Texas Wine & Rogue Art Fest this weekend

With cool (rather than icy cold) temperatures in the air, it is clear that spring has arrived, and with it, wine festivals.

Kick off the season at the oldest wine festival in Central Texas March 29-30 when the Village of Salado is filled with folks sipping wine, browsing art and nibbling on the best at the Sixth Annual Texas Wine and Rogue Art Fest.

Celebrate spring by attending the biggest wine festival between Austin and Grapevine and this year bigger than ever before.

Twenty-two wineries and vineyards will be pouring all varieties of Texas wine, alongside 38 booths featuring art, delectable foods, and handmade goodies. There will be wineries from Florence, Waco and Meridian, as well as from around the state, such as Poteet, Burleson, Marble Falls, Dallas and Houston. With over 90 wines to sample, there is something for everyone.

June Ritterbusch, festival organizer and winery owner says, "I am looking forward to trying the Cabernet Sauvignons, Tempranillos and Vermentinos, while other folks prefer the fruit wines and the sweeter styles." There will also be several ports and a couple of sparkling wines.

Next door to the festival, St. Joseph's Episcopal Church of Salado will be holding their first Annual Art Show as well. The parishioners of St. Joseph's wanted to help promote local artists so they have assembled their own art celebration. Their art will include handcrafts such as recycled hand-painted flower pots, name jewelry and homemade goodies like coconut granola. The youth group will be selling hot dogs and lemonade.

Just in time for the festival, Salado Winery will release their 2012 Diamond Back and the 2013 Night Flight. Both wines are 100% grown in their vineyard in Salado and made on the premise.



You'll find bling and a lot more at the Rogue Art Fest this weekend.

These wines will pair well with the truffles being sold by Wiseman House Chocolates and the handmade cheese from Texas Cheese House. "In a Pickle" is back this year with their intriguing pickled specialties along with "In Hog Heaven" who specializes in pork sandwiches like, "Pignic Sandwich" a fried bologna sandwich. Foodies will also enjoy biscotti from EMA Baking Company and olive oils from Spicewood Food Company.

You will be able to hear music wafting from the grounds of Salado Winery and Salado Wine Seller. A full list of participants is available at www.saladowinefestival.com.

"I wanted to attract a different type of artist, so I named it 'Rogue' as in the artists are going rogue," Ritterbusch goes on to explain, "We are always searching for unusual artists and this year we have found some". These Texas wineries are rogue entrepreneurs as well, and I think all the wine and art folks are going to create a great experience." This year, the most rogue artist is likely to be Kristy Dexter whose business is named "KristysKrap", and her work includes blinged out and vintage animal skulls.

The festival will be held on the grounds of Salado Winery and Salado Wine Seller at 841 N. Main St., Salado, rain or shine. Pets on leashes are allowed and families are welcome.

Texas Wine & Rogue Art Fest hours will be noon-5 p.m. March 29 and noon-4 p.m. March 30.

Village finances in top shape, auditor says

The Village of Salado increased its fund balance by \$262,430 in the 2012-13 and village assets exceed village liabilities by more than \$1.7 million.

CPA Don Allman told Village aldermen at their March 20 that the village finances were in "great shape" for a community of this size. He presented the annual audit of Village finances, reviewing the 32 page document with the board.

Despite a 14.6 decrease in sales tax revenues from the previous year, the Village increased net assets by \$175,575.

"You have no bonded debt, no existing long term loans. Your only liabilities appear to be in vacation and accrued expenses," Allman said.

During the 2012-13 fiscal year, the Village generated \$979,830 in general fund revenues. Of that, \$343,733 were in general sales and use taxes, \$250,434 in franchise fees and \$250,641 in property taxes. The village levies a property tax of \$0.12 per \$100 valuation, so each penny in property tax

generates approximately \$21,000 in revenue.

The Village spent \$756,459 in 2012-13. The general government costs were \$202,358, police department costs were \$231,992 and fire protection costs were \$33,800. Public works expenditures were \$215,667.

The Village increased its general fund balance by \$223,371 last fiscal year. The Village also increased its hotel/motel tax fund balance by \$39,059 last year. The Village generated \$255,520 in hotel/motel revenues last year and spent \$216,461. The Village hotel/motel fund balance is \$155,963.

The Village maintains total fund balances of \$1.22 million, including \$1.06 million in the general fund balance.

A healthy fund balance, Allman said, "is good to have so that when you have a bad year you have the funds to continue operating."

In other business, aldermen approved the voluntary annexation into the Extra Territorial Jurisdiction of a piece of property in Hidden Springs subdivision owned by Walter Lesley.

Smokin' Spokes March 29

The 12th Annual Smokin' Spokes Bike Ride, benefitting the Salado Volunteer Fire Department, will be held March 29, with the ride beginning at 8 a.m. at Salado's Pace Park. All routes will begin and end in Salado Pace Park.

As in previous years, a variety of routes will be available for riders to choose from, with each route differing in distance and overall difficulty.

Riders can pick from 15, 27, 57, 70, 85 and 102 mile rides. All routes will begin and end in Salado's Pace Park. Most routes will take cyclists east to the Summer's Mill area, and also west to Stillhouse Hollow Lake.

There are rest stops designated with each route. "We placed most of our rest stops at very scenic locations," said Charles Young, Salado Volunteer Fire Department Chief. "One is on the shore of Stillhouse Hollow Lake; one is at the Overlook Park on top of the dam to Stillhouse Hollow; and one is at Summer's Mill."

Entry fee will be \$25 for pre-registration and \$30 for on-site registration. The first 300 pre-registered riders will be guaranteed a Smokin' Spokes T-Shirt. Pre-Register by March 26.

Click on saladospokes.com/ to register via the internet and learn more about the race, including maps of the various routes.

On-site registration can be completed for \$30.

Free food and drinks will be handed out to riders all day long at the finish line.



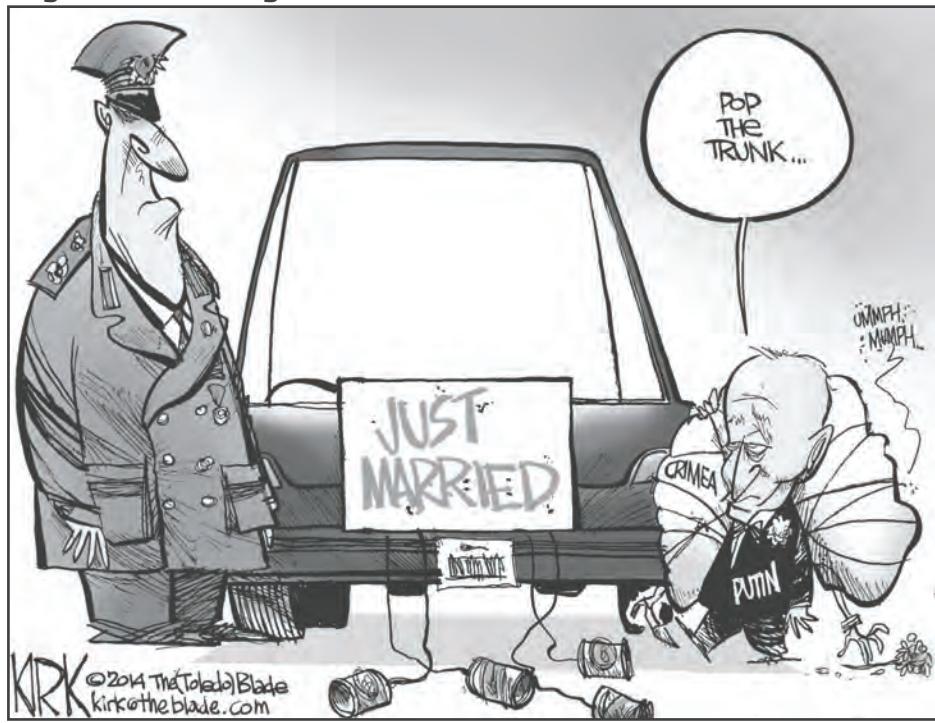

Culture of Corruption

It has been more than nine months since Lois Lerner, head of tax exempt groups at the IRS, admitted the IRS targeted groups based on their political beliefs. As the scandal has unfolded, the media has predictably remained largely silent, allowing the Obama Administration to sweep it under the rug. In fact, in an interview with Fox News, President Obama went as far as to say there “was not even a smidgen of corruption,” in the IRS scandal.

But we know better than to take the Administration at face value. Actions speak louder than words, and even though the President says the targeting was not the result of corruption, his IRS is now trying to implement a new rule that will stifle free speech and damage the integrity of our tax system. The proposed rule redefines political activity for 501(c)(4) groups, overturning 50 year old regulations.

The Treasury Department quietly released the rule during the Thanksgiving season last year,

hoping it would not attract attention. The Committee on Ways and Means, which is investigating the scandal, uncovered internal IRS emails from as early as 2012. In these internal emails officials like Lois Lerner discussed developing the rule “off-plan” – meaning in secret, away from the public eye. When it released the rule, Treasury claimed it was designed to fix the issues at the IRS that led to the targeting scandal. In truth, the proposed rule would only institutionalize the targeting and make it impossible for many conservative groups – including many Tea Parties – to operate as they currently do. Simply, the rule would threaten free speech.

The IRS and Treasury cannot be allowed to target conservatives in any way, which is why I cosponsored the STOP Targeting of Political Beliefs by the IRS Act (H.R. 3865), which the House passed last week. This bill will prevent the Obama Administration from finalizing the regulation for one year. Forcing the Administration to wait a year before implementing the rule will give Congress time to complete its investiga-

tion into the IRS targeting and develop commonsense solutions to ensure nothing like this ever happens again.

In addition to cosponsoring H.R. 3865, I joined many of my colleagues and thousands of average Americans in commenting on the proposed rule during the public comment period. Treasury and IRS received over 140,000 public comments on the proposed rule, more than any other proposed regulation in American history. The message is clear: Tax-exempt organizations do not deserve to suffer due to Obama’s efforts to politically influence and corrupt the IRS.

My efforts do not end there. Last week, I cosponsored the Protecting Taxpayers from Intrusive IRS Requests Act (H.R. 2531) and voted in favor of the Taxpayer Transparency and Efficient Audit Act (H.R. 2530). Both bills passed the House. They are designed to curb the amount of power given to the IRS, because it has demonstrated an inability to handle its power in an unbiased and nonpartisan way.

Dumbing Down the SAT

It turns out that SAT words were too abstruse. The College Board is updating its iconic test yet again in ways that are indistinguishable from dumbing it down. The old vocabulary words are out, the math is easier, guessing is no longer punished in the scoring -- and we're supposed to believe that the test is better than ever.

The SAT, relied on heavily in college admissions, has long been attacked for not producing sufficiently egalitarian results. The multiple-choice test has been accused of everything from racism to classism. It is almost certainly the most hated exam in America, and the easiest way to placate the critics is simply to make it less exacting.

The last round of changes 10 years ago eliminated the analogies (e.g., zenith : nadir :: pinnacle : valley) and instituted an essay. This was supposed to be an upgrade, but the mandatory essay is now being discarded. Peter Wood of the National Association of Scholars describes it as “a decade-long experiment in awarding points for sloppy writing graded by mindless formulae.”

The new SAT will move away from what a reporter in The New York

Times calls -- obviously relying on his readers' knowledge of old SAT vocabulary -- “esoteric” words. Instead, the test will emphasize “evidence-based reading.” The head of the College Board says an example would be an excerpt from an old speech by Rep. Barbara Jordan in which she said that the impeachment of Richard Nixon would divide people into two parties. Students taking the test would then have several choices for what Jordan meant by the word “party.” (Students answering “a gathering to celebrate an occasion,” or “to drink with friends,” will presumably get no credit.)

The SAT is called an instrument of privilege because students from higher-income families perform better. But parental educational attainment tracks with parental income, and highly educated parents will inevitably pass along their advantages to their kids. It is not in the power of the SAT to change this. As Robert VerBruggen of the website RealClearPolicy writes, “Income gaps are evident

on basically every academic measure we have.” The SAT is hardly perfect. It isn't strictly an aptitude test: The more you read and the more math you know, the better you are going to do. Maybe we should go all the way and use achievement tests instead? But that has its own problems, as Howard Wainer of the University of Pennsylvania pointed out in his book “Uneducated Guesses.” How much does proficiency in one subject area weigh against another? And this doesn't help if a student is in a rotten school that teaches nothing.

The SAT aims to predict first-year performance in college, with only modest success. But with its broader, more general approach, the SAT provides different information about students than either GPA or achievement tests. It is a useful tool.

At the end of the day, the problem isn't the SAT, it's ourselves. We have to do a better job raising and educating kids. That is much harder than complaining about the SAT, and the College Board can't do them for us.

SOME OF THE BIGGEST SUPPORTERS OF FRACKING DON'T WANT IT IN THEIR BACKYARDS.

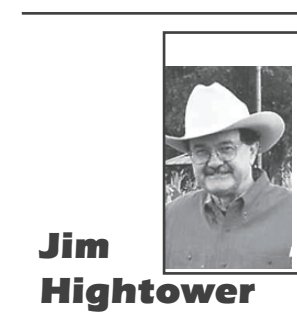
Rex Tillerson is mad. Fracking mad.

Tillerson, you see, isn't some local dirt farmer. He says he and his wife moved here to have a weekend getaway so they can enjoy the rural lifestyle.

He's not a farmer at all — unless you count “farming the government” and harvesting billions of dollars in special tax breaks and subsidies. Rex (whose name means “king” in Latin), is the

H.R. 2530 would keep taxpayers informed by requiring the IRS to explain the reasons for an extended audit for all audits lasting longer than one year. The second bill, H.R. 2531 will stop the IRS from asking tax-payers about their social, political and religious beliefs. Last week's legislation is a step in the right direction in restoring Americans' trust in our tax system.

Although the House has made significant progress by passing these bills, the Democratic Senate must act. The House has done its part by passing these important bills, but it is unlikely the Administration's friends, Harry Reid and the Democrats in the Senate, will follow suit. We still have a long journey ahead. Congressional investigators are still reviewing IRS documents and interviewing IRS employees. My House colleagues and I are working tirelessly to investigate the wrongdoing that has been committed and fighting against the Administra-

Bishop opens online survey

As part of a process in developing a Pastoral Plan for the Diocese of Austin, Bishop Joe S. Vásquez announced the opening of a survey intended to capture information to help the diocese plan for the next five years.

The 43-question survey is available online in English and Spanish. All Catholics, including those who are not participating in church life, are encouraged to take the survey, which

will be open through April 27. The survey can be taken anonymously at www.austindioocese.org.

The survey asks questions about the state of church life, faith formation and social issues.

The Diocese of Austin has begun the process of developing a Pastoral Plan, which is similar to what a business would call a strategic plan. It will help us define our goals and priorities for the com-

ing years. So, everyone's input is essential to our success," Bishop Vásquez said. "Recently, our Holy Father, Pope Francis, conducted a survey of bishops. To comply with his request, we used an online tool to collect information. We decided to use that same process to conduct our own survey. I encourage everyone to take the survey."

The survey takes about 10 minutes to complete on-

line. Those without access to the digital survey can contact their local Catholic Church and request a paper survey, which they can fill out and leave at any Catholic Church.

The results of the survey will be collected and analyzed by a 33-member Pastoral Plan Steering Committee with the assistance of the diocese's consultant, Chicago-based Essential Conversations.



Contract Bridge

In tournament circles, every expert has a favorite story about his encounter with a pair of beginners who have decided to test the waters against the pros. Often these stories relate how the newcomers managed to put one over on the experts.

One of these tales goes back to the time many years ago when two novices, bubbling with excitement, sat down to play against two celebrated Life Masters in a pair championship.

It wasn't really surprising that, as soon as the bidding was over, Novice No. 2 (East) led the queen of diamonds out of turn. The director was summoned and ruled that South could call the lead of any suit -- that was the rule in those days -- or treat the queen as an exposed card.

South directed West to lead a club, but Novice No. 1, somewhat embarrassed, stated he didn't have one to lead. Having selected his penalty, even though West could not comply, declarer had no further recourse. Novice No. 1 was now told he could lead anything at all.

So he shrewdly led a low diamond, knowing that his partner had the queen. East won with the jack -- the queen was back in his hand -- and returned a club, the suit West said he had none of.

West ruffed and led another low diamond to East's queen, whereupon a second club ruff gave the defenders their fourth trick. All over the room declarers were making four or five spades, but at this table declarer went down one, much to his dismay.

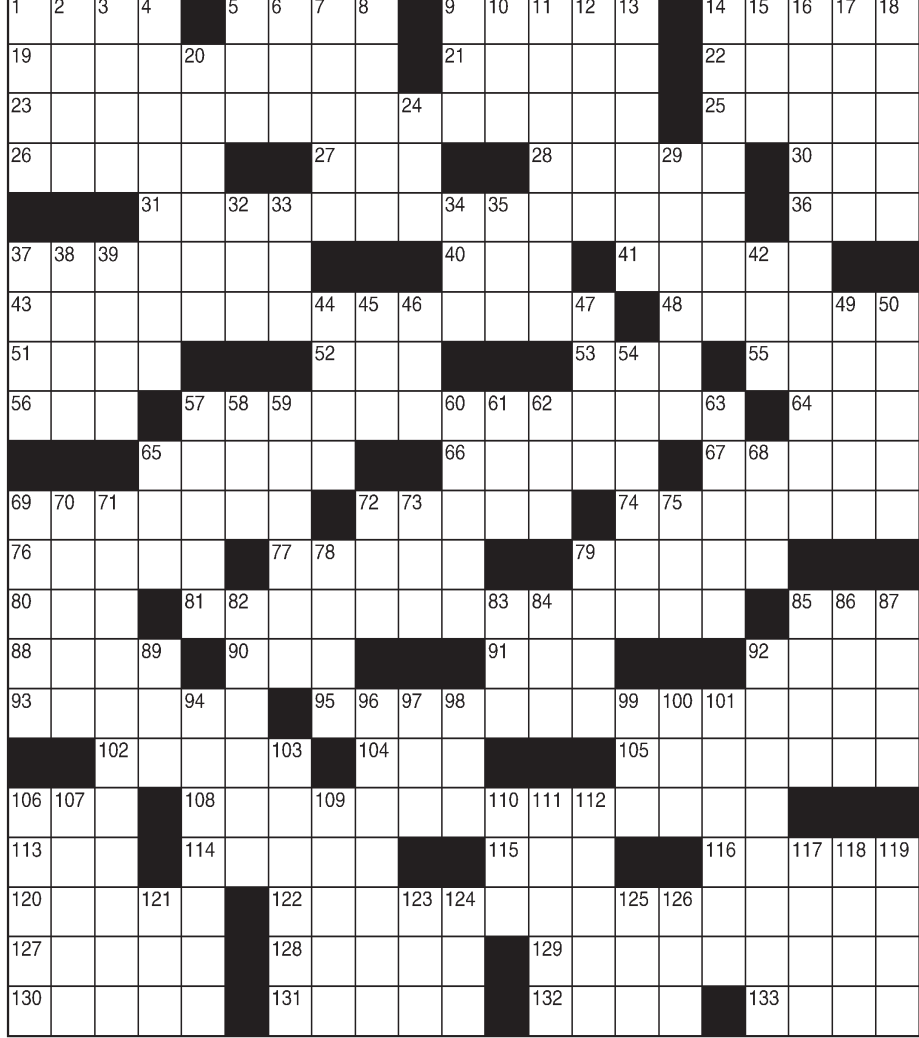
The moral -- if there is one -- is not altogether clear, but South has developed a certain degree of trepidation when he spots a pair of effusive beginners approaching his table.

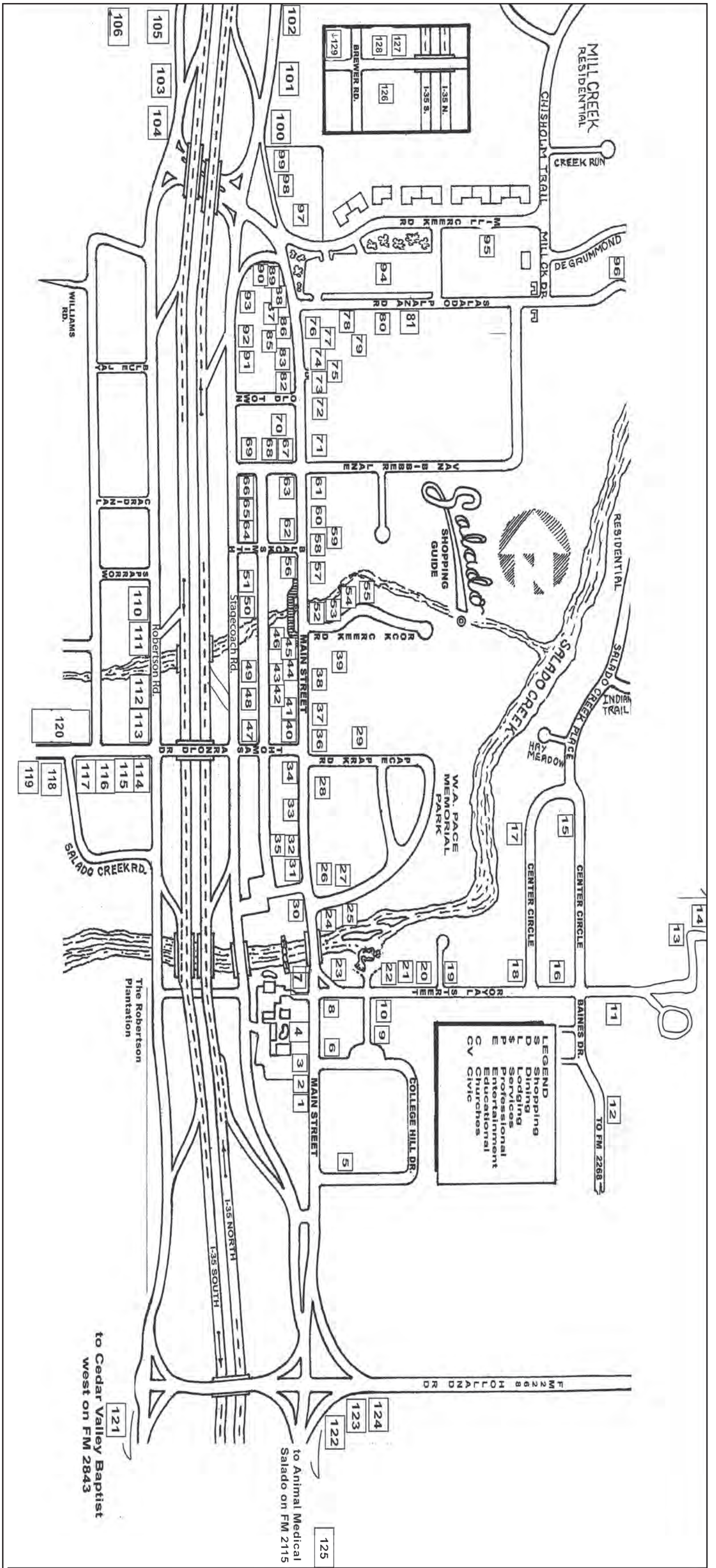
