Aldermen moving forward on sewer

Salado aldermen will meet in executive session with their attorney at 4 p.m. April 10 to discuss the proposed gift of the Stagecoach Inn sewer to the Village.

City administrator Jim Reed told aldermen at their April 3 meeting that he was moving forward on a two pronged approach on the sewer. The first is the acquisition of the Stagecoach Inn sewer and assuring that its immediate operations are done at no cost to the Village. This will likely involve a lease agreement with Terry Potts, owner and operator of Stagecoach Inn Hotel and Restaurant.

Reed said that the board needs to move forward on the other prong of the sewer, the long term solution for a sewer system. "We are still on the timeline that I gave you some time back. To meet those timelines in order to adequately inform the public and to have the maximum amount of time to get this together before the public before a bond election, I will need clear direction from you."

He asked aldermen to give him their ideas of what the proposed service area would be for a bond election to be brought before voters in November. "We should look at cost figures for a number of different service areas. The same plant will be able to serve much more than just Main Street if we can afford the collection system."

He said that recent discussions with Texas Department of Transportation officials may lead to an approach to serving the downtown area by including main collection lines along Church Street with connections to Main Street and other downtown properties as well as to the east side of the access road.

"This way, we do not have to take over Main Street," Reed said. "Properties on the east side of Main could come under Main and tie into a line going down Church St."

He said that he would like to go forward with a conceptual design and perhaps have an initial open house for the conceptual design on April 21.



Candidate Forum tonight

Salado Chamber of Commerce will host a Candidate Forum at 6 p.m. April 10 at the Salado Civic Center.

Candidates for Salado ISD Board of Trustees, Salado Board of Aldermen and Salado Mayor will be given an opportunity to speak at the forum, followed by a period of questions and answers from the audience.

School board will go first, followed by the Village candidates.

Early voting will begin on April 28 and will end on May 6.

The last day to apply for Ballot by Mail is May 1. The last day to receive a ballot by mail is May 10, 2014 at 7 p.m. (unless overseas deadline applies).

Polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on Election Day May 10.

In addition to the three local races, there will be a local option election for or against the legal sale of all alcohol beverages for off-premise consumption only.

Under the hood

Packard enthusiasts and collectors gathered at the Stagecoach Inn for the 37th Annual Texas Packard Meet April 4-6. Cars were on display for the public on April 5. It is the oldest and one of the largest gatherings of Packard owners and their cars in the country. Packards were once seen as some of the most prestigious on the market. The founder of the company, James Ward Packard, was an engineer by trade and began producing automobiles as early as 1899. The first Packards were designed as luxury automobiles and were priced much higher than the competition. In 1902, the Ohio Automobile Company was renamed The Packard Motor Car Company and moved to Detroit. The last Packard came off of the assembly-line in 1958.

Salado Baptists will ring in 150th on May 4

On May 4, the bell of Salado's First Baptist Church will toll to mark the beginning the church's 150th anniversary celebration. The children of the church will each take a turn tugging on the rope of the original bell to signal the start of the celebration. The tolling of the bell will summons people to gather for Sunday School which will start at 9:15 a.m.

The worship service will start at 10:30 a.m. Since the church was orga-

nized as a "Baptist church of the Missionary order," those who have been baptized into the fellowship of the church during the past years will be recognized. A video clip of interviews with former pastors and a video outlining the history of the church will be shown. The music service will consist of hymns of the 1860s and the pastor, Dr. Travis Burleson, will deliver the sermon.

Lunch on the Grounds will be served at noon un-

der a tent that will be set up on the parking lot behind the church offices. The lunch will feature barbeque and all the fixin's from one of Salado's local caterers. Special guests will be introduced during luncheon. These guests will include descendants of early-day church members, government officials, denominational leaders, university presidents, and former staff members.

After lunch everyone will be invited to partici-

pate in activities related to the 1860s. Those activities include:

MASONIC LODGE

Tour the Masonic Lodge building, which was formerly the second story of the original 1878 church building. The Lodge building is located on Church St. between the church sanctuary and the church youth building

MUSIC OF THE 1860s

Hymns of the 1860s will be presented as well

as folk music and children's songs and games.

TRAVELING TRUNK

History is brought to life with a trunk brimming with authentic items relating to life in the 1860s.

GRANDMA'S HEIRLOOMS

An assortment of 19th century everyday household items will be presented and participants can guess what each item is and how was it used.

GAMES OF THE 1860s

Children and adults

will be invited to participate in some of the games and activities that were popular during the 1860s.

SCAVENGER HUNT

Participants will be directed to various spots located inside the church building and on the church grounds. At each spot, participants will can record information regarding the church's history.

The day will conclude with a four-tier anniversary cake served under the tent at 4 p.m.

An Open Exchange of Ideas

Obamacare's master of false assurance

A core competency of Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius is issuing false assurances.

An administration about-face has left the Cabinet official looking like the Baghdad Bob of American health insurance. When Rep. Kevin Brady, R-Texas, asked her at a hearing two weeks ago whether the administration would extend the Obamacare enrollment period beyond March 31, she responded with a crisp and direct: "No, sir."

To the uninitiated, that sounded like an unmistakable denial of any intention to delay the enrollment period. The uninitiated were sadly misled.

The secretary subsequently referred in her testimony to a delayed enrollment period for people who were unable to enroll "through no fault of their own." It turns out that the administration's definition of these frustrated would-be enrollees includes ... well, everyone. The Washington Post reports that the administration will rely on the "honor system" to determine if people enrolling past the deadline are hardship cases.

A few weeks ago, a spokeswoman for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, which runs HealthCare.gov, told reporters "we don't actu-

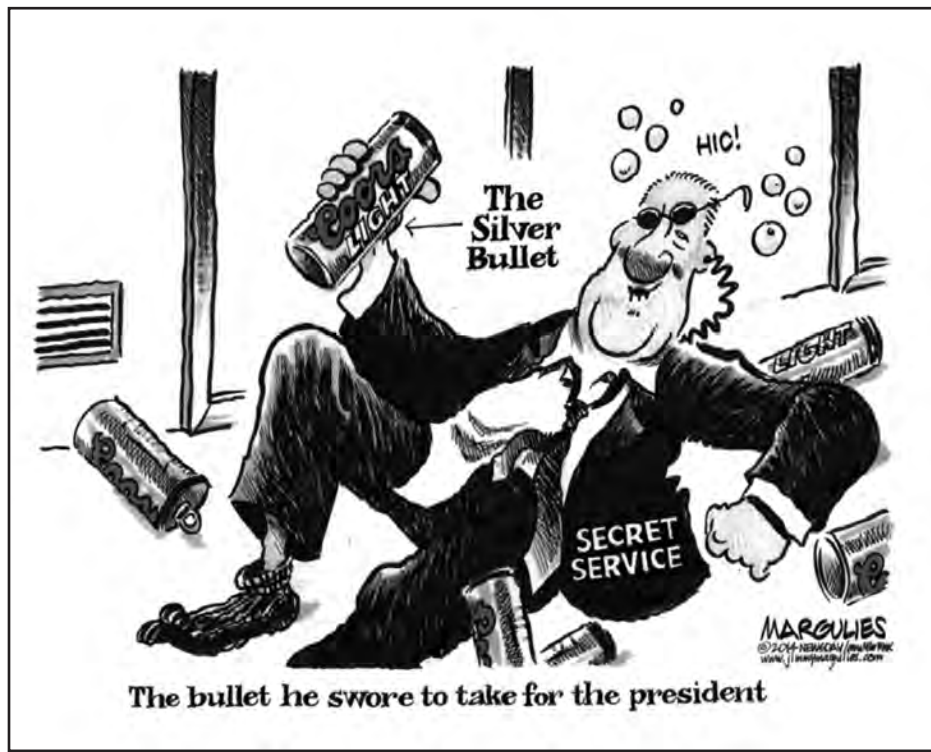


enrollees on the federal exchanges can also get the subsidies. Its defense in *Halbig v. Sebelius* is, true to form, that the law doesn't mean what it says. Obamacare has been a long workshop in improv tragicomedy. The delays, regulatory rewritings and extensions are always an attempt simply to live for another day, to put off the political pain of cancellations, or rate hikes, or layoffs, and to get just enough traction to make the law viable.

Millions have signed up for the exchanges, but it's not clear that the demographic mix is right to avoid steep premium increases by insurers in 2015. So far, it looks like young people -- essential to making the economics of the exchanges work -- aren't signing up in the necessary numbers. The extension is surely a ploy to squeeze every last "young invincible" out of the current enrollment period, and hope the news for the rates in 2015 isn't so bad.

And after that? It's anybody's guess. All we know for sure is that whatever Kathleen Sebelius says today may not be operative tomorrow.

Watch for wildflowers

Dear Editor:

One of the joys of living or driving in the country at this time of year has always been the beautiful vistas of wildflowers. -- Ditches overflowing with bluebonnets, wild honeysuckle, primroses, buttercups and a variety of other beautiful flowers. Shades of blue, pink, and yellow everywhere. But more and more I notice that homeowners are mowing -- not just their yards, but the ditches adjoining their yards and fields. Not only does this destroy this season's wildflowers, but eliminates the possibility of their returning in following seasons. If left to bloom and then to seed out for next year before any mowing is done, these wildflowers will return to be enjoyed in the years ahead.

In addition to the wildflowers this would save, there are also the things

which live on the nectar of the flowers -- such as butterflies, honeybees, -- or the things which shelter and nest in the spring grasses, such as cottontail rabbits, roadrunners, quail, etc. If every corner of your property is mowed to look like a golf course green, where will any of these little living things -- and others such as turtles, toads, lizards -- live and make their homes. The doe need places to hide their fawns. There is a ripple effect when we systematically destroying any part of nature. Where there are fewer flowers, there are fewer insects. Where there are fewer insects, there are fewer songbirds, such as Mockingbirds, which live on insects, etc. Surely there is a way to take into consideration the preservation of other living things. I hope we don't let our obsession with neatly trimmed "every-

thing" destroy the habitat and the beauty that fields and ditches of wildflowers provide. Instead of the monotony of green in mowed ditches and fields -- is the beauty of endless variety of color! One word of warning this time of year, is that rattlesnakes could also be in fields of wildflowers --so anyone stopping for photos should certainly check out an area carefully before planning photo shoots there with their children. But just because this is a possibility which needs to be considered, doesn't mean it is a probability which would necessitate the destruction of the season's flowers. Please enjoy the beauty these flowers provide, and be a guardian of this beauty for those who come after you. Please consider

Some of the states where the Moral Monday movement is rising are mighty steep political hills for progressives to climb.

Like that little choo-choo in the classic children's book "The Little Engine that Could," Moral Monday is the little movement that says, "I think I can" and keeps chugging up the hill.

This new progressive coalition became a full-throttle citizen uprising in North Carolina early last year.

Fueled by rising public outrage at the rampant right-wing extremism of the Republican-run state government, a few advocates for workers, civil rights, and other people's issues went inside North Carolina's state capitol on a Monday in April.

Led by Rev. William Barber, head of the North Carolina NAACP, they literally put their bodies on the line in protest of the GOP's reckless crusade to turn the state into a privatized utopia for unfettered corporate greed and tea party wackiness.

Several members of the small group were arrested that day, and Republican

Monday still has weekly meetings and is launching a 50-county organizing and voter education campaign this summer.

It's now a burgeoning multi-issue, grassroots movement for progressive change. And it's literally on the move, branching out

leaders berated their protest as "Moron Monday."

Those politicians aren't laughing now. The protesters kept coming and their numbers kept growing, for Moral Monday had struck a chord. The protest spread across the state. A rally in February drew more than 80,000 people, and public approval ratings for the governor and state assembly have tanked.

The legislature is now out of session, but Moral

Monday Georgia is going full steam this year, South Carolina has a Truthful Tuesday movement gaining steam, and the movement is getting started in Alabama, Florida, New York, and Wisconsin.

Some of these states are mighty steep political hills for progressives to climb, but success begins with someone saying, "I think I can." To build a movement, you've gotta start moving.

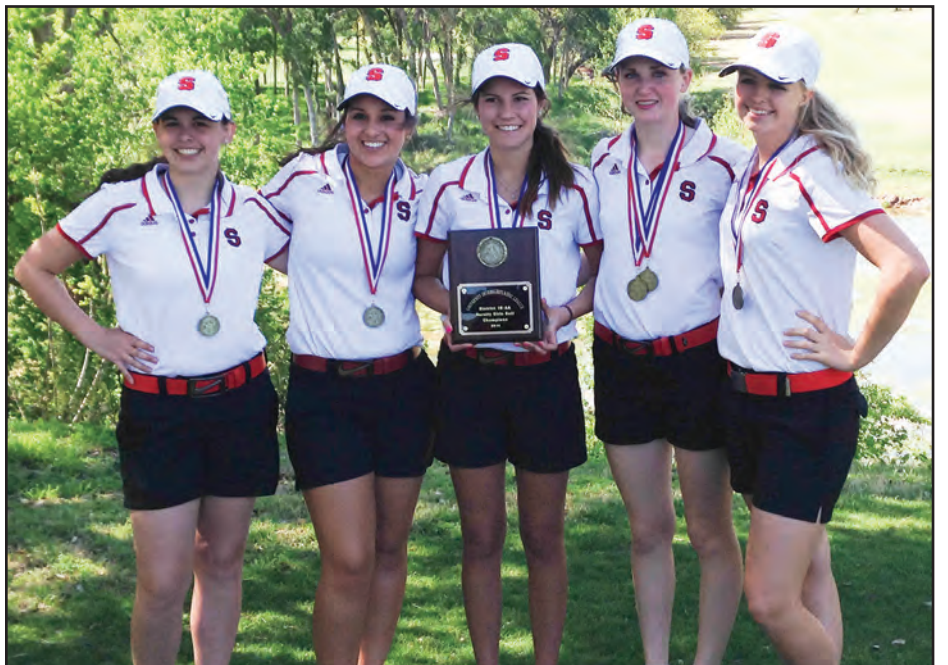
