The Salado Village Voice newspaper has seen more than three decades of service to the Village of Salado.

During that time, the newspaper has always been a family affair, since its founding by Dayton Kelly in 1979. After Dayton's death, his sons Dennis and Bill operated the newspaper until the Fleischer family purchased the newspaper in 1988.

Salado Village Voice is locally owned and operated. "We are vested in Salado and invested in Salado," says publisher and editor-in-chief Tim Fleischer.

As we begin 2016, Salado Village Voice staffers would like to reintroduce themselves to the community they serve.

Salado Village Voice has a staff of four, including publishers Tim and Marilyn Fleischer. Other staffers are Stephanie Hood, advertising composition and Royce Wiggin, office assistant.

In addition to individual awards by staff members, Salado Village Voice has been honored by the community and state. The newspaper was the firstever Business of the Year, awarded in January 2003 by the Salado Chamber of Commerce.

For more than 20 years, Salado Village Voice has published Salado: A Jewel in the Crown of Texas, a quarterly magazine. The newspaper also maintains an active website at www. saladovillagevoice.com and has electronic editions of the newspaper available for subscribers.

The newspaper joined the Texas Press Association in 2010.

Tim Fleischer

Tim Fleischer has been a newspaperman since he was 16, working for both weeklies and daily newspapers. "I got the Devil's Ink at an early age and haven't been able to get rid of it," he said of his 32 years in the newspaper industry.

of it, he has been the editor of the Salado Village Voice.

But his love for Salado has been for more than three decades. "I came to Salado with my parents for the Art Fair and Gathering of the Clans when I was growing up in Coryell County," he said. "I drove through it every day on my way to run a small newspaper in Florence."

Tim and Marilyn Fleischer have published the newspaper since 1988. During that time, the newspaper has grown from an eight-page tabloid to a full-size broadsheet newspaper with four sections.

"We have grown with the community and are a reflection of it," he said.

In those years, the newspaper has won several awards from the Texas Community Newspaper Association, where Salado Village Voice competed against newspapers from San Antonio, Dallas, Houston, Austin around the state.

Tim has won several TCNA awards: advertising design (third in state for large ad format and third in state for advertising series); editorial work (first in state for editorial

writing, third in state for editorial writing, third in state for column writing) and second in state for community service (for articles during the incorporation election).

Fleischer has been named to the Texas Association of School Boards Media Honor Roll several times during his tenure at the helm of the newspaper, including the 2015 Honor Roll. Media are recommended and nominated for the Honor Roll by local school boards for their coverage of schools.

He has also served the community in a variety of capacities, including three different terms on the board of directors of the Salado Chamber of Commerce and six years on the board of directors of the Institute for Humanities at Salado. He was president of the Salado Chamber of Commerce and treasurer for two years of the Institute for Humanities.

Fleischer is in the third year of his third term the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. He recently completed a oneyear term as Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors during the transition

period in which the Chamber and Village of Salado Tourism Department have partnered together.

He served a term on the inaugural board of the Salado Community Foundation. He was also on the first board that established the Mentoring program in Salado.

Tim is also a Mason and twice Past Master of the Salado Masonic Lodge #296. He served as District Deputy Grand Master for Masonic District #48 in 2011-12 and is the current Secretary for the Salado Lodge. He is the Lodge Flag Committee

Tim is also active in the Salado Rotary Club.

He is known to grandson Nate Timothy Potter as DoDo (like the bird).

He and wife Marilyn share responsibilities at the newspaper. "She runs the office and makes the business decisions and I make editorial decisions," he said.

Marilyn got the Devil's Ink in her blood after meeting Tim 30 years ago. She is managing editor and advertising manager of Salado Village Voice.

She worked in the cor-

porate world prior to the purchase of the Salado Village Voice in 1988.

She also owned and operated a business in the Killeen/Copperas Cove area for several years while raising her three children.

During their years in Salado, Marilyn has served the community in many ways. "I think I have been most satisfied with my work with the Salado Family Relief Fund," she said. In addition to her work to establish the Family Relief Fund, Marilyn has also been Art Fair chairperson for two years, and served three years as a Chamber of Commerce Director. She served two three-year terms on the Salado Civic Center board of directors.

She was on the founding board of the Salado Community Foundation.

She has also won awards from the TCNA. She has twice been honored. She won second place for Best Feature Photo and second place for Community Service for her work with the Family Relief Fund.

The Fleischers helped to establish what became known as the Public Arts League of Salado and the Salado Ambassador Program.

The Fleischers' children -- Royce Wiggin and Jenny Potter, both graduates of Salado High School -- have grown up in the eye of the community. Royce graduated in 2007, beginning in second grade in Salado schools. Jenny began her school career as a kindergärtner at Thomas Arnold Elementary School and graduated in 2009.

Salado Board of Aldermen will discuss variance requests during a 6:30 p.m. Jan. 7 meeting at the Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd.

Among the requests for variance are these:

 Presentation, discussion, and possible action on reconsideration of a variance to Section 4.2b, Protection of Drainage and Creek Areas, of the Sub-

division Ordinance in accordance with Ordinance 2008-20 Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance, Section 40 Variance Procedures, for the Creekside Meadow subdivision.

• Presentation, discussion, and possible action on a request for a waiver to Section 3.1 of the Subdivision Ordinance (road curvature) for Windmill Estates, a subdivision located in the Village's Extraterritorial Jurisdiction.

• Presentation, discussion, and possible action on a request for a waiver to Section 3.1 of the Subdivision Ordinance (cul-de-sac length) for Salado Country Estates, a subdivision located in the Village's Extraterritorial Jurisdiction.

In other business, the board will also discuss and possibly adopt a policy to set forth guidelines for the establishment, member-

ship, scope, term, and conduct of existing and future Committees and Citizen Advisory Boards appointed by the Board of Alder-

The board will also have monthly reports from the Mayor, each alderman, department heads and city manager.

The BOA has scheduled public hearings on The Sanctuary, including annexation hearings on Jan.

14 and Jan. 21 at 6:30 p.m. and a public hearing on the P&Z recommendations on zoning and rezoning of The Sanctuary property within the current Village limits to Planned Development.

After the public hearings, the board is slated to approve the voluntary annexation request of more than 300 acres into the Village of Salado at a meeting in February.

The donation of land for a wastewater treatment plant, a discharge permit and the voluntary annexation requests hinge on the approval of the zoning requests by The Sanctuary. The donations were part of several agreements signed into effect in November that included tax abatements, rebates of hotel motel taxes and other economic incentives for The Sanctuary.

For-Profit Colleges Are **Scandal Machines**

THIS CORRUPT HIGHER EDUCATION "INDUSTRY" OUGHT TO BE PUT OUT OF BUSINESS.

The nation's for-profit, private college industry is a study in horror.

Start with the fact that it actually calls itself an "industry." Excuse me, but education is a social investment - not an industrial product.

Next, this so-called "private" industry depends almost wholly on government money. It generates practically none of its revenue from the free market. Instead, it cons students into taking expensive government-backed loans to invest in educations that seldom deliver increases in

their earning potential. "For-profit" colleges are just that. They maintain that their obligation isn't to serve students or society, but to deliver profits to their corporate shareholders. These things are scandal machines, as proven by the latest for-profit college conglomerate to be exposed as a fraud.

Education Management Corporation operates four college systems, offering courses online and in office buildings in 32 states. EDMC gives its recruiters extravagant financial incentives to pressure low-income people into taking-out huge federal education loans in order to pay for courses at the cor-

sters. EDMC is largely owned by Wall Street gi-

Thanks to some former students and a couple of corporate whistleblowers, EDMC has now been exposed and is paying a price for its extortion. Its stock price has fallen from \$22 a share to — get this — 9 cents. And it's also been



poration's colleges.

EDMC has been sucking up more than a billion dollars a year from these students, who generate some 90 percent of its revenue. But its courses are mediocre to worthless, leaving graduates in unbearable debt and unable to get jobs with salaries high enough to pay off their loans.

Bear in mind that this sleazy fraud isn't the work of some fly-by-night huckhit with a \$90 million federal penalty for fraud.

The whole system of corrupt for-profit colleges ought to be put out of busi-

The Year <u>of Hyster</u>ia

We should be glad that 2015 has passed into memory, because it was a year when we could barely hold it together.

It was a year when we freaked out over symbols and scared ourselves with fake statistics. It was a year when the facts weren't allowed to get in the way of a good, overwrought slogan. It was a year when we convinced ourselves that Earth was nearly beyond saving. It was a year of the safe space and micro-aggression.

It was, in short, a year of hysteria.

By now, we should be familiar with the workings of hysteria, since -- usually whipped up in social media and stoked by an inflamed left -- it has become such a familiar feature of our culture and pol-

Hysteria doesn't know when to stop. After it was collectively decided that the Confederate flag shared responsibility for Dylann Roof's hellish murders in Charleston, South Carolina, Confederate symbols were hunted down as if they were armed fugitives from justice. The Memphis City Council even voted to exhume Nathan Bedford Forrest and -- for good measure -- his wife.

Hysteria doesn't care about the facts. In an ex-

traordinary feat, Black Lives Matter protestors took something that didn't happen from a case of justifiable use of police force in Ferguson, Missouri, and made it the slogan --"Hands up, don't shoot" -- of a movement alleging systemic police racism. The truth of Ferguson didn't matter so much as the myth of Ferguson.

Hysteria will believe anything. After the San Bernardino attack, the media hawked the bogus statistic that there had been more than 350 mass shootings in the U.S. this vear, an almost daily occurrence. A more careful measure at Mother Jones tallied four mass shootings in 2015.

Hysteria can be a powerful organizing tool. The entire world got together in Paris to sign on to a climate accord, based on the pretense that without immediate action Earth will be rendered all but uninhabitable by the ravages of climate change.

Hysteria is a weapon. On college campuses, students didn't just seek safe spaces from speech they deemed uncongenial and decry inadvertent slights

known as micro-aggressions, they terrorized anyone not with the program. A university president was fired for looking at protestors the wrong way (University of Missouri), and a prestigious college campus (Yale) was roiled by a dispute over whether allegedly tasteless Halloween costumes could be tolerated. Protestors hunted for university employees they could be offended by enough to get cashiered.

It is always difficult to motivate people around careful reasoning about a problem, or to win a detached argument on the merits. It is much easier to create hate figures to attack, to demand immediate action as a sign of moral purity, and to short-circuit cost-benefit analysis with apocalyptic warnings. With the news cycle faster than ever and social media a constant accelerant, stopping to think, or to gather all the facts, or to consider possible downble than ever.

This is the world we live in. 2015 was a year of hysteria, but why will 2016 be any different? Stock up on smelling salts and fainting couches.

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Families advance with recent tax bill, but corporations got a lot more

Surprisingly, Congress's \$680 billion holiday-season tax deal will bring some cheer to working families and not just to big corporations this year. Refundable tax credits putting extra cash in the hands of hard-pressed workers and parents were included in a huge yearend gift-wrapped package of tax breaks—the type of bill that usually only offers big rewards to corporate fat cats.

Every two years for the past few decades, Washington has renewed a collection of about 50 temporary tax breaks, called "tax extenders." Even though some of them had been repeatedly renewed for 30 years, the giveaways were deemed temporary to hide their substantial \$50 billion annual cost-80% of which benefited businesses. It's an accounting trick. Tax cuts supposedly expiring in a year or two don't make long-range budget projections look so bad, after all.

None of these corporate tax breaks are ever paid for—for instance by closing other corporate tax loopholes. All of the cost goes straight to the deficit.

Moreover, a repugnant double standard is at work. Any time our side wants even a little bit more in spending to improve public services, conservatives demand it be paid for. They even thumbed their noses at 9/11 responders recently.

Conservatives demanded that a renewal of the 9/11 first responders World Trade Center Health Program and a Victims Compensation Fund, costing a total of \$8 billion, be paid for in order to be included in the year-end budget package that included

\$400 billion in unpaid-for corporate tax giveaways.

Tax extender legislation has always enjoyed strong bipartisan support. It's a veritable lovefest between both parties and their corporate contributors.

As usual, though, corporations wanted more. Objecting to the (theoretically) temporary nature of their special breaks, this year they pushed to make several of their biggest billion-dollar loopholes permanent. This gave our side leverage to demand major concessions in return.

Progressives rallied around two tax credits that are very important to low- and moderate-income households-the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and the Child Tax Credit (CTC). Improvements made to these pro-work and pro-family programs were scheduled to expire in two years. This would have pushed 16 million people-including 8 million children-into or deeper into poverty.

Advocates demanded—and won—that any corporate tax cut package had to also make permanent the improvements to these effective poverty-fighting programs. That means a single mom working minimum wage with two kids at home will have \$1,725 more in her pocket, for example.

Another victory was the renewal of the American Opportunity Tax Credit. It provides a tax credit of up to \$2,500 per year for expenses incurred while attending college such as tuition, fees and course materials. This will give a helping hand to millions of families struggling with the costs of higher education.

Altogether, the final tax package makes a \$250 billion investment in America's working families.

Of course, corporations still got more: more than \$400 billion in undeserved tax favors. Among them are two loopholes that make it easier for multinational firms to stash profits offshore in tax havens. The Active Financing Exception was permanently enshrined in law while the CFC Look-Through Rule was extended for five years. It was the AFE that helped General Electric to go five straight years without paying any federal income tax, and in fact get billions in refunds.

Together, the two tax breaks will cost the American people around \$85 billion in lost revenue over the next decade. Alternatively, if we didn't plow \$75 billion of that money back into overstuffed corporate treasuries we could guarantee preschool for every low-and moderate-income four-year-old in America for 10 years.

Another gratuitous gift called Bonus Depreciation—originally intended as a recession fighter, and not even good at that—will go on for another six years, losing \$28 billion in corporate tax revenue.

Congress should not be making any corporate tax loopholes permanent or even temporarily extending them. It should be closing them.

Over the past half-decade of budget austerity, American families have withstood \$2.7 trillion in spending cuts in everything from senior nutrition to college financial aid to affordable housing. America's corporations haven't contributed a nickel in extra tax revenue.

Moreover, while corporations enjoy record profits, workers continue to struggle in a slow economy. Working families need a hand. Corporations don't need handouts.

I'm not sugar coating our challenges with a lot of holiday cheer. Progressives won some, but lost a lot, in this big fight.

We have a long way to go towards the day when corporations routinely pay their fair share of taxes and families and communities get the public services they deserve. It may sound like a Christmas miracle today, but we can get there.

Report: Texas isolation policies dangerous for kids

AUSTIN, Texas - Texas is one of only 10 states that allows juvenile justice centers to use solitary confinement indefinitely to punish children, according to a new report.

The survey by the national law firm Lowenstein Sandler found 21 states now prohibit punitive isolation and 20 others impose time-limits.

Patrick Bresette, executive director with the Children's Defense Fund of Texas, says time-outs to separate a juvenile from the rest of the population can be useful, but solitary confinement isn't the answer.

"But the practice that has no real limits in law that allows administrative approval to just kind of snowball and add up to hours and hours and hours and days and days of solitary confinement, that's clearly damaging," he says. "And it would be good for us to have a policy that really restricted that use as much as possible."

Bresette notes the report's in-depth research can be an important tool for state legislators already committed to juvenile justice reform and says the Children's Defense Fund will work with other Texas groups to advance the issue in the next session.

Half of all suicide victims in juvenile detention nationally were in isolation at the time they took their own lives, according to the report, noting concerns expressed by former Attorney General Eric Holder, and 62 percent had a history of solitary confinement.

Mark Soler, executive director with the Center for Children's Law and Policy, says isolation has an especially profound impact on young people.

"Solitary confinement causes a variety of harms to children," he says. "Including psychological and emotional harm, increased anxiety, depression, psy-

chosis on some children, increased risk of suicide and self-harm."

Soler adds increasing staff at facilities is also important. He says after 14 hours on the job, staffers have no patience when children act up, and lock them up instead of taking time to de-escalate a situ-

The report found young people have been held in solitary confinement for up to 23 hours a day, often with no human interaction and, in some cases, children were held in small rooms with windows that were barely the width of their own hands.



Her duties also included financial planning as well as the yearly budget.

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

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Undoubtedly, your batting average as declarer would rise appreciably if you could see the defenders' hands instead of having to guess the location of the missing high cards and the distribution of the suits.

Sometimes, though, it isn't easy to find the winning line of play even with all 52 cards in view. Admittedly such hands are rare, but they are fascinating when they do arise. Here is such a case.

West leads the queen of clubs against your fourheart contract, and you win with the ace. Probably the instinctive play at trick two is to lead a low diamond and finesse dummy's nine after West follows low. This play does not succeed in the actual deal, because East wins with the ten and returns a trump. Eventually you lose

three diamonds and a heart and go down one. Leading a diamond to the jack instead might backfire if it turned out that West had the ten.

Oddly enough, the best approach by far is to enter dummy with a spade at trick two and lead the nine of diamonds. If East follows low, so do you, and your troubles are over (even if West is able to win with the ten).

But if, as is likely in the

actual case, East covers the nine with the ten, you play the queen. (It does East no good to rise with the king because the most you could then lose would be two diamonds and a heart.)

West takes the queen with the ace but is stymied. He cannot afford to lead a trump, so let's say he returns a club. You ruff and lead another diamond. East wins and returns a trump, but you don't jeopardize the contract by taking a finesse. Instead you win with the ace and ruff your last diamond to assure making four.

In fact, this is the right line of play even if the East-West cards are not known, but it is hard in actual practice to resist leading diamonds initially from the South hand.







Preheat the oven to 325°F. Butter a 10-inch springform pan and then evenly coat with 2 tablespoons of the cocoa powder, tapping out excess.

Combine beer, 3/4 cup of the butter and remaining 3/4 cup cocoa powder in a medium heavy saucepan and heat over low heat, whisking occasionally, until butter is melted, about 5 minutes. Add sugars and whisk until dissolved. Transfer mixture to a large bowl and cool.

Meanwhile, melt remaining 2 tablespoons butter in a large skillet over medium heat. When butter starts to sizzle, add figs and season with pepper and a pinch of the salt. Cook, stirring gently, until figs begin to soften and release their juices, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and cool.

In a bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, remaining 3/4 teaspoon salt and cloves. In a separate bowl, whisk together eggs and vanilla.

While whisking, slowly drizzle egg mixture into cooled chocolate mixture until combined. Add flour mixture and use a wooden spoon or spatula to stir until smooth (don't overmix), and then stir in chocolate discs.

Pour half of the batter into the prepared pan. Arrange figs evenly over batter and top with remaining batter. Bake until a toothpick inserted into center of cake comes out mostly clean, 50 minutes to 1 hour.

Cool cake in the pan on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Remove the outer ring and cool completely, about 1 hour. Dust with cocoa powder just before serving. Store in an airtight container at room temperature for up to 1 day or in the refrigerator for up to 1 week.

3/4 teaspoon coarse sea

1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

grated 1/4 teaspoon

1 (4-pound) beef brisket, excess fat trimmed

14 cloves garlic, peeled

Preheat the oven to 325°F. Combine salt, pepper and nutmeg in a small bowl. Sprinkle mixture all over brisket and place in a roasting pan. BBB's top 10 scams of 2015

BBB releases top scams of 2015 in 79-county service area

It's a new year, but unfortunately scams that happen every day are not. Better Business Bureau serving Central, Coastal, Southwest Texas and the Permian Basin serves businesses and consumers, and is a resource for unbiased information on scams and other marketplace issues. BBB also hears from thousands of business owners and consumers about several scams and frauds.

Scams work because there is a "science" to it. First, scammers gain your trust by building a relationship with you so you won't question their motives. They use a lot of techniques to make themselves look credible and claim to be with a legitimate business by using a website, business cards, email address or phone number, all of which are

Scam artists also use emotions to get you to make quick decisions in an "emergency" scenario, which usually results in a victim giving that scammer money. In some cases, the scammer will pretend to be a family member or friend in need of help immediately.

These were the top 10 scams of 2015 from your

IRS imposter scam -This scam topped the list with your local BBB and BBB nationally. How this scam works: an imposter, someone claiming to be with the IRS, will call you and tell you that you owe money to the government and if you don't pay now, you will be arrested. Scammers threaten you to send them money via a prepaid debit card or wire transfer, and many people pay out of fear. BBB advises you to hang up - the IRS and other government agencies won't call you to collect money or

ask you to make a payment via a prepaid card or wire transfer.

Government grants scam This scam comes in the form of a phone call, email or letter informing you qualify for a government grant. In order to receive the grant you must first send a processing or delivery fee, usually by wire transfer or a prepaid debit card. BBB advises you to never send money by wire transfer or a prepaid card to someone you don't know or haven't met in person. It's almost impossible to trace this type of payment once it's gone.

Debt collections scam-You receive a phone call from someone claiming that you have an unpaid debt. You are threatened with garnishments, lawsuits, and even jail time if you don't pay right now. The scammer will often use Caller ID spoofing and pretend to be a government agency or law enforcement in order to further invoke fear and make you send money.

Sweepstakes, prizes or gifts scam - With this scam, you receive a phone call, email or letter claiming that you've won a prize in a sweepstakes, perhaps

that you've never entered. In order to receive the prize, you're instructed to send a fee to cover expenses associated with processing, insurance or delivery. However, this prize is not real. If you've really won, you should never have to pay money to claim a prize. Phishing scam - Phishing is an attempt to acquire personal information, such as usernames, passwords and credit card numbers by claiming to be a trustworthy person or business. You may receive an email telling you

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that you've won a contest or that a business needs to verify your personal information. However, links in the email can take you to a site that downloads malware on your computer to search for your sensitive data. BBB advises you to never open emails or click on links from sources you don't know. Keep in mind that legitimate businesses won't ask you to confirm your personal information through email.

Tech support scam – You get a call or a pop-up on your computer claiming to be from Microsoft (or Norton, or Apple) about a problem on your computer. They say if you give "tech support" access to your hard drive, they can fix it. Instead, they install malware on your computer and start stealing your personal information. Advanced fee loan scam – An advanced fee loan may

seem like an easy way to get cash fast, but may end up being a burden because of high interest rates and unaffordable payment terms. Advanced fee lenders charge an upfront fee and will "guarantee" you a loan despite your credit history, and chances are, you won't get your money back. Also, real lenders, like banks or credit unions, will check your credit history – even if your credit history is good. A lender who isn't interested in your credit history is an immediate red flag.

Fake check or money order scam – This scam can happen any time someone is paying you for goods or services, even when you are selling something online. You receive a check in the mail that is larger than the amount owed and you are asked to deposit the check and wire the difference. However, the check ends

up being a fake and when it bounces, you are the one out of the money.

Employment scam – Scammers may say they have a job opening or can guarantee job placement if you first pay a fee to cover the cost it takes to place you in a job. However, after you pay, the job doesn't materialize. If a potential employer asks you to pay the company to cover the costs of testing, training or background checks, consider it a red flag.

Lottery scam – Like a sweepstakes scam, you receive a letter or an email message that claims you've already won a foreign lottery. The letter may be from a government agency, a bank, a well-known national company or a company you have never heard of. To collect your winnings, you must send a check or wire transfer to cover fees. However, it's illegal to play a foreign lottery and any lottery that asks you to send money in order to claim

your prize is a scam.

BBB offers these tips to always keep in mind:

If you are unsure about a phone call, email or letter that claims to be from your bank, utility company, government agency, etc., call the business directly using the number on your bill. Take the time to research the business or organization reaching out to you.

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
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
