Stuck again

An 18-wheeler found itself in the more-and-more common position of being stuck on the I-35 overpass at FM 2268 (Holland Rd.). The trucker was trying to make the turn so that he could head back south on I-35 after stopping at the JD's 282 Truck Stop. Because of the narrow lanes due to the construction going on in the area and the small size of the bridge to begin with, the truck could not maneuver the curve and got hung up. This has happened multiple times, according to residents of the area, one of whom reported that she has even seen one of the trucks hanging over the edge of the bridge. Aldermen argue about process to get manager

Aldermen will write a job description for a potential City Manager as the next step in the process, after a lengthy and contentious discussion on the matter April 4.

Alderman Shannon Ashe requested that the board consider entering into an agreement with Central Texas Council of Governments (CTCOG) and begin negotiating to put into place a City Administrator.

However, after learning that Mayor Danney McCort had appointed a Citizen's Committee to research the four possible approaches to addressing city governance, she asked that this particular item be tabled until the committee met and brought a proposal to the board.

Other aldermen, however, felt that having the committee discuss how to fill the perceived need for a city manager was, in lay terms, putting the cart before the horse.

"Isn't it backward to select who we want (for city manager) and then write a job description for them," Alderman Hans Fields questioned. "How can we hire someone when we don't know what we want?"

McCort appointed a committee of Fred Brown, Mike Milliser, Steven Ervin, Gerry Reihsen, Don Engleking and Larry Sands to meet with village attorney Alan Bojorquez to examine how the Village should go about filling the need for a city manager or administrator.

Those options include hiring a full time City Manager or Administrator, hiring a part-time person for the position, entering into a contract with CTCOG to provide city management services or to do nothing.

Alderman Susan Terry said that "it is our job to write the job description. I am not sure it is appropriate for a citizens committee to do that."

The board voted 4-0 (Stephen Peters was absent) for the aldermen to meet as a committee and draft the job description. After that, aldermen will consider how to fill the position and begin the necessary steps.

Aldermen also read the Animals and Fowl Ordinance, a 15-page document that deals with public nuisance animals, including the neighbor's dog that poops in your yard every day and barks all night. The board is set to adopt this code at its April 18 meeting.

History gets retold

The Salado Historical Society has an updated addition of the history of Salado now on sale at several locations in town including, The Tourism and Chamber of Commerce offices, Charlotte's of Salado, Garden Spirits, The Strawberry Patch, The 1860 Shop and Taylor's for \$3 a copy. The cost was kept low because of a generous donation from First State Bank

The new book took

over a year to compile by Bill Kinnison and Mary Belle Brown. It has been expanded from 16 to 52 pages with new information on the founding of Salado and Salado College. Included in the updated history, which was written originally in 2000 are a few short biographies of early Salado pioneers.

Library closes for renovation

Salado Public Library will close for approximately four weeks on April 15 to allow for the renovation of the current library space and the moving of collections into the expanded space.

The renovation of the current space will include new carpet and paint.

The Friends of the Salado Public Library will host an Open House at a date to be announced later.

After more than two years of planning, the Salado Public Library broke ground on a 3,200 sq. ft. expansion last fall.

At that time, Library directors planned on an annual mortgage of \$15,300 to pay down the remaining debt on the \$362,600 expansion project. However, Gail Robinson announced that the Library expansion would be opened debt-free, because of successful fundraising and a \$50,000 Tocker Foundation grant for furnishings and shelving throughout the Library.

"We have been raising funds through our Very Special Patron Card campaign," said Bill Kinnison, President of the Friends. "The Salado Historical Society and Library book clubs have donated funds for specific pieces of furniture in the new areas."

Very Special Patrons will be honored with an engraved book plaque acknowledging their contributions.

The Library District board contracted with Gene Doss Construction for the project. Larry Neil, Architect, from Temple provided architectural and

professional services for the project.

"The expansion will include new areas for children, teens, adult computers and a larger public meeting room with restrooms," stated Librarian Jeanie Lively.

The new areas match the library's current interior and exterior.

"This is a major project requiring relocation of all the books and shelves in the current library," Robinson said, adding, "once complete, the entire library will look brand new."

New landscaping will be put in place at the entrance of the library.

The Book Ends used book store that is operated by the Friends of the Library will also get a face lift before the Library re-opens. The garage door has been replaced by an entrance door and window and an awning will be put over the door. The bookstore will have new signage showing its hours of operation.

The Library and a group of Library District patrons, with the assistance of Larry Irsik of ARCHITEXAS, an architectural consultant from Austin, began the project in March 2010, to assess the space needs of the library.

The need arose when it was determined the children's section did not have sufficient space for the number of children attending programs, the community needed free meeting space, and that for every new book coming into the Library one old book had to be "weeded out."

More sculptures could be heading to Village this fall

Salado may get more public art after Michael Epps, from the Texas Society of Sculptors visits here April 11.

Epps will meet with Public Arts League of Salado, business members, Village officials and the Tourism department to discuss adding the Village to a circuit of art that features about 100 pieces.

According to Melissa Paxton, President of PALS, the pieces would be placed at the Sculpture Garden, on Main Street and in front of businesses.

"The goal is to sell art, increase tourism, and raise the quality of culture for Salado," Paxton said.

"He will discuss how we can bring more outdoor sculpture to Salado next Fall," Paxton said.

Following the 11 a.m. meeting at the Visitors Center, Epps will tour the garden.

"Coincidentally, we also have a group of 50 people coming from Abilene to tour the Sculpture Garden at noon on the same day," Paxton said.

St. Joseph's celebrates consecration

Following the consecration of the St. Joseph's Episcopal Church in Salado April 3, Bishop C. Andrew Doyle baptized four into the faith and confirmed three others.

"Let the door be opened," the Right Rev. Doyle said as he banged his crozier on the blue door of the small church that seats about 100.

"Peace be to this house and to all who enter here," he said as he stepped into the doorway followed by more than 100 who came for the service.

Presented for baptism were Adelino James

Vickers, Michael Rudolf Stollberg, Laura Diane Osborne and Veronika Ashely Vick.

Presented for confirmation were Kimberly Michelle Austin-Beasley, Andrea Lynn McLester and Tita Marie Ramon.

Following the service, the church members gathered for refreshments and visitation with the Right Rev. Doyle, Bishop of the Diocese of Texas, which is the second largest Episcopal diocese in the nation.

Assisting the Bishop were Rev. Robert F. Bliss, who is the Vicar of St. Joseph's Episcopal Church

and Tamara Clothier, Iona School Deacon Track.

St. Joseph's began as a Parish Mission of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Belton.

In 1996 The Rev. Joseph Sheldon celebrated the Ash Wednesday liturgy in the little chapel.

On March 20, 1999, St. Joseph's Chapel was dedicated as a Parish Mission of St. Luke's, Belton in a ceremony conducted jointly by Father Joe Sheldon and Father Tom Wallace.

In June, 2009 Fr. Tom Wallace retired and was replaced by seminarian Bob Bliss who would be

assigned to St. Luke's and St. Joseph's as their Rector upon his Ordination.

Regular Sunday services became a reality for the members St. Joseph on July 1, 2009. Soon a small choir was formed for the Sunday Eucharist.

By 2010 the congregation had grown from about six on Sunday mornings to about 36.

A new addition was added on to the existing structure of the Chapel and an additional 20 seats were added.

Deacon Bob was ordained Father Bob on Jan. 8, 2011.

Our Volunteer Fire Chief, Charles Young was recently replaced after several years of service to our community. We have all witnessed him arriving first at many of the personal emergencies we've had in the community. We've witnessed him being available 24/7 at any and all such cases. We've seen that he has participated in community affairs such as Neighborhood Watch Meetings and spoken to service groups such as Lions and Rotary whenever requested. He has provided Leadership to the Community Emergency Response volunteer group as needed. He has been effective as a fund raiser such that we have up-to-date equipment and new facilities.

Out of the blue we hear he has involuntarily been replaced. The community has not been informed by any means of communication as to why. He has been replaced by an individual of whom no public issuance has been provided as to his background and qualifications. The decision was apparently made by a group of which little is known of as to their qualifications to sit on such a Board. Has the community been provided any information as to the individuals that are on it?

The Village provides the Volunteer Fire Department a substantial annual stipend yet they don't seem to report to the Village Board as does the police department. Even worse the Village Board seems to be indifferent or disinterested in such reporting or the details of the recent dismissal.

The investigative arm of our local newspaper has as yet to have provided insight.

A Victory for Missile Defense

Kim Jong Un has done the near-impossible. The newly minted supreme leader of North Korea has forced the Obama administration to admit that the United States needs more missile defense.

Since it was introduced by Ronald Reagan in the 1980s, Democrats have reflexively denounced the idea of a defense against incoming ballistic missiles as wholly unworkable, impossibly expensive and dangerously destabilizing. Much better to leave ourselves exposed and work to sweet-talk our enemies out of their hostility and their weapons.

In keeping with this approach, upon taking office the Obama administration promptly nixed additional interceptors planned for deployment on the West Coast against the budding North Korean missile threat. George W. Bush had already put 30 interceptors at two sites on the West Coast, a symptom of his "Cold War mindset" that the supple and sophisticated Obama administration had no use for.

As it turns out, it is North Korea that truly has the Cold War -- or perhaps worse -- mindset. In the words of new Secretary of Defense Chuck Hagel, Pyongyang has "made advances in its capabilities and has engaged in a

series of irresponsible and reckless provocations." It conducted a third nuclear test, apparently a successful one. It put a satellite in orbit with a Taepodong-2 missile. It displayed what appeared to be a road-mobile ICBM.

While threatening to "miserably destroy" U.S. units in South Korea and turn that country's capital into a "nuclear sea of fire," Pyongyang has vowed that North Koreans "will be exercising our right to pre-emptive nuclear attack against the headquarters of the aggressor," which is, of course, none other than the United States.

Rather than simply trust that a lunatic regime running its country like a vast prison camp will rationally calculate its self-interest as we would hope, the Obama administration says it is going to add back the 14 canceled interceptors. This will take the number of West Coast interceptors from 30 to 44, but with unnecessary expense and delay. The new interceptors should be online in 2017, or by the end of the president's second term.

While the restoration is

heartening, the Obama administration has pulled the plug on the development of more technologically advanced defense systems and can't overcome its compulsion to make unilateral concessions to the Russians. Hagel said the administration won't complete the final phase of a defense system in Europe to guard against an Iranian launch targeting the United States.

Why seek protection from Kim Jong Un, but not Ayatollah Khamenei?

Liberals once insisted that a missile couldn't possibly be made to hit another missile. Now, the technology has been demonstrated to work again and again. It is one of the reasons that the Israelis didn't invade Gaza in response to the rocket barrage emanating from there a few months ago. It protected itself with the Iron Dome defense system that intercepted about 85 percent of the rockets.

The Israelis don't have the luxury of abiding by stale arms-control orthodoxies. Neither do we. Evidently, though, only Kim Jong Un and his ilk have the power to convince the Obama administration of it.

The gagged townspeople of Sanford, New York are suing their town board over the infringement of their First Amendment rights.

Last fall, Sanford officials went further, imperiously imposing a gag order on their own citizens. It seems that opponents of the profiteering frack rush were using the board's public comment session to...well, to comment publicly.

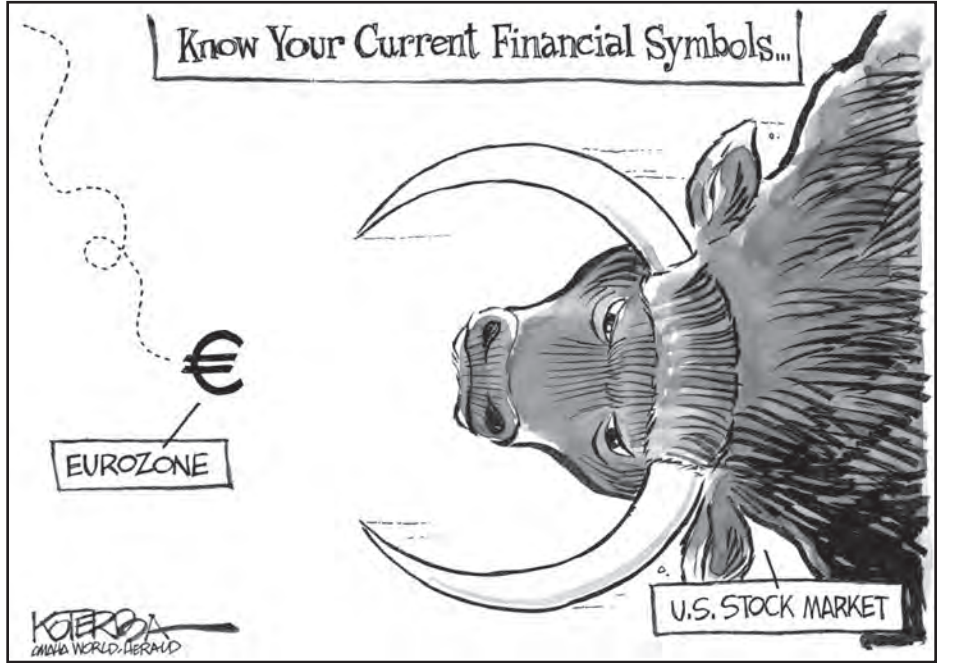
Irritated, the board decreed that any topic could

be discussed at its meetings — except fracking.

The town leveled this autocratic restriction on people's democratic rights by saying that the ongoing discussion on fracking got in the way of other board business. The people themselves can dare to set the agenda by insisting that our local leaders discuss the big issues that matter most to our families and communities.

CTAS Star Party set at Overlook

The Moon takes on the Bull this month, as part of an alignment in the western sky. A waxing crescent moon, just 3 days past new and only 10 percent illuminated, will be surrounded by Jupiter and the Pleiades and Hyades star clusters, within the constellation Taurus (the Bull).

The Central Texas Astronomical Society will host free public star parties 7:30- 10 p.m. April 13 at Overlook Park outside Belton. CTAS members will provide telescopes for public viewing. Guests are also welcome to bring their own telescopes.

The Beehive Cluster (M44) is an open cluster, located just to the upper right of the constellation Leo (the Lion). About 50 of the almost 1000 stars within M44 are visible through binoculars. Leo looks like a large backwards question mark, with the bright star Regulus as the period. Messier objects M65 and M66 are twin spiral galaxies in Leo.

The group will look at these and many other celestial objects this month. Check their web site, www.centexastronomy.org, for directions to the site closest to you. Participants may want to bring a small flashlight and lawn chair. Cancellation due to weather, a notice will be posted on website by 5:30 p.m.

Each year, the Alumnus of the Year is awarded to an outstanding Baylor graduate and supporter. This year's honoree is Billy Ray Hall, attorney at Prater & Ridley Law Firm, alternate Municipal Judge for the city of Harker Heights, Business Law professor at Central Texas College, Constitutional Law Professor at Texas A&M Central Texas.

He is on the Board of Directors for the Dr. Pep-

per Museum, Baylor Bear Foundation, and Texas Sports Hall of Fame. A 1990 graduate of Baylor, he earned a BA with FOUR majors: English, Political Science, Religion, and Speech Communication. Also in 1990 he earned a master's degree in Communication Studies and in 1995 earned a Ph.D in Political Science. In 2000, he earned a Doctorate of Jurisprudence from Baylor Law School. Now in its second printing is his book, *Unlocking Government Gridlock*. He has season tickets to Baylor football games, men's and women's basketball and softball.

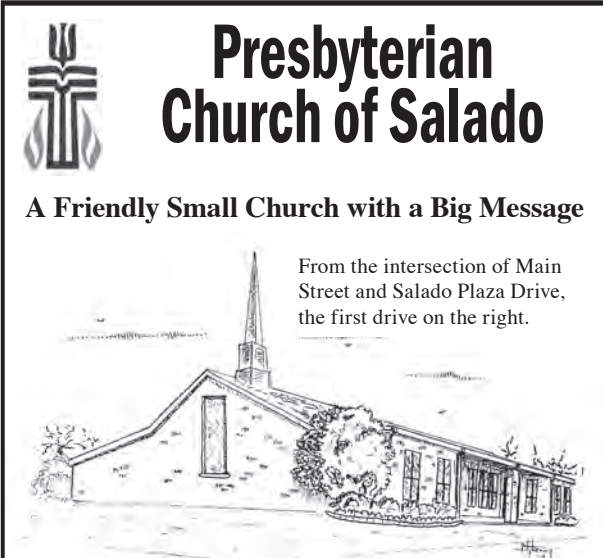

Kase Spears followed with a two-day total of 157, shooting an 81 at Wildflower and a 76 at Mill Creek.

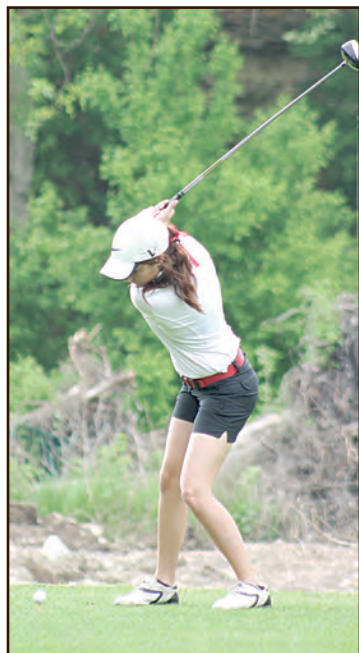
Kyle Heiner shot rounds of 83 and 84 for a 177 third place finish.



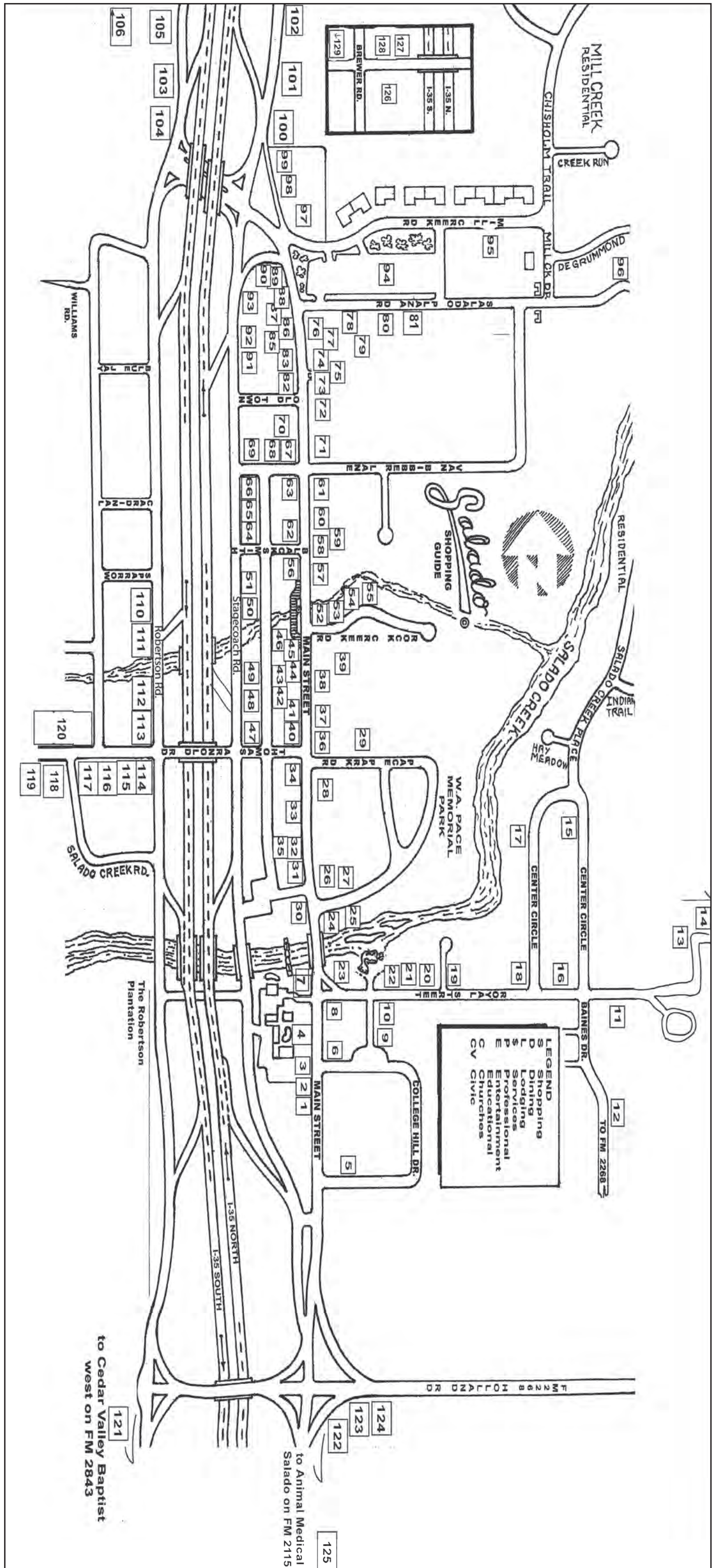

Desperate circumstances Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Assume you're declarer in four spades and West leads the K-A and another diamond. East ruffs and returns a club, on which you hopefully play the queen, but West covers with the king, and you win with dummy's ace.

You lead a trump and finesse the queen, West discarding a club. Learning that East started with five trumps is enlightening, but while it solves the problem of avoiding a trump loser, it does not solve the problem of avoiding a club loser.

Thus, if you next crossed to the queen of hearts to take a second trump finesse, then led a heart to the ace and took another trump finesse, you'd pick up East's king, but you'd still have to lose a club and go down one.

It can't be right to settle for such an outcome without trying to do something about it. So you start looking for a line of play that offers you a chance for the contract.

The solution is not all that hard to find. At trick six, you lead a low heart and finesse dummy's ten! When the finesse succeeds, you are well on the way to victory.

You take a second trump finesse, lead a heart to the queen and take a third trump finesse. The ace of trumps draws East's king, after which you lead the king of hearts to the ace and deposit your club loser on dummy's jack of diamonds.

It is true that you must take what appears to be a foolish first-round heart finesse to make the contract, but you can easily justify that play by saying that desperate circumstances require desperate measures.

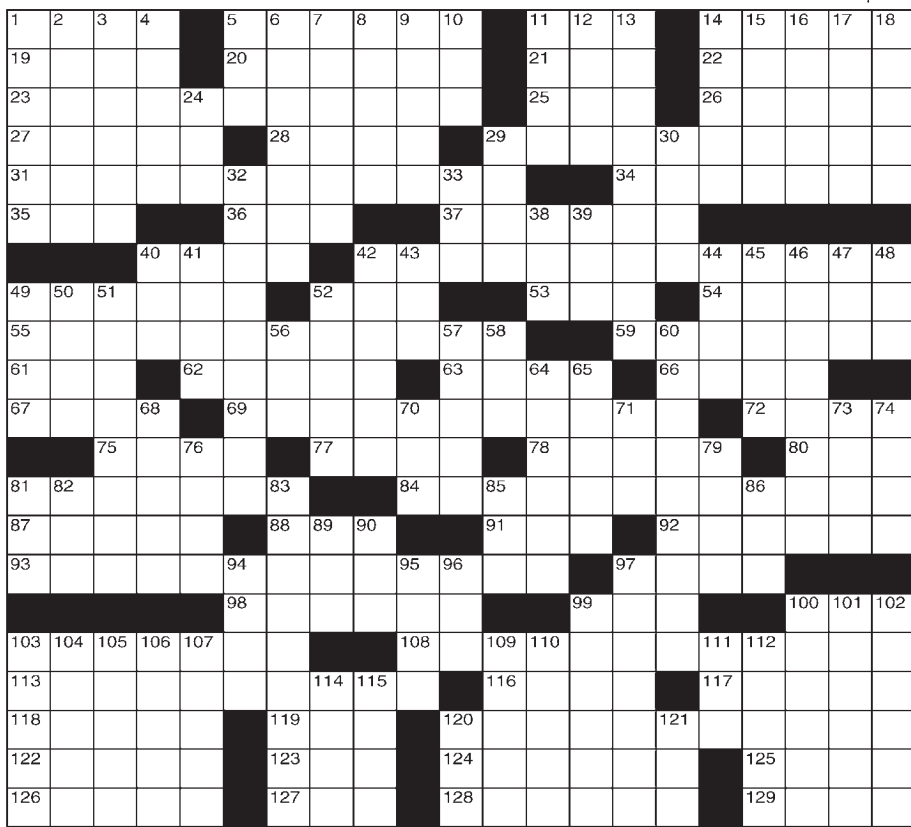

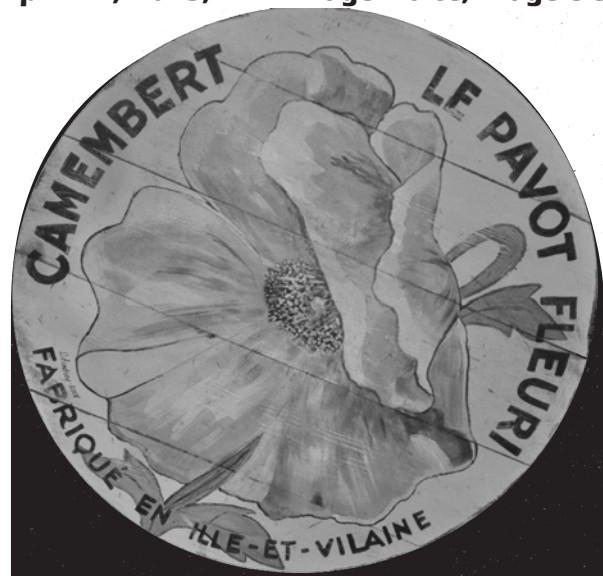
