## Eggheads coming to Salado

### Big Green Egg enthusiasts return to Pace Park March 16

Used to be, if someone called you an egghead, you might want to crack their head open like an egg.

### Van Dormolen to be buried at State Cemetery

Deborah “Borah” Van Dormolen passed away on March 10, 2013 after suffering a massive heart attack last week. She is being mourned by many in the political community, as she spent much of her time, energy and efforts in working for the Republican Party from the grassroots to the state house to the White House.

“Throughout her extraordinary life, Borah Van Dormolen was motivated by a desire to serve her country and work passionately on the causes most important to her,” Texas Governor Rick Perry stated. “We will all miss Borah’s wisdom and boundless energy.”

U.S. Rep. John Carter said that Van Dormolen’s passing is “a great loss for the Central Texas community. She was a light to this community and all that met her. Borah was truly a friend and a confidant.”

U.S. Senator John Cornyn echoed the sentiment, calling her a remarkable patriot, respected leader and loving wife. “Borah’s legacy will live on in many ways, including in the young Texans she helped me select for nominations to our nation’s military academies through her service on my Military Academy Selection Committee.”

Borah Van Dormolen is a past president of the Texas Federation of Republican Women. She was also an active member of the Salado Area Republican Women and in county politics. She has

been involved in countless political campaigns, working for conservative politicians.

After attending West Chester College in Pennsylvania, Van Dormolen enlisted in the U.S. Army, rising through the ranks and retiring as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1997. She served in various command, staff and leadership positions, including a term as Professor at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. She was commander of logistics operations units for the U.S. Army’s largest and most powerful military formations, including the famed 1st Cavalry Division and 13th Corps Support Command.

Borah and Lieutenant Colonel (Retired) Rich Castle, her husband of 25 years, ventured into the business world establishing Design Technology Group, Inc., a highly successful manufacturing and marketing firm of outdoor stainless steel electric grills.

She and her husband Rich called Salado home for two decades.

Van Dormolen’s political activities are remarkable in their width and breadth accomplished in such a short period of time since her military retirement. She has served the Texas Federation of Republican Women (TFRW) as Vice President of Finance, Vice President of Legislation, Chairman of Leadership Development, District Director Coordinator and District Director of Senatorial District 24.



Deborah “Borah” Van Dormolen was a Republican activist and grass roots organizer, after a 23-year career in the Army, from which she retired as a Lieutenant Colonel. She will be buried at the Texas State Cemetery at a later date.

As Vice President - Finance, she coordinated the “Tribute to Women” luncheon at the Republican Party State Convention and the TFRW 2005 Legislative Day Luncheon in Austin.

During the TFRW State Convention in Corpus Christi, Borah was elected President of the Federation for 2006-2007. Borah has applied her leadership and teaching skills to campaign management seminars for the National Federation of Republican Women (NFRW) and TFRW. During the 77th Texas Legislature session, she served as Legislative Aide for State Representative Kent Grusendorf, (R-Dist. 94). Van Dormolen contributes significant amounts of time and talent to the Republican Party of Bell County in fundraising and grassroots organization.

At the time of her death, Van Dormolen was serving her second term as a Republican National Committeewoman from Texas and had recently been elected to represent the Lone Star State on the Rules Committee of the RNC. She also served on the Executive Committee of Maggie’s List, a political



action committee focused on recruiting, training and supporting women running for congressional office. She also represented the United States in the 1968 Summer Olympics in Mexico City as a swimmer. Borah held a gubernatorial appointment to the Texas State Cemetery Commission and was honored in 2010 as the “Distinguished Military Retiree” for Texas.

Van Dormolen an important community leader serving as Past State Vice President for the Texas Council of Chapters of the Military Officers Association of America; Past President and current Director of the Central Texas Chapter of The Military Officers Association; Board of Governors for the Association of the United States Army, Fort Hood Chapter; Rotarian in the Salado Chapter; and past member of the Board of Directors for the Mill Creek Golf and Country Club and Central Texas Women’s Golf Association. Borah is an endowment member of the National Rifle Association and the Texas State Rifle Association.

start. Prizes will be presented at 5:30 p.m.

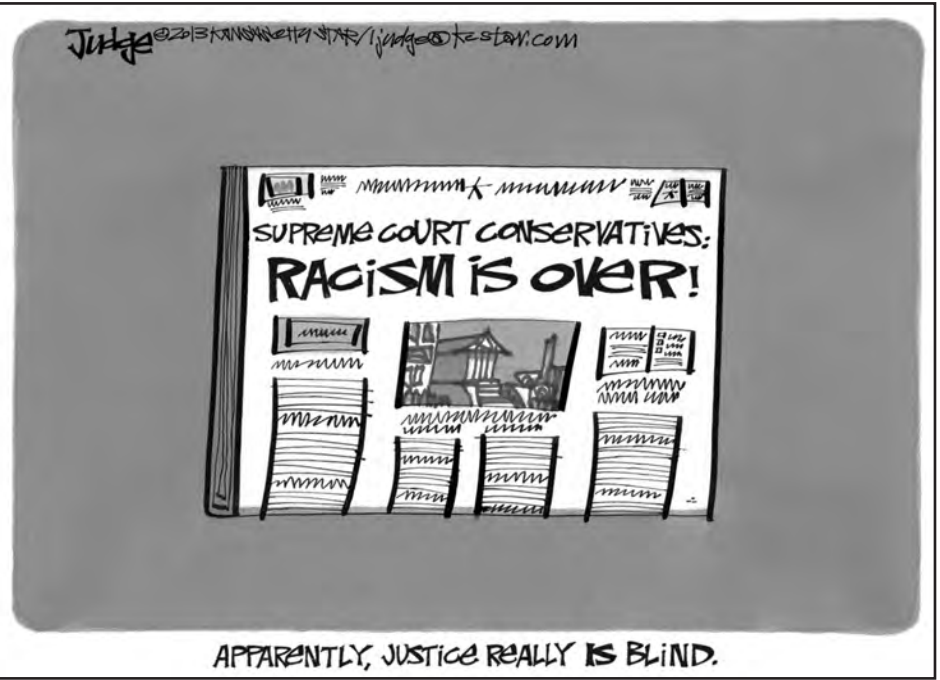

## Improving education about far more than just money

There is a narrative in the Texas education community that contends we are short changing public education spending, and because of that, our students testing performance is suffering.

But is education quality really chained to spending more money? Or might other factors come into play, such as competition, choice and access to on-line learning?

The National Education Association (NEA), the national labor union affiliate of the Texas State Teacher Association, estimates that Texas spends \$8,400 per pupil. But this does not account for the fact that, in 2011, the Legislature delayed \$1.75 billion in education funding by one month, from August 2013 to September 2013 in the next fiscal year. Now they are likely to move that payment forward, since Texas' strong economy has boosted tax revenue.

Another \$317 million in education spending is likely to be added before the close of the fiscal year. With a little more than \$2 billion in new spending, Texas per pupil spending would jump from \$436 per student to \$8,836.

The biggest expense in the K-12 education system is worker salaries. The NEA's salary data shows that Texas teachers were paid an average of \$48,110

vs. the U.S. average of \$56,383. This is 85.3 percent of the national average. But when considering Texas' low cost of living (92 percent of the U.S. average at the end of 2012), Texas teachers are paid the equivalent of 93 percent of the U.S. average.

Teachers in California, the nation's largest state with the greatest number of students, are paid an average of \$69,324, or almost 123 percent of the national average. This sounds great—until one considers that the cost of living in California is 125.6 percent of the national average.

Because Texas' cost of living is lower, its wages are lower, which allows Texas to hire more teachers. The NEA says Texas has 353,635 instructional staff and 4.7 million students. California has 289,327 instructional staff and 6.1 million students. This works out to a 13 to 1 student to staff ratio for Texas vs. California's 21 to 1 ratio.

Education spending advocates have also pointed to Texas' recent scores as symptomatic of an underfunded education system. The problem with this critique is that SAT scores are unsound measures of academic performance. Not every student takes the SAT, for instance, only 2 percent of students in North Dakota take the test. Texas ranks 19th nationally in the share of

public high school seniors taking the test for a total of 58 percent in 2012. Texas' SAT participation rates have also been climbing rapidly in recent years, up 6 percent in the last year alone compared to a 2 percent increase in California.

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) is a better measure of academic performance because it is a national, standardized test that virtually all students take. Recent news accounts have noted that, among the five biggest states, Texas 4th and 8th graders do better than their big state rivals while California ranks the worst. Further, when looking at the test results across racial and ethnic categories, Texas does even better.

Rather than simply pouring more money into the status quo, we should seek real reform. School choice, blended or online learning, expanded charters, and other innovations — not more money — is the real path to a brighter future for Texas children.

## The Unpopular Party

It is not just the winter of Republican discontent. It will in all likelihood be the spring, summer and fall, as well.

The national party is leaderless and nearly issueless, but besides that, is thriving and in fine fighting trim.

Once, taxes and national security were the party's pillars, supplemented by domestic issues like welfare reform and crime and by symbolic issues like the Pledge of Allegiance and flag burning. Now, the pillars are in disrepair.

Cuts in income taxes don't have the same resonance because rates are so much lower than 30 years ago. Republicans formerly had success with across-the-board tax cuts that reduced rates at the top and for everyone else. By focusing on raising rates on the top, Obama has forced them into almost exclusively defending "tax cuts for the rich."

In theory, national security is still a Republican strength, but it doesn't have as much resonance as in the years after Sept. 11. The latest NBC News/Wall Street Journal poll has Democrats leading on: looking out for the middle class, Medicare, health care, reducing gun violence, Social Security, immigration, taxes and the economy. The good news

for Republicans is that they lead on everything else. The bad news is that everything else is only spending, the deficit and national security.

The problem with the deficit as an issue is that people care about economic growth more, and the problem with spending cuts is that people like them more in the abstract than in reality.

At times, "we have a \$16 trillion debt" seems the sum total of the party's argumentation. When party leaders say that they have to become the party of growth again, the policy they invariably advance to that end ... is reducing the \$16 trillion debt.

This necessary, but hardly sufficient message is almost all we hear from Republicans in Congress, where their majority in the House gives them responsibility without decisive influence. The House Republicans mainly have blocking power. Woe to the republic if they didn't. But if you block things, you're easily labeled an obstructionist, and wouldn't you know it, people don't like obstructionists.

Their only hope to deflect the nation from its profligate budgetary path is confrontations coinciding with key fiscal inflection points, like the March 1 deadline for the sequester. They always ride into these fights badly outgunned.

This won't change soon. It is too early to have a presidential candidate or even a presidential field, so the GOP lacks a head and therefore a unified voice.

Of course, it wasn't long ago that Democrats seemed to be in dire straits. The party agonized over appealing to "values voters" after 2004. Little did they know that eight years later, they would run a successful re-election campaign on limitless abortion and free contraception.

Events will again take a hand, as they always do. And since last fall's election, top Republicans from Bobby Jindal to Marco Rubio have been talking about a more bread-and-butter economic agenda. Fleshing that out, though, is a longer-term proposition.

In the meantime, Republicans should prepare themselves for more discontent.

## A Lesson in Education Hyperbole

Dire predictions about the fate of certain government programs were hardly in short supply recently, as sequester-related budget cuts loomed. So it was hardly a surprise when Education Secretary Arne Duncan got in on the act.

"It just means a lot more children will not get the kinds of services and opportunities they need, and as many as 40,000 teachers could lose their jobs," he said in an interview with Face the Nation. "There are literally teachers now who are getting pink slips, who are getting notices that they can't come back this fall."

Turns out, though, that it isn't true. Glenn Kessler at The Washington Post confirmed this in a fact-check column that awarded Duncan no fewer than four "Pinocchios" for this whopper.

"Oddly, however, the Education Department for days was unable to cough up the name of a single school district where these notices had been delivered," he wrote. "Then, on Wednesday, Duncan appeared before the White House press corps and produced a name -- Kanawha County in West Virginia -- with a major league caveat. 'Whether it's all sequester-related, I don't know,' he said."

Facts matter. They may ruin your PR spin, or fly in the face of your talking points, but they can't be ignored. And the facts are this: We've been hiring new teachers over the last four decades at a clip that far outpaces the increase in students.

From 1970 to 2010, student enrollment in the nation's public schools increased by only 7.8 percent. The number of teachers, however, increased by 60 percent.

And even that number is dwarfed by the increase in non-teaching staff positions that occurred during that time: 138 percent. That's right -- it more than doubled, despite the fact that the percentage of students was going up by a very small amount.

"Twenty-one 'Top-Heavy States' employ fewer teachers than other non-teaching personnel," according to a new report by the Friedman Foundation for Educational Choice that focuses on the worst offenders. "Thus, those 21 states have more administrators and other non-teaching staff on the public payroll than teachers. Virginia 'leads the way' with 60,737 more administrators and other non-teaching staff than teachers in its public schools." Certainly puts a new light on those predictions about a parade of pink slips.

The fact is, real federal spending per pupil

has nearly tripled since the 1970s. And as education expert Lindsey Burke of The Heritage Foundation points out, there are plenty of places for the budget axe to fall without hampering education in the slightest.

Consider Head Start, the nation's flagship preschool federal program. Taxpayers have spent more than \$180 billion on this program since it began in 1965; it currently costs \$8 billion a year. Yet a recent evaluation by the Department of Health and Human Services, which shows "little to no effect on cognitive, social-emotional, health, or parenting outcomes" on the participating children -- suggests very little return on that investment. It's also rife with fraud and abuse, with staff misreporting income to enroll more students.

There are plenty of duplicative or ineffective education programs that could be cut as well, such as:

- Native Hawaiian Educa-

tion Program (\$34 million annually)

- Alaska Native Education Equity Program (\$33 million annually)

- Foreign Language Assistance Program (\$26.9 million annually)

- High School Graduation Initiative (Dropout Prevention) Program (\$50 million annually)

The list goes on and on. There are 150 federal education programs, in fact. And that's on top of state and local spending, which comprises the bulk of all education funds.

The unfortunate thing is not that budget cuts are occurring. As the deficit continues to soar, it's clear that they're badly needed. No, the problem is that they're not being targeted more effectively.

The nation's teachers have proliferated a great deal over the last several decades. So have many programs that should have been expelled long ago.

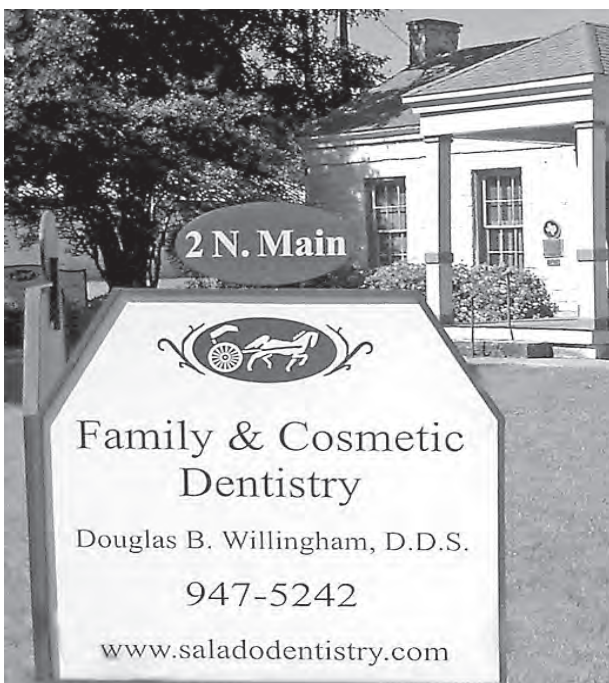

The Presbyterian Church of Salado will celebrate Holy Week by remembering the events of the last week of Jesus' life. It will begin with a

Maundy Thursday service 6 p.m. March 28 and end with the Sunday Easter service.

On Maundy Thursday, the church remembers the last evening Jesus shared with his disciples in the upper room before his arrest and crucifixion. Derived from the Latin word mandatum, meaning "commandment." Maundy refers to the command Jesus gave his disciples at the Last Supper: to love one another.

Maundy Thursday marks three key events in Jesus' last week: his washing of his disciples' feet, his institution of the Lord's Supper, and new commandment to love one another.

This year, the Maundy Thursday service will be a Tenebrae Service. The Presbyterian Church will be celebrating both Maundy Thursday and Good Friday by conducting communion and a Tenebrae service. Communion will be done informally during a time of light snacks, then congregations move into the sanctuary for the Tenebrae service.

The word 'tenebrae' is Latin for "darkness" or "shadows". The purpose of the Tenebrae service is to recreate the emotional aspects of the passion story. This is not supposed to be a happy service, because the occasion was not happy.

The Tenebrae service is not a new development in church liturgy. It has been observed since medieval times. Originally, the Tenebrae was held in European monasteries on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of Holy Week.

The Tenebrae service always has a somber tone, reflected in the darkness, in the accounts of Christ's suffering, in themusic, and in the silence of the congregation as they leave the sanctuary. But underlying the somber feeling is the anticipation of the resurrection, mirrored in the Christ Candle.

The services will have scripture narratives. The service starts out with the church in candlelight. There are eight candles plus a white Christ Candle. As the Gospel Lessons are read, one of the candles is

extinguish until only the Christ Candle remains.

Then the first part of Psalm 22, which Jesus quoted on the cross is read and the Christ candle is put out, leaving the congregation in near total darkness. At this point, the service ends. There is no benediction and the people leave in silence.

The purpose of the service is to recreate the betrayal, abandonment, and agony of the events, and it is left unfinished, because the story isn't over until Easter Day.

Rev. Carl Thompson encourages believers to be a part of this service at 6 p.m. March 28.



# UMHB 74th Annual Easter Pageant March 27

O'Rear also decides which female student will play the role of Mary, mother of Christ. This year, the role went to Madaline Garcia of Colorado Springs, Colorado

The rest of the cast has been selected by Anna Payne of Midlothian, TX, who O'Rear chose as this year's director for the pageant. This year's assistant director is Lauren McKee of Belton.

McCarthy recommends that visitors try to attend the day's earlier performances.

"The 5:30 p.m. show is always popular, so people who attend the 12:30 or 3 o'clock show will have a better opportunity to get good seats," McCarthy says.

Audience members are also encouraged to bring sunscreen, but umbrellas are prohibited.

The tradition of the an-

nual Easter Pageant began in 1940 when it was held during the afternoon on Easter Day. At that time, the school was not co-ed, so all of the roles were played by women. Over time, the production expanded to include male students and extra performances.

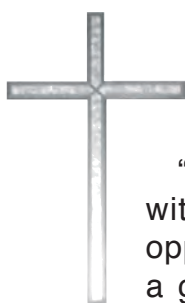

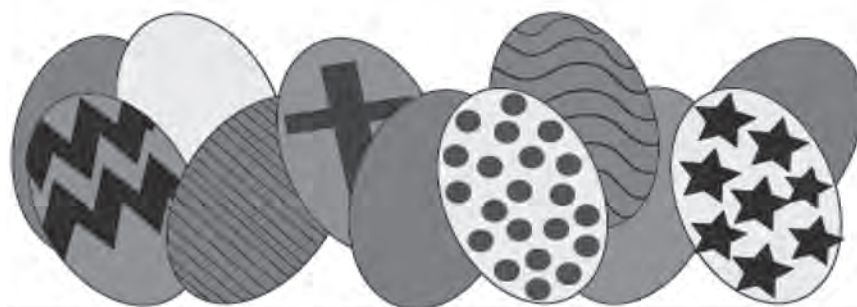

## The Legend Club welcomes Dale Watson to the stage

Country music heavy hitter Dale Watson takes the stage at The Legend Club on March 15. The original songs on this Red House Records recording artists new album, "El Rancho Azul" are being touted as the "honkiest tonkiest" of his 21-album career.

Recorded at Willie Nelson's legendary Pedernales Studio in Austin, Watson used his own band of Chris Crepps on upright bass, Mike Bernal on drums, Don "Don Don" Pawlak on pedal steel, with Danny Levin sitting in on piano and fiddle.

Born in Alabama, raised outside Houston, based in Austin, Watson came to country music early and naturally. His truck driving father moonlighted as a country singer, and his older brothers had bands as well. Dale remembers receiving his first guitar at age 7 and starting to write songs shortly after—"the same stuff I'm writing about now," he jokes.

During his formative years in Pasadena, Texas (the town on the Houston outskirts that Gilley's would put on the musical map), he began playing the local honky-tonks while still in high school. "I was definitely an outsider," he says of those days. "All my friends were pretty much an older crowd. The people my age were listening to the Eagles and Fleetwood Mac. I didn't necessarily think it was bad—it just wasn't what connected with me. I grew up with the music my dad listened

to. I inherited his record collection, and I'm as big a Lefty Frizzell, Hank Williams and Buck Owens fan as he is."

The kind of country Watson loved had fallen from favor when he moved to Nashville in 1981 to launch his career. He fared a little better after relocating to Los Angeles, where his traditionalism attracted Curb Records, and he released a couple of singles in 1990. Yet he ultimately decided that Texas was the natural habitat for his brand of music, and he quickly won a popular following, along with a record deal with Hightone Records, after moving to Austin in the mid-'90s. His 1995 debut album, Cheatin' Heart Attack, and its "Nashville Rash" anthem spread his renown across the Atlantic, with Europe remaining a popular stronghold for Watson.

Watson returns to the road on the heels of

his stage performance in Ghost Brothers of Dark-land County, written by novelist Stephen King with original music by John Mellencamp. The musical debuted at the Alliance Theatre in Atlanta, Georgia in April of 2012.

He is also at the front of a movement to create a new genre in music. Ameripolitan is a term Watson has been using for years to describe his own music. The term describes music that does not fit in to what is called "Country" today. "Ameripolitan embraces Rockabilly, Western Swing, Hillbilly, Honky Tonk, Soloist, Duos and Instrumentalist. I think they all relate to each other and share the same roots whereas New Country has it's roots planted in mid air and came from someones wallet," says Watson.

The Legends Club is located at the intersection of FM 2484 and IH35.

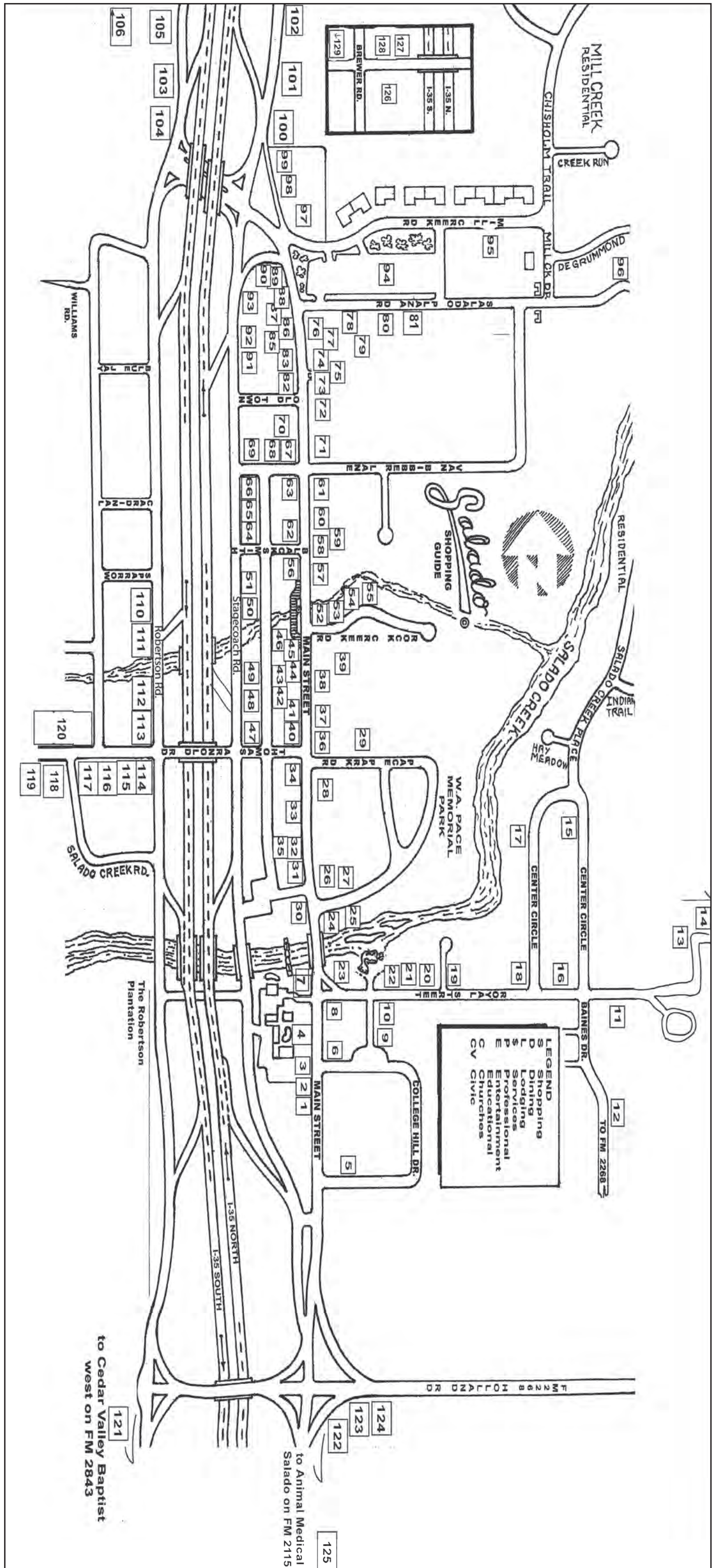

### Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

If you play against opponents who never make a mistake, this article is not for you. But if, as is more likely, your opponents are human and err occasionally, these words will not be in vain.

Assume you're South and West leads the seven of hearts against your four-spade contract. Right away you get a sinking feeling about what's going to happen. After you take East's queen with the ace and lead a trump, you know East will win the trick, cash the king of hearts and return a heart for West to ruff. In the fullness of time you will also lose a club trick and so go down one. But there is no place for a defeatist attitude at the bridge table, so you begin to look for a way out until, after a while, you concoct a scheme that you hope will turn the tide.

When East puts up the queen of hearts, you don't take it with the ace, but play the jack instead! When East continues with a low heart, you win with dummy's ten and cash the ace of diamonds, discarding the ace of hearts! Now you cannot be defeated, and you make four spades. The fly in the ointment is that East can upset your plan by returning the king of hearts at trick two rather than a low heart. The low-heart return by East is an error, to be sure, but it is one he might easily make. So if, as we said before, East is a player who never makes a mistake, he will return the king of hearts, and your grand scheme will go up in smoke. But it certainly doesn't hurt to try!

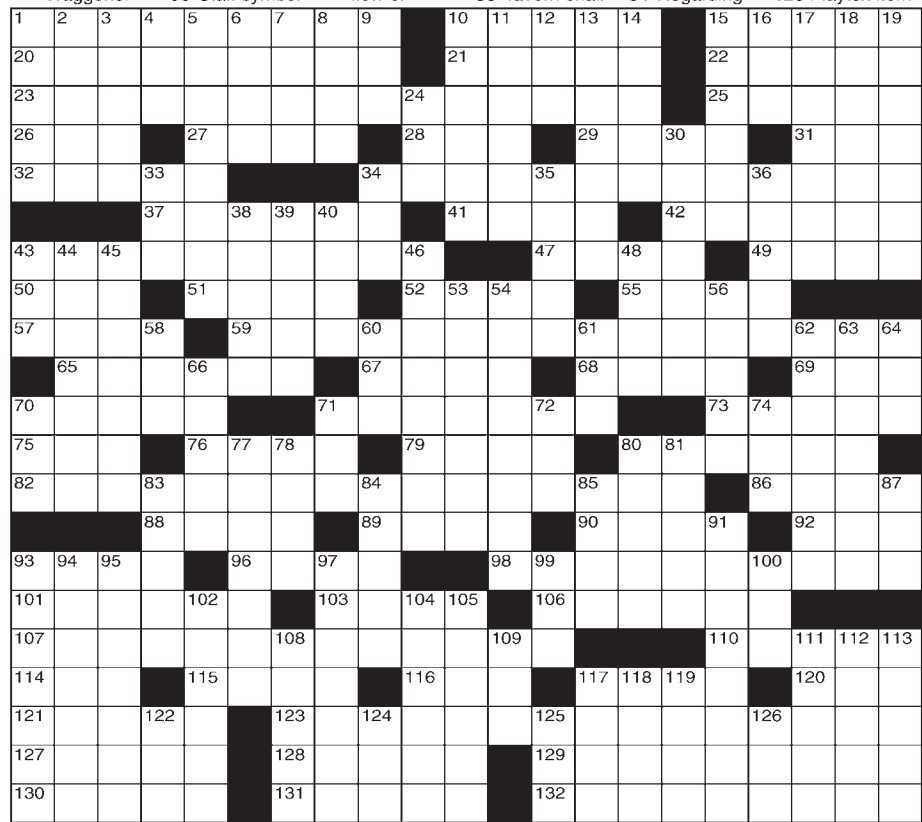

**Ban Texting on Texas Roads, Say Physicians**

A statewide ban on texting while driving passed the Texas House Committee on Transportation this week, with the support of Texas physicians who see the suffering and death that can result from the potentially dangerous practice. The bill, House Bill 63 by Rep. Tom Cradick (R-Midland), would ban text-based communications except when using a GPS device, pressing a button to make a call, or using voice-operated technology. The full House will hear the bill next.

not safe," said Theodore Spinks, MD, an Austin pediatric neurosurgeon, spine surgeon, and member of the Texas Medical Association (TMA). "Texting is considered one of the most dangerous forms of distracted driving, as it is a manual, visual, and mental distraction. Texting while you drive has the potential to kill Texans on our roadways." Dr. Spinks testified on behalf of TMA before the state House Committee on Transportation last week in support of these bills banning texting while

driving: House Bill 41 by Rep. José Menéndez (D-San Antonio) would prohibit wireless communication devices except hands-free devices and establishes fines for offenders. House Bill 347 by Rep. Jim Pitts (R-Waxahachie) would prohibit the use of a wireless communication device while operating a motor vehicle on school property. House Bill 63. The bill's companion legislation is Senate Bill 28 by
