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Local elections decided May 9

Local voters will go to the polls at the Salado Civic Center 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 9 in the Salado ISD Board of Trustees and Village of Salado Board of Aldermen elections.

Early voting ended at 7 p.m. May 5 with 296 casting ballots in the school board race and 225 voting in the Village of Salado race.

Appearing on the ballot for Salado ISD Board of Trustees are Brad Bolick, Melanie Kirchmeier and Chris Seaton. Kirchmeier is a one-term incumbent and Seaton served three terms on the board before retiring two years ago.

Mike Matthews' name appears on the ballot for Salado ISD Trustee, but he announced April 21 that he was withdrawing from the race.

"I would like to announce an unofficial withdrawal," Matthews stated in an April 21 email to *Salado Village Voice*. "Due to family, work, and time restraints I feel I would not have the time to serve properly on the Salado school board."

The two candidates with the most votes will be elected to three year terms

on the board of trustees.

Three incumbents and a challenger have filed for two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen. Incumbents Fred Brown, Hans Fields and Michael McDougal all filed for re-election. David T. Williams has also filed, making the race contested. The three candidates with the most votes will be elected to the board.

Civil fines of \$300 may be adopted as part of School Bus stop arm violation program here

Salado aldermen will consider at their meeting 6 p.m. May 7 adopting an ordinance that creates a civil offense for a school bus stop arm violation and enacts a \$300 fine for those violations that are captured on school bus cameras. The board voted last month in favor of an interlocal agreement with

Dallas County Schools doing business as Techserve that will put the cameras on board all 14 school buses in Salado ISD through no expense to either the district of the village.

In return for installing the cameras, enforcing the violations and issuing and collecting the fines, Texserve will collect 75

percent of the fines it successfully collects. The remaining 25 percent will be divided equally between the Village of Salado and Salado I.S.D.

Texserve will install the equipment, provide a certified law enforcement officer to review images of potential violations and issues notices of violations

for the school bus stop-arm violations, designate hearing officers, provide testimony and video evidence of violations and collect any civil fines, penalties and costs.

The cameras will likely be installed over the summer break to begin implementation with the 2015-16 school year.

Village continues negotiations with Sanctuary developers

Salado aldermen have requested that the Sanctuary gift the site (for the wastewater treatment plant) of a minimum of six acres and the Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination Permit (TPDEP) #WQ0014898001 to the Village and in turn the Village would contract with the Sanctuary to be the developer of the wastewater treatment plant, Royal Street lines and lift station."

The board voted 4-1 on the motion April 29 with Hans Fields voting against the motion that was put forth by Frank Coachman and received a second from Michael McDougal.

The motion included language that "through legal services and communication, the Village share our concerns of the current proposed agreement with the Sanctuary."

One of the chief concerns is the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Agency grant of \$1 million for which the Village of Salado has made application.

"When negotiating with anybody," City Manager Kim Foutz told *Salado Village Voice*, "we have to honor those requirements in the grant, as well as any other binding statutes of the states or requirements of TCEQ (Texas Commission on Environmental Quality)."

Aldermen and Sanctuary developers may also have to consider which

method of public funding for the 300-acre planned use development will best suit the needs and resources of the municipality and the needs and resources of the developers.

And there are many ways for developers to fund infrastructure, including Municipal Utility Districts (MUD), Municipal Management Districts (MMD), Tax Increment Reinvestment Zones (TIRZ) and Public Improvement Districts (PID).

MUDs have become prolific throughout the state in unincorporated areas that do not have utility and infrastructure provided by a municipality. The funding formula is a relatively simple one: a District is formed by an election (usually with very few voters) and a bond proposal is approved with a tax rate suitable to retire the debt. Typically, for MUDs that are in the extra-territorial jurisdiction (ETJ) of a city, if the city annexes the MUD, it assumes the MUD debt. Property owners within the annexed MUD then pay the municipality's property tax rather than the MUD's.

TIRZ have become popular ways for defined areas within a municipality to pay off debt more quickly. It works in this manner: all of the increase of the property value within the TIRZ is applied toward paying off the debt. "The city gets some increase in its M&O taxes and sales taxes," Foutz said. TIRZ typically have

British are coming! TX MG Register gather for 40th year here

British automobile pioneer Cecil Kimber and his MG Motorcar Company Ltd. could hardly have imagined the impact their first sports car would have on the automotive world. And now 90 years later, and more than 30 years since the last MG rolled from the storied factory at Abingdon-on-Thames, that passion shows no sign of letting up.

This infatuation (some might say obsession!) is kept alive today by the more than 200 enthusiastic members of The Texas MG Register (TMGR). The TX MG Register was formed 40 years ago – and celebrated their very first event in Salado at the Stagecoach Inn. Since that time, TMGR members have always gathered

in Salado during Mother's Day weekend – enjoying the town and celebrating their little British cars.

TX MG Register members are custodians of more than 500 classic British automobiles, ranging from a 1930 M-Type fabric covered roadster to some of the last MGBs produced. TMGR members are devoted to maintaining and enjoying one of the world's favorite cars.

Most automotive historians agree that America's affection with open, two seat sports cars began with the MGTC model of the 1940's, a distinction acknowledged in later company advertising with the slogan "The sports car America loved first". Like many a bride, servicemen returning from England

after World War II brought home the tiny British roadsters they fell in love with during the war. Slightly more refined TD and TF models followed, and it was devotees of these "T Series" MGs who formed the original Texas MG Register in 1975. In 1993 the club welcomed owners of "modern" MGA and MGB models, and became the TMGR as it is today; a diverse group of all ages, backgrounds and interests hailing from all parts of Texas, the nation and even as far away as Australia!

The TMGR's bylaws establish that the club is "primarily dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of MG cars". For some members this means showing their meticulously restored cars at the spring

"Gathering of the Faithful" (GoF) held every year at Salado. Many enjoy disproving the myth of British automotive unreliability with a hearty challenge to both man and machine, driving hundreds, sometimes thousands of miles to Salado for this annual event.

As Jim Yule, a past President says: "The Texas MG Register is about having fun. It's about enjoying MGs and the down to earth folks that own them." Look for a convoy of MGs travelling Bell County roads this May 7-10 and congratulate the TX MG Register members on their 40th Anniversary.

The cars will be on display on the grounds of The Venue by Inn on the Creek May 9 beginning at 10 a.m.

Aldermen hopefuls on challenges, Sanctuary, Chamber

Question 1: To me, the most critical issue facing Salado is our ability to keep a vibrant business environment in the historical district of Salado. Our historical past, mixed with the eclectic feel of our downtown, is what attracts people from all over the country to come and enjoy what we have to offer. In that vein, I think we need to create a number of new events so that we always have a steady stream of people visiting our village and spending their money in our local shops, restaurants, hotels, and bed and breakfasts. This, along with a new Main Street project, will generate increased appeal to tourists and our local citizens alike.

Question 2: I totally support the Village negotiations with The Sanctuary, because we do not need to have a separate

community to the south of our Village. We have the opportunity to be all-inclusive, which offers great benefits to Salado as we gain sales tax and property tax. That, in turn, allows our local government to have additional financial resources to repair roads, improve our parks, and enhance the overall appeal of our community. This also give us the ability to put in the sewer on Main street and the west side, in a much shorter time frame.

Question 3: I support the partnership of the Salado Chamber of Commerce and the Village of Salado Tourism Department. I strongly believe that having two organizations that plan and implement events that benefit our village will have a much greater impact than each going their own separate ways. Tourism's job is to bring tourists to town to spend their money in our shops, restaurants, and lodging facilities. The Chamber's job is to build a vibrant business community. The partnership provides a total coordination to make Salado more appealing to both businesses and visitors.

Question 1:

I believe that there are two very important issues currently facing the Village. The first is getting new businesses to settle here in Salado (economic development). It is my understanding that the Salado Chamber of Commerce has created a Committee or Team to address this issue. We currently have businesses closing and we need new business to come

in and fill those voids. It is believed by many that the sewer system will help to bring both businesses and tourists to the Village. The main street project will also help with this issue. The other issue that I see is preserving the Village's History. At present to my knowledge there is no active committee from the Chamber/Tourism to assist with this issue. The Salado Historic Society is basically powerless when it comes to preserving the Villages History. The preservation efforts are at the whims of the Zoning Committee which seldom, if ever, confers with the preservation societies in their decision making.

Question 2: Since the BOA has voted to resume negotiations with the Sanctuary I will support those negotiations. I will however oppose issues in the negotiations that I feel are not in the best interest of the Village. I think it is well past the time when our Village citizens have a right to know and hear what the Aldermen are hearing during these negotiations. After all they will pay the bill. I personally have never met the two people that are in charge of the Sanctuary Project. It might be helpful for the negotiations if there was a face to face meeting with the negotiators instead of all negotiation commentary coming by way of paperwork from the Mayor or the Mayor Pro-Tem to the board. My opinion is that all negotiations should be held with legal representation present for both sides. If counsel was present during the negotiations we would not have to wait for our attorneys comments and things would move ahead much faster.

Question 3: Yes, I support the Partnership with the Chamber and Tourism. It is way too early to

say whether this Partnership will be successful as it has only been in place officially since January of this year. Also all staff was not in place until after January. This is a very unique merger since it is the first in the State of Texas to combine these entities in a true partnership, putting the Chamber/tourism under the city government. I believe that it will be two years before any real decisions can be made as to how effective this partnership is or will ultimately be. The executive committee has only met once and I am certain that the committee will do all possible to support and bolster the organization. I believe that it will be successful as long as the two entities are able to work effectively together so that both benefit equally.



Michael McDougal

Question 1: One of the most precious assets of our Village would be our downtown shopping opportunities. My view is that the Village Board should continue to place major emphasis on solidifying a primary reason that has attracted thousands of visitors to the Village in the past and will continue to do so, if promoted and marketed in good taste. Our Historical value is well established and should be highly promoted. Paramount in doing so is to increase tourism with rock solid marketing practices. This, coupled with continuing and enhancing the Main Street project, will create a better revenue position for our merchants and to

the overall fiscal base of the Village. This is an extremely critical initiative that is certainly a primary ingredient for the positive future of our community.

Question 2: I absolutely support current negotiations with the Sanctuary Development Company. Negotiations are always more prudent when one has more than one option to pursue. The Sanctuary provides the Village with a third option for fulfilling the positive November bond election.

The values of the Sanctuary plan appear to be that it provides a more timely sewage initiation-completion time. In addition, it would provide more variety of housing, retail, and entertainment opportunities. Further, it would broaden the tax base which contributes to a moderate tax structure for all Village residents, and although a \$10.5 million bond was approved, the Sanctuary appears in line to be less costly than the other options.

Question 3: I do support the newly established partnership of the Chamber of Commerce and the Village Tourism Department. My reasons for support are that they now have a consolidated budget which avoids duplication and will save tax dollars. Single direction is provided to the Executive Director which avoids duplicate directives. Further, the two groups have established one action plan that is in place and provides a better road map for success.

My final view is that this partnership provides a healthy environment that will enhance all facets of the community. It allows professional personnel the opportunity to plan, as a single unit, in order to provide a most laudatory Village that we all will be proud of.

Question 3: I support this partnership. We have a vested interest in working together to continue to bring value to the Village of Salado. Tourism should support business, and business should support tourism.

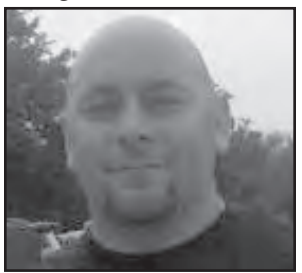

SISD candidates discuss district's issues, strengths

Question 1: I believe the most critical issue facing Salado is in the higher education readiness process for the students. While the Salado High School website have a broad overview of Dual Credit courses at the high school, the Junior High is lacking in college readiness courses like the AVID program (offered only in the 6th grade currently), which prepares students for college readiness and success. A current Salado High School student asked me, "Why

do you support dual credit when AP courses are more heavily weighted toward a student's GPA for class ranking?" The answer is simple. Some students have dreams and aspirations outside of the "STEM" areas, do not want to attend a state university, and wish to peruse other fields of study in the liberal arts like fine arts or humanities. The idea of the dual credit program is to make college more affordable and offer a support system to avoid the issues faced with college retention and student debt. With the higher education coordinating board creating institution "core 40" to aid students in not losing credits transferring from the 2 year college to the 4 year university, the idea can be a win-win for shareholders.

Question 2: The greatest strength of Salado ISD is the shareholders in the community. While Salado has changes since I graduated in 1998, one core value has remained within the school system, which is involvement from parents and community. For example, the support our booster programs receive from local business and the parent involvement with activities like field day, talent shows, fundraising, and volunteer work like the mentor program. Salado ISD greatest weakness is the

Question 1: Over the past four years Salado ISD lost \$ 2.8 million in funding from the State of Texas. While Dr. Novotny managed the budget with direction from the School Board, this was a devastating hit on Salado ISD. We were able to control expenses through attrition of staff, hold off on large purchases/expenses, and watch normal operating budget very closely. Our finance team did an excellent job managing the decrease in funds while still giving our teachers the

step in salary they richly deserve. Since the Texas Legislature is currently meeting, we are waiting to see the bills passed that relate to school funding. When we are notified of the school funding that Salado ISD will receive, we will continue with the five year plan of raising teacher pay as well as look at the programs that were affected by the \$ 2.8 million cut. After these priorities are addressed then I would recommend any facilities maintenance needed as well as review technology needs campus wide.

Question 2: The greatest strength at Salado ISD is the people. From students to parents, from administration to teachers, from maintenance personnel to cafeteria workers, everyone in Salado cares about our students. We may have different opinions and different ideas, but our students and the people that surround them are the best in Texas. We laugh and we cheer, we agree to disagree, and we have good debates on what is best for our students. At the end of the day, we know that we all love Salado and strive to make our schools excellent. Over the past few months we have addressed our weakness by engaging in a strategic plan. Salado is changing and Salado ISD will need to be prepared for the

change. We will meet and discuss the changes ahead and look to the future for new ideas, look in the past for ideas that worked, and plan for the next 5-10 years for our students, staff and community.



Chris Seaton:

Question 1: I believe one critical issue is teacher pay. Currently our district competes with surrounding districts which pay much more. These districts attract qualified teachers away from our district as job opportunities open up. Potential candidates prefer surrounding districts to avoid a substantial pay cut. To demonstrate this, the district recently posted positions that not one applicant has applied for. In addition to attracting exemplar potential teachers, we need to strive to retain our existing outstanding staff. Currently salaries are based on years of service, with stipends added for extracurricular work. The district is already trying to bump up salaries, but I think more should be done. As leaders of the district we should think creatively about how teachers can be compensated for

their hard work. When the legislature severely cut funding a few years ago, most districts including Salado had to reduce staff and put heavy work load on the existing teachers. Now, with additional funding possibly coming back, most of it should go, if not all, to the teachers but in an appropriate manor.

Another critical issue is technology. It has been and will continue to be a difficult task for any district to decide on what to invest in, how much, and what is the return on investment.

Question 2: Our greatest strengths are the students and parents along with a great group of teachers and staff. It is the combination of these people that allow us to see the outstanding results year after year. The community shows fantastic support for our kids and this can be seen day in and out. If I were to strengthen our schools, I would say that the staff of the district needs to focus their efforts in educating the community on the challenges and issues which face the district, such as facilities and lack of funding. I believe if everyone is well informed with all the facts, they can't help but be supportive of solutions that are presented to them.

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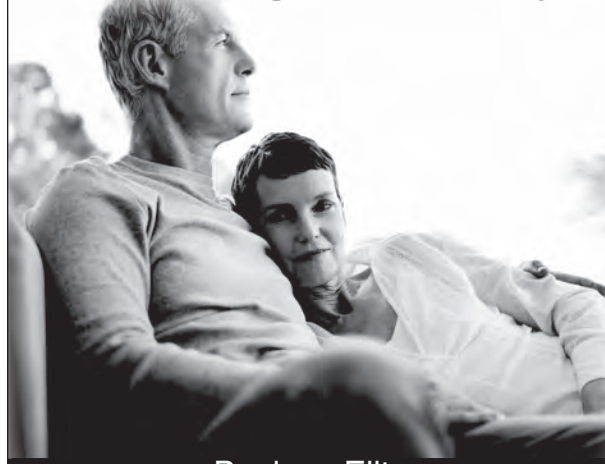

a life limit, but that can be amended to issue new debt or change the boundaries of the TIRZ. TIRZ also affect the municipality's ability to borrow further debt, according to Foutz. "With more and more debt on the books, it could affect your bond rating and ability to borrow."

PIDs have been successful in many other states and are relatively new to public financing in Texas.

According to Texas statute, PID money can be used for the following: (1) landscaping; (2) erection of fountains, distinctive lighting, and signs; (3) acquiring, constructing, improving, widening, narrowing, closing,

or rerouting of sidewalks or of streets, any other roadways, or their rights-of-way; (4) construction or improvement of pedestrian malls; (5) acquisition and installation of pieces of art; (6) acquisition, construction, or improvement of libraries; (7) acquisition, construction, or improvement of off-street parking facilities; (8) acquisition, construction, improvement, or rerouting of mass transportation facilities; (9) acquisition, construction, or improvement of water, wastewater, or drainage facilities or improvements; (10) the establishment or improvement of parks; (11) projects similar to those listed in Subdivisions (1)-(10); (12) acquisition, by purchase or otherwise, of real property in connection with an authorized improvement; (13) special supplemental services for improvement and promotion of the district, including services relating to advertising, promotion,

health and sanitation, water and wastewater, public safety, security, business recruitment, development, recreation, and cultural enhancement; (14) payment of expenses incurred in the establishment, administration, and operation of the district; and (15) the development, rehabilitation, or expansion of affordable housing.

Before it can be formed, a proposed PID must have appraisals conducted on the property in its current unimproved state and market-analyzed appraisals of the property once the improvements are made.

A market analysis must be conducted for the proposed improvements in the PID.

An assessment and service plan must also be developed to define what improvements will be built and when they will be completed.

The assessment plan will include the period of time that the assessment will be applied within the

boundaries of the PID. Those assessments will be paid for by the developer until property within the PID sells and is developed by the end user, whether it is a commercial building or residential building. At that time, the owner of the individual property then becomes liable for the PID assessment.

The end user pays the assessment based upon the appraised value of the improved property with the buildings.

The funding considerations, development design and annexation agreements are all part of the continuing discussions between the Village and the Sanctuary Development Corporation.

Aldermen will continue these discussions at their May 7 meeting. The board will meet in executive session to discuss the negotiations, but will take any action stemming from those discussions in open session.



Another asterism, the Big Dipper, can be used to locate Arcturus. The bent handle of the Big Dipper forms an arc that points to Arcturus, allowing us to "arc to Arcturus". Messier objects M3 and M64 are located within the Great Diamond. M3 is a beau-

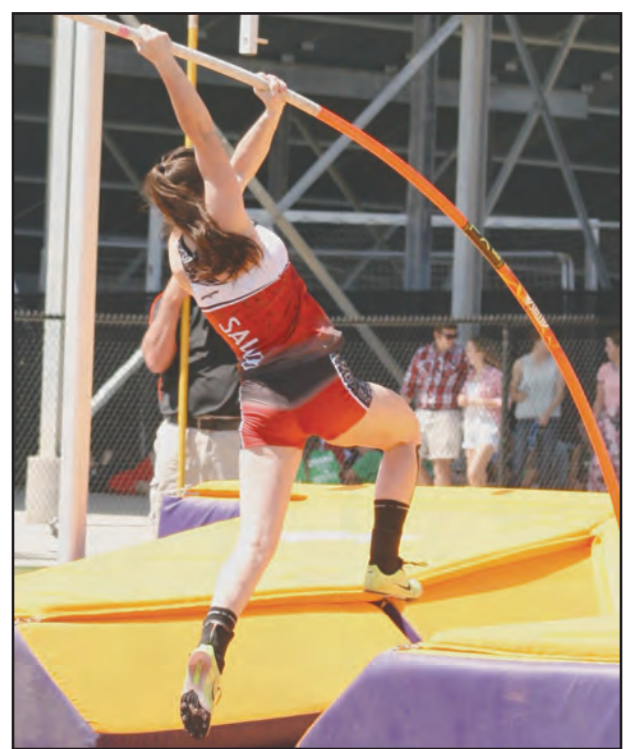
Averi Fischer placed third in the girls pole vault on May 1 with a height of 11'0", qualifying for the State Meet.

Macy Thrasher was eighth in her preliminary heat of the 300 Meter Hurdles with a time of 51.26.

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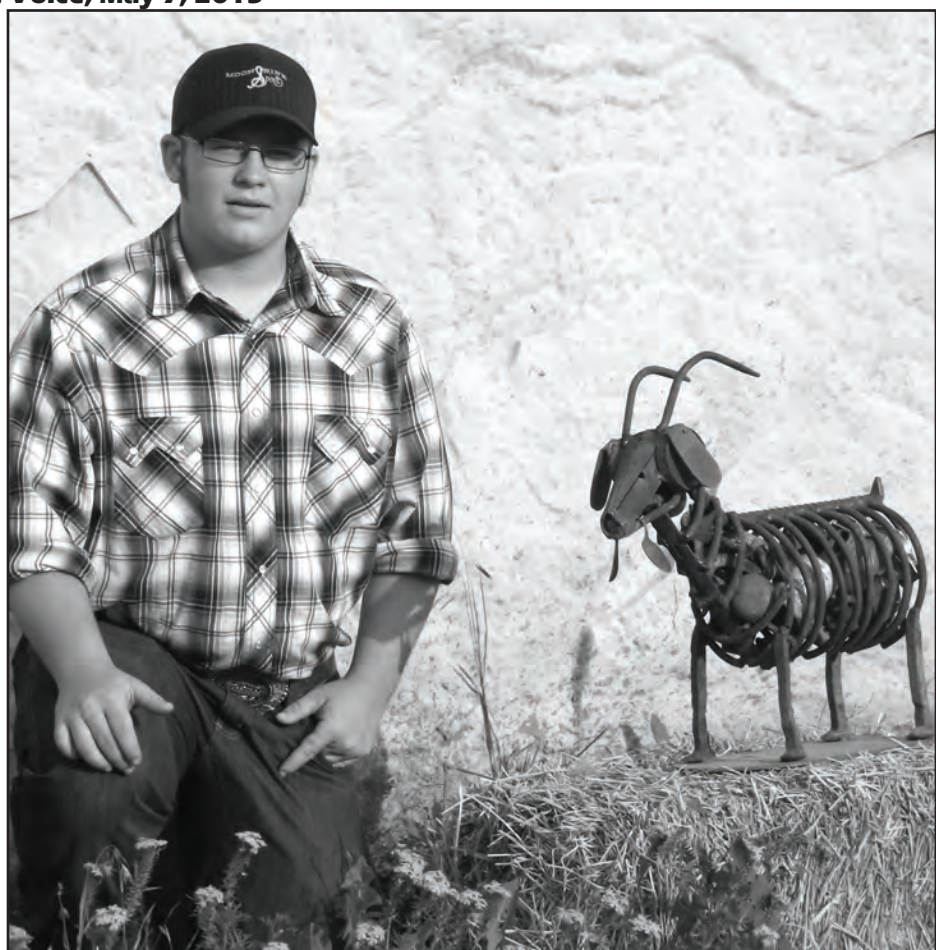
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Evans reaches quarterfinals in Tournament of Champions

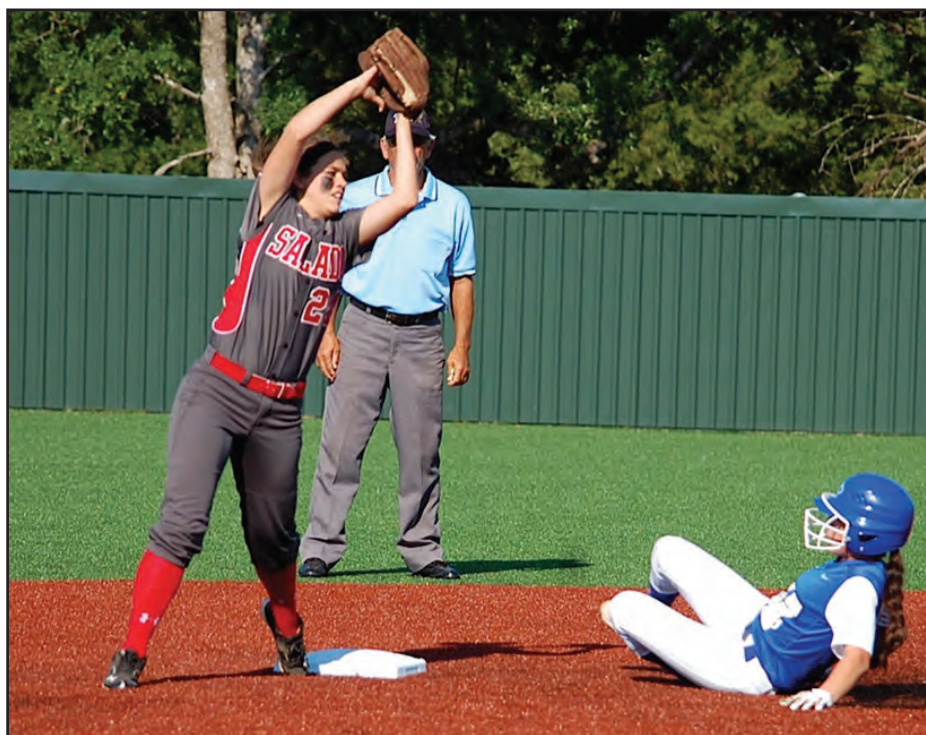

Bellamy Brothers return to Outback

The Bellamy Brothers return to Johnny's Outback May 9 for an outdoor concert with music that will span the duo's four-decade career.

Gates open at 6 p.m. May 9. You can visit johnnysoutback.com for advance tickets priced at \$15 (not including service fees) or buy them at the gate the night of the show for \$20 per person.

It's been almost 40 years since the Bellamy Brothers broke out on the country music scene with their chart-topping "Let Your Love Flow," but the duo have had country hits every decade.

The Bellamy Brothers have received nearly every music award there is to have, and they even hold the record in both the Academy of Country Music and the Country Music Association for the most duo nominations. They've written countless worldwide hits, crossed the globe like their music has crossed genres, brought reggae to the Grand Ole Opry, and recorded more than four dozen albums.

Their road started on the pop music charts in the '70's, took a winding turn into country music in the '80's and paved the way for duos to come, such as Brooks & Dunn, Montgomery Gentry, Big & Rich, and previously—The Judds.

But before the road forked into country, the musical odyssey of brothers Bellamy started creatively smoldering in their home state of Florida, before exploding nationally amidst the '70's pop music culture of L.A.

The break came in the form of the hit, "Spiders & Snakes," written by David and recorded by Jim Stafford. The song became a smash, eventually selling more than three million units worldwide.

Now known by their music and the company they were keeping, The Bellamys officially lifted off the launch pad in 1976 when their single, "Let Your Love Flow," became an instant smash in both the U.S. and Europe.

By the late '70's The Bellamys were emerging on the country charts with another bona fide smash. "If I Said You Had A Beautiful Body (Would You Hold It Against Me)," originally scrawled on a dinner napkin by David, rocketed them to the top of the country charts the way "Let Your Love Flow," had done in the pop market just a few years earlier. It proved to be the first of a string of 14 #1 singles in the U.S. alone.

Success followed success: "Dancing Cowboys," "Sugar Daddy," "You Ain't Just Whistlin' Dixie," "Lovers Live Longer," "Do You Love As Good As You Look," "Redneck Girl," "For All The Wrong Reasons," "I Love Her Mind," "I Need More Of You," "Old Hippie," "Too Much Is Not Enough," "Kids Of The Baby Boom," and "Reggae Cowboy" and "Crazy From The Heart,"...all have lined the corridors of the Bellamy's musical history and their walls with platinum and gold.

category in country music.

These days when the subject turns to touring, The Bellamys are showing a new generation of country music how it's done. "We're old road dogs," Howard says about the motivation behind the brothers 200 plus concert dates each year.

It's been a decade since the duo performed "duets" with some of the biggest names in country music for their 30th anniversary album "Angels and Outlaws, Vol. 1." "Angels & Outlaws - Volume One" (Curb/Bellamy Brothers Records) featured such songs and artists as "You Ain't Just Whistlin' Dixie" with Alan Jackson; "Old Hippie" with Montgomery Gentry; and "If I Said You Had a Beautiful Body" with none other than Dolly Parton (whose interpretation makes it sound new all over again). Willie Nelson, George Jones, Tanya Tucker and many more also contributed their talents to this CD proving these hits from the past still resonate today.

The duo attained quite a bit of notoriety to go along with their country music awards and chart-topping hits when they released "Jalapenos," which was banned by many country music stations because of its language.

The tune purports that life is more like a jar of jalapenos than a jar of cherries, a satirical look at today's political correctness. The video and song are available on iTunes and youtube.com.

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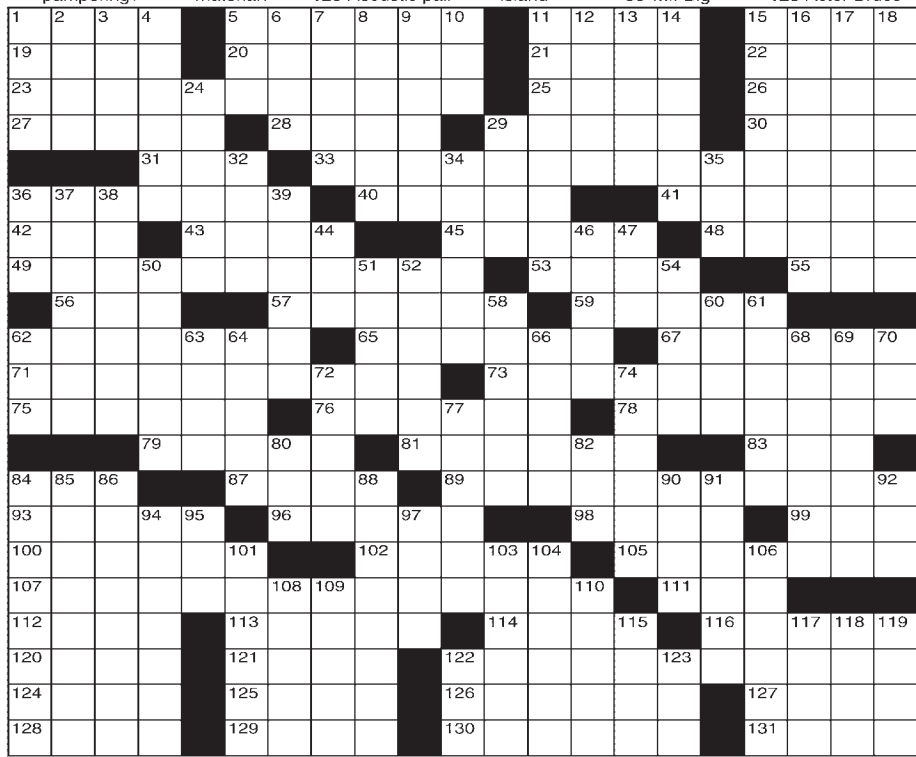

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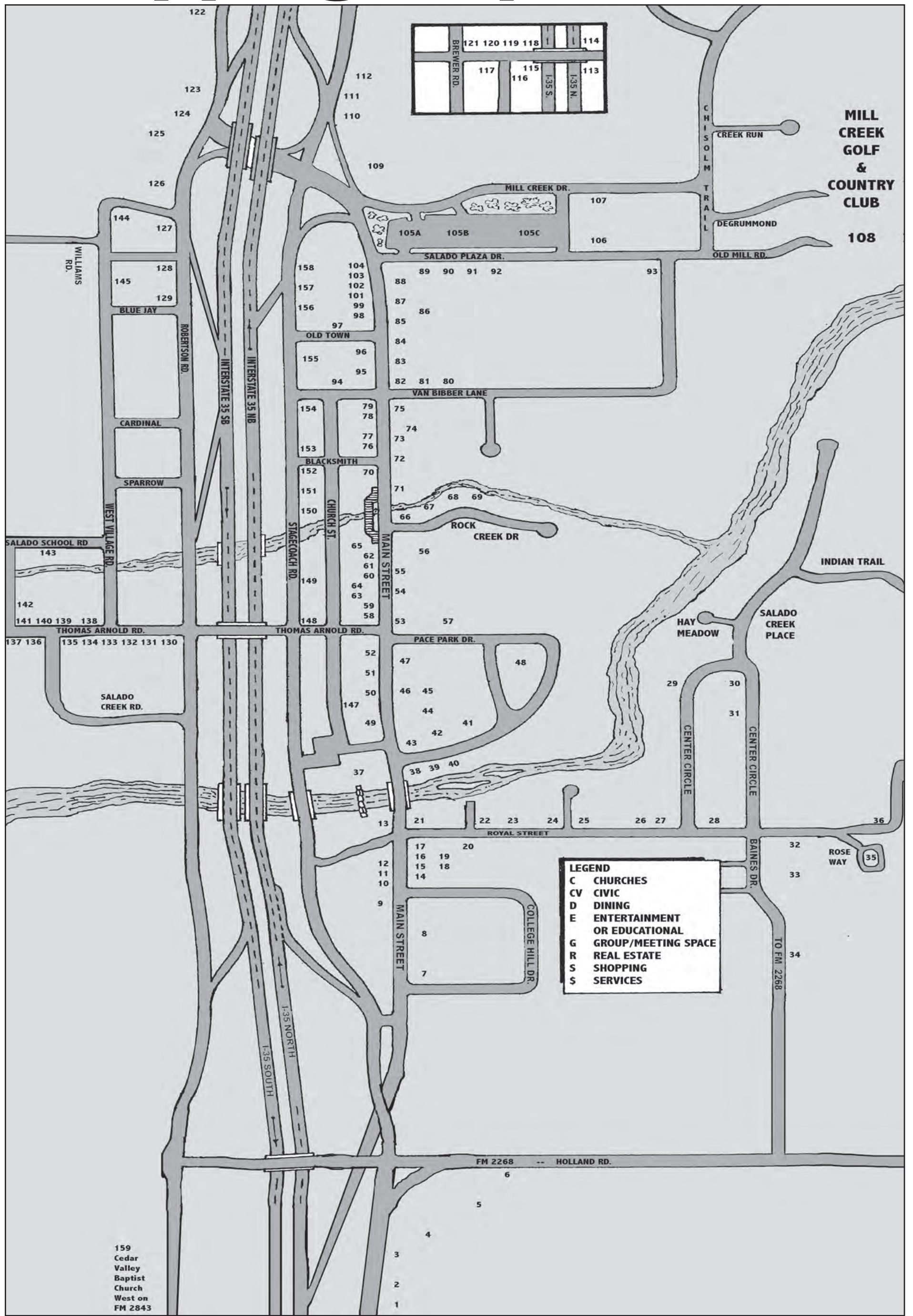
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Shopping Map of Salado

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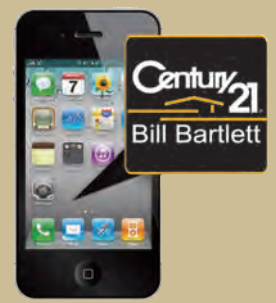

Shred all sensitive documents. Shred all statements and documents you get in the mail that you don't want to keep, including credit card applications, insurance forms, financial statements, health forms and billing state-

ments for utilities and phone service.

Protect your Social Security number, account numbers and passwords. Don't carry these numbers in your wallet. Give out your Social Security number only if absolutely necessary, and offer to provide another type of personal identifier, if possible. Never give personal information over the phone or to unknown persons. Unless you are the one initiating the phone call, you

should not give your Social Security number, driver's license number or bank account information over the phone.

Monitor your bank and credit card transactions for unauthorized transactions. Crooks with your account number generally start with small transactions to see if you'll notice.

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TxDOT Motorcycle Campaign Urges Drivers to Look Twice, Share the Road

AUSTIN - As spring weather draws more motorcyclists onto Texas roadways, the Texas Department of Transportation is launching its "Share the Road: Look Twice for Motorcycles" campaign to reduce crashes and save lives. The

campaign—part of National Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month in May—urges drivers to be extra cautious, because motorcyclists are more difficult to see and less protected than other motorists. "We see far too many

deadly motorcycle crashes on Texas roadways, so we're telling drivers to be extra diligent when sharing the road," said TxDOT Executive Director LtGen Joe Weber, USMC (Ret). "We're constantly told drivers simply didn't see the motorcyclist until it's too late. As drivers, it is incumbent upon us to be fully aware of our surroundings at all times and take proactive measures to ensure the safety of motorcyclists."

Over the past five years, 2,354 motorcyclists have been killed in Texas. In 2014, Texas motorcycle crashes killed 455 motor-

cyclists. Half of the motorcyclists killed were not wearing a helmet at the time of the crash. One-third of motorcycle fatalities took place at intersections. Approximately 49 percent of motorcyclists who died in 2014 were riding in rural areas of the state.

To promote motorcycle safety awareness, TxDOT is partnering with local law enforcement agencies and Texas Patriot Guard Riders to hold motorcycle processions in select Texas cities. The riders will carry oversized flags emblazoned with the slogans "Look Twice for Motorcycles" and

"Share the Road." Patriot Guard Riders are volunteers known for leading funeral processions for fallen soldiers and first responders.

Additionally, TxDOT is traveling to multiple cities to participate in festivals and other special events. This year's TxDOT display includes a special glass-panel truck showcasing a motorcycle on a virtual rural Texas roadway. Visitors will be able to step inside the truck to have their picture taken and shared via social media. They also are encouraged to take a pledge to "Look Twice" for motorcycles.

When sharing the road, TxDOT encourages drivers to check their mirrors, leave extra room between vehicles and use turn signals to help prevent crashes and save lives.
