Dill to give businesses, residents update on purchase of Mill Creek

The Salado Golf Club at Mill Creek, a non-profit corporation, has begun its fundraising efforts and will discuss the proposal with local businesses and residents 6 p.m. Feb. 7 in the Mill Creek pro shop.

The meeting is open to the public and Terry Dill will be present to discuss the plans, procedures and progress made in the proposal to purchase the Mill Creek Golf Course.

The ultimate goal of the Salado Golf Club at Mill Creek is local member-ownership of the Mill Creek golf course, which has been financially troubled for much of its 30-year existence and which may be closed and the property sold off for real estate development by current owner Morris Foster.

Many businesses and residents see the loss of the golf course as a major economic blow to the community, not just in loss of property values but in loss of taxable revenues

from weekend and traveling golfers.

To avoid that, the Salado Golf Club at Mill Creek (SGC) was formed with the purpose of a not-for-profit approach to operating the golf course property.

To do that, however, the SGC will first have to purchase the golf course operation, priced at \$2.5 million by owner Morris Foster.

Another \$500,000 would allow for the extensive repairs of the signature holes along Salado Creek of the course. Getting these holes operational again would allow for more play on the course, as well as flexibility for continued maintenance of all the course, according to golf professional Terry Dill, who is leading the effort to raise \$3 million.

The fund raising will be done in a manner that allows the SGC to borrow (in units of \$10,000) up to \$3 million from its mem-

Manager, housing top workshop agenda

In a 4:30 p.m. workshop session Feb. 7, Salado aldermen will hear an update from the Salado Chamber of Commerce Economic Development Committee on the feasibility of changing from the Mayor-Alderman form of government to a Manager-Council form of government.

This will be the third time that aldermen have discussed this with the economic development committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

The Economic Development

committee supports a city manager for the operations of the municipal government and offered three approaches to filling the position: hiring a full-time city manager outright, contracting with a private firm to provide city manager services or contracting with the Central Texas Council of Governments to provide city manager services.

Aldermen instructed the Chamber committee to bring back possible costs and other considerations for the proposals for later

deliberation.

Also on the workshop agenda is discussion of the requirements for affordable housing. Following the workshop session, aldermen will discuss community support for an affordable housing project at their 6 p.m. meeting Feb. 7 at the Municipal Building, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd.

Aldermen will review the Emergency Operations Plan Annexes I,J,K and L and conduct a public hearing in order to call for a May general election.

Grand Jury indicts former SISD teacher

A Bell County Grand Jury indicted former Salado school teacher Lisa Wagnon on Jan. 30 on a two count charge that she had an improper sexual relationship with a student.

Judge Ted Duffield issued a warrant late on Oct. 24 for the arrest of Lisa Marie Wagnon, age 48, for the second degree felony of Improper Relationship between an Educator and a Student.

On Oct. 22 at approximately 3 p.m. a Bell County Sheriff's Office deputy was dispatched to Salado High School in reference to a student telling Salado school administrators that he was having a sexual relationship with a Salado teacher.

Wagnon resigned her position effective immediately on Oct. 23

Improper Relationship Between an Educator and Student is a second degree felony punishable by no less than two years and no more than 20 years in prison and a fine of up to \$10,000.

After turning herself in to Travis County authorities on Oct. 25, Wagnon posted \$10,000 bail, which was set at \$10,000.

Wagnon was employed for 12 years at Salado ISD, where she worked at the Intermediate School.

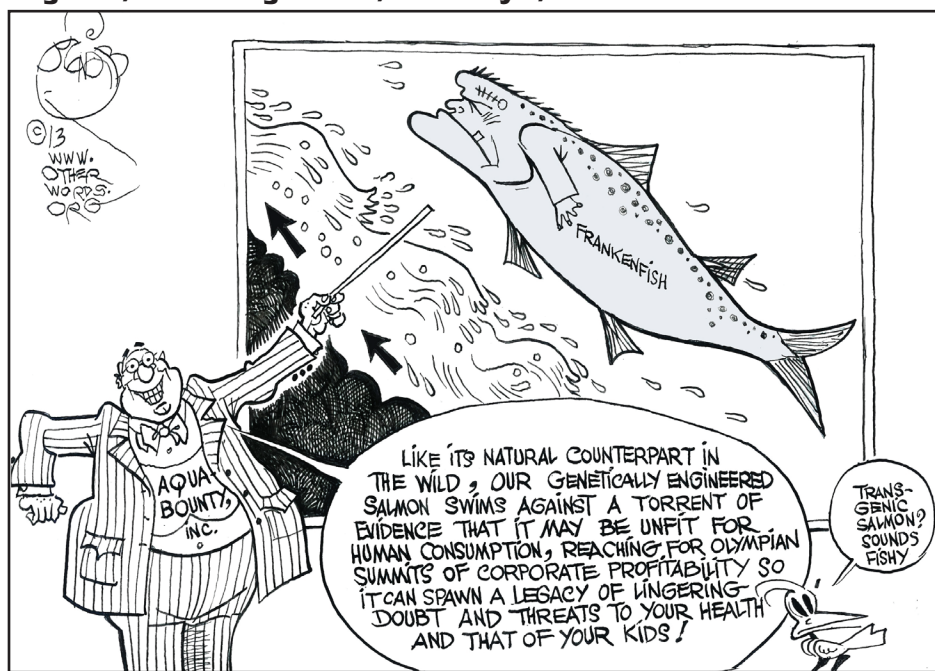

Washington vs. 'Zero Dark Thirty'

In "Zero Dark Thirty," CIA characters warn of congressmen coming after them for running the agency's interrogation program. As it happens, they could have said the same thing about making a movie about the agency's interrogation program. Washington is aghast at Kathryn Bigelow's fantastically compelling new film. "Zero Dark Thirty" isn't really about interrogation, although you could be forgiven for thinking so given all the debate over its scenes devoted to the agency's harsh questioning of detainees after Sept. 11.

Sens. John McCain, Dianne Feinstein and Carl Levin have panned the movie as inaccurate for suggesting that enhanced interrogation, or what its critics call "torture," helped find Osama bin Laden. Fine. They can slam it all they want. They can give it zero stars on their websites. They can write harsh reviews on Rotten Tomatoes. They can urge friends to go see "Silver Linings Playbook" instead.

Where they have shamefully -- and pathetically -- overstepped their bounds is in using their positions to badger the CIA over its cooperation with the filmmakers. In December, the trio wrote the acting director of the CIA, Michael Morell, two heavy-breathing letters about the movie, demanding in one of them to learn everything the agency told Bigelow and her team. It's as if Bigelow were an agent of a foreign power.

The casual viewer of "Zero Dark Thirty" will find it hard to see what Langley could have possibly revealed that is worth investigating. It is, at the end of the day, another Hollywood movie, even if an exceptionally good one. Did the agency's hierarchy tell Bigelow that the hunt for bin Laden was led almost exclusively by a willowy, gorgeous redhead (the protagonist Maya, played by Jessica Chastain)? That the events leading to bin Laden were easily compressed into a straight-line narrative, punctuated by conveniently cinematic dialogue?

Bigelow upset the senators and other purveyors of polite opinion by trampling on Washington pieties about interrogation. "Zero Dark Thirty" depicts detainees subjected to enhanced interrogation as providing information -- sometimes through their deceptions -- that helped the CIA zero in on the man acting as bin Laden's courier.

The movie is hardly an advertisement for harsh interrogation. It depicts the CIA program as more frankly violent and uncontrolled than it was, confusing it with the abuses at Abu Ghraib. Even if in reality the CIA program was more antiseptic and bureaucratic than depicted, the movie leaves no doubt that breaking a man is a brutal business.

That's not enough for the amateur film critics of the world's greatest deliberative body, though. They want to believe that we could have waged a shadowy war against terrorist operatives in the deadly urgent circumstances immediately after Sept. 11 without ever making difficult moral choices. For whatever reason, they are fine with flying trained killers to a compound in Pakistan in the dead of night to shoot the place up and bring bin Laden back in a sack. But they can't bear the thought that any of bin Laden's associates suffered coercive interrogations.

In this case -- in perhaps a first -- it is Hollywood that has the greater appreciation for complexity and moral realism.

Step away from that desk

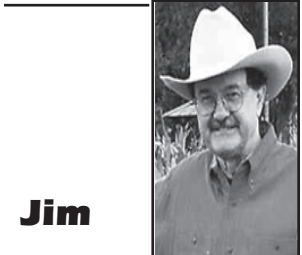
Don't let your boss steal your lunch break

Do you eat lunch at your desk? Alone? Continuing to work as you chew?

Welcome to the new wondrous world of work in which employees feel intense pressure from bosses to labor right through lunch. In a survey, 62 percent of people with desk jobs said they grab a snack and keep working during lunch, rather than taking a pause to step outside, clear their heads, socialize with co-workers, and recharge.

By creating a nose-to-the-grindstone climate, companies are able to extract an extra hour of work -- unpaid -- from every cube captive who foregoes taking that noontime pause. This is yet another product of the corporate autocracy's tightening grip over a union-free workplace. It's not exactly a morale-builder, for it increases both stress and resentment.

So guess who's do-

ing something about the corporate usurpation of lunch? Corporations! Not by empowering workers, of course, but by exploiting their resentment. McDonald's, a notorious union buster in its own workplaces, recently launched a perverse, workers-of-the-world-unite advertising campaign under the slogan, "It's your lunch. Take it."

By "take it," McD's is saying that distressed desk jockeys should "overthrow the working lunch" by darting out for a calorie-packed Third Pounder

Deluxe burger at McDonald's. Likewise, KFC and Applebee's have concocted crass PR pitches to divert legitimate worker anger into lunch consumerism in their chain store eateries.

The corporate theft of the lunch hour is not some hokey ad gimmick -- it's a real assault on the basic ethic of workplace fairness. Medicaid: Reform, not just expansion

In his State of the State address last week, Gov. Rick Perry was correct to reiterate his opposition to expanding Medicaid under ObamaCare. The goal of Texas Medicaid is to provide a safety net for our state's poorest residents -- a way for specific, targeted groups of people to have regular access to quality health care. But this is not what they have with the current Medicaid program, and it is not what they would have if the state expands it.

A study published last week by Texas Impact and Methodist Healthcare Ministries of South Texas claims that expanding Medicaid to cover about one million non-disabled, low-income adults is the right decision for Texas because it would bring in \$100 billion in federal tax dollars over the next decade while only costing the state \$15 billion. This influx of funds from Washington would, the theory goes, create jobs and boost state tax revenue in the short term with relatively little investment from the state.

But what would happen in the long term? The study projects the economic impact of expansion only through 2017, but even that is enough to give a hint at the long-term consequences of such a policy. Medicaid expansion would begin with modest state spending and steadily increase every year, according to the report. A phased-in approach would mean the state contributes an additional \$352 million to Medicaid in 2014,

then \$833 million in 2015, \$1.06 billion in 2016 (the first year of full implementation), and \$1.49 billion in 2017.

The health care law requires the feds to pay for 100 percent of the Medicaid expansion population -- until 2020. After that, the federal government's match rate falls to 90 percent, but there is no guarantee that the feds will not gradually draw down their share to the current level, which is about 58 percent. In that case, state costs would increase rapidly after 2020. The study argues against this scenario rather weakly, saying only that such a move by the feds is unlikely, "given that members of Congress represent states." On the contrary, given that an early version of the White House's 2013 budget recommended a "blended" rate well below 90 percent, we should expect such a scenario the future.

Although the Texas Impact study does not project costs beyond 2017, a 2010 study by the Texas Public Policy Foundation found that the state's total General Revenue spending on an expanded Medicaid program would total \$45.6 billion in the 2020-21 biennium, and increase to \$160.4 billion in the 2040-41 biennium. In 2001, Medicaid spending accounted for just 14 of the state's General Revenue budget; it is currently 26 percent, and with expansion it would comprise 33 percent by 2040.

That kind of spending is simply unsustainable, but that's only part of the reason why expanding

Medicaid is a bad idea. Simply put, Medicaid is not a very good way to get health care coverage. The program provides poor results for Texans and their families, partly because it is hard for people enrolled in Medicaid to find a doctor.

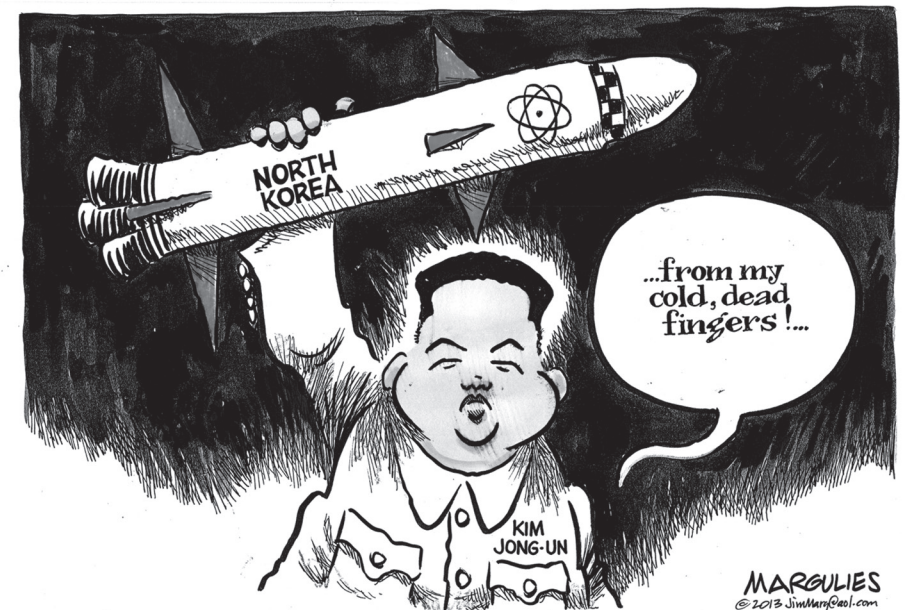
Less than one-third of our state's physicians will accept new Medicaid patients, and millions of new enrollees will only exacerbate the problem. Without sufficient access to routine and preventative care, Medicaid enrollees often end up in hospital settings where their care is more costly and less effective.

It would be reckless even to consider expansion unless the fundamental structure of the program is reformed. This session, the Texas Legislature should press Washington to disentangle state and federal finances and give state officials the flexibility to devise a better health care system through a Medicaid block grant. With greater flexibility and less federal interference, Texas could create a more efficient system that provides a better level of care for the right populations and introduces personal responsibility.

The current program, however, is structurally unsound and financially unsustainable. It is not only failing Texas taxpayers, it is also failing our state's poorest residents. All Texans deserve better.

Medicare has redesigned and simplified the statement it mails to beneficiaries every three months to explain the claims and benefits they've recently received. The Medicare Summary Notice, as the statement is called, describes all of the health care services or supplies billed to Medicare on your account, how much of the bill Medicare paid and how much you still may owe the health care providers or suppliers.

The Summary Notice goes to everyone enrolled in traditional Medicare -- private Medicare Advantage health plans send out their own claims reports to their members.

The notice isn't a bill, but you still should carefully review it when it comes in the mail. The Medicare statement helps you keep tabs on your medical care and your out-of-pocket expenses. It also helps you detect billing errors and even possible fraud.

Until now, though, checking your Summary Notice hadn't always been easy.

If you had a number of doctor visits or medi-

cal procedures during the previous three months, the statement often ran a dozen pages or more. And the form contained many medical terms, codes and abbreviations that confused all but health care professionals.

No wonder that some people simply ignored the Summary Notice when it arrived.

In redesigning the statement, Medicare visited with beneficiaries and asked how to make the notice clearer and more useful. Consumer advocates also weighed in with suggestions.

The results of the makeover will land in your mailbox soon. If you'd prefer not to wait, the new statement is already available at Medicare's secure online service -- www.mymedicare.gov -- where you can create a personal account and track your claims.

Either way, you'll find the new, consumer-friendly format, including:

- A clear notice of how to check the form for important facts and potential fraud.
- A snapshot of what you've paid toward your annual deductible, a list of the health care providers that made claims, and whether Medicare paid those claims.
- Simple descriptions,

in plain English, for medical procedures.

- Definitions of all terms used on the statement.
- Larger type to make the notice easier to read.
- Information on preventive services available to you.

The improved Summary Notice is meant to empower you in a couple of ways.

First, you can more easily file an appeal if a claim is denied. The new statement clearly explains what to do if you disagree with a payment decision and how to get help submitting an appeal. There's also a form attached that you can complete and mail to the address provided.

Next, you can more easily spot billing mistakes or potentially fraudulent charges. Improper payments and outright fraud cost Medicare billions of dollars each year and can lead to taxpayers and beneficiaries paying more for health care.

So it's to everyone's benefit to make sure your Summary Notice doesn't include questionable charges.

To check its accuracy, compare your claims notice with the bills, statements and receipts you've received from your health care providers or suppliers during the previous three

months. Do the dates, billing codes and descriptions of services match?

If you see an entry for services or supplies you didn't receive, get in touch with the provider and ask about it. It may be a simple billing error the hospital or doctor's office can correct. The correction will then show up on your next Summary Notice.

If you still have questions about your Medicare statement or there's something you and your health care provider can't resolve, call Medicare at 1-800-633-4227.

Medicare has stepped up its efforts to prevent unscrupulous providers and suppliers from filing false claims, but the best line of defense against fraud remains you -- the health care consumer.

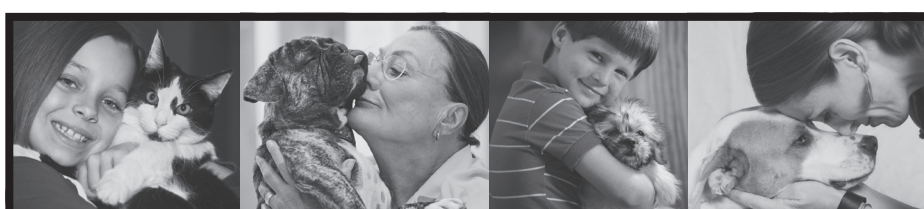

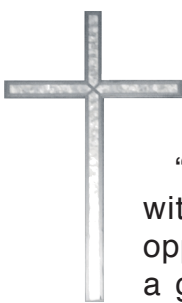

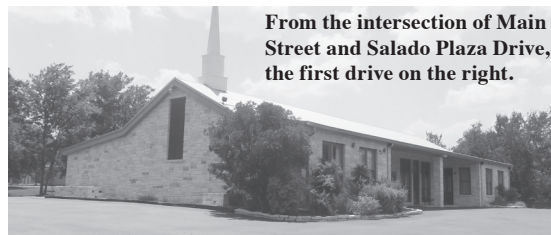

Trick dog wins hearts of owners and fans

Discarded. That's what he was until Saladoans Bill and Connie Hall saw him outside Petco a couple years back.

Now Mojo, a two-year-old blue heeler mix has his own Facebook page and Youtube videos. He has been featured in newspaper articles, TV news and trade magazine stories.

He and Connie have performed around the state and as far away as Georgia, where they performed a five minute routine in front of more than 6,000 fans at the National Barrell Horse Association (NBHA) Youth Finals.

When Mojo took off around the barrels, the audience of barrel horse racing fans went nuts for the knee-high dog that the Halls adopted just over two years ago.

Connie and Bill got him for their grandbaby, who tragically died while at daycare. At that time, Connie was teaching him basic tricks like fetching and playing baseball.

Now, he has routines which incorporate Gangnam style dancing (alongside Connie in her cowgirl boots and jeans), barrel racing, Frisbee tricks and even CPR.

He'll lay patiently on his back while Connie administers the 'CPR' and then jump back to life before giving CPR to a prone Connie. "He does, he breathes right in my mouth," Connie said. She confides that sometimes it's a bit messy.

His forte', though, are Frisbee tricks. But only with Tractor Supply soft frisbees. "He won't have anything to do with any other Frisbee," Connie said. "He's funny that way. Stubborn."

And smart. Connie said that she began training Mojo seriously before he was six months old. Most professional trainers don't begin intense training until the dogs mature to about two years old, Connie said.

Bill attributes Mojo's ability to the fact that he is not indeed a canine. "He's a human in a dog suit," he said.

Mojo travels with Connie and Bill whenever Bill has auctions, which is pretty regular since he has been a professional auctioneer for more than 30 years. Most folks recognize Bill's face from the many local charity auctions he does in and around Salado.

But soon, they may begin to recognize Bill as Connie's husband and Mojo's dad, as the two gain more fans for their performances.

Connie and Mojo will perform this weekend at Wildfire Ranch during the Open to the World. After the best ropers in the business have gone through and qualified for the Short Round, Mojo and Connie will entertain the crowd before the first go of the Short Round. You can catch the two performing in the late afternoon, most likely between 4 p.m. and 6 p.m., depending upon the timing of the ropings.

This will be his second performance at the Open to the World.

Earlier this week, he returned to the Bell County Expo Center where he performed at the mini-rodeo.

The little guy has come a long way since Bill and Connie first fell in love with him yapping at them to adopt him and take him home.

And he still has a few tricks up his sleeve.

bers and pay those loans back based upon the operating profits of the golf course.

If the 300 units of \$10,000 can be raised for the purchase and renovation of the golf course, then the SGC would aggressively go after recruiting members lost over the years and finding new members.

The golf club will also market to the traveling golfers lost over the years, as well.

Dill said that he expects that with repairs completed on the creekside holes and a good marketing campaign that the golf course

could see a return to its days of 50,000 rounds per year.

Recovering some of the historically-loved holes that criss-cross Salado Creek will bring back many golfers who have not played the course since the floods of 2009 and 2010.

"They'll want to come back to play those holes," Dill said. "Those are some of the best holes anywhere."

Dill said that he will concentrate on bringing those creek holes back into play as soon as the Salado Golf Club takes ownership of the course.

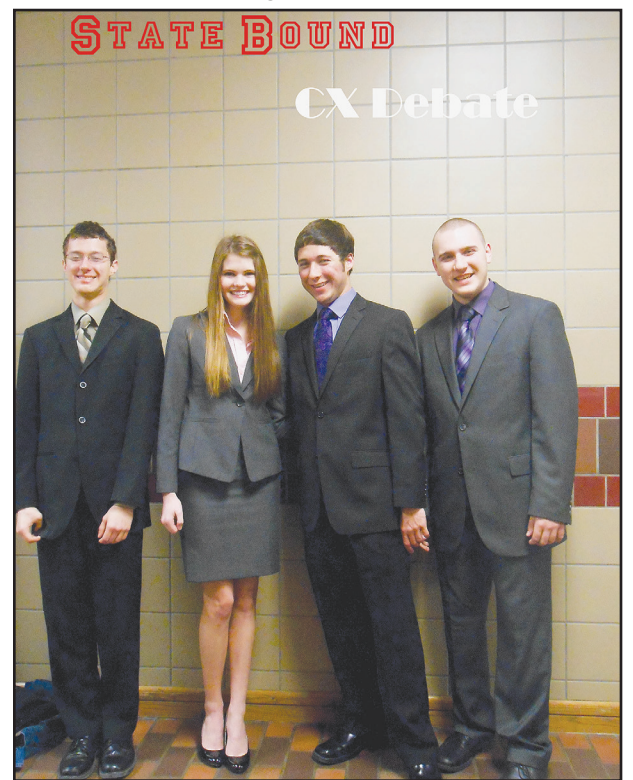

You too can be a genius Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

The secret of good declarer play lies in the ability to determine how the unseen cards are divided. If you could see all four hands, you'd almost always achieve the best possible result.

The knack of placing the opponents' cards is available to anyone willing to analyze the clues and shape them into a composite picture that is consistent with the bidding and plays already made.

For example, consider declarer's problem in today's deal after West leads a club against five diamonds doubled. South ruffs and plays a trump to the ten, losing to East's ace. Back comes another club, ruffed by declarer. South then cashes the king of trumps, bringing him to the crucial point of the play.

To make the contract, he must avoid losing two heart tricks. This can be accomplished very easily, if West has the missing ace, by leading hearts twice toward dummy's K-Q. But if East has the ace, this method of play is almost certain to fail, since a second heart trick must eventually be lost to the jack or ten.

The first thing South does at this point is to try to work out who has the ace. This is not a difficult task, since East could not sensibly double five clubs without the ace of hearts.

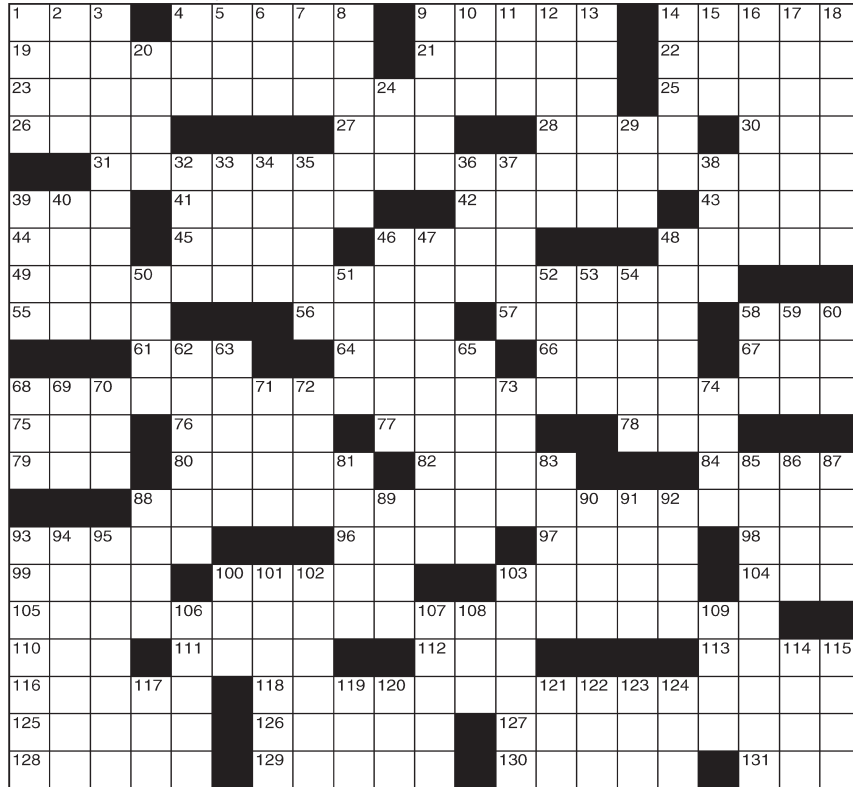
South therefore has only one real hope -- that West has both the jack and ten of hearts. So at trick five, he leads a heart, and, instead of playing the king or queen, he finesses the nine. When the nine forces East's ace, the contract is home.

The nine is clearly the right play -- even though it requires a good bit of luck for it to succeed (the chance that West would have the jack and ten is about one in four). But

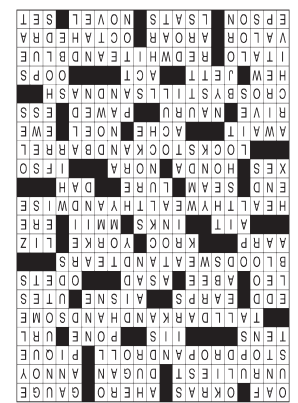

Quick cooking fish dishes are family favorites

LEMON TROUT FILLETS WITH CAPERS

A meal in minutes, these delicious fillets are topped with a classic sauce of butter, lemon and capers. Remove pin bones before cooking or make sure to alert diners to watch for these tiny bones in their fillets.



1/3 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt
4 (4- to 6-ounce) butterflied trout fillets, head and tail removed
3 tablespoons unsalted butter, divided
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon zest
2 tablespoons capers
Optional: You may use skin-on trout fillets if desired.

Combine flour and salt in a shallow bowl or bak-

ing dish. Pat fillets dry. Dredge fillets in flour and pat off excess.

Heat 2 tablespoons butter in a large skillet over medium-high heat until melted. Add fillets to skillet, skin side up, and cook about 3 minutes or until golden, carefully turn fish and continue to cook on the other side 2 to 3 minutes longer or until fish is opaque throughout. Remove fish to a serving platter and keep warm. (This may have to be done

two at a time, depending on the size of the skillet.)

Add remaining 1 tablespoon butter to skillet and melt. Remove from heat and stir in lemon juice, lemon zest and capers until heated through. Serve fillets with lemon-caper sauce.

CRISPY BAKED TILAPIA

Enjoy the crispiness of fried fish with a simpler and healthier recipe.

2/3 cup panko bread crumbs
1 tablespoon grated lemon zest
1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil, plus more for the pan
2 teaspoons dried basil
1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt
1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
4 (5 ounce) tilapia fillets

Spread bread crumbs on a rimmed baking sheet and place into the oven. Preheat the oven to 425°F, toasting bread crumbs while the oven preheats. Timing will depend on the oven, but it should take about 5 to 6 minutes. Remove the baking sheet when bread crumbs



are lightly golden, stirring once (watch carefully so crumbs don't burn).

Meanwhile, stir together lemon zest, oil, basil, salt and pepper in a medium bowl. Stir in toasted bread crumbs and mix until evenly blended. Brush the baking sheet lightly with additional oil.

Pat fillets dry with paper towels. Coat both sides of fillets by pressing into crumb mixture in the bowl

and then place them onto the oiled baking sheet. Press remaining crumbs on top of fillets. Bake until fish is opaque and flakes easily, about 15 minutes.

1 yellow onion, coarsely chopped
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 teaspoon sea salt
1 teaspoon ground turmeric
1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
4 teaspoons tamarind paste
1/2 cup coconut milk
1 (8 ounce) can bamboo shoots, drained
4 (6 ounce) red snapper fillets, skin on
1/3 cup shredded fresh basil



leaves

In a large skillet or wok, heat oil over medium heat. Add onion, garlic and salt; cook until very tender, 6 to 7 minutes. Stir in turmeric and pepper flakes and cook, stirring, 30 seconds. Meanwhile, dissolve tamarind paste in 1 cup hot water. Strain out and discard any seeds or stems. Add liquid to the skillet. Carefully transfer mixture to a blender and pulse until just chopped. Return to the skillet. Add

coconut milk and bamboo shoots and bring to a boil. Add snapper fillets, skin side down. Spoon sauce over fillets, reduce heat to medium-low, cover and simmer 15 minutes or until fish is opaque throughout. Garnish with basil.

bowl, toss with lime juice and break into small pieces. Fill warmed taco shells with fish, lettuce, tomato and green onions and top with shredded cheese.
