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Village will lose more than \$170 Million in market value due to disannexation

If approved by the voters in the Village of Salado May 6, the disannexation of a large -- almost entirely residential -- portion of the Village could result in the loss of just over \$170 million in market value.

Bell County Appraisal District, at the request of Salado Village Voice, calculated the loss in market value, taxable value and freeze adjusted value to the Village of Salado should the disannexation proposal pass in May.

Marvin Hahn, chief appraiser of BellCAD, stated that the market value of the property in the proposed disannexation area is \$170,082,524. The total Market Value for the Village of Salado, according to the certified appraisal for 2016 was \$289,774,823.

The disannexation would leave a total market value of \$119.6 million for the Village of Salado.

According to the 2016 certified values, the Village of Salado has a certified total freeze adjusted taxable value of \$168,130,780. The total freeze adjusted taxable value for the disannexation area is \$81,638,646.

That total freeze adjusted taxable value for the Village of Salado was budgeted to generate a total of \$911,100.97 at the \$0.5419 total tax rate for the 2016-17 fiscal year. Of that total in property tax revenue, \$575,007.27 is for debt service (\$0.542 per \$100 tax rate) for the \$8.2 million sewer bond.

The maintenance and operation tax is \$0.199 per \$100. It generates \$336,093 in M&O revenues for the Village. The loss of \$81.6 million in freeze adjusted taxin the loss of \$163,195.65 in determined. local revenue to the Village of Salado.

While the Village could face losing the local maintenance and operating revenue, the property owners in the disannexation area would continue to be liable for their pro rata portion of the bond indebtedness.

According to Sec. 43.143. (c) of the Local Government Code: "If the area withdraws from a municipality as provided by this section and if, at the time of the withdrawal, the municipality owes any debts, by bond or otherwise, the area is not released from its pro rata share of that indebtedness. The governing body shall continue to levy a property tax each year on the property in the area at the same rate that is levied on other property in the municipality until the taxes collected from the area equal its pro rata share of the indebtedness. Those taxes may be charged only with the cost of levying and collecting the taxes, and the taxes shall be applied exclusively to the payment of the pro rata share of the indebtedness. This subsection does not prevent the inhabitants of the area I&S tax rate of \$0.342 per from paying in full at any time their pro rata share of the indebtedness."

Hahn stated that homeowners whose taxes are frozen will not see an increase Bell County behind Rogers' in taxes due to the disannexation election.

The potential impact upon the M&O budget of the Village of Salado is daunting, to say the least.

Faced with the loss of more than \$163,195.65 in M&O revenues, aldermen will either have to drastically cut its budget for 2017-18 or increase the M&O to the remaining properties by a substantial amount.

In order to the same \$336,093 in M&O revenues for the Village in 2017-18 as it did in 2016-17, the Village could face an increase in the M&O property tax to \$0.3889 per \$100 valuation. This estimate is based upon the loss of the disannexed area from the tax rolls and no other changes

in property values. However, the board of aldermen in setting the budget for 2017-18 could adopt a tax rate that is 8 percent more than the effective tax rate (the rate needed to retire the debt and generate the same amount of revenue as the previous year) without facing the possibility of a rollback election. This could raise the M&O rollback rate to \$0.4200 per \$100.

Coupled with the current \$100 would bring the possible rollback rate to \$0.762 per \$100 evaluation, making the Village of Salado's property tax the second-highest in tax rate of \$0.7897 per \$100.

Chamber plans move

Aldermen mull contract with CofC for use of HOT funds

The Salado Chamber of Commerce and Visitors Center will move south to the Salado Museum after appropriate renovations are made for staff offices.

The renovations are estimated at about \$10,000. The Chamber Board of Directors awarded the bid to SVC Remodeling Construction at their March 16 meeting.

Work will begin March 27 and is expected to take about three weeks to complete. The Chamber and Visitors Center will give its current landlord, Tim Brown 30 days notice before vacating the current premises for the new location on South Main Street.

The new location will cost the Chamber \$1,000 per month and the Chamber will have the first four months at no cost in order to recoup some its initial expenses in making the move to South Main Street.

While the Chamber is making this move, the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen will meet on March 23 in executive session to discuss the contract between the

Chamber of Commerce and the Village of Salado.

According to the agenda for the special called meeting, the board will consult with Village attorney Linda Sjogren to seek her advice on the "duties and obligations of the parties and contract compliance regarding: Contract between the Village of Salado and the Salado Chamber of Commerce."

Aldermen approved a contract with the Salado Chamber of Commerce on Sept. 1 2016 to provide consultation services to the Village.

At that time, alderman Frank Coachman made a motion to approve and offer the contract to the Chamber of Commerce. Mayor Pro Tem Brown seconded.

At that time, aldermen had a lengthy discussion about Chamber and Hotel/Motel funds, as well as Chamber reserves, and the need for the funds to be spent in a legal manner.

The motion carried 4-1 with Alderman David Williams voting against.

The 2016-17 hotel occupancy tax (HOT) budget is \$187,850 in income, including a transfer of \$30,000

For expenses, it allots \$20,550 in benefits for two employees and \$122,100 in salaries and payroll taxes. It allocates \$5,000 for a director benefit program, \$950 for insurance and a payment of \$39,250 to the Salado Chamber of Commerce.

The contract outlines a Scope of Work to be performed by the Salado Chamber of Commerce on behalf of the Village of Salado. The Scope of Work can be found in the Village of Salado budget for 2016-17.

All events, rent and utilities for the Chamber office and visitors center, marketing and advertising and other expenses are funded by the Chamber of Commerce.

HOT revenues are based on taxable occupancy to the lodging properties that are within the Extra-territorial jurisdiction (ETJ) of the Village of Salado.


Taxable occupancy receipts for calendar year 2016 totaled \$2.26 million.

In 2007, occupancy receipts totaled \$3.9 million with an inventory of 311 rooms. The Stagecoach Inn accounted for just over a third of those revenues in 2007. At an assumed \$110 average, this represents 35,454 room nights.

In calendar year 2015, HOT receipts totaled \$2.66 million. Stagecoach Inn moreceipts/


rooms. Calendar year 2014 was the final full year with Stagecoach Inn motel contributing to the HOT funds. That year, taxable occupancy receipts

totaled \$2.88 million. Salado Village compiled a 10-year history of hotel occupancy receipts for Salado.

The worst argument for Trump-care

Of all the arguments to make for repealing and replacing Obamacare, the very worst is that people don't need health insurance.

Yet this is a Trump administration talking point. White House press secretary Sean Spicer recently told reporters, "When we get asked the question, 'How many people are going to get covered?' that's not the question that should be asked." Pressed on the merits of the bill by George Stephanopoulos on ABC's "This Week," Office of Management and Budget Director Mick Mulvaney shot back, "You're worried about getting people covered." As if that's a woeful mistake.

This is a strange rhetorical tack for officials in an administration led by a president who pledged to cover everyone. Nor is it substantively or political defensible. Repealing and replacing Obamacare will require every ounce of persuasiveness especially with the Congressional Budget Office now estimating that under Trumpcare, 14 million fewer people will be insured in 2018. The early signs aren't encourag-

It is true that health insurance isn't a panacea. There is an academic debate about whether having health insurance leads to longer lives, and all sorts of factors be-



sides insurance affect health and the quality of medical care (geography, for instance, can have more of an impact on care than whether someone is insured).

Still, there is abundant evidence of the benefits of insurance. Research has found that Romneycare in Massachusetts improved measures of physical and mental health. A Rice University study of the Houston area found that people with insurance report being in better health than those who lack it. If nothing else, insurance is protection against catastrophic health expenses and provides a sense of security.

Republicans obviously shouldn't accept the premises of their detractors. By all means, they should hit the dubious methodology of the CBO, which vastly overestimated how many people would be covered on the Obamacare exchanges in the first place. And they should point out Obamacare's manifest failings, including an overreliance on the deeply flawed Medicaid program and insurance exchanges that are shaky at best (the executive of Aetna recently said

they are in a "death spiral"). But the best response to criticisms that Trumpcare doesn't cover enough people is simple and more fundamental -- to get the coverage numbers up. If the headline-grabbing numbers from the CBO don't prompt the GOP to realize this, nothing will. Making the tax credit in the Republican plan more generous further down the income scale would be a start. President Trump's promises about universal coverage aren't achievable, but to lurch in the other direction and dismiss the significance of health insurance is politically poisonous.

At its best, the Trump phenomenon pointed to a GOP more grounded in the economic realities of working-class life. It is remarkable, then, that the first major legislative priority out of the box is being sold, in part, in stereotypically Republican terms, and by Trump's own

going down this road, they should of critics. Among them, apthink about why Trump, with his keen gut-level political instinct, never told audiences or interviewers that he'd be fine with fewer people having insurance, and adjust their rhetoric and their plan accordingly.

Dis)United We Stumble

President Trump's executive order on immigration parently, is someone at the Department of Homeland Security. The leaked report indicating that the children of immigrants raised in America radicalize at a higher rate than their parents do was plainly meant to un-

dercut the president's order. But regardless of what motivated the leak, the report underscores a serious problem with the process by which immigrants become Americans. In short, it's broken. Our slogan "e pluribus unum" -- Latin for "out of many, one" -- has become a joke.

Many of America's institutions no longer promote assimilation. And it isn't only conservatives who are worried.

Consider what the distinguished liberal historian Arthur M. Schlesinger Jr. had to say in his book "The Disuniting of America." He argued that a stress on ethnicity has benefits, but that "its underlying philosophy is that the United States is not a nation of individuals at all but a nation of groups, that ethnicity is the defining experience for Americans." This dogma, he warned, "replaces assimilation by fragmentation, integration by separatism. It belittles unum and glorifies pluribus."

The noted conservative William E. Simon Jr. has sounded the same alarm: "There are disturbing signs that here in America difference and separateness are becoming more pronounced than unity and harmony." And the distinguished cul-

tural historian Samuel P Huntington warns in this book "Who Are We?" that citizenship has been devalued and that a revival of national identity is crucial to America's very survival.

What has gone wrong? Simon is right to trace the trend not to any basic change in the immigrant population -- today's newcomers are as willing as ever to be assimilated -- but to the cultural revolution of the 1960s, which was led by elite young students and the post-college generation of the day. In the backlash to the war in Vietnam, authority was called into question, and the nation's superiority was no

longer accepted. Patriotism itself became suspect, derisively equated with Rudyard Kipling's jingoism: "To be born an Englishmen means winning the first prize in God's lottery." The American flag became a right-wing symbol, brandished by the people who beat up protest marchers. "Americanization" was seen as coercive, even ruthless - in the catch-phrase of the day, the equivalent of destroying a village in order to save it.

The cultural relativists largely succeeded in imposing their attitude on the political scene. But, as usual, If nothing was better than anything else, then nothing could be much worse. Morals were as relative as values; the criminal, molded heritage.org).

by genes and environment, wasn't really responsible for his or her crimes. And love of country was simply naïve and embarrassing.

Even Ralph Nader was brusquely rebuffed when he suggested that 100 of America's biggest businesses should honor their country by reciting the Pledge of Allegiance at their annual meetings. Only one company agreed. Half never responded. The CEO of Aetna Insurance told Nader that his idea was "contrary to the principles on which our democracy was founded."

In fact, the Pledge was on the wane even in the nation's classrooms, where for decades it had marked the beginning of each school day. By one count, fewer than half of America's teachers and students now recite it.

What matters, of course, isn't the Pledge itself, but the ideals that it stands for. Today's immigrants are encouraged to think, act and identify as a separate group, not to identify proudly as Americans. Can we be surprised that some of them would become easy prey for terrorist recruiters?

I doubt that the leaker of that DHS report was trying to force us to confront our assimilation problem. But that's exactly what we need the pendulum swung too far. to do. The board approved a Resolution that would authorize the "release or transfer of any disannexed areas from the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the Village and recognizing the statutory requirement that property owners disannexed or released from the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the Village will still be responsible for the indebtedness of the Village incurred while property was within the territorial limits of the Village, and authorize city administrator to take appropriate action, as presented. Fred Brown made the motion, which received a second from Frank Coachman. The motion carried unanimously.

Aldermen at that meeting also approved an "interlocal agreement transferring property located in the extraterritorial jurisdiction from the Village to the extraterritorial jurisdiction of a neighboring municipality" and "authorized city administrator to take appropriate action including negotiations with neighboring city."

Then-city administrator Kim Foutz explained that this agreement would be put into use only if property is disannexed.

Coachman made the motion, which was also approved unanimously.

If the disannexation were to pass in a referendum, the incumbent members would retain their seats until a special election was conducted to replace them.

The disannexation election is on the same ballot as an aldermen election in which seven candidates are vying for three two-year terms on the board. Three of those candidates are incumbents: Fred Brown, Michael McDougal and David Williams. Challengers are Judy Fields, Andy Jackson, Linda Reynolds and Chris Tramel. Six of the seven candidates live in the proposed area for disannexation. Reynolds is the only candidate who does not reside in the proposed area of disannexation.

Furthermore, if the disannexation election passes, the remaining aldermen and mayor will have to vacate their offices because they live in the disannexed area.

The local government code states in Sec. 22.041. "VACANCY ON GOVERN-ING BODY IS CREATED. (a) If an alderman moves

from the ward from which the alderman is elected, the alderman's office is considered vacant."

Because there is more than one vacancy at one time, according to Sec. 22.011 of the local government code: "FILLING VA-CANCY IN MUNICIPAL OFFICE UNDER SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES. If a vacancy occurs in a municipal office by a resignation or in another manner and if the vacancy cannot be filled as provided by other law, the commissioners court of the county in which the municipality is located shall order an election to fill the vacancy if the court is petitioned to do so by at least 26 taxpaying voters residing in the municipality."

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
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Kamylle Palomino marries Capt. Joshua Coleman





The fruits are very sweet, easy to peel and only have one or two seeds per fruit. David Rodriguez, a member of the Texas Superstar® selection board has noted that as opposed to other satsumas, which are grafted to another variety rootstock, the Arctic and Orange Frost varieties are grown from their own rootstock. They can be used as accent plants for the backyard or container plants. Give them 8-10 hours of full sun daily and they can reach 8-12 feet tall in the ground or 6 feet in a container. Planting time for these evergreen citrus is spring, and in winter they are cold tolerant to 10° or 15° Fahrenheit respectively. They are designed to expand in-ground citrus growth into our USDA Hardiness Zone 8.

This reseeding, old fashioned petunia has fragrant violet flowers on a vigorous, heattolerant plant. It performs well even in alkaline soils. Laura Bush grows 24 inches tall and 36 inches wide. It should be cut back 20% each month and blooms spring to frost. Full sun.



Seven candidates are vying for three two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen. Those candidates are incumbents Fred Brown, Michael Mc-Dougal and David Williams and challengers Judy Fields, Andy Jackson, Linda Reynolds and Chris Tramel.

A proposal for the disannexation of a part of Salado is on the May 6 ballot.

According to Sam Taylor, communications director for the Texas Secretary of State office, the disannexation election "would be within the municipal boundaries."

"Sec. 43.143(a) of the Texas election code says that once the 50 signature threshold is reached, 'the mayor

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shall order an election on the question in the municipality," Taylor stated in a March 13 email to Salado Village Voice.

Two meetings have been set concerning the May 6 election.

A Question and Answer Town Hall has been set for 6:30 p.m. April 4 at the Salado Civic Center, according to Mayor Skip Blancett. The Village Attorney Alan Bojorquez "will answer questions concerning matters of interest or issues on the May Ballot," according to Blancett, who added that this will be "an excellent opportunity to receive legal/accurate answers."

Additionally, Mill Creek Community Association will sponsor a Town Hall meeting on the subject of Disannexation at 6 p.m. April 8 at the Salado Intermediate School cafeteria.

John Newman, one of the organizers of the disannexation petition, and county commissioner Tim Brown are scheduled to speak at the MCCA meeting.

Early voting will begin on April 24. The last day of early voting will be May 2.

Early voting will be conducted in person at the Salado Civic Center.

Early voting hours are these: 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. April 24, April 26-28 and May 1 and 7 a.m.-7 p.m. April 25 and May 2.

Election day, the polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. at the Salado Civic Center.

The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is April 25. Applications for a ballot by

mail must be mailed to Judy King, Village of Salado, PO Box 219, Salado, TX 76571.

There will be no Salado ISD Board of Trustees election. The following will be inducted into office for three year terms to begin in May: Dr. Kim Bird (incumbent), Nate Self and Troy Smith.

There will be no Salado Public Library District election either. The following will be inducted into office for two year terms on the board of directors: Bobbette Bell, Soo Kim-Delio and Patricia Rehm.

Qualifications to vote, according to the Bell County Voter Registrar are these:

- You must register to vote in the county in which you reside.
- You must be a citizen of the United States
- You must be at least 17 years and 10 months old to register and you must be 18 years of age by election day.
- You must not be finally convicted of a felony, or if you are a felon, you must have completed all of your punishment, including any term of incarceration, parole, supervision, period of probation, or you must have received a pardon.

After answering the first question, fill out the form completely and press submit. If both opponents followed suit to the A-K, he could then cash the jack of spades before running the diamonds. If the second diamond happened to get ruffed, the contract was doomed anyway.

The advantage of this approach can be seen in the actual deal. When declarer cashed the two top diamonds, East showed out, but was unable to ruff. South then led a low diamond and ruffed it in dummy to establish the suit. Dummy's remaining trump was led to the jack, and the rest of the diamonds were run. West got his heart trick at the end, and South got a well-deserved top score.

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



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Black-tailed Rattlesnake

The Black-tailed Rattlesnake mates for life

Michael Price

When a person mentions the word "rattlesnake", the image immediately conjured up is that of the defensively coiled and agitated Diamondback Ratter. However, in Texas, there are eight species of rattlesnakes, and one of my favorites is the variety that rarely makes its presence known by utilizing the tell-tale rattle.

The Black-tailed Rattlesnake (Crotalus {molossus} ornatus) occurs from central New Mexico eastward through the Chihuahuan Desert portions of western Texas to near Austin, then south to the Mexican states of Coahuila and Nuevo Leon. In Texas, it is most frequently observed in the mountainous areas of the Trans-Pecos, less often in the Hill Country. Unlike its close relative the Western Diamondback Rattlesnake, Black-tailed Rattlesnakes are habitat specialists, living primarily in the canyons and streambeds of these areas.

This is a moderately large species of rattlesnake that can attain lengths of up to four feet, with the record size being fifty-two inches,

although most adults average iust over three feet in length.

Black-tailed Rattlesnakes have unique and distinctive coloration and pattern characteristics. The most obvious is the dark tail that ranges in color from jet black to a charcoal black. Another is the black nose and forehead that gives this snake the appearance of having dipped the front part of its face into black ink. The background is primarily black along the spine, with a pattern of variably colored patches of pale scales along the first half of the body. At least in the confines of this state, these pale patches range in color from light tan to yellow to greenish. Specimens from the limestone-filled Edwards and Stockton Plateaus typically are lighter in coloration than the ones that inhabit the igneous rock mountains of the Trans-Pecos. No other rattlesnake that lives in this

animal's range exhibits these

characteristics.

Like other rattlesnakes, the head of this species is distinctly wider than the neck, giving this animal the famous "diamond-shaped" head. The pupils are elliptical, and the rattle is large and is capable of being heard from several yards away.

Unlike other large species of rattlesnakes, the Black-tailed Rattlesnake does not winter together in large numbers. The process of brumation, (not hibernation as the animal does not sleep through the winter, but rather just slows its heart rate and metabolism) generally takes place between late October to mid-March. Even in mid-winter, this species may make an appearance on exceptionally warm days to bask in the heating rays from the sun, particularly females that are carrying fertilized

ing on to its mate's sperm over the winter until spring, when ovulation actually takes place. Several studies have shown that this species of snake will "mate for life", reproducing with the same mate year after year while cohabitating in the same area. Blacktails are oviviparous, which means they give birth to living young, and the nine-inch-long neonates (which number from 6 to 10) are typically born in late summer and early fall. Other than having a "button" on the end of the tail, they are exact replicas of the adults and are fully capable of fending for themselves, including having fully functional fangs and

This species is typically crepuscular (active at dawn and dusk) during the spring and fall when night-time temperatures begin to fall and are nocturnal (active at night) during the summer months when the daytime temperatures exceed intolerable highs. It uses its venom to obtain its prey, which is primarily made up of rodents of various sizes. Juveniles will occasionally add lizards to its diet.

venom apparatus'.

Black-tailed Rattlesnakes as a whole are not as highstrung and temperamental as the more common Western Diamondback Rattler, and their venom is only about eighty percent as potent. This does not make them any less dangerous, but because they live in areas that are generally inaccessible to the general public, they are not considered by most to be a serious threat to people. In fact, many ranchers will often leave the "colas negras" alone, while exterminating any and all Diamondbacks on sight.

When participating in outdoor activities, the risk of encountering a Black-tailed Rattler is remarkably slim, although it can and does happen occasionally. If such an encounter occurs, remember that this animal, despite its harmful capability, is more afraid of you than you are of it and it would prefer to be left alone.

APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION. Village of Salado, P.O. Box 219, Salado, Texas 76571, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a major amendment of Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. WQ001489800s to move the discharge point. The draft permit authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 300,000 gallons per day. TCEQ received this application on August 10, 2016.

The facility will be located north of the intersection of Shepherd Drive and Farm-to-Market Road 2268, approximately 2,000 feet north from the end of Shepherd Drive, in Bell County, Texas 76571. The treated effluent will be discharged to Smith Branch; thence to Salado Creek in Segment No. 1243 of the Brazus River Basin. The unclassified receiving water use is intermediate aquatic life use for Smith Branch. The designated uses for Segment No. 1243 are high aquatic life use, public water supply, aquifer protection, and primary contact recreation. In accordance with 30 Texas Administrative Code § 307.5 and the TCEQ implementation. procedures (June 2010) for the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, an antidegradation. review of the receiving waters was performed. A Tier I antidegradation review has preliminarily determined that existing water quality uses will not be impaired by this permit action. Numerical and narrative criteria to protect existing uses will be maintained. A Tier 2 review has preliminarily determined that no significant degradation of water quality is expected in Smith. Branch, which has been identified as having intermediate aquatic life use. Existing uses will be maintained and protected. The preliminary determination can be reexamined and may be modified if new information is received.

The TCEQ Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The Executive Director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The permit application, Executive Director's preliminary decision, and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at Village of Salado Village Hall, 301 North Stagecoach Road, Salado, Texas. TCEQ holds a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period; and the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing," If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor. submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material water quality concerns submitted during the comment period.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The Executive Director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed. If a limely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the Executive Director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and request to the TCEO. Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.


