Salado Plaza underpass to open this week

Northbound I-35 mainlane traffic swtiched to the overpass over the weekend. Texas Department of Transportation announces that several other changes will occur over the next two weeks.

On June 12, James Construction, the contractor in Salado, switched northbound mainlane traffic from old pavement to new pavement.

The following activities are planned for the I-35 corridor in Salado:

• Salado Plaza Drive underpass will open to through traffic on June 16. Salado Plaza Drive and Mill Creek Drive will be staged with flaggers to guide traffic through the area while the switch is being finalized from 7 p.m. June 15 to 7 a.m. June 16

• The northbound frontage road from Salado Plaza Drive to FM 2484 is to be converted to one-way north on June 17.

Message boards are currently displaying the

upcoming swich to oneway traffic. The work to complete the switch will be finalized from 7 p.m. June 16 to 7 a.m. June 17.

The northbound offramp (Exit #286) to FM 2484 to repoen on June 20. I-35 will have a one lane closure from 10 p.m. June 19 through 7 a.m. June 20.

All these activities are weather dependent.

TxDOT also announces that the deadline for the 3.5 mile project through Salado to be substantially complete by James Construction is October 2016.

James Construction began work on the expansion of I-35 through Salado in June 2012 with an completion date of May 2015.

If James Construction meets the latest deadline, it will be 17 months behind the original schedule, or 47 percent behind the original schedule.

Preston Payne ground out to first to start the sixth, Ryan Dunnahoo walked and was only the second Eagle to reach base so far in the state final. Phillip Ellis singled and Cody Wolf singled to load the bases. Drew Dobbins fought Mueller to a walk after getting behind in the count, forcing across the Eagles' first run. Deer feeding on agenda

Salado aldermen, at their 6:30 p.m. June 16 meeting, will conduct a public hearing on a proposed ordinance relating to "the Intentional Feeding and Disposal of Deer."

The board has been wrestling with the issue of deer in the Salado suburban landscape since last summer, when they rejected last July on a slim majority of 3-2 a similar ordinance that included limited hunts by bow of deer within the village limits.

Aldermen discussed the issue again in the early fall and heard from many residents opposed to the controlled hunting of deer within the village limits.

In November, the Village sponsored a round-table of experts from various state and local governments, including the Texas Parks & Wildlife, Bell County Master Gardeners and the city of Lakeway, to discuss deer populations in a suburban environment like Salado.

Earlier this month, aldermen met in workshop session to hone the proposed ordinance, which deals with the intentional feeding of deer and the disposal of the carcasses of deer that have died.

The ordinance puts in place a fine of no less than

\$75 or more than \$125 per feeding offense. It also puts in place a \$50 fee and process for the village to dispose of deer carcasses

reported by landowners.

The five-page ordinance stops short of implementing a Managed Lands Deer Permit (MLDP) program, which was part of the failed ordinance last July.

"There is no quick fix." There is no cheap fix," Texas Parks & Wildlife biologist Derrick Wolter told a room full of Saladoans during a November forum on Suburban Deer Populations. "The problem will not go away. The longer you wait, the more expensive it will be."



The petition whines that "a year spent around a seminar table where the literary contributions of women, people of color, and queer folk consider Toni Morrison are absent actively harms all students, regardless of their identity."

Salado High gets an A from Children at Risk

Salado High School received an A from Children at Risk, which recently released its rankings of more than 7,000 Texas schools.

Salado Junior High School received a rating of B- and was 655th among 1,670 Texas junior high schools.

Salado Intermediate School received a rating of B+ and was ranked 1,073 among 4,188 elementary schools.

Salado High School was ranked #175 among the 1,159 high school ranked by the non-profit, non-partisan research and advocacy organization. It was the highest ranking among 15 high schools serving Bell County stu-

Four of those area high schools, including three in Killeen school district, received an F from Children at Risk. Those were Killeen High, Killeen Ellison, Killeen Shoemaker and Rosebud-Lott.

Temple and Bartlett received D+ while Copperas Cove and Harker Heights High School got Cs and Troy and Academy both got a C+. Belton received a B while Rogers, Belton New Tech and Holland all got a B+.

The Children at Risk website states that the "school rankings strive to serve as an accessible guide for parents, educators and community members of the performance of local schools and to spark important community dialogue on the quality of public education in Texas."

The annual school rankings include the following measures by which schools are ranked: Student Achievement Index based upon on performance on the STAAR Reading and Math test;

Campus Performance Index, which is an adjustment of achievement indicator to eliminate bias toward campuses with low percentage of economically disadvantaged students; Growth Index, which is the improvement over time on standardized test scores in Reaching, English and Math. Additionally, high school campuses had the added measurement of a College Readiness Index, which includes graduation rates, SAT/ACT participation rates and scores and AP/IB participation rates and scores.

All campuses were assigned a letter grade, based on their Composite Index. For elementary, middle, and high schools:

- Campuses at or above the 75th percentile (indicating they rank better than at least 75 percent of schools serving the same grade levels) received an
- Campuses at or above the 55th percentile, but below the 75th percentile, received a "B."
- Campuses at or above the 35th percentile, but below the 55th percentile, received a "C."
- Campuses at or above the 15th percentile, but below the 35th percentile, received a "D."
- Campuses below the 15th percentile received an

Once campuses are assigned a general letter grade, "A," "B," and "C" grades were further differentiated into plus/minus grades (e.g., "A+"). The range of Composite Index scores for each letter grade was divided evenly into thirds. The top third of Composite Index scores became "plus" grades and the bottom third of Composite Index scores became "minus" grades. The cut-points are different for elementary, middle, and high schools because they are based on the unique sample of scores for the year's schools at each lev-

According to the website, "As a research and advocacy organization, the purpose of the rankings is not only to provide a tool for parents and students, but also to provide information for campuses and districts on how they perform relative to their peers, comparing them against successful models of high-performing public schools.'

"Each year, Children at Risk reexamines its methodology of ranking schools," the website further states, "to ensure that the rankings most accurately reflects school performance, utilizes the most appropriate data available, and incorporates feedback from educators, researchers, and service providers."

The right time for action

Contract **Bridge**

If the only way to defeat a contract depends upon your partner having a certain card, and if your partner's holding that card is consistent with the bidding, then you should proceed on the assumption that he has that card. To play otherwise would essentially

For example, consider this deal where South is in four spades and West leads the queen of hearts. Declarer wins with the king and draws three rounds of trumps, ending in dummy. The three of clubs is then led to the jack, losing to West's queen. What should West play next? Actually, there is only one card he can return to defeat the contract: the jack of diamonds! If he leads that card, South goes down; if he leads any other card, South makes four spades.

then avoid the loss of three diamond tricks regardless of what he does. But if West

leads the ace of diamonds or a low diamond, South can hold himself to two diamond losers with proper play.

How can West know that the jack of diamonds -- and only the jack of diamonds -is the right play? West sees that declarer has five trump tricks, the A-K of hearts and the ace of clubs. It is also fairly obvious that South took a club finesse at trick five with a holding that included the K-J. This brings declarer to nine sure tricks.

If West also credits South with the king of diamonds, he might as well give up and go home. Instead, he must assume that East has the king and that declarer has three diamonds. To do otherwise. as we said earlier, is a form of self-destruction.



The Great Blue Heron is strictly carnivorous

Some of the birds that we observe in their native habitats look as though they just don't fit in with the other "normal looking" birds. Sometimes their tails are shorter than what we expect, sometimes their legs look too long, or their bill is a different shape. Occasionally we see a species that has several "goofy-looking" characteristics, and one of the most familiar types is the Great Blue Heron.

The Great Blue Heron (Ardea herodias) occurs in every state of the continental United States during the summer months but can only be observed in the southern states during

the wintertime. It is a habitat specialist, rarely being observed far away from permanent bodies of water, something that is not overly abundant here in west Texas.

It is a large bird, with a total length (body and tail) of just over 50 inches. The wingspan can approach 80 inches, making this species one of this state's largest birds. This avian species has a blue-gray body (hence the name) with a long, black-andwhite streaked neck and a disproportionately short tail. The face is white and there are two bold black lines on either side of the crown of the head. The bill is long and powerful and is more often than not yellowish in coloration. The long legs, which are utilized for wading in shallow water as it searches for prey, are colored a dirty yellow. In flight, the legs are stretched straight out while the neck is pulled back into a S-shape. The flight pattern is a simple

one, consisting of a straight

path with slow, strong, and steady wing beats.

Wild About Texas

Great Blue Herons are strictly carnivorous, feeding primarily on fish, although other vertebrate animals such as aquatic snakes, turtles, frogs, and mice are opportunistically preyed upon. This "longlegged wader" employs two different strategies when hunting prey. The first consists of the bird just standing still in the shallow water for long periods of time, allowing prey items to familiarize themselves with it and even get comfortable with its presence. It then waits for the right moment to capitalize on its prey's complacency, grabbing its food with a lightening quick jab of its stout bill.

The second method involves the bird walking slowly along shorelines, lily-covered shallows, or grassy meadows, methodically waiting the opportune moment to grab whatever it perceives as potential prey.

During the vast major-

ity of the year, this aquatic species is solitary. However, during breeding season, it will congregate into massive colonies, with males adorned with long, thin black plumes selecting a single female with which to mate with. Pairs are monogamous, and the male collects the supplies needed for nest building while the female utilizes the twigs, sticks, leaves and grass for the actual nest construction. Most nests are built in trees anywhere from twenty feet to fifty feet above ground. One to two broods per year are produced, with two to seven blue eggs being the norm. Both parents incubate the two inch long eggs for about one month. The young are semialtrical, which means they are incapable of fending for themselves. Both parents feed the young, which stay in the nest for almost three

months. Populations of this subtly colored but beautiful bird are stable due to its widespread distribution. Many times this species is referred to by locals as the "blue crane".






