Bill to buy out Village admin top \$100,000

The Village of Salado announced Nov. 14 that it had “reached mutually acceptable terms” with Kim Foutz and had executed an exit agreement with the Village Administrator.

The cost of that exit has exceeded \$100,000, almost 10 percent of the total annual budget for the Village.

It is not clear whether Foutz will be the last to go from Village employment. According to the agenda for the 6:30 p.m. Nov. 17, aldermen will meet in executive session with its attorney to discuss three personnel items:

- “the legal requirements for the operation of the police department.”
- “the legal requirements for the operation of the municipal court.”
- “the employment, evaluation, duties, and discipline of the Maintenance Worker for the Village of Salado.”

The cost of severing the employment of Foutz through the unilateral severance includes paying a full year’s salary of \$80,000, payment of any unused vacation and sick/personal days and continuing health insurance benefit for a period of six months or until the administrator obtains other employment and insurance. The health insurance benefit could cost as much as \$3,102.

In addition to the severance amount, Foutz was placed on paid administrative leave by aldermen on Sept. 15. The paid administrative leave ended on Nov. 7, accounting for 296 work hours of a 2080 work year. At a rate of \$38.46 per work hour, the cost of administrative leave will total \$11,384.62.

According to the employment agreement, Foutz was entitled to 144 hours of vacation/personal time per year. *Salado Village Voice* requested from city attorney Linda Sjogren a total number of hours of vacation and sick time available to Foutz at the time of the severance.

In contracting with Bojorquez and Associates to conduct the investigation into Foutz, the Village spent \$6,778.50 in the month of September for legal services related to Foutz’ employment. *Salado Village Voice* has requested the legal invoices for the month of October, but those invoices are being redacted as of press

time.

Aldermen on Oct. 13 voted to contract with Texas First Source to provide David Miller as the Interim City Manager with the final terms to be determined by the Mayor and Texas First Source. The village will pay \$50 per hour for those services with Miller working approximately three days per week for a weekly cost of \$1,200. He began work on Nov. 1, according to the contract.

While the Village contracts with Texas First Source for city manager services, it will begin the process of hiring a new city administrator. How long that process will take and what that process will be is unclear at this time.

On Oct. 6, aldermen voted unanimously to “invoke the Unilateral Severance provisions in the employment contract with Village Administrator Kim Foutz and authorize the Mayor and City Attorney to take any necessary action including extending her administrative leave with pay until the effective date of the severance,” which was Nov. 7.

Prior to that, on Sept. 15, the board voted 5-1 with Dave Williams voting against “to place Village Administrator Kim Foutz on administrative leave with pay for a period not to exceed 30 days under terms set by the Mayor, in order for the Mayor or his designees to conduct an investigation into complaints against the Administrator and to determine if the Administrator’s employment contract should be terminated for Good Cause.” Immediately following that vote, Mayor Skip Blancett announced that aldermen McDougal and Fred Brown would conduct the investigation into complaints against Foutz.

The following week after a two-and-a-half hour executive session Sept. 22, Mayor Blancett announced that “on the advice of the Village attorney, legal counsel will conduct the investigation into complaints against the Village Administrator. The attorneys will report back to the BOA on or before October 6, 2016. In addition, he said that, on advice of the attorney, officials and employees of the Village should not comment on the ongoing investigation of the Village Administrator.”

Weapons ordinance draft will add missiles, including arrows, to ban

Salado aldermen will consider amending the Weapons Ordinance to include missiles of any type. The board will consider the amendment to the Weapons Ordinance at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 17.

Earlier this year, the Deer Committee appointed by the Board of Aldermen encouraged the hunting of deer on private property by licensed bowhunters. With no local ordinance making the use of

bow and arrows within the city limits unlawful, bow-hunting was seen by some as one answer to controlling the population of whitetail deer in the Village.

Aldermen adopted an ordinance making the feeding of whitetail deer illegal and punishable by fines.

The draft Weapons ordinance will add the following to the sections on Specifics: “(5) Missiles: a missile is any projectile ejected from a weapon and

designed to cause bodily injury or death to a person or animal including but not limited to arrows or rocks.”

The Village had been pursuing an additional 300 Land Management Permits to allow for the extra take of whitetail deer within the limits of the Village, but the proposed amendment appears to be a reversal of encouraging hunting of whitetail deer as a solution to the growing population in Salado.

Under Section 3 of the

Weapons Ordinance, “it shall be unlawful for any person to discharge, fire, or shoot any firearm, explosive weapon missile, or sip gun of any description within the Village limits.

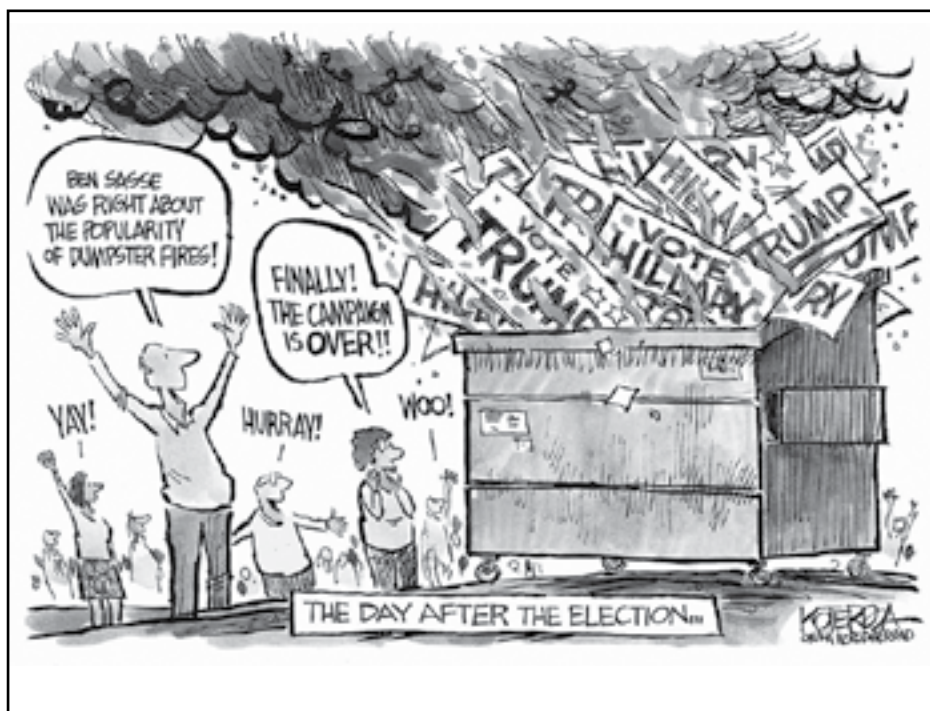
Further, “it shall be unlawful for any person to discharge, fire or shoot any firearm, explosive weapon, missile, or zip gun, of any description in any public place, on or across any public right-of-way, or across any property line within the Village limits.”

President Obama's stinging rebuke

In the course of about six hours, what was supposed to be a Republican existential crisis turned into a Republican wave.

What was supposed to be a victory of the coalition of the ascendant became a dispiriting rout of the coalition that didn't show up.

What was supposed to be the crowning political achievement of Barack Obama's presidency set the predicate for the unraveling of his legacy.

Since before he was elected president, Obama put down as a marker the transformational example of Ronald Reagan. That entailed moving the political center of gravity of the country in his direction; winning re-election; and cementing his standing by securing a de facto third term for a Democratic successor.

As of 7 p.m. EST Tuesday, the Reagan standard looked to be in Obama's grasp. His approval rating stood above 50 percent. He campaigned vigorously, and apparently effectively, in front of adoring crowds. The last round of public polling and the exit polls on Election Day showed Hillary Clinton getting over the top, and her victory seemed likely to precipitate an ugly, self-destructive Republican civil war. By the wee hours of Wednesday, this scenario turned to ashes, and

Obama could only survey the wreckage of the Democratic Party and, by extension, his highest ambition.

Obama is a once-in-a-generation political athlete who will always be remembered as the nation's first African-American president. But a goodly portion of what he has labored for over two terms could now wash out with the political tide.

What happened? From the beginning, President Obama pushed the left-most plausible agenda without regard to political consequences. His signature initiative, Obamacare, was forced through Congress despite its manifest unpopularity and with the crucial assistance of obvious falsehoods. When Obama's initial legislative overreach cost him his congressional majorities, he proceeded with executive overreach, especially on environmental regulation and immigration.

Having made no real effort at party-building and after a series of disastrous midterms where his campaigning basically saved no one, he had no protege available to try to win his third term. He

had to reach back to his vanquished rival, Hillary Clinton, whose inadequacies he had exposed in the 2008 primaries and who was almost comically ill-suited to energize the Obama coalition.

Those voters were considered Obama's enduring political contribution -- an ever-growing bloc of minorities, millennials and the college-educated who would constitute an ideological ratchet, turning the country's politics steadily to the left.

In its first big post-Obama test, the coalition failed. Now many of the president's substantive achievements are under threat, especially Obamacare, which is in a semicrisis, and his vast number of unilateral actions. President Trump will soon pick up his own pen and phone.

President Obama's party is lurching toward a bloodletting after losing to perhaps the least likely presidential candidate in all of American history.

Nothing is permanent in politics, and victories often carry the seeds of future defeats. But elections are always clarifying. We now know that President Obama's larger project has come a cropper. He is no Ronald Reagan, not even close.

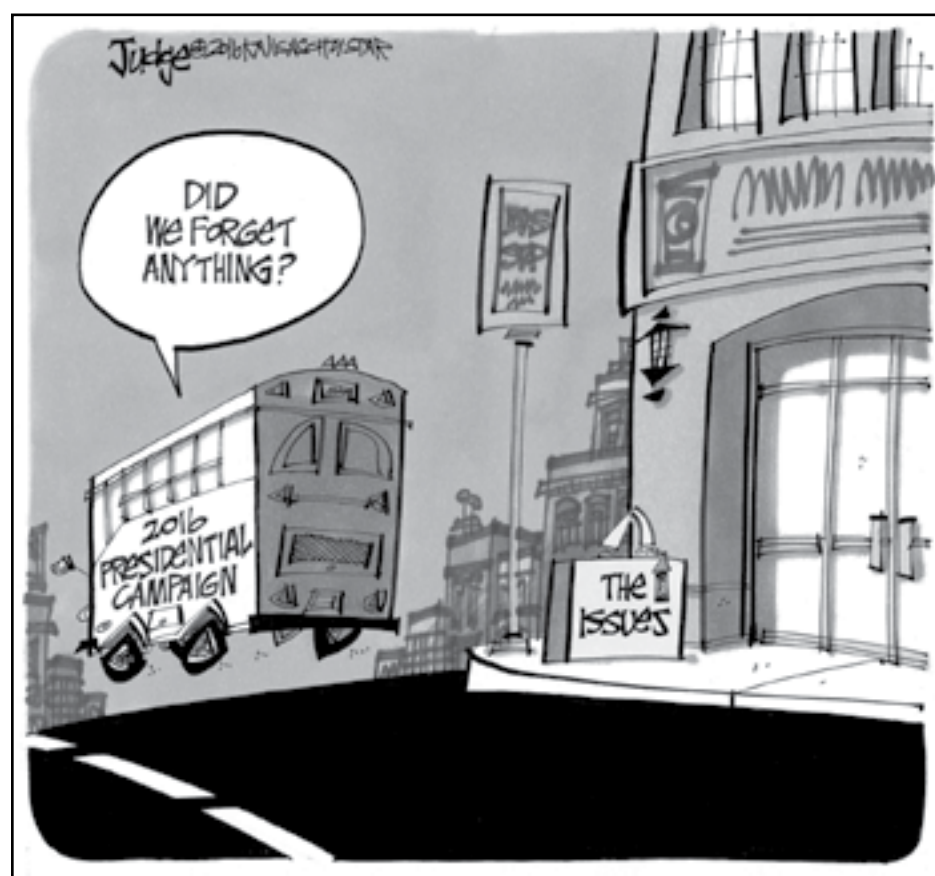
ative of Salado who majors in helping others.

Texas needs to fix its school funding issues

Our current school funding system in Texas is inadequate. The State Legislature cut public education funding by \$5.4 during the 2011 legislative session. It did restore some of that funding during the 2013 and 2015 legislative sessions, however, after adjusting for inflation, Texas currently provides less funding per student than it did in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009, and 2010. Texas is ranked #44 out of the 51 states (including the District of Columbia) in per student funding.

Our current school funding system in Texas is also inequitable. Some districts receive thousands of dollars more per student in funding than other districts. For example, the Salado school district receives \$5,761 in funding per Weighted Average Daily Attendance (WADA). The average of all school districts in Texas is \$6,264 in funding per WADA. If we were funded at the state average, we would receive an additional \$1,067,494 per year.

About half of the school districts in Texas are funded above the state average. One example of this is the Jarrell school district as it receives \$6,720 in funding per WADA. If we were funded at the same level as Jarrell, we would receive an additional \$2,035,241 per year. Thus, if one of our students in Salado moves to the Jarrell school district, that student is immediately worth over \$1,100 more in funding per year. Our students should receive the same funding per student, regardless of which district they attend.

We provide our students an excellent education with our limited resources. However, if we received more state funding we could provide our students even better class sizes, curricular and extracurricular programs,

transportation, and facilities. It would also enable us provide more competitive salaries for our employees, especially our teachers, in order to continue to recruit and retain the very best faculty to work with our students.

The Texas State Legislature will be meeting this January through May and they will have the opportunity to fix our inadequate and inequitable school finance system. I encourage you to contact our new State House Representative and State Senator regarding this topic:

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House Bill 62 changes distracted driver behavior to keep eyes on the road

It's been six years since I first started working on legislation to address traffic safety issues posed by Texans using their cell phones while driving.

While almost 100 cities across the state have adopted ordinances and 46 states have adopted laws to address cell phone use while driving, Texas does not have a statewide law. It is shocking to me that Texas is one of four states without a distracted driving law.

This upcoming 85th legislative session of the Texas Legislature, I am determined to see a statewide law enacted in an effort to reduce damages, injuries and deaths due to distracted driving crashes. Other states with laws have seen a reduction in distracted driving crashes, while Texas has seen an increase.

I have filed House Bill 62 for the most fundamental purpose of protecting lives.

I am proud to propose this bill again during this upcoming 85th Texas Legislative Session. The bill will create a traffic violation for smart-phone use while driving. With few exceptions, the law would not allow a driver to read, write or send electronic messages while driving.

Distracted driving is an epidemic in Texas and we must pass a law to address this life-threatening habit and change this dangerous driver behavior.

Named for Alex Brown, House Bill 62 is truly representative of all Texas victims and families of victims whose lives have been forever changed because of a distracted driving crash.

Distracted driving crashes have struck too close to home. Unfortunately, it is becoming far too commonplace to personally know someone -- a family member, a friend, a co-worker or fellow college student -- who has been involved in a distracted driving crash.

No longer is it a random newspaper article recounting the harrowing details of a distracted driving crash of a young family where the parents died and the kids survived to be forever wheelchair bound. It is your co-worker in that article.

No longer is it an obscure Facebook re-share post memorializing a much-loved teacher from an unknown high school who died in a distracted driving crash. It is your sisters' story on that post.

No longer is it a pass-by flyer for a 5K run in honor of the death of an unknown neighborhood kid struck down by a dis-

tricted driver. It is your son who ran across the street chasing a ball.

The victim is now someone we personally know.

All Texans are feeling the pain of damage, injury, or loss of life and are calling for action by the Texas Legislature to enact legislation that will prevent these irresponsible crashes, unnecessary tragedies, preventable injuries, and needless deaths.

Lawmakers have a responsibility and an obligation to protect Texans lives.

We must put safety regulations in place that will prevent our TxDOT contractors from being struck while working to improve our roadways. We must pass a law that will protect our blind pedestrians from being run over by a distracted driver cutting the curb too close. We must enact legislation that will protect our precious children from the distracted drivers on the roadways.

Only with House Bill 62 will we help to change driver behavior and keep their eyes focused on the task of driving.

This session, I am more committed than ever to give our Texas drivers safer roads; I am determined to be a voice for the distracted driving victims and families of victims; and I am extremely motivated to enact legislation that will prevent any loss of life.

Together with the help of my fellow lawmakers, Chairman Byron Cook, Chairman Charlie Geren, Vice-Chairman Eddie Lucio, and Representative Gene Wu, this is the year we enact a statewide law on distracted driving.

This is the session that the Texas Legislature finally understands the victims' and the families' pain.

The last time the Salado Eagles got to the Area round of the football playoffs, they gave former head coach Jeff Cheatham a near-perfect 13-1 record, eventually losing in the State Semi-finals to Tatum.

Salado beat La Grange Leopards in the bi-district

round by the slimmest of margins Nov. 11, when the Eagles defense stopped the Leopards on a two-point try in overtime. The Eagle defense had stopped the Leopards just minutes earlier when La Grange took advantage of a defensive penalty and fresh set of downs inside the Salado 15 yard line with just over a minute left in regulation.

The Eagle defense stiffened, as it had just before to force La Grange to settle for the field goal, which was declared good and tied the game at 28-28. La Grange elected to accept an offside penalty against Salado, moving the ball inside the 15 yard line. The Leopards could not con-

vert the new set of downs into a touchdown. Instead, La Grange settled for a 23 yard Migual Ramirez field goal with 29 seconds left on the regulation clock.


Salado got the ball first in overtime and scored in two plays, a run by Trey Sheppard to put the ball at the five. Aaron Torczynski bulled the ball in from there. Jake Walrath kicked the extra point, giving Salado a 35-28 lead.

The Leopards responded, scoring on a 13 yard run by quarterback Colter Sipak. The Leopards lined up to kick the extra point and instead went for two. Parker Seaton put pressure

on Ryan Cooper, causing him to throw the ball away and giving Salado the one point win 35-34.

The Eagles fought back from a two-touchdown deficit to tie the game at 14-14 in the first half.

La Grange scored touchdowns in the first and second quarters. Sip-tak, who carried the ball for 120 yards and threw for 52 yards, scored on a five yard run in the first. Ramirez kicked the PAT for a 7-0 lead.

Jericho Haardt scored on a two yard run in the second quarter. He had 83 yards rushing on 18 carries for the Leopards. The PAT gave La Grange a 14-0 lead.

Salado answered with two rushing TDs in the second quarter. Sheppard scored from six yards out. Jake Walrath kicked the extra point. Torczynski scored from four yards out.

The Eagles had 284 yards on the ground with Torczynski leading all carriers with 152 yards on 14 carries. Jake Harvey had 83 yards on 12 carries and Sheppard had 49 on 11 carries.

Hayden Haire had 64 yards passing on three

completions on six passes.

In an evenly matched game, La Grange had 287 yards on the ground and 52 in the air.

The Leopards took the lead in the third quarter on a 32 yard field goal by Ramirez.

The Eagles got their first lead of the game early in the fourth on a one yard dive by Sheppard and Walrath kick to go up 21-17.

Cade Depoy picked up a La Grange fumble and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown. Walrath's kick gave the Eagles a 28-17 lead.

But La Grange answered with a 25 yard touchdown run by Santana Herrera. Cooper hit Travis Ferley for a two-point conversion to bring the score to 28-25.

The Leopards tied the game with less than half a minute left on the 23 yard chip shot by Ramirez.

The Eagles will face the #10 Bellville Brahmas in the Area Round. Bellville beat Orangefield 45-21 in the Bi-District round. Kick off is 7:30 p.m. Nov. 19 at Round Rock ISD Stadium in the Reeves Athletic Complex.

Bellville is 8-2 on the year and Champions of

District 11. Mac Briscoe led the Brahmas to the win with 242 yards rushing on 25 carries with three touchdowns. Briscoe is a powerhouse runner who has had nine games with more than 100 yards rushing and seven games with more than 200 yards rushing. He has carried the ball 237 times for 2,047 yards on the ground and 27 TDs.

Don't expect much passing as the Brahmas have just 634 yards passing and 3,697 on the ground.

With two powerhouse rushing teams, the Area round may end being decided by which team has the ball last and which team commits fewer turnovers.

With the exception of the Giddings and Connally matchup, District 9-4A Div. II got the best of its District 10 counterparts. In addition to the Salado win, Lorena beat Gonzales 48-3 and Robinson beat Caldwell 77-59. Giddings beat Connally 41-18.

Lorena (8-3) will face Liberty (9-2) in the Area round on Nov. 18 in College Station. Robinson (9-2) plays #1 West Orange-Stark (11-0) at the Woodforest Bank Stadium in Shenandoah on Nov. 18.

Husung home featured on Salado Historical Society Tour of Homes

Flanked by grand Mill Creek homes, Jack Husung's residence at 609 Willow Creek Drive, is nevertheless almost invisible. The home is secluded within a forest of great trees and virtually encircled by native stone walls. This showcase house on the Salado Historical Society's Tour of Homes is a contemporary California-style house of redwood and stone, with a Spanish concrete tile roof.

Approached by a circular drive, the iron gates open to stone steps that lead to the large carved doors. The square foyer, which looks down into the living room, displays a chest which belonged to the former owners.

From the foyer, a hall runs the width of the house. At one end is the master suite and at the other the kitchen. The living room and dining room are a step down from the hallway. The living room's ceiling is 25 feet high at its center, providing ample room for a 12-foot Christmas tree, its glitter reflected in tall windows that look out to the pool area. The fireplace wall of the same native stone of the house's exterior, background for a massive wreath, rises to the ceiling's highest point. Oversized furniture pieces are dwarfed by the height and breadth of the room.

French doors open to the pool at the back of the expansive property. Stone walls, wrought-iron, water features, and statuary complement overhanging trees and climbing ivy. All of the garden is filled with myriads of twinkle lights.

Woodwork throughout the house is a refined version of exterior, clear heart redwood left in its natural color but highly lacquered. Floors on the first floor are Mexican tile.

The dining room is on an angle just off the entry and in sight of the kitchen. A long refectory table surrounded by dining chairs,

centers the area. A large bronze stag, purchased during a recent trip to Aspen, CO, is a proud centerpiece on the table. The area's compact size is deceiving, Husung says, as he recently hosted 26 dinner guests comfortably. A huge Welsh side piece holds a collection of Spode china in the Woodlands pattern. Borrowing from this theme, pheasant feathers peek out of floral arrangements and are spotted among the Christmas tree ornaments in both living and dining rooms.

Kitchen cabinetry is light pickled wood, a dramatic contrast to the satin brown of redwood elsewhere. Textured walls are brown, counters are creamy-white tile and appliances are stainless steel. A deck is reached by doors from the dining room and kitchen.

The master suite features a king-size bed, luxuriously dressed, set against chocolate brown walls, lightly textured, and a fireplace-centered sitting area where leather chairs and ottoman create an inviting ambiance. A slender tree, standing at tall windows opening to the patio and pool, sparkles under its trove of Waterford crystal ornaments. A chest displays multiple Santas, trees and other seasonal figures, also of Waterford crystal.

The accompanying bath boasts a spa tub, a steam shower, a sauna, mirrored walls, white tile and crystal lighting.

Off the hallway is a guest powder room. Spode plates in Woodland Stream pattern are arranged on the walls. Colors here, as throughout the house, are gold, green and deep red.

Upstairs are two bedrooms, each with its own bath. These rooms are decorated especially for Husung's children. The hall between the room displays wall hangings from Guatemala, intended, perhaps, to make the little ones feel at

home. The boy's room is in the traditional primary blue, red and yellow combination. A Christmas tree with Noah's Ark figures sits on a small table. An iron crib, numerous toys, a colorful rug, and a child-size chair slip-covered in blue denim with "Jackson" embroidered on it fill the room.

Maria's room is designated similarly, but on a hot pink chair. White provincial furniture, richly trimmed linens of lime and shocking pink, "Choochoo dolls" known in Guatemala as "pets," await the room's young occupant. Her Christmas tree holds hot pink, vivid lime and crystal ornaments.

At the end of the connecting hall is a large den, featuring a copper wood-burning chamber flued through a tile fire wall. A 12-foot tree is laden with over 100 Christopher Radko ornaments. Greenery and glittered baubles form a garland draped around a gold framed mirror. Leather chairs face the corner fireplace, and an antique hobby house with yarn mane and tail stands nearby.

Contract Bridge

The chief purpose of a pre-emptive bid is to make things difficult for the opponents. The bid is made in the hope that the opponents, who presumably have the balance of strength, will get fouled up in the bidding.

Consider this deal where East opened three diamonds and South doubled for take-out. West passed, and North responded four clubs. South understandably retreated to four hearts, and West just as understandably doubled.

Declarer won the diamond lead with the ace and played the queen of trumps. West took his ace and led a second diamond. East won and returned the eight of spades, whereupon West played the Q-A and led a third spade for East to ruff. East returned a club to West's ace, and West later scored the jack of trumps to defeat the contract four tricks -- 1,100 points!

Procyon lotor (Raccoon)

Raccoons are rotund animals

Many times, animals are given human emotions such as anger, mischief, or even love by people who desire to have something in common with the natural world around them. The proper term for this is anthropomorphism. This column is not the avenue to debate whether this is a true assessment for animals or not. However, the almost personable Raccoon is one such animal that even the most diehard anti-anthropomorphismist has to concede displays some attributes that can be construed as mischievous behavior.

Raccoons (Procyon lotor) are one of the many species of animals that can be observed throughout Texas, although they occur more commonly

in the eastern two-thirds of this great state. They inhabit a wide variety of habitats, ranging from marshes and bottomland swamps in the east, corn and maize farmlands in the Panhandle, thornscrub in south Texas, and the high elevation areas of the Chihuahuan Desert mountains in the Trans-Pecos. The most common denominator in these natural habitats is water availability, and their distribution is heavily influenced by its presence.

Raccoons are a medium-sized mammal that can be easily identified by two very distinctive morphological characteristics. The first is the black facial mask that is made prominent by the white outlining surrounding it. The second is the black and brown banded bushy tail that is just less than one foot in length. The body, which is just over two feet in length, and the head are both covered with coarse grayish fur that is sprinkled with orange along the

spine and black throughout the rest of the upper fur. They have five toes on each foot and the tracks that are made are easy to identify as the entire back foot touches the ground when they walk. Raccoons are rotund animals, with adult animals weighing as much as twenty eight pounds.

Raccoons are highly nocturnal, and their nightly forays will generally begin when the sun sets and will not end until the sun reappears the following morning. Their activity during the daylight hours is limited to resting in their dens that are usually located in secretive areas such as rock ledges or in tree trunks. They are primarily solitary, although occasionally females will gather in groups of two or three individuals. Mating season is annual and can begin as early as February, although studies have shown that most females mate in March and give birth to as many as 4 young in late April or early May. The young are born with a ring less tail and with their eyes closed and they will often stay with the mother for as long as a year after their birth. Most Raccoons live less than five years in the wild. Their primary predator is man, and raccoons are the most important furbearer in the state economically.

These mammals are omnivorous, meaning

they will eat both plant and animal matter. During times of abundant food sources, they will be selective, while in times of scarcity they will devour just about anything. Fruits and acorns make up well over fifty percent of the diet, while insects, small mammals, and birds constitute the remainder. They do not hibernate, but rather will utilize whatever fat they have stored in their bodies while they remain in their den for several days during the coldest portions of the year.

The distinctive mask of the Raccoon gives it an almost mischievous look about it, a personable characteristic that is shown by its uncanny behavior to view human trash as a viable and significant portion of their diets. Feeding on the refuse placed in trash receptacles is only part of the problem. Many raccoons have also developed the troublesome habit of utilizing attics and storage buildings as den sites, placing them in direct contact with humans. Most state and natural parks consider them pests, as do the majority of municipal animal control departments. When natural areas are colonized by humans, many times the effects on the native wildlife can be devastating. Most animals are incapable of adapting to the "new" intrusion, while a few other species seem to almost thrive in the altered conditions. Raccoons are one of the few examples of adaptation at its finest, for they have thrived in the residential areas of even the largest cities.
