




Three Generations

Salado Legends returns to Tablerock stage

The Billy Lummus family will bring 3rd generation actors to the Tablerock stage for the 2014 performances of Salado Legends July 19, July 26 and August 2, 2014.

Billy Lummus, an Army officer, raised his family all over the world and many military bases in the United States. After 20 years in the Army, with his last assignment being Fort Hood, the Lummus family of five settled in Belton, Texas and Billy began his second career as a high school teacher at Belton High School.

In 1994 the Lummus family joined Tablerock productions. The whole family were either assigned actor's roles or volunteered as crew members of the plays. They took roles in many Tablerock productions over the years, including A Christmas Carol, Salado Legends, Hamlet and Fright Trail.

Heather, the oldest daughter in the Lummus clan, and her twin sisters, Erin and Ashleytook to the Tablerock stage as if they slept in a vaudeville trunk during formative years. Perhaps it was the constant moving and making their home in so many countries and states that gave them a high polish. The girl's cry of "I can do that" was often taken to heart. Heather met her husband Josh Harris when they were both in Tablerock's production of A Christmas Carol. It was another Tablerock romance! Josh, from Belton, became a professional baseball player after college. Heather graduated from college, they married and moved back to Salado when Josh was offered a coaching job at Salado High School. In 2011, when their first son, Nolan, was 5 years-old all three in the Harris family appeared in Salado Legends. Heather took on the role of TEXAS!, Josh was

In 2012 Ashley and her one-year old daughter, McKinley, rejoined the Salado Legends cast and crew as Indians in the Tonkawa Village so Ashley could carry her 8 month-old "papoose" at ease. This year Ashley will resume her old role as Sirena since her 2 ½ year old is now old enough to take on a child's role in the Indian village.

Erin is married to Christian Rider who is a Site Supervisor for Fluor Construction Corp. and was moved to Orlando, Florida in May. Erin and Christian have

no children as yet. Erin has earned a Masters in Psychology and is writing a book. Erin will fly home for one of the performances of Salado Legends this summer.

Darlene Lummus has played many roles in Tablerock productions over the past 20 years. Her continued role as Mrs. Cratchet was her favorite. She has been mother to many children who were friends of her 3 daughters and "mothered" all of the Tablerock children. Darlene taught at Salado High School for many years and was in charge of The Drill Team.

After 13 years at Ellison High School in Killeen, Billy will retire from 20 years of teaching. With two retirements under his belt, he has not made up his mind what he will do next, besides read, play with grandchildren and rest for a few months. For the past few years Billy has played the role of Sterling Robertson in Salado Legends and will do so again this year.

Blue Lapis Light will dance among the ancient oaks of Pace Park in a free performance 9 p.m. July 25.





"We are so excited to have Blue Lapis Light coming to Salado," said Jill Shipman.



Pickle and Homer Thornberry Federal Buildings in downtown Austin and the Long Center for the Performing Arts. 
Blue Lapis Light is under the direction of its founder Sally Jacques, who creates creates site-specific aerial dance works that speak to social, political and spiritual issues.
















Mill Creek returning to excellence

"It is hard to find a great piece of land and Mill Creek has just that," JL Lewis said of the golf course where he now serves as the full-time Golf Pro. "You don't see that kind of natural roll of land and undulations. Add the water running through it and you have the potential for Mill Creek to become one of the premier courses in the state."

Lewis knows good and great golf courses. The potential for Mill Creek to return to being a premier course in the state is one reason he accepted the position here. "I am hoping this is my last job," he said.

He is a lifetime golfer and a two-time winner on the PGA Tour and has over \$8.5 million in career earnings since 1989 on the PGA and Champions Tours.

He brings a great deal of experience to Mill Creek, both as a traveling pro tour player when he represented Horseshoe Bay Resort and Golf Club for five years and as a course golf pro.

He was the assistant golf pro at Berry Creek Country Club in Georgetown, Las Vegas Country Club in Nevada and Live Oak, Yaupon & The Hills of Lakeway, a 54-hole semiprivate golf resort.

He was the head golf pro and general manager of the 18 hole Forrest Creek Golf Club in Round Rock from 1990 to 1993. There, he implemented a junior golf program that grew to more than 100 participants and sold 50 events per year with 50-200 players per event. He also implemented member-related activities for the Men's and Ladies' Golf Association there.

He was Director of Golf for the Ben White Golf Center in

Austin for two years, an active driving range with more than 100 players per day. He taught an average of seven lessons per day and worked to promote and instruct weekly clinics for golfers of all ages and levels. He worked with staff to develop good golf instructors.

These are some of the things he looks forward to developing at Mill Creek in the coming months and years as the course is rehabilitated to bring it back to what he calls, "one of the best courses in the state."

"We've got work to do," Lewis said, "but we're going to get there. The owners are all good people and have the right train of thought for the future of the course."

As the creek holes are restored and the full 27 is brought back in to play, Lewis said that the ownership will be able to pursue a wider range of players, from the stay-and-play packages to tournaments, without slowing down the daily club members.

"A 27-hole course has as much flexibility in terms of play and being able to perform maintenance on it as a 36-hole course," he said.

A beautiful fountain was in-

stalled at the pond this spring. Fireworks will be displayed above it on July 5 for the community. The 19th Hole and Pro Shop have been recently expanded and the 19th Hole Grill offers dinner specials every Friday night.

"It looked like as soon as the temperature got up," he said, "everyone was getting out and hitting the course."

With milder than usual temperatures this summer, play has been heavy.

Lewis wants to build on the momentum started by the new ownership group by fully developing a junior golf program. Lewis said that in addition to the local Salado families, the course would reach out to all of the communities in the area to develop junior play. "That's where the future of golf is."

Lewis led a five-week junior golf camp that began Feb. 15. Other golf camps will be planned throughout the year to each the game to the next generation of golfers. "We will be teaching all aspects of the game, including etiquette and the rules," he said.

Lewis also works directly with beginning adult golfers with sessions every Thursday.

To find out more about these programs, call the Pro Shop at 947-5698.

Now is the time to join Mill Creek before initiation fees go into effect.

Several levels of membership are available, including Corporate (\$250 per month for first two employees, \$50 per month for each additional), Family (\$225 per month), Twilight (\$125 per month) and Junior (\$165 per month).

The course is reasonable even for non-members. Call the Clubhouse at 947-5698 for rates and tee times.




The new owners of Mill Creek are working on a three-year plan to return the Robert Trent Jones II designed golf course to a full 27 holes.





Historic bridges over Salado Creek

For several years after the town was laid out, the citizens of Salado crossed the shallow creek by stepping from rock to rock, or on logs laid across the wider places. These logs were chained to the rocks and would sink down stream during freshets and be replaced when the flood subsided. But when in 1866 a dam was thrown across the stream at the lower end of the village, the water was backed up over the rocks. Then for a time "foot-logs" raised on legs standing in the water and chained to the rocks below were used; but they were narrow, rickety and unsafe, and pedestrians not infrequently tumbled off into the water. A general demand arose for a bridge. To meet this problem as well as others, it was decided to incorporate the village. Application for incorporation was made under the general law and the county court in January 1867, authorized and election for town officers. On February 23, Judge O.T. Tyler was elected mayor and a board of aldermen was chosen. These officials appointed the other officers, among the Colonel Thos. H. Jones as treasurer. The town officials first tried to raise funds for a bridge by voluntary donations, but finding they could not raise enough by this means, on December 3, 1868, they ordered an issue of bonds...

The bonds were purchased by the citizens of the town. With the proceeds and subscriptions amounting in all to some \$2,500, the municipal authorities proceeded to build a wire cable suspension foot-bridge of substantial construction of unique design and graceful proportions. Two large galvanized rope-wire cables, anchored at each end in strongly built stone abutments, were carried over two doubleturreted dressed-stone piers of towers. From these suspended cables wire cords extended down to catch and support the ends of sawed cedar cross bars or joists on which the plank floor was laid. It was one of the first of its kind in the Southwest and was designed, engineered




This photo, courtesy of the Salado Historical Society, shows the walking bridge over Salado Creek. In the background is Salado College.

and constructed entirely by home talent-Judge Tyler, Colonel Thos. H. Jones, Judge Wm. H. Garrett, Wm. A. Davis, John Hendrickson and others. It swung some twenty feet above the water and although it could be made to sway enough from side to side to frighten timid souls--especially groups of squealing girls when mischievous boys chose this method of teasing them--it served the people well for more than thirty years. After the county built a combination wagon and foot bridge a few yards upstream the suspension bridge gradually fell into disuse. In 1913 it was finally swept away when a cloud burst in the upper water-shed of Salado Creek sent down a terrific flood that carried away the county bridge as well. The latter was promptly rebuilt, only to be carried away again in the still greater flood of September 9 and 10, 1921.



Salado Glassworks to move into expanded location this summer

A small rocket ship is emblazoned on each of his glass shop's T-shirts, popular items for tourists and locals alike to purchase and wear.

And indicative of the growth of Salado Glassworks and artist Gail Allard II. Salado Glassworks purchased the Peddler's Alley buildings and the .58 acres they sit upon to expand Allard's gallery and studio.

It's been several years since the original Peddler's Alley has had any retail use, but Allard has plans for the 6,000 sq. ft. former granary.

The front of the building will be for an expanded Salado Glassworks location that will have a much larger gallery of his hand blown glass art, as well as the glass and metal art of Aaron Gist and the glass and jewelry art of Sara Whitis. The studio furniture by REVELation Decor's Allie and Benjamin Guenther and paintings by Chad Hines.

The studio itself will be approximately three times the current cramped quarters in which he has been working and teaching Aaron Gist since November 2012.

Gist is learning the ancient craft in the same way Allard learned it, by doing. Allard recalled how he first came across glassblowing by visiting the Rynoglass studio in Temple and meeting Bob Rynearson.

Allard worked under Rynearson for some nine years. He then joined the non-profit Salado Arts Workshop before opening in the small metal building currently housing his gallery and studio.

"We are in such a prime spot, with the beautiful new entrance to Main Street being built," Allard says of the location just steps off of south Main St. and

College Hill.

At the time he opened in Salado, he considered Fredericksburg and other towns in Texas but says he recognized "the potential of what is going on in town and the kind of charm it has going for it."

And Allard says he wanted to bring some "excitement" to Salado

So he brought fire.

A couple thousand degrees worth of it, to be exact.

"There is something about the glow of the fire that attracts people of all ages," he said. "Folks wander in off the highway and see what we create in the front and then make their way to the back...."

And their reactions are terrific, whether they are a child or a grandparent. "For the older generation, it is the fact that we are making something by hand, here on the spot," Allard said. "For the kids, it is definitely the fire."

And the transformative art that he creates making everything from large vessels to lamps to hearts to Easter eggs to beer mugs to pumpkins to Christmas ornaments.

"That they can get involved and help create their own oneof-a-kind piece makes it very special and something they will remember for a long time," he said.

Using social media, billboards and print, Allard has grown the business demonstrably. Enough to have been named the Salado Chamber of Commerce Person of the Year.

His business plan for the expansion will be to improve on what he has already created.

The new location will have an expanded viewing room, a larger gallery space, a party room for groups who want to come and make things, and a home space in the back for his wife Jennifer



and son Gail III.

Gail and crew will continue operating in the current location through mid-July, reopening in the new location in mid-September, just in time for making beer mugs for Oktoberfest.






