Salado aldermen will have an open town hall meeting to discuss several upcoming issues at 7 p.m. April 21 at the Salado Civic Center, following the 6 p.m. regular Salado ISD board of trustees meeting.

Among the topics that will be up for discussion with citizens will be the preliminary plans of the sewer system, annexation plans, the proposed senior living center and the proposed west side overlay.


City administrator Jim Reed will meet with aldermen prior to the town hall meeting to discuss the initial design of the proposed sewer system including its possible service areas. The board will meet at 4:30 p.m. April 17 at the Salado Municipal Building on Church St. in workshop session with the list of items to prepare for the town hall meeting on April 21.

At 6 p.m. April 17, the board will meet for its regular business meeting. At that meeting, they will take any votes necessary in preparation for the April 21 town hall meeting.

Citizens may attend workshops but discussion is in most cases limited to the board of aldermen, and Village employees. The board can take no action during the workshop ses-

Citizens can make public comments that are entered into the record at any regular meetings of the board of aldermen, 6 p.m. on the first and third

Thursday of each month. The town hall meeting will allow for more interaction between the board and the public. The board will take no action at the Town Hall meeting. Aldermen hope to hold regular town hall meetings in the future.

Sales tax leap 34% for Village, down for Library

Salado's sales tax rebate in April is a mixed bag as the Village of Salado is up by 34 percent while the Library District is down more than 18 per-

The Village received a sales tax rebate check from the Comptroller for \$29,930.99, which is 34.45 percent more than last April's payment of \$22,260.69.

The Library trict received a check for \$22,271.45, which is 18.29 percent less than last April's payment of \$27,257.22. The Library District boundaries are similar to the school district, while the Village encompasses just over two square miles.

The increase for the Village brings its year-todate payments to above last year's payments through April. For most of the year, the Village has been lagging behind 2013 in sales tax rebates. To date the Village has received \$123,892.23 while it received \$121,015.10 through April 2013.

The Library District is lagging behind 2013. So far this year, the Library District has received \$94,239.57 in sales tax rebates, which is 20.79 percent less than the

\$118,982.02 paid through April 2013.

Bell County shows a moderate increase over last year in sales tax rebates.

The County received a \$1.27 million check in April, which is 1.31 percent more than last April's payment of \$1.25 million. For the year, the County is slightly ahead as well. The County has received \$5.29 million thus far, compared to the \$5.25 million paid through April 2013.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said last week that state sales tax revenue in March was \$2.09 billion, up 5.6 percent compared to March 2013.

"The growth in sales tax revenues was led by business spending in the oil and natural gas mining, wholesale trade and construction sectors," Combs said. "Collections from restaurants were also strong. This marks 48 consecutive months of growth in state sales tax collections."

Combs sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their April local sales tax allocations totaling \$554.5 million, up 6.2 percent compared to April

Real estate runs three generations deep in this family

"It tickled me to death," Bill Bartlett says with a laugh and his characteristic broad smile, "I listed it and sold it in two days. I

thought I was good!" He is reflecting on the first real estate deal he closed, "a little house and land out of Belton going toward Holland" that he sold for Carl Schoepf in August 1973. He sold it for \$16,800, earning a commission of \$800.

"I thought that was big money," Bartlett said. It was the first real estate sale he made after a career of 18 years in the insurance business.

That transaction -- and many, many others over a span of four decades -- is written down in a small, leather bound journal.

Some 40 years later, Bartlett is tickled to death again as his grand-daughter closed on a house she sold at the real estate agency bearing his name.

When Savannah Hennig joined Century 21 Bill Bartlett Real Estate in March, she became the third generation of the family to go into the real

estate business.

She closed on her first transaction for a home on Betty Place not too long after joining the real estate agency that is located on N. Main Street in a building that Gary Bartlett built in 1996.

"I kind of knew that it would happen eventually," Hennig said of joining her grandfather, mother and aunt at Century 21 Bill Bartlett, "We decided it was too good of an opportunity to hold off any longer."

The opportunity she speaks of is the flexibility to work and raise her family in Salado.

After graduating Salado High School as salutatorian in 2005, Savannah attended Abilene Christian University, graduating with a degree in Accounting in 2008. She and Garrison Hennig were married in 2009. Savannah worked at Bank of America and then at Scott & White Health Plan for three years where she rose to a management position before leaving in October

on field trips," she says, looking forward to school days with Garrison. "If he is sick, I want to be able to take off and take him home and take care of him. Not many jobs give you that kind of freedom."

There is another kind of freedom as well. The freedom of self-determination, something her grandfather, mother and aunt know very well.

"You are self-employed," Bill says, "you can work as long as you want and you determine what you are going to make."

From their father, Melanie Kirchmeier and Sue Ellen Slagel have learned a great deal about business and about ethics.

Sue Ellen says that one of the greatest lessons learned from her father is that "if you say you are going to do something, do it."

Likewise, Melanie says that she has learned "to the tell the truth. Even if it something they don't want to hear, tell the truth."

In addition to the lessons from Bill, Savannah says that she has learned lessons from her working mom and working aunt.



It's also Child Neglect **Awareness Month**

On April 1, a threeyear-old boy drowned in Denton County in his family's backyard pool. Mom was watching him blow bubbles in the backyard through the kitchen window. Her phone rang and then a baby in the home began to cry. By the time she checked again on the toddler, he was face down in the pool. And he was

Five days later, in a cluttered home in Montgomery County, a young father took a nap on an adult bed with his five-month-old and one-year-old sons. When he awoke, the infant was cold and blue.

In the child welfare world, these are common, seemingly every day occurrences. But even after hearing the details of these and hundreds of cases like them, that sick feeling in the gut persists.

Neither of these children had to die - or the hundreds of others, victims of nothing more than simple neglect, preventable simply by clicking on a link at the bottom of this

page. April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month, and all across our state there are rallies and marches and vigils and readings and speeches, all festooned with the nowfamiliar symbol of child

abuse prevention - the blue ribbon. You may have seen pinwheels at an event; an advocacy group in one of our largest cities has placed almost 6,000 "cardboard kids" in the community to represent victims of child abuse. One of those kids sits near my office in

This month is priceless to those of us who work in the child welfare field, because it serves as a wellneeded call to action to every community, and jolts our awareness of a very uncomfortable everyday reality of our society: that across all demographic and socioeconomic lines, parents and grandparents and boyfriends and girlfriends beat and starve and ignore children. Because of that, society suffers and this state's future suffers.

We have to do better most of all for these individual children, and for their families who also often desperately need help. Texas' future also depends on these very young children, and they must be protected.

I doubt you have heard about the Denton County drowning, or the co-sleeping death in Montgomery County. You may have only heard about the worst cases, ones that result in immediate arrests, and capital murder charges, and horribly graphic details presented publicly in law enforcement affidavits or court documents. When

we are already involved with a family, we have to do a better job to identify and intercept those cases, if at all possible, and stop the terrible abuse before it

But each of us, as individual members of our community, can have even a more dramatic effect on our children, and save more lives, by paying close attention to the two most frequent causes of child fatalities investigated by Child Protective Services (CPS): drowning and unsafe sleep.

Last year, 804 child deaths were reported to CPS to investigate. Of those, 238 were either drownings or sleep-related - 30 percent!

Of the 156 child fatalities confirmed as either abuse or neglect, 60 percent were neglect, and most of those were either drownings or sleep-related deaths.

We can save children's lives by becoming familiar with information about these easily preventable deaths.

The First Amendment Is such a nuisance

Every time the Supreme Court rules in favor of the First Amendment in a campaign-finance case, the left recoils in disgust. The court's 5-4 decision in McCutcheon v. FEC is the latest occasion for the rending of garments and gnashing of teeth. The court struck down the limit on the aggregate amount a donor can give to candidates and politicalparty committees, ruling it incompatible with First Amendment protections for political expression.

The left pronounced itself outraged. The First Amendment is for strippers, flag burners, pornographers, funeral protesters and neo-Nazis, but not for people trying to give money to political parties or candidates.

In his decision for the court, Chief Justice John Roberts noted that contributing to a candidate is political participation just like volunteering for a campaign or urging others to vote. "Money in politics may at times seem repugnant to some," Roberts writes, "but so too does much of what the First Amendment vigorously protects."

The decision in Mc-Cutcheon should have been a slam-dunk. Campaign-finance law limits how much a single donor can give in an election cycle to \$5,200 for a federal



candidate and \$64,800 for a party committee.

The court let these socalled base limits stand on grounds that under the landmark Buckley v. Valeo decision, direct contributions to candidates hold the greatest possibility for creating corruption.

But if you accept the base limits, the aggregate limits on the total anyone can give to candidates in a single cycle (\$48,600) and to party committees and PACs in a single cycle (\$74,600) make no sense. By the logic of the law, if a contribution to one candidate of \$5,200 or less is not corrupting, there should be no fear that a donor giving a couple of dozen candidates that amount will be corrupting. Each of the candidates is receiving the proscribed amount or less. Once a donor hits the aggregate limit, though, it functions as an outright ban on further donations to candidates or parties -- even though these donations aren't corrupting. This is an impingement of his political rights without any upside of preventing

The critics of the decision object to it partly

graft.


on egalitarian grounds: Very few donors have the resources to contribute enough to bump up against the aggregate limits, so the decision gives disproportionate influence to a few people.

A free political system always has such disparities. At the root of the left's opposition to McCutcheon, and Citizens United before it, is that it reduces governmental control over the political process. That control is taken, ipso facto, to be a good thing.

Remember: The position of the Obama administration in oral arguments over Citizens United was that the government could ban books printed by corporations. Nancy Pelosi, the House minority leader, has proposed amending the First Amendment to give the government more latitude to limit political expression.

In his decision, Roberts writes "that the First Amendment 'is designed and intended to remove governmental restraints from the arena of public discussion, putting the decision as to what views should be voiced largely into the hands of each of us." For those lamenting the decision, that is precisely the problem. Rich Lowry is editor of the

Wall Street's MIA ethics Banks don't engage in wrongdoing, bankers do.


Let's review the rap sheet of Wall Street banks: defrauding investors, cheating homeowners, money laundering, rigging markets, tax evasion, credit card ripoffs... and so sickeningly much more.

At last, though, some of the cops on the bank beat seem to be having regulatory epiphanies. The New York Times reports that some financial overseers are questioning "whether such misdeeds are not the work of a few bad actors, but rather a flaw that runs through the fabric of the banking industry..." Regulators are starting to ask: Is there something rotten in bank culture?

Really. Where've they been?

Millions of everyday Americans sniffed out that rot back in 2007 at the start of the Wall Street collapse and nauseating bailout. Imagine how pleased they are that it took only seven years for the stench of bank rot to reach the tender nostrils of authorities. Still, even sloooww progress is progress.

Both the head of the New York Fed and the Comptroller of the Cur-



lar bonuses despite their shoddy ethics, and blithely proceed to the next scandal.

More restraint on bank processes misses a core fact: Banks don't engage in wrongdoing, bankers do. As Comptroller Tom

rency are at least grasping one basic reality, namely that the tightened regulations enacted to deal with the "too big to fail" issue do nothing about the fundamental ethical collapse among America's big bankers. The problem is that, again and again, Wall Street's culture of greed is rewarded — bank bosses preside over gross illegalities, are not punished, pocket multi-million-dol-

Curry says, the approach to this problem is not to call in more lawyers, "It is more like a priest-penitent relationship."

Public shaming can be useful, but it should include actual punishment of the top bosses - take away their bonuses, fire them, and prosecute them.



The following questions were put to the four candidates for the Board of Aldermen





need was answered with the CTCOG contract. Salado needed a Village Administrator, and CTCOG could provide someone on a parttime basis to assist us with that need. We must remember, CTCOG is responsible for a multi-county area in central Texas. With largescale projects and growing management needs ahead of us, the Village is in need of a full-time city manager who is dedicated specifically to the Village of Salado's needs and vision. In the long-term, I believe our approximate \$4800/ month that we are spending with CTCOG would be better spent by hiring a permanent Village employee. If the Village is unable to secure a permanent hire by October, we should continue the current contract only until a permanent hire can be secured.

Ouestion 2: Advertise, advertise, adrtise. We have a tourism director hired by the Village to bolster our attraction to tourists. We should make sure that she has an adequate budget to advertise and promote Salado. SISD candidates on student-teacher relationships, transfer policies, technology

The following questions were put the four candidates for Salado ISD Board of Trustees.


Question #1. In the past two school years, Salado has had two teachers charged with improper relationships with students. In your opinion, did the administration handle these situations correctly? If not, what should it have done? Going forward, is the administration addressing issues of relationships between teachers and students correctly, particularly in this day of social media and personal technology? (200

Question #2. In the latest realignment, Salado will move up to division 4A by 13 students, of which 10 are additional transfer students. This will require more travel to compete against larger, more distant schools. Last year, SISD waived its transfer fees to encourage more student transfers in order to receive about \$6,400 per student in state funds. Was this the correct policy change? Why/why not? (reader question) (150 words)

Question #3: Education is changing rapidly, utilizing technology and distance learning far more than ever before. Is SISD keeping pace, leading the charge or falling behind? What does the district need to do to improve its use of technology? (150 words)

RODNEY BELL Question #1:

In opinion the administration handled



Currently, there is a policy in place concerning the communications between teachers and students. The bottom line, it is against the law for a teacher to have an inappropriate relationship with a student. The action violates the law and the moral character clause to which the professional is expected to uphold.

Going forward, as is done now, staff should be briefed on the law, policy, and consequences of their actions. Moreover, we need to provide an atmosphere where students notify staff as they become aware of such situations and incidents. Question #2:

The waiver of transfer fees was the correct decision. Our district is considered a property rich district by the State of Texas. Therefore, we forfeit our funds to educate students from other school districts in the state.


The property rich calculation contains a clause that allows districts to "modify" the allocation they must pay to the state. If you collect tuition for transfer students, then you cannot include the student in the state calculation. If a district "waives" the tuition for transfer students, then they can include the student in the state calculation. By "waiving" the tuition, a district can lower the amount of funds they are required to send to the state.

When we collected tuition, we were sending money to the state. By waiving the tuition, this amount has been significantly lowered and we receive additional funding from the state for each stu-

As a parent, it breaks my heart to think the



and correctly in each case, both in their initial reaction and follow up with the parents and students, staff and community. Going forward, I believe we need to make sure strategies to recognize and stop improper relationships should be included in the usual Health and Safety programs for students and staff, right along with internet safety, bullying and fire drills. I also believe parents should be offered the same training because, ultimately, it is our responsibility as parents to make sure our children recognize each of these threats and have strategies in place to be able to deal with them appropriately. Question #2:

The latest UIL alignment numbers show that Salado ISD is growing and will continue to grow regardless of our transfer policy. Dropping the transfer fee allows Salado ISD to keep more of our local tax dollars in regard to our Chapter 41 status. With our budget stretched thin because of the huge state cuts a few years ago, the policy change makes sense financially. Besides dropping the fee, the policy was modified to ensure ongoing monitoring of transfer students' grades, behavior and attendance in addition to district resources. It allows the district to limit the number and calibre of transfer students we accept. Under these circumstances, I would continue to support the current Transfer Policy. Question #3:

I believe Salado, like many other school districts, is struggling to keep on the forefront of technology while still being fiscally responsible. We need to remain current in order to expose our students to the latest technology that they will use in college and in the workplace. It is not enough to simply put the technology in their hands. We need to provide training to our faculty on new and exciting ways to use that technology in the classroom. I also believe we have to keep our technology infrastructure such as high speed wireless networks up to date and ready to handle our growing use. A further challenge is finding alternative funding for STEM education. We need to seek out grants and other available monies to help our already strained budget take on this much needed expense.

BRIAN SUNSHINE Question #1:

If sexual relationships inap-

propriate sexual communications between educators/ students have been proven or admitted to, employees should be immediately "fired" rather than allowed to resign. The public trust has been violated with protecting Salado's most precious asset: our children.

I'd put the quality of our district's personnel against any surrounding district. Nevertheless, teachers, coaches and administrators must be held to the highest standards in protecting our students. SISD's employment screening, orientation and ongoing code of conduct training must ensure we are communicating a message of zero tolerance, by word and by deed. We need to promote and provide a culture of "See Something, Hear Something, Say Something", where students and teachers are comfortable anonymously reporting possible or potential inappropriate behavior by teachers or students (e.g., bullying) without fear of ret-

ribution. To ensure we attract and retain the best in integrity and strong moral compass, we must address teacher compensation, which hasn't been improved in years and lags behind larger surrounding districts by nearly \$10K/ year, and even trails Jarrell by almost \$6K/year.

Finally, Facetime, Skype, and Instagram, pose unique challenges due to the lack of an audit trail, so we must thoughtfully address those with sound policy and consistent enforcement.

Question #2: What's done is done.

However, we must have a strategic plan in place that will allow us to rise to the challenge and embrace the higher level of competition that 4A will bring, both academic and athletic.

A transfer policy based upon enrollment forecasts should be part of this plan and it needs to be less about money and more about the students we serve who live in this district. Larger class sizes, lower academic results from transfers and importing students for the sole purpose of athletic participation all detract from the educational quality and achievement our children deserve. We must track outcomes of our transfers. If we continue down this fee-free transfer path, SISD must ensure it has strong, measurable and consistent threshold criteria.

Three year olds coming into the Pre-K program next year will increase capacity utilization and decrease the need for transfer revenue. Question #3:

The SISD Robotics class & several academic UIL teams are bright spots. However, it's a challenge for a district our size to not fall behind technologically. Apple TV's and IPods for teachers just begin to scratch the sur-

Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) education has an increased emphasis in the new House Bill 5 graduation paths. Surrounding school districts are offering courses in coding & programming, graphic design, computer animation, website buildtelecommunications, networking, and even video game design.

Our resources are limited and we must effectively balance classical and technology driven education, leverage partnerships (dual credit, pooled resources with other districts), have a long range technology plan for all grade levels, and professional development for teachers to integrate new technologies for learning. To minimize taxpayer cost, we must be more vigilant in seeking available federal, state and private grant funding to expand our technology education and infrastructure.

KIM **B**IRD Question #1:

In these two tragic cases, Sala-

do ISD administrators handled the situations quickly, appropriately, professionally and according to district policy. When administrators became aware of the possibility of improper teacher behavior, they immediately took action by launching thorough investigations, contacting parents and proper authorities and ensuring that the staff members were removed from the campuses and away from our students. In both cases, Dr. Novotny obtained immediate letters of resignation saving the district from termination proceedings. Our administrators informed parents and the community of the situations and made every effort to be as transparent as possible while protecting the children involved.

Policies on social media and student/teacher communication are reviewed regularly in Salado ISD. Training in appropriate student/ teacher relationships is a part of all teacher education programs and is reinforced throughout a teacher's career through annual teacher inservice training, sexual harassment training and teacher mentor programs. As professionals, educators are held to an Educators' Code of Ethics under the Texas Administrative Code that specifically forbids this type of behavior.

In almost every incident of this nature, friends of the student were the first to know. SISD plans to expand student training in how to respond to such situations. Question #2:

Salado ISD has a reputation for excellence and, therefore, attracts excellence. When the state drastically reduced funding to school districts, we were charged with finding innovative ways to

continue to provide outstanding educational services for our students. Because the state was recapturing a large portion of the transfer fees we were collecting, this was not producing revenue for our district. By eliminating this fee, we were able to attract more potential transfer students. By tightening our policies to only accept outstanding applicants and ensuring that they would not overtax our classrooms or staff, we were able to capitalize on the state funding (about \$6,400 per student) that accompanies each student, while optimizing fixed costs such as buildings and electricity. These additional funds allowed us to augment our budget and avoid painful staffing and program cuts that were seen across the state. Ouestion #3:

Remaining abreast of new technologies is an expensive and difficult task for public schools. Salado ISD must ensure that students leave twelfth grade prepared to be successful in a global economy that requires them to compete for jobs against other applicants from across the nation and the world. Students must experience such technologies to become proficient with them. Although we are keeping pace, it is an on-going effort. Our partnerships with organizations such as the Salado Education Foundation, the Texas Bioscience Institute and other school districts help us find funds to assist in this effort through grants and cooperative programs. Business partnerships have also helped us purchase new technology. These must be maximized.

The use of technology

also includes experience using the technologies that are readily available such as smart phones and tablets. By teaching students to use such technologies to solve

problems, we prepare them for success by utilizing the technology already at their fingertips.

To the Voters of Salado

My frequent contact with Mayor Danney McCort indicates that he is working hard for the benefit of the Village of Salado.

His varied background in public service jobs and his education proclaim his expertise in management and leadership for our growing town. He is accessible and listens well. I applaud his successes and dedication to his duties.



Child Protective Services (CPS) investigated more than 160,000 allegations of child abuse or neglect in Texas last year. 156 children died at the hands of their parents or other caregivers, 66,398 were victims of abuse or neglect, and more than 17,000 had to be removed from their homes for their own protection.

Each April, CPS and its parent agency, the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS), join hands with local governments, community groups, service organizations, activists, and average citizens to put the spotlight on preventing, recognizing, and reporting child abuse.

In Bell County last year there were 1,100 confirmed victims of abuse or neglect and 472 children were removed from their homes due to this. One child died due to abuse or neglect.

"While stopping abuse after it happens is critical, it's not enough. We need to stop it before it starts," said DFPS Commissioner John Specia. "Many of the parents CPS works with are young, some are poor, and almost all of them are under stress and need some kind of help. Helping parents is one of the keys to preventing child abuse!"

That's why DFPS' Help for Parents, Hope for Kids campaign educates parents about child abuse and points them to help in their communities to strengthen their parenting skills and learn to better care for their kids. The campaign's Facebook page (4MyKid) shares fun and helpful ideas and resources for families, and anyone can download the 2014 Child Abuse Prevention Calendar from HelpandHope.

The campaign website, HelpandHope.org, features a number of inspiring testimonials of parents who overcame abuse to become better parents and break the cycle of abuse. These videos are also available on the DFPS You Tube Channel.

"I encourage everyone who cares about children to watch and share these powerful stories, especially with parents who are having a hard time", said Commissioner Specia. "But, if you suspect abuse is already happening, please report it."



Best is majoring in Business at TSU.




Hankamer to play golf at Air Force







While there is judging and awards are presented, the cars are also on display at the Stagecoach Inn for the public to view on April 19.







Contract Bridge

Over the long haul, the successful bridge player scores most of his points on the so-called breadand-butter hands. He does nothing extraordinary or brilliant in these hands; he just does things the way they ought to be done.

As a case in point, examine this deal where South went down in four spades. West led the king of clubs and continued with the ten, ruffed by declarer. South played the A-K of trumps, and, after East showed up with the Q-J-6-5, had to lose two trump tricks and a heart, going down one.

One could argue that South was the victim of bad luck, but the fact is that he himself was responsible for the outcome. He did not play the hand as it should have been played.

After ruffing the club at trick two and playing the ace of trumps, South should have led a low diamond to the jack and returned a trump from dummy. In the actual case, this line of play would have brought home the contract. If East follows low on the second trump lead, South makes the safety play of the eight, guaranteeing only one trump loser whether West follows suit or not.

If East plays the jack or queen on the trump lead from dummy, declarer wins with the king, returns the ten to East's remaining honor and likewise ensures only one trump loser. All told, the defenders get no more than a spade, a heart and a club.

It is true that the suggested method of play would not succeed if West held the Q-J-x-x of trumps. In that case, the effort to guard against a 4-1 trump break would, unfortunately, amount to a futile exercise in good technique.





Shred all statements and applications you get in the mail that you don't want to keep, including credit card applications, insurance forms, financial statements, health forms, billing statements for utilities and phone service. Visit bbb.org to find a Shred Day location near you.

Protect your Social Security number, account numbers and passwords. Don't carry these numbers in your wallet. Give out your Social Security number only if absolutely necessary, and offer to provide another type of personal identifier, if possible.

Never give personal information over the phone or to unknown persons. Unless you are the one initiating the phone call, you should not give your Social Security number, driver's license number or bank account information over the phone.

Monitor your bank and credit card transactions for unauthorized transactions. Crooks with your account number generally start with small transactions to see if you'll notice.

Steer clear of suspicious texts, emails and links. Unsolicited e-mails and pop-up ads can be full of computer viruses designed to steal usernames and passwords from your computer. Don't give in to curiosity. Close or delete the message.

Check your credit report at least once a year. There is only one source authorized to give you one free annual credit file disclosure per year from each of the three consumer credit reporting companies.






