## Highland Games this weekend at Civic Center

Texas' oldest and finest Celtic festival returns for its 53rd year to Salado, Nov. 7-9. The Scottish Clan Gathering & Highland Games will be held at the Salado Civic Center off Main Street in downtown Salado.

Guests can enjoy caber tossing, world-class Highland dancing and as many as 100 bagpipers parading during the festival held at 601 N. Main Street, about a block East of I-35.

"The Gathering," as it is commonly called, kicks off with a torch-lit ceremony Nov. 7, followed by a Welcome Social in the Central Texas Area Museum's Hall of the Clans, at 423 S. Main Street.

Events begin at 9 a.m. on Nov. 8. Guests who pay the entry fee at the Civic Center grounds can delve into Scottish ancestry and heritage with clan society representatives, tap their toes to lively folk performances, or explore items offered by the many vendors selling Scottish goods. Meanwhile, various cultural competitions will be taking place in every corner of the grounds.

While activities commence at 9 a.m., a formal Festival Opening Parade, followed by welcome speeches, occurs at noon, featuring the massed pipe bands and clan society representatives carrying tartan banners.

Guests can also watch the athletic competition on Saturday with men ages 18 to 39 competing in the Open category, men over 40 making up the Masters class, and all adult women in their own category completing the same events, which include putting the stone, tossing the Scottish hammer, tossing weights for distance, as well as for height, and tossing of the caber. The competition begins at 10 a.m. and runs continuously. Officials judging will include Boyd Brazeel of Lewisville, a lifetime strength athlete who founded the Heavy Athletic competition at many other Texas Scottish festivals and Central Texas Area Museum President David Boyens, also a long time former Highland Games athlete.

More events include the Highland Dance competition, coordinated by Donna Cusack and Diane Krugh. Dancing Judge will be Megan Burgess. Piper for the Dance Competition will be Douglas Frobose. The highly athletic dance contests will feature continuous performances of the Highland Fling, Scottish Hornpipe, Sword Dance, Sean Tribhas and the Lilt. Many past Salado competitors have been world champions.

Sending reverberations

across the grounds such as those that bounce off wild mountains and dark glens in the Old Country will be the bagpipe and drum competition, for individual pipers and drummers as well as for bands.

Participants will include the host band, Houston's St. Thomas Episcopal School, which previously has won five Juvenile World Pipe Band Championships held in Scotland. Other bands participating include the Silver Thistle Pipes & Drums of Austin and numerous other groups from all over Texas.

Renowned Piper Rose Adams of Austin will chair the piping competition. Others judging using rules of the Eastern United States Pipe Band Assoc., will include Robert Richardson, Ian K. MacDonald, and several others.

Drumming Judge will be Tom Foote.

Even more competitions include the shortbread contest and the bonniest knees contests to be held mid-day on Nov. 8.

Featured folksingers at the festival will include Carl Peterson, Don Gabbert, Michael Harrison, Hugh Morrison and Central Texas' own Oak and Ember.

In addition, a worship service to include a "Kirk-ing of the Tartan" ceremony will be held at 9 a.m. Nov. 9 in the Salado Civic Center Building. Jim Haney will preach at the service. The service will include a blessing of family tartans and a "Flowers of the Field" ceremony, honoring friends of the museum who have died in the last year.

Sunday also gives guests the chance to watch the children attempt athletic feats inspired by the adult Heavy Athletics performers. All children are invited to compete for no extra fee.

Day passes to access all events on the Civic Center are \$15 for adults on Nov. 8 and \$10 on Nov. 9. A two-day pass can be purchased for \$20. Children's admission is \$6 either day. Saturday's pass, also provides free admission to an evening event known as the Tattoo.

Guests arriving later on Nov. 8 can purchase a ticket to just the Tattoo. Tattoo guests enjoy a twilight performance of bagpipes bands, along with performances by some of the top festival talent, including folk singers and dance contest winners. The event begins at 5:30 p.m. Saturday evening. Cost for those attending the Tattoo only is \$6 for adults and \$3 for children.

Another special event of the weekend will be the Tartan Dinner, a for-

## Salado voters approve \$10.55 million sewer bond, local option for legal sale of beer, wine

"The future looks very, very bright for Salado."

Mayor Skip Blancett said this Nov. 4 while celebrating the results of two local option elections.

Village of Salado voters approved a \$10.55 million bond election for the construction of a sewer system for the business district and west side of I-35 in a heavily contested race with 579 casting in favor and 458 voting against.

The difference was in the early vote when 429 voted in favor of the proposal and 308 voted against the proposal.

On election day, as the rains fell for much of the day, the turnout was much lower with 300 voting in the sewer election, splitting their ballots evenly, 150 for and 150 against, according

to Precinct 203 Election Judge Eldon Miller.

The proposal for the legal sale of beer and wine was overwhelmingly approved by Village of Salado voters, 783 in favor and 229 against. In early voting 559 voted in favor and 158 voted against the proposal.

Salado Board of Aldermen will canvass the election results at their Nov. 13 meeting and will begin to "immediately work on the project," according to Mayor Blancett.

Blancett said that aldermen would begin working with Jim Reed and city manager Kim Foutz on putting together a citizens committee with local participants who have experience in engineering and sewage treatment plants.

"The interest in Salado has been far greater than I would have expected,"

Blancett said. He added that the board will sit down in a marathon session in early January to begin putting together a plan for implementing what he called "the voice of the voters."

"We said that we would bring them an option and that their voice would be heard. They have told us what they want," Blancett said.

The mayor said that the Village will soon learn whether it has qualified for a \$1.5 million matching grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Agency to match local funds for the sewer project.

"That will bring us to \$3 million," he said, adding that with the election in hand, the Village can in earnest pursue discussions with a local developer who

wants to partner with the Village on the sewer. The Sanctuary is a 300 acre planned development that lies mostly in the extra territorial jurisdiction on property between Holland Road and Royal Street and the intersection of FM 2268 and I-35.

Developers are negotiating with the Village and will have workshops in November and January about The Sanctuary. The first workshop is Nov. 11.

The village may be able to use the existing Texas Commission on Environmental Quality permit issued to the project developers in order to save several months in processing. The treatment plant itself may be built on land owned by The Sanctuary developers east of the Village limits. See 3A for complete election results.

## The Poll Tax That Wasn't

When the Supreme Court rejected a petition to stop a Texas voter-ID law from going into effect for the mid-terms, the left commenced its wailing and gnashing of teeth.

In her dissent, Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg called the law "purposely discriminatory," and everyone piled in behind her with denunciations of the Lone Star State's blatant racism.

For the left, voter ID is tantamount to a poll tax. If so, the nation is awash in neo-segregationist election rules. According to a recent Government Accountability Office report on voter-ID laws, 33 states now have them.

A valid ID is a necessity of modern life, and requiring one to vote hardly seems an undue imposition. Especially if you are willing to give one out gratis. Of the 17 states that have strict requirements for a photo or government-issued ID, the GAO notes, 16 provide a free ID to eligible voters.

The critics complain that people may not have the relevant underlying documents to get the free ID, and there is a cost to obtaining them.

Well, yes. In Indiana, for instance, it costs \$10 to obtain a birth certificate.

In Arkansas, it costs \$12. In North Dakota, \$7.

The GAO report focuses on the voter-ID states of Kansas and Tennessee, where voters whose eligibility to vote is in doubt may vote provisionally. Then they have a period after the election to establish their eligibility. How many voters are showing up to vote, only to be foiled by the ID requirement?

According to the GAO, in Kansas in 2012, 1,115,281 ballots were cast. There were 38,865 provisional ballots, and of these, 838 were cast for voter-ID reasons.

In Tennessee, 2,480,182 ballots were cast. There were 7,089 provisional ballots, and of these, 673 were cast for voter-ID reasons.

In both states, about 30 percent of these voter-ID-related provisional ballots were ultimately accepted. That means in Kansas and Tennessee, altogether about 1,000 ballots weren't counted (and perhaps many of them for good reason) out of roughly 3.5 million cast. There you have it, ladies and gen-

tlemen, voter suppression!

Where you come down on this issue depends on whether you think it's reasonable to require the minimal effort to establish your identity when voting.

The critics say that in-person voter fraud is extremely rare, although that is not an argument for leaving the system completely open to it. Is voting so important that it shouldn't be tethered to an ID requirement? It takes an ID to buy a gun, a constitutional right. It takes an ID to get a marriage license or check into a hotel.

Voting is inevitably going to entail, even in the most latitudinarian system, some effort. You have to, at least most of the time, go to the polling place. You have to fill out the ballot correctly. You might have to deposit it in a box. Not all people will go to the trouble to do this, or to do it properly, which doesn't mean they are disenfranchised.

The irony is that unhinged complaints about voter ID are, in this supposedly troubling new era of the poll tax, a turnout tool.

## Better start shopping now for the best health care plans

Now's the time to check your health care coverage for 2015 or sign up for the first time.

More than 7 million Americans, including 733,757 Texans, got coverage through the Health Insurance Marketplace during the program's first open enrollment period a year ago.

This year's marketplace open enrollment begins on Nov. 15.

If you bought a health plan last year, you'll want to review it to make sure it still meets your needs. Every year, insurers make changes to premiums, out-of-pocket costs and benefits. Look for a letter from your insurance company explaining how your costs and benefits may change for 2015.

Even if you're satisfied with your current coverage, it'll be smart to log into your marketplace account at [www.healthcare.gov](http://www.healthcare.gov) and update your information on household income and family size. You may also contact the marketplace call center at 1-800-318-2596 to do that.

Updating your personal information is important, because you may be eligible for lower costs than last year. Eighty-four percent of the Texans who signed up during the first enrollment period qualified for help with their premiums. That help reduced their costs by 76 percent on average.

Generally, if you bought a plan last year and do nothing this year, you'll be automatically re-enrolled. Yet as tempting

as "doing nothing" sounds, you could be missing out on a better deal.

Nationally, 25 percent more insurers will offer coverage through the marketplace in 2015. By comparing all the available plans in your area at [www.healthcare.gov](http://www.healthcare.gov), you may find one that saves you more money, offers more services or includes more doctors in its network of providers.

The open enrollment season runs until Feb. 15. But if you want any changes in your coverage to take effect on Jan. 1, you must act by Dec. 15.

Like last year, this year's open enrollment gives the uninsured the chance to obtain coverage through the marketplace. The private health plans all cover a comprehensive set of benefits, including doctor visits, hospital stays, preventive care, pregnancy and prescription drugs.

Health plans sold through the marketplace must treat you fairly. Insurers can't deny you coverage because you have a medical issue, such as cancer or diabetes. Nor can they charge you more than they would someone who's in good health.

By completing an application at [www.healthcare.gov](http://www.healthcare.gov), you'll find out if you qualify for savings you can use right away to lower your premiums and out-of-pocket expenses. The application has been streamlined since last year so that it requires less time and work from most new enrollees.

The marketplace simplifies your shopping for coverage by letting you make convenient comparisons of health plans. You'll get a clear picture of what

benefits you'd get and what premiums and deductibles you'd pay. Then you can enroll in the plan that best fits your needs and budget.

If you expect frequent doctor visits or need regular prescriptions, you may want to pick a plan that has higher monthly premiums but pays more of the costs when you require care. If you don't foresee many visits through the year, you may prefer a plan with lower premiums.

Also, before you buy a plan through the marketplace, check whether your doctor is in the plan's network. Your out-of-pocket costs will be lower. The most direct way to find out is to call the insurance company's customer service line. You can get the number through [www.healthcare.gov](http://www.healthcare.gov).

The website has been improved over the last year so that it can better accommodate the heavy demands that will be placed on it as millions of consumers shop, compare and enroll. If you like, you'll be able to access the website on your cellphone and sign up for coverage.

At the marketplace call center, an additional 1,000 customer service representatives have been hired to assist consumers who call 1-800-318-2596. You can also visit [localhelp.healthcare.gov/](http://localhelp.healthcare.gov/) to locate the organizations in your community that will assist you in signing up for coverage.

For most people, the open enrollment period from Nov. 15 to Feb. 15 is the only time during the year when you can buy health insurance through the marketplace. So don't delay. Start shopping today.

## Denton Tells Big Oil to Frack Off

Nothing's crazier than letting corporate giants plunder the environment and deny our democratic right to govern local communities.

The University of North Texas, best known for its top-notch jazz program and sometimes for its "Mean Green" football team, might soon become known as Frack U.

UNT (where I went to college back in the Paleocene Epoch) and the good people of the surrounding city of Denton are at the center of an epochal fight between Big Oil and common sense.

Denton, just 30 miles north of Dallas, stands on the frontlines of the growing conflict between frackers and the rest of us. Unbeknownst to nearly all Dentonites (until recently), they sit atop the Barnett shale field, a deposit of natural gas locked a mile and a half underground in ancient rock.

Suddenly, the city was invaded by Shell Oil and other profiteers drilling deep wells to "frack" that

A gutsy and savvy group of hundreds of grassroots Dentonites -

led by the likes of a home care nurse, a UNT philosophy professor, and a jazz drummer - has proposed banning future fracking in the city. They stunned the arrogant and aloof fracker club by getting their proposal on the November 4 ballot.

Of course, the industry powers are now rolling out their usual politicking arsenal of big money, lies, fake economic reports, and slander - accusing the grassroots people of being "wacko" and even terrorists.

# Statewide and Salado mid-term election results

Gregg Abbott was elected as the next Governor of Texas, Dan Patrick as the next Lt. Governor and Salado voters overwhelmingly cast Republican ballots and approved two local propositions in heavy voting of the midterm elections.

Precinct 203 had a heavy turnout with 48 percent of registered voters casting ballots: 2,851 of 5,863 registered voters in the Salado precinct voted. In Bell County, 44,059 of 168,747 registered voters cast ballots in the mid-term election, a turn out of 26.11 percent. Statewide turnout was slightly higher with 33 percent of the 14 million registered voters casting ballots.

At the bottom of a long ballot were these two local proposals:

- "The issuance of not to exceed \$10,550,000 general obligation bonds for sewer facilities, property and improvements, and the levy of a tax sufficient to pay for the bonds." For 579 Against 458
- "Local option election to legalize the legal sale of beer and wine." For 783 Against 229



This year's Christmas tour of homes includes the Garrison home. Located on the perimeter of Pace Park, the Garrison home was purchased in May of 2013 from the original owners Steve and Millie Pylant. Mr. Pylant built the main home in 1996, adding a "mother-in-law house" in place of the carport in 2004. The cabinetry and the home's stairs were both built within the housing structure and installed upon completion. The current residents added a deck overlooking the expansive lawn to accom-

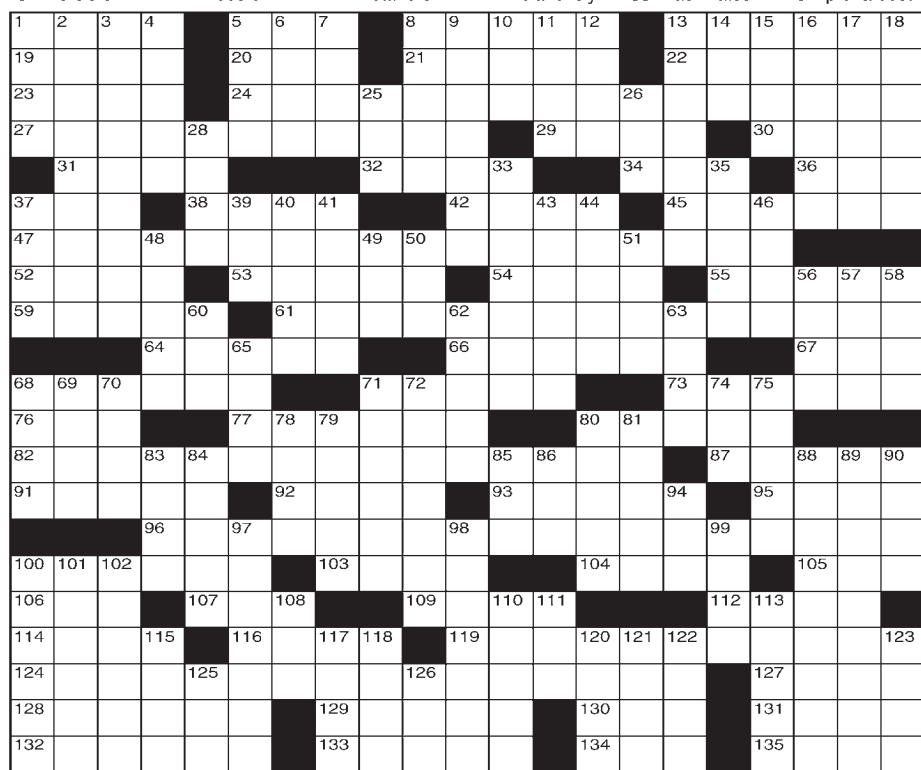

## Not all roads lead to rome

One advantage of playing weak two-bids is that they frequently cause the opponents to bite off a bit more than they can chew. As with all pre-emptive bids, weak twos present a challenge to the enemy, who often over-reach themselves by bidding a game or slam unwarranted on their combined values. The outcome may then depend on the proficiency of the defenders.

Consider this deal from a team-of-four match. At the first table, the bidding went as shown, and North-South wound up in three notrump with only 23 high-card points. Declarer then made the contract after West led the queen of spades and East turned up with the king of hearts, allowing South to score nine tricks consisting of one spade, three hearts and five clubs. West's two-spade

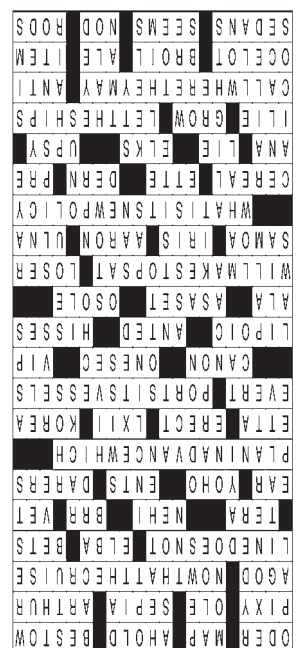
bid at this table thus back-fired, pushing North-South into a game they almost surely would not have reached if left to their own devices. Oddly enough, the bidding went the same way at the second table, but here the outcome was altogether different after West hit on the inspired opening lead of a diamond. East won the trick with the jack and shifted to a spade, taken by West with the jack.

West led another diamond, won by East with the queen, and East returned another spade. When the smoke cleared, East-West had scored six spade tricks and three diamonds to put the contract down five -- 500 points -- a terrible penalty to pay for a marginally ambitious contract.

The deal thus demonstrates both the advantage and disadvantage of pre-emptive bids, as well as the difference good judgment

can make in determining the final outcome.

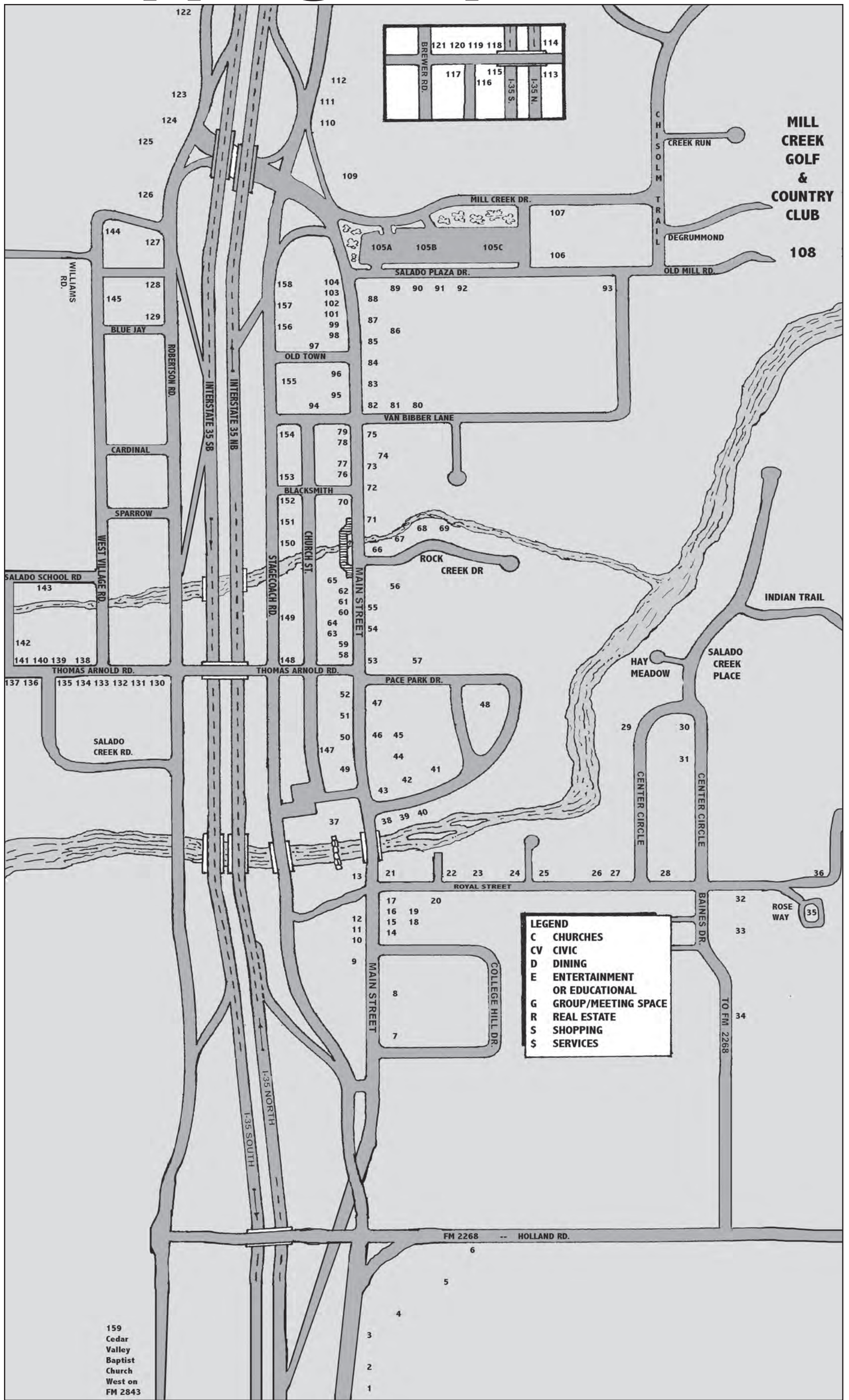

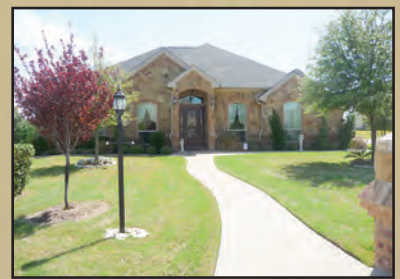

# Riparian Workshop set Nov. 17

LAMPASAS — The Lampasas River Watershed Partnership will host the "Proper Functioning Condition Riparian Workshop" Nov. 17 at the Lampasas County Farm Bureau, 1793 N. U.S. Highway 281 in Lampasas.

The program is free and open to the public, with registration starting at 8 a.m. and programming from 8:30 a.m.- 3:30 p.m.

The program will consist of inside talks and field instruction along Sulphur Creek, said Lisa Prcin, research associate with Texas A&M AgriLife Research, Temple.

"Lunch will be on your own," Prcin said. "As time will be limited for lunch stops after the inside instruction, it might be a good idea to bring a sack lunch."

"The workshop will help landowners and land managers learn to assess riparian and wetland conditions, and will offer three continuing education units for holders of Texas Department of Agriculture private pesticide applicator licenses," Prcin said.

Those planning to



attend should contact Prcin at 254-774-6008 or lprcin@brc.tamus.edu by Nov. 13. The workshop's full agenda and a map to the site are available at <http://www.lampasasriver.org>.

Presentations will be conducted by U.S. Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service personnel and hosted by the Lampasas River Watershed Partnership and AgriLife Research, she said.

"Be prepared for the possibility of chiggers and/or ticks," said Ricky Linex, USDA-NRCS wildlife biologist at Weatherford.

"Wear long pants, sturdy shoes, sunscreen and a hat. We will be walking adjacent to and in the creek with some rough ground to cross. A walking stick will come in handy for navigating the terrain."

In the morning inside sessions, participants will learn the basic interaction of hydrology, erosion and vegetation for Central Texas creeks and rivers, Prcin said. The afternoon session will move to the Lilley Ranch on Sulphur Creek to allow participants to see the riparian issues in a real-life environment.

"Among topics to be covered are channels, floodplains, water table,

vegetation, base flow, flood flow, sediment and how these things in combination are what make up the riparian area," she said.

The Lampasas River Watershed Partnership is a collaborative effort by local stakeholders, AgriLife Research and the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Funding and support for the Lampasas Watershed Protection Plan is provided through a Clean Water Act nonpoint source grant from the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

# Good cyber security habits are essential during the holidays

With so many new methods for cyber theft, it's important to remember to take extra steps to protect your bank accounts and money this season, as criminals look to take advantage of the increased spending activity.

any request for personal or financial data, make sure you know who is asking and why they need it. Be extra careful of requests made with an urgent or threatening tone, or an offer that sounds too good to be true. Criminals use this trick to

get personal information to access your accounts or commit identity theft.

- Monitor accounts and spending activity frequently. Take advantage of banking features, such as alerts that trigger when you have a low balance or

unusual spending activity. "Many banks provide mobile banking apps that allow you to keep tabs on your account activity on-the-go," says Diane Morais, Ally Bank deposits and line of business integration executive. "In addition to their convenience, mobile apps are an excellent resource to spot unusual transactions in a timely manner."

- Online shopping is an easy way to beat the crowds at the mall. But before providing your credit or debit card information, ensure your computer protection software and operating system are up to date.

Some banks offer customers free or discounted anti-virus protection. For example, Ally Bank, Member FDIC, provides its customers Webroot SecureAnywhere anti-virus software to protect their devices, including PCs,

tablets and smartphones, for free. Most people understand the importance of protecting their computers, but it's important to protect your smartphones too.

Look for "https" in the web address field of your browser to ensure a website is secure. The site should be verified by TRUSTe or a similar data security service.

- Check your credit reports periodically. Getting a free credit report is easy. During the holiday season, it might be worth the extra precaution to put a fraud alert on your credit report before any new accounts can be opened.
