BOA may appoint interim administrator

Aldermen will discuss the appointment or employment of an Interim Village Administrator, Assistant Village Administrator and Receptionist during an executive session Oct. 6 at the Municipal Building. The board will also continue discussions with the Village Attorney regarding the ongoing investigation and possible action regarding the employment of the current Village Administrator in closed session.

Following the executive session, aldermen will convene in open session to "take any action on the above executive session items and authorizing the mayor and city attorney to take any necessary action."

During the regular part of the agenda, aldermen will consider a request for waiver from Section 3.10 Street/Block Length of the Subdivision Ordinance, for Salado Mills, a proposed subdivision located on Stinnett Mill Road in the Village's extraterritorial jurisdiction.

The board will also consider possible action on a Concept Plan for Mill Creek Meadows, a ±119.381, 3-phase (Phase I existing), residential subdivision, located near the intersection of Ambrose Drive and Mackie Drive to the west and on the corner of Marie Lane and Blackberry Road to the east, in the Extraterritorial Jurisdiction of Salado.

Museum hosts scuba innovator on Oct. 9

The Central Texas Area Museum, in conjunction with the Institute for the Humanities Salado, will host renowned speaker Ron Coley 3 p.m. Oct. 9 at the Event Hall.

Coley is an internationally-recognized, award-winning filmmaker and underwater photographer, an innovator of SCUBA equipment, and an educational leader, author and publisher. Throughout his 40-year career, he has explored the world of water and its relationship to humankind. His new book, *The Fountains of Saint Mark*, about Texas' San Marcos River system, will be available for purchase at the museum event.

For 20 years, Coley was Director of the Aquarena Center for Environmental Education for Texas State University in San Marcos.

Historical marker dedicated Oct. 8

Salado Historical Society will dedicate an official Texas Historical Commission Historical Marker 10 a.m. Oct. 8 in honor of Alice Gray Hamblen and the Hamblen family's gift to Salado.

Local historian and author, Carol Wilson, documented the life of and gift from Alice Hamblen to apply for the marker. The ceremony will be at the Salado Civic Center, which was the 1924 Salado public school and the site of the William and Alice Hamblen home.

Today, the building houses the Salado ISD Administrative offices. David Yeilding, Historian, will make comments.

After the Civil War, William Kroger Hamblen (1817-1902) and his second wife, Alice Joy Gray Hamblen, moved to Salado to provide an advanced educational opportunity for their children. Salado College had been established in 1860 and its reputation as having high academic

standards was known throughout the State of Texas. A school of that caliber in Texas was rare and the forward thinking leaders, led by Elijah Sterling Clack Robertson, established a classical school to serve the families of Salado. Col. Robertson donated one hundred acres of land around Salado Creek, which were sold for home and business sites, with the exception of ten acres on the crest of a hill which were reserved for the school. Proceeds from the sale of town lots were used for the construction of the school. Several families moved to the area that is now the Village of Salado because of the opportunities afforded their children.

Rev. Hamblen's first wife had died at a young age and left him with three children. When William and Alice moved to Salado from Milam County almost ten years after the establishment of Salado College, they had added

two more children to their family and, while living in Salado, Alice bore twelve additional children. Also, the Hamblens opened their large home for the children of other family members so they could enjoy the benefits of the school. They secured a city lot of almost five acres on the main thoroughfare for their home, and built the house using red brick for the exterior.

William was involved in ranching and land speculation. He became the second pastor of the Salado Church of Christ, where he served for twenty years. He was also very involved in community service, which included serving on the Salado College Board of Trustees. Alice supported his community involvement, participating in the kind of discreet work that goes unrecorded, while raising their children.

Salado college struggled financially. By 1901, the old college building, which was still serving as

a private high school, had been serving Central Texas students for forty-five years. Two fires ravaged the building just months apart. William Hamblen offered his church as a temporary classroom. Naomi, a Hamblen daughter, offered her services on the solicitation committee formed to raise funds to rebuild the school.

On September 12, 1902, William Hamblen died.

In January, 1919, the stockholders of the Salado College Joint Stock Company, one of whom was Alice Hamblen, voted to dissolve the corporation that owned the college building and donate the property to Salado's Public School District. The facility was used as a public school until the early 1920s when the building was declared structurally unsafe.

At the suggestion of her son-in-law, Carl Aiken, Alice offered the family homestead, consisting of

4.66 acres of land – including the sacrifice of the once bustling and brimming Hamblen family home, which had offered refuge to many, as a site for the new public school. The location was ideal, positioned, as it still is, on Salado's most heavily traveled street.

Dubbed "the Red School House," the new two-story facility was constructed quickly. It was no less imposing than the school on the hill, and blessed with easier access. The Red School house became the new landmark school, a symbol of civic pride that reflected Salado's well-placed priorities.

Riot First, Ask Questions Later

The Charlotte rioters didn't know whether the controversial police shooting of Keith Scott was justified or not, and didn't care.

They worked their mayhem -- trashing businesses and injuring cops, with one protester killed in the disorder -- before anything meaningful could be ascertained about the case except that the cops said Scott had a gun and his family said he didn't.

Charlotte is the latest episode in the evidence-free Black Lives Matter movement that periodically erupts in violence after officer-involved shootings. The movement is beholden to a narrative of systematic police racism to which every case is made to conform, regardless of the facts or logic.

It doesn't matter if the police officer is an African-American with an unblemished record and numerous character witnesses. This describes Brentley Vinson, the officer who fatally shot Keith Scott.

It doesn't matter if the victim disobeys the police in a tense situation and acts in a potentially threatening manner. Despite cops with guns drawn yelling orders at him (and his wife shouting, "Don't you do it!"), Scott exited his vehicle and approached

officers without raising his hands.

It doesn't matter if the allegedly unarmed victim turns out to have been armed. Everything points to Scott having had a gun, even though the family insists he had a book (the police didn't find one at the scene).

The police dashcam and body-camera video of the Scott shooting is inconclusive but broadly supportive of the police story. The police recovered an ankle holster and a pistol at the scene. Lab results showed Scott's fingerprints and DNA were on the weapon.

It doesn't necessarily mean he did anything wrong in this instance, but Scott also has a long rap sheet including weapons offenses, lending additional credence to the idea that he had a gun.

These facts didn't penetrate the Black Lives Matter narrative of the Scott shooting. Such facts never do. The narrative is immune to complication or ambiguity, let alone contradiction. Every police-involved shooting of a black man is taken, ipso facto, to confirm that the

police are racists. When the evidence in any particular instance makes it obvious that the narrative is a lie or a gross oversimplification -- e.g., in Ferguson or the Freddie Gray tragedy -- the movement simply moves on to the next case, as reckless as before.

It is increasingly hard to deny that the movement is anti-police. When any evidence supporting the police is disregarded, and rioters hurl insults and objects at officers whose only offense is trying to maintain public order at a protest, the agenda is clear. After an event like Charlotte, a more responsible movement would keep the pressure on for more facts and wouldn't indict police conduct without them. It would have a healthy skepticism about both the official version of events and the version of bereaved relatives. It would embrace peaceful protest as warranted, and avoid anything to bring discredit to itself or endanger wholly innocent police officers.

But that movement would be something else entirely. In Charlotte, as in so many other places, it was riot first, and ask questions later.

IH35 almost completed; onto fulfilling promises of Sewer

"You cannot delegate thinking. Computers fail, checklists fail, everything can fail. But people can't. We make decisions based on what deserves our attention. It is an absolute necessity in becoming genuinely productive," (Duhigg: Smarter, Faster, Better)

For several years, the I-35 Construction hung over Salado like a tornado without end. A year ago, the decision was made to go to Austin and knock on every door until there was action. It was not easy. Result: Salado's I-35 Project portion will soon be completed. Main street is near completion and an 8ft apron on either side was added. Additionally, two other streets paved.

The attention now: sewer and wastewater plant completion. Studies

are done, and most state, county, and local meetings held. Recently, the Texas Historic Commission gave their permission for the permit. Their concurrence was sent to the Corps of Engineers and Texas Fish and Wildlife. The total package is being reviewed and a decision is expected. Their concern: Absolute assurance that the Salamander habitat will not be harmed.

Rick Kasberg, engineer, Amber Preston Dankert, and myself have turned our total attention to assure them that we will not en-

danger the Salamander. Whatever it takes, whatever offices must be visited, whatever information must be given; we will do.

Many believe it is simple: bid the contract, open the ground, lay the pipe, and build the plant. Far from it. Every step-of-the-way, a host of organizations (environmental and historical) review; ask for additional information; and work their own schedules.

Failure to ignore an organization or skip-a-step leads to lawsuits and severe consequences. With the Corps of Engineers and Texas Fish and Wildlife's decision, the simple can be done: bid, lay the pipe and build the wastewater plant. November 2017 is the planned completion date and the plant fully operational.

How to Build Better Drugs Faster

Breast cancer surgeon Dr. Laura Esserman sings to her patients as they go under anesthesia. She tackles any song request, whether it's a top 40 hit or a Broadway ballad. This same patient-centric attitude drove Dr. Esserman to participate in adaptive clinical trials, a game-changing way to test new medications.

It's past time that other researchers think beyond traditional clinical trials. Adaptive trials can make drug testing both more efficient and accurate. If regulators were to encourage greater use of adaptive trials and facilitate sharing of electronic health record data, researchers could deliver better drugs to patients, faster.

In a traditional clinical trial, researchers plan out every element of the trial -- from the number of participants to the type of data to be collected -- before they begin testing. They stick to this rigid master plan until the trial is complete.

But in an adaptive trial, researchers pre-plan certain modifications that they can make part-way through the trial, based on the results they've uncovered so far.

Think of it in terms of mapping a run. A runner might look at a map and realize that at one point, the road will fork. Instead of deciding whether to

go left or right before he ever begins jogging, he might choose to postpone the choice until actually reaches the fork. Perhaps he'd like to observe which path is muddier or which path has less traffic -- and he'll only know when he gets there.

Similarly, researchers administering adaptive clinical trials can modify their tests as they make observations. Like the runner, they have to pre-plan what choices they'll make and when. But the more flexible trial formula enables them to alter the trial in response to real-world results.

Dr. Esserman's trial, for example, personalized testing by splitting breast cancer patients into different groups depending on various measurements of their health. She tested a combination of therapies on these patients -- and only continued testing those that were found initially effective. By not having to run a dud treatment through the course of a standard clinical trial, the adaptive design reduced the cost, time, and number of patients needed for the trial.

The FDA currently permits adaptive trials in limited instances. Letting researchers use this model more often would improve the drug development process.

Another way to improve the process is to enable doctors, insurers, and

drug companies to share data on patients' health outcomes after they take new FDA-approved medicines. By analyzing this data, they could uncover patterns that can't be detected even in the largest clinical trials.

For instance, a clinical trial for a diabetes drug might include 1,000 participants, 10 of whom are Native American. Perhaps 60 percent of all patients respond well to the drug, but all 10 Native Americans get their blood sugar under control thanks to the medicine. It's impossible to tell from such a small sample size whether the medicine really is vastly more effective for Native Americans, or whether those 10 patients just got lucky.

Changing regulations to permit greater sharing of such data would help researchers unveil rare side effects, complications, or "miracle" results that crop up.

Adaptive trials and increased data sharing would deliver better medicines to patients faster and with greater safety. That's something to sing about.

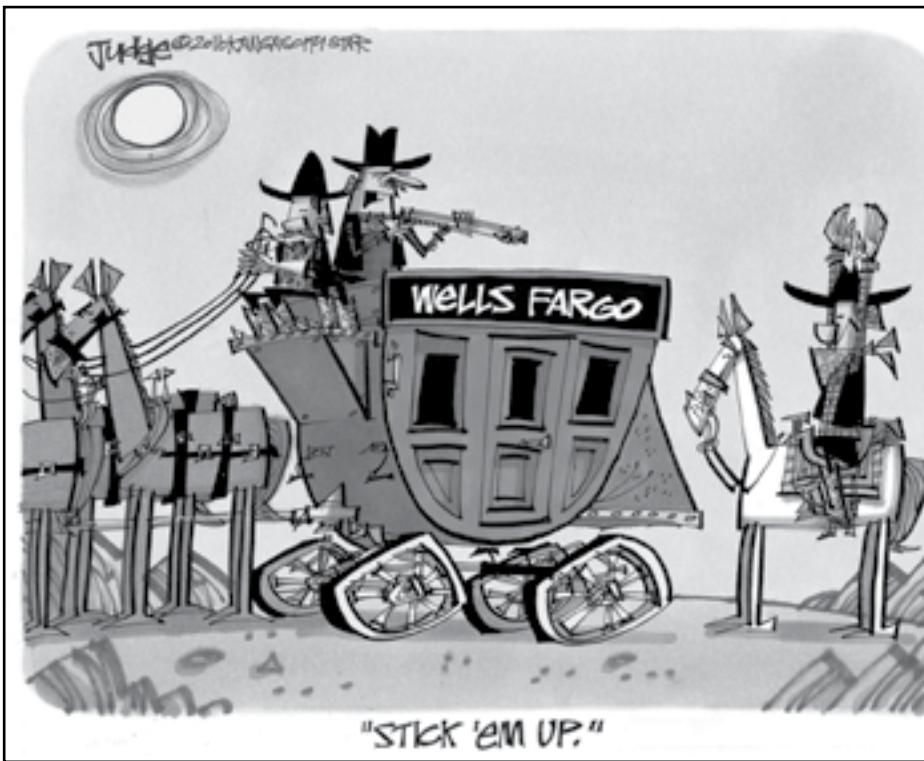

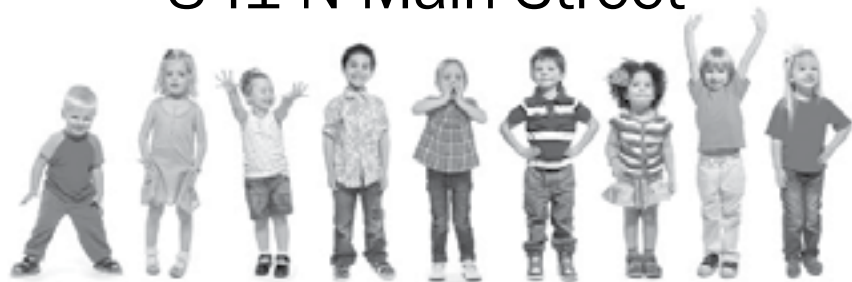

Large live oaks, cedar elms, red oaks and a burr oak offer a shady respite and vitex, pomegranate, mountain laurel, crape myrtle, yaupon holly add seasonal blooms and interest. Foundation plants are a traditional blend of nandina (heavenly bamboo) and ligustrum (privet) adding year round green foliage. A variety of ferns are used throughout the beds and include wood ferns, holly ferns, asparagus fern, fox tail fern and Ming ferns - all adding a coolness surrounding the home. The interesting Ming fern is known for its clusters of pom-pom like foliage and is sometimes used to enhance interest in flower arrangements.

A variety of ornamental shrubs are found including gardenia, American beautyberry, Turk's cap and sweet almond verbena. Sweet almond verbena is an attractive, fragrant, deer resistant, drought tolerant plant that grows tall and is a magnet for bees, butterflies and hummingbirds. "Almond verbena is a must for anyone who loves summertime fragrance"

as noted on the television show, Central Texas Gardener. There is a tremendous abundance of flowers providing a mixture of colors: autumn sage, cedar sage, firebush and firecracker plant in red; trailing lantana in yellow along with yellow bells and Jerusalem sage; bougainvillea, rock rose, climbing roses in pink; blue flowering plumbago and majestic sage--just a few of the varieties. Placed among the gardens are a collection of stone angel and cherub sculptures and stone benches where one can sit and commune with nature. There is even an elegant white wicker swing under an arbor of a climbing rose bush to linger with a book.

On Saturday, October 8 from 10 am to 4 pm come and engage in this garden and experience a selection of the other private gardens on tour: the gardens of Nancy and Owen Messenger, Joyce and CR Pennington, Shirley and Bill Pinkston, and Linda and Mickey Rawls. These gardens plus Salado's public Pocket Gardens feature

inspirational ideas with unique landscape characteristics and art. Garden docents will be at each location to share information.

Contract Bridge

Luck evens out in the long run, so if you want to be a winner at bridge, you have to play better than those you play with.

Let's say you're in six hearts and West leads the king of clubs, which you ruff. You play the queen of trumps and finesse, but East wins with the king and returns the queen of spades.

It looks as though you must lose a spade trick and go down one, but if you put your gray cells to work, the way to avoid the spade loser emerges.

So you win East's spade return with dummy's king, ruff a club with the ten, re-enter dummy with a low trump to the nine and ruff another club with the jack.

This runs you out of trumps in your hand, since you've ruffed clubs three times and led trumps twice, but that's precisely what you've been trying to do.



Barn Owl

Barn Owls have impressive wing span

Many of us here in west Texas are familiar with the largest of the owls, the Great Horned Owl. Its "who-who-who" song resounds throughout the southwest evenings. Some of us have even observed one of the smaller owls, the Burrowing Owl, which we will learn more about at a later date. Both of these species, while exquisitely marked in their own right, are typically colored in shades of dark brown. However, there is another, less common species that lives here in west Texas that is colored quite a bit differently, and that species is the Barn Owl.

Barn Owls (*Tyto alba*) are medium sized birds of prey that have a body size maxing out at just under twenty inches in length.

Their wingspan is quite impressive however, reaching just shy of four feet. Very distinctively colored, the Barn Owl is easily distinguishable from all other owls in this area. The first distinctive feature is the white, heart-shaped face that is set apart by a thin, tawny colored edging. With this facial feature, the Barn Owl has often been referred to as having a "monkey-face". The eyes are very dark, and there are no ear tufts on the smooth, rounded head.

The underparts area is colored white with numerous small dark spots; these

spots are only noticeable at very close range. The upperparts are colored a beautiful golden-tawny and have several random gray blotches throughout. There are also numerous white spots that appear randomly as well, and the tops of the wings are barred, as is the short tail. The legs are skinny and long, and being that this species is a "bird-of-prey", the talons on the feet are quite impressive.

Barn Owls are the only member of their genus that live north of Mexico. Their range is U-shaped as they can be observed, albeit infrequently, from coast to coast in the southern half of the United States, extending up the coastlines on both sides. Although they are rarely observed, they actually appear to thrive in close proximity to mankind.

This symbiotic relationship appears to benefit the owl in two separate ways. Barn Owls often take up abandoned, and occasionally, inhabited buildings to

roost during the day. More often than not, this species utilizes structures built by humans rather than elsewhere. This propensity to utilize the storage buildings of farmers and ranchers is how they received their common name of Barn Owl.

This bird of prey also benefits from the presence of humans by using the lands cleared for agricultural uses to hunt for its favored prey, small mammals. These clearings allow the owl easy access to the rats and mice that make up the majority of its diet. Most ranchers who observe this owl do not disturb it as they realize the benefits of having an animal that feeds on rodents on their property.

Barn Owls, like other owl species, are entirely nocturnal and are able to locate their prey in total darkness by sound alone. They heart-shaped face aids in this as it funnels the sounds to the ears of the bird. They are also able to fly in stealth mode, for although their wingspan can approach four feet, their flight pattern is very light and nearly silent.


This species of owl mates for life, and may nest throughout the year in the warmer climates of its range. The female is the primary caregiver, beginning with the building of the crude nest made up primarily of debris. Again, this nest is usually in an abandoned building. She can lay anywhere from two to twelve white eggs that are nearly two inches in length. She then incubates the eggs for roughly one month, then cares for the young for another two months until they are ready to leave the nest. Depending on the climate, she and her mate may produce up to three broods annually.

The population trends of this species is typically thought to be declining, particularly in the eastern half of the country. Some states have listed it as threatened. However, although it is rarely seen, this species appears to be thriving in this state.
