New leaders bring new procedures for Village staff

With a new mayor, the Village of Salado will have new processes and operating procedures. In addition to a new mayor elected by the popular vote in a May 10 election, the Village of Salado also has a new Mayor Pro Tem and two new aldermen. The newly-inducted aldermen Dr. Amber Preston-Dankert and Frank Coachman joined Dr. Michael McDougal and Hans Fields in electing Fred Brown as the Mayor Pro Tem during a short business meeting May 15.

Election judge Eldon Miller presented the official election results to the board as one of the few agenda items for the regular session. Bryan Fritch gave the motion to accept the election results as Mayor Danney McCort exited the meeting for another appointment. Justice of the Peace and Village Municipal Judge Don Engleking read the oaths of office with the newly-elected officials, Mayor Skip Blancett and aldermen Preston-Dankert and Coachman.

Village administrator Jim Reed presented outgoing aldermen Fritch and Shannon Ashe with plaques thanking them for their years on the board. Fritch served two terms on the board of aldermen and Ashe served one. McCort was not present to accept a plaque thanking him for his service as an alderman and mayor.

Part of the transition of power and responsibility will be bringing the new board up to speed on the future sewer bond issue.

"This will be a change in how we manage things," Village administrator Jim Reed said during a brief workshop session May 15. "Our previous mayor was in the office quite a few hours. The village staff will have to adjust to the new leadership style and pace. Past practices guide where we've been, but not

where we're going."

All day-to-day contact should go through the Village Secretary Margaret Murray, Reed said. Murray will direct inquiries of office traffic through the phones, electronically or walk-ins to the correct person for the situations at hand.

"She will work with myself and our assistant to address the issues as they come up," Reed said. "This is a change for us."

Maintenance requests will go through the secretary. Financial issues will be directed to Dan Nixon, the Village investment officer. Code enforcement issues will be sent directly to the Code Enforcement Officer Berrier.

Requests for agenda items should be directed through the Village Secretary, Reed said. "The Mayor will work with the both of us to get the sequencing of these items on the agenda."

Mayor Blancett reviewed his schedule with aldermen, telling them that he can be at the Village office on Tuesdays. He said he would make contact with the Murray and/or Reed in the mornings, at lunch and again in the late afternoon. He also said he can work at the office over the weekends. Brown told aldermen that he could be at the office on Mondays and Fridays.

Reed addressed the priorities of aldermen, specifically making the transition to a full-time city manager. "We need to begin looking at calendars to pull that off," Reed said, adding that aldermen should discuss their priorities and vision for the next nine months to a year and begin working on the budget cycle. Reed has informed aldermen that Central Texas Council of Governments (CTCOG) is not likely to extend the contract for providing city management services to the village beyond the current period.

He pointed new aldermen to see Village, page 6A

Memorial service set at Cemetery

Salado Cemetery Association will again host the annual Memorial Day Service at 9:30 a.m. on May 26 at the Historic Salado Cemetery on Baines St.

"Everyone is invited to honor our veterans on this special day and pay tribute to their service to our country," said Bill Kinnison with the Salado Cemetery Association.

The purpose of the Memorial Day ceremony is to remember the veterans buried not just in Salado

Cemetery but in all of the Salado-area cemeteries, including family and church cemeteries, by a roll call of their names. All 432 veterans buried in the cemetery will have flags placed on their graves. The veterans are from the Texas Revolutionary War, Early Day Rangers, Home Guard, Indian Wars, Mexican War, Confederate and Union Armies, WWI and II, Korean War, Vietnam War, and from peace time service.

The ceremony will consist of these events: the Bell County Sheriff's Posse presenting the colors; honoring each of the armed services; a Commemorative Air Force fly-over; and playing of bag pipes in the cemetery. Capt. Skip Blancett, USN, Ret., will give Memorial Day remarks. LTC (Ret) Stephen Peters, Cemetery Board Treasurer, will read the roll call of veterans' names this year. Taps will be played at the conclusion

of the ceremony.

Light refreshments will be served following the closing of the Memorial Day ceremony. Seating will be provided by the Village of Salado, but the number of seats is limited, so you are encouraged to bring lawn chairs, also umbrellas, as tradition has it, the event is held outside in spite of sun or rain.

"We hope to see you at the Memorial Day ceremony," Kinnison said.

Trustees review facilities assessment

Salado ISD Trustees spent two hours in workshop session May 19 reviewing the draft of a facilities assessment that estimates costs of maintaining the current facilities at \$10 million. The assessment was conducted by SHW Group for the school district and trustees agreed that further dedicated workshop sessions are needed in coming months on the present conditions and future needs for the district facilities.

SHW Group conducted the facilities assessment for the school district for \$23,000, which included a survey of 20 staff members, a survey of five campus principals, a systems survey of each campus, interviews with each principal and superintendent Michael Novotny, a review of existing documents and reports on facilities and site visits.

Using a formula that considers the current replacement value (CRV) and the deferred maintenance backlog (DMB), the assessment assigns a Facility Condition Index (FCI) for each facility.

Dividing the DMB by the CRV gives the FCI, explained Barry Nebhut with SHW Group. An FCI below 10 percent is rated as Good, an FCI between 10 percent and 20 percent is considered Fair and an FCI above 20 percent is considered Poor condition.

"A building that is considered in Poor condition doesn't mean that it needs

Advocacy group ranks SISD in top 5% in state

The Children at Risk organization has ranked 953 schools in Texas, giving Salado ISD one of only two A's to local schools and ranking it as #44 among the 929 school districts it ranks.

"These ratings and rankings are a very objective measure of the excellent education that we provide to our students," Superintendent Michael Novotny. "This achievement is result of the teamwork of many people including students that are diligent, employees that are caring and dedicated, parents that have high expectations, and school board members that provide great leadership and support."

With a website dedicated to its ranking system, Children at Risk declares on its website that it "serves as a catalyst for change to improve the quality of life for children through strategic research, public policy analysis, education, collaboration and advocacy."

to be replaced," Nebhut cautioned. "It means that some money needs to be spent on that building."

He added that one or two big ticket items, like an aging roofing system, or heating, venting and air conditioning (HVAC) system could "cause that number to be skewed."

Overall, he said that the SISD facilities are in good repair, but added that the older facilities, including the elementary school, football field and administration building were in need of attention.

He explained that the assessment process was in-depth in that it looked at the structural integrity of the facilities as well as more cosmetic items.

The assessment review site work, to include drives, parking, sidewalks and drainage systems; structures to include foun-

datation and footings, crawl spaces and structural framing; and exteriors to include roofs, walls, doors and windows.

The assessment also included interiors construction: walls/partitions, doors, fixed furnishing, stairs, ramps, finishes of floors walls and ceilings and facility rest rooms.

The assessment considered the condition of mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems.

The assessment examined facilities for safety and security and technology as well, including future expandability of technology network infrastructure.

Considering these aspects, the assessment measured each facility based upon criteria that included compliance with state and federal safety and welfare codes, operational condi-

tion of the facility, the system age and its anticipated service life and communications capabilities within and between facilities.

The assessment then assigned priorities to addresses identified deficiencies.

Priority 1 items face imminent failure and can have collateral damage to other aspects of the facility function, Nebhut said. Failure of those systems could occur within the next five years if no corrective action is taken.

Priority 2 items face product failure within 6-10 years if not addressed by the district.

Finally, priority 3 items are more cosmetic in nature and are not as crucial or pressing in nature.

Nebhut told trustees that the CRV for all of the facilities in the school district was \$60.4 million.

He outlined Priority 1 projects that totaled \$110,798 that are imminently needed. He said that the district had \$3.4 million in Priority 2 projects and \$6.3 million in priority 3 projects.

"This assessment does not address future needs," he told trustees. "These are to keep your facilities operating at the standards for which they were built, not for bringing them up to meet new codes or improving and expanding them for future growth."

Trustees discussed the assessment, focusing on the safety needs of the district and that the \$10 million in deferred maintenance costs does not address future district needs.



It ranks school campuses and districts across three indexes: Student Achievement, Campus Performance, and Growth.

Within each index, a percentile rank was calculated for each school. Using these three index percentiles, a weighted average was computed to create an overall composite index. A state or local rank was determined as the order in which campuses are listed when the weighted Composite Indexes are sorted from highest to lowest, relative

to other schools servicing the same grade levels (i.e., Elementary, Middle, High).

With a composite score of 87.00, Salado ISD was ranked 44th in 929 school districts.

Schools were also assigned a letter grade, based on their Composite Index.

For elementary, middle, and high schools: Campuses at or above the 75th percentile received an "A." Campuses at or above the 55th percentile, but below the 75th percentile, received a "B". Campuses

at or above the 35th percentile, but below the 55th percentile, received a "C". Campuses at or above the 15th percentile, but below the 35th percentile, received a "D". Campuses below the 15th percentile received an "F".

Belton also received an A grade and was ranked 79th in the state. Holland, Academy, Troy and Rogers received Bs from the organization. Bartlett ISD received a C while Killeen, Temple and Jarrell all received a D grade.

ernment training and handbooks on the open meetings and government officials.

Reed suggested that the board may want to move workshops to occur after regular business sessions, rather than before business sessions.

Part of the transition of power and responsibilities will include bringing the new board up to speed on the future bond election for a sewer system. Reed told aldermen that the Village is still on pace to have preliminary design of the sewer in mid-June with the final proposal by mid-August. Alderman Fields asked Reed if he would have answers to the "sixteen questions that came from the town hall meeting." Reed said that he will have answers to most of those questions, but will not have specifics as to "where parcels of land will be" for the sewer plant or effluent.

Aldermen will meet June 5 and June 19 to start the budget process.

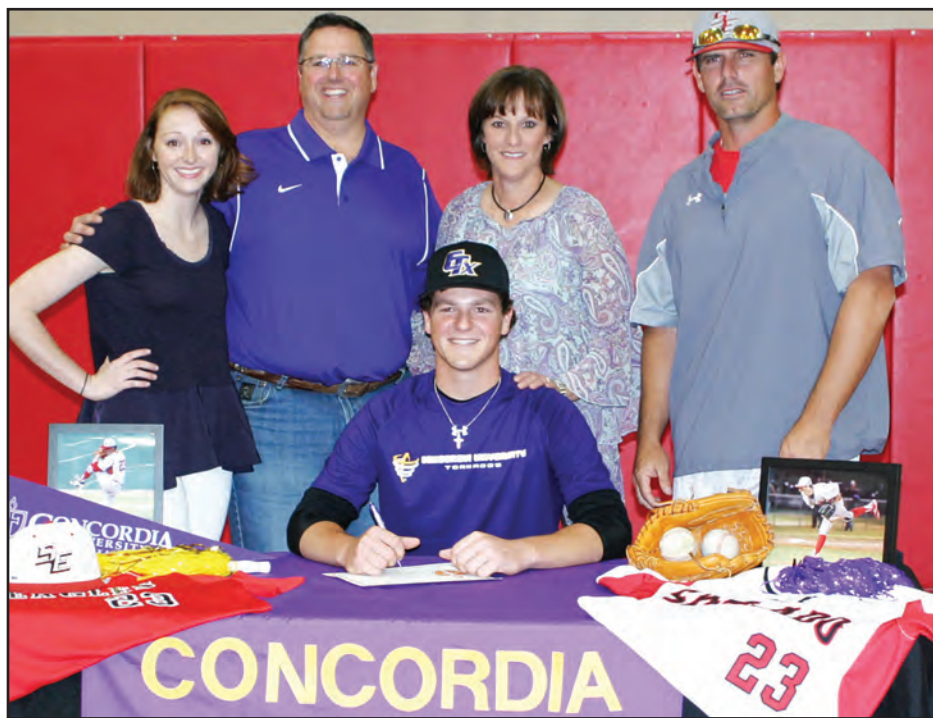

Central Texas Astronomical Society holds star parties at a lookout near you

The best way to learn about the night sky is to go outside at night and look. For that purpose, the Central Texas Astronomical Society (CTAS) will host free public star parties, on Saturday, 8:30 p.m.- 11:30 p.m. May 24, at Overlook Park outside Belton, the Waco Wetlands outside Waco, and at the Hubbard City Lakes Park in Hub-

bard. CTAS members will provide telescopes to view the visible planets, comets, asteroids, and a selection of star clusters, nebulae, and galaxies.

Objects that move from night to night with reference to the background stars are located within our own solar system. In astronomical terms, they are very near to us. Planets,

asteroids, and comets fall into this category. Comet PanSTARRS C/2012 K1 moves past the Big Dipper this month. The Earth may pass through the tail of Comet 209P/LINEAR and provide a meteor shower for the star party. The meteors, if they occur, will appear to us to come from an area near Polaris, the North Star.

Saturn reaches opposition (on the opposite side of the sky from the Sun) and peak visibility in May. Saturn's rings are tilted wide open, providing excellent views of the Cassini division, the gap between the A and B rings. Mercury, Jupiter, and Mars will also be on display. The two brightest asteroids, Ceres and Vesta, are moving through the Constellation Virgo.

They will look at these and many other celestial objects this month. Visit centexastronomy.org, for more information and directions to the site closest to you. A flashlight and a lawn chair can make moving around easier and viewing more comfortable. If this event is cancelled due to weather, a cancellation notice will be posted on the CTAS website homepage by 7 p.m.

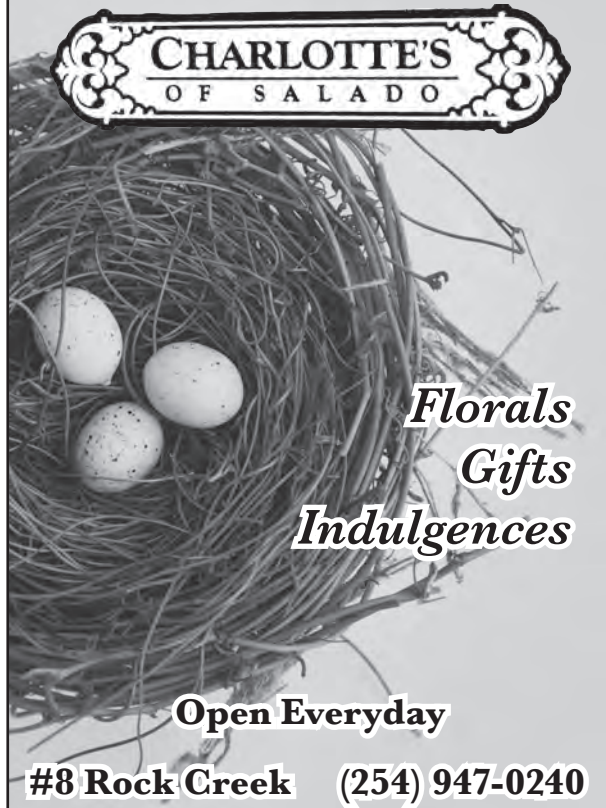

Contract Bridge

Assume you're declarer at four spades and West leads the ace and another diamond, which you ruff. You lead the ten of spades, which wins, and then the jack, taken by West with the ace. West shifts to a heart, won by East with the ace, and East returns the king of diamonds.

It doesn't matter whether you ruff high or low -- in either case West sooner or later scores his nine of trumps, and down you go. That's the story if you played the hand this way, but naturally there's more to it than that. The question is whether you can figure out how to make the contract -- and it can be made -- now that you know how the East-West cards are divided.

As with most problems of this type, the solution is easy once you've seen it. If you'd like to work it out for yourself, stop reading right here; if not, here's the way it's done:

Obviously, you have to try to do something to keep West from getting a second trump trick. To that end, after ruffing the diamond jack at trick two, you should lead a club and trump it in dummy!

Now play the third round of diamonds and, when East produces the king, discard a heart (instead of ruffing). This hands East-West their second trick, but the only other one they can get is the ace of trumps. East is out of diamonds, and there is nothing else he can return to injure you.

The effect of this "loser on loser" play is that it removes a potential threatening card (the king of diamonds) from East's hand at the same time as you dispose of a heart -- which was a loser in any case.

It is not important that you wind up losing two diamond tricks instead of a heart and a diamond. What is important is that you lose only one trump trick instead of two.

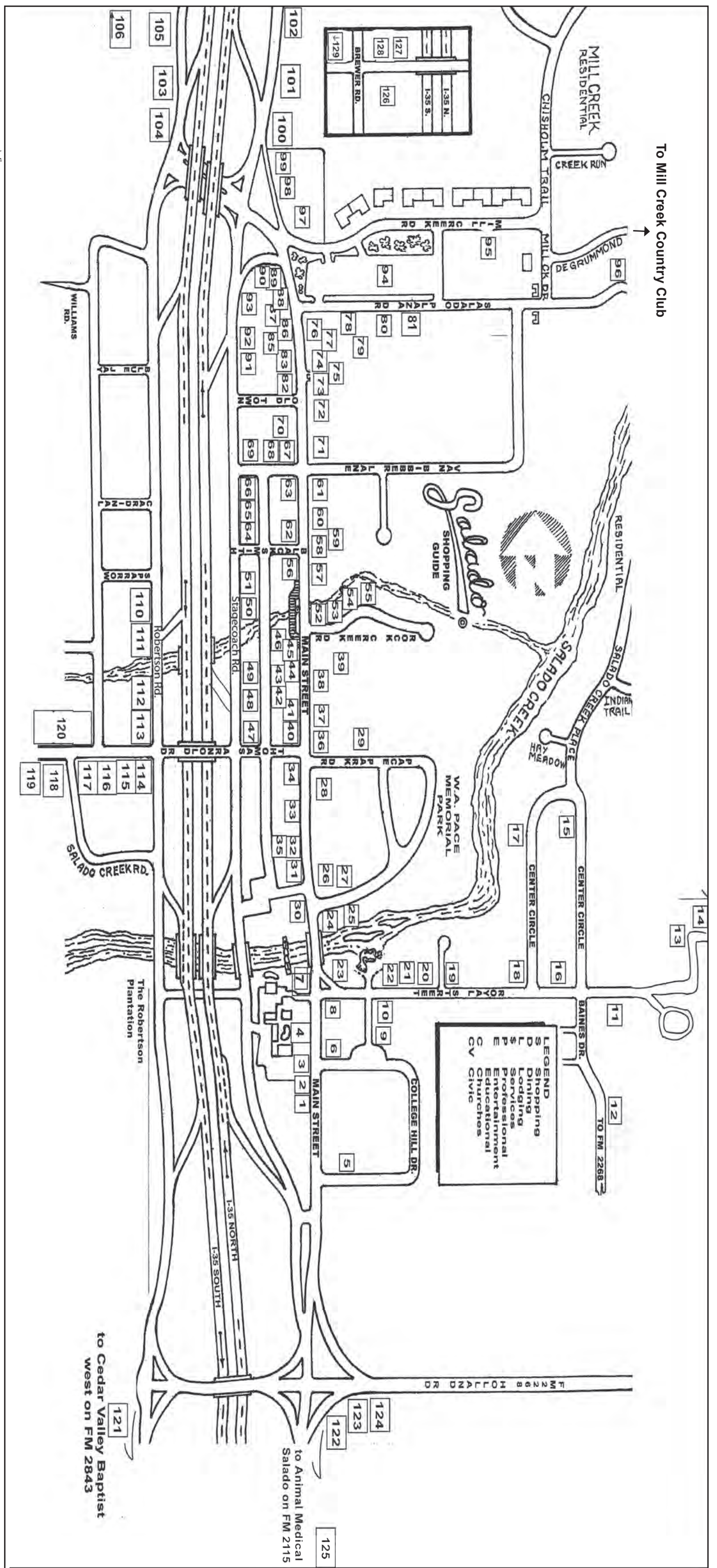



Choosing the right summer camp for your kids

BBB advice on making a wise choice for your child's summer activities

Summer is just around the corner and now is the time to start planning your summertime activities. Each year more than 11 million children and adults attend camp in the United States. The American Camp Association (ACA) states that there are more than 12,000 day and resident camps nationwide. It's great to have options, but with so many to choose from it can be an intimidating task.

Better Business Bureau (BBB) serving Central, Coastal, Southwest Texas and the Permian Basin recommends that you research the camps you are considering. Before making a decision, it is important to know your child's personality to identify

which camp program will benefit him or her most. Also, include your child in the decision-making process when looking at camps.

According to the ACA, there is no government oversight of camps which is why it's so crucial to do your homework. Most complaints received by BBB about camps nationwide allege camp billing and refund issues. These include failure to respond to notices of cancellation, which resulted in unauthorized credit card charges. Other complaints include contract issues and claims that the camp advertised activities and field trips that their child never participated in.

BBB offers the following advice for parents searching for the right camp:

Check BBB.org. Find trustworthy camps by checking the company's BBB Business Review. You will find important background information, such as how long the camp has been in business, advertising issues, ownership information and how it resolves complaints. You may also want to find out if the camp is certified by the ACA. The organization requires camps to meet up to 300 nationally-recognized standards.

* Visit the camp in person. This will be your opportunity to check out living, eating, recreational facilities and meet staff members. Be sure to ask about safety procedures and how rules are enforced.

* Assess the quality of staff. Find out the camp director's background, the criteria used for hiring staff and whether certification in CPR and First Aid is required. It is also important to know the ratio of staff to campers. Parents sending children to specialty camps should inquire about the staff's level of expertise in the specialized area.

* Know the fees and payment policies. What is the total cost of tuition? Is your money refundable should the camp be canceled? Are there extra charges for any activities? Are meals and transportation included? Make sure all these details are included in your contract.

* Ask about medical care. Find out if a nurse or doctor is on-site. Inquire about the procedures for transporting injured or sick children to nearby medical facilities and under what circumstances you will be notified of any problems.

* Consider a backup plan. In case the camp you choose gets canceled for unexpected reasons, be sure to have another camp or two in mind. It is ideal to also visit and research those backup camps in advance so that you can be well-informed in the event of a last-minute decision.
