Town hall meeting Oct. 6 on proposed sewer

Another town hall meeting on the proposed \$10.55 million sewer system is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Oct. 6 at the Salado Intermediate School cafeteria. This is the third town hall meeting on the proposed bond election, which will be decided on Nov. 4.

The last day to register to vote in the Nov. 4 election is Oct. 6.

The first day of early voting is Oct. 20. The final day of early voting is Oct. 31. Early voting will be conducted in person at the Salado Civic Center.

Election day, the polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Nov. 4 at the Salado Church of Christ Activities Center, 225 North Church

Street.

Ballots by mail must be received by Nov. 4. The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is Oct. 24.

Village officials will discuss the proposal with voters and property owners, including the possibility that the total cost to the Village for the project could be much less than was called for by aldermen in August.

The Village of Salado has proposed a \$10.55 million bond for the sewer, but it will only spend \$9.6 million from taxpayers if voters approve the bond in November.

According to Jim Reed, the village would only build certain segments of the proposed service areas if it has significant financial participation from the Salado ISD and Brook-

shire Brothers.

“Those lines (to Brookshire Brothers via Mill Creek Dr. and to the Salado schools) will only be built if these two entities come forward,” Reed told an audience at a Sept. 11 town hall meeting. If those two opt out, then the lines to those areas will not be built.

Salado ISD Trustees met Oct. 1 to discuss participation in the proposed sewer system. The meeting was held after press time for this edition.

By either having the financial participation of the schools and Brookshire Brothers or not building those lines, the overall proposed tax rate to retire the 20-year bond will be considerably lower than the highest rate of 47.28¢ per \$100 evaluation.

The Village is also in discussions with the developer of Highlands of Salado for that proposed development in the extra territorial jurisdiction of Salado (on Royal Street southeast of Salado Methodist Church) to bring that development into the service area. The board will discuss this in executive session Oct. 2.

“We do not now know what level they might join in,” Reed said, “but if they do, it would lower the impact on the local taxpayer.”

The Village could also realize another \$1 million in savings from an offer by a local company to do the excavation “at-cost,” according to Reed.

Truth in taxation laws requires the Village to publish the highest possible tax rate resulting from

the bond proposal, according to Reed.

During a workshop session Oct. 2, aldermen will discuss possible tie-in fees and requiring all property owners in the propose service areas to tie in to the sewer rather than opting out. Details of this discussion may be brought out at the town hall meeting Oct. 6, but the board will not take any actions on the tie-in fees or tie-in requirements during its workshop session.

Aldermen will meet in regular session at 6:30 p.m. Oct. 2 at the municipal building. New business items include a contract with Stewart Construction to maintain the municipal building septic system for two years for \$400 and acting on a Construction Plat and Final Plat

of Creekside Meadow, a 24.248 acre, 19-lot residential subdivision on Van Bibber Road. Following the business agenda items, aldermen will recess into executive session to discuss a development agreement with the Highlands of Salado proposed multi use development bordered by I-35 and Royal Street and including parts of FM 2268.

After the executive session, aldermen will hold a workshop session (taking no actions) with these items of discussion: presentation regarding KTM-PO grant proposal; wastewater tap fees, mandatory hook up and Ordinance requirements and information provided by Texas Department of Transportation for Main Street future options.

Aldermen approve \$1.08 M budget, resident will petition for rollback

Salado aldermen approved a \$1.08 million budget for 2014-15 and the 18.1¢ per \$100 evaluation tax rate for it during a special called meeting 6:30 p.m. Sept. 29 at the municipal building.

The special called meeting on Sept. 29 was set on Sept. 25, which was the date aldermen planned to adopt the budget and set the tax rate because the Sept. 25 agenda was not posted to the Village of Salado website.

The issues the Village had been having posting agenda have been addressed and the Sept. 29 meeting was posted at least 72 hours before the meeting both online and at the bulletin board of the Village of Salado municipal building.

The budget is almost \$82,000 more in income than last year's budget. The chief source of the increase in income is from a

6.1¢ property tax rate hike.

The Village will have to now wait until Dec. 29 for a rollback election petition to be filed.

Since the Village exceeded the rollback tax rate, voters have until that date to collect 184 valid signatures of registered voters living within the Village of Salado municipal limits on a petition calling for the tax rate to be rolled back to the rate of 12.5¢ per \$100 evaluation.

If a petition is filed, the Village of Salado will have 20 days to determine the validity of signatures on the petition and, if found valid, to call for the rollback election. The Village would have to call an election for no less than 30 days and no more than 90 days from that deadline, meaning the rollback election could be held between mid-February and mid-April 2015 (followed by the Uniform Election Date of May 9, 2015 for local municipal and school dis-

trict elections).

Salado resident Stephen Peters told aldermen at a Sept. 22 public hearing on the budget that he would “encourage that we have a rollback election.” Peters served as alderman and investment officer for the Village of Salado. He told *Salado Village Voice* Sept. 30 that he is collecting signatures on a petition calling for the rollback election.

The adopted budget is a deficit budget of about \$112,000 as expenses are estimated at \$1.08 million. The budget increases spending on road maintenance from about \$220,000 to more than \$264,000. It also increases the general administration costs from \$240,514 to \$301,898. Municipal court costs are \$21,500 (including the cost for a court clerk). Most other costs are in line with last year, except code enforcement, which is almost \$10,000 less than last year.

Village mulls takeover of Main Street, bridge

Texas Department of Transportation wants to turn over responsibility for Main Street (FM2268) to the Village of Salado in the near future.

TXDOT officials met with Village aldermen in a workshop session Sept. 29 to discuss turning over Main Street, including the Main Street bridge, to the Village when TXDOT completes the expansion of I-35 through Salado.

Aldermen will further discuss this at a workshop session following the 6:30 p.m. Oct. 2 meeting at the municipal building.

TXDOT is planning to resurface Main St. next summer, a project estimated at \$182,000, according to City Manager Kim Foutz.

The department has

proposed that it installed six-foot sidewalks on each side of Main Street as well as curbs and gutters for a cost to the Village of about \$600,000.

TXDOT will not allow the Village to put any of the trunks of pipe under the asphalt of the Main Street travel lanes, but the Village can run pipes for the proposed sewer in the right-of-way. Voters will decide in November whether to fund a \$10.55 million bond election for a centralized sewer system.

“We have alternate alignments for the sewer pipelines,” Foutz told *Salado Village Voice*.

Aldermen have voiced concerns about the potential costs of taking over Main Street, especially the Main Street bridge.

Bridges are rated every two years on a 100-point scale and the last time that

the Main Street bridge was rated it was rated at 72.6 points. When a bridge is rated at 50 or below, it is eligible for repairs or replacement.

Foutz said that there are also many grant programs available at 80/20 partnerships in which the local government pays 20 percent and the federal or state agency pays 80 percent of the replacement or repair costs of the bridge.

The Village qualified for a similar grant when Federal Emergency Management Agency funded the majority of the cost for replacing the bridge over Smith Branch Creek that was damaged by flooding in 2008.

Foutz told *Salado Village Voice* that the board of aldermen and TXDOT will have “further dialogue” concerning this issue going forward.

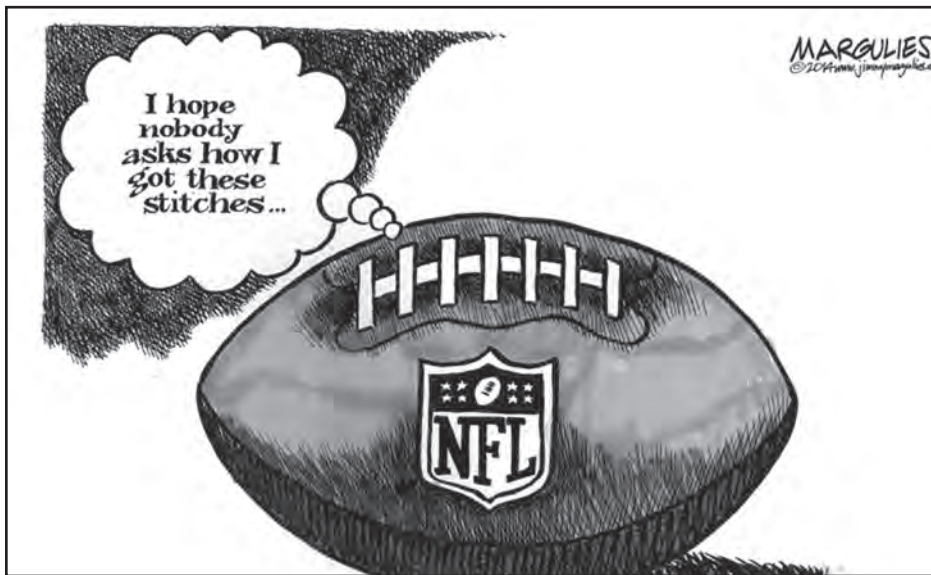

The Media's Absurd NFL Hysteria

During the past few weeks, two sets of initials have dominated the news -- ISIL and NFL -- and the casual listener would be hard-pressed to decide which is more odious.

It's a wonder that President Barack Obama hasn't pledged to bring NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell to justice.

Such is the weight the press has put on the NFL's punishment of Baltimore Ravens running back Ray Rice for punching his then-fiancee that Denis McDonough, the president's chief of staff, had to weigh in on "Meet the Press": "We all know Ray Rice being suspended indefinitely seems to be exactly the right thing."

On the NFL, the media has lost its collective mind. The coverage of the Rice elevator video managed to combine moralistic preening with voyeuristic pandering. Everyone on TV professed to be so outraged by domestic violence that they had to show a clip of a woman getting viciously punched, over and over again (until many of the networks finally recoiled from their own overkill).

At least the NFL gets its ratings by broadcasting images of men hitting other men.

In recent weeks, you'd think that the fate of justice in America depends

on how harshly the NFL punishes a few miscreants. Only if Ray Rice and accused child-abuser Adrian Peterson are banished can women and children be safe from violence and abuse.

This is patently absurd. No matter how many sermons we hear to the contrary, the NFL is not the key to fighting domestic violence. Domestic violence declined 63 percent from 1994 to 2012, according to the Justice Department -- even though the NFL had a lenient policy toward domestic abusers across this period.

Nor is the NFL the sink of criminality you might assume from the headlines. Benjamin Morris of FiveThirtyEight writes that "arrest rates among NFL players are quite low compared to national averages for men in their age range." (Although domestic violence accounts for a disproportionate share of the arrests for violent crimes.)

It is true that Ray Rice should have gotten more than the initial two-game suspension for his shocking assault, and the NFL

needs a clear, certain policy for punishing for such offenses.

Yet no one seems to care how the vortex of outrage affects the victim, Janay, who married Rice after the incident. She gets to see that horrible night replayed everywhere, to hear people bray for the end of her husband's career and to receive lectures from people who presume to know what's best for her and her marriage.

Now, Minnesota Vikings running back Adrian Peterson is the new focus of outrage. Facing child-abuse charges for disciplining his son with a switch, he is taken as a symbol of the noxiousness of all corporal punishment.

This is all so wildly disproportionate that perhaps something more than the usual ax-grinding, ratings-chase and group-think is at work. It may be that these cases are ways to express a deeper discomfort with the NFL, which sacrifices men's bodies and minds for our viewing pleasure every week.

That, of course, is something in which everyone who enjoys football is implicated and isn't such a ready subject for table-thumping condemnations.

When you are, consider Merck.

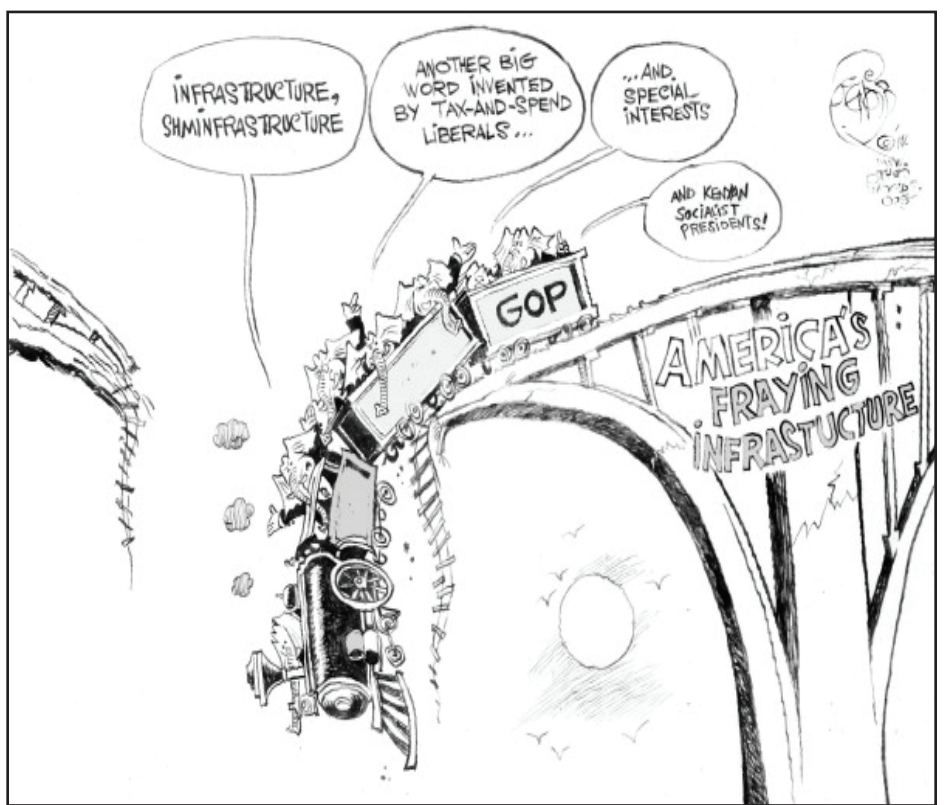
Merck, the pharmaceutical company, had to

Most could not afford it. Merck made an "uncommon" decision. They gave it away free to anyone that needed it. Over 350 million pills were given away for free.

George Merck, CEO, said, "We never forget that medicine is for people not for profits."

The Lesson Learned? Simple. "Instead of trying to be great; be part of something greater than yourself."

However you vote, whatever you sign, whatever you are -- remember the above Lesson Learned because that is what has made Salado uncommon and popular.

I would like to take this opportunity to compliment the City Council in their effort to provide us with a clear concise budget, and to comment on the history of budgets in this town over the last 4 years.

The current budget reflects the thoughts, needs and abilities of the tax payers.

Thoughts because they have dug deeply into their hearts and minds to come up with the best solutions for the city

Needs because they recognize we have many direct needs, i.e. roads that must be addressed.

Abilities because they recognize that their will be trade-offs with what we must do and what would be nice to do.

I would hope that before residents become critical of the budget, they would have taken the time to read and study the budget, but most important, talk to their council members to find out what and why a budget item exists before frivolously commenting on it.

In FY 2013, your then mayor and then investment manager established a budget which was planned to exceed income by over \$100,000; in fact it was \$119,240.



Religion's Decline in America are "Misleading, Inaccurate and Biased," Baylor Researcher Says

WACO, Texas (Sept. 26, 2014) — Reports of religion's demise have been greatly exaggerated, says Byron Johnson, Ph.D., co-director of Baylor University's Institute for Studies of Religion. Close examination of data from the General Social Survey and other data sources show that across 40 years, church attendance has varied only slightly, Johnson wrote in The Heritage Foundation's recently published 2014 Index of Culture and Opportunity: The Social and Economic Trends that Shape America. Headlines are "misleading, inaccurate and biased," Johnson wrote, referring to reports that millennials are leaving the faith of their parents; that young people under 30 are deserting the church; that women are rapidly falling away from religion; and that the "nones" — those without religious affiliations — have doubled in recent decades. Johnson challenges media accounts that suggest a consistent — if not dramatic — decline of faith in the nation's culture. He said that analyses of data from the General Social

Survey* and data from the Baylor Religion Survey* show that: Millennials, like the vast majority of Americans, consider themselves religious. Because options abound, however, many people switch churches for varied reasons, often to a different denomination from the one in which they were raised. "This change does not mean that they have departed the faith," Johnson said, noting that many change to more theologically conservative churches than those of their childhood. "Switching churches is a fascinating subject, and if anything, it's a marker of religious vitality, not decline." While surveys "perennially find that younger people are less likely to attend church, reflecting the fact that many single young adults choose to sleep in on Sunday mornings once they are out on their own," church attendance rates recover once they marry and have children. However, recent research confirms if people do not marry, and if they do not have children, there is a real decline in church attendance — a finding

that is particularly striking among the poor and less educated. On the other hand, many who do not attend church regularly, especially the elderly, consistently report high levels of religious commitment and belief. In 2007, 38 percent of women, compared with 26 percent of men, described themselves as "very religious," according to the Baylor Religion Survey. Such a gender gap has been consistent since 1991, according to GSS data. The number of atheists in America has remained steady at 4 percent since 1944, and church membership has reached an all-time high. Inaccurate perceptions exist in part because traditional surveys do not ask respondents enough questions to accurately sort out religious affiliations. Johnson noted that some of the "nones" — those who report no religious affiliation — indicated not only that they regularly attended church but even provided the name and address of their church. "The knee-jerk reaction that all "nones" are unaffiliated — or atheist — is false," Johnson said.

*The General Social Survey (GSS) is a sociological survey used to collect data on demographic characteristics and attitudes of residents of the United States. It is conducted with in-person interviews by the National Opinion Research Center at the University of Chicago of adults (18 and older) in randomly selected households. The survey was instituted in 1972, initially done annually, and since 1994 has been conducted every other year. The data collected is demographic information and respondents' opinions on issues ranging from government spending to race relations to the existence and nature of God. As of 2010, 28 national samples with 55,087 respondents and 5,417 variables had been collected. *The Baylor Religion Survey is a random sample of 1,714 individuals across the country. Designed by Baylor University scholars and conducted by The Gallup Organization, it includes more than 300 items dealing with religion and the attitudes, beliefs and values of the American public.

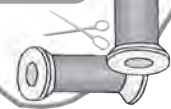

Eagles fall behind early, can't catch Hornets

Salado Eagles will host the 1-4 Llano Yellowjackets in the final non-district football game of the season with kick off at 7:30 p.m. Oct. 3 at Eagle Stadium.

The Eagles scored 20 points in the fourth quarter on the road against Gatesville Hornets, but it was not enough as the Hornets coasted to a 42-32 win Sept. 26. The Yellowjackets lost 45-7 at home Sept. 26 to the 3-3 Lake View Chiefs. The lone win for the Yellowjackets came in their second game, beating Bangs 41-21 on Sept. 5.

Salado is looking for its first win of the season and its second win under head

coach Brent Graham before going into 4A-DII play against Caldwell (2-3). Salado will host Caldwell Oct. 10; then travel to Giddings (4-1) Oct. 17; host last year's 3A state semi-finalists LaGrange Leopards (5-0) on Oct. 31 for the final home game and close out the season on the road at Smithville Nov. 7.

This week, Salado is likely to play without receiver Keaton Mims, who was injured in the fourth quarter of the Gatesville game.

Gatesville rolled out to a 35-6 halftime lead, despite Salado scoring first. Jacob Little connected with Jacob Quick on a 37

touchdown strike in the first quarter, but the kick failed.

The Hornets then rattled off five touchdowns in the first half with quarterback Jeff Speer throwing for 271 yards before sitting out the rest of the game. Gatesville had 317 yards in the air and 169 yards on the ground.

Salado meanwhile, had 401 yards total offense, with 169 yards rushing and 232 yard passing.

McLane Matthews led the rushing attack with 102 yards on 14 carries, including a 39 yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter. Tyler Armstrong had three rushing touchdowns, starting with a 47 yard run in the third quarter and TD runs of 15 yards and four yards in the fourth quarter.

Little was 14-of-28 passing with a touchdown pass and two interceptions and 232 yards. Matthews was his favorite receiver with five catches for 79 yards. Mims had three catches for 63 yards, Quick had two catches for 46 yards and Ty Stewart grabbed three passes for 44 yards.

Eagle undervarsity teams fall to Gatesville

Salado JV Eagles suffered a heartbreaking 18 - 21 loss to Gatesville last week at Eagle Stadium.

Gatesville's aggressive first drive was shut down with an interception by Caden Trice, setting the Eagles at the Hornet 20. Allen Sirois bulldozed his way through the line for the touch down, but the extra point was deflected.

Quarterback Parker Seaton connected with Gabe Kane with 2:23 left in the second quarter. The quarterback keeper failed on the PAT to put the score at Eagles 12 - Hornets 0.

Salado's defensive line kept the pressure on Gatesville throughout the first half with substantial hits by Chase Kunz, Nathaniel Sunshine and Sirois. An interception by Dakota Volk pulled the Hornets out of scoring position but the Eagles were stopped a yard short of the touchdown on the resulting drive.

Gatesville pulled off a touchdown and the extra point with just 17 seconds left in the half putting it at Eagles 12 - Gatesville 7 going into the second half. Tate Hill opened the

third quarter with a 50 yard touchdown. Sirois failed on the PAT attempt.

The highlights of this year's tour include a quaint historical church and Salado's rustic log cabins.

The Christmas Tour of Homes hours are Friday, 5-8 p.m. Dec. 5, 10 a.m.- 5 p.m. Dec. 6, 1-5 p.m. Dec. 7. Tickets (and reservations for tickets) for the tour are available at the Salado Visitors Center at 831 North Main, phone (254) 947-8634. Tickets purchased before Thanksgiving are \$12 while children 11 and under are free.

After Thanksgiving the ticket price will be \$15.

One of the stops on this year's tour is the home of Drs. Gene and Susan Terry. The Terry home is rich in history evidenced by the many family heirlooms and artwork on display throughout their warm and welcoming residence. Among the sparkling crystal, the delicate Lenox and Spode Christmas china and the gleaming Grande Baroque silver, cherished antiques with storied pasts abound. A Profurio Salinas painting greets visitors in the front entry of the home. The painting was purchased in the 1940's by Susan's grandmother on the San Antonio River- a true bargain with a purchase price of \$5. The

painting is accompanied by a Louise Ortega Nativity, an original woodcarving by the daughter of Ben Ortega, Sr., known as the Michelangelo of Albuquerque.

The Terry Christmas tree stands in the dining room adorned with ornaments, many of which were gifts to the family. An additional "Texas-themed" tree is nestled among the vintage maps and the roll top desk (purchased from a Bastrop drugstore) with the original bus schedule intact on the desk drawer. Gene's family has a long history in Texas, having settled Bastrop with Stephen F. Austin.

A smaller children's tree in the upstairs portion of the home provides the



Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Whenever declarer is missing the Q-x-x of a suit, he faces the question of whether to cash the A-K, hoping to drop the queen, or first cash the ace or king and then finesse the jack.

This situation arises with disturbing frequency, and the standard practice is to cash the A-K rather than rely on the finesse. This is because the odds very slightly favor the drop of the queen under the A-K. But this is a mathematical concept only, and declarer should not allow it to override any tactical considerations that might arise during the play of a particular hand.

Here is a typical case. West leads the K-A and another heart against four spades. Let's say declarer ruffs, plays the ace of trumps, crosses to dummy with a diamond and leads the jack of trumps, on which East follows low.

South's correct play is to finesse the jack. If he does, he makes the contract; if he doesn't, he goes down one. Declarer should reason that if he plays the king and the queen does not fall, he is likely to fail in his mission unless the opposing diamonds are divided 3-3.

But if he chooses to finesse, he makes the contract not only when East has the queen of trumps, but also when West has the queen and the diamonds are divided 3-3 or 4-2. In the latter case, declarer can establish an extra diamond trick by ruffing one of dummy's low diamonds, eventually using dummy's nine of trumps as an entry to collect the fifth diamond.

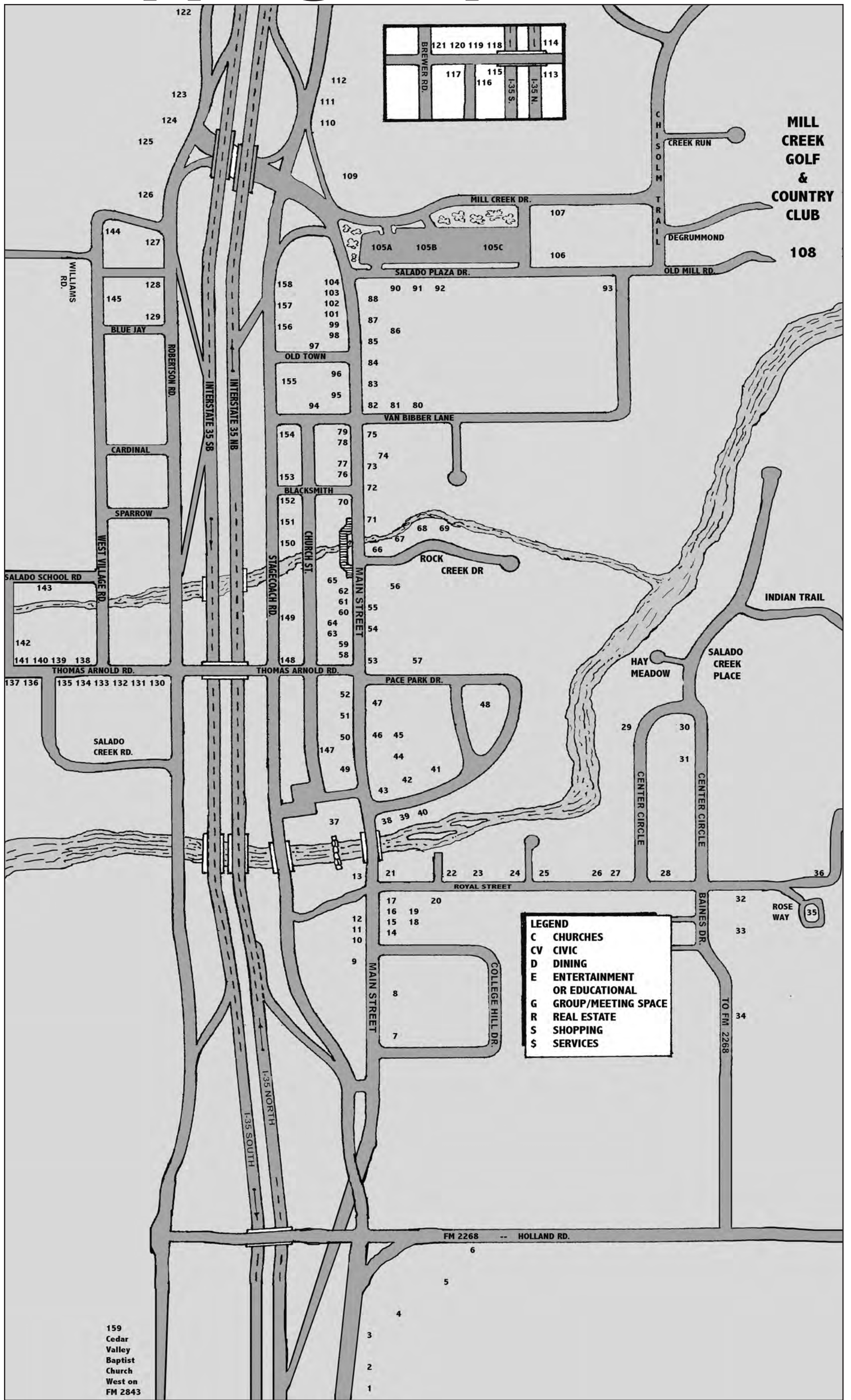



Private Applicator Training October 16

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in Bell County will be offering a Private Applicator's Training on Oct. 16. The cost of this training is \$60, and fee includes the study material (Private Applicator's Manual and Laws and Regulations manual, and registration fee), which needs to be obtained prior to the class by coming by the Bell County Extension Office at 1605

N. Main, Room 102, Belton.

The Licensed Private Applicator is a person who uses or supervises the use of restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticides for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity on property owned or rented by the person or the person's employer or under the person's general control. An agricultural commodity is defined as a

plant or animal grown for sale, lease, barter, feed or human consumption and animals raised for farm or ranch work.

The class begins promptly at 8 a.m. and will be completed by 11:00. Don't make any other plans during this time period. Class participants will need to give full attention to the class. Studying prior to the class is strongly urged.

The training /testing procedure has changed so please read on. This is simply the required training. Producers will have to travel another day to take the exam.

TDA has partnered with PSI Services LLC to administer TDA agricultural pesticide applicator exams which began June 1. Convenience testing offers more opportunities to test at a date and location

convenient to applicators. Applicants for a license will complete an application and submit license fees to TDA after the training. You contact TDA to receive an account number, and then you will be able to go to PSI's web site or call 800-733-9267 and register for the test at one of 22 locations. This will expand the number of testing opportunities; reduce the wait time for exam sessions and increase flexibility and convenience in scheduling exams.

Anyone who has had a license in the past which expired cannot get another license until theirs has been expired for 1 full year. To maintain current licenses, producers must obtain 15 CEU credits over a 5-year period of time. A score of 70% or

better is needed on your test to be able to apply for the license. You can contact our office at 254-933-5305 if you have any questions, and would like to receive information and study material.


