Weapons ordinance may prohibit arrows, bolts inside Village

If aldermen adopt the amended Weapons Ordinance at their 6:30 p.m. Dec. 8 meeting, the discharge of arrows and/or bolts will be prohibited within the limits of the Village of Salado.

Alderman Dave Williams discussed the process for the recommended change to the current Firearms Ordinance, which will be renamed the Weapons Ordinance, during a Town Hall meeting attended by about a dozen citizens Dec. 5.

Several requests came in to the Village office asking for aldermen to make hunting deer with bows and arrows illegal in the Village.

The requests came after a Letter to the Editor of the *Salado Village Voice* in early fall by Dr. Lewis Raney stating that "Archery Season (Deer) opens Oct. 1 and ends Nov. 4 ... "Yes, bow hunting in and around Salado is legal. Safety and shooting with caution is always the daily thought process. No one without training should be shooting in the city limits or highly populated areas!"

Dr. Raney in the letter pointed out that the limit per hunter is two does and two bucks. "I would encourage hunters to leave the beautiful bucks in our city. It is well known that this -- Bow Hunting -- is the cheapest way to help control the overpopulation of Deer. One company has advised us that their charge for sharpshooting will be \$250 per deer. This does include processing for the needy. I would also encourage hunters in Bell County to donate as many of their deer as possible to the needy."

Finally, Raney stated in the Letter to the Editor that the Texas Parks & Wildlife suggested "that Salado harvest 300 deer this year."

"Although the City is working on plans," he stated. "they don't have the money to pay for such a task. Most of the harvest this year will need to be accomplished by individuals and professionals that volunteer."

"Management of our

overpopulation of white tails will be a yearly ongoing issue," Dr. Raney stated in his letter.

Shortly after that letter appeared, Salado became pockmarked with "No Kill Zone" signs in the yards of local residents and businesses.

"Those signs were more of a political statement than anything else," one resident said during the Town Hall meeting. "People are against bow-hunting in the Village."

"This isn't about deer hunting," Alderman Williams said. "This is about the discharge of bows and arrows in the Village."

Other than the statement by Kathy Michaels in a Nov. 24 Letter to the Editor that she found five arrows on her Main Street property, there have been no complaints filed with the Village of Salado police about arrows crossing property lines. One complaint was made about a person who was target shooting on his own private property, but the arrows never crossed the property line.

Other anecdotal evidence of hunters has appeared across the social media spectrum, but little evidence of any actual deer hunting within the Village limits -- especially illegal hunting across public roads and property lines as propagated by some social media posts -- has appeared.

Police chief Jack Hensley told *Salado Village Voice* that he has had only one complaint of illegal deer hunting in the Village and it was not proved.

As fall moves into winter, residents have reported seeing fewer deer in the Village. Some have attributed this to the publicized and highly-discussed hunting of deer. However, according to grandviewoutdoors.com, the decrease in the sightings of deer in the fall and winter months is more likely attributable to the white tail deer's instinct to survive the colder weather than to hunting within the Village.

"Whitetails will hide out in dense cover, preferably on the south side of steep hills, to shield themselves from cold," the website states. "Cedar thickets or pine plantations

are classic deer shelters."

The regulation prohibiting the feeding of deer may have some effect on the numbers, or lack thereof, of deer being seen this fall. Proving that a decrease in the number of deer is attributable to the ban on feeding would be hard to do since there is no baseline number. The deer count conducted by Village volunteers was done after the deer feeding prohibition came into effect.

"Around prime feeding areas, so long as the food lasts, deer will yard-up, standing rump-to-shoulder in a maze of bodies," the website states. If the prime feeding areas are no longer there, the deer will likely disperse in search of forage.

Regardless of evidence in either direction -- that there is a lot of hunting going on in the Village or that there is no hunting going on in the Village -- if aldermen adopt the changes Weapons Ordinance, it will in effect make hunting within the Village illegal (because it is already illegal to discharge a firearm of any kind).

However, the prohibition will not apply to animal control officers, destroying a dangerous animal (defined in health and safety code), toy archery equipment, or the discharge of a weapon on a tract of land of 10 acres or more. The tract of land must be more than 1,000 feet from the property line of a public tract of land used for sports and recreation, or a school, day-care hospital or 600 feet from the property line of a residential subdivision or multi-family complex or 150 from a residence of occupied building located on another property.

While the changed Weapons Ordinance may appease those opposed to bowhunting of deer within the Village of Salado, it will not address the initial problem of the growing population of white tail deer in a residential, populated environment.

With the exception of the prohibition on feeding deer, the Village has examined but not pursued options laid out to it by experts from the Texas Parks and Wildlife and other

New rules for historic structures could be added

Salado aldermen will consider amending its Zoning Ordinance Dec. 8 to change the permitting process for construction in the Historic District.

Rather than issuing a building permit for historic structures that are identified in the Historic District, the ordinance puts in place a process for issuing a Certificate of Appropriateness.

The Certificate of Appropriateness applies to a few dozen locations identified as being of historic value within the Historic District.

In order to assure that work on any of the historic

structures in the Historic District conforms to the regulations of the Historic District, a COA is required for any proposed external alterations, sign, demolition, repair, maintenance, new development and/or redevelopment.

All projects shall be reviewed by Village staff, and submitted to the Planning & Zoning Commission for consideration. Denial of a COA by the Planning & Zoning Commission may be appealed to the Board of Aldermen. The Board of Aldermen shall have final approval or denial authority of COA appeals.

The design requirements for a COA can be found in Section 3.15.H of the Zoning Ordinance. "

History strikes back

President Barack Obama won't explicitly say that Donald Trump is on the wrong side of history, but surely he believes it.

The president basically thinks anyone who gets in his way is transgressing the larger forces of history with a capital "H." In 2008, he declared John McCain "on the wrong side of history right now" (the "right now" was a generous touch -- allowing for the possibility that McCain might get right with History at some future date).

Obama has returned to this phrase and argument obsessively. It is deeply embedded in his, and the larger progressive, mind -- and indirectly contributed to the left's catastrophic defeat on Nov. 8.

For the left, History is not a vast, unpredictable, untamable force, but has all the characteristics of a stereotypical Whole Foods shopper. History reads The Huffington Post, and follows Lena Dunham on Twitter. It really cares whether transgender people get to use the appropriate bathroom. History was probably hanging out at the Javits Center on election night, and collapsed into a puddle of tears right around the time Wisconsin was called.

The political dangers of this point of view should now be obvious:

It assumes that cer-

tain classes of people are retrograde. Why would Democrats bother to try to appeal to working-class white voters if they are stamped with the disapproval of History?

It becomes a warrant for all manner of overreach. History evidently favored trying to get nuns to sign up for contraceptives they didn't want and forcing small business to bake cakes for gay weddings.

And, if History is thought to have an ascendant electoral coalition (and a hell of a data operation), it creates an unjustified sense of political inevitability. This is what the theorists of the "emerging Democratic majority," and most pundits on the left, bought into.

All that said, the evidence was pretty good for the proposition that welfare-state programs, once ensconced, could never be reversed and therefore must enjoy the approval of History. This assumption pervaded the Obamacare debate. Sen. Harry Reid lambasted Republicans for not "joining us on the right side of history" and compared them -- of course -- to defenders of slavery.

In retrospect, History might not have been so enamored of sprawling legislation based on faulty economic premises. When Republicans pass a repeal bill, it will constitute the most significant rollback of the welfare state ever.

Another progressive assumption is that the nation-state is bound to decline, as supranational institutions like the European Union grow and cross-border migrations increase. In a trip to Germany in April, President Obama deemed Angela Merkel's policy of welcoming a massive wave of migrants as "on the right side of history." Never mind that its recklessness has caused a backlash that is still brewing. Obama believed the same of his own latitudinarian views on immigration, apparently never imagining people might consider it progress to tighten our borders rather than render them more porous.

Now, a president who so confidently associated himself and his cause with the tide of the future has presided over a political wipeout that will send much of his legacy into the dustbin. If nothing else, History has a keen sense of humor.

A good lesson from Charles Dickens

Charles Dickens wrote in Christmas Carol: "Ghost of the Future, I fear you more than any spectre I have seen. But as I know your purpose is to do me good, and as I hope to live to be another man from what I was, I am prepared to bear you company, and do it with a thankful heart. Will you not speak to me?"

Christmas Parade, 2016, the Ghost of the Future spoke. Main Street was lined with people -- citizens with unknown names and many children.

July 4, 1998, I retired from the Navy and became Pastor, Salado United Methodist Church. Within three years, I knew almost everyone in town. Going for groceries took an hour visiting with everyone. Drivers greeted each other with a wave. Everyone

took their turn on the one-way bridge; no one trying to piggy-back on the car crossing.

Today, new families and friends fill the streets; and grocery shopping is 15-minutes and a nod or looking-away, not a friendly conversation.

I long for the past but this is futile. The changes are here.

As Salado evolves, our traditional spirit does not have to change. Our business is to keep it alive by good actions, wholesome attitudes, and a helping

spirit. It is time to be of one consent -- listening, understanding, forgiving, and re-learning what we have always known -- "No space of regret can make amends for one life's opportunity misused." (Christmas Carol)

When this happens, Dickens correctly predicts the outcome:

"He went to the church, and walked about the streets, and watched the people hurrying to-and-fro, and patted the children on the head, and questioned beggars, and looked down into the kitchens of homes, and up to the windows, and found that everything could yield him pleasure. He had never dreamed of any walk, that anything, could give him so much happiness."



Transfers should decrease, even as enrollment grows

Our student enrollment has increased by 399 students over the past four years:

- 2012 = 1,348
- 2013 = 1,461
- 2014 = 1,556
- 2015 = 1,656
- 2016 = 1,747

Of those 399 additional students, 294 of them (73.7%) moved into our district and 105 of them (26.3%) are additional transfer students that live outside the district and submitted an application to attend our district. We currently have 237 transfer students in our district, which is 13.6% of our total enrollment.

To have their transfer application approved, students need to have good attendance, behavior, and academic performance. Transfer students need to re-apply every school year and will only be accepted if they continue to maintain good attendance, behavior, and academic performance.

In addition to the increased success in academics, athletics, and fine arts, our district has also benefitted financially from these transfer students. We receive the same funding per student, regardless of whether or not they live in the school district. The state revenue generated by our 237 transfer students, which is over \$1.5 million, is much greater than the additional expenditures for these students. Many district expenditures such as maintenance, transportation, utilities, etc. do not increase as a result of

these transfer students. Thus, our transfer students have helped us offset the below-average funding we receive from the state. If we were funded at the state average, our district would receive over \$1 million per year in additional state funding. Without our transfer students, we would not have been able to hire as many teachers, which would actually increase our class sizes. We also would not have been able to increase our compensation plan for our teachers and other employees.

However, as a result of our enrollment growth, our facilities are reaching their capacity. We are now using many of the portable classrooms at the elementary school and the junior high school that weren't needed after the high school was opened in 2008. If we were to continue at our current rate of growth, all of our schools would be out of space within the next few years. However, this year we slowed the growth of transfer student enrollment by closing off many of our grade levels to new transfer students. Of the additional 91 students we have this year, 88 of them moved into our district and

only three of them were additional transfer students.

Last month, our school board voted unanimously to discontinue accepting any new transfer students effective January 1, 2017, with the following four exceptions:

1. Students of new district employees, as this is a great benefit that helps with recruitment and retention
 2. Siblings of current transfer students, to allow families to stay together in the same district
 3. Students of active members of the armed forces, to honor our military and with consideration to our proximity to Fort Hood
 4. Current resident students that becomes non-resident students
- Current transfer students and any new transfer students that meet one or more of these four exceptions will still need to apply annually and meet our criteria (i.e., good attendance, behavior, and academic performance).

As a result of this change, our number of transfer students should decline significantly over

agencies, including other cities that have grappled with the issue.

Community programs that are non-lethal could include Trap and Transport. However, these are expensive and are not always effective. The cost of Trap, Transport and Translocation of deer is estimated by Agrilife extension at \$150 to \$750 per deer. And not all the deer survive that are transported.

Fertility programs are even more expensive, estimated at between \$350 to \$1,100 per female.

Lethal approaches could include trap, transport and process approaches, which cost \$175 to \$350 per deer; individual hunting programs through Land Management plans that cost \$85 to \$300 per deer and sharpshooter programs that cost \$250 or more per deer.

Village officials have stated that they can find no recipients for the TTT permits. Even if they could find a ranch to take the deer, there are few funds available for this program. The Village of Salado set aside \$10,000 for the management of the deer population.

TTP permits are also expensive because of FDA regulations on testing the meat of the deer that will be processed and given away.

Even under the Managed Lands Deer Permits that allow additional hunting by licensed hunters (beyond the two bucks and two does) in an area, the regulatory requirements are very stringent and costly.

The Managed Lands Deer Permit (MLDP) program allows landowners involved in a formal management program to have the state's most flexible seasons and increased harvest opportunities. The program is incentive based and habitat focused.

Participation in the MLDP program requires a written Wildlife Man-

the next few years as many of our current transfer students will graduate, move into the district as resident students, or withdraw from the district because their families moves out of the area. This decrease in transfer students will offset our resident student growth the next few years to provide enough time for us to develop and implement a plan to increase the capacity of our facilities. We will soon be establishing a committee of parents, community members, and employees to help develop this plan.

agement Plan (WMP). The Village has no Wildlife Management Plan at this time.

Texas Parks & Wildlife works with communities to help them establish programs for managing deer populations through both lethal and non-lethal means.

Among the non-lethal approaches are making the landscape less "palatable" to deer through planting of deer-resistant plants and local regulations prohibiting the supplemental feeding of deer, according to a TP&W document "Living with Overabundant White-Tailed Deer in Texas."

"Supplemental feeding cannot increase the carrying capacity of an area," according to the TP&W and Agrilife document. "It can however, artificially sustain populations above the acceptable limits of the natural habitat. In supplementally fed habitats, populations are vulnerable to volatile and unstable population growth and crashes."

The booklet suggests these non-lethal approaches:

- Fencing of at least 8 feet and electric fences to keep deer off of properties.
- Unpalatable Landscape Plants that will cause deer to go to other areas for forage. Forrest W. Appleton in his article "Coping with the deer by the use of deer resistant plants" on the Aggie

horticulture website lists these plants as being not so favored by deer. Visit saladovillagevoice.com for a list of the Unpalatable Landscape Plants.

Other deterrents could include visual, auditory or olfactory. Visual deterrents such as shiny pans, scarecrows, and other items can deter deer from an area, but the deer "quickly habituate to visual deterrent techniques and become less scared of them," according to the Agrilife document.

Noise making devices can do the same, but may be troublesome to neighbors. Deer acclimate to noise as well in the long term.

Odors can be used to repel deer.



Eagles put 6 on First Team All-District

Salado varsity Eagles had their best record in almost a decade under first-year coach Alan Haire.

Accordingly, the Eagles had five offensive and one

defensive players named to the First Team All District, released last week by District 9-4A Div. II coaches. The Eagles also had five offensive players and six defensive players named to the Second Team. Three offensive players and four defensive players earned Honorable Mention.

Senior running back Jake Harvey was named First Team All District. He carried the ball 106 times for 1,104 yards and 16 touchdowns. He averaged 10.4 yards per carry. He also caught 5 passes for 144 yards and three touchdowns.

Willy Whigham followed with 8 points, shooting 2-of-4 at the free throw line.

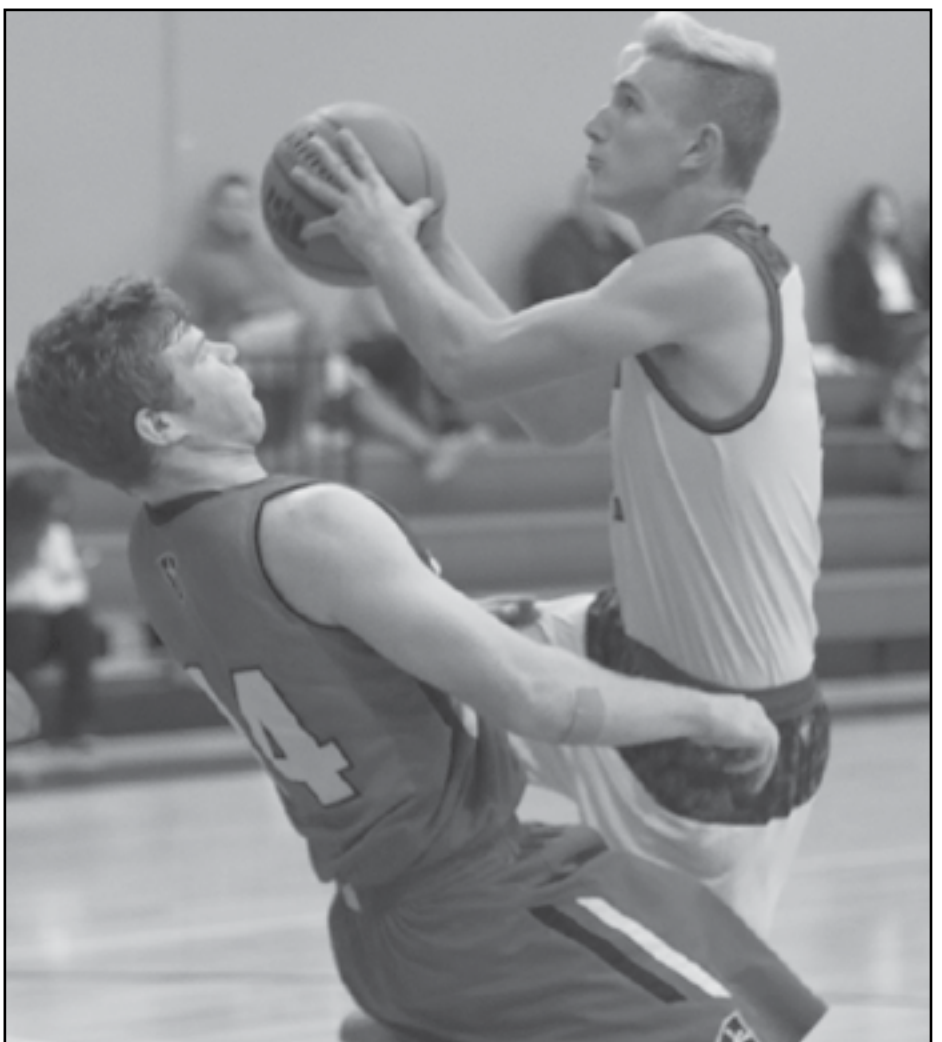

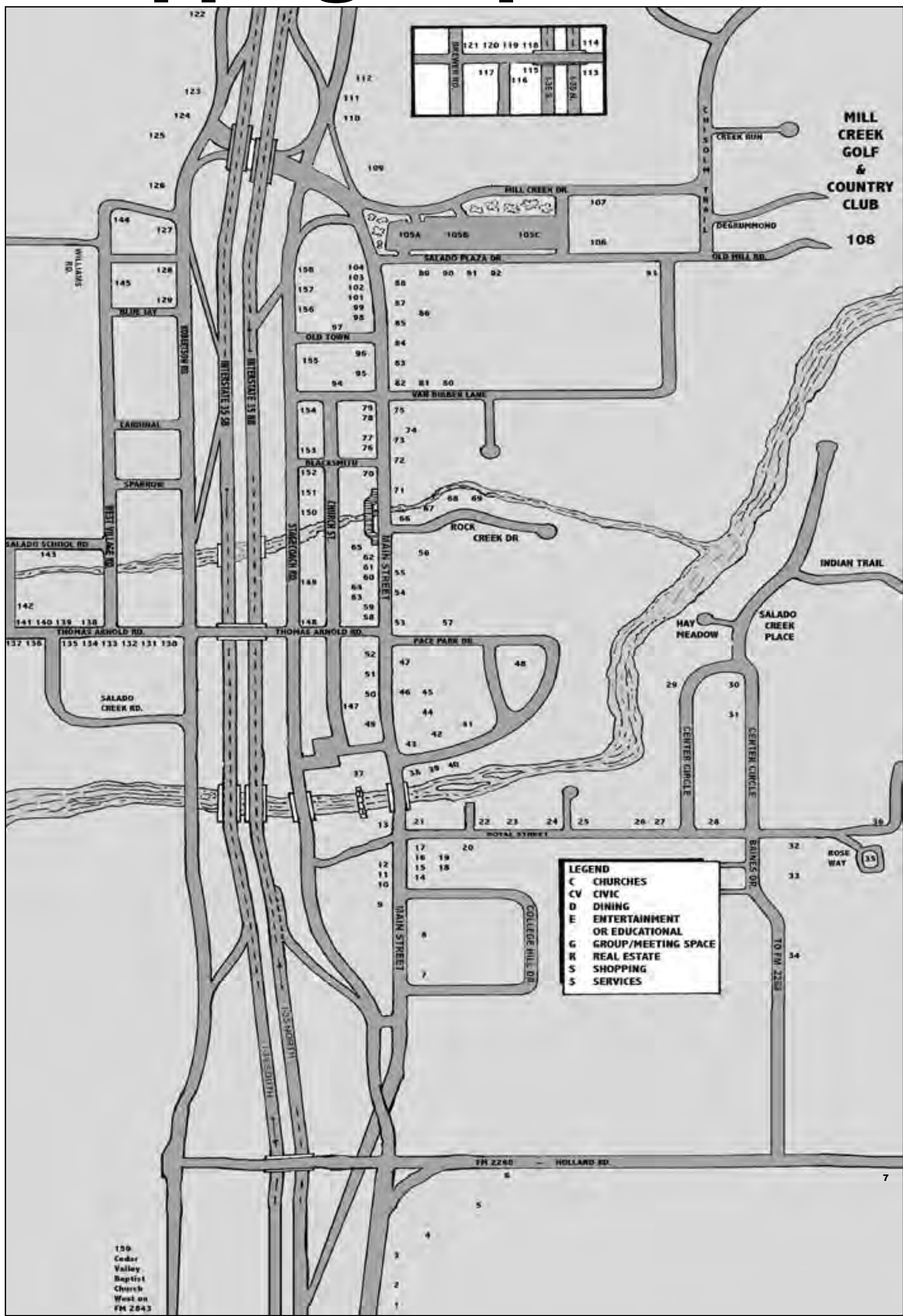

Checkered Garter Snake (Thamnophis marcianus)

Checkered Garter Snakes are harmless to humans

As a general rule, most people have experiences as children that can ultimately define the very essence of who they are as adults. One of the first experiences from memory that shaped my herpetological life happened when I was a mere six years old. We had just moved from the city to the country, and I had read in a book that one of the best ways to find reptiles was to look under debris on the ground. As a curious youngster, I took the advice of that particular book, and encountered my first snake in the wild resting peacefully underneath a fallen log. Even to this day, I still recall the subtle beauty of the bold

checkerboard design and distinctive stripe of my first Checkered Garter snake.

The Checkered Garter snake (Thamnophis marcianus) is a small non-venomous serpent, with most adults reaching sexual maturity between eighteen and twenty four inches in total length. The largest specimen recorded, however, was a whopping 42 inches, but that specimen was definitely an exception to this species size rule. Like most other species in its genus, it has three stripes that run

longitudinally on its body. The most distinctive stripe is the bright yellow one that runs along the spine, while the other two pale lines run lengthwise along the sides on the third scale row above the belly scales. In between the stripes are two rows of bold square shaped dark spots that alternate along the length of the snake, giving this reptile its namesake. The background coloration of the body varies from dark gray to greenish while the head, which is significantly wider than the neck, is olive and un-patterned

save for a small yellow dot that is located near the center.

Most of the garter snake species are rarely encountered far from water, and this one is no exception. However, with its range in Texas being the semi-arid to arid western three quarters of the state, the Checkered Garter snake is far better adapted to living in dry environments than most of the other native garter snakes. It is an abundant snake, thriving in the dry grasslands of the Panhandle as well as in the Tamualipan thornscrub of the southern portion of the state. It is also a common sight throughout the Edwards Plateau and the Trans-Pecos regions. Wherever it occurs, permanent water sources are a must, regardless of how large or small that source may be.

As with almost all other reptiles that reside in temperate climates, they undergo a period of inactivity during the coldest months of the year, allowing sexually mature adults to generate the sperm and eggs necessary for successful reproduction in the spring. However, unlike most other harmless snakes found in Texas, Checkered Garter snakes are oviparous, or live-bearing animals. Mating occurs primarily during the months of April and May, and the young are usually born sometime between late June and mid-August. Litters range in size from as few as three to as many as thirty, although the average litter size is around 13. The delicate babies, who are between 6 and 9 inches in length, typically mimic the adults in color and pattern and are capable of fending for themselves from the moment they are born.

Checkered Garter snakes are diurnal (daytime active) during their foraging activities in the spring and fall, then they become nocturnal when the temperatures of summer reach temperatures too unbearable for most cold-blooded animals. Many are observed crossing roads during and immediately after rainstorms as they search for their primary prey of frogs and toads. Earthworms are also consumed, as well as the occasional lizard. It is because of this diet that many Checkered Garter snakes are found even in urban areas, as many are drawn to gardens in search of prey. However, like the majority of snakes that occur in this state, they are completely harmless to humans.

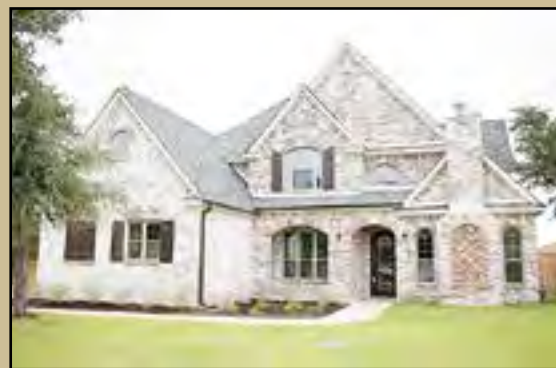
