Wildflower festival promises busy weekend in Salado

Salado will host the 13th Annual Wildflower Art Fair & Festival on March 21-23 with events at the Salado Civic Center, The Range at the Barton House and throughout the Village.

It is a weekend long celebration of music, art, food and drink, and handmade crafts by artisans from Texas and other parts of the U.S.

The fun-filled activities will be spread throughout the village, beginning with the Arts & Crafts Festival located on the Salado Civic Center grounds on Main Street. Fifty vendors of handcrafted arts and crafts will be located under a single tent offering unique items.

The outdoor food court will host several local food vendors and non profit groups, while the Wild West Soda Stand offers home-made sodas for your sipping delight.

The Arts & Crafts Festival hours are 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. on March 21, 10 a.m. - 10 p.m. on March 22 and noon - 4 p.m. on March 23. Live music will be

playing on the Civic Center grounds during the Arts & Crafts Festival on March 22 and 23. The Civic Center will also host a skydiving demonstration provided by Skydive Temple, located just south of Salado.

Admission to the Arts & Crafts Festival is \$2 for adults, children 12 and under are free.

The first ever Salado Pub Crawl will take place Wildflower weekend at 6 p.m. on March 21. Tickets are \$19.95 and includes a collectible Pub Crawl cup. Pub participants will travel to five different pub locations in Salado and have their cups filled with a different craft beer at each stop. Crawl stops are: Alexander's Distillery, The Shed, The Range at the Barton House, and the Stagecoach Saloon.

Another first of its kind, the Edgy Art Show makes its debut in Salado on Wildflower Weekend. See related story below.

High speed chase ends on I-35 in Salado

DPS and Salado Police stopped a white male suspect after he allegedly led DPS on a high speed chase from Elgin to the 285 mile marker on I-35 in Salado. The suspect was in custody at about 11:45 a.m. March 14.

The suspect was driving a silver Ford F-150 pickup truck.

According to witnesses, the tires on the truck were blown out from about the I-35 and Hwy 195 area in northern Georgetown. By the time the driver

stopped, both tires on the passenger's side were off and the rims had collapsed.

"Oh yeah, he was on rims (in Georgetown) and they already had the helicopter and about a dozen DPS cars on him at that point," Arthur Vasquez, a resident of Pflugerville who saw the chase in Georgetown, told *Salado Village Voice* on the scene in Salado.

Another witness told *Salado Village Voice* that "he blew past us in Jarrell

doing at least 90 or more."

The scene caused traffic to back up on both sides of I-35 as southbound travelers rubber neck the scene.

According to Salado Police Chief Jack Hensley, the suspect allegedly refused to stop for a traffic violation and led police on the chase through multiple counties. Douglas Lewis, 67 of Houston, was arraigned at the Bell County Jail and transferred to Bastrop to face charges.

CTC Jazz Ensemble featured performers at Tablerock

The Central Texas College (CTC) Jazz Ensemble will be the featured performer at this weekend's Salado Spring Stroll Jazz Festival. The event will be held at the Tablerock Amphitheatre at 7 p.m. March 22. The concert starts at 7 p.m. while concession sales will begin at 6 p.m.

Under the direction of Dr. Bradley Bolick of Salado, the CTC Jazz Ensemble performs a variety of music genres ranging from jazz to classical styles. The band is made up of nearly 20 CTC students who are either in the fine arts music program or who just like to perform. In addition to community events, the CTC Jazz Ensemble performs at numerous campus events and during CTC Fine Arts department functions. These functions include the Student Music Showcase which will be held at CTC next month.

Election deadlines loom

Local residents who want to vote in the contested Mayoral, Aldermen and School Board Trustees election will need to be registered no later than April 10.

The election will be held May 10 for those races. Early voting begins April 28 and ends on May 6. The last day to apply for a Ballot by Mail is May 1. The last day for the election officials to receive a Ballot by Mail is May 10.

The Mayoral race is being contested. Incumbent Danney McCort faces sitting alderman Hans Fields, former mayor Rick Ashe and Rev. Skip Blannett.

Fields made a statement this week about rumors circulating around the Village that he was "dropping out of the race."

"This is untrue," Fields said. "I have no intention now or ever of dropping out of the race. I am not sure how this rumor started but it is totally untrue."

Four candidates filed for two positions on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen: incumbent Bryan Fritch, former mayor and alderman Merle Stalcup, Amber Preston Dankert and Frank Coachman.

Three positions on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees will be up for election with four candidates filing: incumbents Rodney Bell and Kim Bird and Kristi Jarvis and Brian Sunshine.

Aldermen meet

Salado aldermen will meet in workshop sessions and regular sessions on March 20. The 3 p.m. workshop session concerning the Stagecoach sewer plant will be closed.

The regular session will begin at 6 p.m. and is open to the public

Watch artists create, compete this weekend

Salado's first-ever Edgy Art Show will be part of the Wildflower weekend.

Local artists will compete on the grounds of The Range at the Barton House, creating their own individual works of art that you will vote on. The Edgy Art Show Competition will be held 11 am.-3 p.m. on March 22. Admission is \$5 and includes one vote. A \$25 ticket includes six more votes and entry into a raffle to win the work of art that you voted for.

Artists competing are the following:

JOHN AND CHARLES HANCOCK

Charles and John Hancock -- also known as the Amazing Hancock Bros. to some -- are masters of low-tech print making and other mixed media printing.

They excel in woodcuts and silk-screen prints, or mixed-media variants of the two. They also double-team on mixed-media prints, where genre and identity both blur.

They are known to use exotic material such as mattress covers, plastic, metal flashing, little mermaid bed sheets, recycled materials or even a good piece of arches buff rag paper and whatever is handy to print on.

Their work is peopled with happy clowns, morose little hobo clowns toting giant guns, wrestlers (Sumo and otherwise), pigs, livestock, more guns, insects, booze, crucifixes, broken typewriters, imported car parts, hot rods, trophy skulls and even kamikaze attacks on 18-wheelers.

AARON GIST

Central Texas sculptor Aaron Gist currently resides in Salado, where he works in aluminum,

bronze, steel, and stainless steel. Gist credits his knowledge in metals and mold-making to endless experimentation, in addition to training he received from mentor Lonnie Edwards, father Forrest Gist and at the University of Texas under sculptor Steve Daly.

Additionally, Gist currently works in soft glass as an apprentice to Gail Allard at Salado Glassworks.

Gist holds an AA in art from Temple College, as well as a BFA in studio art and sculpture from the University of Texas at Austin.

CHAD HINES

"My work combines iconic and personal references with the surprise of design and content, presented through a juxtaposition of images and shapes," says artist Chad Hines, who holds a Master of Fine Arts from Stephen F. Austin.

He has taught college art courses at Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, McLennan Community College in Waco and the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor in Belton. In 2010, he was hired by Central Texas College in Killeen as the head of the Visual Arts

Program and Gallery Coordinator for campus visual art exhibitions.

He lives in Temple with his wife and their two daughters.

"Each piece is created by pooling my artistic skills and knowledge and incorporating both traditional and non-traditional skills and materials, such as carpentry, construction techniques and flooring remnants, industrial materials and coatings," he says of his work. "The overall use of an intuitive process allows the imagery and structures to grow from unplanned responses and provides the most formative degree in fulfilling my personal expression."

BENJAMIN GUENTHER

Benjamin Guenther has been making art since he could walk.

He grew up in San Antonio and moved to Temple in 2001 on a full ride golf scholarship. He later finished his schooling with a Sculpture degree from Southwest Texas University. School is where he met his soon-to-be wife Allison. Shortly after graduation, Benjamin landed a full time job as the lead sculptor for a company called The Fountain People. This is where he sculpted and theme-paint-

ed large water park rides for eight years. He often admitted that this was a dream job.

This was until he and Allison started to dream bigger, about starting their own artistic company. These dreams blossomed into what is now REVELATION Décor. Benjamin is able to use many of the art skills he has learned along the way to create unique products for his own company. The Russian Reset to Nowhere

The “reset” with Russia had a brief, unhappy life. It began with then-Secretary of State Hillary Clinton presenting her Russian counterpart with a mistranslated reset button reading “overcharged.” It ended with current Secretary of State John Kerry denying knowledge of the late, unlamented policy on “Meet the Press”: “Well, I don’t know what you mean by the reset.”

Memories are short in Foggy Bottom. And understandably. Who wouldn’t try to forget a geopolitical initiative that has been exposed as willful naivete and strategic obtuseness from the beginning?

George Kennan wrote the famous “Long Telegram” at the outset of the Cold War. President Barack Obama would have needed only “A Very Brief Telegram” at the outset of his administration: “Bush’s fault.”

This was a perverse misreading of history. Of all President George W. Bush’s failings, not giving the Russians a chance wasn’t one of them. He notoriously looked into Russian President Vladimir Putin’s eyes at the beginning of his presidency and saw sweetness and light. By the end, his illusions were shattered by the Russian invasion of Georgia in 2008.

President Obama picked up like this Russian act of aggression had been perpetrated long ago by the Grand Duke of Muscovy, instead of by the very regime he was resetting with.

In a 2009 visit to Moscow, the springtime of reset, President Obama professed his belief “that Americans and Russians have a common interest in the development of rule of law, the strengthening of democracy, and the protection of human rights.” He was 0 for 3.

It didn’t take a student of Russian history, or of international relations or even of the model U.N., to know that this would end in ashes.

At one level, the Obama administration was guilty of the human impulse of wanting to see the world as you would like it to be, rather than as it is.

At another, the president is not particularly interested in international relations. It was appropriate that one of his statements on the crisis came at an elementary school while announcing his latest budget, which reduces the U.S. Army to pre-World War

II levels. Because we all know that we will never face an unexpected, unpredictable international crisis again.

Whereas Obama has the left’s traditional discomfort with American power, Putin has no such guilty conscience. Whereas Obama believes we’ve entered a paradisiacal new period in history when everyone can be constrained by international norms, Putin has no such delusions.

President Obama said recently that Ukraine’s stability and success are “in Russia’s interest.” Not if you are Vladimir Putin and stung by the humiliation of the Russian empire’s diminishment after the end of the Cold War and informed by Catherine the Great’s belief that the only way to secure Russia borders is to extend them.

President Obama declares that Russia is on the wrong side of history. That may be a clinching argument in a debate over gay marriage at Wesleyan University, but won’t carry much weight with Putin. He thinks he can make history move with lies, tuggery and iron.

It’s now Obama’s challenge to prove him wrong.

Put the public back in public information

This week is Sunshine Week, a nationwide discussion about the importance of access to public information and what it means for you and your community. During this week we pay special attention to our collective obligation to bring some “sunshine” to the often shadowy processes of government decision-making.

Different governments have different ways of inhibiting effective oversight of government decision-making, from intentional stonewalling and secrecy to budget-driven decisions to reduce hours and staffing.

These problems, while diverse, may have a similar solution: Public records and the content of public meetings should be considered public data, and accessible to anyone who wants it, including electronically.

Technology has made the transmission of information easy and inexpensive, and when we demand electronic, online access

to public information, we add a new and important method of bringing sunlight to all corners of government.

When we ask that public data be made regularly available on a website, we don’t have to wait for responses to our requests to find out about government activities. We can find out about decisions made in our name, right on our own computers. We can find out about upcoming government committee meetings on our own phones. We can download information that lets us compare existing and past government behavior. We can evaluate the impact of different kinds of deci-

THE PERFECT WORLD FOR CORPORATIONS WOULDN’T BE COMPLETE WITHOUT A DOSE OF FACTUAL MANIPULATION.

In L. Frank Baum’s novel, *The Wonderful Wizard of Oz*, the “wizard” turns out to be a phony — just an old guy sitting behind a curtain, using his booming voice to spew nonsense in a vain effort to fool people.

But now, a century after Baum’s fictional Oz, a real-life incarnation of the phony wizard has been discovered — hiding behind not one, but two curtains. He’s recently been circulating his nonsense in full-page newspaper ads that hyperbolically denounce economists who favor raising the minimum wage as “radical researchers.”

The ad directs readers to a website named *MinimumWage.com*, implying that it supports the positions of independent, unbiased, and non-radical economists. But, no — it’s not a group at all, just a curtain.

What’s behind it? Something that goes by the name of The Employment Policies Institute, which sounds rock solid, but it too is just a curtain.

Go to 1090 Vermont Avenue NW in Washington, the address of this “institute,” and you won’t find any economists or any other employees. The institute has none. Instead you will find the old wizard sitting there — manipulating

the big restaurant chains. They want to keep profiting by paying poverty wages to their workers, so they’ve hired Berman to trash any and all who support raising America’s wage floor.

sions across governmental units.

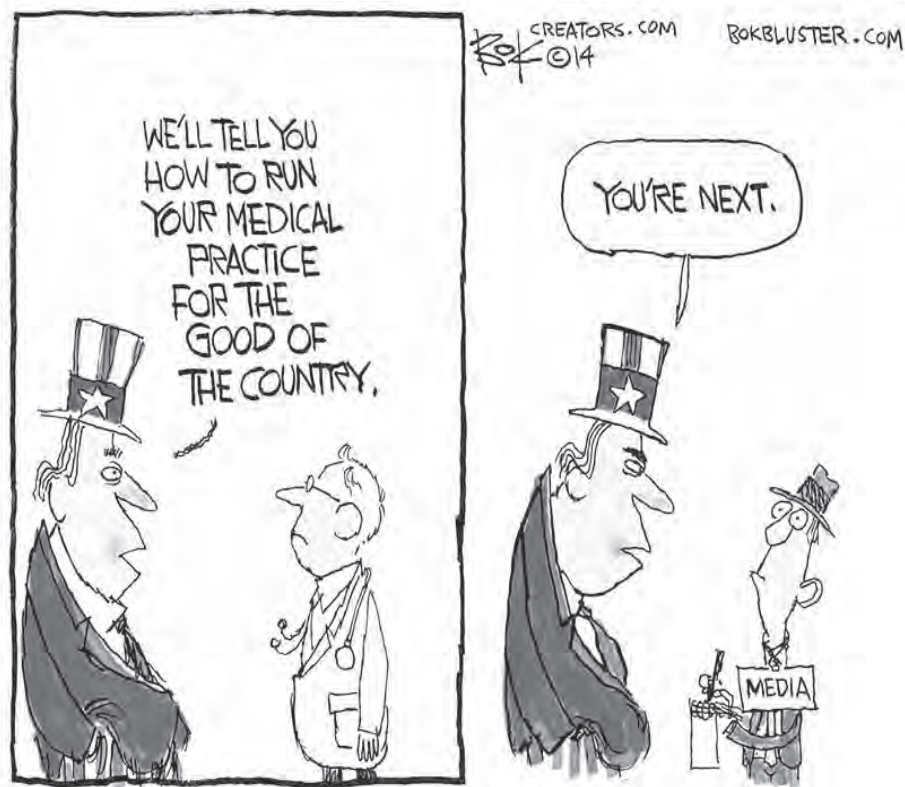
Many states and cities have developed open data policies that make this kind of proactive release of public data a reality, and this allows for civic-facing technologists and others to make this public information more accessible to more people.

In Chicago, readily available data about municipal lobbying has enabled civic technologists to develop easy ways to visualize the strength of lobbyist involvement in city lawmaking.

In Philadelphia, people were able to use campaign finance disclosures to demonstrate how much and to whom city wards were contributing—and also how much was coming to fund city campaigns from outside of the city or even the state.

Open data policies can also lead to the crowd-sourcing of useful information for cities to use in improving their service to citizens.

In South Bend, Ind., civic technologists built an interface that allowed people to both report vacant buildings to the city and for the city to let people know about existing plans



for building demolition or redevelopment.

In all cases, the value of open data is limited by the degree to which local transparency advocates know about it and use it. It's time to expand expand the rights we have to access all the halls of power,

be they the elegant marble foyers of the United States Congress or the carpet-tiled corridors of the smallest town office.

To help the sun shine into your own government through a different window, urge it to establish an official policy that

guarantees you constant and immediate access to your public information. When we free the public data we're achieving the enduring goal of freedom of information—while using the advantages of the 21st century.

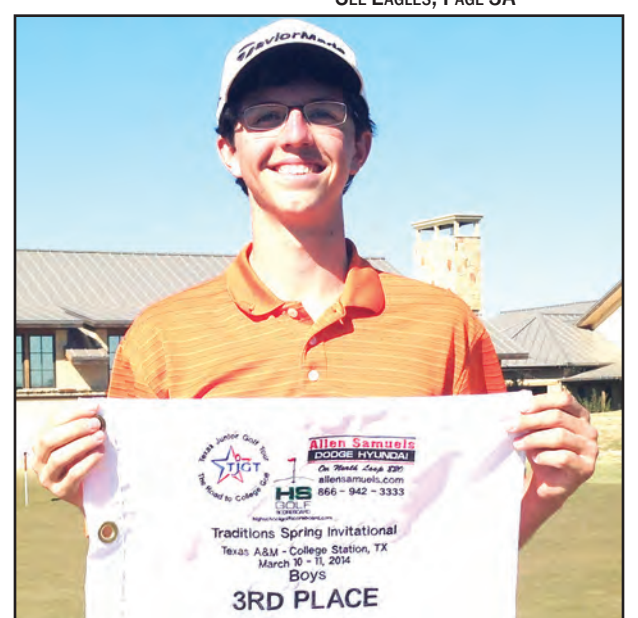

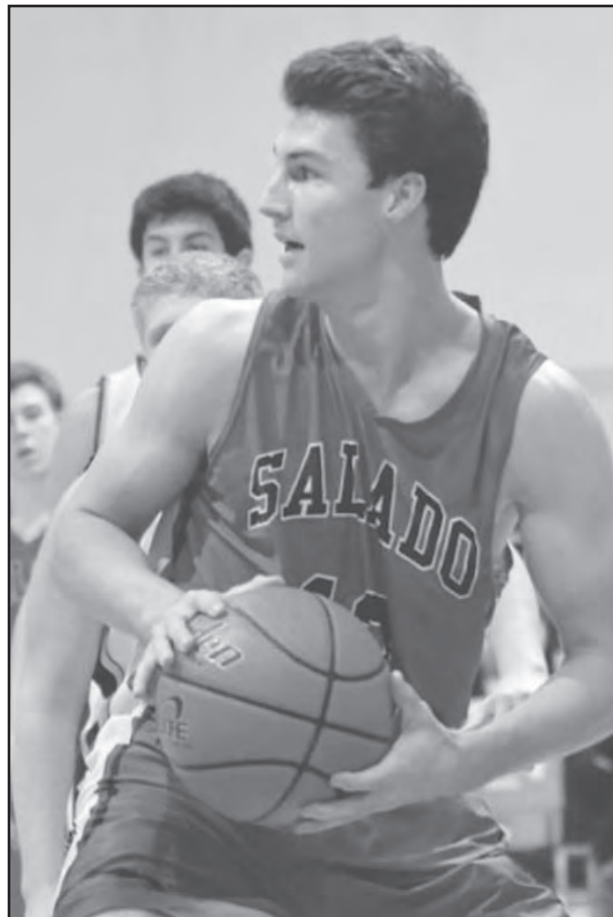

SHS speakers place in TFA State

The Salado High School Speech and Debate Team competed at the Texas Forensic Association State Tournament at Cypress Creek High School in Houston on March 6-8.

In Domestic Extemp, 109 students participated in the state meet. Sydney Walter placed fourth. In the final round of competition, Walter competed against speakers from 5A schools (Plano Senior HS, Hendrickson HS, Clements HS, Robert E. Lee HS and Cypress Creek HS). Rachel Evans reached the semifinal round of competition where she placed third. The top two speakers in the three semifinal sections advanced to finals, so Evans arguably was in the top 10 at the state meet. Only one other school, Plano Senior HS, had two students reach the

The TFA State Tournament is the largest state tournament in the nation. Over 1,500 students and 216 schools from all five TFA regions participated in the tournament. TFA does not make a distinction between school size or public-private status. Given this, Salado, a small 2A school, competes against the large 5A schools and the affluent private schools from Dallas and Houston. To qualify, students must earn at least 12 points in at least one TFA event.

Youth Leadership learn about Bell County

Salado Youth Leadership's adventures continued with their session on Feb. 25.

During this session, the group set off to tour places of significance to Bell County. They started their journey at the County Clerk's office, where they received a little taste of Bell County History. While there, the students learned about how the documents had been preserved for many years. These documents include anything from birth and death certificates to cattle books and marriage licenses.

After their history lesson, the group then traveled across the complex to the Bell County Jail. There, they were taken through the process that a normal inmate would take after they had been arrested. One student in particular had an experience like no other while in the jail. Freshman Parker Seaton explained this experience when he said, "I was used as an example, so my mug shot was taken, my fingerprints were entered into the system, and I was even patted down in a holding cell. It truly was a big eye opener. The experience literally scared me straight; I don't think I ever want to be arrested." This tour of the jail gave the students

a unique look at what they would go through if they were to ever be caught up in a situation that is not appropriate for the leaders the students are supposed to be for their community. After the group's tour of the jail was over, they met with some of Bell County's attorneys, commissioners, and judges. During this encounter, they learned how the system works whenever someone is caught doing something illegal, such as breaking and entering. The students then had time to discuss situations with the attorneys, commissioners, and judges about what happens to teenagers of similar ages to the students whenever they are taken into custody.

The group concluded their journey at the Bell County Museum. There, they were informed some more of the historical significance of Bell County. These students learned more about how Bell County started, its people, and how the county got to where it is today.

The group's next adventure will be on March 27 when they visit Scott & White hospital for a session on drinking and texting while driving.

the work finds favor with another person," Griffith said. "Philosophically, I believe there are no new images, designs, or colors.

They all exist in the universe. We humans 'play' with images, designs, and colors.

Painting in oils, Griffith says that "Sometimes I want a brush for paint application, sometimes a palette knife. Sometimes I want to paint with precise detail; other times with vagueness. Reflections of light and emotion are important themes."

Griffith studied color and design with abstract artist and author Ethel

Beitler. She began studying oil painting with Larry Prellop and later technical oil painting with Dalhart Windberg.

"I was born with an intense curiosity about the world around me and sensitivity to color," she said.

Her abstracts can be seen at Griffith Fine Art Gallery at 229 North Main Street in Salado.

As a result of the World of Art Showcase, Griffith is now represented by The Amsterdam/Whitney Art

Gallery in New York City as their only Texas artist.



Risky Business Contract Bridge

I have it on good authority that this deal actually occurred in a pair championship some years ago. There is no point in saying that hands such as South's are never dealt, as the players involved would testify to the contrary.

South opened four notrump, planning to bid a grand slam if his partner showed one ace in response to Blackwood. But South was playing against very active opponents, and by the time it was his turn to bid again, East-West were in six hearts.

Reluctant to settle for a small penalty, and convinced that he could not make seven clubs, South ventured six spades. It seemed to him that on the bidding, North would have spade length. At any rate, he fervently hoped so. When East doubled, South stood solidly behind his decision and passed. West led the king of diamonds, and South was home. He won with the ace and played the K-Q-J of trumps, East holding up the ace until the third round.

East returned a diamond, ruffed by declarer with the deuce, his last trump. South then ruffed the ace of hearts in dummy, drew East's last trump with the ten and ran his clubs to score the slam.

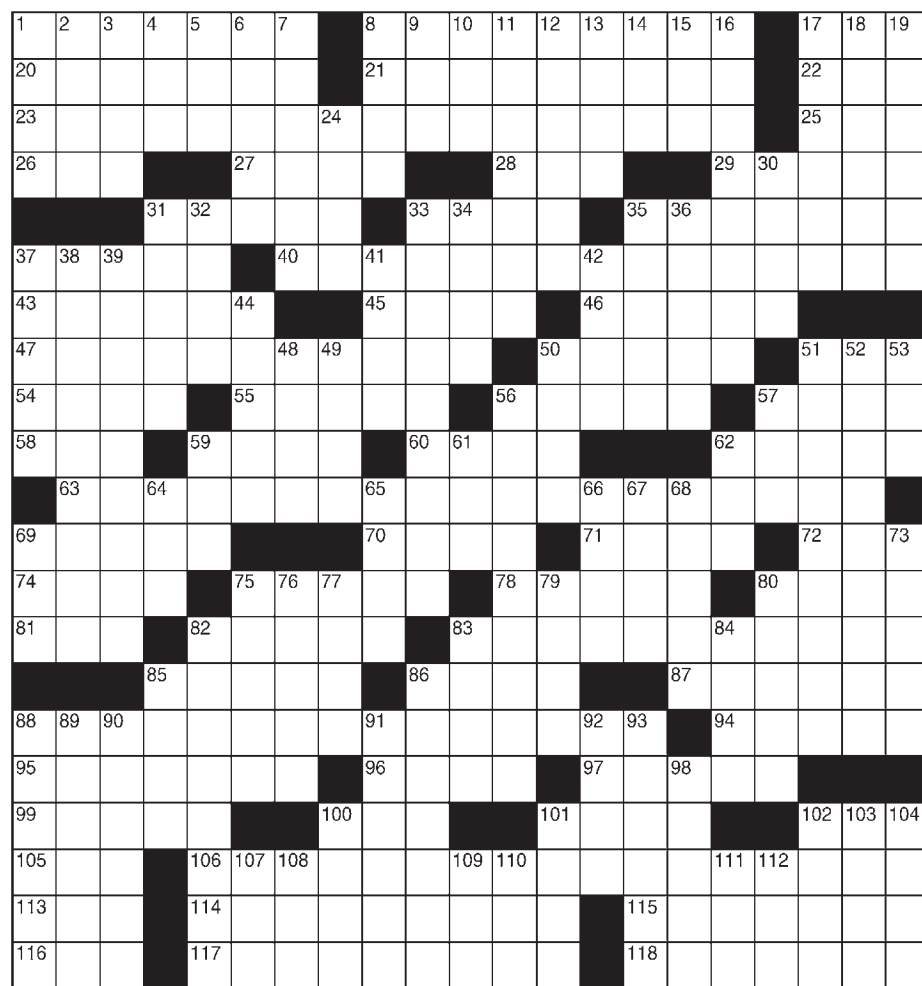
West could have defeated the slam with a club lead, but that does not detract from the credit due South for his bold bid. South might have been carted off in an ambulance had his partner been short of spades. But he took the position that six hearts doubled would yield a poor result and that he could not lose much -- and might gain a lot -- by his seemingly reckless bid.

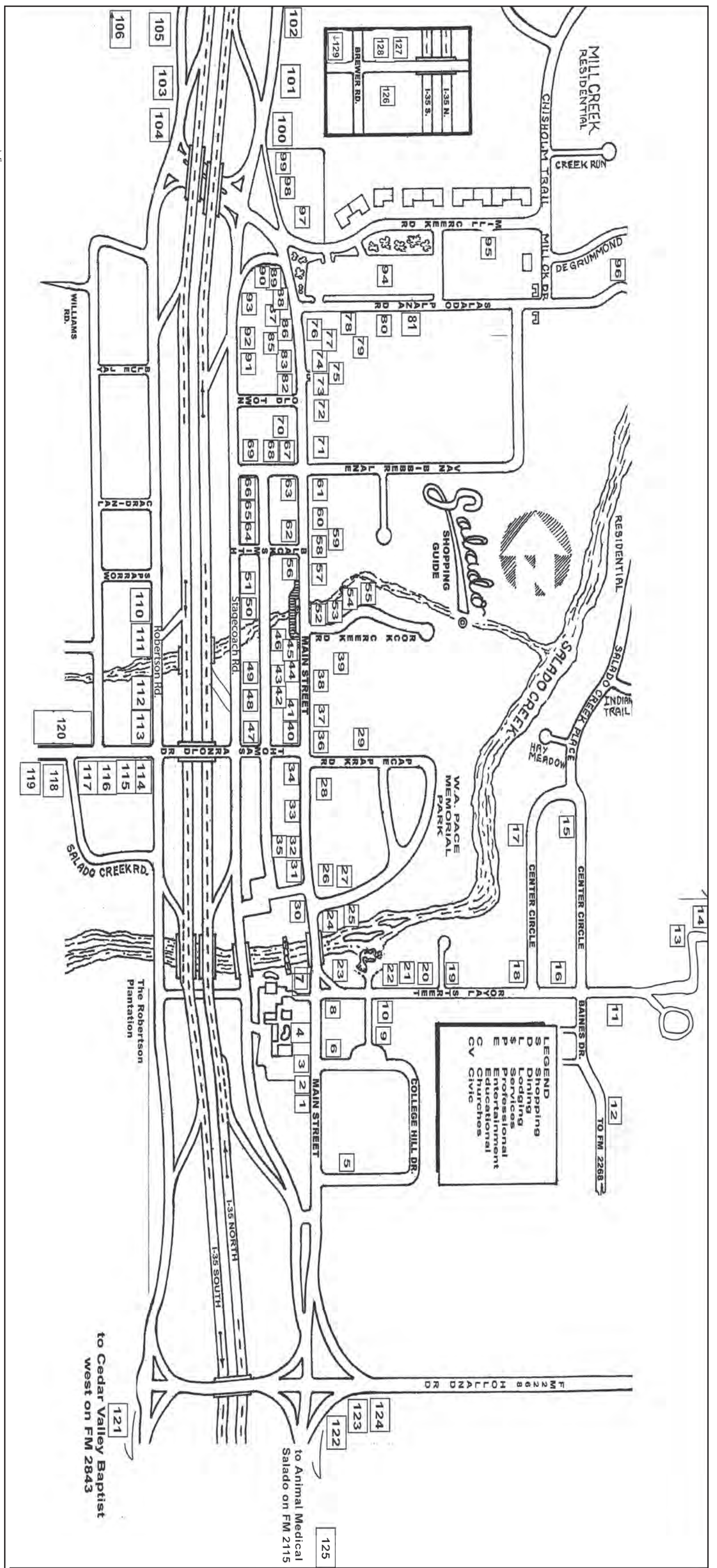


