## Founder of Patriot Kids' Ministries charged with indecency with child

The founder and executive director of Patriot Kids' Ministries was arrested on Jan. 13 for the felony charge of indecency with a child by sexual contact.

As of presstime on Jan. 14, Jon Phillip Tidball, age 63, was being held in the Bell County Jail until he can be transported to Bexar County.

The arrest came from a warrant issued by Bexar County Sheriff's office in October 2013.

The alleged victim is a 24-year-old woman and former family member who told investigators that the alleged sexual contact occurred with her between the ages of eight and 14. When the woman learned that Tidball was associated with the Patriot Kids' Ministries, she came for-

ward to make charges. Bell County Special Crimes Unit has asked that parents of children who attended the Patriot Kids' Ministries camps and events talk to their children.

"We're concerned about the children of this community," Lt. Michelle Cianti with the Bell Co. Special Crimes Unit told *Salado Village Voice*.

Tidball served as an Army chaplain, retiring as a Lieutenant Colonel after 31 years in the military.

After retirement, Tidball founded Patriot Kids' Ministries, opening the facility in January 2012.

According to its website, the purpose of Patriot Kids' Ministries is "to serve the children of our Nation's Military Heroes through a variety of min-

istries and programs."

Those programs include Christian after-school programs, day camps, summer camps, workshops and other activities. Patriot Kids Ministries retreat center and kids camp is south of Stillhouse Lake. The organization purchased the property that once housed the Cedar Knob Baptist Church.

## Bridge comes down Jan. 27

The Thomas Arnold bridge over Interstate 35 in Salado will be demolished overnight Jan. 27, according to officials with Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT)

All adjacent frontage roads will be open to two-way traffic to maximize circulation of traffic, ac-

ording to Gary B. Thomas, P.E.

Prior to the demolition of the bridge, the new northbound frontage road from FM 2268 to Thomas Arnold is scheduled to be opened on Jan. 17.

The new southbound frontage road from Salado Plaza to Thomas Arnold is

slated to be opened on Jan. 27.

The demolition of the Thomas Arnold bridge will require the closing of the mainlanes of the freeways overnight on Jan. 27.

These plans are tentative and are subject to change by weather and other circumstances.

## City admin. will recommend against accepting sewer gift

City administrator Jim Reed will recommend to aldermen that the Village not accept the possible donation from Morris Foster of a sewage treatment plant on the south side of Salado Creek that currently serves the Stagecoach Inn and about 16 businesses.

Salado aldermen will discuss the matter during a 4 p.m. workshop session Jan. 23 and a 6 p.m. regular session.

Aldermen met Jan. 10 in workshop session but took no action. Reed and Mayor Danney McCort were tasked by aldermen in December to begin due diligence into the feasibility of accepting the donation of the 40-year-old privately-operated sewer plant.

The sewer plant has a capacity of 50,000 gallons per day and uses less than 40 percent of that capacity.

Reed and McCort met with Foster to begin discussions. Coming away from the meeting, they were told that the Village could continue to use the agriculture property owned by Morris Foster as effluent fields for six months at no cost. After that, an agreement could be reached to lease the use of those fields for \$1,500 per month for the next six months and increasing incrementally to \$5,000 per month in the following four to five years. According to Reed, the total cost for the use of the effluent field for five years would be \$228,000.

A period of due diligence was agreed to at 120 days.

Both parties also agreed that if the Village were to take the sewer system plant, that Foster would agree to cover any costs the system encounters to assure that the operation of it is revenue neutral until the operations of the plant can be budgeted in 2015-15 fiscal year.

Since receiving that direction, Mayor McCort and Paul Murray, who is licensed wastewater treatment plant operator employed by Bell County W.C.I.D. #3, visited the plant. Other visits to the plant included Reed, Alderman Bryan Fritch and Rick Kasberg, Village Engineer.

Those visits have raised concern in Reed and the Mayor about the condition of the plant, concern that

## Sales tax rebate dips by 14% for Jan. payment to Village

The sales tax rebate to Salado dropped 14 percent this month as the Village of Salado received a \$25,963.70 check compared to \$30,307.07 paid last January.

The rebate check to the Salado Public Library District, which has boundaries that are about the same as Salado Independent School District, plummeted by 30 percent compared to last year. The Library received a payment of \$19,619.82. Last year, the Library received \$28,022.09.

Bell County received 2 percent less in January than it did the previous year. The County received \$1.24 million for the half-cent sales tax it levies compared to \$1.26 million

last year.

The county's largest cities -- Killeen and Temple -- saw smaller declines in sales tax payments, while Harker Heights saw its sales tax increase by more than 25 percent for the November period compared to the previous year. Killeen, Temple and Harker Heights are all experiencing the expansion of the highways that run through them.

Nearby Jarrell saw a small increase in sales taxes, receiving a check of \$88,349.87 for the month.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said that state sales tax revenue in December was \$2.25 billion, up 3.9 percent compared to December 2012.

"Consumer spending

in retail trade contributed to the latest gain in state sales tax collections," Combs said. "Other sectors such as telecommunications also contributed to the monthly growth, and state sales tax revenue has now increased for 45 consecutive months."

Combs sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their January local sales tax allocations totaling \$573.5 million, up 8.1 percent compared to January 2013.

The sales tax rebate checks were for taxes that were collected in the month of November 2013 and reported to the state in December 2013.

## Obama vs. Nuns

It takes some doing to get embroiled in a court fight with nuns who provide hospice care for the indigent. Amazingly, the Obama administration has managed it.

Its legal battle with the Little Sisters of the Poor is the logical consequence of Obamacare's conscience-trampling contraception mandate. The requirement went into effect Jan. 1, but Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor issued a New Year's Eve injunction against enforcing it on the Little Sisters.

They are Catholic nuns who follow the doctrinal teachings of the church and therefore oppose contraceptive and abortive drugs and sterilization, all of which Obamacare mandates that employers cover in their insurance plans. Given the ongoing delays, waivers and exemptions associated with the law, it would seem natural simply to let the Little Sisters go about their business of pouring out their hearts for the sick and dying.

But this is a fight the administration won't walk away from. For it, it is a matter of principle. And the principle is that the state trumps the convictions of people with deep-held religious beliefs.

When the contraception mandate first caused an uproar, the administration contrived a so-called

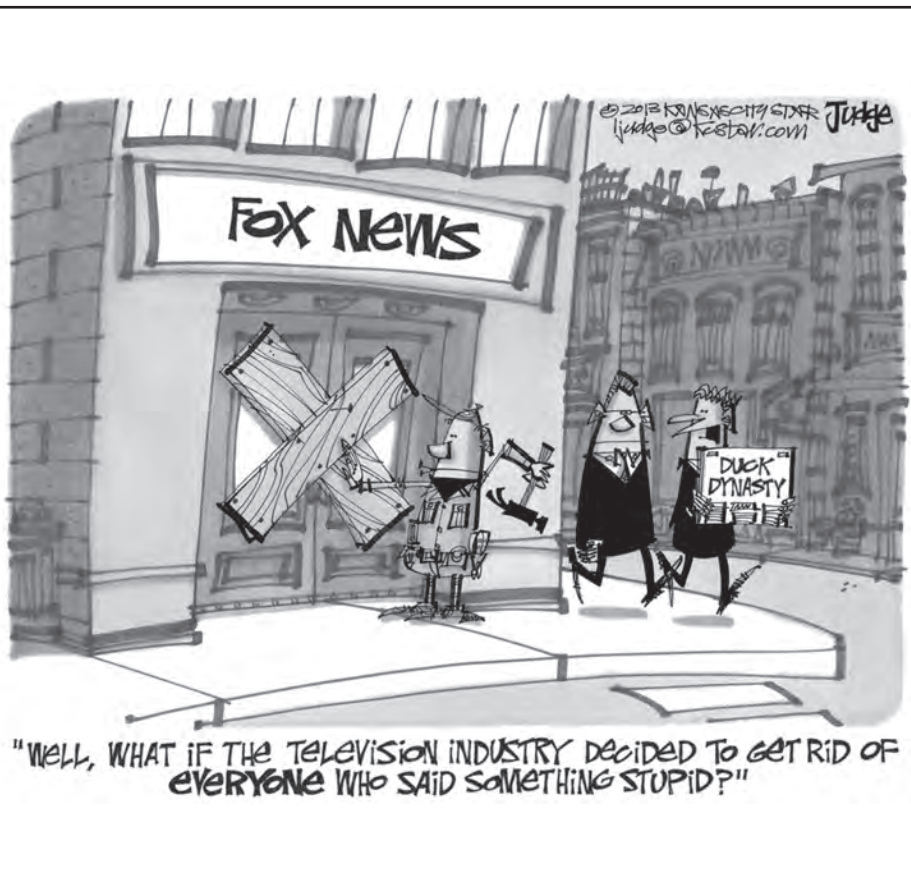
Just a piece of paper? So is a mortgage. So is a wedding certificate. So is a will.

The Little Sisters deserve deference. Their religious sensibility is different than that of the mandarins of President Barack Obama's administrative state. In a dispute over what their conscience tells them to do or not to do, the Little Sisters are better positioned to know than anyone else.

Besides, who is harmed if the Little Sisters don't provide contraception coverage? They are a voluntary organization. They aren't imposing their views on anyone. Who, for that matter, is harmed if a secular organization run by people with moral objections to contraceptives and abortifacients refuses to cover them? Employees are still free to go out on their own and get contraceptives, which are widely available. If this sounds like an outlandish imposition, it is what people managed to do throughout American history all the way up to last week.

Instead of respecting the moral views of the Little Sisters, the administration hopes to grind them under foot by force of law. For shame.

## Flashing Too Little Editorial Integrity

ADVERTISERS ARE PUSHING NEWS SITES NOT TO BE TOO EXPLICIT ABOUT DISTINGUISHING BETWEEN GENUINE NEWS ITEMS AND AD HUSTLES.

Attention, class. Here's today's new word: "Native advertising."

OK, that's two words. But it's one concept, and it has nothing to do with indigenous peoples.

Rather, it's a phrase sprung on us by the wonky wordsmiths of Internet media, who also refer to it as "brand content." Translated, this means that these particular web pages on news sites aren't articles. They're paid advertising.

But the advertisers are pushing news outlets not to be too explicit about distinguishing between genuine news items and ad hustles.

How? Money, of course.

In today's web publications — from such newbies as BuzzFeed to the digital versions of mainstays like The New York Times — there's a blurring of the line between the publications' legitimate journalistic content and the faux "stories" that are

dollars, so their game is to flash just enough integrity without losing the bucks.

That's a losing game for integrity. Media analyst Bob Garfield notes that the effectiveness of native advertising depends on it being confused with editorial content.

Eliminate the confusion, and the ethical failure diminishes, he says. But "what will also diminish, to near vanishing point, is the readership of those adverts."

Any media so dependent on corporate money that it resorts to deceiving its audience is — in a word — "dependent." Also, untrustworthy.

provided by marketers and designed to look like real articles from non-biased news sources.

For readers and viewers, the questions are obvious: Whose stuff is this, and what can I trust?

The best ethical response by online publishers would be to draw a bright line around all "branded content." Perhaps they could add some flashing neon lights and honking horns to announce: "This is an ad."

But no. While Internet publishers say they seek journalistic integrity, they're hungrier still for advertisers'





FORT HOOD, Texas -- The 504th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade cased their colors in a ceremony at Ready Field on West Fort Hood, January 8, for an upcoming deployment to Kosovo in support of Operation Joint Guardian.

The brigade will deploy 500 Soldiers from the 2d Squadron, 38th Cavalry Regiment and the brigade's Headquarters and Headquarters Company.

This is the first time the 504th BFSB has deployed in support of this mission, and will be replacing the 525th BFSB out of Fort Bragg, N.C. The brigade will be joined by National Guard Soldiers from the 35th Infantry Division, who have been training on North Fort Hood since their arrival in early December.

"All of these Soldiers conducted their individual and small unit training here at Fort Hood, supported by Soldiers from First Army Division West, East and observer controllers from Germany," said Col. Charles Hensley, 504th Commander. "After several months of challenging training, learning new tasks, and forming new teams, the Soldiers who will be part of Multinational Battle Group East stand ready to deploy in support of Operation Joint Guardian."

Consisting of nearly 1,500 troops from nine different countries, MNBG-E will be commanded by the "Always Ready" brigade after taking over from the 525th. Kosovo Forces will be working with the United Nations and European Union to support a healthy and peaceful development of Kosovo.

"The challenge for those deploying is that we must maintain the current safe and secure environment in Kosovo," said Hensley. "We must be prepared to conduct operations to prevent any deterioration of that environment and improve that environment so that someday the people of Kosovo no longer need NATO forces' assistance and so

that the Government of Kosovo is able to stand independently in the international area."

Hensley went on to describe that while Kosovo isn't as dangerous as other deployable locations, Soldiers and their families are still making sacrifices.

"Deployment is never easy," said Hensley. "We take some comfort that the operational environment in Kosovo is stable and isn't nearly as dangerous as other locations in which Soldiers serve, but that doesn't make the missed anniversaries, birthdays, graduations, report cards, summer vacation, and just missing out on normal family activities any easier

to accept for the Soldiers or their families."

Operation Joint Guardian is a mission that started in Kosovo on June 12, 1999, to provide peace support operations and for 15 years servicemembers have deployed supporting KFOR.

"In 1999, many may not have seen how the Kosovo mission would evolve over time, but our challenge today is to continue the mission started in 1999," said Hensley. "We will continue to carry it on to victory; not so much for ourselves but for the people of Kosovo and to honor the service and sacrifice of the tens of thousands of Soldiers who served before us."

coupled with the cost to lease the effluent fields is enough that Reed is going to recommend against accepting the plant.

In a paper for aldermen, Reed has documented the concerns expressed about the corrosion of tanks, pipes, valves and other safety issues that could lead to liability concerns for the Village if it were to own and operate the system.

Mayor McCort and Kasberg have developed a check list of what they suggest needs to be repaired. The possible rough estimate costs for those repairs is almost \$500,000.

"The system is operational and functional for the customers that it serves now," Reed told *Salado Village Voice*. The plant is also fully licensed by the state. The next state inspection of the plant is in 2016, according to Mayor McCort.

"The plant operates for its intended purpose," Reed stated in a draft paper for aldermen. "If the Village were to take ownership of the plant as-is. It is estimated that there would be at least \$250,000 to \$500,000 of basic repairs to bring the operation into a state that would reduce liability to an acceptable level."

Reed says that coupling the potential cost of \$228,000 in leasing property for effluent and \$500,000 for what he called basic repairs would bring the cost of the plant to \$728,000. "This is to serve the current 16 customers," he said, "not to tie in any other businesses along Main Street or anywhere else."

Reed said that he will recommend to the board that they concentrate their efforts on a bond election to build a new system that can serve the needs of the business district.

The \$728,000, Reed said, "represents between 10 and 15 percent of a new system cost which could serve most of Main Street and be expandable to other growth areas in the future."

If the Village is to call a bond election, it must do so at its Feb. 6 meeting.

Reed told *Salado Village Voice* that he would favor calling an election for November; however, he added, "I serve at the pleasure of the board of aldermen and will do my best to bring whatever they want to do to fruition."

At this time, Village aldermen have not decided how they would like to implement a sewer treatment plant, the possible costs of it, the operating costs of it, where it could be located, who it would serve, the possible costs of tying in to the system, where the effluent would be discharged, or many other questions many voters and taxpayers would want answered.



### A frequently fatal weakness Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

In general, more contracts are won or lost on the opening lead than at any other stage of the play. But while it is true that some players are more successful than others in choosing leads, there are times when no one would find the winning lead.

Take this case where South opened with five diamonds. West felt strongly tempted to double, but followed the more conservative course by passing. He had no clear-cut opening lead, and, after considerable thought, chose a club.

This was not a re-sounding success, because declarer won the club, played the ace and another heart -- which he ruffed in dummy -- and discarded his last heart on the ace of spades. South then led a diamond and lost two trump tricks to make exactly five diamonds.

Irritated by the outcome, West later polled 10 experts to see what they would have led against five diamonds. As usual, there was a lack of unanimity among the top players. Seven of them agreed with the opening lead, two favored a low heart, and one chose a low spade.

All of them thus missed the only lead that could set the contract: the ace of diamonds, followed by the queen! Against this opening salvo South is absolutely helpless and, in fact, winds up down two!

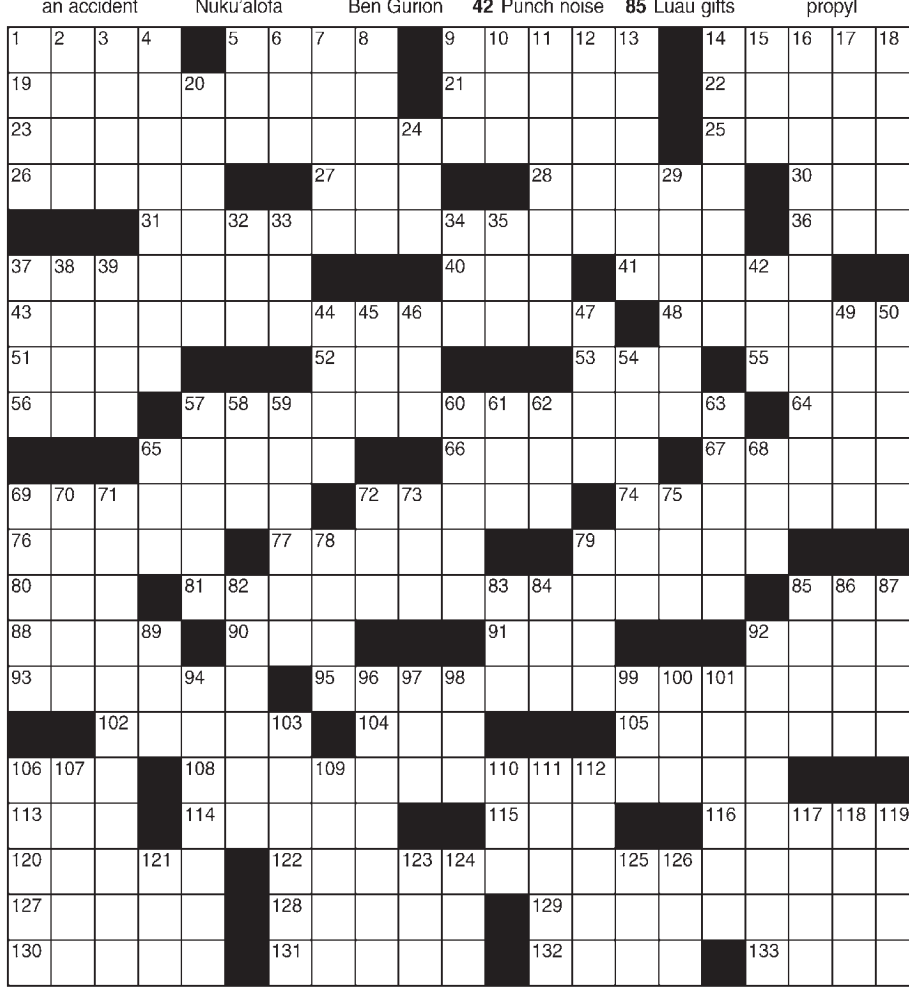
It just goes to show that even the expert has an Achilles' heel. When it comes to opening leads, he, in common with lesser mortals, will frequently fail to find the most effective one. Less-accomplished players will no doubt take some satisfaction from this.

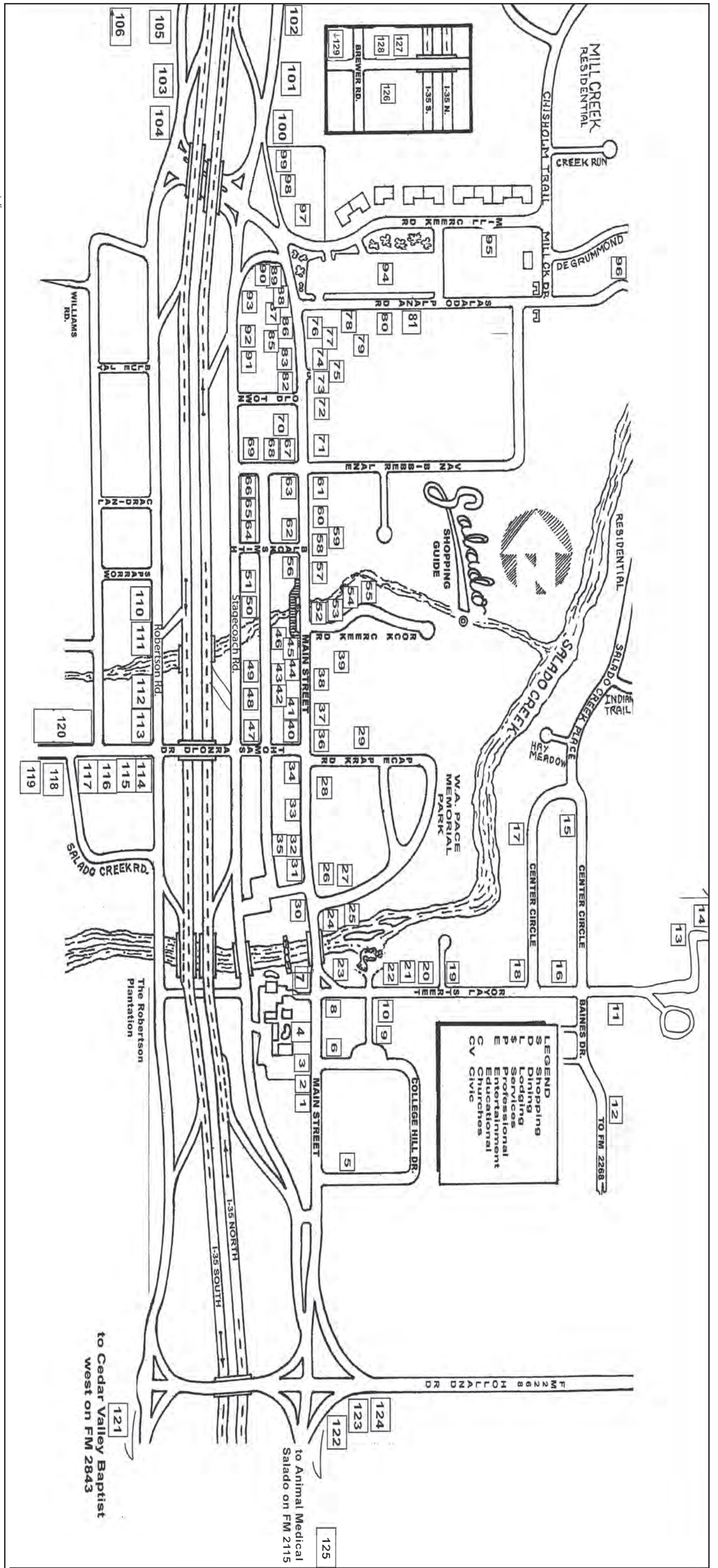

# America's Great Outdoors Initiative



Dear EarthTalk: What is the Obama administration's America's Great Outdoors initiative and what does it hope to accomplish?

President Obama signed a Presidential Memorandum in April 2010 establishing the America's Great Outdoors Initiative to promote and support innovative community-level efforts to conserve outdoor spaces and reconnect Americans to the outdoors. The Memorandum calls for collaboration among the Departments of Interior and Agriculture as well as the Environmental Protection Agency and the White House's own Council on Environmental Quality in leading the initiative. Eight other federal agencies play a supporting role—and literally thousands of other partners from state, local and tribal governments, non-profits and the private

sector are involved as well. Getting young people, especially city kids, into the outdoors to experience our country's unique natural heritage is a top priority of America's Great Outdoors. Before pursuing any specific strategies, initiative leaders solicited feedback from everyday Americans as to what mattered most to them regarding conservation and access to the outdoors. Some 105,000 written comments and many more spoken ones from "listening sessions" held coast to coast

streamed in and were crucial to the development of programs. Public feedback continues to shape the initiative's agenda. Some of the programs that fall under the umbrella of America's Great Outdoors include: the Veterans Fire Corps, which employs veterans in forest fire management; the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's program providing technical training and work opportunities for underserved youth in habitat restoration and fisheries monitoring; and

the establishment of a new network of "water trails" coast to coast to increase everyone's access to the outdoors. America's Great Outdoors was in the news recently when Interior Secretary Sally Jewell announced the launch of 21st Century Conservation Service Corps as part of the program. "21CSC," as Jewell calls it, aims to be a modern incarnation of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) that President Franklin Roosevelt used to help put Ameri-

cans back to work during the Great Depression. Jewell envisions a 100,000 person strong "CCC 2.0" that will provide opportunities for thousands of young Americans—6.7 million of whom are currently unemployed or not in school—and veterans transitioning back to civilian life to serve their country, feel proud of what they are accomplishing and improve their own lives and the lives of others around them.

the program into a potent force for reducing youth and veteran unemployment while giving our endangered lands and waterways some much-needed attention.

Environmentalists may be disappointed that the Obama administration hasn't been able to muscle through mandatory greenhouse gas emissions cuts and put sustainability concerns at the forefront of the policymaking process, but getting unprecedented numbers of Americans involved in conservation projects that protect the nation's treasured natural heritage is a worthy conservation legacy in its own right. The program is sure to positively impact generations of Americans for decades to come.
