Construction intense on I-35

"This is the most intensive level we will see," said Jodi Wheatley, information specialist for Texas Department of Transportation for the I-35 corridor in the Waco District.

And it is intense as 66 miles of the 80 miles of I-35 that pass through the Waco District, from Abbott in the north to Salado in the south, are under construction as part of a major project to expand I-35 in both directions so that it will be at least three lanes in each direction and four lanes in highly-populated areas.

Salado should see its construction aches coming to an end by the close of 2015 as crews with James Construction are expected to begin construction in the next three months on the final portion of the project through Salado: the reconfiguring of the underpass of I-35 and Salado Plaza.

Work on this section will take about eight months to complete and will move the underpass of

I-35 from its present location to connect Salado Plaza Drive in a straight shot underneath I-35 ending at West Village Road on the west.

Traffic on Salado Plaza Rd. will be able to turn north or south on Main Street or continue west to under pass I-35. Traffic on Mill Creek Dr. will also be able to turn south on Main or north onto the access road feed. The access road feed at Salado Library is actually two way, feeding into the northbound access lanes, according to the I-35 schematics.

TXDOT officials did not have the I-35 schematics on hand for the June 26 town hall meeting with citizens, having left those maps at the Waco office. However, they did have schematics for the Belton portions of the expansion project.

A copy of the I-35 schematics are available in a large PDF file at salado.villagevoice.com.

Many of the 100 or so citizens gathered for the

meeting were frustrated by the lack of schematics, others were frustrated by what they consider a lack of consideration for safety for those traveling in the project area. One citizen asked repeatedly about the confusion of drivers on two-way frontage roads during the construction, especially when those roads will be one-way when the project is completed.

She was told that TXDOT will "look into that" for additional signage to warn drivers that the access roads are two-way, particularly in areas where there is a confluence of traffic such as the intersection of West Village Road with the two-way access road and the entrance ramp back onto I-35.

Citizens were again encouraged by Wheatley to follow TXDOT on Twitter and subscribe to the daily and weekly e-mail distributions of lane and other closures for the construction project at my35.org.

Andy played the Captain of a Ranger Company in "Dawn of the Crescent Moon" that premiered at a Houston film festival this past May and won two top awards. In addition, he has been cast as a sheriff in a new film called "Retail Hell: Do You Work Here" and several other productions that are in preproduction.

Girls named to All State

Shyenne Hicks was named to the Texas Sports Writers Association All State First Team at first base and pitcher Morgan Hill and shortstop Malory Schattle received Honorable Mention.

Hicks led the Lady Eagles in batting with 13 homers and 80 RBIs. In 148 plate appearances, she had an on-base percentage of .595. She batted .568 and had 36 hits for extra bases.

Hill pitched in 24 games and had a record of 18-6. She faced 579 batters and had an ERA of 2.18. She struck out 159 batters and allowed 101 hits and 76 walks. At the plate, she was very effective as well,

Grace Baptist Church founder dies at age 59

John Glover Warden, 59, and founding minister of Grace Baptist Church of Salado, died June 28, 2014.

A service celebrating his life was held 10 a.m. July 2 at Crest View Baptist Church in Georgetown with interment following at Berry's Creek Cemetery. A visitation was held July 1 at The Gabriels Funeral Chapel.

John Glover Warden was born May 14, 1955 in Burnet, Texas to the late Douglas Amon and Mary Nell Glover Warden. He spent his childhood years

in Austin, TX, and graduated from Lanier High School. He and his family were active at Ridge Top Baptist and later Crestview Baptist Church in Austin.

He attended Baylor University where he met his future wife, Paula Knight. The two were married in Waco on May 29, 1976. Upon graduation, he joined his family's wholesale heating and air conditioning business, DA Warden Company, in Austin. He subsequently started a branch office in Georgetown.

In 1994 John was called into the ministry and started Grace Baptist Church of Salado with 18 members. He served as pastor of Grace for 14 years and saw tremendous growth in the congregation of the church including the construction of a new worship hall.

Feeling the call to plant a church in his hometown of Jarrell, John started New Hope Baptist Church (known in the community as "The Barn Church") where he served for the past six years.

John touched many lives throughout Williamson and Bell Counties with his ministry, which included volunteer chaplaincy at St. David's Georgetown Hospital.

He is preceded in death by his parents Douglas and Mary Warden and his mother-in-law, Jean Knight.

He is survived by his wife of 28 years Paula Knight Warden; his children, Douglas Wade Warden and his wife Julie of San Antonio, Melanie Warden Pell and her hus-

band Andy of Dallas and Marissa Warden Priddy and her husband Jared of Euless; his sister, Annette Hill and husband Robert of Jarrell. He is also survived by his grandchildren, Asher Warden, Jude Warden, Ethan Pell, and Macy Pell; his father-in-law, Wade Knight and his wife Jo; along with a host of family and friends.

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Hail to the Redskins!



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The U.S. Patent and Trademark Office's contribution to the Washington Redskins debate is petting absurdity in the service of rank politically correct bullying.

A panel of the office's Trademark Trial and Appeal Board ruled in favor of plaintiffs claiming that the Redskins name "may disparage persons or bring

them into contempt, or disrepute," and therefore stripped the team of six trademarks. In theory, the ruling will hurt the team's bottom line by making it impossible for it to stop others from selling its merchandise.

Exercising his constitutional power as arbiter of tastefulness in sports, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid rallied almost all of his Democratic colleagues a few months ago to implore the NFL to change the offending name, and hailed the patent ruling as the beginning of the end of the profound historical injustice perpetrated by the football franchise that dare not speak its name.

The patent board ruled this way once before. In response to a complaint in the 1990s, the board made its decision, as it noted this time around, "after seven years of litigation, involving multiple discovery and pre-trial motions." Then, the ruling was reversed in court -- after about another 10 years.

Certainly, opinions differ about the appropriateness of "Redskins" as a nickname. But some perspective: There is no time in American history when

Native Americans have been held in higher regard. Their nobility is celebrated in our popular culture, and their unjust treatment recounted in our schools. The existence of a professional football franchise with the same name that it has had for 80 years -- no matter how anachronistic -- has self-evidently not caused Native Americans to be held in contempt and disrepute.

The Washington Post called the patent decision "a victory for tolerance." A bureaucratic body seeking to harm a sports team because some people don't like its nickname is a strange exercise in tolerance. The paper went on to note that the tide is running against the Redskins since so many people have spoken out against them, "including the president of the United States and half of the United States Senate, which controls the tax breaks enjoyed by the NFL." Get it? It would be

too bad if something happened to your nice football league. How tolerant.

In a section establishing the standing of the anti-Redskins petitioners, the patent panel made it clear they have no direct interest except that they are offended. Fine. Don't be Redskins fans. Root for the Cowboys or the Giants, the team's NFC East rivals. Never go to FedExField. Don't buy Redskins paraphernalia. If you must support a Washington sports team, make it one with a nickname so thoroughly anodyne that even the Trademark Trial and Appeal Board approves -- the Major League Soccer team, D.C. United.

But in the 21st century, this isn't the American way. If something offends you, it must be crusaded against and crushed underfoot, using whatever instrument of power is available. That the franchise is holding firm against this assault is reason to say a hearty "Hail to the Redskins!" -- while we still can.

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Let's Measure the Job Market the Way We Gauge Stock Market Health

Whether you're talking about investors or workers, quality-- not quantity -- should determine whether conditions are good or bad.

Have you noticed that the Powers that Be employ a different standard for measuring the health of America's job market than they use for the stock market?

They're currently telling us that the job market is "improving." What do they mean?

Simply that the economy is generating more jobs for workers. But when they talk about the stock market "improving," they don't mean that the number of stocks investors may purchase is on the rise. Instead, they're measuring whether assets are generally getting more valuable and making investors richer.

And isn't value what really counts for workers and investors alike?

As a worker, you don't merely want to know that 200,000 new jobs are on the market. You want to know what they're worth: Do they pay living wages, do they come with benefits, are they just part-time and temporary, do they include union rights, and what are the working conditions? In other words, are these jobs or are they scams?

So, it's interesting that the recent news of job mar-

ket "improvement" doesn't mention that of the 10 occupation categories projecting the greatest growth in the near future, only one pays a middle-class wage. Four pay barely above poverty level, and five pay beneath it, including fast food workers, retail sales staff, health aides, and janitors.

The job expected to have the highest number of openings is "personal care aide." That's the official description of the folks who assist aging baby boomers either in their

own homes or in nursing homes. The median salary of an aide is around \$20,000. Most of them enjoy no benefits, and about 40 percent of them must rely on food stamps and Medicaid to make ends meet. Plus, many labor in

the "shadow economy," vulnerable to being cheated out of those already miserly wages.

To measure the job market by quantity -- with no regard for quality -- devalues our workers themselves. Creating 200,000 new jobs doesn't indicate economic health if each worker needs two or three gigs to patch together a barebones living.

The Disastrous Tenure of "Obama's Enforcer"

ney general in U.S. history to be held in contempt of Congress. Considering his behavior toward the legislative branch, it's not surprising. He stonewalled, for example, when the Senate Judiciary Committee questioned him about the scandal that erupted when it was revealed that the IRS was targeting conservative organizations.

Or take the testimony he gave the House Judiciary Committee when asked about prosecuting the press over publishing classified material. Holder swore that he had never been involved in that or

even thought about doing so.

Yet the committee subsequently learned that Holder had approved a search warrant for Fox News reporter James Rosen's emails by "swearing to a federal court that Mr. Rosen was a co-conspirator in a national security leak investigation."

How did Holder explain this gap between his answer and the truth when the committee asked about it? He didn't. He refused to answer.

Then there's the deplorable way the Civil Rights Division has been run un-

der Holder and Thomas Perez, an assistant attorney general from 2009 to 2013.

CTC offers a full schedule of summer classes for children 3-18 years: July offerings listed

In their chapter "The (Un)Civil Rights Division," Fund and von Spakovsky detail numerous instances in which Holder and Perez "pursued a militant civil rights agenda intended to help Democrats win elections and implement a socialized America where racial, ethnic, and sexual quotas are required in everything from college admissions to public employment to school discipline."

But Holder will probably be best known for overseeing Operation Fast and Furious, which put more than 2,000 guns into the hands of a Mexican drug cartel and led to the deaths of hundreds of Mexican citizens and a U.S. Border Patrol agent. When federal lawmakers began investigating, Holder again opted not to cooperate, but to cover up.

Any claim "that ATF 'sanctioned' or otherwise knowingly allowed the sale of assault weapons to a straw purchaser who then transported them to Mexico is false," Assistant Attorney General Ronald Weich wrote to Sen. Charles Grassley (R-Iowa) in February 2011. "ATF makes every effort to interdict weapons that have been purchased illegally and prevent their transportation into Mexico."

But nine months later, after weeks of foot-dragging and attempts to find "dirt" on those who had blown the whistle on Fast and Furious, the Justice Department finally came clean. In November 2011, Holder admitted under oath that the gun-walking had, in fact, occurred. The February denial was rescinded.

To some observers, the idea of a truly ethical Justice Department is something of a pipe dream. As far as they're concerned, the attorney general is nominated by a president who's either Democrat or Republican, so we shouldn't be surprised when he conducts business in a partisan manner.

Such a cynical view, though, is unfounded. Many fine attorneys general have served ethically defensible terms under both Republicans and Democrats. The tenures of Edwin Meese under Ronald Reagan and Griffin Bell under Jimmy Carter, for example, prove that the Justice Department can be run in an entirely independent, professional way.

Holder's term as attorney general represents the other end of the spectrum: driven by politics, tainted by scandal and mired in corruption. The need for an attorney general that will, in fact, uphold the Constitution in a fair, impartial and ethical fashion has never been greater.

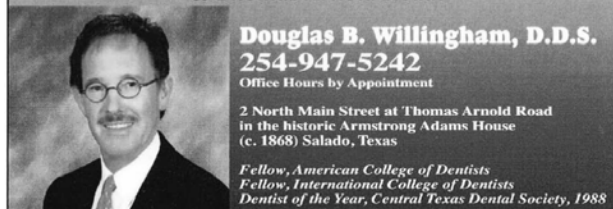

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



In the laps of the gods

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

It stands to reason that you shouldn't allow the success of a contract to depend on a guess when there is a way of avoiding the guess. The aim should be to remain in command at all times, and so be the master of your own fate.

Take this case where West leads a heart against three notrump, and East plays the king. It is only the first trick, but the outcome rests largely on South's play at this point. If he plays the right card, he can considerably improve his chances of making the contract, and will succeed as the cards lie. But if he plays the wrong card, he must guess right later to get home safely.

First, let's see what happens if South takes the king of hearts with the ace. He can cash four diamonds, but then must guess whether to next play a spade or a club.

If he guesses wrong by leading a spade, East takes the ace and returns a heart. West's hearts thus become established, and, because West has the ace of clubs as an entry, declarer finishes down one. Of course, if South guesses right by attacking clubs before spades, he makes the contract, but the fact remains that at trick one he placed his fate in the laps of the gods.

Now let's see what happens if South allows East's king of hearts to hold the first trick, as he should. Declarer wins East's heart return and no longer has to guess whether to lead spades or clubs first. He is on safe ground either way.

Let's say he tackles spades first. East takes the ace but has no heart to return, and South makes four notrump.

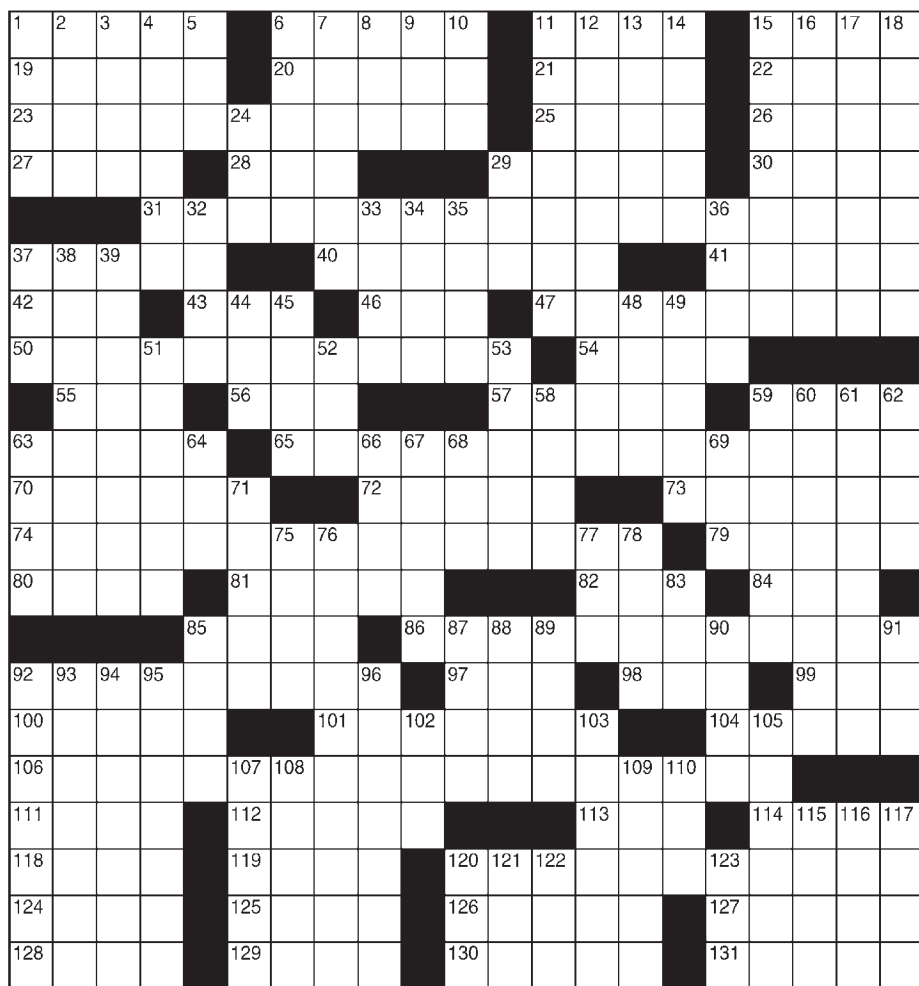
The same result accrues if South tackles clubs first. West can take the ace and establish his suit, but has no way to regain the lead later, and again South finishes with 10 tricks.

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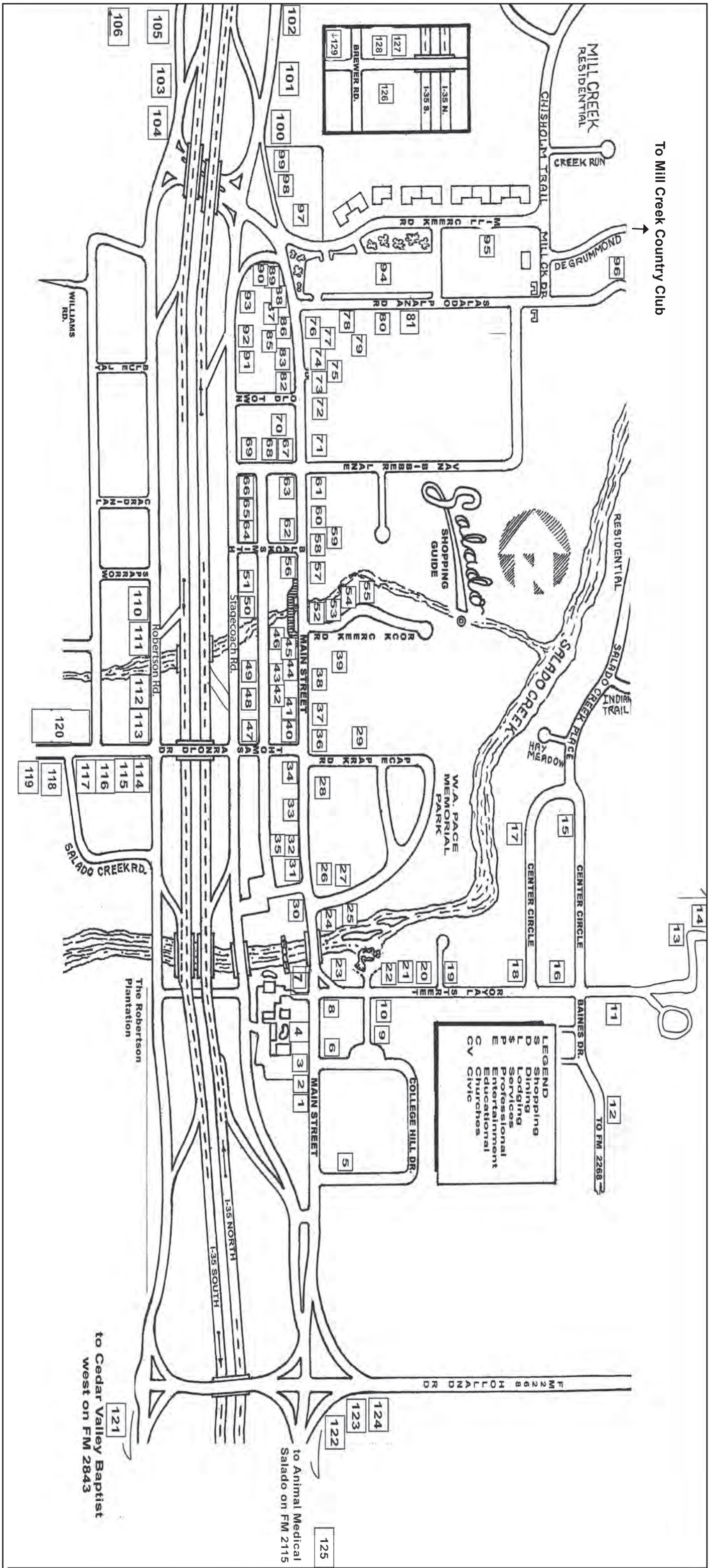

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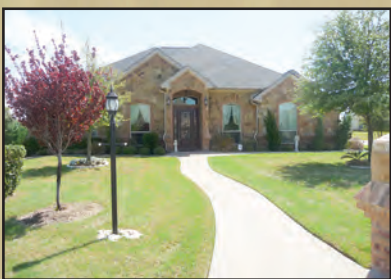

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
