Aldermen to adopt budget, tax rate tonight, residents voice opposition

"A budget should reflect the vision of the current board," former alderman and Village investment officer Stephen Peters said Sept. 22 when the Village of Salado held the second of two public hearings on the proposed 2014-15 budget and tax rate. "I do not think the current budget does that." The board will formally adopt the budget and set the tax rate at 18.1¢ per \$100 evaluation at a 6:30 p.m. Sept. 25 meeting.

Speaking of the proposed hotel/motel budget, Peters said, "It looks like a zeroing out of the hotel fund. We've increased that budget by \$62,000 over the current budget year. That harbors on bad management, at the very least. If there is no reserve, what do we do when hard times come along? Do we just reach out and tap another source?"

Peters also criticized the hotel/motel budget for the line item that marks and injection of funds from previous years as income. "It is not income for this year," Peters said. "The income has already been noted on previous years' budgets."

He questioned whether the hearing or any action that might stem from it would be legal because the Village had not posted any

notice on its website. State law requires that a governing entity that maintains a website post notice of meetings on its website as well as at its regular posting location, which is at the entrance to the Municipal Building.

"The best that I can tell," he said, "the meeting is not posted online. Therefore, any action taken tonight is not valid. The last meeting posted online was the September 4 meeting. The last set of minutes posted online was in June."

The board took no action on Sept. 22. It is slated to vote on the proposed budget and tax rate on Sept. 25.

As of 4:30 p.m. Sept. 23, notice for the Sept. 25 meeting has not been posted to the Village website, www.saladotx.gov. However, minutes of board meetings through Sept. 4 have been posted to the website.

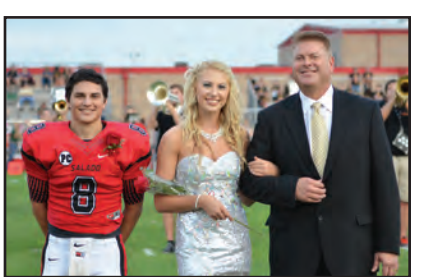
Village secretary Margaret Murray said that staff has been working to resolve issues with agenda posting properly to the website. She said that the Sept. 22 agenda was "uploaded to the website" at the same time that it was physically posted at the Municipal Building last week. The agenda for the Sept. 25 meeting was "uploaded" during the day on Sept. 22. However, the

Aldermen, Chamber approve new partnership agreement

Salado aldermen voted 4-1 to approve a contract in which the Village of Salado and Salado Chamber of Commerce will partner together to create the Salado Chamber and Convention and Visitors Bureau under the direction of one executive director.

"I've read it (contract and scope of work) several times and I must say it is well done," alderman Hans Fields said. "If I belong to the Chamber of Commerce, which I do, I think it is terrific document. For Tourism, however, it is terrible document."

Fields said that the supervisory board of the newly-created Salado Chamber of Commerce and Convention and Visitors Bureau is comprised of the city manager, an alderman appointee and the Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. He criticized it for having no representation from the Tourism Council.

"Tourism disappears and becomes the Chamber of Commerce," he added.

"The Tourism Council is a department of the Village of Salado," responded city administrator Jim Reed, "not a stand-alone organization. It never has been, it never will be. The

Village has two representative to Chamber's one. ... To claim that tourism is shorted in this agreement is maybe just a matter of difference of opinion."

The contract and partnership is, Reed said, "an attempt to streamline and more effectively use the resources of both organizations. Instead of having two CEOs, we now have one CEO and a more robust staff to accomplish the goals of the Village of Salado."

The agreement "enhances Tourism because it allows Tourism to leverage its dollars with Chamber

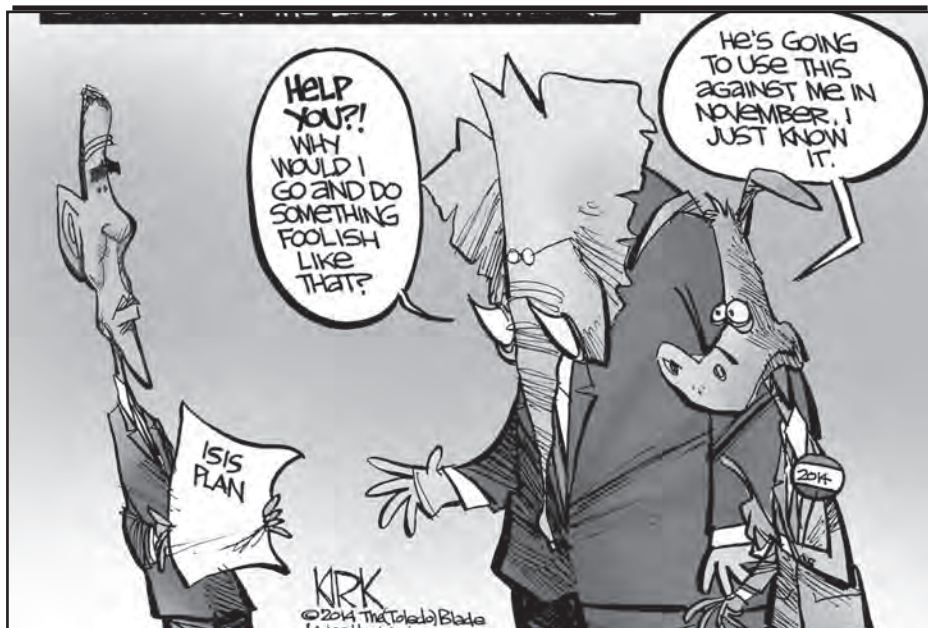

Congress Should Vote on ISIS

We have as close to a national consensus as possible in the war against ISIS.

Polls show the public wants strong measures. Practically everyone on the political spectrum says the terror group should be destroyed, even Elizabeth Warren and Rand Paul. President Barack Obama has given a prime-time speech committing the country to a yearslong war.

And yet Congress can't bring itself to vote to authorize military action. President Obama doesn't want to ask for an authorization, and Congress doesn't want to be asked. Who says that no one can get along in Washington? When it comes to evading democratic accountability, the consensus is broad and deep.

The advantages of an authorization are obvious. It would be an unmistakable statement of national will. It would communicate to our allies our seriousness. It would put everyone on record, making it harder for finger-in-the-wind members of Congress to bail out.

Even more obvious is the alliance of convenience between President Obama and Congress to avoid a vote (except on the more limited mission of arming and training Syrian rebels).

So the president rummages around his desk

drawers searching for a legal basis for his war, while Congress mumbles and looks at its shoes. Such are the exertions of the nation's political branches as they embark on a long fight against an enemy of the United States.

Even if it is unauthorized, the war against ISIS is not illegal. The president has the inherent authority as commander in chief to act against a threat to the United States, and Americans have been killed by ISIS.

The problem is that under the War Powers Resolution -- a fetish of the left -- Congress must authorize military action 60 days after it is undertaken. So, unless the administration wants to openly defy the resolution, it would still need congressional authorization.

It prefers, then, to argue that the war has already been authorized. It is relying primarily on the 2001 authorization against those who "planned, authorized, committed, or aided" the Sept. 11 attacks, or "harbored" those who did. This has been taken as a broad mandate to hit al-Qaida or al-Qaida-allied

groups. Its application to ISIS is dubious, though. ISIS didn't commit 9/11, and it is fighting al-Qaida rather than being allied with it.

As backup, the administration says the 2002 authorization for the Iraq War still applies. This, too, is tenuous. The regime that constituted that threat is long gone.

It wasn't long ago that President Obama was a scold about how important it was for Congress to authorize military interventions. It wasn't long ago that his administration considered the 2001 and 2002 authorizations dated and overly broad, and talked of their repeal. Now, he is happy to sidestep Congress by any legalistic parsing necessary.

Just because the president doesn't want to push for an authorization doesn't mean Congress has to stand by the sidelines. Yet that is where it is happy to be. The fight against ISIS will be accompanied by fiery denunciations of the group's barbarism and ringing statements of resolve. It will include everything, it seems, but a congressional vote of authorization. How pathetic.

to the citizens of a community like Salado. Whatever affects some of us here—be it the welfare and prosperity of the business district, the golf course or Salado's many historic and cultural resources, we all stand to gain or lose by the "rugged individualism" that has, in fact, brought many of us to this town—

to start a business, to publish a newspaper, to build a dental practice, to restore an old building, to educate our children or build a dream retirement home. While I strongly believe in less infrastructure, less government and less interference with my property rights and general freedoms as an American, I would be short-sighted in thinking that among those freedoms and self-will there does not also come community responsibility and a banding together mentality that is not only good for our fellow men and women but which stands to benefit each of us as individuals. SISD off to great start

We are having a great first month of school. We have an all-time record enrollment this year with a total of 1,552 students.

The following are just a few of the recognitions that our school district has earned during the past year:

Salado ISD earned a five star rating for two consecutive years on the Financial Allocation Study of Texas (FAST). This rating is based on district finances and student achievement in reading and mathematics. Out of over 1,200 school districts and charter school districts in Texas, only 25 have earned a five star rating the last two consecutive years.

Salado High School won the UIL Lone Star Cup two years in a row and a total of three times (2008, 2013, and 2014). This is the highest overall award in Texas for academic, athletic, and fine

arts competitions. Out of over 1,300 high schools in Texas, only 34 have ever won a Lone Star Cup and only 12 have won it more than two times.

Salado High School was ranked #289 out of over 20,000 high schools in the nation and #30 out of over 1,300 high schools in Texas by the Daily Beast online publication. Salado ISD earned an "A" and was ranked #44 out of 953 school districts in Texas by the Children at Risk organization.

Salado High School was ranked #447 out of over 20,000 high schools in the nation and #26 out of over 1,300 high schools in Texas by Newsweek.

Salado High School won state championships in both filmmaking and boys' golf. Salado High School also won state runner-up in both One Act Play and girls' golf.

Salado High School won the Academic UIL state championship for the ninth time and for the second year in a row. Out of over 1,300 high schools in Texas, there is only one high school that has won more of these championships than Salado.

I would like to thank our students, employees, parents, and community for making Salado one of the very best school districts in Texas and the nation.

agenda were not found on any of the pages of the Village website.

"We have been having some software issues with some things posting correctly and other things not posting," Murray said. The Village of Salado website is hosted by Consentus Media, which also hosts the Salado Chamber of Commerce website, www.salado.com.

In the section of state law dealing with postings to websites, it states that the "validity of a posted notice of a meeting or an agenda by a governmental body or economic development corporation subject to this section that made a good faith attempt to comply with the requirements of this section is not affected by a failure to comply with a requirement of this section that is due to a technical problem beyond the control of the governmental body or economic development corporation."

According to Murray, legal counsel for the Village has advised the Village that by this standard of good faith that it has met the requirements of making good faith efforts.

Murray said that Village staff is looking long-

term to resolve the software issues it has with the posting of notices and other information to the Village website.

The proposed budget was posted to the website for both the general fund and the hotel/motel budgets but was marked as being for the year 2013-2014 on the menu item leading to the page where the budgets were listed for 2014-15 fiscal year. That conflict was corrected on Sept. 23 following the meeting.

While the budget was available online, no copies were printed and made available as handouts to the public prior to either hearing.

Peters criticized the hotel/motel budget for a \$62,000 increase in expenses without showing "any income from the Chamber of Commerce."

He said that the Village has hired a city manager, yet "we are continuing to pay CTCOG (Central Texas Council of Governments) for another three months. We have evidently hired a full time employee for the court, but there is no indication of that in the budget, just the court judge's pay. We have

\$50,000 for street beautification and street lights on Main Street, yet the merchants aren't going to be open at night."

"We've assumed the sewer responsibility (the gift of the Stagecoach Inn treatment plant), but there aren't even any placeholders in the budget for expenses that might come up leading to that sewer," he continued, adding that he understands that there is a contract with Terry Potts to operate the Stagecoach sewer at no cost to the village. "What happens if he sells the Stagecoach Inn? What then?"

He questioned what will happen if the sewer bond were passed because there was nothing in the operating budget to plan for its construction. "If you don't budget for it, you can't spend a penny," he said.

He concluded by saying that if the board adopts a tax rate of 18.1¢ he would "encourage that we have a rollback election."

Resident David Williams also expressed concern and opposition to the proposed budget because of the "deficits we have been running each year. Why can't we stick to our

budgets? If you don't stick to a budget, what confidence do I have that we aren't going to make commitments during the year that aren't in the budget. We have gotten in the habit of obligating ourselves to spending more than the budget allows."

"If something comes and it has merit," he said, "bring it up in the next year's budget."

Of the proposed tax rate, Williams said, "my concern is that we are adding a tax, but I don't know if this is going to fix our current situation or if this is just a stop gap or band aid on a much more serious issues of spending more than we budget."

dollars and the Chamber to leverage its dollars with Tourism dollars."

"I have never seen a budget from the Chamber of Commerce, but all of a sudden we are being asked to approve this without ever seeing their budget," Fields continued in criticism of the contract. "It just doesn't seem right to me the way it is written."

Reed said that a detailed budget would be forthcoming. "This authorizes us to begin developing and recruiting for those positions so we can have an operating entity beginning Oct. 1 or as soon as possible afterward."

"I think the Chamber would be a wonderful partner," alderman Michael McDougal said. "The Chamber is full of enthusiasm as we are. We can put our forces together and come out with a win-win situation."

Earlier in the day, the Chamber of Commerce board voted unanimously to move forward with the contract and proposed Scope of Work.

In the new partnership agreement, the Chamber of Commerce will contract with the Village of Salado for executive and management services. It will allow the two entities to approach events, advertising, promotions and marketing in one unified effort through the Bureau.

The scope of work calls for the Bureau's day to day functions to come under the direction of the Executive Director Debbie Charboneau. "The Executive Director would be responsible for the completion of the annual program of work, the day-to-day operation of the Bureau, staffing and management of the Bureau, fiscal administration of the Bureau's budget, and coordination of all community activities as directed by The Salado Chamber of Commerce and Convention and Visitors Bureau Board of Directors."

The Chamber of Commerce will continue to seek out memberships in order to fund its portion of the contract with the Village. Dave Hermann, chairman of the Chamber, says that this new arrangement will give "more value to our members at the same price they are paying now."

In addition to the Executive Director, the Village will hire an Events Coordinator and a Promotion and Outreach Manager in administrative positions, serving under the Executive Director.

The Executive Director will serve under a supervisory committee comprised of a representative from the Village Board of Aldermen, the city manager and the current Chairman

of the Salado Chamber of Commerce.

The Salado Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors will serve in an advisory capacity to the executive director.

The scope of work outlines performance indicators that include goals for training and support, membership growth, finance and communication and sets forth a performance appraisal plan and review. The partnership documents also lay out a governance structure.

I do, however, use the lathe to make the bottle shaped nut on the end

of the handle. 

Bees hand Eagles Homecoming loss

Jacob Little did everything he could to give his Salado Eagles a fighting chance at pulling off a come-from-behind victory, but the Eagles could not finish off the visiting Academy Bees and lost 14-7 Sept. 19.

With 9:22 left in the game, Little connected with Jacob Quick for a 20 yard touchdown pass to cap a 61-yard scoring drive for the Eagles. Cameron Markham toed the extra point to bring the score to 14-7.

He then dribbled a perfect onside kick that ended up in Little's hands at midfield to surprise the Bees and give Salado a shot at scoring a second time in the quarter.

Little carried the ball twice to move the ball to the Bees' 31 yard line and hit Ty Stewart for a five yard gain on third-and-10 to move the ball to the Academy 26 yard line.

Little was harrassed and forced out of the pocket throwing an incomplete pass to turn the ball over to Academy with 7:50 left in the game.

After giving up a first down to Academy, the Salado Eagle defense stiffened on fourth-and-one at

the 47 yard line to give the Eagles the ball back with 3:48 left in the game.

With the Academy defense in his face, Little could not find receivers and the Eagles were hit with two five yard penalties to set up an impossible fourth-and-20 with just over three minutes left in the game.

Academy took over the ball at the Eagles 43 yard and ran out the clock.

The Bees did a great deal of running throughout the game, pounding out 237 yards on the ground and 68 in the air.

The Bees held the ball about twice as long as the Eagles during the game, holding it for about 32 minutes.

Alex McCullough led the ground attack, carrying the ball for 135 yards on 28 carries. Cody Martinez had 56 yards rushing, including a 23 yard touchdown with 20 seconds left in the first quarter.

On a fourth and goal, Bubba Berumen dove in from the Eagle one from a wildcat formation for the Bees with 25 seconds left in the third quarter, capping an 80-yard, 15 play drive that ate more than seven minutes of game time.

Camron Costa booted both extra points for the

yards on nine carries.

Wells Gallery hosts open house Sat. in new location

Ronnie and Patricia Wells opened the doors of Wells Gallery in Cleveland, Texas 45 years ago, selling his original paintings and reproductions of his watercolors.

After a short stint on the square in Georgetown, the couple found the old Salado post office building on the south side of Salado, where they have operated Wells Gallery for more than two decades.

"Patricia and I have loved every minute of it, but it's time to move on," Ronnie said, adding that the Robertson and Ambrose families have been "wonderful landlords. Had it not been for Mrs. Lucile Robertson, we may not be in Salado today."

The old post office building is now for sale and Wells Gallery has made the move north to its new location.

Wells Gallery will remain in Salado, but almost a mile north of their location in the old post office building across from the ruins of Salado College. The Wells bought the early 20th century home at the corner of North Main Street and Blacksmith Rd. and will open the gallery there this weekend.

Wells Gallery hosts an Open House at the new location 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Sept. 27 and invite local residents and visitors to come see the new place.

"Over the years we have acquired hundreds of good friends and collectors, who are willing and excited to visit us in Salado, now that we are able to accommodate them," Ronnie said. "But first we want to thank you, our friends and neighbors of Salado for 21 years and look forward to many more."

There will be plenty of refreshments and a chance to meet the Wells and their daughter and son-in-law Tressa and Mike McCabe. Before buying the building at the corner of Main and Blacksmith, the

Wells were looking at the old Tyler House for their new location.

"Our daughter Tressa and son-in-law Mike McCabe bought the old Tyler House and at one point we planned to move there," Ronnie said, adding that "issues with the sewer system will require thousands of dollars to overcome, so they have decided to wait and see if the city sewerage system passes before investing in a private system. Their plans are to restore the old house to its original state as close as possible. This may take several years and Patricia and I made the decision along with our family to purchase the Adelea's restaurant building."

Ronnie and Patricia have spent a great deal of the two decades they have been in Salado on the road, traveling to national art shows.

"We have traveled the country doing wildlife art shows and worn out two box trucks," Ronnie said, "The last one had over three hundred thousand miles on it when it was retired. Patricia logged all the miles, with only a handful from yours truly. We have a third one now and I think I have driven it twice."

With that travel has come national recognition, including being named the Texas Ducks Unlimited Artist of the Year in 2007.

He has been the featured artist at Wildlife Art Shows in Tulsa, Oklahoma and North Carolina.

His monumental sculptures have been installed around the country as well, including a seven-foot bronze of mallard ducks at the National Headquarters of Ducks Unlimited in Nashville.

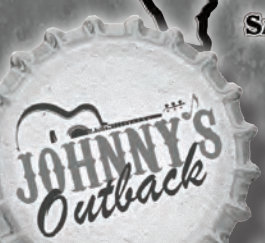



The battle for trump control

Contract Bridge

Trump control is often a decisive factor in the play of suit contracts. Whenever possible, the defenders try to run declarer out of trumps so that they can eventually cash their tricks in the side suits. At the same time, declarer tries to maintain control over the trump suit in order to withstand this attack.

Consider this deal where trump control plays a key role. West leads the king of hearts and continues with the ace. After declarer ruffs, he has four trumps left, and so does West.

If South were now to play the ace and another trump, he would lose control of the hand and take a bad beating. West would cash the K-Q of trumps and play another heart. When South ruffed, leaving West with the only remaining trump, the rest of West's hearts would become tricks, and declarer would go down four!

To forestall this, South leads the nine of spades at trick three, not the ace. If West ducks, South gets home safely by cashing the ace and then leading his winners in the side suits.

So let's say West takes the nine with the queen. How does West then proceed? This is a crucial decision, for West's next play determines the outcome. Since dummy can ruff a heart continuation, West might decide to make a neutral return, such as a diamond or a club.

If he did this, declarer would win and play the ten of spades in order to maintain trump control. Whether West won the ten with the king or decided to let the ten hold, the contract could no longer be defeated.

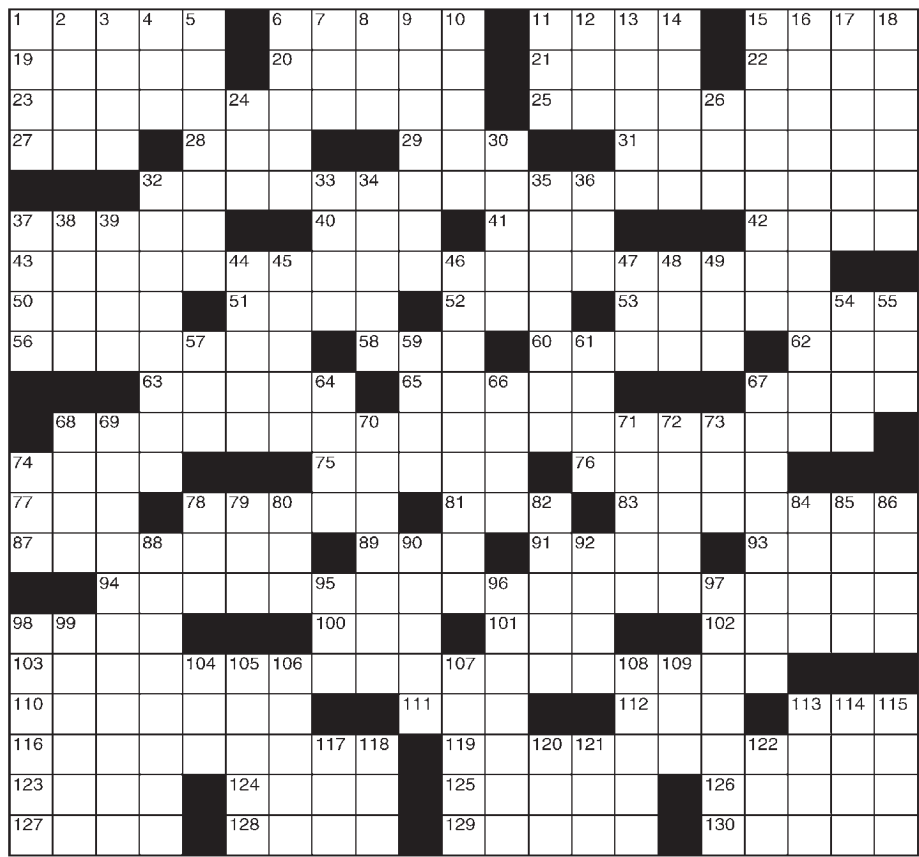
But if West, upon taking the nine of spades with the queen, returns another heart, the contract cannot be made. The old bugaboo against giving declarer a ruff-and-discard does not apply here. In fact, it will cause South endless pain and suffering, regardless of which hand he chooses to ruff in. Indeed, the best South can do against this defense is to settle for down one.

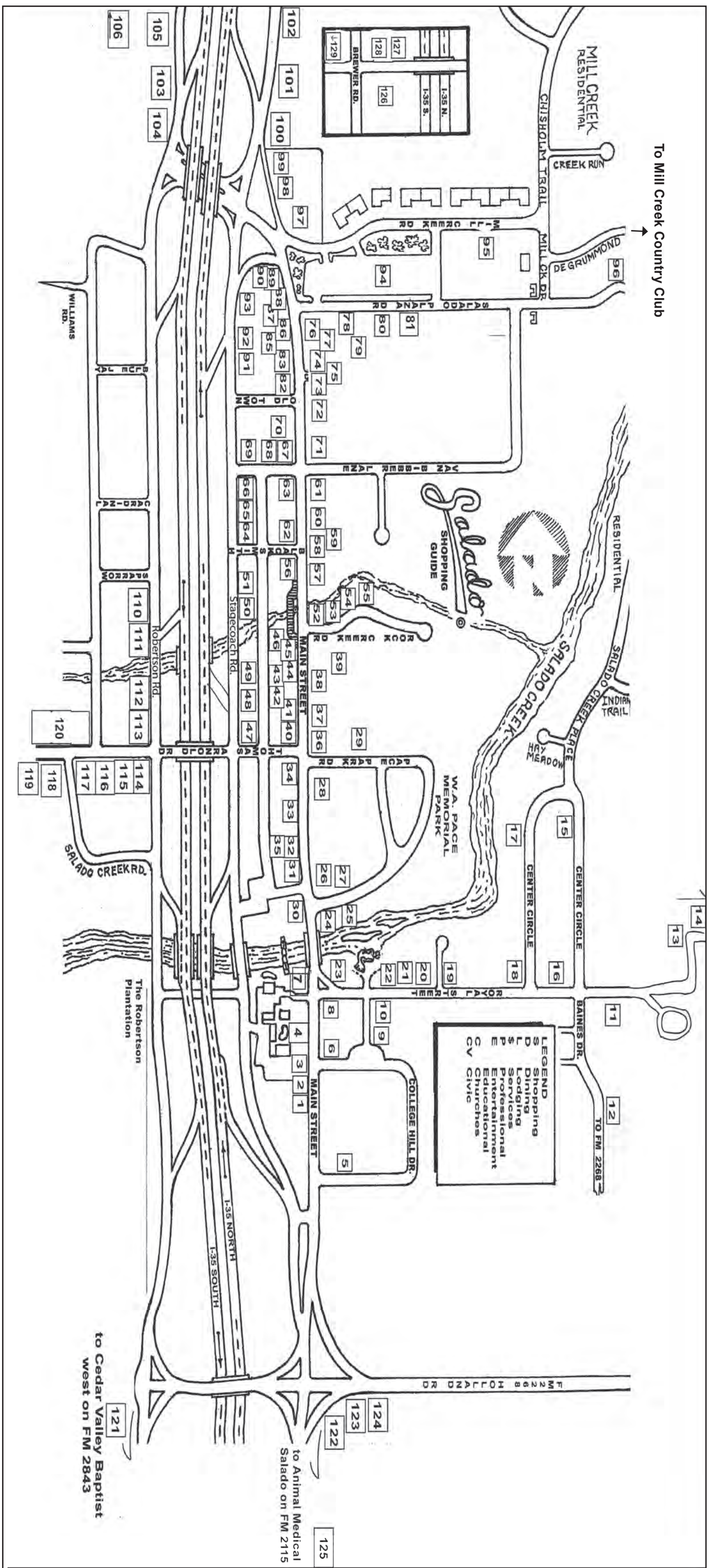

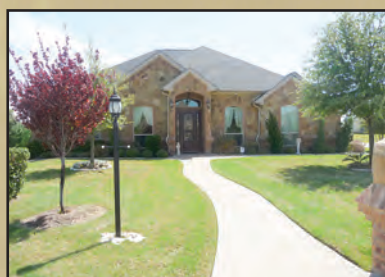



Do your research. When seeking the right tutoring service or commercial learning center for your child, check out the company's BBB Business Review at bbb.org to view its complaint history and details about the complaints. Also, read customer reviews for positive, neutral and negative feedback.

Get referrals. Ask for referrals from your child's teacher. Other parents and friends can be a great resource as well.

Check the tutor's credentials. Ask for transcript

copies, copies of state teaching certificates, tutor certification, or proof of other specialized training. Ask the tutor to provide a complete resume. Also, make sure he or she is qualified in the right subject area for your child's needs.

Schedule a meeting. Meet with the tutor and discuss measurable, specific goals. While a tutoring program can't necessarily guarantee higher test scores, a tutor can help identify problem areas and address any specific subjects where your child needs help.

Check in. If you use a personal tutor, feel free to occasionally sit in on a session and observe how the tutor and your child are working together. Ask the tutor for advice on

what you can do as a parent to help your child learn more effectively.

Read the terms and conditions. Be sure you understand details of your payment plan and what happens if you decide to cancel. Get everything in writing.

 • Vacuum frequently. Whether you have wall-

to-wall carpeting, tile or hardwood floors, it's important to eliminate dust and dirt. Vacuum, mop or steam clean flooring regularly.

"Use a vacuum with a high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter, which captures small particles such as allergens, irritants and pollutants," says Wilson.

For example, the Panasonic MC-UL429 Vacuum has a HEPA filter and ac-

cessories that allow you to be more thorough and get into tight corners. This vacuum also comes with an attachment that pulls pet hair -- another potential allergen -- out of upholstered surfaces. More information can be found at www.shop.panasonic.com.

- Wash or freeze stuffed toys. If your child sleeps with their favorite stuffed animals, you should frequently wash or freeze

them in a plastic bag for 48 hours. This will lower the level of dust mites which can trigger asthma and allergies.

- Use Slipcovers. Slipcovers have come a long way in the last 10 years. Since they can be cleaned regularly and more easily than upholstery, consider using them on sofas and other furniture.

Keep ragweed outside. After spending time outside, have your child

leave any clothing or sports equipment close to the entrance of the home to avoid tracking irritants throughout rooms.

"Just because the pollen count isn't through the roof doesn't mean you can't fall prey to allergies," says Wilson. "With regular cleaning, you can manage the irritants in your home and make it a more breathable place."


