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Aldermen call for disannexation election

Disannexation of a large portion of Salado will be on the May 6 ballot, as well as a field of seven candidates for three spots on the Village of Salado board of aldermen.

Aldermen voted 4-1 with David Williams voting against to call for the election, despite possible issues with the metes and bounds description of the area to be disannexed.

The possible issue of metes and bounds came up in open session discussion with the Village attorney Linda Sjogren after this reporter stood up in opposition to the board of aldermen retiring into executive session to consult with legal counsel.

Governing boards are allowed to meet with their attorneys in executive session to discuss pending and contemplated litigation. They may also meet in closed session to seek legal advice on any legal matter that may come before the body.

This reporter objected based on the agenda posting of the election items under the regular session when other personnel items were posted under executive ses-

Knowledge of the issue of metes and bounds closing came to the board earlier in the afternoon. It was not known that there were issues when the agenda was posted.

"It is possible a surveyor could take those metes and bounds and could close those boundaries," Linda Sjogren, Village attorney, told alder-

If the measure passes, there could be legal quandaries that could arise from the metes and bounds issue.

"There is case law for annexation, not for disannexation, that says if the metes and bounds don't close, you don't have a described area," Sjogren.

"You are in a bit of a Catch-22," she said. "There's not a real clear decision to be made one way or the other."

David Williams asked Sjogren, "isn't it incumbent upon the applicant to file a complete application" and to make sure the metes and bounds are legal.

"The burden is on them," Sjogren said.

"The downside of approving the election would be getting challenged," Sjogren said. She added that the

The election was called after a group that calls itself FED UP gathered 77 signatures on a petition calling for the disannexation of an area of Salado and presented it to Mayor Skip Blancett Feb. 9.

The disannexation election will be on a ballot on May 6 along with an election for three spots on the board of aldermen.

Early voting will begin April 24. The last day to register to vote is April 6.

Chief. , officer resign from PD; **Sheriff provides added patrol**

Salado police chief Jack Hensley turned in his badge to Mayor Skip Blancett on Feb. 14. A day later, officer Sid Post turned in his resignation from the Salado police department effective immediately.

The departures of the chief and officer leave just one officer in the force for the time being: Josh Tulloch.

Mayor Skip Blancett told Salado Village Voice that the Village will contract with the Bell County Sheriff's Office to provide off-duty personnel to patrol Salado specifically during the time that the Village hires new personnel.

Blancett announced that the Village will advertise the Police Chief position through Texas Municipal League and other websites and begin accepting applications.

It is likely that the Village will have a new city manager in place before the interview process begins for a police chief. (See related story).

Mayor Blancett told Salado Village Voice that he would not comment on personnel issues when we asked why the Chief and officer Post submitted their resigna-

Salado Village Voice called Hensley several times last week for comment from him, but calls were not answered or returned.

Aldermen met in executive session on Feb. 16 to discuss these personnel issues, but took no action when they convened in open session after more than an hour in closed-door session.

The Village hired Hensley in October 2008. He came to Salado from Elgin, where he had served as police chief for that city.

He followed Alan Rogers in that position. Rogers was elected Marshal of Salado when the Village incorporated in 2000. Shortly after, the Village did away with the Marshal position and hired Rogers as its first chief of po-

BOA to interview 3 city administrator finalists

Salado aldermen have called a special session for 11 a.m. on Feb. 23 at the Village Municipal Building to interview three candidates for the City Manager posi-

It appears from the agenda posted online that the presentation and interview of the candidates will be conducted in regular session.

The Village is interviewing Don Ferguson, interim city manager in Wimberley, Dennis Baldwin, interim city manager in Killeen and William Lewis, from Arkansas.

David Miller left his position as interim city man-

ager earlier this month. He serves as executive pastor of a church. "That is where his heart was," Mayor Blancett said.

Miller helped the board to narrow the applicants to a final list of three.

"There is an interim village administrator that is waiting in the wings in case this takes longer than we think," Blancett said. "In talking to Fred Brown today about this, we will decide the 23rd on exactly what we need to do.

"There is a feeling among us and among the two staff here, if they can hold on for a month," they will do so, Blancett said. "Their difficulty in bringing in an interim village administrator is that there is no guarantee they will stay on and if they do, by the time they learn everything there is in the village, guess what? The new full-time city administrator comes on board."

After the interviews, the board will convene into executive session for "Discussion regarding the position of Village Administrator as authorized by Texas Government Code 551.074, Personnel Matters."

Following the executive session, the board will take any action stemming from the interviews in open ses-

After discussions with village staff, Mayor Blancett and aldermen decided against bringing in an interim city manager for such a short time period.

Gift that keeps giving: Stagecoach sewer costs continue rise

In order to complete repairs on the main tank of the Stagecoach sewer, the Village will rent a temporary tank for the location. Whether that temporary tank is part of a temporary pump-andhaul program for the treatment of wastewater for 16 commercial customers or as part of repairing or replacing the damaged main tank will be decided at a later date.

Phase 1, which will tie the sewer to the temporary holding tank, is estimated at \$31,358. The cost of renting the tank is estimated at \$718 plus the monthly cost of pumping and hauling \$800.

"If we get the plant decommissioned in 24 months, which is our plan, we are looking at \$24,000 rather than \$88,000," Alderman Frank Coachman said.

The amount of repairs cannot be determined until the original storage tank is emptied. The cost of removing the old tank and connecting to a new tank (which will have to be removed when the system is decommissioned if and/or when the sewer system is built) is estimated at \$57,628 in addition to the \$31,358 cost of Phase I.

"Disregarding repairs puts the Village at risk should the tanks malfunction, break or leak," Code Enforcement officer Chrissy Lee stated. "This could lead to potential daily fines from TCEQ and the costs of HazMat clean up. These potential costs would far surpass the estimated cost of this repair and potential replacement."

"The worst decision we ever made was taking that water treatment plant," Mayor Blancett said. "There are so many other things.... That is just beyond comprehen-

Then-Mayor Danney Mc-Cort signed a letter on May 13, 2014 to accept the donation of the Stagecoach sewer planet and the donation of two tracts of real property totaling 4.972 acres and the wastewater plant located at 401 South Stagecoach Road.

Aldermen at the time the letter was signed were Shannon Ashe and Bryan Fritch (at the end of their terms and neither seeking re-election) and Fred Brown, Hans Fields and Michael McDougal.

The acceptance letter marked the culmination of six months of negotiations between the Village of Salado and Foster in 2014 to accept the sewer treatment plant that treats water for the Stagecoach Inn and more than a dozen other downtown businesses. The plant has a capacity of 50,000 gallons per day and currently utilizes less than 40 percent of that total capacity.

Under the arrangement at that time, Terry Potts, who owned Stagecoach Inn until July 2015, operated the sewer on behalf of the Village.


"This is an excellent opportunity for Salado to own at little to no cost an established sewage operation that would benefit most of Main

Street and have the opportunity to expand in the future," Foster said at the time of the donation.

A year after the Village accepted the Stagecoach sewer, the largest user of it -- Stagecoach Inn-- closed as new owners have closed the property for a top to bottom renovation of the restaurant, meeting facilities and hotel property.

In the 2015-16 fiscal year, the Village spent \$82,803 in repairs of the Stagecoach sewer system in addition to the operating costs associated with the treatment of sewage from its customers.

Trump Tweet Exposes Judiciary

As you might have heard, Donald Trump tweeted at a judge.

The commentariat shuddered at the effrontery of it, and some worried that the foundations of the separation of powers had been shaken. Trump's slam of Judge James Robart was undeniably crude and ill-considered, but it wasn't a threat to our republic.

In fact, it is a symptom of our distorted and overly sanctified view of the judiciary that a criticism of a judge with a lifetime appointment is greeted with such pearl-clutching. It is entirely appropriate that the political branches have their own view of the law and the Constitution, and robustly contest -- and even deny the legitimacy of -- court decisions that they consider erro-

President Trump will have to go considerably further to come close to Andrew Jackson supposedly saying of a Supreme Court decision protecting the Cherokee Indians in Georgia, "John Marshall has made his decision; now let him enforce it." Or to match the wars waged on uncongenial Supreme Court decisions by Franklin D. Roosevelt and Abraham Lin-

dounds to his great credit. To say that Republicans weren't deferential to the ruling is an understatement for the ages. They alleged a vast conspiracy of Chief Justice Roger Taney and top Democrats to commit offenses "comparable to the worst villainies of recorded history," in the words of one historian.

Everyone would soon enough recognize Dred Scott as a disgrace. At the time, though, supporters of the decision considered it a means to peacefully settle a question tearing the country apart. For his part, Stephen Douglas made an argument that was simple and entirely familiar today: "Shut up, the Supreme Court justices have spoken."

Lincoln allowed that Dred Scott applied to the particular parties to the case; he refused, though, to accept it "as a political rule." This wasn't Lincoln venting during an idle moment in his bathrobe. He devoted a portion of his first inaugural to developing his argument, and he governed as if the Dred Scott decision didn't

It's an odd disconnect that Lincoln is justly considered perhaps the greatest statesman in American history, yet his rejection of judicial supremacy that was so central to his view of our system is roundly ignored.

It is certainly true that presidents defying the court willy-nilly would be a formula for chaos. But you see a Lincolnian political resistance to the court in, for instance, the pro-life movement that won't rest until Roe v. Wade is overturned. The determined opposition to Citizens United is another example, from the left.

The fundamental point is that it is not just the executive or Congress that can abuse its power and overstep its bounds. The courts can, too, and no one is obligated to meekly accept their deci-

If the courts in the end throw out the order, despite the black-and-white letter of the law giving him the authority to block aliens in the interest of national security, it will be a usurpatory act. In that scenario, the courts will have done more violence to our constitutional system than a foolish Trump tweet ever could.



Pollinators are essential for crops

The majority of Americans pay little attention to pollinators - bees, butterflies, wasps, moths and other insects.

However, without pollinators, many crops would not grow. A large variety of fruits and vegetables would become scarce or incredibly expensive, and the cost of other products, including clothing (as cotton is bee-pollinated), would be

impacted. Over 70 percent of the world's crop plants depend on pollination. In addition, many fruit and vegetable

crops require pollination to produce. Wildlife like deer, quail, pheasants and other animals depend on the production of berries and fruits for food.

Many human actions, such as pollution and conversion of natural habitat, have impacted pollinators and their ability to provide eco-

system services. In our modern agricultural world, drift (or unintentional off-target contamination) from aerial spraying of pesticides has become a major threat to our pollinators. Most insecticides (and a handful of fungicides and herbicides) can kill bees directly or have sublethal effects that can, among other

things, negatively impact bees' ability to reproduce and forage.

The best thing we can do for pollinator conservation is to avoid using pesticides. Unfortunately, avoiding pesticide use, particularly in today's precision farming world, is not an option for most farmers.

A solution presented by DriftWatch and Xerces Society is to take steps in reducing drift and maintaining buffer zones between sprayed areas and pollinator

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
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Concert to benefit Meals on Wheels



Contract **Bridge**

Assume you're in four hearts and West leads the queen and another club, which you ruff. The problem is to find the best method of play -- and this is not easy even if you look at all four hands.

There are several assumptions you're entitled to make without seeing the East-West cards. One is that the trumps are divided 3-2, since you have no chance to make the contract if they're divided 4-1. Another is that East, who opened the East-West vulnerable. NORTH **♠** Q 6 **♥**K53 ♠ A 10.9.7

It would be easy enough to make 10 tricks if West had three hearts and East two. You could cash the K-A of trumps, force out the ace of spades and later ruff a spade in dummy.

The danger in playing this way is that East might have





three trumps, as in the actual deal. If you drew two rounds of trumps and then played a spade to the queen, East would take the ace and cash his high trump. You would then go down one, losing two spades, a heart and a

However, assuming East has the spade ace, there is a way to make 10 tricks regardless of which defender has three hearts. To accomplish this, you play the A-K of hearts and then lead the six of spades from dummy.


If East goes up with the ace, you no longer need to ruff a spade, so let's say he plays low. In that case, you win the spade with the king, lead a diamond to the ten, ruff a club and continue with a diamond to the ace. If East ruffs, your only remaining loser is a spade; if he discards, you ruff dummy's last club and continue playing diamonds. Whatever East does, you are sure to finish with 10 tricks.





Citizen Science brings the natural world and technology together

As I look back over the past several years of writing this column, I have noticed that I will habitually disparage technology. I suspect that this criticism is due to my observation that people are increasingly more and more disconnected from the natural world around them and more dependent on their electronic devices. And due to those observations, I have felt that the natural world and technology are at odds with one another.

However, I have recently become connected to a technological advancement that is connecting the natural world with technology in a positive manner. In addition, it is allowing any person who has at least some interest in the natural world to contribute to the accumulation of scientific data in a relevant



way. These contributions are now known as "citizen science" contributions, and one of the best platforms for these contributions is a simple app and related webpage known simply as I-Naturalist.

I-Naturalist is a worldwide data-gathering organization that began in 2008, and since that time, over 87,000 naturalists have made over 3.6 MILLION observations of over 103,000 species of plants and animals. But let me encourage you to not look at those vast numbers and feel as though you would have nothing to contribute you do! And hopefully, by the end of this column, at least a few of you will take a few minutes to set this app on your phone and begin your own journey as a citizen

scientist. Everywhere you go, you are surrounded by the natural world; whether you are in the most remote regions of western Texas or in the downtown offices of a metropolis there are evidences of the natural world to be observed. I-Naturalist allows you to journal those observations, regardless if you can even identify

what it is or not. The premise of an observation on I-Naturalist (I-Nat for short) can simply be broken down into 5 sections - who, what, when, where and evidence. I want to take just a moment and go through these sections and in doing so, perhaps I can inspire many of you to begin to add observations to this worthwhile data-gathering project.

Who – This is where you will need to make an I-naturalist account. Go to www. inaturalist.org and click on the "sign-up" icon. Once this tab is opened, you will be

able to make your own username and password. Be sure and choose a username and password that you will be able to remember easily. To make remote observations, you will need to download the I-Naturalist app.

What - As you upload an observation, you will want to add an identification to what you observed and not leave this section as "Unknown". Even if you cannot identify the organism to the species level, you will want to make your best guess. For example, if you observe a toad in your garden, you can just make the listing as "Frogs & Toads" (there is a dropdown tab in the identify section to make your choices less complicated!) Then, experts from these fields can see your observation and add the appropriate identification. In doing so, it also allows the user to become familiar with their own observations.

When - If you are uploading an observation onto the webpage, you will need to select the date that it was observed. The app will add the date automatically as it is in real time.

Where - As you upload your observation on the webpage, you will be given a map so you can accurately pinpoint where you saw what you saw. If you are uncomfortable giving the EXACT location, there is a separate tab where you can "obscure" the locality for a certain distance. For example, if the observation was in your own backyard, you can obscure the locality to where it is still relevant to where the observation was, but does not show the public EXACTLY where it was found. This tool is useful in areas that are susceptible to human inter-

Evidence - And of course, you must be able to provide evidence of what you have observed. This is best done in the form of a photograph (don't worry, professional style photos are NOT required!), although for some organisms such as birds, frogs, toads, or even insects a recording of a vocal call is all that is needed. What cannot be used is an observation of "I saw this animal, didn't get a photo, but here is where it was". These kind of observations are never accepted by the I-Naturalist community.

In a column of this size, it is completely impossible to share all the benefits that I-Naturalist.org provides. It not only allows you to add much-needed data for reference, you can also utilize the search engine to find observations on specific organisms. Let's say that you were planning a trip to Belize and you wanted to know what species of birds might be found there. You can find that out on I-Naturalist. Let me encourage you to visit www.inaturalist.org today; sign up if you are inclined, or just research more about what it is and how it is used on their "about" page. I guarantee that you will be hooked.

Oh, and one other thing. There are also projects within the I-Nat community itself. For example, there is a "Plants of Texas" project or a "Birds of Texas" that you can join to add to their data. And you can be involved with as many projects as you wish. One that I am especially involved in is the "Herps of Texas" project. As a curator of this project, I enjoy the ability to see folks learning about the reptiles and amphibians in this great state. So far, there have been over 41,000 observations of 245 species from over 1,100 citizens in this project - I'd love to see you join in!

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

The Central Texas Chapter of the Texas Master Naturalist class of 2017 is currently taking applications to become a Certified Master Naturalist. Enrollment is limited and the deadline for enrollment is March 21.

With 48 chapters statewide, the Texas Master Naturalist program aims to develop a corps of well-informed citizen volunteers who educate their communities about
