Salado woman runs Boston

"I didn't think I could qualify," Salado fifth grade teacher Corey Baird.

Baird ran in the famed Boston Marathon this week, taking her husband and two kids with her.

The Baird family combined Corey's athletic feat with historic tours and even a Boston Red Sox game as Corey was able to mark an accomplishment off of her bucket list.

"I made it a goal to qualify for it by the time I was 40," she said, adding that "I barely made it."

Corey turned 40 in December. She qualified for the Boston Marathon at a marathon in The Woodlands last spring.

Her time of 3:40 in The Woodlands race was her best. Her time in the Boston race was somewhat slower at 3:55.

"It was really hot," Baird said. "I slowed down my pace so I could make it through."

Sponsored by the Boston Athletic Association, the Boston Marathon starts on Main Street in Hopkinton.

Marathon The route makes its way along Route 135 through Ashland, Framingham, Natick and Wellesley and picks up Route 16 to Newton Lower Falls where it turns onto Commonwealth. It bears right onto Chestnut Hill Ave. and continues to Cleveland Circle. Runners then turn onto Boston's famed Beacon Street, then onto Hereford Street and finally onto Boylston to end near the Hancock Tower.

This is her fourth marathon. The three others have all been in Texas. She ran her first marathon in San Antonio five years ago.

Baird said she started to get serious about running seven years ago. She had been cycling competitively and then moved to triathlons before competing in her first marathon.

She runs 35-40 miles a week when she is training for a race, but admits that "sometimes life gets in the way."

She and husband Paul work in Salado ISD. Corey is a fifth grade science teacher. She is also the head cross country coach for Salado and coaches the distance runners in track. Paul is the athletic

SHS senior dies in Cedar Park car accident

A Salado High School senior was killed in an automobile accident April 17 in Cedar Park.

Victoria DeKay died as a result of the injuries she received in a one car accident on Hwy 183 tollway. The accident was reported at 6:07 p.m. April 17.

As of presstime, no funeral arrangements have been made. We will report arrangements online as soon as details are released.

The car in which she was traveling struck a concrete barrier and rolled over. According to the Cedar Park police department, DeKay was ejected from the vehicle and died at the scene. Another occupant, a male in his late teens, was transported to St. David's Round Rock Medical Center where he remains with serious injuries.

"We have counselors from all four of our schools, pastors from our local churches, and crisis counselors from the Region 12 Education Service Center at Salado High School to visit with any students that want to talk with someone," Superintendent Michael Novotny stated in an email sent to school parents, "Tori's family and friends are

in our thoughts and prayers at this difficult time."

Victoria was the daughter of Bryon and Deanna DeKay. As a senior, she was a Homecoming Queen nominee. Victoria was a member of the varsity volleyball team, Salado Youth Leadership Club, and ASTRA. She was named to the Second Team All-District Volleyball team.

According to the biography Salado Village Voice printed when she was nominated for Homecoming Queen, DeKay had plans to attend Texas State University to study to become a speech language pathologist.

Left Behind

What happens to those who are not in the disannexation area

Much has been made of how much or how little the disannexed property owners will pay in property taxes if an election for the disannexation of a large portion of the Village of Salado is successful on May 6.

But what about those who are left behind?

They could see their property taxes increase to at least \$1.01 per \$100 evaluation, or more, in order to fund a \$1 million operating budget and retire the debt service of the \$8.2 million in bonds approved by the board of alder-

The left behind residents and property owners could face the daunting task -- if petition circulator John Newman has his way -- of funding the entire \$525,000 annual debt service for the \$10.55 million bond issue that was

approved by voters in the entire Village of Salado in November 2014.

If faced with funding the entire bill for the sewer bond, the debt service tax for those left behind in Salado could increase to \$0.6069 per \$100 evaluation, based upon the property value estimate provided to Salado Village Voice by the Bell County Tax Appraisal District (BellCAD).

The 2016 certified total freeze adjusted value for the Village of Salado is \$168,130,780. Marvin Hahn, chief appraiser of BellCAD, stated that the certified total freeze adjusted value for the Disannexation Area outlined in the petition is \$81,638,646.

Based on current values, the total freeze adjusted value for the remaining area of Salado is \$86,492,316. At this value, the debt service tax rate to retire the \$525,000 annual payment for the sewer bond would be increased to \$0.6069 per \$100 evaluation in the next budget cycle.

Citing section 43.148 of the Local Government Code, Newman says that the disannexed properties would be due refunds of those taxes for the bond debt because the sewer is of "no direct benefit" to the area. Therefore, Newman states that the disannexed properties would not be liable for the sewer debt.

Newman is at odds with statements by Village attorney Alan Bojorquez that the disannexed area will be responsible for the pro rata share of the municipal bond debt if disannexation passes in May.

If Newman is wrong, and the disannexation area remains responsible for the pro rata share of the debt, the disannexed area will be responsible for about 48.55 percent of the debt service, or \$254,887.50 of the annual payment. The area left behind by the disannexation would be responsible for

\$270,112.50 of the annual debt payment.

Property taxes for maintenance and operation could also double to a rate of \$0.40 per \$100 valuation with the exit of such a large portion of the Village. The current budget calls for \$350,200 in M&O property tax revenues.

To generate that level of revenue in 2017-18 would require an increase of more than 20 cents in the property tax rate for the much smaller remainder of Salado.

Here's where things get very complicated for those who could be left behind by disannexation. Next year's rollback rate will be determined on the amount of money generated by this year's tax base.

The Tax Appraisal District will not calculate the rollback rate until it certifies the property values in July.

The Salado left behind by disannexation will also face the loss of another sizeable

source of revenue: franchise called for the November elecand sales taxes.

The Village receives approximately \$176,600 franchise fees. Most of this is from \$116,600 in electric franchise fees. Another \$30,500 in phone franchise fees, \$20,000 in water franchise fees and \$9,500 in cable franchise fees are paid to the village.

The Village, at this time, cannot anticipate just how much it will lose in franchise revenues due to the disannexation, but it could lose more than half of those revenues.

This situation could be made tougher by the fact that only one candidate of the seven vying for three positions on the board of aldermen lives in the area left behind.

All of the aldermen and the mayor live in the area proposed for disannexation. If the disannexation is successful, one of two things could happen:

• An emergency special election is called for by the Governor for a date earlier than November. If this happens, the earliest that an emergency election could be held would be the end of August or early in September.

The Village deadline for adopting a 2017-18 budget is the end of September.

Shortly after being inducted into office as the new aldermen of the left behind Village of Salado, they would be faced with either slashing hundreds of thousands of dollars from a budget that they have had no influence in making or increasing the tax rate to more than \$1.00 per





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Disannexation, incumbents, challengers topics for letter writers

Dear Editor:

Out of respect for a community's right to self-determination, I have been reluctant to comment on the "de-annexation" discussions in Salado. However, factual information is essential to informed decision making so I feel compelled to correct some of the misconceptions presented in a recently published letter.

First, there seems to be a widely held belief that dis-incorporation of part of Salado will relieve those leaving the village of obligation related to voter-approved debt. While this not a county issue in any way. I can affirm that this is incorrect. While the exact mechanisms of payment may be uncertain at this time, the obligation for repayment attaches to everyone residing within the origin Village limits, and will until the debt is retired. The residents in the dis-incorporated area would simply surrender their right to participate in electing those who will be tasked with managing debt-financed projects.

Secondly, assertions have been made regarding 24-hour police patrol by the Sheriff's Department. While the Sheriff indeed has patrol deputies in the field 24-7, the patrol force is limited to no more than four to six officers on any given shift to cover the entire 1088 square miles of the county. They would certainly respond to emergency calls in the dis-incorporated area, as they do elsewhere, but they are not staffed to provide routine community police patrol for any particu-

lar area.

Finally, there is the issue of street maintenance. The cited examples of county-performed maintenance in Salado were executed under an inter-local agreement between the village and the county whereby the village paid for materials and the county provided equipment and labor for a defined scope of work. This reflects a county policy through which we assist our smaller communities from time to time. However, we are obligated to the maintenance of the 900 mile county road system first, so community assistance proiects are limited to a few per year, and only when cities can pay a share of the costs. As growth continues in the unincorporated areas, the county may soon be forced to institute a system of feebased maintenance in subdivisions to offset the increased costs associated with higher design standards, higher urban densities and higher traffic volumes. The dis-incorporated portion of Salado could be subject to such an

arrangement. If this effort succeeds, the county will certainly honor its obligation to provide basic services. But statutory restraint dictate that counties simply cannot provided the level of services municipalities can. And make no mistake, additional services come with additional costs.

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

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

Donald Dean Davis

March 15, 1924-April 14, 2017

Donald Dean Davis arrived in rural Jewell County, Kansas, during the big snow storm of March 15, 1924. He had a child's eye view of the great depression from the home of his parents (Newell F. Davis and Ruby M. Fogo) in Mankato, Kansas, and the farmstead of his maternal grandparents north of Burr Oak, Kansas.

World War II crashed into the lives of everyone in his generation. The U.S. military decided he could best serve his country in the Coast Guard, first as a mounted patrol on the Georgia coast and then as a member of the crew on a landing craft in the Pacific. After the war, Don and his new bride (Jean Claire Bothwell) moved to Hays, Kansas, as he, like millions of his fellow veterans, used the GI Bill to make their lives better. Don enrolled at Fort Hays State College to attain his teaching certification while also playing as a scrappy 150-pound center for Tiger football team. He was elected president of the letterman club during his senior year.

Graduation brought Don (Gabby) an offer of a teaching and coaching position in Smith Center, Kansas. His family, which now included a son (Daniel James) and a daughter (Donna Jeanne), moved to the central Kansas county seat and spent the 1950's living their version of the American dream. Don's passion for sports had him playing town team baseball across western Kansas during this time. One of his proudest honors was being selected for the individual sportsmanship trophy at the NBC national tournament in 1951.

When the Smith Center school board decided that they "wanted to go in a different direction" for a football coach, Don was forced to find a new way to support his family. His personality was well exemplified as he told the many fans who offered to battle for his reinstatement that "if you get down in the gutter to fight, you're just in the gutter."

Don then enrolled at the University of Nebraska and rode the Rock Island Rocket to Lincoln every week to earn certification in the newly created education role of guidance counselor. He completed his Master's degree at Ft. Hays and was hired as the first guidance counselor at Beloit High School. His counseling career only lasted two years at Beloit, largely due to conflicts defining this new position. Don felt that the counselor's office should be a place where conversations with students were considered private rather than a source of information for the school administration. He accepted a position with the Kansas Department of Education and spent the next few years driving from Beloit to Topeka to work so that his children would not have their high school years interrupted by a major relocation.

During this time Don was noticed by a group of educators who were establishing what became the American College Testing Program. They asked Don to work with the colleges and universities in Kansas, Nebraska, and the Dakotas utilizing individual ACT test scores to help students find majors that were personally fulfilling. His work as Regional Director for ACT spanned the 60's, 70's, and 80's and included several years living in Salado, Texas, as the growing company expanded and consolidated. At each community in their lives Don and Jean found warm folks with similar world views who became part of their lifelong friendship circle. They chose to make Manhattan their retirement home and purchased a house on what came to be called Democrat Ridge amid neighbors who were some of the finest of Manhat-

Inevitably, life challenged Don as he aged into his 90's and his life partner, Jean, was felled by Alzheimer's. His strength and determination were a source of inspiration and frustration for the many folks who helped him in his last years. He was fiercely determined to be in control of his life even as his sight and reason failed. His struggle ceased late in the night of April 13-14 while he was surrounded by his exhausted family members who were laughing and crying while reassuring him of their love and gratitude.

Don is survived by his children, Dan (Nancy Patnode) and Donna (Shawn Nouri), and his grandchildren, Kane, Booker, and Oakley (Dustin Shawn) Davis and Ada Davis-Nouri. (PAID OBITUARY)

Dear Editor:

I love Salado. My wife and I moved here in 2007. We own our property and pay taxes on it. I voted for the 2014 sewer bond. At the recent town meetings, various residents have expressed their confusion over why the disannexation of Salado is being considered. Here are a few of the arguments behind the disannexation movement.

Charlotte Douglass was the driving force behind Salado's incorporation in 2000. She stated that Salado residents would never pay property tax and that all operating costs would be paid by the money collected from sales taxes and fees. From 2000 through 2007, residents paid no property tax. Starting in 2008, the village assessed a

tax of approximately \$00.05 per \$100.00 valuation on property. Additionally, residents sixty-five and over could take advantage of a law that would freeze their municipal property taxes. By 2014, our property tax had been raised to a valuation of \$00.18 per \$100.00. In 2014, voters approved a 10.55 million dollar sewer. In 2015, the village prematurely issued a 8.2 million dollar sewer bond. The remaining 2.35 million could still be borrowed. In the three years since 2014, the property tax has tripled to \$00.54 and by law could conceivably climb to as much as \$1.50 in the near future. As of today, no work has begun on building the sewer while residents have been paying principal and interest on the borrowed money.

I voted for the sewer to help Main Street, however, that effort has been co-opted for developer welfare. The burden for paying this debt unfairly falls on my family and other families whose taxes are not frozen. Our best remedy for this injustice is to vote for disannexation.





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
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Golf Teams advance to Regionals

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BEFORE YOUNGE, MONTHE FACTS why vote 1990 to disannexation

*Will we be obligated for our share of the sewer debt?

YES. The bond a DEBT that was made when the sewer bond election passed. The entire Village voted on this bond, and the entire Village is responsible for the debt until paid off. (*Local Government Code Section 43.143 (c))

*But I heard that if the disannexated area doesn't receive "direct benefit" then I wouldn't have to pay bond taxes.

This information is WRONG. "Direct benefit" refers to services such as police, fire, road, and (yes) sewer. However, it does NOT include bond debt.

*Will Belton annex the newly disannexed portions of Salado?

Only Belton can answer that definitively. The facts are, once Salado's village limits change, so does our ETJ. This would give Belton the opportunity to annex portions of the newly disannexed Salado, or at the very least put those portions in the Belton ETJ.

*I live in the ETJ now, so this issue really does not affect me.

Disannexation could affect everyone in the Village of Salado and Salado's ETJ. What happens to the Village if a sizable portion of the Village is no longer paying property taxes? It's **possible** that the Village could cease to exist. If there is no Village of Salado, there is no Salado ETJ.

*But I heard about a "green wall" that would keep Belton out.

Again, this is WRONG. There is no such term as a "green wall". The term is "AGRICULTURAL OR WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT USE OR AS TIMBER LAND". *A municipality has to make a development agreement OFFER the property owner before annexation. Because of the type of municipality Belton is, they do not have to have the owners agreement or consent to annex. They only have to make the offer. (*Local Government Code Sec. 43.035)

*What about other services, such as road maintenance police, fire, emergency services, and schools?

Schools: YES, all of the newly disannexed area will still be zoned for Salado schools and still pay the taxes.

Police: YES and NO. Currently, Salado Police department services the Village of Salado. The police department currently employs 3 officers (including the chief of police) that cover the village, with a response time of 3 to 4 minutes on average. If the disannexation passes, the effected portions will be serviced by Bell County Sheriff's department. Talk to anyone currently in the ETJ now and ask what their response time is currently. Bell County has a minimum of 4 patrols at all times for the ENTIRE county, slowing response time down. Will SPD be "first responders"? That would depend on the situation.

Fire: MAYBE. Currently the SVFD receives \$40,000 yearly from the Village to help cover operating costs. This is a large portion of their budget. IF the Village has decreased income they may have to decrease their contribution to the SVFD. Or worse yet, IF the Village cease to exist what does that mean for the SVFD? These are real consequences of decreased tax revenue.

<u>Emergency Services:</u> YES. Bell County will continue to provide this service. However, currently when an ambulance is called the SVFD is also dispatched and is usually first on the scene to stabilize the patient, before the ambulance gets there to transport.

Roads: YES and NO. Bell county will be responsible for maintaining and repairs to the roads in the effected area. Again, you have to address resources. Currently Bell county is responsible for maintaining / repairing county roads. All you have to do is drive some of these roads to see that even the county's resources are limited. Will the newly disannexed area be a priority for the county? Or will we end up at the end of a long list of roads that need maintenance and/or repair.

We the undersigned support a UNITED SALADO. We will vote NO to disannexation on May 6, 2017.

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

Assume you're defending against four hearts. Partner leads the queen of clubs, which wins, and continues with the jack, which South ruffs. Declarer crosses to dummy with a trump and returns a spade.

If you follow low, South makes the contract. His jack forces West's ace, and there is nothing your partner can do to harm declarer. For example, a spade return to your king would be futile, since it would make South's queen a trick and allow him to discard a diamond from dummy on it. 

bites the dust. He loses two spades, a diamond and a club and goes down one.

The question that arises, of course, is how are you supposed to know that you should go up with the king of spades at trick four? It seems too unusual a play to make without seeing all four hands; furthermore, it violates the rule of second hand low.

Yet the play of the king is entirely logical. Once declarer ruffs the second club, it becomes clear that the only real hope of scoring four defensive tricks is to assume that your partner has the ace of spades and a diamond

If declarer has the A-Q of spades, your king is dead whatever you do, so you might as well play the monarch and hope for the best. When the king holds the trick, returning a diamond just adds the icing to the cake. (c) 2017 King Features Syn-





American Robin

American Robin herald of spring

Even though weather in west Texas has been known to rapidly change dramatically, the arrival of spring can often be foretold by the animals that can be observed. One such animal in west Texas is one of the most easily identifiable birds in North America, the aptly named American Robin.

The American Robin (Turdus migratorius) is probably one of the most common and well-known birds in North America, occurring in every state in the Union at least temporarily. It can be observed throughout east Texas year-round, while in the Trans-Pecos and Panhandle regions it is most commonly seen in the spring as it migrates back from its neo-tropical winter

This is an attractive and somewhat colorful species of bird that exhibits a bright orange breast offset by the gray upperparts. The head of the males are black, while in the females and juveniles, the head coloration matches the upperparts. It has a yellow bill, and the throat is white with black striping. There is an incomplete white ring around the eyes. The

Michael Price legs are long and lanky and the tail is fairly long and dark colored. It is a larger bird, with the body length of about ten inches and a wingspan that can approach seventeen

inches. Robins can be most commonly observed while searching for food in a style that can be almost comical in appearance. They will run for several steps, stop abruptly, peck at the ground, and then begin running again. This is known as a "runstop" foraging style. They feed primarily on earthworms and insects, berries and fruits are also eaten. When not on the ground, the flight pattern is easily recognizable as it is a direct path with strong wing-beats.

These birds typically prefer to live a solitary life during the spring, summer, and fall months. However, during the winter, they occasionally will form flocks together. They are known to pair up during the breeding season, with the male and female

remaining monogamous during such time. The nest is typically found in trees, and is made up of grass and mud, lined with finer grass. The three to seven eggs are small (roughly one inch by one inch) and are usually unmarked and colored a pale blue, although occasionally they will be off-white. These eggs hatch in about two weeks, and the female is the primary care-giver to the helpless young until they leave the nest approximately two weeks after hatching. Juveniles are colored similar to the adults, except they have a heavily spotted breast. Up to three broods per year have been recorded.

Wild About Texas

Robins are a common to abundant bird throughout their range in Texas. This is one species of bird that has adapted quite well to human habitation, with many individuals seen foraging in lawns and gardens. They are not bashful, and many will utilize bird feeders littered with breadcrumbs.







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


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Protecting Cattle from Horn Flies

pest for beef cattle in Texas is the horn fly. Research shows that a calf infested with more than 200 horn flies will weigh 15 to 50 pounds less at weaning. Horn fly feeding on dairy cows can also reduce milk production up to 20 percent.

To suppress horn flies effectively and economically:

Identifying horn flies Horn flies look like house flies and stable flies but are

slightly smaller. Like the stable fly, horn flies have piercing mouthparts. To distinguish horn flies

from stable flies, observe their feeding behavior. Horn flies rest on an animal between feedings; stable flies remain on the animal only while feeding. Also, horn flies feed most often on an animal's back shoulders.

and sides, whereas stable flies feed principally on the legs.

Life Cycle Horn flies lay eggs in fresh manure pats, where they hatch as maggots. They develop from the egg to the adult stage within 10 to 20 days and live for about 3 weeks, feeding 20 to 30 times

In Central Texas, horn flies are usually first observed in early spring. Populations tend to peak in early summer, then decline when the weather becomes hot and dry. In the fall, horn fly populations usually surge again when the temperatures drop and rainfall increases. Generally, they are no longer a problem after October or November, depending on when temperatures start to drop.

Control Methods

To suppress horn fly popu-

lations, efficiently, use an integrated pest management (IPM) approach. IPM relies on multiple tactics including cultural, biological, and chemical methods to suppress insect pests.

Biological control: Parasitic wasps suppress horn fly populations naturally. Producers who want to use parasitic wasps to control horn flies can order fly pupae parasitized with the wasps from insectaries in Texas or across the United States.

Dung beetles and fire ants also suppress horn fly populations, Dung beetles compete for manure use and shrink the manure pats where horn fly larvae grow. Be careful when applying pesticides moxidectin and, to a greater extent, avermectin kill dung beetles.

Fire ants feed on horn fly larvae and pupae, thus reducing

the number of horn fly adults. Fire ant control is effective when horn fly populations are small, but as they increase in the summer, the impact is not as apparent.

Cultural methods: Remove and properly dispose of fresh manure from barns and stalls to interrupt the horn fly's life cycle and help prevent new populations from developing.

Chemical control: Several chemical control methods can help reduce the number of horn flies on cattle: ear tags, sprayers and dusters, feed additives, and boluses. To prevent resistance, rotate chemical classes of insecticide products each year and even within a year if a midto-late season horn fly increase warrants further insecticide applications. Ear tags

Ear tags are 2 to 3 inch plastic tags impregnated with an insecticide and attached to a cow's ear. For descriptions of several types of ear tags products, see: http://insects.tamu. edu/extension/publications/ epubs/eee-00047.cfm

Sprayers and dusters

Free-range cattle can be treated with small sprayers and dusters powered electrically from the back of a truck. Although sprays can also be applied during seasonal roundups, they usually do not suppress horn flies for long.

Feed additives Confined and free-range cattle can be given feed additives that suppress horn flies. These products contain insecticides that pass through the animal's digestive system and remain in the manure where horn

fly maggots develop. But, the herd will still be susceptible to biting flies moving from neighboring properties.

One disadvantage of feed additives is that it is difficult to regulate each cow's feed intake.
