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Record numbers cast early votes in presidential race

Early voting continues through Nov. 4 in the Presidential and General Election on Oct. 24 with six early voting locations in Bell County.

Early voting has broken the records of 2008 in the first two days Oct. 24 and 25. So far, at the Salado early voting location, more than 750 have cast ballots in the first two days.

Hours for early voting are 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 27 and 28; 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Oct. 29 and Oct. 31-Nov. 4 and noon-5 p.m. Oct. 30.

The early voting locations are Salado Civic Center, 601 N. Main St., Salado; Bell County Courthouse Annex, 550 East 2nd Ave., Belton; Bell County Annex, 301 Priest Dr., Killeen; Killeen Community Center, 2201 E. Veterans Memorial Blvd., Killeen; Bell County Annex, 205 East Central Ave., Temple and the Parks and Recreation Center, 307 Millers Crossing, Harker Heights.

Election day, Precinct 203 voters will cast their ballots 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on Nov. 8 at the Salado Church of Christ Activity Center, 225 North Church St., Salado.

I-35 work should be substantially completed before Thanksgiving

All of the mainlanes for I-35 through Salado should be open no later than Thanksgiving, according to Mayor Skip Blancett, who has met almost weekly with James Construction representatives.

"Will everything be perfect?" Blancett said Oct. 20 during his report to Salado aldermen. "No, not yet. But all road lanes should be open and traffic should be on the permanent lanes."

Blancett said that this should include the one-way access roads through Salado and the entrance and exit ramps being completed.

"They are running wide

open, working 24 hours per day to get it done the week before Thanksgiving," he added.

After the expansion is "substantially completed," there will be work remaining: "Another 30 days to clean up and finish," the Mayor said.

Bringing the date for the final removal of the ubiquitous orange barrels to near the end of December.

James Construction began work on the expansion of I-35 through Salado with a great deal of fanfare for its June 2012 groundbreaking on the rubble of the former Super 8 motel and restaurant on the west side of I-35.

The project was slated by Texas Department of Transportation for three

years, due to complete April 1, 2015, according to TXDOT Project Tracker. Spring 2015 came and went, as did Spring 2016 and Summer 2016.

The project is now at 138.91 percent of the time allowed. If it is completed by year's end, it will exceed 150 percent of the time allowed.

No sooner than the I-35 construction cleans up construction will begin on the Salado sewer system. According to timeline, bids will be sent out and selected in October and November with construction to begin as early as December.

The timeline allots 11 months for the construction of the collection system, with the Main Street collection system and low

pressure force mains slated for construction January through September 2017. The Church Street lines will be constructed December 2016 through August 2017. The West Village collection system will be constructed March through June 2016.

The construction of the wastewater treatment plant is scheduled for December 2016 through September 2017.

The village plans on three months to connect septic systems and transfer sewer services with the plant going online in January 2018.

The village has all of its permits for the construction of the collection system and wastewater treatment plants.

BOA approve subdivisions, ratify officer's promotion

Aldermen unanimously approved the concept plan for one subdivision and waivers from the subdivision ordinance for another subdivision at their meeting Oct. 20.

Aldermen approved the concept plan for Salado Mills, a ±64.66 acre, 3-phase (Phase I existing), residential subdivision located in the Village's extraterritorial jurisdiction. Aldermen asked the developer if there had been any discussion of the subdivision voluntarily annexing into the Village. Aldermen also asked about whether the roads would be privately or publicly maintained. The developer said that they first thought of it being a gated community with private roads, but opted not to close the

subdivision and the roads would be maintained by the county.

The board also approved the request for waivers from Section 3.1(0) for street/block length, Section 3.4(b) blocks and Section 3.1(h)2 streets of the Subdivision Ordinance for Windmill Estates, a proposed subdivision in the Village extra territorial jurisdiction. The board approved the waiver contingent on the developer requiring hammerhead driveways or other forms to mitigate backing in to a collector street.

Salado Police Officer Sid Post's promotion to Corporal was ratified by aldermen following an executive session Oct. 20. Post will receive about \$3,600 in back pay for pay increase that was supposed to come with the promotion in November 2015.

Belton conducting hearings on annexation of 7 areas

The City of Belton will conduct the second of two public hearings on the annexation of seven areas of land, two of which will abut the Salado extra territorial jurisdiction, at 5:30 p.m. Nov. 1 at the Harris Community Center.

Two of those areas expand annexation along I-35 south of the Lampasas River.

Annexation Study Area 3 contains approximately 283.9 acres within the Belton ETJ "located south of the intersection of IH-35 and the Lampasas River." According to city documents, the tract extends along the west side of IH-35 measuring approxi-

mately 1,000 feet in width and would add 1,000 feet additional on the west side of IH-35 to the current 1,000 feet total city limit width centered on IH-35. The tract extends southward along IH-35 south of Amity Road and adjoins the Salado ETJ line.

Annexation Study Area 4 contains approximately 324.88 acres and is located south of the intersection of IH-35 and the Lampasas River. The tract extends along the east side of IH-35, measuring approximately 1,000 feet in width and would add 1,000 feet additional feet to the current 1,000 feet total city limit width centered on IH-35. The tract extends southward along IH-35 south of Amity Road and adjoins

the Salado ETJ line.

According to city documents, a proposed annexation schedule for the seven annexation areas began Aug. 23. Service Plans and Annexations public hearings will be conducted Oct. 25 and Nov. 1, according to the city documents. The city could adopt the annexation on Dec. 13.

Salado Village Voice will have coverage of the public hearing meeting online, as the Oct. 25 hearing was held after presstime for the Oct. 27 edition of the newspaper.

Since annexing the original 1,000 feet wide path centered on IH-35

south from the Lampasas River intersection to the northern boundary of Salado's ETJ in late 2004, the city of Belton has not provided those properties with sewer or other municipal utility services. Those properties remain on onsite septic systems and private water supplies.

In November 2004, the city of Belton began annexation of the 1,000 foot swath of land south of Lampasas River. At the same time, it annexed 103 acres along and on both sides of West Amity Road, beginning at the intersection of I-35 and extending 3,600 feet and another 127 acres of East Amity Road extending one mile from the Interstate.

Clinton's Insincere, Arrogant Campaign

The website PolitiFact jumped all over Rudy Giuliani earlier this year when he said, "Hillary Clinton is for open borders."

It spent about 700 words sifting through the evidence, and ended up rating the former New York City mayor's claim "false." Now we know that PolitiFact blew its call because it lacked access to the most important datum -- Hillary Clinton's real view.

For that, it would have had to be present at one of her paid speeches at a major financial institution, in this case the Brazilian bank Banco Itau. In May 2013, Clinton told her audience at the bank, "My dream is a hemispheric common market, with open trade and open borders." Ding, ding, ding -- there's the magic phrase, in Hillary's own words.

The excerpt from Hillary's speech comes courtesy of the massive WikiLeaks dump of pilfered emails -- probably by Russian hackers -- from the account of Clinton campaign chairman John Podesta. The hack is illuminating insofar as it illustrates how progressives think and talk in private -- i.e., about how you'd expect.

The frank advocacy of open borders is now so radioactive that even the editorial page of The Wall

Street Journal will no longer associate itself with it (once upon a time, the paper routinely called for an open-borders amendment to the U.S. Constitution). Talk of open borders has consequentially retreated behind closed doors.

A faux cosmopolitanism is a thread running through the WikiLeaks emails. If you think Clinton aides root for terrorist acts not to be committed by Muslims, lest political and policy complications ensue, you're right.

Hillary aide Karen Finney sent John Podesta an email in December 2015 about the San Bernardino shooting. She wrote "damn," and forwarded a tweet from MSNBC journalist Chris Hayes relating that one of the shooters was named Syed Farook. Podesta lamented that it wasn't instead a journalist named Syed Farook reporting on a shooting by Chris Hayes, who has a much more convenient, Irish surname.

A certain highhandedness and bad faith pervades the entire Clinton campaign. Hillary Clinton was perfectly comfortable with the globe-trotting financiers throwing six-fig-

ure speaking fees at her, but then had to turn around and shovel boob bait for Bubba at her party's inflamed left-wing activists, who hate those very financiers and their views on trade, among many other things.

The Clinton campaign's predicament was captured in microcosm by spokesman Brian Fallon. In September 2015, he worried about an op-ed attacking the Keystone Pipeline that, he notes, had already been extensively edited and re-edited. As secretary of state, Clinton had, reasonably enough, indicated she'd likely support the pipeline, and now she was coming out against it. Will her newly aggressive opposition, Fallon wondered, "be greeted cynically and perhaps as part of some manufactured attempt to project sincerity?"

Yeah, probably -- like much of what she says and does. Such was Clinton's manifest weakness in March 2016 that a friendly liberal columnist sent a worried email to John Podesta. "Right now," the columnist warned, "I am petrified that Hillary is almost totally dependent on Republicans nominating Trump." Sounds right. It always pays to be lucky, rather than good -- or sincere.

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



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Central TX Area Museum Curator speaks to ABWA meeting Nov. 3

Coleman Hampton will speak to the Chisholm Trail Chapter of the American Business Women's Association at 6:15 p.m. Nov. 3 at the Presbyterian Church of Salado.

Hampton is the acting curator of the Central Texas Area Museum. He holds a Master of Arts from Baylor University.

The Central Texas Museum was established by a group of interested citizens and received their

charter on November 19, 1958. It opened on August 1, 1959. It was founded to preserve the historical items of early frontier days and was also established for the purpose of housing a library of certain books and papers connected with the settlement of Texas and the Central Texas area.

The Museum is housed at present in an old rock building more than 100 years old.

The University Interscholastic League (UIL) has a very prestigious award called the UIL Sponsor Excellence Award. Every year, each public high school in Texas is allowed to nominate a teacher that also sponsors academic, athletic, and/or fine arts competitions. Out of the 1,317 high schools in Texas, the UIL only selects 15 teachers per year for this award.

We have four teachers in Salado that have received this award during

their career:

Dennis Cabaniss for UIL Academics (Mathematics, Number Sense, and Calculator)

Dennis has helped lead our high school to all nine state championships in UIL Academics and three Lone Star Cups. Out of the 1,317 high schools in Texas, there are only two high schools that have more UIL Academic state championships than Salado. Dennis has also been an employee in our school district for 46 years, which is longer than any other employee in the history of the district.

Tim Cook for UIL Academics (Speech and Debate) and Fine Arts (Film-making)

Tim has helped lead our high school to four of our UIL Academic state championships and all three Lone Star Cups. His students have won sixteen state championships in speech, debate, and film-making. This year Tim was also inducted in the Texas Forensic Association (TFA) Hall of Fame. Only 23 speech/debate teachers in the State of Texas have ever been inducted into the TFA Hall of Fame.

Alan Haire for UIL Athletics (Football)

Alan was the head football coach in Lago Vista for 13 years. During this time his record was 81 wins and 62 losses. He has been selected as the District Coach of the Year three times and he was also selected as Dave Campbell's Texas Football 2A Coach of the Year. During his first season as the head football coach in Salado, his team's record is 5 wins and 3 losses so far and they have already qualified for the playoffs with two regular season games remaining.

JJ Jonas for UIL Academics (Journalism) and Fine Arts (One Act Play)

JJ has helped lead our high school to UIL Academic state championships and three Lone Star Cups. JJ's One Act Play program has won two state championships, three 2nd place state awards, and one 3rd place state award. JJ has also had state champions/qualifiers in poetry, humorous interpretation, dramatic interpretation, duet, and duo.

Out of the 1,317 high schools in Texas, Salado is the only high school that has four recipients of the UIL Sponsor Excellence Award currently on staff.

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

venues in his home state.



Clan Wallace Society (CWS) has over 1,400 members in the United States, Canada, Scotland, England, France and as far away as Hong Kong, New Zealand, and Australia.

CWS was founded and chartered in 1966 at one of the early Gathering of the Clans in Salado. The purpose of the Society is educational with particular reference to the history of Scotland, and its public figures, such as Sir William Wallace, the national hero of Scotland, its Clan and the heritage and achievements of those claiming Scottish descent.

The Clan Wallace Motto is Pro Libertate which means "For Freedom". In the late 1200's and early 1300's a Scottish Patriot named William Wallace stirred his nation to rebel against the harsh rule of England's King Edward I Plantagenet also known as "Longshanks". William Wallace became

High Protector of Scotland and was knighted for his patriotism and leadership in the rebellion. He was eventually defeated in battle and was imprisoned and tortured to death by the English. It was not until the year 2000 that Sir William Wallace's dream of freedom for Scotland became a reality. Scotland instituted its first Parliament in 2000, with Queen Elizabeth II of England in attendance to support the event.

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
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

APPLICATION NO. 12-3013C

MCCC, LLC has applied to amend Certificate of Adjudication No. 12-3013 to extend the expiration date of the term portion of its permit which authorizes the diversion and use of 168 acre-feet of water per year from a reservoir on Salado Creek, Brazos River Basin for agricultural purposes in Bell County. More information on the application and how to participate in the permitting process is given below.

APPLICATION. MCCC, LLC, P.O. Box 159, Salado, Texas 76571, Applicant has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for an amendment to a Certificate of Adjudication pursuant to Texas Water Code (TWC) § 11.122 and TCEQ Rules Title 30 Texas Administrative Code (TAC) §§ 295.159, *et seq.* Notice is being published and mailed to the water rights holders of record in the Brazos River Basin pursuant to Title 30 TAC § 295.158.

Certificate of Adjudication No. 12-3013 authorizes the Owner to maintain an on-channel reservoir in Bell County. Owner is also authorized to divert and use not to exceed 236 acre-feet of water per year (168 acre-feet on a perpetual basis and 168 acre-feet on a term basis) from a point on Salado Creek, tributary of the Lampasas River, tributary of the Little River, tributary of the Brazos River, Brazos River Basin for agricultural purposes to irrigate 139.44 acres and 78.881 acres of land in Bell County. The term portion of the permit expired on December 31, 2009.

Applicant seeks to extend the expiration date of the term portion of authorized water. Applicant indicates the diversion point and on-channel reservoir are located within ZIP Code 76571. Applicant has provided alternate sources of water from one groundwater well.

The application and partial fees were received December 10, 2009. Additional information and fees were received March 3, March 5, May 14, August 17, 2010; December 3, 2015; and January 4, January 21, February 18, April 6, April 21, April 25, May 3, May 12, and May 24, 2016. The application was declared administratively complete and accepted for filing on September 7, 2010.

The Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and based on the results of the water availability analysis, appropriated but unused water is not available in the Brazos River Basin to support the Applicant's request. Staff therefore recommends that the application be denied. The application and technical memoranda are available for viewing and copying at the Office of the Chief Clerk, 12100 Park 35 Circle, Bldg. F., Austin, TX 78753.

PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. 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Risky business

Opening lead -- jack of clubs.

There are hands where declarer might appear to be subjecting himself to an unnecessary risk during the play. Yet when these hands are later analyzed, it often can be demonstrated that the so-called risk was not really a risk at all, since it improved declarer's chances without exposing him to any greater jeopardy than he already faced.

Consider this deal where South was in four spades and the defense started by taking the first three club tricks. East then shifted to the heart queen, taken by South with the ace.

Declarer cashed the A-K of trumps and then abandoned further trump leads, leaving the jack outstanding. Next he played the A-K of diamonds and a third diamond to the queen. After West discarded a heart, South led his last diamond, ruffed it with dummy's last trump, ruffed a heart in his hand and scored the last two tricks with the Q-6 of spades.

It might seem that declarer was living dangerously when he began playing diamonds while a trump was still out, since one of the diamonds might have been ruffed. Nevertheless, South's line of play was absolutely correct.

If declarer had drawn a third round of trumps, he would have made the contract only if the opposing diamonds were divided 3-3, and he would have failed against the actual distribution. By playing as he did, though, declarer would not only make the contract if the diamonds were 3-3 -- in which case he would have drawn the last trump before cashing his



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
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Texas Brown Tarantula

Most tarantulas are quite placid

With the onset of "All Hallows Eve" we are bombarded with images that can be described as frightening to downright terrifying on the television, in stores, etc. However, as scary as many of these images may be, they pale in comparison to the fear elicited by the largest spider in west Texas for those persons who suffer from the fear of spiders, or arachnophobia.

Tarantulas are a large and diverse group of spiders that can be observed throughout the southwestern United States, Mexico, and South America. The most familiar and recognizable species belong to the genus *Aphonopelma* that is represented in Texas by fourteen species, the most commonly observed being *Aphonopelma hentzi*, the Texas Brown Tarantula.

Texas Brown Tarantulas, like other species of arachnids, have a body that consists of two parts (the cephalothorax and the abdomen) as well as the customary eight legs. As the common name implies, the dorsal color-

ation is primarily brown, although the intensity of the brown is directly correlated with the age and physical condition of the spider. The abdomen is covered with long, coarse dark brown hairs that are known as urticating hairs. The abdomen is generally one way to differentiate between males and females. The female's abdomen is as wide or wider than the cephalothorax, giving her an hour-glass or figure-eight shape. The male's abdomen is generally thinner than the cephalothorax. Tarantulas are among the biggest spiders of the New World, and this species is by far our heaviest. Females are slightly larger in size than males, reaching a total body length up to one and one-half inch and a leg span of almost four inches.

Tarantulas inhabit a myriad of habitats, ranging from the grasslands

and cottonfields of the Panhandle to the gravelly, dry soils of the Trans-Pecos, as well as all of the habitats in between. The most consistent variable in their habitat selection is the looseness of the substrate as they need to have soil in which to burrow. The vast majority of their lives are spent in this humid underground lair. This is especially true for the females, who allow food to come to them, ambushing their prey as it passes by the entrance to her domain.


Prey items accepted by this species include just about any smaller invertebrate creature, including many harmful and nuisance species, but they have been known to feed on small mammals such as mice as well. Food is eaten in a very odd, if not disturbing, way. The fangs are inserted into the prey item, much like short, hollow straws, and the insides of the food

are literally sucked from within. The exoskeleton that remains is discarded after the feeding. This is akin to a person drinking a milkshake. We drink the contents of the cup, (usually with just one straw) but then we throw away the inedible container.

Given their dastardly appearance, most Tarantulas are quite placid. However, they have several means in which they will defend themselves. The first is to try and run for cover. The second is the shedding of the urticating hairs on the abdomen, which can be very itchy and irritating when placed in the eyes, nostrils, or mouth of a would-be predator. The third defense is to raise the forebody to expose the 3/8 inch long fangs, and the fourth defense is to actually bite with said fangs. Although Tarantulas, like all spiders, are venomous, the bite is of no long-term consequence as the venom is rather weak.

Due to their relatively passive nature, many Tarantulas are actually kept in captivity as pets. It has been documented that females can live up to thirty years, and many researchers are of the opinion that they might live longer than that. Males on the other hand generally survive only two to three years.

Every summer, there is a mass movement of Tarantulas that many nature enthusiasts enjoy and this is when mature males leave their burrows and set out on a quest to find food, as well as to look for love. It is not uncommon to see literally hundreds of males on west Texas country roads as they passively search for these items. It is at this time many Tarantulas can be seen in places such as neighborhoods, backyards, and parks when no others have been seen prior to this time.



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

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
