Residents voice ire over village codes

For some Salado citizens, the codes go too far. For others, not far enough. Or at the very least not far enough in the enforcement of those codes.

A handful of business owners and residents addressed the Salado board of aldermen July 10 about their concerns with the ordinances and codes adopted by the village as well as the enforcement of codes that are on the books.

Jill Shipman, who owns Stonecreek Settlement with her husband Johnny, told aldermen that they chose to renovate a home just outside of the village limits rather than continue to face the onerous code enforcement and the prolonged process of getting building permits.

She spoke of two examples of their frustration in dealing with the village on building permitting. The first was the construction of a guest house to match new construction of a home in the village. "After we had filed building permits with the village," Shipman said, "an aldermen sent police out to the house to send my people home. I found out that they (the village) had failed to charge us \$26 on the building permit for the guest house, even though it was clearly on the permit. I had to write them another \$26 check before I could send my people back to work."

The civil engineer the Shipmans hired in order to have a flood plain plan for the single family home they planned on building, Shipman said, told them that "this was the last job he would ever do in Salado" because of the codes.

The Shipmans then planned on building a house on Center Circle and drew up plans for the house. The codes require a Landscape Plan, Shipman said adding that Johnny drew them up and turned them in to the Village. "They weren't good enough for them," she added, "because they did not have a civil engineer's stamp on them. This cost

us another \$600 for the exact same plans to be presented with that stamp."

"And then we were told that this wasn't good enough and that we had to have the engineer come before a committee to 'discuss it further.'"

End result? The Shipmans opted for a house at the edge of the city limits which they have renovated on College Hill Dr.

"We have wanted to build and to live 'in Salado.' We have wanted to build businesses here, but I think you can now understand some of the anxiety we might have in dealing with the city," she said.

Knox Tyson told aldermen of some of the problems he has faced in developing property he owns. His newest tenant has faced what Tyson defined as "serialized objections" from Bureau Veritas in trying to open a restaurant location that has been closed some time. "It has been one objection. After another. After another," Tyson said.

Carolyn Britt pointed to an irony in that the Village uses Salado Square as a marketing tool on its own website. "Yet today there is no way we could build that with the regulations that are in place in the Village," she said.

Salado Square -- designed by Darwin Britt, Lonnie Edwards and the late Bryant Reeves -- has received awards by the National Trust for Historic Preservation for the way that antique and salvaged materials were used in its construction. The fronts of the buildings were taken from 19th century buildings in Santa Anna and pieced back together here in Salado.

Britt became well-known through in-depth features in design and architectural magazines for the characteristic style of using old materials from building and breathing new life into them.

"He couldn't build any of those homes under the regulations we have today in Salado," Britt said of her husband's work.

She implored aldermen to please involve builders,

real estate investors and property owners in developing a regulatory system "that fits Salado."

Oscar Castellanos talked about the frustration of trying to open Salado Vintage Cakery in the cafe space at the back of Salado Square. "There should be better, more open lines of communications" he said of what is expected in the building process, rather than having the city come back time and again with changes and additional costs for businesses and property owners.

Joyce Pennington aired her frustration that the codes, or enforcement of them, were too relaxed. She showed aldermen pictures of a property on Van Bibber Lane with abandoned houses that are allowed to continue to deteriorate and that she said were becoming hazardous. She said that more than once, vagrants had been staying in the buildings and that there were mattresses piled on the front porches. She showed a photo taken through the door of one of the apparently abandoned structures, capturing a buzzard in what might have been a living room.

Aldermen have discussed the international building codes that Salado has adopted, but have taken no action on repealing or changing them.

Salado has updated the building code to put into place the 2009 versions of the International Building Code, the International Residential Code, the International Fire Code, the International Plumbing Code, the International Mechanical Code, the International Property Maintenance Code, the International Energy Conservation Code and the National Electrical Code.

A copy of these codes (each one a volume in itself) is maintained at the Village of Salado municipal office. The International Code Council recommends the 2012 codes and is currently working on amending and publishing the 2015 codes.

Aldermen meet in regular session at 6:30 p.m.

Tireless Salado volunteer Doris Denman passes away

Doris Ann Denman, age 86, passed away on July 9, 2014 with her husband of 65 years by her side.

She was born at home in Walters, Oklahoma on August 1, 1927 to Ben and Zora Hutchins. She had three older brothers - Ben, Jr., Bob and Bill. Her family moved to Lawton, Oklahoma in 1940. Doris attended Sullins College in Virginia, Cameron Junior College in Lawton and Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee.

She started teaching in Bible School at the age of 13 and continued to do so in multiple churches throughout her life.

On June 12, 1949, she married her lifelong sweetheart, Robert at the Post Chapel, Fort Sill, OK.

The Denmans moved to Salado in 1977, purchased the Historic Barton House, where they lived for 19 years. The Denmans worked side by side in their antique business, The Royal Emporium, until retirement in 2003. When

they retired, the Salado Public Library purchased the site in which The Royal Emporium was located and is housed there today.

Doris loved Salado, its history, and those who have come to be a part of the community. She contributed to the village in multiple capacities through the years including: President of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Chamber of Commerce; one of eight women to form the Salado Historical Society; original organizer

and "lifetime" member of the Tablerock Festival of Salado; assisting in the formation of the Salado Merchants Association which merged with the Salado Chamber of Commerce in 2005; being a founding member of the Chamber Ambassadors group; active in various Salado school activities through the years.

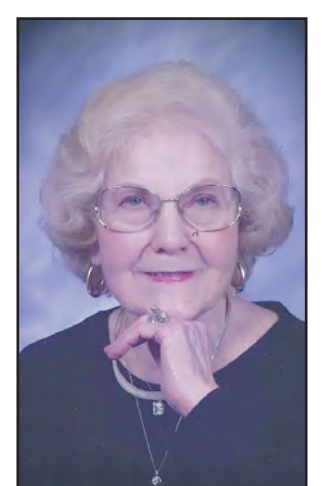
She was preceded in death by her parents, three older brothers, and a great grandson.

Obama's border crisis

It's hard to imagine a more apt summation of the lunatic state of the nation's immigration debate than the split screen over the past weeks.

In Washington, most respectable opinion lined up, yet again, to condemn Republicans for not passing an amnesty under the guise of defunct-for-now "comprehensive immigration reform."

Meanwhile, the crisis

on the Southern border continued. A massive influx of people -- largely driven by Central Americans, many of them children -- drawn here in the expectation of lax immigration enforcement is overwhelming border offices and facilities.

A Wall Street Journal story about the crisis was headlined "Obama Plans Executive Action to Bolster Border Security," which has a man-bites-dog feel to it after all of the administration's executive actions to undermine immigration enforcement.

House Speaker John Boehner spoke imprecisely when he excoriated the president for "giving false hope to children and their families that if they enter the country illegally they will be allowed to stay." Actually, the hope is quite real.

A leaked memo from a high-ranking Border Patrol official said that only 3 percent of non-Mexicans apprehended at the border are being returned to their native countries.

"It will not be open arms," Vice President Joe Biden thundered in Guatemala City, attempting to dissuade would-be migrants. "We're going to hold hearings with our

judges, consistent with international law and American law, and we're going to send the vast majority of you back."

The only part he had right is that we will hold hearings. The immigrants themselves may or may not be part of them.

The administration is waving the families and children into the United States, dispersing them around the country, and giving them a date -- often quite distant because of a huge backlog -- to appear in immigration court. Experience says only about a quarter will actually show up.

Why would they? As Byron York of the Washington Examiner points out, once illegal immigrants are in the country, they fairly quickly can become part of the broad category of people that the administration has exempted from interior enforcement.

Even many of the illegal immigrants who go all the way through the system and get a removal

order don't go anywhere. According to Jessica Vaughan of the Center for Immigration Studies, there are roughly 800,000 aliens who have been ordered removed but are still here.

The administration's policy of eviscerating interior enforcement is entirely its own creation. That policy, together with the president's de facto amnesty of young illegal immigrants and all the talk of a more wide-ranging amnesty over the past year, has had a predictable effect.

The key to reversing the tide is enforcement, and not just at the border. But the same Wall Street Journal story with the headline about Obama bolstering the border reported he "will make at least minor adjustments to deportation policy later this summer that would shield some illegal immigrants from deportation" -- with his base agitating for even more far-reaching action.

For the left, and its fellow-travelers in the business community and on the libertarian right, there is only one side of the split screen that matters. It's always amnesty.

A Fracking Fortune Gets Political

Televangelist James Robison recently declared that he's praying for a merger of the tea party and the religious right. Is he kidding? That merger is well underway. And it's getting a hefty push from a couple of billionaire brothers.

No, not Charles and David Koch. Brothers Farris and Dan Wilks, who reaped a fortune off the fracking gold rush and cashed in their Texas-based company a few years ago for more than \$3 billion. In addition to buying up vast swaths of land in the West, they're "using the riches that the Lord has blessed them with to back specific goals," as Christian Broadcasting Network's David Brody puts it.

What are those goals? They've embraced both the anti-government politics of the Koch brothers and the religious right's anti-gay, anti-choice cultural warfare. The Wilks brothers belong to Pastors and Pews, an organization connected to Christian-nation extremist David Lane, who wants to make the Bible a primary public school textbook.

Dan Wilks told Brody that we need to "bring the Bible back into the school, and start teaching our kids at a younger age." Adds brother Farris: "They're being taught the other ideas, the gay agenda, every day out in the world so we have to stand up and explain to them that that's not real, that's not proper, it's not right."

The brothers and their wives have followed in the

footsteps of other far-right funders and set up foundations. Together they've funded them to the tune of more than \$200 million. In 2011 and 2012 they gave away millions, both to churches and to culture-war political groups. More than \$5.5 million buttressed groups in the Koch brothers' political networks.

Another \$4 million or so funded leading organizations in the religious right political movement, Focus on the Family and the Family Research Council. Another big chunk -- more than \$4 million -- enriched anti-abortion groups. The brothers support a network of "pregnancy centers" that refuse to talk to single women about contraception and require married women to check with their husbands and pastors before discussing birth control.

The Wilks family also backs conservative politicians. They made a splash in Montana, where they own a lot of land and gave more to Republican legislative candidates than anyone else in 2012. In Texas, they've backed both Governor Rick Perry and Attorney General Greg Abbott, the Republican aiming to replace him. At the federal level, the brothers and their wives together contributed \$125,000 to Mitt Romney's 2012 presidential campaign.

The brothers' worldview seems to draw heavily on the teachings of a church founded by their father, which combines biblical literalism with a heavy emphasis on the Old Testament. According

to church doctrine, abortion is "murder," including when it ends pregnancies resulting from rape and incest. And homosexuality is "a serious crime -- a very grievous sin."

Farris is a pastor of the church. In his sermons, he decries "socialism" and argues that the Bible was grounded in the free market. He urges congregants not to vote for candidates who promise "free this, free that," saying "Yahweh never intended for us as a people to be afraid and reliant on government." He has suggested that the melting of the ice-caps might be punishment for sin, and that President Barack Obama's re-election may be a harbinger of the "end times."

Since Obama's election, conservative political strategists have made him a rallying point in their efforts to merge the energies of two wings of the conservative movement, the religious fundamentalist wing and the anti-government wing. Their success at bringing the tea party faithful and religious right movements together is embodied in funders like Farris and Dan Wilks as well as politicians like Senator Ted Cruz, a Texas Republican elected in 2012.

The result is a more extreme, and more powerful, right-wing movement that threatens our nation's well-being by seeking to undermine the separation of church and state, opposing equality under the law for all Americans, and limiting the ability of the federal government to regulate corporate behavior and promote the common good.

Famous hand Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Some contracts seem impossible to make, regardless of how the opposing cards might be divided. Nevertheless, declarer is obliged to give every contract his best effort, and sometimes the "impossible" turns out to be not so impossible after all.

Take this deal from the final of the 1992 World Team Olympiad. When Bob Hamman and Bobby Wolff of the United States held the North-South cards, they reached a normal four-spade contract that appeared to have virtually no chance. Declarer seemed certain to lose at least a spade, two hearts and a club for down one.

But Wolff saw a slim chance to bring in 10 tricks, and he went for it. The French West started by cashing the K-A of hearts and shifted to a spade.

Wolff put up dummy's king, led a second trump to the ace and cashed the heart queen, discarding a club from dummy. Now came the key play: He cashed the diamond ace and then led a diamond to the jack, taking an apparently unnecessary finesse that set the stage for the desired end position.

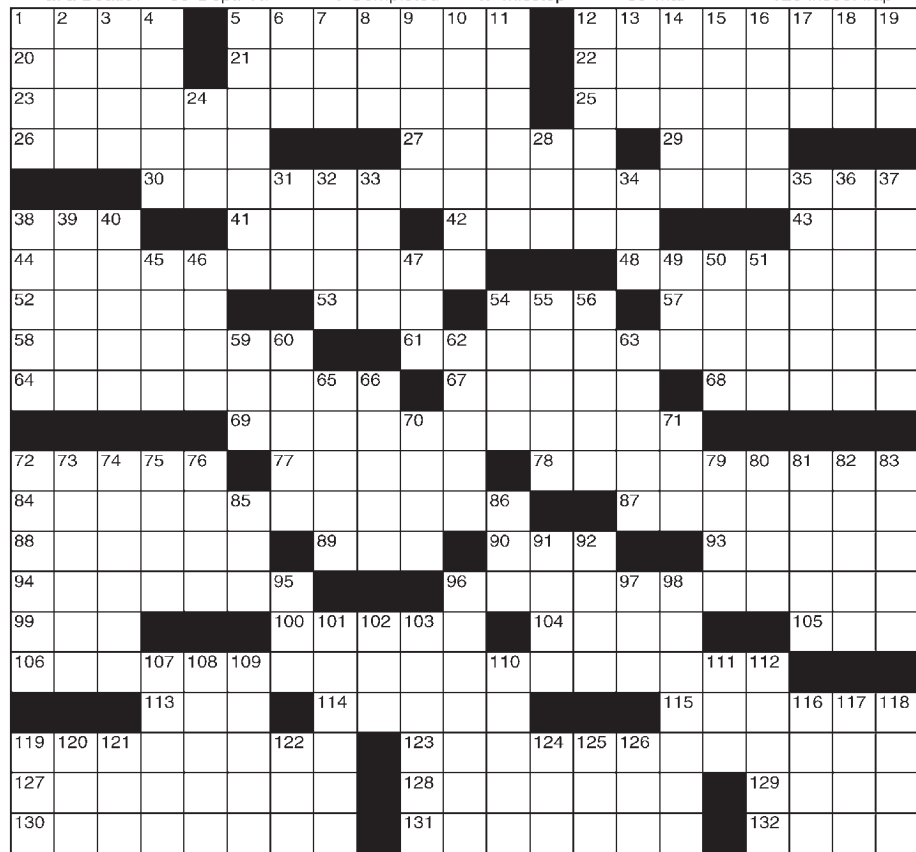
After the diamond jack held, Wolff cashed the king, discarding a club from his hand. Next came the A-K of clubs followed by a spade, taken by West with the jack.

This was the position Wolff had visualized at the outset -- that the defender with the third trump would have started with no more than two clubs. West had no choice but to return a diamond or a heart, allowing Wolff to discard a club from one hand while he ruffed in the other, and the "impossible" contract was home.

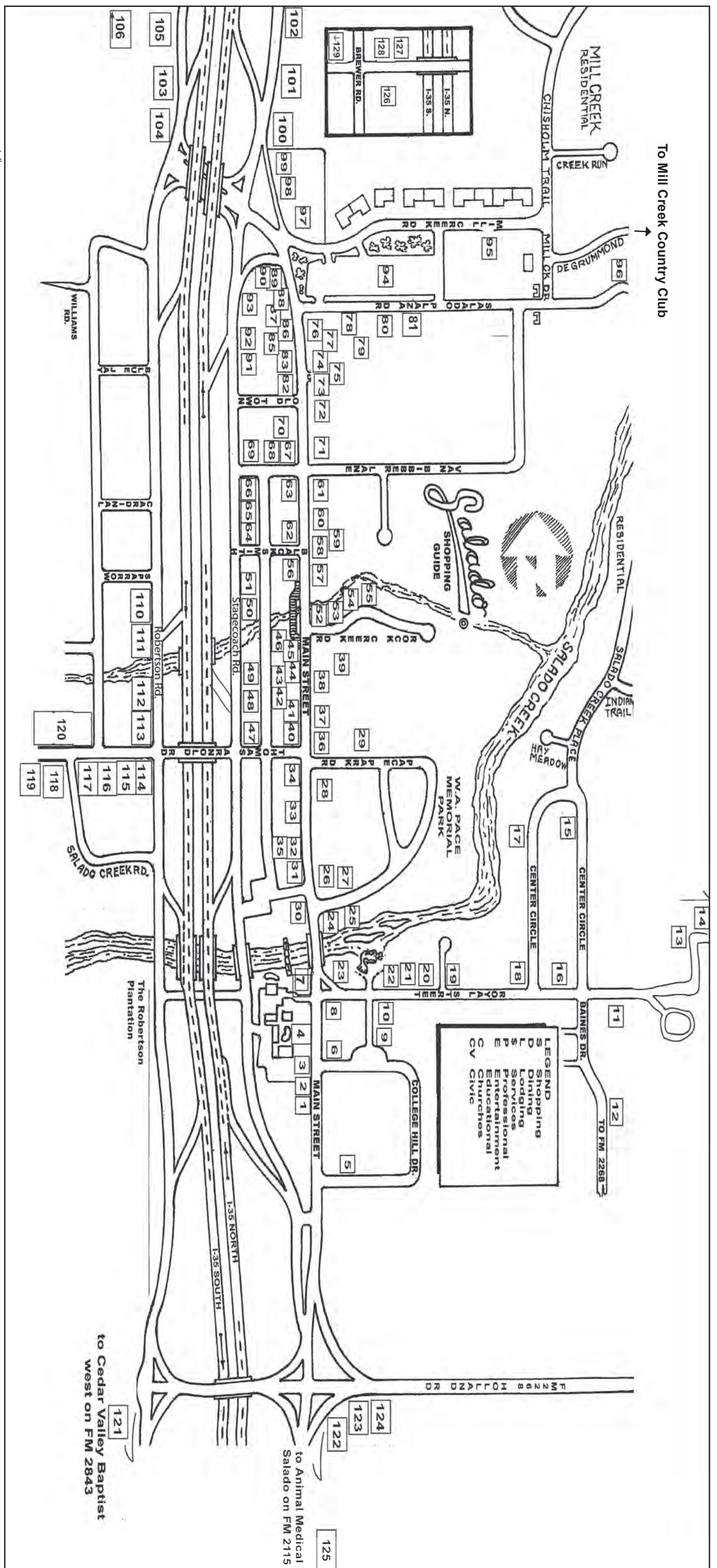


