PALS Taste of Salado finale of Immerse, Emerge weekend

The Public Arts League of Salado (PALS) will hold the annual fundraiser Taste of Salado on April 25 at the Venue in Salado.

The event will be preceded by three days of public art in action as well as ticketed events, collectively known as "Immerse & Emerge."

Three Texas-based stone carvers, Bob Ragan, Larry Hullum and Matt Johnson, will participate in a stone carving competition April 23-25 on the grounds of The Venue next to Salado Creek.

Visitors are encouraged to bring lawn chairs, visit with the artists, and watch them work.

The sculptures, including the winning piece, will be auctioned at the Taste of Salado April 25.

Original art from several Salado artists including Ronnie Wells, Larry Prellop, Gail Allard II, Troy Kelley, Michael Pritchett and Melissa Paxton will be sold at auction during the Taste of Salado.

Artists in Action will be working throughout town all weekend. Visitors can stroll through the Village, stopping at specific galleries and locations to see the artists working and visit with them about their processes and techniques.

PALS will present Blue Lapis Light, the world-renowned aerial dance troupe at 9 p.m. April 24. This year's performance will be a new work by Director Sally Jacques that will last 45 minutes. General Admission is \$19.95. Premium is \$29.95.

The Taste of Salado will be the weekend's culminating event on April 25. Ticket holders will enjoy a "taste" of the culinary

and fine arts communities of Salado. Twelve local restaurants and establishments will be highlighted during the evening.

Tickets for the April 25 Taste of Salado can be purchased on the Eventbrite website for \$29.95 or at the Salado Tourism Office beginning for \$30. Tickets can also be purchased at the door for \$35.

A special package for the Immerse & Emerge weekend event is also available for the arts connoisseur.

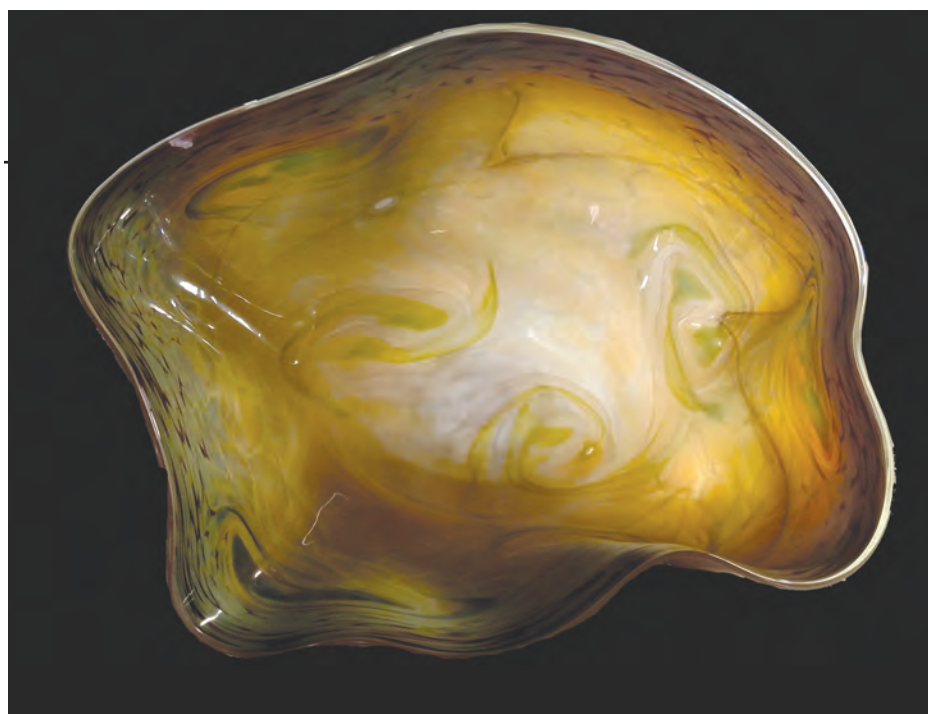

Early voting starts April 27 in local races

Early voting in the Salado ISD Board of Trustees and Village of Salado Board of Aldermen election begins at 7:30 p.m. April 27 at the Salado Civic Center.

Later that day, the Candidates Forum will be held upstairs in the Meadows Foundation Auditorium of the Civic Center at 6 p.m. April 27.

Filing for two three-year terms on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees were incumbent Melanie Kirchmeier, former SISD board member Chris Seaton, Brad Bolick and Mike Matthews. Mike Matthews announced April 21 that he was withdrawing from the race. While his name will remain on the ballot he asks voters to only consider the other candidates. The two candidates with the most votes will be elected.

Three incumbents and a challenger have filed for two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen. Incumbents Fred Brown, Hans Fields and Michael McDougal all filed for re-election. David T. Williams has also filed, making the race contested. The three candidates with the most votes will be elected to the board.

In-person early voting begins April 27 and ends on May 5. Early voting will be weekdays 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Extended early voting of 7 a.m.-7 p.m. will be held on April 28 and May 5.

Election day, the polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 9 at the Salado Civic Center. The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is April 30. The last day to receive a ballot by mail is 7 p.m. May 9.

DPS releases fatal accident report, no charges yet

Almost a month after the March 26 fatal accident on I-35, no charges have been filed and an official Department of Public Safety crash report left the narrative description blank as being under review by the District Crash Team.

As of presstime on April 21, no charges have been filed in connection with the accident.

The eight page report from the DPS does include a diagram of the vehicles involved in the accident in which an 18-wheeler carrying a cherry picker and traveling northbound struck the girder of the I-35 overpass at FM 2484.

The truck and its load, operated by Lares Trucking and driven by Valentin Martinez, were measured at 14'7" by Department of Public Safety officers after the accident. It was carrying construction equipment in the flatbed of the trailer. The maximum height for a truck to travel without an overheight permit is 14 feet tall. The Texas Department of Motor Vehicles stated that the truck did not have an overheight permit.

The truck passed through the underpass after striking the first girder

with its load and causing it to shift and then tumble down onto the highway.

A driver on the southbound side was killed when the 57.5 ton girder fell on his pickup truck. He was identified as Clark Davis, a 32-year-old Arlington man.

"The beams are set into slots on the support columns," stated Jodi Wheatley, TxDOT Public Information officer for the I-35 expansion project through the Waco district. "They are not fastened in until the bridge deck plates are installed on top of the beams (that would have been the next step in construction). Each beam weighs 57.5 tons and they stay in place by their weight."

Three others suffered non-life threatening injuries and were taken to Baylor-Scott & White Hospital in Temple via helicopter or ambulance: Roberto Zambra, the driver of the northbound black Kenworth 18-wheeler; Chuong D. Nguyen, driver of a pickup truck heading north and Aldine C. Riley, the driver of the southbound Freightliner.

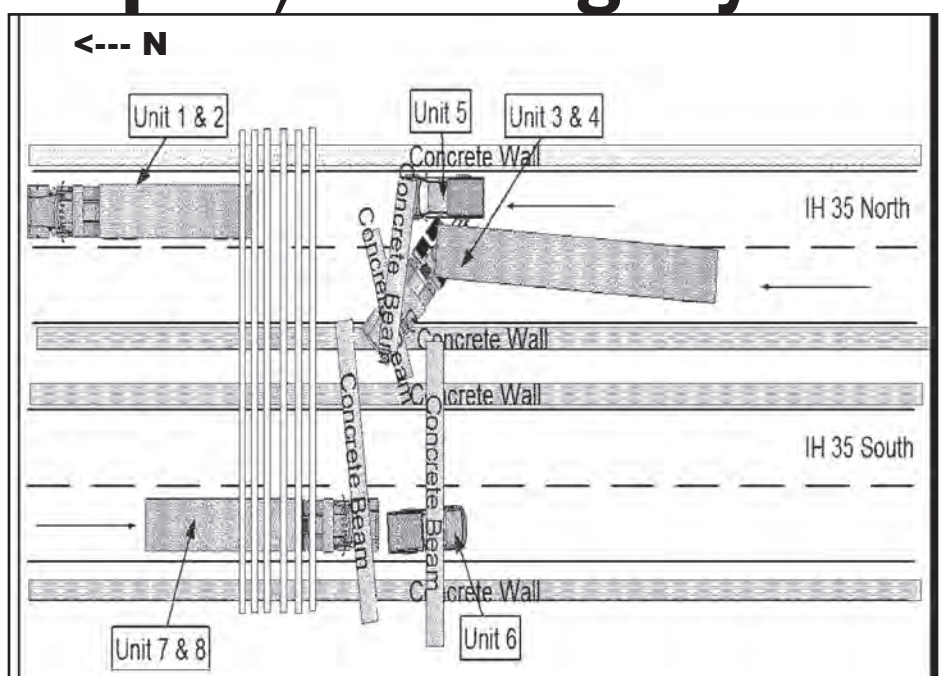
"The bridge was measured early last Thursday (March 19) after the new beams were set," Wheat-

ley told *Salado Village Voice*. "The height was measured then as 14' 0.5". It was signed at that time or very shortly thereafter as 13' 6" for an added measure of safety."

Wheatley later acknowledged to the *Salado Village Voice* that the bridge height was measured by James Construction. "The contractor is required by TxDOT to measure this height and sign accordingly," Wheatley stated, adding "TxDOT verified that the bridge clearance signs were in place."

Wheatley added that TxDOT sends the information to the TxDMV. "We send notice to TxDMV, which is the agency that issues over-size permits for all trucks too high, too wide or too heavy," Wheatley said. "Those permits list the route the truck is to take, to make sure the truck fits all clearances. The trucking company is supposed to apply for those permits in advance of the travel of an oversized load."

According to the TxDMV website, permittees are "responsible for obtaining current restrictions." The TxDMV lists those restrictions broken

down into the 25 different districts. The restrictions for the FM 2484 were posted to the TxDMV on March 26, 2015, the day of the accident.

TxDOT officials said that there were three warning signs of the low bridge at FM 2484, including an electronic sign. On northbound I-35 through Salado, both overpasses at Thomas Arnold Rd. and FM 2484 are now marked as 14'0". An electronic sign before the northbound exit for FM 2268 south of Salado warns of the 14'0" minimum clearance

through FM 2484 and asks overheight trucks to exit the highway at FM 2268 remaining on the access road through the FM 2484 overpass.

A bright orange diamond warning sign sits far off the highway and warns of the 14'0" clearance before the NB access road can enter the interstate just north of FM 2268.

A second electronic sign warns overheight loads to exit at FM 2484 before the overpass. A diamond warning sign warns of the 14'0" height at FM 2484 just after crossing

over Salado's Main Street.

On the southbound lanes, an orange diamond sign warns of the 14'3" height of the FM 2484 overpass a quarter mile before the exit.

The warning sign for the Thomas Arnold overpass, which is listed at 14'0" on the southbound side is placed right at the southbound exit to Thomas Arnold.

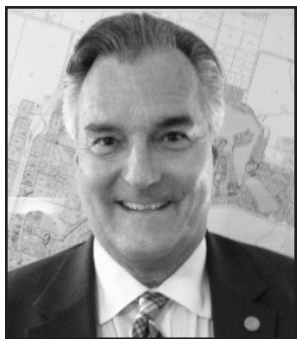
TxDOT officials say that when the expansion is completed through Salado that the overpasses will meet the regulation height of 16 feet in height.

Texas should pass driving and texting ban

April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month, and, unfortunately, we don't have to look far to understand the terrible toll that distracted driving is taking on Texas families.

Last month alone, 15-year-old Delia Ramirez of Austin was killed when a distracted driver ran a red light and crashed into the vehicle she was riding

in, and 87-year-old Helen Montfort of Corsicana was killed and her daughter seriously injured when a distracted driver of a pick-up truck rear-ended their vehicle.

The problem of distracted driving is getting progressively worse in Texas. In 2014 distracted driving was a factor in more than 100,000 crashes in our state, an increase of six percent from 2013. What's

more, these crashes were responsible for more than 3,200 serious injuries and 468 deaths. All were needless and could have been prevented, but for distracted drivers.

Texting while driving increases the risk of a crash by at least eight times, and according to the Texas Department of Transportation, distracted driving is the cause of one in every five crashes

in our state. A recent study by the AAA Institute for Traffic Safety indicates that distracted driving was the cause of nearly 60 percent of crashes in which teenagers were behind the wheel.

There's good reason to believe a statewide ban on texting while driving could make a real difference in reducing the number of deaths and injuries

About those overpasses in Salado

To the Editor:

We all had concerns about how I-35 construction could negatively impact Salado. No one even remotely considered that three overpasses could possibly damage our community. It seems that James Construction and TXDOT are working hard to do just that.

I am confident that the truck driver/trucking company will be held liable for the injuries and fatality at 2484 overpass north bound of I-35. They were reckless and should be heavily penalized. The driver/company disregarded warning signs, did not have appropriate permits (?), carried an oversized load, etc., etc. But James and Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) should share the blame for shoddy oversight and inattention to driver safety. I have every confidence they'll point fingers of blame at each other, but both seem equally culpable. James and TXDOT heads should roll.

For months we have heard that the Thomas Arnold overpass had inadequate clearance; heard the roadway would be trimmed down to allow adequate clearance. Now that bridge clearance is noted as 14 feet plus. What is it?

The 2484 north bound clearance was noted as 14' plus; then 13' 6"; then post-tragedy, 14'; then today 15'. The lighted caution sign south of the village notes 14 feet. Do drivers on this major north-south artery choose one and hope for the best? What is it?

And the south most Salado overpass, 2268--was closed for months after a brief opening because a large rock left in the fill under or near the bridge shifted and the bridge needed repair (when it is brand new). Then that bridge clearance was noted as over 14 feet. Today it is 16'. What is it?

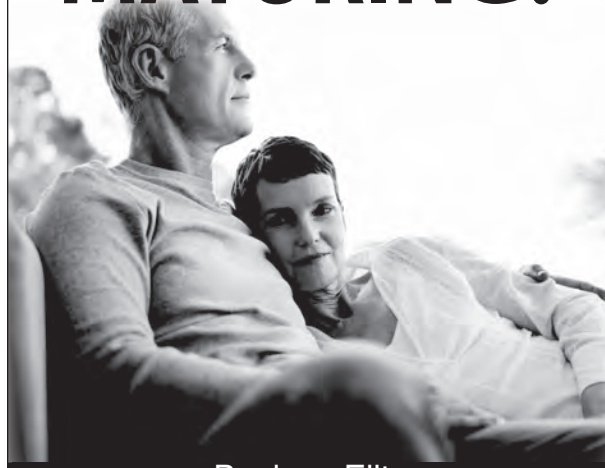

related to distracted driving. Researchers at Texas A&M University recently found that the number of car crash hospitalizations declined in states that instituted strict bans on texting while driving.

No text is worth a life, and texting bans are worth it if they save even one life. More than 40 Texas cities have recognized this and passed their own bans on texting while driving.

This patchwork of local ordinances is better than nothing, but it can be confusing to drivers. What we need is one uniform, statewide rule. Like the well-known state law requiring Texans to buckle up,

a statewide ban on texting will ensure drivers know they are prohibited from texting while driving on city streets and state highways.

Accordingly, this legislative session Rep. Tom Craddick, R-Midland, and I again have filed the Alex Brown Memorial Act, named after one of Rep. Craddick's constituents who was killed in a single-car rollover crash on her way to school. She was distracted by text messages on her cell phone.

It's time for Texas to get serious about distracted driving and join the 44 other states that already prohibit texting while driving. The Texas House of Representatives already has passed the Alex Brown Act overwhelmingly, and it's time for the Texas Senate to do the same.

Passing the bill during National Distracted Driving Awareness Month would send a strong message that our state is serious about saving lives and preventing unnecessary

deaths and injuries.

In the meantime, there are things you can do to reduce the risk of having a distracted driving crash. For example, you can put your phone in a place where you can't see it and won't be tempted to reach for it. Alternatively, you can put your phone in silent mode until you reach your destination, because the less you hear it, the less you'll be tempted to reach for it.

If you have a passenger, make him or her your "designated texter." What's more, there are many downloadable smartphone apps such as Live2Text and AT&T's DriveMode that can help you stop texting while driving.

Perhaps most important, the next time you see friends or family members start to send a text while driving, remind them that it can wait. Their lives—and yours—could depend on it. Senator Judith Zaffirini represents District 21 in the Texas Senate.

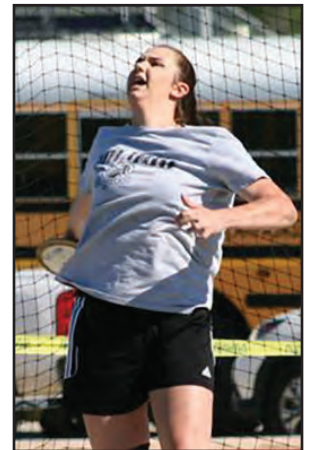

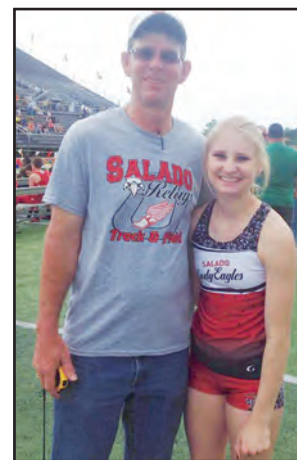

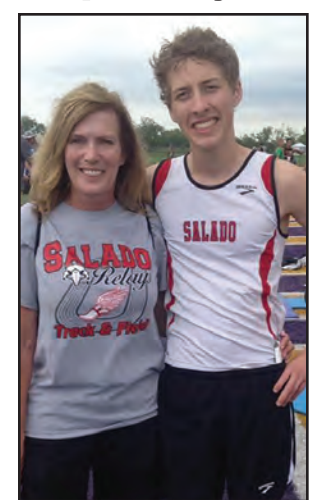

Turnpike Troubadours at Johnny's Outback April 24

The Turnpike Troubadours will perform at Johnny's Outback on April 24. Their live show reflects years of coercing beer joint crowds into responding to unfamiliar music. It is fast, gritty, and often drenched in beer, but always a good time.

"When we first started playing, people couldn't have cared less that we were there," recalls Troubadours' frontman Evan Felker. "They were there to drink beer and raise hell and they didn't really care

what music was playing while they did it. But as we went on and as we got better, they started to listen. I mean, they were still drinkin' plenty of beer, but before too long, they were actually coming to hear us and asking us to play our songs."

Not only did the crowds get more attentive, they kept getting bigger. As time went on, and the Troubadours broadened their touring circle, they moved on from tiny clubs in the more obscure corners of the Sooner state and started hitting – and selling out – prestigious venues like the Firehouse Saloon in Houston and Antone's in Austin.

In the past five years, Felker, bassist RC Edwards, fiddle player Kyle Nix, guitarist Ryan Engleman and drummer Gabe Pearson, have honed the rowdy, quick-witted sound that's brought folks together in front of those stages.

The band – which took its name from the Indian Nation Turnpike that connected so many of the smaller towns where they cut their teeth – gradu-

ally evolved from offering acoustic explorations of tunes by Townes Van Zandt and Jerry Jeff Walker to kicking out three or four sets a night of full-throttle roadhouse country – tinged with the punk rock attitude that was in the air during the members' teen years.

"We all pretty much grew up with hardcore country music around us," says Felker. "I mean, sure, there was rock stuff in there, but the real old-school stuff, plus exposure to folks like Jason Boland and Cross Canadian Ragweed, really affected what we were playing. We're really a product of both our influences and our environment. It wasn't something that we sat in a room and dreamed up in one day."

And with Goodbye Normal Street – the name a reference to another longtime band residence as well as a state of mind that they left behind long ago – they set their sights on conquering even more expansive territories. With songs like the blue-collar anthem "Southeastern Son" and the universally understandable breakup plaint "Wrecked," they look pretty likely to conquer them.

"This music, at its best, can put into words what we have been thinking for our entire lives," says Felker, "and even at its worst, it gets people drinking beer and makes people happy. Either of those is fine with me."
