Christmas Stroll kicks off with annual Parade

Get in the holiday spirit in picturesque historic Salado with a holiday parade, home tours, a live nativity scene and theatrical performances.

The two weekends of Dec. 4-6 and Dec. 11-13 are filled with entertainment, activities and Christmas shopping experiences for the whole family

Festivities start with the annual Christmas Parade at 5 p.m. Dec. 3. The Parade will begin on Royal St. and make its way up Main Street to the Salado Civic Center. Mayor, Hanks sign Sanctuary agreements

Salado mayor Skip Blancett and landowner Billie Hanks, Jr. signed into effect on Nov. 25 more than 200 pages of agreements and a 12 page Warranty Deed. The board of aldermen approved the agreements following a two-hour executive session on Nov. 19.

The agreements form the basis for a partnership of sorts between the Village and the Sanctuary in which the developers and property owners of the proposed 297 acre mixed use development agree to have all of their properties brought into the Village limits in return for concessions on property and hotel motel taxes as well as guarantees for sewer services.

As part of the agreements, property owner Billy Hanks will donate six acres, or more, of property on the northeastern portion of the 297 acres to the village where it will construct a 300,000 gallon per day wastewater treatment plant for the cost of about \$3 million.

The Village will also construct at its cost the collection system for the plant, except for the collection system on the property that will become the Sanctuary Development. As part of 24-page Wastewater Service agreement, Sanctuary developers will design and build the collection system for the development, tying in at Royal Street or another location if easements are not attained by the developer with the assistance of the Village.

While "eminent domain" verbiage concerning the Royal Street tie-in was struck from the final documents, Sanctuary Chief Executive Officer Robert Sulaski warned aldermen earlier this fall that the cost of connecting at a different location would be much more expensive for both the Sanctuary and the Village of Salado as the Village would be responsible for constructing collection lines from the southern end of the Village to

the lift station on the south

side of Salado Creek.

The current design approach will have a main collection line tie in to a gravity sewer line on Royal Street that will connect to a lift station on the south side of Salado Creek, most likely where the current Stagecoach sewer plant lies, and a force main line will connect to the top of the hill on Royal Street before a gravity sewer line will connect to the future Royal Street wastewater plant.

In addition to the collection system lines on the development property, Sanctuary developers will also be responsible for the design and construction of the "Re-use Facility," according to the Wastewater and Chapter 380 Agreements. Under these agreements, the Village will provide up to 200,000 gallons of treated effluent to the Sanctuary at no charge.

The Village will provide the treated effluent to the Sanctuary at most through a Chapter 380 Economic Development grant. Determining wholesale water prices is not an easy matter and depends on several variables, according to Salado Water Supply Corporation manager Ricky Preston

ager Ricky Preston.

Preston told Salado
Village Voice that SWSC
has a take-or-pay arrangement to with Jarrell-Schwertner Water Supply to sell
JSWSC up to 3 million
gallons of treated water
per month for approximately \$1.50 per 1,000
gallons.

Many municipalities have begun to sell their effluent on the open market, typically for agricultural uses and for some fracking uses. While it is difficult to find what those costs are for the end user, we did find that municipalities in California are selling effluent for as much as \$1.80 per 1,000 gallons.

The 380 Economic Development grant could be worth more than \$100,000 per year based upon full 200,000 gallons per day at a cost of \$1.50 per 1,000 gallons.

The Developer will have to apply for beneficial reuse of the effluent

and will do so at its sole cost, according to the Wastewater agreement.

The Re-use Facilities referred to in the Wastewater agreement are defined as "any treated wastewater effluent lines and related appurtenances constructed by Developer to transport treated wastewater effluent from the Wastewater Treatment Plant for beneficial reuse within the Property."

The Discharge Permit that Billy Hanks and Salado Utilities, Inc. will donate to the Village states that the Discharge Point is Smith Branch Creek "near Shepard Drive" and FM 2268 on the western portion of the property.

The Wastewater Services agreement defines the Village Wastewater Improvements as "the Wastewater Treatment Plant, the Village Outfall Line, the Royal Street Wastewater Line Improvements, Lift Station No.2, and all other facilities, equipment and appurtenances required for Village to meet its service obligations."

The Outfall Line would carry the treated wastewater from the WWTP on the north east portion of the property to the Discharge Point defined in the permit. The cost of the outfall line has been estimated as being as much as \$500,000.

If the Village should amend the Discharge Permit that is being donated by Billy Hanks and Salado Utilities, Inc., to allow the discharge into the Smith Branch Creek closer to the WWTP, it will have to prepare that amendment and documentation at its own cost.

The period for the reuse of the effluent is 15 years from the "from the date of recordation of the last Subdivision Plat for the Property," according to the Wastewater Agreement.

The Wastewater Agreement requires the Village to provide retail sewer service to the Sanctuary within two years of the execution of the documents. However, the Village is under no obligation to provide wastewater service to any portion of the

property until the lands to be furnished service have been annexed, the lands to be furnished service have been final platted by the Village, the internal facilities for that Phase of the project have been completed and accepted by the Village and all necessary easements and other real property interests have been dedicated to the Village. Further, all required fees and charged have been paid to the Village and the Developer remains

Sanctuary properties will pay the same rates as other Village customers for in-city usage.

in material compliance.

If the Village should expand the wastewater plant beyond the capacity of 600,000 gallons per day, then the Village shall undertake and complete these additional improvements simultaneously with such expansion: landscaping, walls and/or screening of the property, all blowers at the plant shall be located within effective sound boggling structures, the plant shall be retrofitted with a charcoal filter vented headworks or comparable odor mitigations technology.

Annexation is referenced in the Master Development and Wastewater Agreements. While the properties will request annexations all at one time, it is done with the understanding that the property owners will continue to claim the agricultural use exemptions for property tax until "such time as they are developed," with the exception of the 53-acre tract of land that includes the Wildfire Ranch Arena, which will be zoned and taxed as commercial prop-

By approving the Master Development agreement, the Village "confirms its approval of the Conceptual Master Plan and specifically approves the land uses, densities, exceptions, utility and roadway alignments and width of rights-of-way shown in the Conceptual Master Plan, Land Use Chart and the Exceptions and Minimum Specifications.

Christmas Carol takes the stage

Obama's sanctimony on Syrian refugees

President Barack Obama has seen the enemy, and it is the refusal to accept more Syrian refugees.

From the tone of his post-Paris remarks, you'd think that a sophisticated terrorist assault on a major Western city is a setback; sentiment in the U.S. against taking more Syrian refugees is an atrocity.

Obama warned against "that dark impulse inside of us," as if we were debating whether Syrian refugees should be drawn and quartered. He said that "slamming the door in their faces would be a betrayal of our values." He was joined by liberal commentators who scoffed and guffawed at worries over Syrian refugees after -- ho-hum, nothing to see here -- one of the Paris terrorists apparently posed as a refugee.

It's remarkable that the president feels justified in lecturing anyone on humanitarianism. He has stood by while Syria has descended into a hellish chaos, and hasn't betrayed any guilty conscience. If you put those 10,000 Syrian refugees back in their native country and let them get gassed, barrel-bombed, shelled or shot, would he bat an eye at the ever-growing casualty count?

The Syrian refugees are most useful to the president as a symbol of his Rich Lowry



alleged cosmopolitanism and of the supposed backwardness of his opposi-

The problem with the argument that our values compel us to take refugees is that it isn't subject to any limit. We admit about 70,000 refugees a year. Is that the American level? Or would 700,000 be more American? And what's the balance between prudential considerations -- cost, security, assimilation and American-ness?

By any reasonable standard we are justified in telling Europe that we have already done our part on migration, thank you very much. According to immigration expert Jessica Vaughan, since 2009 we have accepted 70 percent of all resettled United Nations-designated refugees worldwide.

It is true that Europe at the moment faces a migrant crisis. It's not hard to see how it can begin to handle it. First, tell Germany's foolhardy chancellor to stop encouraging more migrants to come; enforce national boundaries like nation-states have from time immemorial; refuse to accept anyone who hasn't been processed properly.

The U.S., already dealing with a steady migrant flow from south of the border, needn't become part of the bidding for Syrian refugees.

Resources can be better spent in Middle Eastern countries that are hosting millions of Syrian refugees. The Center for Immigration Studies, which supports restrictions on immigration, estimates that the cost of settling one Syrian refugee here would support 12 Syrian refugees in the other Middle Eastern states.

While we don't face the security risk of Europe, where the refugee flow is essentially uncontrolled, there is no reliable way to vet Syrian refugees.

Finally, assimilation is an obvious concern. The experience of the Somali refugee community in Minneapolis hasn't been a happy one. Unemployment is high, and the community has provided dozens of recruits to radical Islamist groups.

Of course, that we are discussing a Syrian refugee crisis at all is another symptom of the president's abject failure in the Middle East. So, please, Mr. President, spare us your sanctimony and condescension.



One of the exceptions to the local ordinances includes an exception concerning the dedication of parkland as required by the Subdivision Ordinance because Sanctuary will have private parks, private trails and private greenspace.

The Land Uses Master Plan outlines the following general use categories and specifications, which can be amended by as much as 20 percent without further approval:

- · Commercial (e.g. office, retail, restaurants, etc.): 515,000 heated sq. ft.
- Entertainment Venue: 40,000 HSF
 - Lodging: 355 rooms.
 - Multi-family (multi-

story including senior housing and rental): 575

- Mutli-Family (for sale including condos, townhouse and duplexes): 130 units.
- Single Family (for sale): 364 units.
- Parking Garage: 500 spaces

Approving the Master Development Agreement also approves the road design standards identified in the Conceptual Master Plan and includes roadway connections to the following Village roads: Royal Street, College Hill Drive, Baines Street, Santa Maria Road, San Jose Road, Salado Oaks Drive, Main Street and FM 2268.

The Design Guidelines referred to in the Master Development Agreement states that the Developer will provide design guidelines to the "Village of Salado prior to the first preliminary plat."

The Chapter 380 Eco-Development agreement outlines 15 years of tax rebates for commercial properties. It states that the owners will receive rebates equal "to the annual Property Tax Receipts actually received by the Village associated with such development (if any) less the amount of Property Tax Receipts in the Base Tax Year for the property associated with such development," multiplied by 50 percent.

The tax rebate will not include the debt service tax for the retirement of the debt for the sewer plant, according to City Manager Kim Foutz.

The property taxes will rebated for a period of 15 years "from the recording date of the last Subdivision as deigned by the Village of Salado Subdivision Ordinance No. 2009.02 or the 15th anniversary date of the last certificate of occupancy issues for a commercial building, whichever is the last to occur."

The Chapter 380 agreement also includes Rollback Grants for periodic economic development grants "equal to 100 percent of the Rollback Taxes to offset the portion of the Owner's cost of development of the Land." Rollback Taxes are defined in the Chapter 380 agreement as "the tax and/or penalty assessed against the Land, or operation thereof, as the result of the removal or agricultural and/or open space land designation(s) for the Land."

Property that is appraised as Ag Use is valued on its capacity to produce agricultural products, not the market value of the land. According to the article entitled "Ag-use Exemption: Fact or Fiction?" by Judon Farmbrough in the Tierra Grande, the Real Estate Center Journal, "This is determined by capitalizing the average net income that the land would have been earned during the past five years using prudent agricultural

management practices." The chief appraiser will also appraise the land at its market value. Then, according to Farmbrough's article, "If the land is sold or diverted to a non-agricultural use, the difference between the two appraisals" for the past five years, plus interest, must be recaptured. This is what is referred to as the Rollback Taxes in the Chapter 380 Economic Development agreement, according to

Additionally, the agreements include verbiage concerning Future Phases in which it states that the Village "shall look favorably in good faith on extending the existing economic incentives" for the future Phase Two Entertainment District which will consist of an approximately 1,800 to 2,500 seat additional music venue and multistory parking garage. However, the agreement is not binding on this future development.

The agreements signed by the Mayor and Billie Hanks, Jr. include a Tourism Marketing Agreement in which 50 percent of the hotel occupancy taxes generated by the Sanctuary will be rebated to the development to promote the property for overnight stays. The Tourism Marketing Agreement shall "continue for a period of 15 calendar years from the Opening Date of the last Venue opened to the public by the Owners."

Senior running back Hayden Ebeling was named to the First Team All District as a running back. Sophomore cornerback Cutter Hudgens was named to the First Team, as well.







Cabins on tour this weekend

Visitors enjoying the 2015 Christmas Tour of Homes can experience a virtual trip into the past when they "discover" the village's hidden treasures, two authentic 19th Century log cabins owned by the Salado Historical Society and located behind the Salado Civic Center.

The Boles-Aiken cabin truly was a "hidden treasure" discovered in teh mid-1980s between the walls of a house on Center Circle that was being demolished. Disassembled, its logs carefully numbered, the cabin was stored until acquired by the Salado Historical Society and rebuilt on its present location in the mid-1990s.

Believed to have been constructed before Salado's founding, the structure is thought to have had three different "lives." It has served as a stagecoach stop, as a post office-possibly Salado's first-and as a school. Presently those

ed with appropriate furnishings.

The Moses Denman cabin, though not original to Salado, has a justifiable place in Village history as it was the home of the late Robert Denman's greatgrandfather.

Built in the 1860's, it was discovered by Denman and moved to the site of the Barton House, a well-known historic home in which Denman and his late wife, Doris, lived for many

When they sold the Barton House (now The Range Restaurant), the Denmans donated the cabin to the Historical Society. The building was moved without any disassembling, with the exception of the chimney, to become a neighbor to the Boles-Aiken cabin. With the chimney restored, it was furnished with primitive antiques provided by the Denmans.

Opened on previous Homes Tours and when special events are held, the cabins do not always draw the visitors their history justifies. When school children visit the cabins, they are amazed at the cabins' size and simplicity, which shed light on the hardiness and tenacity of our ancestors, lessons needed for today's technology saturated generation.

The Salado Historical Society 2015 Home Tour, will be 5-8 p.m. Dec. 4, 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Dec. 5 and 1-4 p.m. Dec. 6. In addition to the cabins, the Homes Tour will feature the Robertson Plantation, the home of Dave and Barb Swarthout, the home of Dena Parks and the home of Bryan and Phyllis Johnson.



Space travel: no strings attached

Okay Space Travelers, ready, set, jump! That's not space travel, you say? Then what was that "space" between your feet and the ground? And what was that amazing invisible force that brought you


safely back down to the earth? That invisible force is called gravity, and it's all around us. If you put rocks in your pockets, you can't jump as high or as far. The heavier you are, the more mass you have, the harder you press down on the earth. Gravity, as described by Isaac Newton, is an attractive force between two objects. The strength of this force depends on the mass of each object and the distance between them.


We can see the effects of gravity in the night sky. Close-up pictures of comets and the smaller moons of Pluto show them as lumpy objects. An object in space needs to be between 300 and 500 miles across before gravity is

strong enough to squeeze it into roundness. Gravity is what makes our moon and sun perfectly round. The stars in the night sky are very distant suns, round and bright.

Gravity on distant worlds will be on display at the next star party, sponsored by the Central Texas Astronomical Society. This free public event will be held on 5:30-8:30 Dec. 5 at Overlook Park between Salado and Belton. CTAS members will provide telescopes to view fascinating stellar objects and answer questions about gravity and light.

Contract Bridge

There are times when the normal way for declarer to play a suit should be altered in order to increase the chances of making the contract. South neglected to do that in today's deal, and it cost him a vulner-

He won East's jack of spades with the king at trick one and could count eight a heart, two diamonds and the spade trick already taken. The diamond suit clearly offered the best chance for a ninth trick, so declarer cashed the king of diamonds at trick two and continued with a low diamond at trick three.

When West showed out, South played the ace and then conceded a trick to East's queen. Declarer was hoping the defenders could collect only three spade tricks at this juncture, but after East returned a spade, West cashed four spades to set the conBoth sides vulnerable. South's failure to make three notrump was directly attributable to the way he handled the diamonds. Considering the threat posed by the opposing spades, he should have played the diamond suit so as to minimize the possibility of East gaining the lead.

With that goal in mind, declarer should start by leading a low diamond to dummy's ace. In the actual deal, after West produces the ten,

the contract becomes an absolute certainty. A low diamond is next led to the nine. If the nine wins, as it does in the actual case, declarer scores 11 tricks; if the nine loses to the queen, at least 10

tricks are assured. This careful approach guarantees the contract whenever the diamonds are divided 2-2, as well as when they are 3-1 and East does not have both the queen and ten. If East does turn up with the Q-10-x, then, and only then, will declarer have to resort to conceding a diamond to him in the hope that the missing spades are divided 4-4.



SLOW COOKER APPLE CINNAMON FRENCH TOAST

Wake up to a casserole of fragrant French toast with this super-easy recipe. Choose light and fluffy bread for tender French toast or dense bread for a heartier dish.

8 slices whole grain or whole wheat sandwich bread (about 9 ounces to-

Preheat oven to 425°F. Place squash and onion in a large, heavy cast-iron skillet or other ovenproof skillet and toss with the oil, 1/2 teaspoon of the salt, and 1/4 teaspoon of the pepper. Roast until the vegetables are browned and softened, about 25 minutes, stirring once or twice during cooking. Remove skillet from oven and set aside to cool slightly.

Skip the oven all together and top each ramekin of collard greens and grits with an over-easy egg, if you like. Spinach makes an excellent substitute for the collard greens.

1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt 1 cup uncooked grits or polenta (coarse cornmeal) 1/4 teaspoon ground black

pepper



2 tablespoons butter, plus more for the ramekins

8 slices pork or turkey bacon

2 1/2 pound collard greens, stemmed and roughly chopped

Preheat the oven to 400°F. Arrange 8 large buttered ramekins on a large rimmed baking sheet; set aside.

Bring 3 cups water and salt to a boil in a medium pot then whisk in grits and return to a boil. Reduce heat to medium low and simmer, stirring often, until thick and creamy, 10 to 15 minutes. Stir in pepper and butter. Divide grits among prepared ramekins.


Meanwhile, cook bacon in a large skillet over medium heat, turning occasionally, until just crisp, 6 to 8 minutes; transfer to a paper towel-lined plate. When cool enough to handle, roughly chop bacon.

Texas housing market shows strong gains in 2015

Texas real estate made a strong showing in all segments of the housing market in 2015 due to continued growth in the state's economy, jobs and population, according to the 2015 Texas Annual Housing Report released today by the Texas Association of Realtors.

"The Texas real estate market has been firing on all cylinders in 2015. People are relocating to Texas from far and wide, homes in all price classes are in high demand and the number of available properties is slowly rising," said Scott Kesner, chairman of the Texas Association of Realtors.

The 2015 editions of the Texas Quarterly Housing Report indicated that Texas real estate is on pace to potentially have a record year in 2015. Home sales and prices steadily increased throughout the year, while statewide housing inventory reached a two-year high – 4.0 months - in 2015-Q3. Once again, the 2015 Texas Homebuyers and Sellers Report showed that Texas is outpacing the nation in home sales, as median incomes for Texans rose 5.9 percent year-over-year – more than double the growth rate of incomes nationally during the same time frame.

Texas's businessfriendly environment and strong job growth continued to attract new residents from out-of-state and internationally in 2015. Texas was the No. 2 state for gains in out-of-state residents, with more than 538,000 Americans relocating to Texas, according to the 2015 Texas Relocation Report. Additionally, international homebuyers contributed more than \$8.32 billion to the Texas economy in a 12-month period, according to the 2015 Texas International Homebuyers Report.

"Texas's diversified economy and our state's enduring real estate demand shows that Texas remains to be a great place to live, work and do business," said Kesner.

Two of the strongest segments of the Texas housing market were luxury home sales and small land sales. According to the 2015 Texas Luxury Home Sales Report, home sales priced at \$1 million or higher grew between 9 percent and 26 percent year-overyear in the state's four largest metros. Small land

sales throughout Texas also experienced doubledigit growth, with 5,282 small land sales statewide. This was a 20.69 percent increase from the year prior, according to the 2015 Texas Small Land Sales Report.

The 2015 Texas Condominium Mid-Year Sales Report showedthatexistingcondos spentlesstimeonthemarket than new condos, as rising land and development costs may make new condominiumsless af for dable for some

Despite this rapid market growth, tough lending standards and a competitive homebuving market continued to make home remodeling a popular option among Texashomeowners.The2015 Texas Remodel Valuation Reportshowedthatremodelingprojectscontinuedtogain popularity and profitability, with smaller, functional projects that boosted a home's curb appeal recouping the highestpercentageofproject costs.

Kesnerconcluded, "Once again, the Texas housing markethas exceeded expectations and is on pace to possibly set another record for home sales. The market will remainhighlycompetitivein 2016, making housing developmentandaffordabilitykey areasoffocusthroughoutthe state."

Don't succumb to pressure to make an immediate giving decision. Responsible organizations will welcome your gift tomorrow as much as they do today.

Be wary of emotional

appeals. Marketers have been known to exploit the holidays to make emotional pleas to donors. Always research to verify that your selected charity operates ethically.

Avoid charities that don't disclose. Although participation is voluntary, charities that don't disclose any of the requested information to BBB WGA raise a critical red flag for donors. Visit Give.org to find out if your selected charity is nondisclosure.

Rely on standardsbased evaluations. Charities can demonstrate they are trustworthy by agreeing to in-depth evaluations such as the 20 BBB Standards for Charity Accountability. Get free access to charity reports at Give.org.
