Annexation, zoning hearings held on Sanctuary, Hidden Glen

While Sanctuary developers have withdrawn their request for the rezoning of three acres within the Historic District, sentiment expressed during public hearings continues to be mostly opposed to the annexation and zoning of the Sanctuary development.

Cathy Carlson asked aldermen “to come down off of the dais and listen to the voters. Paradise is lost.”

H.T. Crow said that he felt the developer had “pulled the wool over the board’s eyes.” If the board continued forward with annexation of the development, he promised, “I guess I will do my best to see that nobody on this board will ever hold office.”

Sheryl Russell, who along with her husband Rod Russell owns Baines House B&B, expressed concerns about the impact of Sanctuary on the drainage issues along Royal Street. She said that the additional development will increase the danger to pedestrians on Royal Street, which she described as “straight and dark with no walkways.”

Hans Fields said that he is concerned that “the only things that is going to be built” is the entertainment venue. “Do you have a plot plan?” he asked.

Fields also stated that the Salado Historical Society was “100 percent against rezoning any property that is in the Historic District.”

Maurice Striegler, who lives in Salado Oaks, said that Sanctuary developers “want to make a feeder road through our subdivision.” He added that he lived on a cul-de-sac subdivision, but the plans for

Sanctuary will turn Salado Oaks Dr. into a collector street for the 1,800 residents of Sanctuary.

“They are turning the place into Disneyland. Where are people going to park? Where are all these cars going to go?” he questioned.

Others, including Judy Fields, expressed concern about the impact of dramatic growth on the schools. “Our school taxes will be raised for more space,” she said, adding that the board did not consider the “impact on the current roads.”

James Kelley said that the Sanctuary was right behind his house and that he was concerned about the plans for multi-family housing so close to a quiet, estate-lot neighborhood.

King Copeland said that the bond election passed because “all the village wanted the much-needed sewer system.” However, he added, that the Aldermen “turned that vote primarily to servicing the Sanctuary.”

He said that the issues of secret meetings, eminent domain, rezoning and tax breaks all landed on “Billie Hanks’ side” rather than on the side of the Village.

The board took no action on the annexation of the three properties comprising the Sanctuary Development:

- a. 31.745 +/-acres generally located at the northeast corner of FM 2268 and I-35 frontage road.
- b. 196.945 +/-acres generally located at the corner of Salado Oaks Drive and FM 2268, and the 700 block of Royal Street Drive, just east of Rose Way Circle.
- c. 58.132 +/-acres generally located at the southeast corner of FM 2268 and I-35 frontage road.

The Board of Aldermen also conducted the second public hearing on the annexation request for Hidden Glen Subdivision -Senior Living: 18.71 acres out of 20.017 acres in the Young Williams Survey, Abstract No. 861, Tract 1, Bell County, Texas, located at 251 Mary Lane locally known as Hidden Glen Senior Living.

The board will vote in February on the annexation of the properties, as well as the proposed zoning of the properties to Planned Development.

At their Nov. 19 meeting, aldermen approved a series of agreements with Sanctuary developers, including a Donation Agreement for six acres of land and a Water Quality Permit No. WQ0014898001; a Wastewater Service Agreement for the funding and constructing of improvements to the Village’s wastewater collection, pumping, treatment, and disposal system, and the terms and conditions for retail wastewater services to the proposed 297 acre development and a Development Agreement between the Village of Salado and Sanctuary Development Company, LLC. for the terms and conditions of economic development incentives related to the proposed 297 acre development to be constructed by Sanctuary Development Co.

The land donation and donation of the water permit are being kept in escrow until the property is annexed and zoned by the Village. Aldermen are expected to vote on the annexation and zoning of the development at their Feb. 11 special meeting. The meeting will be at 6:30 p.m. at the Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd. It is open to the public.

Narrow right-of-way, ancient oaks driving sewer construction costs

Narrow right of way and ancient oak trees will be costly to overcome when the Village installs a sewer collection system in the Main Street area.

Village engineer Rick Kasberg told aldermen this during a special workshop session with Bobby Littlefield from Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT).

TXDOT will allow the use of its right-of-way for the sewer pipeline, as long as there are no permanent structures under the actual pavement of Main Street.

TXDOT will not allow Main Street to be cut for the cross pipes of the sewer system. Instead, the Village must bore beneath the pavement in order to cross Main St.

Of course, this could change if the Village were to take over Main Street from the state. TXDOT

has made overtures to the Village for the past several years to turn Main Street over for local maintenance and ownership.

Aldermen questioned Littlefield about the Main Street bridge. Littlefield explained that if the Bridge goes “off system,” that TXDOT would still be responsible for the future replacement of the bridge. “It will just take longer,” he added.

Littlefield said that TXDOT would be willing to put down a surface with a 20-year lifespan when it resurfaces Main Street at the completion of the I-35 expansion, if Salado were to agree to take over ownership of Main Street.

“You won’t have to do anything for 20 years,” he said.

This would also lessen the tough restrictions that TXDOT maintains with utilities concerning the right of way and cutting pavement.

This would do away

with the necessity for horizontal boring under the highway and could drastically decrease the cost of the sewer collection system.

The toughest portions of the Main Street sewer are in the areas where the right of way goes from 100 feet to just 60 feet in the downtown areas near Pace Park and Thomas Arnold.

Littlefield also reported to aldermen that the bridge over Campbell’s Branch (at Main Street and Rock Creek), is slated to be replaced in 2017.

TXDOT will resurface Main Street, widening the pavement, after the expansion of I-35 through Salado is completed. He said that the resurfacing could be delayed for a short time to allow the Village to install the sewer down Main Street.

Mayor Skip Blancett said that he hopes the Village could begin that process in May 2016.

Citizens needed for Village advisory boards

The Village of Salado is seeking local citizens to serve on a variety of committees, after aldermen adopted a policy defining the roles, composition and longevity of those committees and advisory boards.

Among the committees and advisory boards are these:

Ordinance: five member standing committee, two-year terms; reviews and makes recommendations on past, present and future ordinances and governance policies.

ETJ/Annexation: five member standing committee, two-year term; advises

and provides research for bringing property into the Village.

Street Improvement: seven member standing committee, two-year terms; examine, consider and recommend changes to Street Maintenance Plan, Draining Plan.

Wastewater: five member standing committee, two-year term; make recommendations to BOA regarding wastewater ordinance, adoption, fees, etc.

Environmental: Five member standing committee, two-year terms; inform and advise BOA on preserving and improv-

ing environmental quality, including air quality, hazardous waste, Salado Salamander issues, Salado creek, other natural resources.

Economic Development; Sanctuary: two aldermen ad hoc committee charged with advising and negotiating on behalf of the Board of Aldermen relating to incentives and development standards and associated agreements, including the Public Improvement District agreement, with the Sanctuary Development.

Counting minutes: School year will be 8 days shorter

Students are usually the ones who count the minutes they are in class, but the Texas Legislature did the same and determined that 75,600 minutes are the appropriate amount for a school year.

Due to this, Salado ISD will shorten its school year by eight days in 2016-17, down to 170 school days

compared to 178 days in the current school year.

“The Texas Legislature passed a law last spring that changes the school attendance accounting from days to 75,600 minutes,” Salado ISD Superintendent Michael Novotny said in announcing the new school calendar, which will end for students on

May 26, 2017.

“Many school districts (including Salado) have a school day that is longer than the minimum length of seven hours so it allows us to have the required number of 75,600 minutes in fewer school days,” Dr. Novotny said.

Salado will continue with the nine-week grad-

ing period that was started with the 2015-16 school year.

The first day of classes will be Aug. 23, 2016.

Student and Teacher Holidays will include Labor Day on Sept. 5, Veterans Day on Nov. 11, Thanksgiving Break Nov. 21-25, Christmas Break

Dec. 19-Jan. 2, 2017, Spring Break, March 13-17, April 14, and May 29.

Teachers will have a workday on Jan. 3 and students return to class on Jan. 4, 2017. Teachers will also have a work day on May 30-31.

Oct. 10 and Jan. 16 will be Student Holidays and

Parent Conference Days.

Feb. 20 and April 17 will be Bad Weather Days.

STAAR Assessment Days will be Dec. 5-9 and May 1-5 and May 8-11.

Noon Release days for the end of Nine Weeks will be Oct. 14, Dec. 16, March 10 and May 26 (final day of classes).

The Great Humiliation

The Obama administration was right when it insisted that the capture and release of 10 American sailors by Iran showed the benefits of a cooperative relationship with Tehran.

The crux of the arrangement is simple: The Iranians agree to humiliate us (and pursue their long war against the United States and their hegemonic ambitions in the Middle East), and we agree not to care. It is, as Secretary of State John Kerry says, diplomacy at its best.

What Vice President Joe Biden called "standard nautical practice" involved the Iranians making our sailors get on their knees on their captured boats, eliciting an apology from the commander, and photographing and videotaping all of it to broadcast for propaganda purposes -- in clear violation of international law.

This obviously wasn't another Carter-era Iranian hostage crisis (it wasn't even a hostage crisis), but it was another national humiliation to add to a sour public mood that President Barack Obama doesn't get, let alone understand his own role in creating.

His State of the Union address was devoted to a pep talk for the country that did more to demon-

strate that he is out of touch -- an occupational hazard for late-second-term presidents -- than that anyone is wrong to feel pessimistic.

Yes, the economy has had a long recovery, but it has been slow and weak and, by some measures, hasn't been felt in much of the country. Yes, we are the most powerful nation on Earth, but our adversaries, from Vladimir Putin to ISIS to Iran, have been gaining and are eager to demonstrate our toothlessness -- in the case of ISIS, with spectacular acts of evil.

The president's version of world events in the State of the Union was particularly wan. He touted the marginal gains against ISIS without coming to grips with the catastrophes that made its rise possible; he boasted of the Iran nuclear deal, with nary a hint that the pact hasn't moderated Iranian behavior as hoped; and he spoke as though "partnering with local forces and leading international efforts" in Syria is an effective response to that country's

hellish meltdown.

True to form, in what was supposed to be a visionary speech, Obama continually took ill-disguised shots at his potential Republican successors, Donald Trump foremost among them. He scolded the 2016 GOP field for its fear, cheap sound bites and pandering.

There is all of that, of course -- it is a primary campaign, after all -- but there also is a deeper disgust with the direction of our country and the failures of its institutions, and a yearning for something better.

The president has actively sought America's diminishment abroad. For him, this is a shrewd play that avoids costly entanglements and makes us stronger. But there is no doubt that we are less respected and feared around the world. The public feels it, and doesn't like it. Many Americans, as a certain presidential candidate puts it, want to win again. They look at the photographs and videos of those American sailors, and it feels like a punch in the gut. The Obama administration looks at them and says to the Iranians, thank you very much.

Sanders Proves the Pundits Wrong

The problem with applying conventional wisdom to political campaigns is that it can suddenly be upended by an unconventional campaign.

National media pundits have been riveted by Donald Trump's flagrantly narcissistic run for the Republican presidential nomination. But Exhibit A for the most remarkable political challenge to conventional wisdom is Bernie Sanders and his totally unconventional, unabashedly populist run for the Democratic nomination.

When the Vermont senator launched his campaign last May, the snarky cognoscenti pronounced his effort dead on arrival. Not a chance, they snorted, that a 74-year-old, Jewish, democratic socialist going against Hillary Clinton's powerhouse machine -- and daring to call for a people's revolution against

Wall Street and reckless corporate elites -- could come close to winning.

But Bernie's authenticity and straight talk have mocked the cynicism of the "wise ones" and shocked the self-assured Clintonites. Huge crowds have turned out to cheer Bernie as he denounces the chasm of inequality ripping America apart.

Moreover, grassroots supporters have made Sanders' run financially competitive. A record 2.5 million individual donors chipped in an average of \$27 each last year to gird him with a campaign fund

of \$73 million.

And now, polls show that Bernie "no chance" Sanders has surged into the lead among Democratic voters in both Iowa and New Hampshire, including taking a significant lead among New Hampshire women. Yeah, say the scoffers, but he can't win the general election. In fact, polls now show he would handily defeat Trump, Ted Cruz, or Marco Rubio, outperforming Clinton against all three.

Not only is Bernie defying the odds, but he's doing it by showing that an authentic candidate with an authentic message can generate an authentic people's movement.

doubled by an astonished West, who thought it was possible that either or both of his minor-suit aces might not score tricks, but could not imagine how the ace of trumps would get away. East was naturally pleased as well, since he had an ace his partner knew nothing about. South eventually ended down three -- 500 points.

This contrasted greatly with the outcome at the other table, where the Brazilian North-South pair managed to stop in four hearts, scoring 420 points, after the following sequence:

Certainly the first three bids were all reasonable. The trouble started when North, at his second turn, raised to three hearts (forcing) instead of two.

It's hard to blame South for investigating a slam by using Blackwood. From his viewpoint, a small slam was certain if his partner had three aces, and a grand slam could be made if, perchance, his partner had all four aces. North responded five clubs,

which in standard Blackwood shows zero or four aces. South could not believe that his partner had no aces, considering his three-heart bid, so he leaped straightaway to seven hearts. This development was

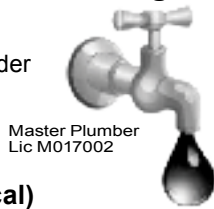
