

Parties agree 'in principle' on sale of golf course

Salado Golf Club at Mill Creek claims that it has reached an agreement "in principle" for the purchase of the Mill Creek golf course operations, real estate and assets.

Bruce Bolick, certified public accountant, working on behalf of the Salado Golf Club, would not discuss details of the agreement, following direction of the interim board of directors.

Instead, interested parties are invited to attend an open meeting at 7:30 p.m. May 16 at the Municipal Building during which the details of the proposal will be discussed at length and in-depth.

The 7:30 p.m. meeting follows the regular 6 p.m. Village of Salado Board of Aldermen meeting. Aldermen met in an hour-long closed-door executive session 5 p.m. May 13 to deliberate on real estate, as authorized by the Texas Open Meetings Act.

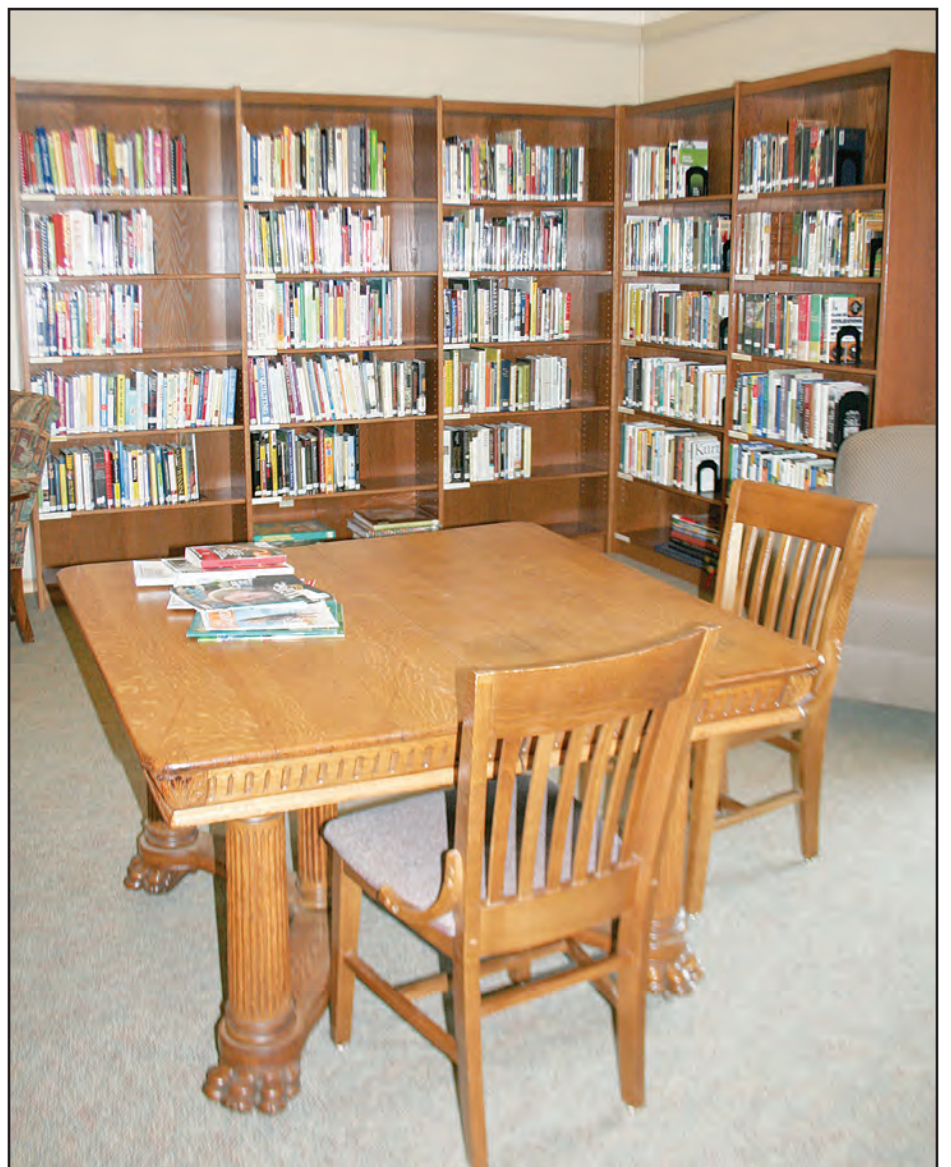
While the meeting was closed to the public, its timing has led to speculation that the Village of Salado may act to provide the missing piece in the financing puzzle for the purchase of the golf course.

Chapter 380 of the Texas Local Government Code allows for both home rule and general law cities "to provide monies, loans, city personnel, and city services for promotion and encouragement of eco-

nomonic development."

In April, representatives from Salado Golf Club met with Morris Foster and offered \$1 million cash for the purchase of the real estate and assets of Mill Creek Country Club. Foster countered with an offer of \$1.5 million, of which \$500,000 would be financed by Foster with terms and conditions to be agreed upon by both parties. As the holder of the largest debt, Foster insisted upon being the first lien holder.

The Salado Golf Club board rejected that counter at the time because it "violates the Prospectus that was filed with the State of Texas," Bolick said.

New space is available for meetings, for genealogy and for children's books. The Book Ends shop has also been renovated recently and is again open for business.

New aldermen to discuss city administrator May 16

With newly-seated officials May 16, the Village of Salado board of aldermen will discuss entering into an agreement with the Central Texas Council of Government (CTCOG) and to begin negotiations to punt into place a city administrator.

Village of Salado will canvass the results of the May 11 election and swear-in newly elected aldermen during a 6 p.m. May 16 meeting at the municipal building, 301 N. Stagecoach Rd.

Hans Fields was re-elected to a second two-year term on the Board of Aldermen on May 11. He received 105 votes cast in

the election.

Fred Brown and Dr. Michael McDougal were also elected to the board. Brown received 113 votes cast and McDougal received 64 votes cast in the election.

Jeff Ling, who announced that he was not seeking election to the board, received 50 votes cast in the election.

This was the lowest voter turnout in the history of the Village of Salado.

After the swearing-in, the board will appoint a new Mayor Pro Tem. Stephen Peters did not seek election this term. He served as Mayor Pro Tem.

Both Brown and Dr.

McDougal have publicly supported the CTCOG proposal to provide part-time city administrative services to the Village. Hans Fields has also voiced support for city administration, but has questioned how the Village can pay for this additional cost. The three aldermen voiced this opinion at a Salado Chamber of Commerce candidate forum in April.

The specifics of any contract, whether with CTCOG or another entity, have not been discussed.

In other business, aldermen will discuss additional storage needs for Tourism.

Third Cav Brave Rifles bring annual run to Salado May 18

The Third Cavalry Association will hold the Second Annual Brave Rifles 5K/10K Run at the Youth Athletic Fields off Rose Lane 6 a.m.-noon May 18.

The first Brave Rifles 5K/10K Run was held last year on Fort Hood and attracted 1,000 military and civilian runners from the Central Texas area. This

year the Third Cavalry Association is partnering with the Village of Salado to attract more runners.

The event is open to the public and features 5K and 10K distances in the following categories: running, walking, and wheelchair/hand cycle. Pets and strollers are also welcome. Other attractions include live music, a rock-climb-

ing wall, a bouncy house, as well as other children's activities at no extra cost. Local vendors will be on site offering food and other concessions.

The Third Cavalry Association is registered as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. All proceeds from the event will benefit the Soldiers and Family members of the 3d Cavalry

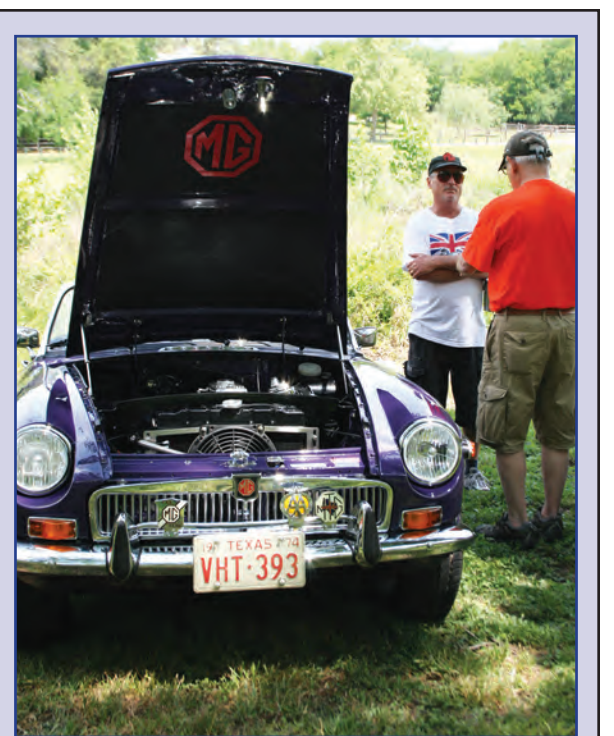

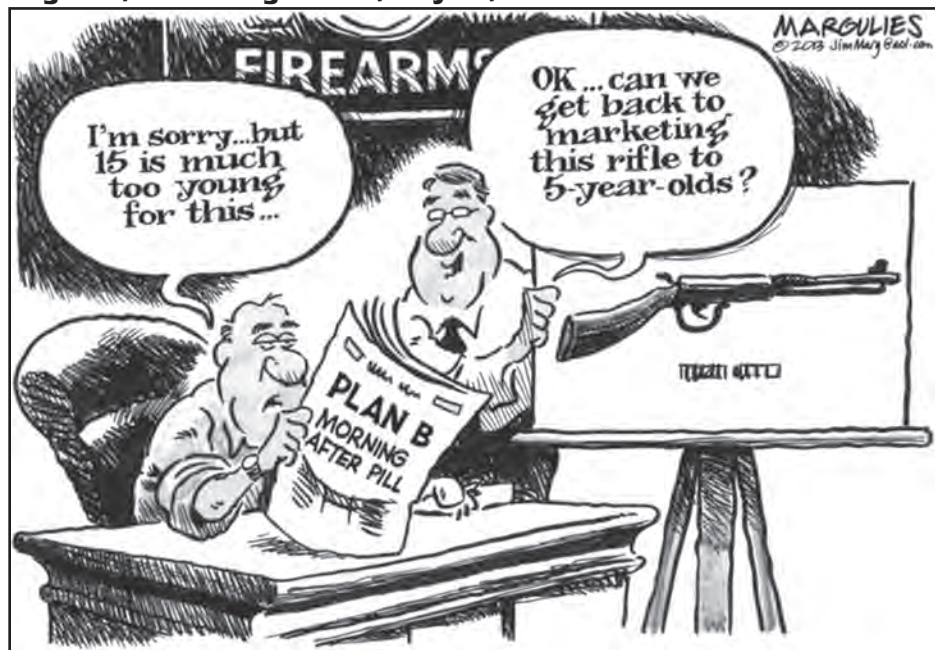

The euphemism imperative

President Barack Obama was proud to become the first sitting president to address Planned Parenthood the other week. But not proud enough to utter the word “abortion.”

The right to abortion is the sneakiest, most shame-faced of all American rights. It hides behind evasion and euphemism and cant.

So President Obama sang a hymn of praise to Planned Parenthood at the organization’s annual conference without mentioning what makes it so distinctive and controversial. He said its core principle is “that women should be allowed to make their own decisions about their own health.” He excoriated opponents involved “in an orchestrated and historic effort to roll back basic rights when it comes to women’s health.”

Listening to him, you could be forgiven for thinking that the country is riven by a fierce dispute over whether women should be allowed to choose their own OB-GYNs or to get cancer screenings. In his speech, the president said the word “cancer” seven times. About that he is happy to be forthright.

Imagine if he had been similarly frank about the

core of Planned Parenthood’s work: “In 2011, according to your annual report, your clinics or affiliates performed 330,000 abortions. That’s a lot of abortion. Over 10 years more than 3 million. Thank you, Planned Parenthood. Think of all those women who wanted to terminate their pregnancies, and you were there for them. That’s what you are about. And that’s what *this country* is about.”

Before that crowd, he might have gotten rousing applause, but talking in such honest terms would have been a gross faux pas. The unwritten rule when the left discusses abortion is that it shouldn’t be called “abortion,” but always “health” or, more specifically “reproductive health” -- although abortion is the opposite of reproduction and, for one party involved, the opposite of health.

The trial of Philadelphia abortionist Kermit Gosnell has been an exercise in stripping away euphemism. He is accused of murdering babies because he allegedly didn’t manage to kill them in the womb

and had to finish the job outside the womb. His case is so discomfiting for liberals not only because it is such a stark picture of the seamy, money-grubbing side of abortion, but because it illustrates how slight the difference is between late-term abortion -- or late-term “health” -- and what nearly everyone recognizes as a crime.

In a story about the case, The New York Times referred to the newborns killed by Gosnell as “fetuses.” The definition of a fetus according to Merriam-Webster is “an unborn or unhatched vertebrate.” By definition, the newborns weren’t fetuses; they weren’t *unborn*. But the Times couldn’t bring itself to use the word “baby.”

This is the crux of the matter: If it is a baby outside the womb, why not inside the womb? If a procedure to end its life is wrong outside the womb, why isn’t it wrong inside the womb?

The essence of abortion is that there are two lives when you start and one when you finish. If it were your business to perform them and fight all restrictions on them, no matter how slight, you wouldn’t want to be forthright and honest about it, either.

FASHION VICTIMS

The gravitational pull of corporate greed makes clothing factories prone to disasters like the recent tragedy in Bangladesh.

You see it in stores across our country and around the world: colorful and stylish clothing with happy-sounding brand names like Children’s Place, Papaya, Joe Fresh, and Mango.

But you don’t see the factories where these cheerful garments are made. Nor are we shown the strained faces of the impoverished workers who make them, paid little more than a dollar a day for long, hard shifts. We only catch a glimpse of the grim reality sewn into these happy brands when yet another factory is in the news for collapsing or burning down, bringing a grotesque death to hapless workers trapped inside.

It’s a horror that keeps happening. And after each disaster, the brand-name marketers and retail profiteers cluck with sympathy for the families of the dead and decry the “tragic acci-

dent.” As Scott Nova of the Workers Rights Consortium put it after the most recent atrocity, when a Bangladesh factory collapsed and crushed hundreds of garment workers, “The response is always the same: vague promises and public relations dodges, while the pile of corpses grows even higher.”

Is there something about clothing factories that makes them disaster magnets? Yes — the massive gravitational pull of corporate greed. Not merely the greed of sleazy

factory owners, but most significantly the greed of such “respectable” retailers as Walmart, Benetton, Gap, and H&M.

The April collapse in Bangladesh that killed more than 700 garment workers wasn’t an “accident.” It was the inevitable result of a Western business model that demands such low prices from offshore suppliers that worker safety is their dead-last priority.

In the corporate hierarchy, death is coldly built into the consumer price and routinely accepted in the boardrooms as a justifiable means of adding another dime to the bottom line. For information and action, go to WorkersRights.org.

Red Tape on the Rise

Heritage Forum

“Do as I say, not as I do,” goes an ironic saying worthy of Mark Twain. It’s a phrase that is well-suited to the political field.

Take what one politician said about regulations during President Obama’s first term. After noting the need for a “proper balance” between making needed rules and allowing markets to work as freely as possible, he said:

“Sometimes, those rules have gotten out of balance, placing unreasonable burdens on business -- burdens that have stifled innovation and have had a chilling effect on growth and jobs.”

In fact, it was President Obama himself who said that, in an op-ed for The Wall Street Journal.

He was right. The rules are indeed out of balance. Instead of having only those regulations that are truly necessary to protect the public, we have a plethora of rules that go far beyond that. And yes, they are making it difficult for businesses to innovate, invest or hire.

But don’t pay attention to what the president has said on regulation. Consider what he’s done. Has he worked to restore that “proper balance”?

Unfortunately, no. A new report from The Heritage Foundation, “Red Tape Rising,” shows that the regulatory situation has worsened over the last few years. And it’s costing all of us.

During President Obama’s first four years in office, 131 new major regulations were imposed. “Major” indicates a rule expected to cost the economy at least \$100 million per year. The price tag of many is much higher. Plus, numerous smaller regulations also

add to the overall cost.

According to “Red Tape Rising,” it’s expensive. During the president’s first term, the annual regulatory burdens on Americans increased by nearly \$70 billion.

That’s right, billion with a “b.” Nine zeros. “If a billion kids made a human tower, they would stand up past the moon,” writes David M. Schwartz in his book “How Much Is A Million?” “If you sat down to count from one to one billion, you would be counting for 95 years.”

The Obama administration of course isn’t the first to increase regulation, but it has done so at a pace far exceeding its predecessors. George W. Bush, for instance, imposed 52 regulations costing about \$16 billion during his first four years in office.

The most costly new rules are fuel-economy standards adopted by the EPA and the Department of Transportation. These add hundreds of dollars to the sticker price of a new vehicle. The EPA says what people will save in fuel costs more than offsets a higher price tag.

Yet customers prefer the safety and power of larger vehicles. As “Red Tape Rising” puts it: “If fuel efficiency was such a good deal for consumers, why are regulations needed to force them to buy more fuel-efficient vehicles? Either consumers are wrong, or the regulators are wrong.”

When you have an administration deciding that consumers are wrong, that’s overreach. That’s “out of

balance.”

Then there are the limits the EPA has placed on power-plant emissions, which will hike utility bills for consumers.

And there are new rules in the pipeline. Hundreds of them, primarily related to Obamacare and the Dodd-Frank financial-regulation statute have yet to be written. So the true price tag is “\$70 billion and climbing.”

Worse, even as the number and cost of regulations is rising, oversight and transparency is on the wane. According to “Red Tape Rising,” the White House office charged with overseeing regulatory policy has not had a director since last August, referring an appointee to the Senate for confirmation only last month. Meanwhile, legal deadlines for key reports on rulemaking have been ignored.

There are several common-sense steps that lawmakers can take. One is to require that Congress approve any new major regulation. For now, government agencies can act autonomously, and that’s not right. They should be accountable to the people.

Establishing a “sunset” date for federal regulations would also help. Old regulations tend to stay on the books even after they’ve outlived their usefulness.

Not all regulations are bad. But all of them cost. Let’s make sure we leave only the most necessary ones on the books -- and restore that crucial “balance.”

Citizen gun owners must take a seat at the table and join the discussion to decide what to do about this issue..... OR..... they can shrug their shoulders and await

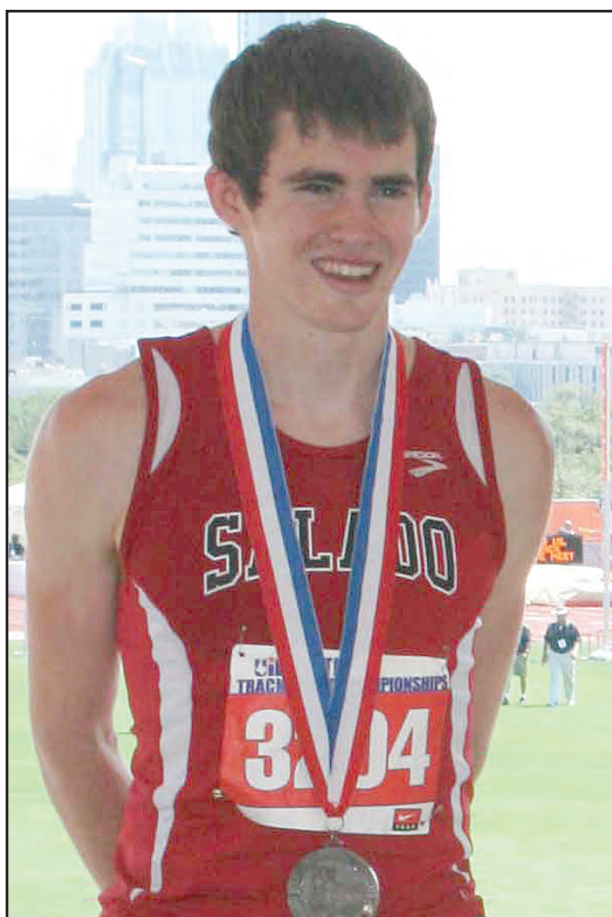

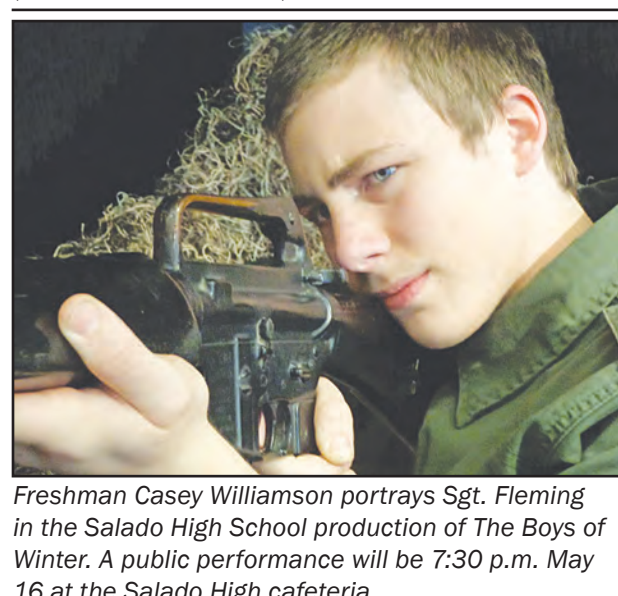

For more than a decade, Baylor alumnus Frank Jasek tracked down the stories behind the names on the plaques that are affixed to the granite lamp-posts scattered around the campus of Baylor University.

Each small plaque honors a Baylor alumn who was killed in action in service to the country.

The culmination of the work is a 323-page book "Soldiers of the Wooden Cross: Military Memorials of Baylor University" published in late 2012 and now available as a hard-back edition.

Fletcher's Books and Antiques on North Main Street will host a book signing and reception 4-8 p.m. May 24.

"Soldiers of the Wooden Cross" tells the story of each of the Baylor veterans killed in service who are honored on plaques across campus.

Civil War and World War I veterans (recognized on plaques in the Texas Collection) each have brief entries. The majority of the book, however, honors the 145 Baylor alumni killed in service during World War II, Korea, Vietnam and Iraqi Freedom.

Each of those veterans is given a two-page spread in the book that includes family photographs, letters home, newspaper articles and yearbook photos and articles.

This labor of love took more than 10 years to complete. Jasek says that his interest in the memorials began when he stopped to read one of the plaques and wanted to know more about the man's story. He found some information in the Texas Collection and dug up more from government archives.

But the real story came

from interviews with surviving family members and friends.

Jasek, a 1973 graduate of Baylor, is a preservation specialist for Baylor Libraries.

Grant Teaff wrote the forward to the book. In it, he states, "If you love Baylor University and you appreciated the freedom we have in this great country, you should read this book. To know and to understand that former students who dreamed the big dreams and never fulfilled them, gave the full measure of their life

to protect America, their families and the freedom for following generations to pursue their education."

"I would like people to know who these people were by reading the book and knowing their story, and not to forget what they did," Jasek said in a recent interview. "They didn't have a chance to come back and own a business or be presidents - they didn't have a chance. Their lives were taken from them. But they knew the risks. And so they stood in line, and - the Sioux Indians have a saying, "Brave hearts

to the front." They were the brave hearts, and they were killed in the war. I think that's what I want people to know, to understand the sacrifice."

"For all Americans that died while in the service of their country we cannot forget that they lived, they mattered, they loved and they were loved," he wrote in the book.

The book is available from Fletcher's Books for \$50 per copy. A portion of the funds will be used to establish a scholarship for a Baylor student.

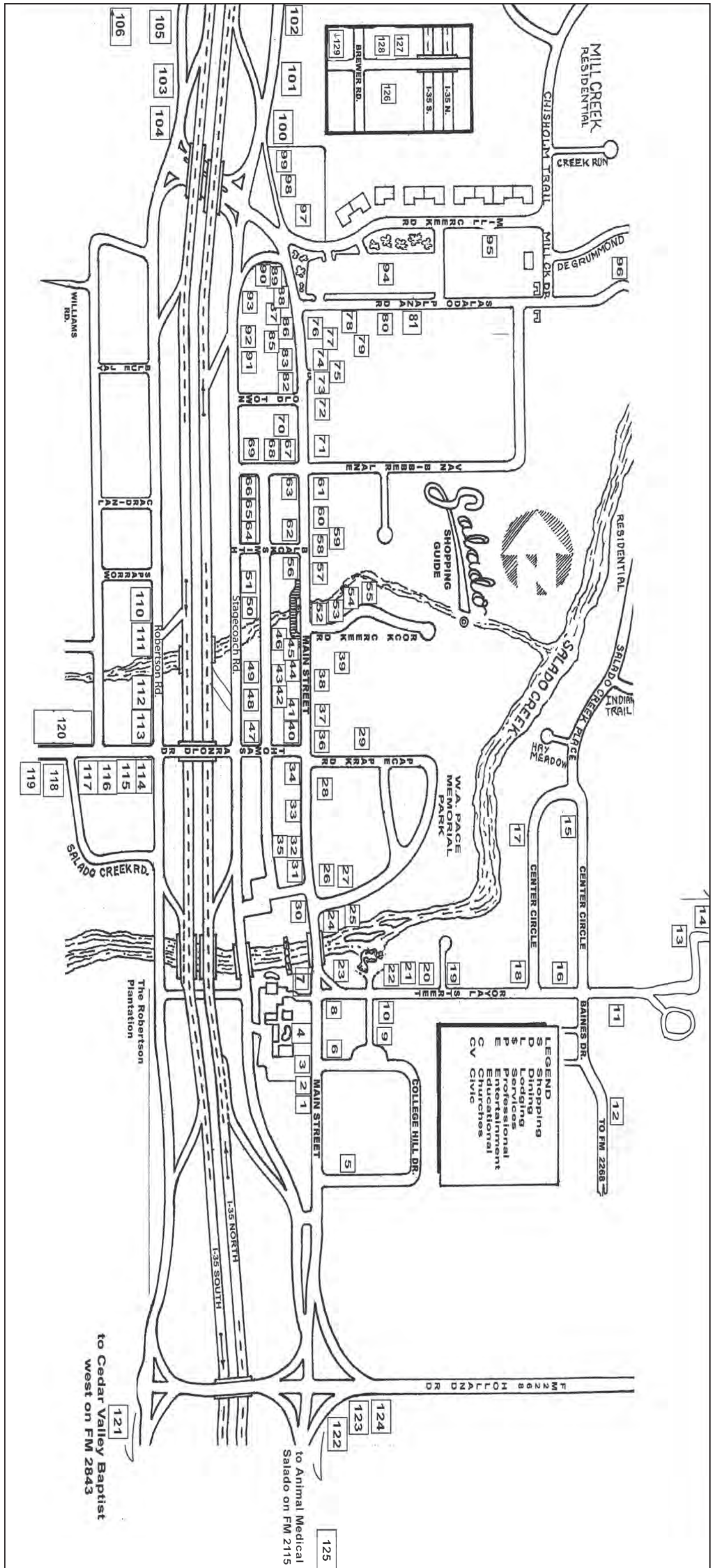

The anti-percentage play Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

There are times when a player must abandon the so-called percentage play because his common sense tells him that the play favored by the percentages cannot succeed.

For example, take this deal where South gets to four hearts on the bidding shown and West leads the nine of spades. East wins with the jack and plays the A-K of spades. Declarer ruffs with the ten and draws trumps, ending in his hand.

South next leads the ten of diamonds, losing the finesse to East's king. Back comes a diamond, declarer taking the ace and then the queen.

South is now at the crucial stage of the play. He has lost three tricks, so he cannot afford to lose a club trick. If he follows the standard approach of leading the nine of clubs to the king and then finesses the jack, he winds up down one.

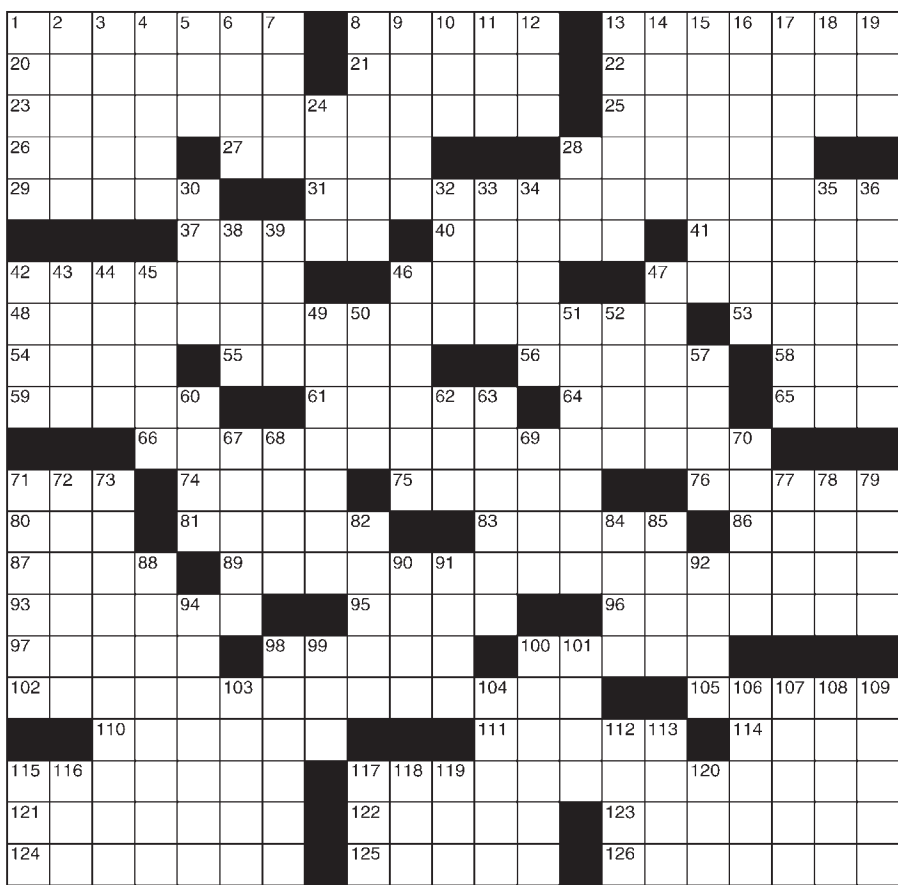
But if South is alive to the situation, as he should be, he rejects this line of play. He remembers that East passed originally and has already shown up with the A-K-J of spades and the king of diamonds. East therefore cannot have the queen of clubs, since he surely would have opened the bidding had he held that card as well.

So declarer credits West with the club queen and adjusts his play accordingly. He leads the jack of clubs at trick ten, planning to let the jack ride if West follows low. If West covers the jack with the queen, declarer wins with dummy's king, returns a club, finesses the nine and so makes the contract. True, South has to be lucky to find East with the ten of clubs, but this is manufactured rather than random good luck.

Make your grill the MVP of week night dinners

GRILLED FLANK STEAK WITH HONEY MUSTARD GLAZE

Flank steak is a flame-cooked favorite, and this glaze made with Dijon mustard and honey couldn't be simpler. Serve the sliced meat over a bed of greens and tomatoes or, for a heartier meal, over cooked whole grains.

- 1/4 cup Dijon mustard
- 1/4 cup 365 Everyday Value Rainforest Honey
- 1 (1 1/2-pound) flank or skirt steak
- 3/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Prepare a grill for medium-high-heat cooking. In a small bowl, whisk together mustard and honey. Set aside



2 tablespoons of mixture for glazing the steak while grilling; the rest will be used as a sauce. Sprinkle steak with salt and pepper, and grill for 3 minutes on each side. Brush both sides of the steak with the 2 tablespoons of Dijon and honey mixture and continue to cook, turning once or twice, until the steak reaches the desired doneness, 2 to 5 minutes longer. Let steak rest on a cutting board covered loosely with foil for 10 minutes

before slicing and serving. Meanwhile, whisk reserved Dijon mixture together with about 1 tablespoon water. Serve the extra sauce for drizzling over the steak or on top of side dishes, as desired.

GRILLED CHICKEN AND PEPPERS OVER ARUGULA

Here's a delicious grilled meal that can easily make it to the table for weeknight dinners. Splitting the chicken breasts will help them to cook quickly and evenly.



- 2 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves (about 1 1/4 pounds total)
- 7 tablespoons prepared Italian dressing, divided
- 2 bell peppers (red or green, or 1 of each), quartered
- 1/4 small red onion, thinly sliced
- 6 lightly packed cups arugula leaves

Split the chicken breasts by placing them on a cutting board and using a sharp knife to slice evenly through them, while applying slight

pressure on top with the other hand.

Prepare a grill for medium-high heat cooking. Brush chicken breasts on both sides with 3 tablespoons of dressing. In a small bowl, toss bell peppers with 2 tablespoons dressing. Grill chicken and peppers, turning occasionally, until chicken is cooked through and peppers are tender and browned, 6 to 7 minutes. (Take care that raw chicken does not touch the peppers.)

Meanwhile, toss onion and arugula with remaining 2 tablespoons dressing and arrange on a platter. Slice chicken and peppers; place them on top of arugula.

PESTO TURKEY BURGERS WITH GRILLED HALLOUMI

Halloumi cheese is a must-try for grill fans. Its uniquely firm texture allows it to hold together as it browns, resulting in a wonderfully caramelized flavor. Garnish these tasty burgers with your choice of toppings and condiments - fresh tomatoes, avocado and additional pesto are excellent choices.

- 1 1/2 pound ground turkey, preferably dark meat
- 1/3 cup prepared basil pesto
- 1 sweet onion, peeled, ends trimmed and cut into 4 thick slices
- 6 ounces halloumi cheese, cut into 4 slices
- 4 hamburger buns



In a large bowl, combine turkey and pesto. Form the mixture into 4 patties, each about 3/4-inch thick. Thread onion slices onto metal skewers; this will help them stay together for ease of flipping.

Prepare a grill for medium heat cooking. Grill burgers and onions until browned and cooked through, about 4 to 5 minutes per side. Grill halloumi

slices until they are browned and just softened, 2 to 3 minutes per side. Place burgers in buns and top each with a slice of halloumi and some onions.

YOGURT-MARINATED GRILLED SALMON

- 1 cup plain low fat yogurt
- 1 tablespoon Sriracha sauce
- 4 (6 ounce) pieces skinless salmon fillet
- 1/3 cup chopped cilantro leaves
- 1 lime, cut into wedges
- Oil for the grill

Whisk yogurt and Sriracha together in a large bowl. Add salmon and turn to coat; cover the bowl. Refrigerate 8 hours or overnight.



Prepare a grill for medium-high heat cooking. Remove salmon pieces from Sriracha-yogurt mixture and discard excess marinade. Arrange salmon on grill grates or in a fish basket and cover grill. Cook salmon for 4 minutes, then gently turn and continue grilling until salmon is cooked through, about 4 more minutes. Alternatively, bake the salmon on a parchment-line baking sheet at 425°F until cooked

through. Transfer the salmon to plates or a platter. Sprinkle with cilantro and serve with lime wedges.

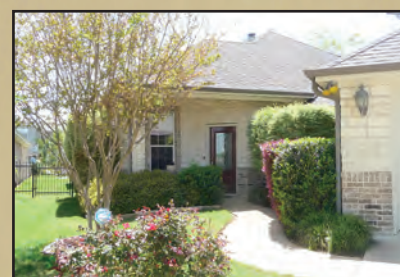

AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF SALADO, TEXAS, TO ANNEX AN ADJACENT ROAD INTO THE INCORPORATED MUNICIPAL BOUNDARIES OF THE VILLAGE OF SALADO, TEXAS INCLUDING THE FOLLOWING: FINDINGS OF FACT; EFFECTIVE DATE; A REPEALER; SEVERABILITY; AND PROPER NOTICE AND MEETING.

ANNEXATION OF TERRITORY

The area described in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes, is hereby annexed and brought within the municipal boundaries (i.e., corporate limits) of the Village of Salado, and is made an integral part, hereof.

The official map and boundaries of the Village of Salado are hereby amended and revised so as to include the area annexed.

Cyber Security Advisory issued by FBI

CENTRAL TEXAS - Better Business Bureau is urging all consumers and businesses to pay close attention to a Cyber Security Advisory issued by the Federal Bureau of Investigation regarding a vulnerability in Microsoft's Internet Explorer 8 browser (IE8) that could allow scammers to access and take over users' computers. The risk for all users - home, business and government - is high, and BBB is urging anyone with IE8 to follow the recommended steps to address the problem.

The problem was first announced May 9, and Microsoft released a temporary fix the same day.

Here is the original overview from the FBI:

"A vulnerability has been discovered in Microsoft's web browser, Internet Explorer, which could allow an attacker to take complete control of an affected system. Exploitation may occur if a user visits or is redirected to a web page which is specifically crafted to take advantage of the vulnerability. Depending on the privileges associated with the user, an attacker could then install programs; view, change, or delete data; or create new accounts with full user rights. Failed exploit attempts may result in a denial-of-service condition."

Microsoft has released a workaround which acts as a temporary fix. It is available at: <https://support.microsoft.com/kb/2847140>. The company is working on a patch to undo the vulnerability, which does not affect other versions of IE.

"BBB recommends that everyone with Internet Explorer 8 apply the temporary fix immediately," said Ben Steinberg, Chief Information Officer of the Council of Better Business Bureaus. "If you are not sure which version you have, try running the fix. If you don't have IE8, the fix will stop running and let you know that your system is not at risk. Microsoft will let you know when

the patch is available, and you need to download that as soon as it is."

To avoid being a victim of computer scams, the BBB provides this advice for online security:

Develop a strong password. A strong password has letters, punctuation, symbols and numbers. A variety of characters makes the password better. Never use personal information such as your name, birthdate, driver's license, social security number or similar information. Also, avoid sequences or repeated characters.

Avoid Phishing e-mails. Phishing e-mails are a common way for

hackers to get at your personal information or break into your computer. Do not respond to requests for financial information. Legitimate businesses do not request personal or financial information by email. Don't click on any links or open any attachments to e-mails until you have confirmed that they are not malicious. Also beware of unsolicited e-mails from companies with which you have no association.

Install virus detection. To help protect your computer from viruses, make sure you have virus detection software installed on your computer. This software can also

help identify if a virus appears on your computer.

Find a computer repair company you can trust. If you are concerned your computer may have been exposed to viruses, contact your service provider directly.
