
Shopping Map of Salado on Page 4C this edition



Candidate Forum set April 18 at Civic Center

Salado Chamber of Commerce/Tourism Bureau will host the 2016 Candidates at a question and answer forum beginning at 6:30 p.m. April 18 at the Salado Civic Center.

There are two threeyear terms on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees to be chosen on May 7. Candidates appearing on the ballot are incumbents Jeff Kelley and Darrell Street. Michael Matthews is a write-in candidate for the SISD Board of Trustees.

Voters will elect two candidates to fill two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen. Incumbent Frank Coachman's name appears on the ballot. Write-in candidates for Aldermen are incumbent Dr. Amber Preston-Dankert and Linda Reynolds.

Voters will elect a mayor to serve a two-year term. Hans Fields name appears on the ballot. Incumbent Skip Blancett is running for Mayor as a write-in candidate.

All candidates have been invited to participate in the Candidate Forum.

Moderator Dave Swarthout, Vice Chair of the Chamber/Tourism Board, will introduce the candidates at the beginning of the session.

Salado Lady Eagles will face the Jasper Lady Dogs (22-3-1) in the 4A girls soccer state semifinals at 11 a.m. April 13 at Birkelbach Field in Georgetown after beating Boerne 3-1 in the Region IV finals. Jasper and Kennedale both return from last year's state tournament, which Kennedale won by defeating Princeton 4-1 in the finals. Jasper went into the tournament last year with a 26-0 record and lost to Princeton 4-3 in the The Lady Dogs started their season with two losses to 6A teams The Woodlands and Magnolia West. They also lost to Royse City and tied Port Neches-Groves. The girls have not lost since Jan. 20. They won District 18-4A with an 8-0 record.

The Lady Dogs have run through playoff competition thus far, allowing only one goal to be scored in the past five games. Jasper beat the following: Bi-district, 6-0 over Lorena; Area, 6-0 over Little Cypress; Region Quarters, 9-0 over China Spring; Regin Semi, 7-0 over Bay City and Region III Final, 4-1 over Hardin-Jefferson.

Village approves design, gets land, permit

By adopting the Development and Design Standards for Sanctuary on April 7 and accepting a utility easement from Sanctuary owners, aldermen took the final two steps to secure the possession of the wastewater discharge permit and the six acres of property on which the future 200,000 gallon per day treatment plant will sit.

The board adopted the Sanctuary Development and Design Standards Ordinance, which includes 14 pages of exceptions to the Village ordinances including the zoning, subdivision and sign ordinances.

Among the exceptions are exceptions to street widths, lot sizes, building height limits and cul-desac lengths.

The Development and Design Standards allow for the construction of at least two, two-sided illuminated billboards "that shall be located on the Sanctuary project and closest permittable location to Interstate 35 and its service roads. Each sign face shall have a maximum sign area of 672 sq. ft. and maximum dimension of 14 feet by 48 feet and the overall top of the sign shall be no more than 50 feet from the grade level where the sign is located."

Street dimension for two way streets "shall have two 10 foot travel lanes in each direction with four foot minimum pedestrian or multi-modal zone flush; total clear zone is 24 feet."

Street dimensions for one way streets "shall have

16 foot cart way width plus one four foot parallel pedestrian lane and one four foot shoulder on the park side, total clear zone of 24 feet.

According to the Standards, the project may have private streets "as determined by the Sanctuary."

The minimum residential lot shall be 24 feet wide and 125 feet deep. There is no minimum lot size for a commercial lot.

According to the Development standards, "The Project can contain oneway streets. The Sanctuary is not required to submit a Traffic Analysis or compliance with the Transportation Plan provided Sanctuary does not exceed the total land uses pursuant to Article IV of the Master Development Agreement." There is no minimum or maximum length for alley streets and there is no maximum length for a culde-sac street.

Block sizes shall average 250 feet by 500 feet with minimum block dimensions of 180 feet by 300 feet.

The Development standards reduce the minimum setbacks to 10' front, 6' side and 5' rear for single family attached or multi family buildings.

Single family residential requires 15' front, 6' side and 5' rear.

The Development standards will have five styles of architecture: Flemish, Franconian, French Country, Texas Classical and Mediterranean Coastal.

Flemish is defined as Northern European style with primarily stucco on thick masonry walls, stepped gable roof parapet fronting the street, casement windows, flush facade and generous proportions of windows.

Franconian is defined as German Romantic style is similar to an English Tudor with steep rooflines, natural earthly materials and colors, use of half timbers on exteriors, multi-pane double hung windows, masonry foundation. Predominant in the center city of Rothenburg og de Taber.

French Country style was imported to the U.S. during the colonial period and is characterized by steep sheltering hip roofs, casement windows, stucco and stone. Greens, taupes and whites are used for body colors with bold accent colors on trim and door.

Texas Classical is epito-

mized in the Standards as "The Baines House is an excellent example of Texas Classical style."

Mediterranean Coastal style is "unmistakable influences of Spanish, Italian and Baroque styles developed for the warm Asymmetrical climate. composition of discrete building volumes. Masonry walls with stucco and low pitched flat clay tiled roofs. Acceptable materials for exteriors include stucco, stone, lap siding, brick, aluminum, metal and glass. Roofs may be fiberglass or asphalt shingles, metal, tile, wood shake, or membrane for low slope roods. Fences may be iron, aluminum, wood, fiberglass, recycled materials or synthetic materials.





Do Not Fear the Chalk

Students at the University of Michigan called police the other day -- because someone had written Donald Trump's name in chalk.

No arrests were made. The episode is part of a nationwide trend of Trump supporters writing pro-Trump messages on sidewalks, stairs and other surfaces at college campuses, where fainting fits are sure to ensue.

When they could get no relief from law enforcement, the University of Michigan students took it upon themselves to erase the offending messages -- including "Trump 2016," "Build the Wall" and "Stop Islam" -- while fighting through feelings of betraval.

One student complained that there should be a special emergency number to call in such cases and said that the administration's inadequate response "perpetuates these really racist and hateful stereotypes that turn into



messages can be considered tantamount to a physical threat captures the crisis of free speech on campus perfectly.

Pro-Trump chalking took off after the reaction at Emory University, where some students were reduced to tears by the messages and said they felt "fear." Protesters gathered at an administration building and let loose the antiphonal chant "You are not listening! Come speak to us, we are in pain!" This might have been an appropriate response if the kids had been tear-gassed, rather than seeing a positive phrase about a candidate that is supported by some significant plurality of the American public.

The president of the school, James Wagner, promised to review security footage to try to identify the perpetrators, and in a statement full of campus-diversity jargon pledged, among other things, "immediate refinements to certain policy and procedural deficiencies" and "regular and structured opportunities for difficult dialogues." to get over seeing an anodyne political message that they disagree with? To his credit, Wagner himself chalked "Emory stands for free expression," a message that will evidently have trouble penetrating the formidable incuriosity of some of his students.

The reaction to "the chalkening," as it's become known on social media, is a testament to the electric charge surrounding Trump. This branding isn't prudent positioning for a general election, but it makes Trump a perfect vehicle for provoking the other side, and it's in that thumb-in-the-eye spirit that the Trump chalking is spreading.

The students getting the vapors over it don't understand free expression or what it means to live in a free society, where you inevitably encounter people who have ideas and support candidates that you oppose. They hate Donald Trump. Fine. That is reason to argue and agitate against him, not to seek protection from any contact with supporters of his, no matter how tenuous.

Rule by Unelected Bureaucrat

President Obama opened the annual Easter Egg Roll at the White House this year by saying it was a bittersweet moment: it would be his last time hosting it.

The term "Easter egg" is also used to indicate little surprises hidden on a website or DVD menu. Of course, those surprises are pleasant and intended to be found. As the Obama administration approaches the end of its term, however, we can expect a different type of surprise -- and certainly not the friendly kind.

I'm referring to federal regulations, which have been growing at an alarming rate. The 2015 "Red Tape Rising" report from The Heritage Foundation (the 2016 one will be out soon) found that 27 new major rules were added in 2014, for a total of 184 over the first six years of the Obama administration. The cost, as estimated by the regulators themselves: \$80 billion annually. (And that's not even the full amount.)

Who pays that cost? You and me. It's passed on to all of us, even non-taxpayers, in the form of higher prices for everything.

But for now, let's consider a bigger question: Why do federal agencies have so much power to begin with? In simplest terms, it's Congress's fault. The lawmakers you elect to, well, make law, have gotten into the habit of passing remarkably vague legislation.

The law your senator or representative votes for to do Good Thing X is often

full of blanks. Somebody has to fill in those blanks -- to specify all the details about how X will be accomplished. Increasingly, that somebody is not a man or woman who's directly answerable to you, but someone you'll never meet. Someone who can't be voted out of office for failing to look after your interests.

The situation is exacerbated by something known as the Chevron Doctrine, which evolved out of a Supreme Court case in the 1980s. It boils down to this: When a federal court is interpreting an ambiguous federal law, it should defer to the agency that enforces it when deciding what the law means.

So if, for example, the Environmental Protection Agency says some pollution-prevention law should be interpreted a certain way, the court will -- unless there's some compelling reason to rule otherwise -- let the EPA's reading of the law stand.

Rep. Tom Marino (R-Pa.) recently provided an example of how things can go awry under the Chevron Doctrine. Noting the presence of a small stream by several farms near his home, he said the EPA and the Army Corps of Engineers tried to push through a rule stating that because a farm sometimes has some standing water after a rainstorm, the Navigable Waters Act gives the EPA control over that farm.

"I've been living out where I live for 15 years, and I have yet to see a ship go through that little stream that goes past my house," Marino said.

Now, by and large, Congress likes the Chevron Doctrine. It makes the job of legislating easier, obviously. No need to sweat the details -- let bureaucrats do that! The Executive Branch likes it, too: When a rule is challenged in court or elsewhere, an administration can point to the Chevron Doctrine.

But We the People shouldn't like it. As Sen. Mike Lee (R-Utah) has put it:

"You don't trust [the power to legislate] to other people. As hard-working, well-intentioned, well-educated and highly specialized as they might be, the men and women who work within our Executive Branch agencies don't work for you. You cannot fire them, almost regardless of what they do. You have no opportunity to review their work at regular intervals. And that is a recipe for tyranny."

He's right. Our system of government relies on checks and balances. Under the Chevron Doctrine, things have become remarkably unbalanced. For the sake of our freedoms, it's time to recalibrate.

Republican insiders are as confused as goats on astroturf when it comes to grasping Donald Trump's appeal.

Exciting news, people: The Republican Party establishment has a secret plan to stop blue-collar voters from supporting Donald Trump. The plan is code-named "Operation Paul Ryan."

Good grief.

The GOP's old-line clique of congressional bulls, corporate funders, lobbyists, and right-wing think tanks is as confused as goats on astroturf when it comes to grasping a core part of Trump's appeal.

Trump's winning because he's reaching out to longtime Republican voters who've finally realized that it's the party's own Wall Street elites who knocked them down economically. And it's the insider cadre of influence peddlers who've shut them out politically.

The party power powers are insisting that The Donald is winning only because he's drawing voters who are ignorant, racist, xenophobic, and sexist.



Some of them certainly are. But he's also drawing huge numbers of disaffected Republicans who are mainly opposed to the par-

ty's own power players. Far from being Koch-headed, laissez-faire ideologues, these voters like Trump's opposition to job-busting trade scams, his mocking of big-money campaign donations, his call to hike taxes on Wall Street's pampered hedge-funders, and his support for Social Security, among other things.

For these voters, the idea of nominating House Speaker Paul Ryan in a brokered convention is a dud, a farce, and an insult.

The Wisconsin Republican has long been the darling of the rich and powerful. The obtuse establishment snootily calls him "serious" presidential material — only because he champions such plutocratic policies as privatizing Social Security, cutting taxes on the super-rich, deregulating Wall Street, and replacing Medicare benefits with vouchers.

The only thing serious about Ryan's agenda is that it's a dead-serious loser with the great majority of Americans. Trump has his own issues. But trying to knock him off for Ryan is a sign of the GOP's irreversible decline into cluelessness and political irrelevance.

Readers on Sewers and Big Trucks

To the Editor:

Since when does a city government take out a full page ad on the taxpayer dime to politically advertise and defend their position on sewage treatment during an election season?

Last week's propaganda effort gives the mirage of a deliberative process, but excludes many details, including: zero public input into the agreements as promised, the two dozen secret meetings with Sanctuary while the public was kicked out into the cold, the short timeframes for consideration of red herring options, the actual cost of a regional solution, overinflated values of the land donation and TCEQ permit transfer, the unexplained disappearance of the Sanctuary's \$1 million dollar gift, how the aldermen's non-negotiable tax break/economic development/effluent benefit timeframes suddenly went from 10/10/10 to 15/15/45, why the EDA sewer grant was reduced from \$1.5 to \$1.0 million, any explanation why it took seven weeks from the time the annexation and economic development agreements were signed to have the land donation and TCEQ permit transfer in hand, and why there was delay after delay after delay throughout this Sanctuary sewer fiasco. The sewer bond was approved in November 2014 and other than studies, plans and hundreds of thousands already spent (including over \$600/day in bond interest since August 2015), there's not been a single shovel of dirt turned in more than 17 months.

This full page ad is nothing more than a political advertisement funded by taxpayers to cover for the infinite missteps of your incumbent elected and salaried public officials during this election season.



Belton will be constructing a 1,000,000 Gallon Per Day (GPD) wastewater lift station near the Lampasas River at Toll Bridge Road. It's scheduled for completion in mid- 2017. This date is prior to the scheduled completion date of the Village's proposed new 200,000 GPD Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) in Sanctuary.

The current north most main line of the proposed Village sewer is 4 miles from this future lift station. A Low Pressure Sewer (LPS) 4 inch line along this route is estimated to cost no more than \$750,000 to install. A 4 inch LPS line has a wastewater capacity of 700,000 GPD. LPS lines can be tapped into at any point, thereby extending the Village's sewer main line an additional 0.6 miles further north.

The remainder of this route north along IH-35 adjoins the Belton City Limits. Since this LPS


As for "Three Options" that concluded it would take all (\$11,500,000) of the bond money to:

1. "run lines to the Lampasas River and connect with the Temple-Belton waste water facility" Or is it...


2. "Build the initial lines to the Temple/Belton plant"



• Rigidly enforce the truck permit provisions (overweight, over height, over length, etc.)


• Rigidly enforce the speed limits

• Reserve the inside lane for passing and emergency vehicles for quicker clearances

And lastly, it's time we qualify drivers to operate in the Interstate environment with emphasis on defensive driving around larger vehicles.

Some years ago I was driving one of those big trucks before sunrise one morning on a freeway that lacked acceleration ramps. A young (and obviously distracted) driver in a small, underpowered car attempted to enter the highway by outrunning me. I never saw him until I saw a headlight beaming on the left guard rail. He tried to cut in front of my truck which clipped his rear quarter fender and flipped his car sideways in front of my truck which pushed him sideways several hundred feet.

Just because you can see the truck doesn't mean

by the City of Belton, it's likely they would pay a portion of its installation cost.

Currently the City of Belton has metered wastewater customers that pay a rates as low as \$2.50 per 1,000 gallons. The proposed 200,000 GPD Village WWTP will cost a minimum of \$200,000 annually to operate, not including bond principal or interest. The lowest possible operating cost of the proposed WWTP at maximum capacity is \$3.10 per 1,000 gallons.

But if all properties adjoining the proposed main line runs were FORCED by the Village government to connect, the initial daily flow will be 20,000 GPD. At that volume, it will cost \$27 per 1,000 gallons in operating cost. As for likely income from fees, there'll be one-time connection fees totaling \$28,000 and \$50,000 in annual wastewater fees, leaving an initial annual operating deficit of \$122,000.

As for properties not adjoining a main line, by utilizing LPS, properties as far away as 1.5 miles are in range of the main lines. Anonymous is silent as to who pays for these connections to the main lines. As for "The Rest of the Story", there's nothing positive if a new WWTP in Sanctuary will be hemorrhaging public money for decades. If Billy Hanks Jr could have established a Municipal Utility District (MUD), he would have done it long ago. The financial advantages of a MUD even outweigh the unprecedented giveaway package to him the Village government approved. And it's all moot now after the passage of the "Development and Design Standards for the Sanctuary Planned Community" Ordinance. There isn't a legitimate Developer or Commercial Interest that will build there now. Sanctuary has been condemned to be another Shepard's Glen ghost town. In the same Ordinance, the Village Alderman abdicated their duty to enforce building code(s) through construction inspection and ambiguously attempted to diluting the building code by requiring only "health & safety" to be complied with. I'm certain that the International Building Code Congress views the entire code as addressing "health & safety", and should be enforced in its entirety. As for "Currently", it seems hardly anyone got that far in the blurb and its microscopic schedule. It's notable for what Anonymous omitted.

that's accruing \$670 a day (\$244,550 annually) in interest. By the microscopic schedule, it'll be until August of 2017 before the WWTP will be done and wastewater fees for the new sewer would apply for the operation of the sewer system.

The proposed Village Sewer lines are to be a combination of gravity mains and LPS laterals (lines from properties to the main line). All the LPS lateral lines will be on the opposite the side of the street where the gravity main is located.

Construction of the gravity main will be as if James Construction has come to Main Street. The trench for the gravity main will be between 10 to 20 feet deep, requiring the removal and hauling off of any street or driveway in its path and generating spoil (excavated material) piles the heights of small houses.

And we must be living on "James Construction time" if the Consulting Engineer Kasberg, Patrick & Associates, LP (KPA) schedules 5 months for the Main Street gravity line construction. Village residents have first-hand experience with public work construction schedules. It'll take much longer than that. And to send the wastewater to a new WWTP in Sanctuary 80 feet above Main Street, two lift stations and their forced mains (that can't have lateral lines) are necessary too. A gravity sewer will have infiltration (ground water entering the main), causing wastewater spills into Salado Creek. Fortunately for the Village government, only spills exceeding 100,000 gallons require public notification. There is an alternative and it's a 100% Low Pressure Sewer system. LPS sewers cost a fraction of gravity sewers, are installed instead of constructed in far less time and are fully sealed, eliminating infiltration. There are no lift stations and their forced mains. The trench for a LPS line is 12 inches wide by 3-1/2 feet deep and is unaffected by grade changes. At streets and driveways, LPS lines are bored underneath, leaving improvements undisturbed. The perceived drawback to LPS is that a pump in a wet well is necessary. For customers with an existing septic tank, a Septic Tank Effluent Pump (STEP) can be installed for \$1,000. For new construction, a grinder pump in a wet well is necessary for \$5,000. It's not necessary that each property have an individual wet well and grinder pump. Multiple properties could share a single wet well and

grinder pump if the topography allowed it. Currently, there are over 100 wet well pumps already operating in Salado.

NO COSTS WERE INCLUDED IN THIS ANONYMOUS BLURB. The only information publically available had KPA proposing a construction cost of \$2,841,000 for just the Main St. and West Village Road gravity sewer and a fee of \$533,400, which is 18.75% of construction cost. No costs have been made public for the new 200,000 GPD WWTP. There are government entities that publish statutory professional rate scales. The highest published rate found for the same professional services is 8.7%. KPA's fee would be a World's Record for this kind of work (unless another Engineer wants to come forward and claim a higher charged fee).

Paying KPA nearly \$1 for every \$5 spent constructing the sewer is obscene.

Salado shut out the Llano Yellowjackets in a Mercy Rule-shortened game of six innings on April 5, winning 10-0.


Drew Dobbins pitched the entire game, spreading three hits across the 20 batters that came to the plate. He struck out 10 of them and walked none.


The Scouts began the meeting with trash clean up around the grounds and an informal flag ceremony.

The opponents' bidding sometimes draws a road map for declarer to follow that he would be unlikely to find had the opponents remained silent. For example, take this deal played by multitime world champion Bob Hamman in a U.S. national championship Hamman's opening oneclub bid was artificial and forcing, promising at least 17 high-card points with almost any distribution. West's four notrump announced a strong two-suiter in the minors. The double by North indicated at least moderate values, and South's five-heart bid closed the auction. Without a club lead, Hamman would have had no trouble collecting 11 tricks. But West's king-of-clubs lead cut South off from dummy's king of spades. As a result, declarer was faced with the possibility of losing three

West took the king with the ace, but, just as Hamman hoped, he did not have another trump to lead. Declarer ruffed the queenof-clubs return, trumped his last diamond in dummy and so made the contract.
