# 55th Scottish Gathering, Highland Games on grounds of Salado Civic Center in Nov.

The 55th Scottish Gathering and Highland Games (www.saladoscottishfestival. com) will be held on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center, November 11-13. Heralding all things Scottish, this landmark event is the oldest Scottish festival in Texas and has been sponsored continuously by the Central Texas Area Museum since 1961.

"The Scottish Gathering is a vital part of Salado and its ancestral history," says Melanie Kirchmeier, President of the Salado Chamber of Commerce. "The importance of this event serves to reinforce and celebrate those roots each time it returns. Its value is immeasurable to this community."

The three-day event includes the skirl of the bagpipes, the wearing of the tartan, tossing the caber, Highland dancing, Celtic entertainers, shopping, food and fun. One of the event's main features is the Clan Village, the largest gathering of Scottish Clan tents in Texas where Clan members share information about Scottish history and genealogy.

The weekend begins on Friday evening with the Calling of the Clans at 6:00 pm on

the Salado Creekside just north of the Museum building on south Main Street. This is a solemn torchlight ceremony that recreates the coming together of the ancient Scottish clans to fight with Robert the Bruce for Scotland's freedom in 1314 at Bannockburn.

The Civic Center grounds open Saturday at 9:00 a.m. The official opening ceremonies begin at noon with the Bands and Clans Parade on Main Street followed by presentations and massed bagpipe bands on the grounds. The day's activities include Scottish athletics, dancing and bagpiping competitions, live music, a Celtic marketplace and

Sunday events begin at 9:00 a.m. with the Kirkin' o' the Tartan, a traditional devotional service in which family groups carry banners of their family tartans and ask blessings on the families. The day's activities include bagpipe band competition, Clan tents, dog parade and contest, music, food, and shopping.


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
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# Get lost in tales of treasure during Salado Ghost Walk

village. The ghostwalk begins at 8 p.m., and lasts for approximately an hour and a half.






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


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# Private homes open for Christmas Tour





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# Salado Masonic Lodge #296 will share its history during Open House

Much of the history of Salado is linked to Salado Masonic Lodge #296. Many of the men who founded Salado were Masons.

The Masonic Lodge will mark its 150th anniversary in June 2017.

On Oct. 23, it will join the more than 1,000 lodges under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Texas Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons in hosting an Open House for the community.

Salado Masonic Lodge #296 will open its doors to the community 2-4 p.m. on Oct. 23. There will be representatives of the Appendant Bodies, including the Shrine, the Scottish Rite, the York Rite and the Knights Templar.

The following history of the lodge is taken from the lodge's program during its Century Celebration in 1967.

The petitioners for Dispensation and Charter were: E. Sterling C. Robertson, Harvey Smith, W.A. Davis, O.T. Tyler, A. Rowland, Robert B. Halley, Jno. A. Tyler, F. A. Bigelow, N.R. Land, H.J. Chamberlain, W.R. Karnes, G.W. Wade, M.W. Adams, Jno T. Flint, Geo. W. McWhirter, Welborn Barton, Jas. Tinnin, A. Tinnin, and Jesse Raborn.

The Minutes of Salado Lodge were destroyed in a fire about 1883 and we are deprived of that source of information as to the early activities of the Lodge, after Dispensation.

We may safely assume, however, that education was one of the principal objectives of the Lodge and a matter stressed in its discussions and proceedings.

Thirty-three percent of the teachers and seventy-seven percent of the Trustees of the College were Masons. The founders (of the College), most of whom have been found to be Masons, also made provision in the Deeds of purchase of lots to prohibit the sale of intoxicating beverages by the drink in Salado.

"It seems," writes Mrs. Felda Shanklin, Salado historian, "that most all of those early Salado men were Masons."

The Charter for Salado Masonic Lodge was granted by the Grand Lodge of Texas on June 13, A.D. 1867, and was signed by Grand Master John R. Freitwell.


The first Grand Lodge Report of Salado Lodge after the granting of a Charter shows the following officers: E.S.C. Robertson, W.M.; Harvey Smith, S.W.; W.A. Davis, J.W.; O.T. Tyler, Treas.; W. Barton, Sec.; J.W. Tinnin, S.D.; I. Raborn, J.D.; R.B. Halley, Tiler. This report also shows a membership of twenty-two M.M. by affiliation, one Fellowcraft, five Enter Apprentices, and one Past Master.

On the back of a Grand Lodge, Report U. D., there is this notation: "The Lodge Room of Salado Lodge is the second story of a stone building twenty by forty feet." These figures are the same dimensions as those of one wing of the Salado College building and there seems to be no doubt that the College and the Lodge were using the same building in those early days - an arrangement that is not surprising, since both had similar objectives and both had the same man, E. Sterling Robertson, as their highest official.

Later, Salado Lodge secured an interest in the title to the upper story of the Baptist Church in Salado, and for many years met in a Lodge room on the second floor of the church building. In a church rebuilding and enlargement program, the question came up as to how to dispose of the interest of the Lodge in the old building. This problem was solved by literally sawing off the upper half of the building and moving it to, and setting it up as a Lodge room a short distance away on some land donated to the Lodge by Bro. Charlton E. Johnson, Past Master of Salado Masonic Lodge.

There are four Masons who have been shown to be most influential and effective in the founding and maintaining of Salado College and Thomas Arnold High School. It is a most remarkable fact that all of these leaders in the educational field were contemporaries, and it is also a remarkable fact that a town so small as Salado and a Lodge so limited in membership that Salado Masonic Lodge could have nurtured four men whose great work in life was the advancement of education. It would be difficult to find a parallel in Texas.

Col. E. Sterling C. Robertson, leader and pioneer, who had a vision of a great school in the midst of a wilderness and who gave unreservedly of his time, his splendid talents and his money to make that vision a reality, and without whom there might never have been

any Salado College, Masonic Lodge or town of Salado Springs; Major A. J. Rose, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Texas, champion of education in general, with special emphasis upon the practical phase of education; Geo. W. Tyler, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Texas, advocate of, and tireless worker in, all fields of education, general and Masonic; and Dr. S. J. Jones, Ph.D., M.A., who brought to Thomas Arnold High School a polish, a luster and fame not surpassed in its day by any educational institution in Texas.

Past Grand Master Rose and Past Grand Master Tyler were both members of the Salado Lodge No. 296 at the time they were elevated to the high office, Bro. Rose in 1886 and Bro. Tyler in 1891. Bro. Tyler and Bro. Jones were each raised a Master Mason in Salado Lodge No. 296.

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
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### Mills on Salado Creek

(excerpts from History of Bell County, Third Edition George W. Tyler)

...mention should be made of the numerous small flour and grist mills which were to be found along the streams from the late sixties to the early eighties. They were nearly all run by water power. The Salado Creek was especially well adapted to milling, and more mills than any other stream in the county. The oldest one on this creek was Ferguson's Mill. It had first been built by Ira E. and Whitefield Chalk in 1849 or 1850 and after some years had been owned and operated by Jr. James P. Reed. The Reverend James E. Ferguson bought it in 1867 and ran it until his death in 1876. It was then carried on for many years by his family. In 1866 Mr. W.A. Davis formerly of Round Rock built a mill and dam on this creek a little way below the big springs at the town of Salado. At first it was a wool carding establishment but was later converted into a flour and grist mill. In the same year John Meyers erected a mill several miles further down on Salado Creek, which later passed through the hands of several owners but is best remembered as the Summer's Mill. Other mills built on this stream were Dulaney's (1867), T.J. Jones' (1869), Stinnett and Orgain's (1874) later known as Stinnett's and finally as the Highland Mill and "Ike" (Isaac V) Jones' Mill (1880) . On the Lampasas, after the little pioneer Children's Mill, built in 1848, came Guthrie's (1870) and W.K. Hamblen's (1871).



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## Salado Grange was first in Texas

The following story is taken from George W. Tyler's <u>History of Bell County</u>, 1985 Edition, page 299-301.

Back in the seventies the farmers had a great national organization, styled the "Patrons of Husbandry." It was commonly called, "The Grange," and its members were referred to as "Grangers." The organization covered the farming district of the whole United States, and at one time its membership numbered hundreds of thousands. It comprised a National Grange, a state Grange in each state, a County Grange in each county, and local Granges in the communities.

Bell County pioneered the movement in this state. Salado Grange, No. 1, opened in the summer of 1873, was the first Grange organized in Texas. Among its charter members were A.J. Rose, O.T. Tyler, William P. Hancock, J.F. Fuller, John S. Rogers, L.A. Griffith, N.L. Norton, Wm. J. Caskey, Joe W. Love and many others.

The order soon spread rapidly over Bell County and throughout the state. County Granges were set up and then the State Grange, all in 1873. Wm. W. Lange of Marlin became the first Grand Worthy patron of the State Grange. By 1878 the membership had become so large and its political power so great that Mr. Lange became a candidate for governor before the Democratic State Convention, on the Grange or farmers' ticket. Lange resigned the leadership of the State Grange about 1882 and was succeeded by A.J. Rose, as Grand Worthy Patron. The ordered prospered for some ten or twelve years before it was largely superseded by a radical and active organization, the "Farmers Alliance."

The leading objects of the grange organization were cooperation among farmers in the marketing of produce and in the purchase of farm supplies, implements, building materials, etc.; the bringing with the "middleman;" better provisions for education especially agricultural education; the social uplift of the farmer and his family; a strong code of morals; law and order; lower taxes; and greater participation by farmers in making the laws. And during those days it was the usual stunt for politicians to cater to the Grange vote and to identify themselves with the political demands of the farmers.


The first incorporated Grange store in the State was started in Salado, whence others, too, spread all over Texas. They flourished for a time, but at last with droughts and hard times, they went upon the financial rocks.

The Texas Cooperative Association, a rather ambitious enterprise, also organized and incorporated at Salado, set up its office in Galveston with Mr. John S. Rogers, of Salado, as manager. Its mission was to receive by consignment, cotton and other farm products from the farmers (through their local Grange stores) all over the state; to sell these products direct to spinners' agents and exporters; to purchase, at wholesale prices, the supplies of all kinds required by the farmers, consigning such purchase, in carload lots, to the Grange stores, where they were to be distributed among the members and customers. To pay its overhead expenses, the Association charged a small fixed commission upon all transactions. It was well planned, and for many years was a decided success. Even after the Grange was superseded by the "Alliance," the latter organization used the facilities of the Grange Agency at Galveston.

The local Grange stores and the Texas Cooperative Association were all based theoretically upon spot cash transactions, for they had but little capital and could not extend credit. When droughts and other calamities visited the farmer they were forced back to the credit accommodations offered by the regular merchants and these cooperative enterprises, handling only cash transactions, lost a large percent of the business of even their own membership. In a one-crop country the cash or "pay as you go" system seem to be impracticable, however well managed.

The Texas Farmer was launched by William P. Hancock and J.F. Fuller, of Salado, about 1880. It was devoted to the interests of the farmers generally and of the Patrons of Husbandry in particular. At first it was printed at the office of the Belton Courier in Belton, but later equipped its own print shop in Belton, where it was edited and managed by J.F. Fuller. The paper became the official organ of the State Grange, and enjoyed as a statewide circulation. Later it was moved to Dallas and there it was edited and managed by Wm. A. Shaw, generally known as "Farmer Shaw," who made it an influential factor with the press and farmers of Texas.

Such an organization, with an overwhelming farmer vote throughout the State, was, of course, catered to and preyed upon by politicians, within and without the membership; and what with the financial straits Page 46

of the individual farmers and the arrival of a new organization, the Farmer's Alliance, the Grange gradually disappeared as an active body.

The Order still exists in other parts of the United States and still holds well attended National Grange meetings; but it no longer exists in Texas, so far as is known to this writer. (After this article first appeared in this magazine, we have had reports that the Grange continues in parts of the country).

The membership included all members of the farmer's family - men, women, and children (above a certain age) and all of them participated in the Grange meetings held in halls or rooms prepared for the purpose. The meetings were secret and were conducted on the lodge plan, with a ritual for the initiation of new members and installation of officers. While women as well as men held office in the Grange, the more responsible active duties in that body were performed by the men of the Order.

The Grange did much to promote social intercourse among farmers and their families, brought about a more general habit of reading and investigation, especially along economic lines, and included broader thinking and a more liberal attitude in the minds of a great body of citizens whose outlook had been too much limited by the hard routine of life on the farm. The Grange left its imprint, virile and lasting upon the period.

### Clan Wallace marks 50th anniversary at Salado Gathering

Clan Wallace Society (CWS) has over 1,400 members in the United States, Canada, Scotland, England, France and as far away as Hong Kong, New Zealand, and Australia.

CWS was founded and chartered in 1966 at one of the early Gathering of the Clans in Salado. The purpose of the Society is educational with particular reference to the history of Scotland, and its public figures, such as Sir William Wallace, the national hero of Scotland, its Clan and the heritage and achievements of those claiming Scottish descent.

The Clan Wallace Motto is Pro Liberate which means "For Freedom". In the late 1200's and early 1300's a Scottish Patriot named William Wallace stirred his nation to rebel against the harsh rule of England's King Edward I Plantagenet also known as "Longshanks". William Wallace became High Protector of Scotland and was knighted for his patriotism and leadership in the rebellion. He was eventually defeated in battle and was imprisoned and tortured to death by the English. It was not until the

year 2000 that Sir William Wallace's dream of freedom for Scotland became a reality. Scotland instituted its first Parliament in 2000, with Queen Elizabeth II of England in attendance to support the event.

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


