US Fish & Wildlife will approve permit for Salado sewer

U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is expected to give the Village of Salado its final opinion on the biological assessment for the sewer system next week.

The Village heard from the U.S. Corps of Engineers that USFWS will give approval for the Village to proceed with the sewer system.

The approval will come with conditions, according to Alderman Amber Preston-Dankert.

One of those conditions will be that the Village will be required to trench across Salado Creek, rather than horizontally drilling beneath the creek.

This will likely save the Village money due to the cost of horizontal drilling.

By open cutting across the creek, "it allows us to see what we are cutting," Dr. Dankert said, adding that "it allows us to fix anything immediately rather than not knowing there has been any damage done" to possible habitat areas for the Salado salamander.

"It's less destructive to open cut and have a biologist there on site while we do it," she added.

The Village submitted its biological impact study in March. The USFWS has 145 days from the date of receiving the study that was conducted by Zara Environmental to give its final opinion.

"They (Corps of Engineers and USFWS) have been working really hard to get this done for us," Dr. Dankert said, "knowing where we are on this project."

Once final approval is issued, the Village will proceed with preparing bid

documents and putting the construction project out for

According to the Village Sewer Timeline, the bid process should take 60 days from final approval of plans. Bids could be awarded as early as

Construction is expected to take 11 months for the collection system and wastewater treatment plant, according to the Sewer Timeline.

The Timeline calls for three months for the connection of septic systems and transfer of sewer service.

Based upon the current Sewer Timeline, new customers could begin receiving sewer service by September 2018.

The Village and Sanctuary Development signed Wastewater Services Agreement in Nov. 2015 with a service Availability Date of two years from the execution of the agreement. Under that agreement, the Village agrees to provide "pump and haul wastewaster service to such customers or prospective customers for service in a quantity not to exceed the Service Commitment."

This agreement requires that the internal facilities be designed, approved by the Village, constructed by the developer and accepted by the Village before the developer can request retail wastewater service.

To date, no designs for the internal facilities have been submitted by the Sanctuary developer.

Sanctuary has not submitted any documents necessary to begin formation of a Public Improvement District (PID), which is the funding mechanism for the infrastructure of the development.

Question Planning around the potential loss of some \$300,000 to

"Left Behind"? Are you kidding?

With disannexation, the citizens who remain in the Village limits will gain control of the municipal government. They're mostly the ones who have been squarely in the sights of proposed dense development, an outdoor music venue with a capacity into the tens of thousands and a sewer treatment plant all in their back yard. All the while, those who decided this were snug in their homes on the other side of town in Mill Creek.

The O&M portion of the property tax assessed in the Proposed Disannexing Area (PDA) is approximately \$45,000. Fees assessed in the PDA might be approximately \$100,000. The rest (\$120,000) assessed in the PDA is the bond payment. Until that bond money is SPENT, property tax payers in the PDA will continue to be responsible for their pro rata share. So the projected gap in municipal O&M revenue would be approximate

Anywhere else with disannexation, the end of the cost of services for the PDA would offset some of that gap. Disannexation has a bigger impact on this municipal budget because hardly any money is spent for the PDA. A new Board will have to either curtail spending and/or raise the O&M portion of the property tax.

As for the PDA and the bond with disannexation, the

precedents have the disannexed releasing the municipality from any refund of taxes and fees for a release from any indebtedness. A new Board isn't bound to follow any spending plan by the current Board. A new Board can come up with their own less costly sewer scheme and how to pay for it. 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New unit will help millions of pounds of fresh produce get to hunger agencies

Churches Touching Lives for Christ (CTLC) and the Central Texas Food Bank dedicated a new 2,375 cubic-foot produce hub for storing and distributing fresh produce with a ribbon cutting ceremony April 24. Churches Touching Lives for Christ is located at 702 W. Avenue G in Temple.

With the help of a \$25,000 grant from the Morgan Stanlev Foundation through Feeding America, the two organizations worked together on the produce hub concept, which allows for more fresh produce to be distributed to those in need in the greater Temple area. The produce hub is a used 40- foot-long shipping container that was purchased by the Central Texas Food Bank and retrofitted with insulation and a refrigeration unit so it can be used as a cold storage space for fresh produce. It was placed in the CTLC parking lot to provide easy access for local food pantries and soup kitchens that come to stock up on fresh produce for the people they serve.

"We're thrilled that the Central Texas Food Bank



selected us for this practical, cost-effective alternative to installing additional walkin cooler space inside our building," said Jim Hornsby, executive director of Churches Touching Lives for Christ. "Together, we've set a goal to have an incremental 2 million pounds of food come through the produce hub in its first year, allowing us and other food relief charities in the area to get even more fresh, nutritious food to our neighbors in need."

The cold storage capacity of the hub allows for pro-

duced donated by local retailers and growers, as well as produce shipped from growers in the Rio Grande Valley, to be stored for quick distribution by CTLC, either directly to their clients or to other hunger fighting aganecies in the area.

"Our team is always looking for new and innovative ways to get more food, especially fresh produce, to those in need," said Derrick Chubbs, President and CEO of the Central Texas Food Bank.



Having lost the first two tricks, and with the ace of hearts also a certain loser, declarer had to find a way to avoid losing any diamonds. 

South finally concluded that his only possible chance for the contract was to lay a trap for East. So at trick four he crossed to the queen of spades and returned the deuce of hearts!

It was very difficult for East to imagine that South would make this play without holding the jack of hearts, so, afraid that the jack might be singleton, he rushed up with the ace. South later discarded both of his diamond losers on the K-Q of hearts to make four spades.

You could argue, quite justifiably, that East made a poor defensive play, but even if the ploy had failed, you'd still have to give South an A for effort.



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

Painted Bunting

Painted Bunting is colorful

To say that an object is "hidden in plain sight" means that said object is unnoticed while not necessarily attempting to hide. This saying surprisingly holds true with many animals that are adorned with brilliant colors. For example, a milksnake that is decorated with vivid colors of red, black and white is instantly noticeable while it is on a uniformly colored background, like an asphalt road. However, that same snake is virtually undetectable while crawling through a grassy area with dappled sunlight - the lighting will literally break up the pattern and colors of the snake and make it very difficult to notice.

This gaudy type of camouflage is utilized by the Painted Bunting, arguably the most colorful species of bird that is found in the United States.

The Painted Bunting (Passerina ciris) is one of three species of Bunting that resides in Texas during the summer months. It is a tropical migrant, meaning it spends its winters in southern Mexico and Central America. During the summer months, it may be observed throughout the state of Texas, as well as Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, northward to southern Kansas and Missouri.

Like other members of the genus, it prefers to reside in areas of brushlands and thickets, as well as on the outskirts of densely wooded areas. It is in these areas that the Painted Bunting is literally "hidden in plain sight", despite its extravagant color-



Speaking of coloration, this is the most distinguishing characteristics of this species, at least in adult males. Sexually mature males are one of the most brilliantly colored birds found in North America, having a dark, navy-blue colored head with a red eye-ring. The back areas are bright lime-green, while the underparts are various shades of red and scarlet. The wings and tail are grayish with reddish fringe along the edges. It is hard to imagine that such a showy bird could blend in with its surroundings as effectively as it does.

Painted Buntings are sexually dimorphic, which means males and females look very different from one another. Females, as well as juvenile males, are not nearly as flamboyant as the adult males, being primarily a uniform green (darker on the upperparts). This coloration also serves the female well as effective camouflage.

This riparian species is small, with a body length of approximately five and onehalf inches, while the wingspan can approach eight and one-half inches.

Both sexes of Painted Buntings are commonly seen while foraging for food while in bushes, trees, or more often on the ground. It feeds on a variety of seeds as well as an assortment of insects and caterpillars.

Males are often seen while perched in the open singing. Its flight pattern consists of and up-and-down flight with rapidly beating wings.

With the exception of the spring breeding period, this avian species is extremely gregarious, living in large foraging flocks. However, during the spring breeding season, the Painted Bunting prefers to live a solitary life or it will pair up. Females will remain monogamous, but the males will sometimes take two or more mates, and is referred to as polygynous. The nest is constructed by the female, and she is responsible to incubate the 3-5 pale blue eggs as well. After hatching, the young will remain in the nest an additional two weeks, and during this time they are fed by both sexes, although the female feeds the nestlings about seventy five percent of the time. Up to three broods are produced annually.

The Painted Bunting is a common to abundant bird throughout its range in Texas. Although it is a somewhat bashful and wary bird, many individuals will utilize bird feeders in the yard. Attract them with sunflower seeds and bird baths with fresh water.

At one time, the Painted Bunting was sold as a songbird until laws were established to prevent that. It occasionally will be seen as a cage bird in southern Mexico or Central America, and may be known under the name "nonpareil" which can be translated from the French meaning "without equal".

If you are able to observe this colorful and elegant songbird, you will undoubtedly agree!








