept. 20, with main lanes reopening at 7 a.m. Sept. 21.

The northbound main-

lanes will be closed to allow for barrier wall relocation and striping for the detour of the northbound mainlanes.

During the closure, northbound traffic will be taken off I-35 at the North Main Street exit and remain on the northbound frontage road until it re-enters I-35 at the entrance

ramp south of Amity Rd.

Southbound traffic on I-35 will not be affected during the closure.

The frontage road that is two-way from the north end of Main Street to the hotels at FM 2484 will be northbound only during the closure. The FM 2484 bridge will be open to westbound traffic only.

Eastbound traffic from FM 2484 will turn south at the southbound access road to Thomas Arnold, where it can then access Main Street by crossing over the interstate.

The intersections of FM 2268, South Main Street and Thomas Arnold will not be changed during the overnight closure.



Ben Carson, a Superior Outsider

While Jeb Bush feuds with Donald Trump and others kowtow to him, only one candidate is seriously gaining on him.

Ben Carson is now tied with Trump in one Iowa poll and is close in others. His rise suggests that it's possible to catch the populist wave roiling Republican politics and yet not be an obnoxious braggart. Ben Carson is a superior outsider to Donald Trump. He is more gentlemanly and more conservative, with a more compelling life story. He is a man of faith who, despite his manifest accomplishments, has a quiet dignity and winsome modesty about him. Ben Carson is a throwback, whereas Donald Trump is a boldfaced name straight out of our swinish celebrity culture. What they have in common is that they are political neophytes who are memorable communicators precisely because they speak and carry themselves so differently from other candidates. The similarities stop there.

Carson aced the Fox debate when in his closing statement he didn't puff himself up and attempt to soar like candidates always do, but gently said a few nice things about his background as a surgeon, with a touch of humor. It

was a hit.

If you like your outsider not to favor higher taxes, not to have once opposed the ban of partial-birth abortion, not to speak favorably of socialized medicine and not to have been an erstwhile booster of Nancy Pelosi and Hillary Clinton, Ben Carson (or Carly Fiorina) is a much better bet than Donald Trump.

And Carson is altogether a more sympathetic figure. He rose from nothing; Trump took over the family real-estate business. Carson's mom was one of 24 kids, had a third-grade education and worked as a domestic; Trump's father amassed a fortune of \$300 million.

Carson is a serious Christian who has a powerful testimonial about getting down on his knees as a young man unable to control his temper and saying, "Lord, unless you help me, I'm not going to make it."

Trump says he likes "The Art of the Deal" better than any book except the Bible, but he appears to

have read just one of them. Trump is, to say the least, of a different mold. He is a successful creature of our culture of conspicuous display and tasteless braggadocio. It's no accident that he that he names everything after himself.

Carson has certainly made the most of his own renown, churning out best-sellers and raking in the speaking fees, but it's impossible to imagine him engaging in juvenile insult wars with random targets of his ire. Or imagine him calling a female journalist a "bimbo" for asking unwelcome questions. Or commenting crudely on women's appearances.

Ben Carson stands for something different. His personal story shows how true class isn't about riches, but about character. Donald Trump has all the finest things and, I'd hazard to guess, barely as much class as Ben Carson's penniless mother struggling to raise her sons had in her pinky. If conservatives want to flirt with or support an unconventional candidate, Carson provides the opportunity to do it without a guilty conscience.

I, as most people, scanned the above article in the *Salado Village Voice*. We Americans seem to have a natural aversion to reading government documents because they are purposefully made tedious and deceiving so we won't read them all. We also know from experience that no government budget is ever administered and carried out as proposed and approved. They are always over spent and under performing!

The Village budget being proposed for 2015-16 is certainly typical of the prototype described above.

Here is my perceived summary of what we are

being asked to acknowledge for the upcoming Village budget meeting, (only the BOA) has approved authority.

The tax rate on our homes will be increased by 87 percent. I could not discern any benefits to be received resulting from the 87 percent increase in rates.

The Village is proposing a \$250,000 debt secured by property tax.

The Village had a negative cash over run (overspent) in their 2015 budget of approximately one-half million dollars!

The Village budget plan for 2016 contains a surplus of \$29,000, (see overrun

discussed above.

The budgeted amount for street maintenance/repair is totally inadequate. Maybe we have become too accustomed to bad streets with all this highway construction.

The Village projects only \$5,900 increased revenues for 2016 from new properties added to our tax rolls. Maybe our highly regulated and overtaxed policies are not conducive to expansion of our real estate market. The Village was very clever in proposing a rate increase .0001 of a dollar below the legal

Proclamation to honor creation of Constitution

On 17 September 1787, the U.S. Constitution was created.

Fifty-five delegates from twelve states (Rhode Island refused to attend) formed the Constitutional Convention. Thomas Jefferson and John Adams were in Europe. Samuel Adams, Patrick Henry, and Richard Henry Lee declined to attend because they opposed a powerful central government. Out of 55, 39 signed the Constitution.

The youngest delegate was Jonathan Dayton, 26, New Jersey. The oldest was Benjamin Franklin, 81. The average age was 42. There were 28 Episcopalians, 8 Presbyterians, 7 Congregationalists, 2 Lutherans, 3 Dutch Reformed, 2 Methodists, 2 Roman Catholics, 1 unknown, and 3 deists.

Supporters of the Constitution were called Federalists: Alexander Hamilton, James Madison, and

John Jay. Opponents were called Anti-Federalists: Patrick Henry and George Clinton.

George Washington, chosen to preside over the convention, decided that their debates should be kept secret. All agreed that the Central Government needed strengthening which could only be done by drafting a new Constitution.

Politics were extreme. The Delegates disagreed on taxes, immigration, courts, wars, religion, and democracy. Contention was as active as their principles. The Larger States tried to rule over smaller states; the more affluent over the less affluent; and

the city over the country states.

Ratification of the Constitution was difficult. Nine out of 13 states was needed. Delaware, New Jersey, and Georgia approved unanimously. Others: Pennsylvania, 46-23; Connecticut, 128 to 40; Massachusetts, 187 to 168; Maryland, 63 to 11; South Carolina 149 to 73; and New Hampshire, 57 to 47.

States opposed: New York, North Carolina, Virginia, and Rhode Island. Looking back, the authors of the Constitution not only left a great law but a style of thought and a way of working – be intelligent; be serious but practical; be brave; work hard; and compromise when needed.

Thursday, in their regular meeting, the BOA will offer a Proclamation in honor of the creation of the Constitution.

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Explanatory Statements for the November 3, 2015 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1)
SJR 1 - Current law provides an exemption of \$15,000 from the ad valorem taxation for public school purposes of a residence homestead. The proposed amendment would increase this exemption to \$25,000, starting in the tax year beginning January 1, 2015. In order to reflect the increased exemption on the homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or a disabled person, the proposed amendment would provide a reduction to the current limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes. The proposed amendment would protect school districts from all or part of the revenue loss by authorizing an appropriation of funds according to formulas set by the legislature. In addition, the proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision from reducing or repealing a homestead exemption adopted by the political subdivision. Finally, the proposed amendment would prohibit the imposition of a tax on the conveyance of real property, but would not prohibit the imposition of a business tax measured by business activity, a tax on the production of minerals, a tax on the issuance of title insurance, or a change in the rate of a tax in existence on January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$15,000 to \$25,000, providing for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for those purposes on the homestead of an elderly or disabled person to reflect the increased exemption amount, authorizing the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision that has adopted an optional residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation from reducing the amount of or repealing the**

exemption, and prohibiting the enactment of a law that imposes a transfer tax on a transaction that conveys fee simple title to real property."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 75)
HJR 75 - In 2011, voters approved a constitutional amendment to allow a surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value on the disabled veteran's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse had not remarried. The amendment did not apply to surviving spouses of veterans who died before 2011. This amendment would extend the exemption in such cases. The proposed amendment would apply only to ad valorem taxes imposed for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran who died before the law authorizing a residence homestead exemption for such a veteran took effect."**

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 52)
SJR 52 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the requirement for the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, the Attorney General, and any other officers elected statewide to reside in Austin, Texas, the state capital. Under current law, these statewide elected officers are required to reside in the capital of the State of Texas while in office. This amendment would not apply to the residency requirement for the Governor.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment repealing the requirement that state officers elected by voters statewide reside in the state capital."**

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 73)
HJR 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the legislature the authority to pass statutes to allow a professional sports team charitable foundation to conduct charitable raffles under the terms and conditions imposed by general law. The laws passed under this authority may provide that the professional sports team charitable foundation may use proceeds from such charitable raffles to pay reasonable advertising, promotional, and administrative expenses. Any law enacted by this provision only applies to entities defined as professional sports team charitable foundations on January 1, 2016. Additionally, any law enacted by this provision may only allow charitable raffles to be conducted at games hosted at the home venue of the professional sports team associated with a professional sports team charitable foundation.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles."**

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 17)
SJR 17 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase from 5,000 to 7,500 the maximum total population threshold of a county that is allowed to construct and maintain private roads as long as the county imposes a reasonable charge for the work.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment to authorize counties with a population of 7,500 or less to perform private road construction and maintenance."**

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 22)
SJR 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would add the right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife, including by use of traditional methods, in the Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution. This right would be subject to laws and regulations intended to conserve

and manage wildlife and to preserve the future of hunting and fishing. The proposed amendment would establish hunting and fishing as the preferred method of managing and controlling wildlife in Texas. The proposed amendment is not intended to affect any law or provision related to trespass, property rights or eminent domain, and would not prevent the legislature from authorizing a municipality to regulate the discharge of a firearm in a populated area in the interest of safety.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment recognizing the right of the people to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife subject to laws that promote wildlife conservation."**

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 5)
SJR 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to dedicate a portion of revenues from (1) the state sales and use tax, and (2) the tax imposed on the sale, use, or rental of a motor vehicle, to the State Highway Fund (SHF). Under current law, these funds would be deposited to the General Revenue Fund. Money deposited to the SHF is intended to be used only to construct, maintain, or acquire rights-of-way for public roadways other than toll roads; or to repay certain transportation-related debt.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: **"The constitutional amendment dedicating certain sales and use tax revenue and motor vehicle sales, use, and rental tax revenue to the state highway fund to provide funding for nontolled roads and the reduction of certain transportation-related debt."**

the original permit was for a discharge point immediately adjacent to the plant location, but was later amended to be at the southern part of the property. Aldermen said, in essence, that they felt it should be up to the Sanctuary to pay for that cost, regardless of the language in the permit.

"If he doesn't agree to pay for the extension of the line," Alderman David Williams said, "we will have to amend the permit to discharge near the plant."

Brown said on Sept. 10, that in the negotiations leading up to the Wastewater agreement, "the biggest stepping stone to overcome was the guarantee of so much capacity out of the plant to Sanctuary. They took that off of the

table and we are going to treat them like any other development."

Brown added, "As Salado grows, there will be more use of the plant and we will add to the capacity of the plant. It doesn't matter where the growth comes from, whether it is from Main Street or the west side of the interstate or The Sanctuary or another residential development."

Initially, Brown said, Sanctuary's "intent was to do a MUD (Municipal Utility District)... There would be no unity, no property tax for Salado, no sales tax for Salado. It would be another community at the southern edge of Salado."

Alderman David Williams raised questions about the language of the Agreement documents, particularly the Wastewater service agreement. He questioned the use of the effluent from the sewer treatment plant (which will have an initial 300,000

gallon per day capacity) by The Sanctuary.

"Sanctuary wants the effluent as part of the deal," he said, adding that the Discharge Permit says that "disposal by any other means than discharge directly into the water requires a permit amendment." The Donation agreement originally included language that any amendments to the permit would be done at the cost of the Village.

He further questioned whether the Village would be responsible for the operating and maintenance costs of the discharge line to the Sanctuary. "It sounds like you are going to put that in, but the city is on the tap to make sure it continues to run. If things break in the pond or lines break, then is the city on the hook for that?"

Williams also questioned the Development Agreement, particularly its length and the annexation sections of it. "It says that when they start to de-

velop a property, within 10 days they have to submit an annexation request," Williams said. "I know there will be a plan for the development, but the owners can say 'no, I don't want to do that anymore' for whatever reason. The city is on the hook for everything, though."

"We are very content to do it on our own," Sulaski said, but that is not good community planning. We need to do it together."

"We know more about how to build a community than anyone in this town," Sulaski said Sept. 10. "We have great planners on this and great architects, We know what we're doing."

"If you go to bed every night and imagine a monster under your bed," he said of some of the objections to The Sanctuary, including the outdoor band shell, "you will see a monster under your bed."

"We want to be a blessing to the town," Sulaski said. "We want to be an addition to the town."

here because of the highly significant information South obtains at trick two. On that trick East shows out, revealing that West started with seven diamonds and East with only one.

West therefore has six unknown cards that might include the queen of spades, while East has 12 unknown cards that might include the queen.

On this basis alone, the odds are 2-to-1 that East was dealt the queen, so South should take the finesse. He should not bet the proverbial homestead on its success, as West might have started with the Q-x, but, all factors considered, it is clearly the better play.

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Healthy Living Recipes from Whole Foods Markets

Vegan Harvest Vegetable Tart

Serves 6 to 8

Ingredients:

- 2 tablespoons whole flaxseed , divided
- 1 3/4 cup almond meal
- 1 delicata squash, halved lengthwise, seeded and cut into 1/8-inch slices
- 1 large leek , halved lengthwise and thinly sliced
- 6 ounces mixed mushrooms , trimmed and sliced
- 4 cloves garlic , sliced
- 1 1/2 tablespoon reduced-sodium soy sauce
- 1 1/2 cup cooked quinoa
- 1 1/4 cup butternut squash purée
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh sage
- 1 tablespoon sherry vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons nutritional yeast , divided



Method:

Grind 1 tablespoon of the flaxseed with 1/4 cup water in a spice grinder until fairly smooth. Transfer to a small cup. Repeat with remaining 1 tablespoon flaxseed and another 1/4 cup water. Alternatively, stir 2 tablespoons flaxseed meal into 1/2 cup water.

Preheat the oven to 375°F. Line the bottom of a 10-inch round tart pan with a removable bottom with parchment paper. In a food processor, pulse almond meal and half of the flaxseed mixture until dough begins to pull away from the sides of the bowl. Gather into a ball and flatten into a disk. Press evenly into the bottom and up the sides of the prepared pan. Bake until dried on bottom and barely golden on top edge, about 12 minutes. Cool completely on a rack.

Meanwhile, place delicata squash in a single layer on a parchment-paper-lined baking sheet. Bake alongside crust until soft and browned on the edges, about 15 minutes.

Combine leek, mushrooms and 2 tablespoons water in a large skillet over medium heat. Cook, stirring frequently, until browned and softened, about 12 minutes. Stir in garlic and soy sauce, and cook for 1 minute. Transfer to a medium bowl. Stir in quinoa, butternut squash purée, sage, vinegar, pepper, 1 tablespoon of the yeast and remaining flaxseed mixture. Scrape into tart crust and level top. Sprinkle with remaining 1 tablespoon yeast. Arrange squash slices on top, pressing them lightly into filling. Bake until browned and set, about 45 minutes. Cool for 15 minutes before serving.

Tarragon Chicken Salad Sandwich

Crunchy celery, almonds and onions combine with chicken in smooth mayonnaise and tangy mustard for an ideal lunch or light dinner sandwich. Avoid the stove, if you like, and use cooked rotisserie chicken, removing the skin and bones of course. Simply purchase a two-pound rotisserie chicken, which will yield about 4 cups of meat.

Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 pound boneless, skinless chicken breast halves (about 3)
- 1 cup finely chopped celery
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1/4 cup finely chopped red onion
- 1/4 cup slivered almonds , lightly toasted
- 2 tablespoons chopped tarragon
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 12 slices seeded rye or whole wheat bread
- 6 romaine lettuce leaves
- 2 tomatoes , sliced



Method:

Fill a medium pot with water and bring to a boil over high heat. Add chicken, cover and return to a boil. Simmer chicken for 2 to 3 minutes, then turn off the heat and let the chicken steep, covered, until no longer pink in the thickest part of the breast, 8 to 12 minutes. Using a slotted spoon, transfer chicken to a plate and let cool for approximately 20 minutes. (The chicken can be prepared a day ahead of the rest of the salad, if desired.)

In a medium bowl combine celery, mayonnaise, mustard, onion, almonds, tarragon, lemon juice and pepper and stir to blend. Cut chicken into 1/2-inch cubes, then fold it into the mayonnaise mixture. Arrange 6 slices of bread on a work surface. Divide the chicken salad equally among the bread slices. Top each with a lettuce leaf, slice of tomato and second slice of bread. Cut sandwiches in half and serve.



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
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

Named for Iris, the Roman goddess of the rainbow, tall bearded irises grow especially well in many areas, certainly including Central Texas. And true to their name-

sake, irises come in nearly every color of the rainbow, with only the elusive rose red and true black still tantalizing hybridizers. However, many nearly "black" and "red" irises are now available to join the breathtaking plethora of hues, bicolor combinations, shapes, and patterns of modern and antique irises being grown today.

Dedicated to the enjoyment and sharing of irises, the Belton Iris Society was organized in 1951. In addition to its Fall Sale, the organization showcases the blooms of its members -- and everyone else who wants to show off the irises blossoming in their gardens -- during a spring Iris Show each year. In 2014, the BIS Show was one of the largest held in the American Iris Society Region 17, which includes all 14 of the iris society subsidiaries located throughout Texas.

Master Gardener Plant Sale Sept. 19

By WAYNE SCHIRNER AND PAT JOHNSON, BELL COUNTY MASTER GARDENERS

Even though it is still hot, now is the time to plan for the fall garden. Before planting, clean up your garden if you haven't already done so. Remove crops that are no longer producing or pest laden. Be careful about putting diseased plants in your compost pile. Spider mites don't compost. This is also the best time to add more compost to your garden soil. If you don't have your own compost pile, buy 4-5 bags of different types of compost and blend them together before adding to your garden. This will help make sure your plants aren't missing necessary nutrients.

September and October are the months to plant transplants of broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, and cauliflower. With a two-month planting season, think about succession planting so you don't have everything maturing at the same time. Crops that can be planted by seed or transplants during these same months include Asian greens, Swiss chard, collard greens, kale, kohlrabi, and mustard greens. Garlic can be planted from the end of September to Mid-November. Lettuce (seeds or transplants) can be planted from the last week of September through the first week of March. This is definitely a good crop for succession planting. Peas (English, snap, and snow) should be planted in September. Radishes, like lettuce, can be planted between September and March. Spinach (seeds or transplants) can be planted mid-September through mid-February. Finally, turnips can be planted in September or October. With so many crop options, fall is really a great time to grow vegetables. If you don't know which varieties of crops to plant, visit the aggie-horticulture web site (<http://aggie-horticulture.tamu.edu>) for the best varieties of crops recommended for Bell County. This web site also has crop specific information on almost every vegetable. Happy planting.
