Village seeks to withhold documents concerning Foutz investigation

Assistant city attorney Lisa Sjogren has requested a decision from the Attorney General's office regarding a public information request made Oct. 18 by Tim Fleischer, editor of *Salado Village Voice*.

Salado Village Voice made the request for the following documents after the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen voted to unilaterally sever the Employment Agreement it had with Village Administrator Kim Foutz last month:

- A list of complaints made against and/or about city administrator Kim Foutz
- A list of the names of those interviewed by the city attorney who was authorized to conduct the investigation into Kim Foutz
- The final recommendation and/or summary resulting from the investigation into Kim Foutz
- Communication between the Village and its insurers regarding the employment agreement with

Foutz

• Invoice line items from the Village Attorney regarding the investigation into Kim Foutz.

In the request for an Attorney General's opinion, Sjogren stated that "The City contends that part or all of the information requested is exempted from public disclosure under applicable law found in Chapter 552, Subchapter C, §552.101 through §552.156 of the Act, including without limitation, §552.101 - Confidential Information; §552.103 Litigation or Settlement Negotiations; §552.107 - Certain Legal Matters; and §552.111 - Agency Memoranda."

The Board of Aldermen voted 4-1 on Oct. 6 to unilaterally sever the employment agreement with Kim Foutz effective on Nov. 7. At the time, aldermen continued to put Foutz on paid administrative leave until the date of the severance. Under the specifics of the unilateral severance, the Village will pay one year's salary to Foutz (\$80,000) and up to six months of

Foutz' health insurance stipend of \$557 per month. Of the severance, the insurance carrier will pay \$40,000.

On Sept. 15, aldermen voted 4-1 with Dave Williams voting against to place Foutz on "administrative leave with pay for a period not to exceed 30 days under terms set by the Mayor, in order for the Mayor or his designees to conduct an investigation into complaints against the Administrator and determine if the Administrator employment contract should be terminated for good cause."

After the motion was approved, Mayor Skip Blacett announced that he was delegating the investigation to aldermen Michael McDougal and Fred Brown.

Following a 150-minute executive session of the Board of Aldermen on Sept. 22, Mayor Blacett announced that "legal counsel for the Village will conduct the investigation into complaints against the Village Administrator."

Village continues deer debate

Aldermen may consider at their meeting Nov. 3 two local ordinances concerning hunting within the Village of Salado. While the agenda was posted for the meeting, no supporting documents, including drafts of the two ordinances were available when requested by the *Salado Village Voice* newspaper on Oct. 31.

Aldermen will meet in workshop session on Nov. 3 prior to convening back into regular session to take possible action on amending the 2003.17 Weapons Ordinance, which makes shooting any firearm within the city limits illegal. The Weapons Ordinance does not make the use of bows and crossbows within the city limits illegal.

Some cities within the State of Texas have done

just that, including the City of Alvarado, which did so by ordinance in 2008.

The Environmental and Deer Committee of the Village of Salado has encouraged the right of private property owners within the city limits to either hunt deer with bow and arrows or to allow other licensed hunters to hunt deer with bow and arrows on their property.

The archery only season started on Oct. 1 and ends on Nov. 4. Archery hunting will continue with the general white tail deer hunting season from Nov. 5 through Jan. 1, 2017.

Many residents have reacted to the hunting of deer by bow and arrow by placing "No Kill Zone" signs in their yards.

While unnecessary, they do let neighbors and hunters in the area know their stand on the issue.

Early vote continues record pace

Early voting continues through Nov. 4 in the Presidential and General Election on Oct. 24 with six early voting locations in Bell County.

Early voting has broken the records of 2008. So far, at the Salado early voting location, more than 2,677 have cast ballots in Precinct 203 through Nov. 1.

Hours for early voting are 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Nov. 3-4.

You can early vote at the Salado Civic Center, 601 N. Main St., Salado; as well as five other locations in Bell County: County Courthouse Annex, Belton; Bell County Annex, Killeen; Killeen Community Center, Bell County Annex, Temple and the Harker Heights Parks and Recreation Center.

Election day, Precinct 203 voters will cast their ballots 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on Nov. 8 at the Salado Church of Christ Activity Center on Church St.

Belton unveils plans for annexation along I-35

Belton is preparing for growth along I-35 south of Highway 190.

First, the Belton city council set a Nov. 22 public hearing on \$9.7 million in certificates of obligations for the construction of an elevated water tank and trunk sewer and water lines. The City of Belton has already allocated \$345,081 in the 2016-17 fiscal budget to pay for the debt service on the proposed \$9.7 million in certificates of obligation.

The C.O.s will pay for the extension of sewer trunk lines south of the Expo center along I-35 both sides of I-35 and to serve the Miller Heights area.

City manager Sam Listi

reminded council members that the C.O.s would be repaid by income from water and sewer customers, not from an increase in property debt service taxes.

The city council also conducted public hearings on the annexation of seven areas of land, including areas north of the extra-territorial jurisdiction of the Village of Salado. The hearings were held Oct. 25 and Nov. 1.

Prior to opening the public hearing portion of the meeting, Listi told the council that Belton is looking at annexing along I-35 because of the "potential for development there."

Listi spoke about the impact of the expansion of I-35 through Belton and the potential for commercial growth along the I-35

corridor.

He explained to the council about the level of municipal services that must be provided to the newly annexed areas.

Maps of the proposed annexation areas can be found online with this story at saladovillagevoice.com. The proposed areas are these:

Area 1: Approximately 716.44 acres located on the east side of I-35, along and south of Decker Road. The tract extends southward to the Lampasas River, and extends along the river to the south and southeast, connecting to existing city limits, east of Toll Bridge Road.

Area 2: Approximately 198.69 acres located on the east side of I-35, between the east/west portion of the Lampasas River and

Elmer King Road.

Area 3: Approximately 250.14 acres located south of the intersection of I-35 and the Lampasas River. The tract extends along the west side of I-35, measuring approximately 1,000' in width, and would add 1,000' additional on the west side of I-35 to the current 1,000' total city limit width centered on I-35. The tract extends southward along I-35 south of Amity Road, and adjoins the Salado ETJ line.

Area 4: Approximately 297.20 acres located south of the intersection of I-35 and the Lampasas River. The tract extends along the east side of I-35, measuring approximately 1,000' in width, and would add 1,000 additional feet to the current 1,000' total city limit width centered

on I-35. The tract extends southward along I-35 south of Amity Road, and adjoins the Salado ETJ line.

Area 5: Approximately 228.27 acres located along and north of Sparta Road and west of the existing city limits, extending west to FM 439, and east along Sparta Road to the city limits.

Area 6: Approximately 24.10 acres located generally along the proposed north/south alignment of Lake-to-Lake Road, north of Sendero Estates Subdivision, and south of FM 93.

Area 7: Approximately 2,713 acres located on the south side of Avenue O, between Avenue O and Old Golf Course Road.

The City also announced the Municipal

Services Plan for each of the proposed annexation areas, varying depending upon factors including topography and current and future infrastructure.

For all of the areas proposed for annexation, the City of Belton will provide the following services immediately upon the final annexation:

- Police protection
- Animal control
- Fire and Emergency Medical Service Protection
- Code Enforcement
- Fire Prevention
- Planning, Zoning and Development Review
- Library services
- Parks and Recreation
- Streets and Drainage

Trump Is His Own Worst Enemy

Hillary Clinton may be the first candidate in American history to win a contest of personalities without having one.

She has been content to make the election all about Donald Trump's character, and Trump has obliged because, really, what else would he consider as fascinating and important as himself?

In a more normal year, Obamacare would be a byword for the failures of liberal technocrat rule. Insurers have been exiting the exchanges, and many of those that are staying are hiking premiums by 20 percent or more. Even a Democratic governor, Mark Dayton of Minnesota, has said that Obamacare is "no longer affordable to increasing numbers of people."

In a more conventional election, President Barack Obama's foreign policy would be under relentless assault. The Russian reset is in flames. Syria is Obama's Rwanda. Iran, with its nuclear program intact, is making a bid for regional hegemony. ISIS established its caliphate in the space created by Obama's passivity.

In any other campaign, the economy would be front and center, and the slowest recovery in the post-World War II period a constant flashpoint.

Instead, none of these issues have had the resonance of Donald Trump's early-hours Twitter war with a former Miss Universe, or even his aside in the third debate that Hillary Clinton is a "nasty woman." And these have been third-tier controversies, compared with the ones that have truly rocked the campaign, like Trump's post-convention fight with the Khan family and the airing of the "Access Hollywood" tape.

It's not as though Trump doesn't talk about the issues. But nothing besides his core of immigration and trade has the force to escape the extreme gravitational pull of his persona, which is oversized, compelling and -- in a presidential campaign -- ripe for deconstruction.

If Trump is defeated in November, he will lose, more than anything else, on the basis of his character flaws. His lack of discipline. His thin skin. His boastfulness. His refusal to admit error, even when it's in his interest. His inability to project seriousness or to hit a grace note. The Clinton campaign has

exploited them all, and Trump, ever himself, has lacked the self-awareness or wherewithal to keep from playing to type every single time.

The so-called beer test is the usual personality metric in presidential politics. Which candidate would you prefer to share a cold one with? Hillary's campaign has worked instead to make the personality benchmark the "nuclear code" test. Which candidate would you prefer to have his or her finger on the button? It is meant to portray Trump's outrageousness as affirmatively dangerous, and cast her own persona -- which belongs in the same leaden category as Al Gore or Michael Dukakis -- in the best possible light.

In the primaries, Trump displayed an uncanny ability to understand and target the vulnerabilities of his opponents. But he either never understood, or didn't care to minimize, his own. This is why he chose to make the election about the single hardest thing for him to defend effectively, namely Donald J. Trump.

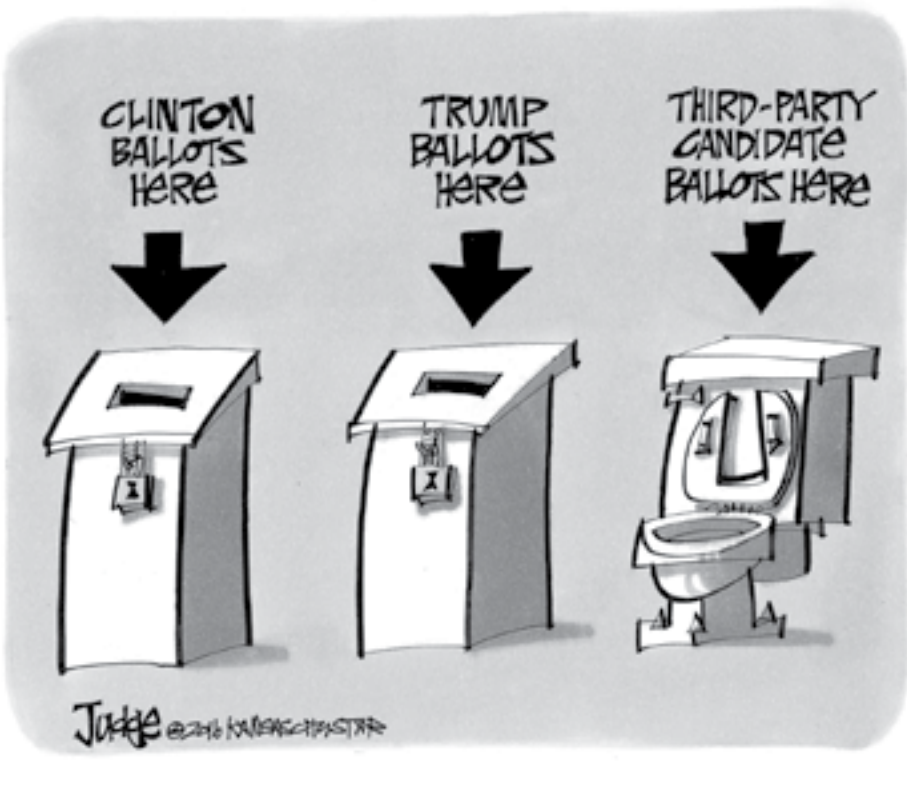
Wednesday, Nov. 2,

and density as those found within the City. Private streets are not maintained by the City."

- Sanitation and recycling. "Residents in the newly annexed area may select to continue service with their current service provider for up to two years or switch to they City's service. After the second anniversary, the City will provide the service at City rates.

- Brush collection services.

- Environmental health ordinance will go into effect.

The City commits to the following Capital Improvements within 2-1/2 years of annexation for the areas to be served:

- Trunk Sewer Line: for placement along the east side of IH-35 north of the study area. "This trunk line will be available for extension to developing properties in the

same manner as they are available to other locations in the City in accordance with City extension policies. Line construction is scheduled to begin in 2017 and services will be available by June 30, 2019.

- Other Water/Waste-water Facilities: A one million gallon elevated water storage tank is planned in Northwest Belton. It will enhance water services throughout the city.

The annexation municipal services plan states that "On-site sewerage systems may be maintained" in the annexed areas.

During discussion of the annexation plans, Listi said that the City is making "substantial public investment" in infrastructure to prepare for the expected growth in development in the annexation areas.

The City will also enter into annexation agreements with owners whose properties are undevel-

oped and used for agricultural purposes. These annexation agreements bind the City to not annex the property as long as they area maintained at their current status. Once the property is subdivided or developed, it immediately becomes eligible for annexation during the terms of five or 10 years, depending upon the agreements.

One property owner in Area 3 spoke about the annexation. Mark Brister said that part of his property was annexed by Belton in 2004 and that the new annexation would take the rest of his property into the city limits. "What kind of services can I expect to have afforded to me?" he asked. "Right now, more than 10 years after being annexed by Belton, I still have no water service and no sewer service."

According to state law, hunters cannot hunt deer from or across public roadways. Hunters may not trespass onto another landowner's property for the retrieval of a deer that has been injured or killed. "If you have wounded a deer, you have the right to ask to retrieve the animal," Bell County Game Warden Bryan Dulock said, adding that the property owner has the right to decline.

At that point, it is up to the property owner of how to dispose of the deer carcass.

Other violations of state laws include shooting across property lines, which Dulock described as "trespassing by projectile."

Violators may be prosecuted by State Game Wardens or other local law enforcement officials for violating current state hunting laws.

Hunting on publicly held land such as such as park space without permission is also a violation of state law.

Hunting on any property without the permission of the landowner is a violation of state law.

Dulock said that "you can't hunt at night," adding that hunting is permitted during daylight hours from 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset.

Before being issued a hunting license, hunters born after Sept. 2, 1971 are required to go through hunter education courses, according to Dulock. To

carry an archery license, they must also go through a bowhunter education course available online through the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

In Bell County, east of I-35 hunters are allowed to kill four deer, no more than two bucks, and no more than two antlerless,

all seasons combined. In Bell County, west of I-35, hunters are allowed to kill five deer, no more than two bucks, all seasons combined.

The Village of Salado will not pursue the 300 Managed Land Permits issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

First Baptist prepares shoe boxes for Samaritan's Purse project

Members of First Baptist Church of Salado will be joining tens of thousands of U.S. residents who are on a mission to make a lasting impact on children in need. They are looking beyond their own wish lists and packing shoeboxes for boys and girls around the world—for many of the children, it will be the first gift they have ever received.

During the week of Nov. 14-21, caring people around the country will transform 9.5 million empty shoeboxes into gifts



of hope filled with school supplies, hygiene items, notes of encouragement and fun toys, such as a doll or soccer ball. Operation Christmas Child, a project of Samaritan's Purse, will deliver these shoebox gifts to children overseas living in extreme poverty or affected by war, disease and natural disaster.

First Baptist Church is asking local residents to join them in preparing the shoeboxes for this year's drive, when they will be gathered at the church on Nov. 20 to be distributed through the global effort.

Last year, the local church collected more than 400 of the boxes for distribution, according to member Ron LeGuin, who heads up the project in Salado each year.

According to organizers, once you have found a shoebox or similar size

box to fill, you should pick the age of the child. Age groups are two to four, five to nine and 10 to 14 years of age. Put one "wow" toy such as a doll, soccer ball with pump, or stuffed animal in the box. Then add other fun toys, hygiene items, and school supplies.

"A global movement begins each November across the U.S. and seven other sending countries, millions are focused on making a difference in the lives of children facing difficult circumstances," said Operation Christmas Child Domestic Director Randy Riddle. 

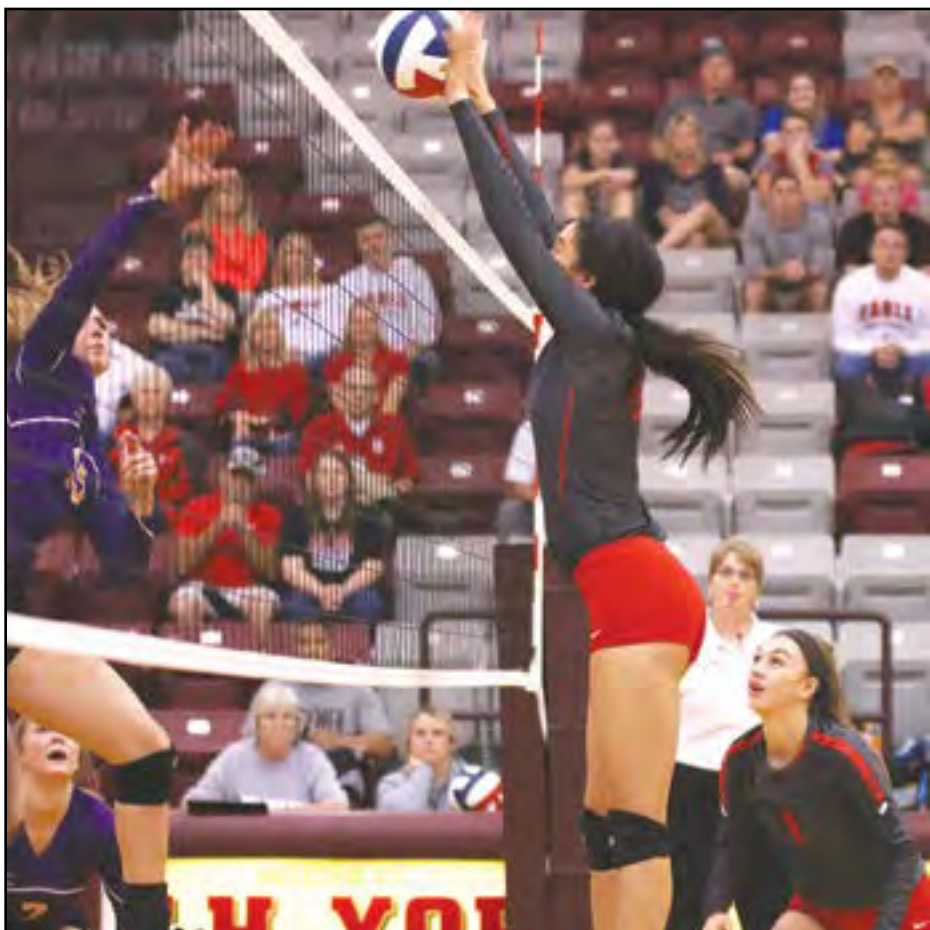

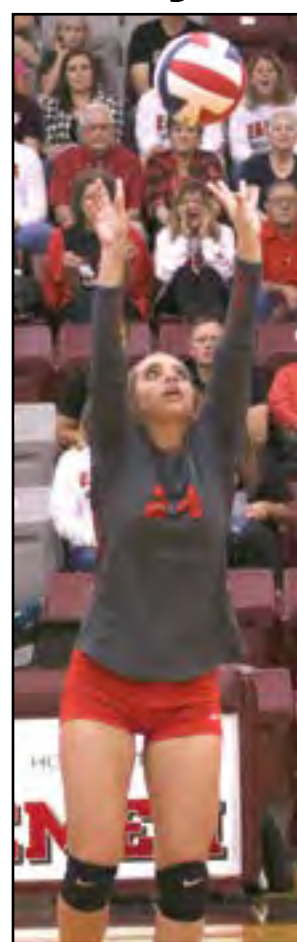

"The defense played very well against the undefeated ninth grade Rockets," Coach Scott Ringo said.

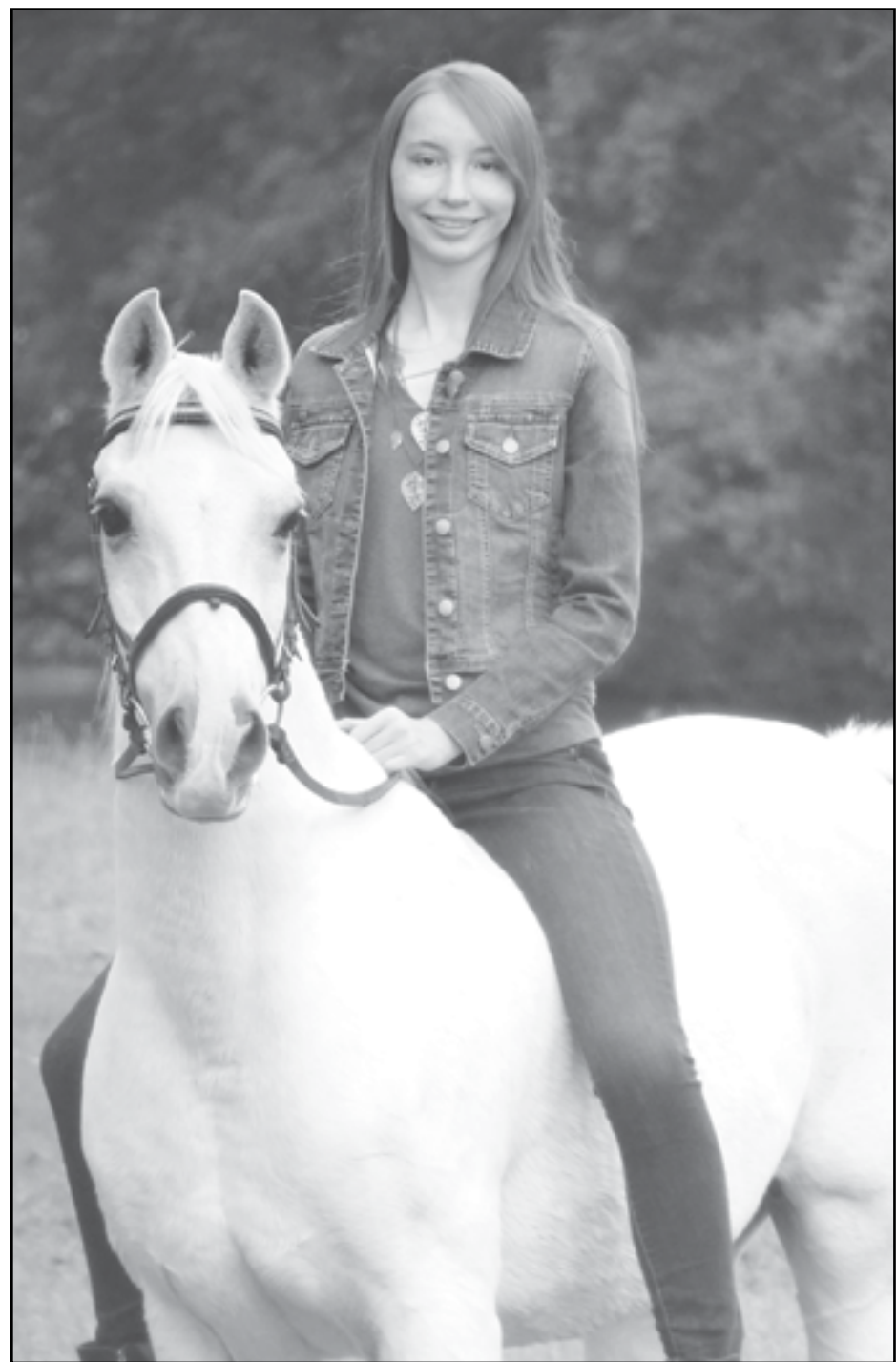
The defense was led by Hunter Bales, McEndree, Gordy Wilson, Clayton Zak and Brown.

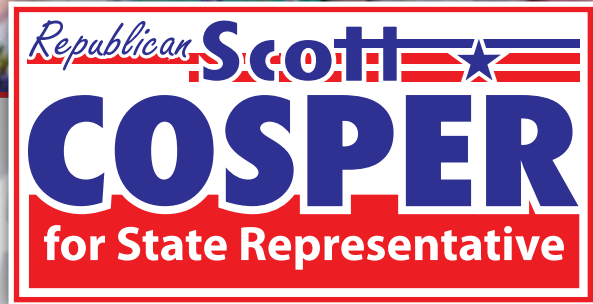

Scottish Festival Weekend Nov. 11 - 13 at Salado Civic Center

The 55th Scottish Gathering and Highland Games (www.saladoscottishfestival.com) will be held on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center, November 11-13. Heralding all things Scottish, this landmark event is the oldest Scottish festival in Texas and has been sponsored continuously by the Central Texas Area Museum since 1961.

The three-day event includes the skirl of bagpipes, wearing of the tartan, tossing the caber, Highland dancing, Celtic entertainers, shopping, food and fun. One of the event's main features is the Clan Village, the largest gathering of Scottish Clan tents in Texas where members from nearly 40 Scottish Clans will share information about Scottish history and genealogy.

The weekend begins on Friday evening with the Calling of the Clans at 6 p.m. on the Salado Creekside just north of the Museum building on south

Main Street. This is a solemn torchlight ceremony that recreates the coming together of the ancient Scottish clans to fight with Robert the Bruce for Scotland's freedom in 1314 at Bannockburn. The ceremony is followed by a Welcome Social at the Museum.

The Civic Center grounds are open Saturday at 9 a.m.- 5 p.m. The official opening ceremonies begin at noon with the Bands and Clans Parade on Main Street followed by presentations and massed bagpipe bands on the grounds. The parade will start at North Pace Park Road and move north on Main Street to the Civic Center grounds. The day's activities include Scottish athletics competition, Highland Dancing competition, bagpiping and drumming competitions, Battle of the Clans tug-of-war, live Celtic music, a Celtic marketplace, local and Scottish food vendors and more.

The day closes with the

Texas Tattoo at 5 p.m. on the grounds at the entertainment tent. The Tattoo includes performances by bagpipe bands, Highland dancers, and Celtic musicians.

Entertainers for this year's Gathering are Scottish singer Ed Miller, Celtic band The Here and Now, Scottish accordionist Hugh Morrison with singer Jed Marum, and singing trio The DramBeauties.

Sunday events (9 a.m.-3 p.m.) begins with the Kirkin' o' the Tartan, a traditional devotional service in which family groups carry banners of their family tartans and ask blessings on the families. The day's activities include bagpipe band competition, Clan tents, children's Scottish athletics, dog parade and contest, music, food, and shopping.

The Wee Scots Gift Shop will be open all 3 days in the Museum building, located on South Main Street across from the historic Stagecoach Inn.

Hidden chance

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

It is obviously better to give yourself two chances to make a contract rather than just one. It is important to keep this in mind before settling for the most straightforward line of play.

Take this case where you're in five diamonds and West leads the queen of hearts. You certainly can't relax when dummy appears, since you have only 10 sure tricks.

However, you should not pin all your hopes solely on the 50 percent chance that East was dealt the ace of clubs. Instead, you should seek an approach that might give you a better chance than that.

One possibility is to win the heart lead, draw trumps, cash the A-K of spades and exit with a spade. If the suit is divided 3-3 and West wins the third spade, you are home free.

This line of play is better than relying exclusively on the location of the ace of clubs, but it is still not the

best approach. A superior play is to let West's queen of hearts hold the first trick!

This unusual maneuver offers you by far the best chance to make 11 tricks. It is clearly better than playing the A-K and another spade, because it avoids the risk of East winning the third spade lead when the suit is divided 3-3.

In the actual case, once you let West win the queen of hearts at trick one, nothing

can stop you from making five diamonds, whatever West does next. You win your return, draw trumps, discard a spade on one of dummy's high hearts and establish an extra spade trick by cashing the K-A of spades and ruffing a spade. If the spades don't divide 3-3, you can still fall back on the possibility that East has the ace of clubs.

Kissing Bugs

Pucker up it's the Kissing Bug



Insect classification can be perplexing to the best of us, and the Reduviidae family of insects is no exception. In this expansive family of "bugs", there are several common names such as Wheel Bugs (a frequent denizen of pecan trees), Assassin Bugs (scary name, but only to other insects), and an innocuous member, in name only anyway, the Kissing Bug. Of the three groups

mentioned, this is the one that is of the most concern, and for good reason.

The genus that the Kissing Bug belongs to is Triatoma. This genus of insects can be observed throughout the southwestern United States from California to Texas. Outside of this country it occurs throughout Latin America.

Kissing Bugs are insects, and like other members of this group, they have three body parts: the head, the thorax, and the abdomen. Each one of these body parts has a specific purpose, with the head being the area where the eyes and feeding appendages are, the thorax is where the legs and wings are attached, and the abdomen is where the majority of the internal organs are housed. Also like others in the insect group, the skeletal structure is on the outside of their body. This structure is known as the exoskeleton. They have six legs, as well as two pairs of wings and two antennae.

The head, thorax, abdomen, and legs of this particular species of "bug" are colored primarily black. The two lengthy wings are also dark colored, although they more often than not are bejeweled with orange-yellow bars around the edges.

This insect is a small species, only reaching a total length of about one inch or so. Its legs are long and spindly, particularly the hind legs. It has two compound eyes, each one positioned on either side of the elongated head. The mouthparts are also quite large and distinctive, and are generally curved and folded in between the forelegs.

Although it requires small amounts of moisture, as do all creatures, this variety of insect thrives in desert flats and mesas, particularly areas of lower elevation. Due to this habitat dwelling, the Kissing Bug generally restricts its movements to the coolness of the evening hours.

The vast majority of the members of this family are highly predatory, utilizing their extendable mouthparts to overpower smaller insect prey. However, the Kissing Bug found another niche to obtain its food. Unlike other species of Assassin Bugs, the Kissing Bug is a parasitic type that feeds on the blood of mammals, including humans. The common name comes not from an affectionate response that this animal has, but rather from the propensity of this animal feeding near the human mouth! Uniquely adapted

to this feeding technique, this bug owns very fine mouthparts that do not cause pain or irritation to its host while it feeds!

Kissing Bugs will utilize their mouthparts to penetrate the skin of its mammal host, inject its saliva that contains an anti-coagulant to prevent the blood from clotting, and will gorge themselves much akin to a mosquito. The native variety will then leave the host to search for a resting area.

However, there are now reports that the species from further south have begun to invade these desert areas, and it is this species that is of concern. This variety, after feeding, will then defecate in the area where the hosts' skin was penetrated. This defecation frequently carries a pathogen that causes Chagas Disease. It is estimated that between 7 and 8 million people have Chagas Disease, and the vast majority of those infected reside primarily in Latin America.

Of course, the phenomenon of the internet has recently spread oodles of fear as people post (mis) information about this well-adapted creature. But this is a prime example of how citizen science can certainly assist with real research. This animal, and its natural movements, are of interest to a multitude of scientists, and if one is observed, please contact the Texas A&M research team at kissingbug@cvm.tamuedu. Oh, and don't pucker up!

APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION. Village of Salado, P.O. Box 219, Salado, Texas 76571, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a renewal of Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. WQ0010884001, which authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 50,000 gallons per day. TCEQ received this application on May 31, 2016.

The facility is located at 401 South Stagecoach Road, Salado, in Bell County, Texas 76571. The treated effluent is discharged directly to Salado Creek in Segment No. 1243 of the Brazos River Basin. The designated uses for Segment No. 1243 are high aquatic life use, public water supply, aquifer protection, and primary contact recreation. The aquifer protection use applies to the contributing, recharge, and transition zones of the Edwards Aquifer for Segment No. 1243. However, this discharge facility is not located in any of the listed zones. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revisions.

The TCEQ Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The Executive Director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The permit application, Executive Director's preliminary decision, and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at Salado Village Hall, 301 North Stagecoach Road, Salado, Texas. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ holds a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. **Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision.** A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period and, the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. **If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material water quality concerns submitted during the comment period. TCEQ may act on an application to renew a permit for discharge of wastewater without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.**

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The Executive Director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed. Venus and Saturn are low in the west, right after sunset. We say goodbye to Saturn later this month, as it passes around the sun and into the morning sky. A waxing crescent moon

(25 percent illuminated) is located near Mars. The planet Neptune is high in the south, in the constellation Aquarius. Uranus is low in the eastern sky, wandering around in the constellation Pisces.

The Scorpion Cluster (M52) is an open cluster of just under 200 stars located between the constellations Cassiopeia

(the Queen) and Cepheus (the King). Cassiopeia is made up of bright stars and resembles the letter W. Cepheus is larger and looks like a tall house, but its stars are not as bright. M103 is an open cluster in Cassiopeia and is 8000 light years distant. Herschel's Garnet Star, aka Erakis, is a distinctly reddish star located in south-

ern Cepheus.
