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Disannexation, aldermen, election May 6

On May 6, Salado voters will decide whether a large portion of the Village will be disannexed from it or will remain within the city.

Election day, polls will be open at the Salado Civic Center on Main St. from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. May 6. Early voting ended on May 2 in the election.

The turnout in early voting has been heavy, with 582 casting ballots through the end of early voting May 2.

Salado Village Voice will post election results at saladovillagevoice.com as soon as possible after they are announced May 6.

The wording on the Village of Salado election ballot has led to some confusion among local voters, resulting in phone calls to the *Salado Village Voice* newspaper, city offices and questions to election judges.

The ballot measure states:
"Shall the area described
by metes and bounds in the
petition on file in the Village
Secretary's office be declared
no longer part of the Village
of Salado. For Against."

Residents have come by and called the newspaper office with questions about the wording of the proposition.

Here is the best answer we can give.

voting to disannex the portion of Salado that is shown in the map that can be seen at the polls in the Salado Civic Center.

If you vote AGAINST, you are voting against the disannexation of that portion of Salado.

The word "disannexation" appears nowhere in the verbiage of the Proposition. The choices are not Yes or No. They are For or Against.

All voters whose registration is within the Village of Salado can vote in the disannexation election, not just the voters who reside in the disannexation area.

Also on the ballot is the election of three aldermen for two year terms. Seven candidates are vying for those spots and appear in this order on the ballot: Judy Fields, David T. Williams (incumbent), Fred Brown (incumbent), Andy Jackson, Christopher Tramel, Michael McDougal (incumbent) and Linda Reynolds.

City admin., chief start work

Saladoans had a chance to meet Don Ferguson, the new city administrator at the end of his first day on the job May 1 and to reacquaint themselves with Rick Ashe, the new Chief of Police in Salado, during a reception at the Salado Civic Center attended by more than 50 people.

Ferguson comes to Salado from Wimberley, where he served as the City Administrator for the past 10 years, leaving there in a February agreement with the Wimberley city council.

As the city administrator in Wimberley, Ferguson coordinated the design and development of the \$3 million Blue Hole Regional Park project that was awarded the 2012 Municipal Excellence Award for Public Works for cities under 25,000 population by the Texas Municipal League (TML).

According to his resume, he did the following while serving as city administrator in Wimberley:

- Facilitated the five-year capital improvement program for the street improvements in Wimberley.
- Secured \$2.5 million in State and local grand funds for the development of the 126-acre Blue Hole Regional Park in Wimberley.
- Developed budget strategies that resulted in a 60 percent growth in the City of Wimberley's fund balance.

Ferguson served as city administrator in Rollingwood and was assistant city manager in New Braunfels.

He told the audience that he is moving to Salado. He thanked Mayor Skip Blancett for the welcome and told the

audience "you are my boss. I am here to serve you."

Ashe was sworn into office as the new Chief of Police by interim chief Josh Tulloch. Ashe is no stranger to Salado, having lived here for two decades.

He and wife Shannon and baby daughter Addie (now a freshman at college) walked the streets of Salado in support of incorporation in 2000. He then ran successfully to be elected to the first Board of Aldermen for the newlyformed Village of Salado

formed Village of Salado. He worked to establish the

Police Department in Salado. He was then elected the second Mayor of Salado, facing no opposition in either of his

Ashe has 36 years experience as a police officer, first in the U.S. Army, where he served in Germany 1981-1984.

He was a police officer with the City of Woodway 1987-1990 serving as a patrol officer

Since 1990, he has been employed by the Temple Police Department. Ashe retired from the Temple PD in April. He began his new duties as the Chief of Police in Salado on May 1.

He was an evening shift patrol officer working with the Citizens on Patrol unit and later an investigator with the Special Investigations Unit until 1998 where he was promoted to police sergeant.

In 1998-2004, he was supervisor for both day and night patrol teams, supervisor for support services and supervisor for the training unit at the Temple police department.

lieutenant in 2004. He has served as watch commander for both day and night shift and watch commander for specialized units such as the COPS program and the Investigations Unit.

Ashe was named the Outstanding Peace Officer in Bell County in 1996. He was also named the Oustanding Police Officer in Temple in 1996. He was named a Master Peace Officer in 2005 and has numerous awards and commendations from the Temple Police Department.

Ashe was elected the President of the Texas Municipal Police Association in 1998.

A graduate of Moon Valley High School in Arizona, he earned advanced training in Military Police from the U.S. Army in 1981. He graduated with an Associates of Arts degree in broadcast communications from ITT Tech in 1985.

He graduated from basic Police Academy in 1987 and Leadership Command College from the state of Texas in 2001. He has 1,200 hours of continuing training.

Salado Village Voice put the following questions before the seven candidates for the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen. Their answers follow.



Question 1: Final approval



We missed an economical, financially beneficial joint venture with Belton and Temple when offering us the opportunity to tie into their already existing waste water plant. This was the most feasible and profitable plan to have brought needed dollars into Salado through the sale of effluent as well as we would have been online quickly without the added expense of maintaining our own system and delays caused by having to obtain necessary permits for a new system. Properties on Main Street would have had the option of whether or not to tie onto the sewer. Unfortunately, it is already too late to correct this very costly deci-

Question 2: Economic Development: Too many inexperienced opinions and actions by the present board have already caused costly delays Salado's progress in this respect. Hiring a professional economic development organization is crucial. Such firms do market analysis and research, attracting appropriate businesses to specific areas. One must spend money-wisely. Actively working with professionals is the best and proven method to attract business which will promote Salado. Regardless of political posturing, no current council member has the experience or expertise to successfully promote economic development without expert advice of professionals.

There are approximately 130 lamps in the sculpture, with eight hand soldered connections for each lamp. That's over 1000 hand soldered connections. Each connection had to have heat shrink tubing over it in order to weatherproof it. All of that

went into the bucket, and had to be redone. Oh well, I have to put up with Congress, and I have to endure local politics, so why should I be surprised that TXDOT would say, "Oh, by the way, you can't do that."

I wasn't the only one. Melissa Paxton and Oscar Salinas had to hand fit the lamps into the hand blown globes and seal them.

They had to pull them all

out and reseal them after I rewired them. We should call

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
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Pershalls celebrate 69 year anniversary

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






- However unlikely it comes to this, if any municipal debt remains on the disannexing area, Belton would have to assume that debt prior to annexing the disannexing area.
- Disannexation will have no effect on the Salado ISD.



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The rambunctious House Finch is found across the US

The House Finch (Carpodacus mexicanus) is unquestionably one of the most common, although lesser known birds in North America, occurring in every state in the Union. This was not always the case however, for at one time it was restricted to the western United States. The first introductions in the east began in New York in

a migratory species, which means that it can be observed here at any time of the year. Adult males of this spe-

cies are quite conspicuous with their colorful adornment of a bright ruby-red breast and face. The back

and underparts are colored brown and decorated with lighter brown streaking. The wings are also streaked with black, and there are two narrow white wing bars. As is custom for the vast majority of songbirds, the female is by far the less colorful of the two sexes. Females have the same coloration on the back, wings, and underparts as the males, but they lack the brilliant colors on the head and chest area. Immature males are similar in coloration to the females. The tail is proportionately long, and is squared in appearance.

It is a small bird, with a body length of about six inches and a wingspan that

can approach ten inches. House Finches are one of the most rambunctious and noticeable of all of the avian species that occur in this area. Their calls vary from a simple chee to a series of multiple-toned chee-wheet. It often hops on the ground in search of food items which include seeds, grains, nuts, and fruits as well as small insects. When flying, the flight pattern is easily recognizable as it is an up and down path with rapid wing beats alternated with short periods of gliding with the wings pulled to the sides of the body.

These birds typically prefer to live in social groups during the non-breeding season. During the breeding season, they known to pair up with the male and female remaining monogamous during such time. The nest is constructed by the female and is typically found in human structures such as the backs of advertising billboards, street signs, and bird boxes. It will occasionally utilize abandoned nests from other species of birds. The 2 to 6 eggs are small (roughly 34 inch by ½ inch) and are usually colored a light blue with black spots that are found primarily on the larger end of the egg. These eggs hatch in about two weeks after being incubated by the female, and both parents share the responsibility of care-giving to the helpless young until they leave the nest approximately three weeks after hatching. Juveniles are colored similar to the adult females. Up to three broods per year have been recorded.

This avian variety is definitely one species of bird that has adapted quite well to human habitation, with many individuals seen foraging in lawns and gardens. They are not particularly bashful, and many will utilize bird feeders that are littered with seeds such as millet and sunflower. This species was first introduced to the eastern United States as a cage bird due to its dazzling colors.


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


