Franz leads Eagles with 3 All-State honors

State coaches put 3 Eagles on All-State squad at end of historic baseball season

Jon Franz leaves the Salado Eagles with three state honors for his play his senior year on an historic baseball team that lost to eventual state champions Hallettsville Brahmas last week. His Salado Eagles ended their season on June 5 with a 16-3 loss in the state semifinals round to finish with a 34-7-1 record.

He was named on June 10 to the Texas High School Baseball Coaches Association (THSBCA) All State Team as a First Team selection for his utility play at short stop.

Franz was also picked as a utility player on the UIL 2A Baseball State All-Tournament Team for his game against the Brahmas, in which he had two hits and two runs batted in.

Franz will also play on the All-Star South Team, selected as one of the very best at shortstop among Texas 1A-3A players.

"He is very consistent," Coach Chad Krempin said. "He has a quick release and doesn't make many mistakes."

Krempin adds that Franz will be a difficult player to replace next year.

"He showed up to work every day and he worked very hard at it," Krempin said, adding, "You can tell that Salado baseball meant a lot to him."

And he meant a lot to the Salado baseball team, providing leadership from his key position.

"Even on the mound, he did good things for us," Krempin said.

At the plate he did good things as well, getting on base better than half the time. He batted .446 with a slugging rating of .640. He knocked in 36 runners on 41 hits. He stole base eight times. On the mound, he pitched 30-1/3 innings, striking out 24 batters with a 2-1 record.

He was also named this week to the 22AA All District team as the Offensive Player of the Year.

Casey Frazier, who pitched his way to an 11-1 record this year, was named the District Most Valuable Player and joined

Franz on the All State team as a third team pitcher.

Frazier pitched 88-2/3 innings, facing 331 batters. He struck out 88 batters, allowing only 15 runs to be scored on him and giving up 57 hits during the extended season.

"We try not to use him very deep in games, so his strike out numbers are not as high as they could be," Krempin said.

"He has great control, especially of his curve ball, which batters may be able to get a bat on, but don't get on base," he said.

"This is a tough district to get out of and he faced a lot of really good batters during the playoffs," Krempin said, adding that he is glad to have him returning next year.

Joining Franz and Frazier on the All State Team is Coby Giniewicz, who missed about two weeks with a broken hand. He broke it during the game against Burnet, but played the next game.

"He is a tough, tough kid," Krempin said. "We were really glad to have him back in the playoffs. We missed him a lot."

Giniewicz was named third team second baseman for the Eagles. He was also listed on All District squad first team as Designated Hitter.

"He was great in that role," Krempin said. Giniewicz batted .354 and had a slugging percentage of .430. He had 28 hits in 79 at-bats, knocking in 22 runs.

Third baseman Marshall Mann was also named first team All District team.

"I am surprised he wasn't named All-State," Krempin said, "I think he was a premier third baseman in the state. He certainly hit the ball well."

Mann had a batting average of .369 and an on-base average of .488. His slugging percentage was .515 as he hit 11 doubles, four triples and a homer.

Caden Eary, a junior outfielder also got a First Team nod. He hit .299 with an on-base percentage of .298 and slugging percentage of .488.

Reagan Bazar and Britton Hawes were both named First Team Pitchers for the Eagles.

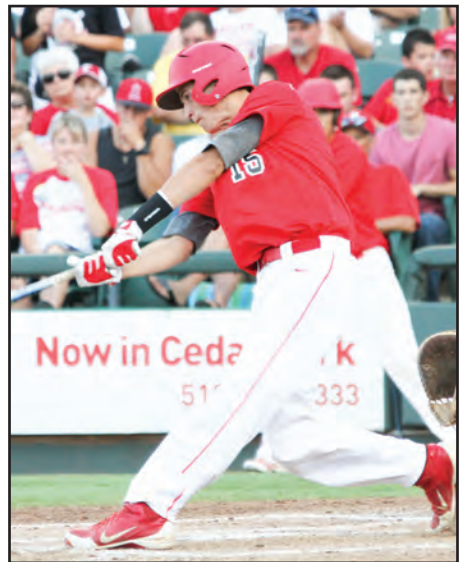
Bazar had an 8-2 record for Salado, pitching 57-1/3 innings. He faced 255 batters, striking out 75 of them and allowing just 39 hits and 28 runs scored.

Hawes had a pitching record of 8-1, pitching 49-1/3 innings for Salado. He struck out 44 batters and allowed 14 runs with 35 hits.

Bryce Martin was named to the second team infield. He hit .317 with 20 hits.

Lead-off batter Trey Mohler was named to the second team outfield. Mohler had an on-base percentage of .541, batting .287. He led the team being hit by pitches 15 times and earning 33 walks.

Davis Little, a junior, is also on the Second Team as an outfielder. He batted .256 on the year with an on-base percentage of .383.

Eagles end season as State semi-finalists

Salado ended their storied season with a tough 16-3 loss to the eventual state champions Hallettsville Brahmas. The Brahmas had 13 hits and 16 runs against an uncharacteristic Salado squad that committed six errors. Hallettsville went on to beat the favored Hughes Springs Mustangs for the State Championship 4-2 on June 6 at Dell Diamond in Round Rock.

Franz drove in Bryce Martin, hitting a single in the third inning after Martin reached on a walk and advanced on a passed ball.

Coby Giniewicz scored an unearned run in the fourth inning, reaching when he was hit by the pitcher. He stole second and scored on an error by the third baseman.

Martin singled in the inning and scored on a single by Franz with two outs in the inning.

Hallettsville hit everything Salado threw at them, rattling all four Eagles pitchers they faced.

Frazier gave up seven hits before he was replaced by Britton Hawes, who allowed three hits. Reagan Bazar also gave up three hits before Keaton Mims came in with bases loaded and seven runs scored in the bottom of the fourth. Mims walked one batter before Kory Smith dribbled a grounder to Franz who threw him out at first to end the eight-run fourth. Hallettsville put Salado down in three to win.

New life breathed into Salado Golf Club

Salado Golf Club delivered a \$25,000 earnest money check to Mill Creek owner Morris Foster last week and may get some assistance from the Village of Salado to do repairs on the golf course should the sale of the property become final.

In recent days, Billy Helm, representing a group of interested investors, met with the Salado Golf Club interim board to discuss joining together in an effort to raise the \$1.75 million necessary to purchase the golf course real estate and operations.

With investors offering unsecured loans ranging from \$2,500 to much higher amounts,

the Salado Golf Club then approached the Board of Aldermen to test their interest in an economic development loan for the repairs of the currently closed holes on the course.

Of course, if fundraising efforts are successful enough, the Salado Golf Club would not need to pursue the loan from the Village for the repairs.

According to Bruce Bolick, certified public accountant and treasurer for the Salado Golf Club, fundraising efforts continue and the Golf Club will continue to accept donations as well as loans in increments of \$2,500.

With the joining of the groups, the Salado Golf Club now has raised more than \$1.5 million in checks and commitments.

Stephen Peters, investment officer for the Village of Salado, answered questions from aldermen about a possible loan of up to \$500,000 from the Village to Salado Golf Club. He told the board that the Village would hold the first lien on the property should the Golf Club go into default on the loan.

Under the proposal, the Village would loan up to \$500,000 for repairs and working capital to the Salado Golf Club at 3 percent interest for a term of 10 years. The Salado Golf Club would immediately begin paying principal and interest on the loan.

Before it can be finalized, the Village would have to follow the legal steps necessary to make the economic development

loan, which would include putting into place policies and procedures for making decisions about economic development loans and a long-term economic development approach.

However, Salado Golf Club asked only an agreement in principle to pursue negotiations with the Village to pursue the loan should it be necessary.

Aldermen voted unanimously to agree in principle to the loan with the understanding that there would be many steps between their vote on June 6 and a final loan.

Village postpones road, emergency expenses

Salado aldermen postponed two major expenses proposed by Mayor Danney McCort at their June 6 meeting.

After discussing a request by Mayor McCort to repave Baines Street, aldermen voted 4-2 to have a professional engineer review a five-year old road study and make recommended changes for an ap-

proach to replacing roads. Voting against the motion were Shannon Ashe and Mayor McCort. Aldermen Fred Brown, Hans Fields, Bryan Fritch and Michael McDougal voted in favor.

McCort estimated the cost for repaving Baines at \$215,000. The Village has \$150,000 budgeted for street maintenance, so the additional funds would have to come from its fund balance of over \$900,000.

When McCort was an

aldermen, he chaired a committee that included two other engineers (Gerry Reihnsen and the late Bruce Butscher) that rated every road in the Village based upon the traffic requirements, road conditions and expected lifetime.

That committee ranked those roads with streets receiving higher scores being those most in need of repair. Since that report was done, the Village has repaved a section of Ch-

isholm Trail, a section of Park Rd. (which was damaged by the 2010 flood) and Whispering Oaks. The roads were completely taken up, base put down and repaved with ribbon curbs to extend the lifetime of the surface.

This approach to road replacement is costly, approximately \$250,000 per quarter mile of blacktop and the village has replaced just under half a mile of roads

with the ribbon curbs.

Prior to this approach, the Village contracted with Bell County to have roads repaved with a chip-seal method that would not replace the underlying base of the roads, but instead add another level of tar and gravel.

In other business, aldermen tasked Fred Brown to research federal funding possibilities for replacing the generator at the municipal building.

Mayor McCort requested \$17,050 for a new Gillette Emergency Generator 30kW Diesel with a 67 dual-wall sub base tank.

Brown suggested that because the Village is a designated emergency management center, that it should pursue federal money to pay for the generator. The municipal building is designated as a gathering location in times of emergency, such as floods and storms.

Perry the poacher

What you are now hearing across the land is a collective whine. Blue-state Democrats are upset that Texas Gov. Rick Perry dares come and play in their sandboxes, and worse, threatens to "poach" jobs from their states.

The website Politico reports that Perry's attempts to lure jobs to Texas are "infuriating to prominent Democrats around the country." Gov. Jerry Brown of California -- a state that is Perry's foremost target -- has dismissed Perry's handiwork in scatological terms. Democrats from another target, Illinois, huff and puff about the temerity of it all. "He better not take our businesses away," Sen. Dick Durbin warned.

He better not or what, exactly? What recourse does Illinois have, except improving its own business environment? Which would mean Rick Perry is good for Texas ... and for Illinois.

Perry is exploiting the genius of our federalist system for all it's worth. In his business-recruitment trips, accompanied by trash-talking ads and Texas-sized braggadocio, he is subjecting other states to the fire of competition. In an ad in Crain's Chicago Business, Perry offered businesses in the state "an escape route to economic

freedom ... a route to Texas."

This is exactly how the Founders imagined the interplay among the states working. The George Mason University scholar Michael Greve refers to the system as "competitive" federalism. "This federalism relies on exit and mobility -- of capital, and of labor -- as a means of disciplining government," he writes. "Competitive federalism is a terrific prescription for a big, diverse country with a highly mobile citizenry and a national government that responds poorly to democratic demands."

Rick Perry may be boastful, but he has a lot to boast about. Texas had a 6.4 percent unemployment rate in April. When President Barack Obama recently made Austin, Texas, his first stop on a trip touting job creation, Perry welcomed him with an ad noting, accurately, "Over the last 10 years, Texas created 33 percent of the net new jobs nationwide."

Perry's opponents assume that there must be something unfair or wrong about this. Texas, they

scoff, is benefiting from an energy boom. Well, states like California and New York also have oil and gas resources, but refuse to exploit them fully for political reasons. Regardless, Texas job growth ranges much more widely than the energy sector.

Texas benefits from low tax rates, a low cost of living, light regulation, checks on abusive lawsuits and its status as a right-to-work state. California has none of the above. Although its unemployment rate has been declining, it is still 9 percent, the fourth-highest in the nation.

"Poaching" jobs sounds pejorative, but it amounts to making it easier for people to do business. The waste hauler Waste Connections Inc. moved from Sacramento, Calif., to a location near Houston. Its CEO told the website The Fiscal Times that it took the company 16 months to design and build a new building in Texas, when the permitting alone would have taken three years in California.

If blue-state Democrats want Rick Perry to stop bothering them, they should quit whining and start learning from his example.

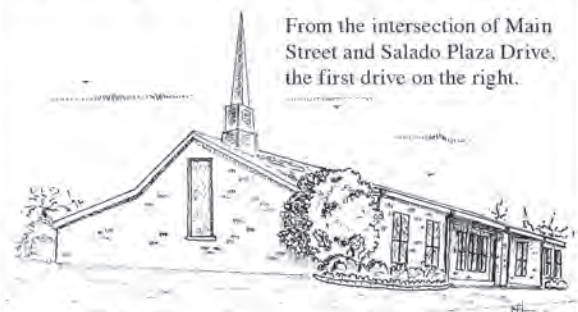

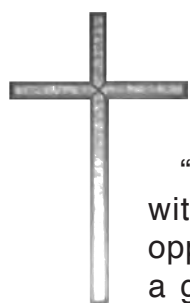

WILBUR R. FOSTER

Wilbur R. Foster, 97, long time resident of Salado, passed away Wednesday morning, June 5, 2013, at his home in Salado. Born October 16, 1915, in Cedar Valley, Texas, to Forrest F. Foster and Minnie Jackson Foster, he was the oldest of four children, two brothers and one sister.

Services were held June 7 at Dossman Funeral Home in Belton with Minister Joe Keyes officiating. Burial followed in Salado Cemetery.

He married Jessie Mildred Lyndal Hamrick on May 14, 1938 in Belton, and they celebrated 75 years of marriage this year. Through the years, he made hundreds of these replicas which are proudly on display in homes and offices all over Salado and in many other places in Texas.

Foster, along with his wife, was recognized on his 90th birthday by Governor Rick Perry with a presentation of a flag that had flown over the Capitol for service to his country and to the community. Afterwards, Foster presented the governor with one of his stagecoaches.

As a member of the Salado Church of Christ, Foster helped build the previous church building in 1961 and the current church building in 1987.

Extra chance

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Assume you're South and reach four spades on the bidding shown. (North's two-club bid is Stayman, asking whether you have a four-card major, and East's double shows good clubs.) West leads the ace and another club. East wins the second club with the queen and continues with the king. How would you play the hand?

When the deal occurred, declarer ruffed the king of clubs with the ace of spades (to guard against a possible over-ruff by West), and then drew trumps with the K-Q-J. Next he led a heart to the ace followed by a heart to the jack, losing to the queen. East returned a club, forcing dummy's last trump. When the hearts failed to divide evenly, South had to lose another trick at the end for down one.

South bemoaned his bad luck in finding the hearts divided 4-2 and the doubleton queen offside. But he should have made the hand anyway.

Declarer erred when he took the heart finesse. Since he needed only three tricks from the heart suit to make his contract, the finesse was not really necessary.

To give himself the best chance of scoring a third heart trick, South should draw trumps, cash the K-A of hearts, in that order, and then lead a third heart toward the jack. This will yield an extra heart trick whenever:

—West started with any number of hearts including the queen.

—The missing hearts divide 3-3.

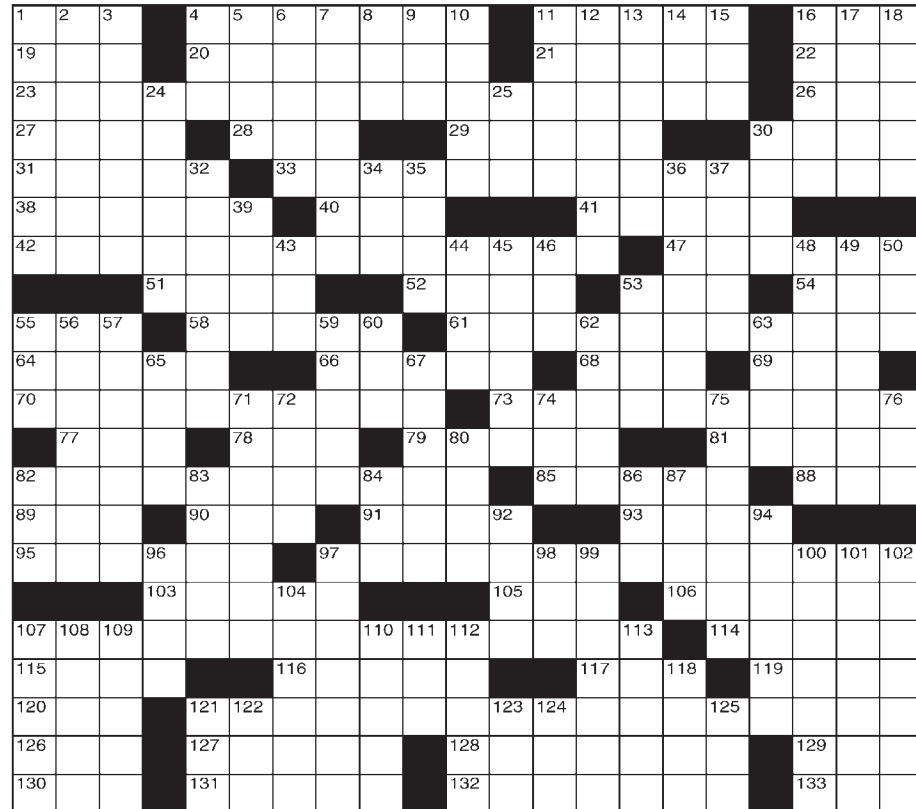
—East started with the Q-x.

South's actual line of play would have succeeded against the first two cases, but it did not guard against

Monarch butterflies in sharp decline, Progress on biofuels



Dear EarthTalk: How are monarch butterflies doing today? They used to pass through my area in big numbers but in the last few years there seem to be many fewer.

-- Bill Wright, Erie, PA
 The monarch butterfly, royally adorned in black, white and reddish-orange and able to migrate as far as 2,800 miles, is a true wonder of nature. Each year monarchs travel from Canada and the U.S. to hibernate in the forests of central Mexico. But in recent years the monarchs have been in sharp population decline due to habitat loss, eradication of the plants it depends upon and other environmental factors.

The decline in monarchs has been going on for two decades, but the last few years have been particularly worrisome. Mexico's National Commission of Natural Protected Areas reports a 59 percent decline in the area of forest there occupied by overwintering monarchs since December 2011. Meanwhile, the World Wildlife Fund (WWF) reports that overwintering populations along the California coast have shrunk from over a million individuals counted at 101 sites in 1997 to less than 60,000 at just 74 sites in 2009. The International Union for the Conservation of Nature, which maintains the

“Red List” of endangered species around the world, recognizes the monarchs’ annual migration as an “endangered biological phenomenon.”

According to Monarch Watch, an educational outreach program based at the University of Kansas that engages citizen-scientists in monarch monitoring and conservation efforts, habitat destruction is one key driver in the monarch’s demise: “New roads, housing developments and agricultural expansion...all transform a natural landscape in ways that make it impossible for monarchs to live there.” Also, drought and record-high temperatures in North America in 2012 triggered an earlier-than-usual monarch migration. This disrupted the butterflies’ breeding cycle by drying out their eggs prematurely.

The hot weather has also reduced the nectar content of the milkweed plants that monarch larvae

depend on. In addition, milkweed is becoming scarce due to farmers’ increasing reliance on herbicides. Most of the soy and corn crops grown in the U.S. are genetically engineered to resist herbicides. This means even more chemical spraying—and far fewer milkweed plants. Nectar producing plants that attract adult butterflies are facing a similar fate, further complicating survival for the monarch.

It won’t be easy to stem the tide of human development that threatens the species’ long term survival. In 2008 the Commission for Environmental Cooperation, set up under the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) to help the U.S., Canada and Mexico coordinate on environmental initiatives, published its North American Monarch Conservation Plan to establish a conservation blueprint for the butterflies. Key aspects of the plan include the creation of incentives for the conservation of overwintering sites and the restoration of breeding habitat throughout the butterfly’s extensive range.

In the meantime, the Mexican government has worked with WWF and other groups and made strides in restricting log-

ging in areas critical to monarch populations. And in the U.S., monarch habitat restoration work in California and other parts of the U.S. have helped provide the butterflies some relief. Whether these and other efforts are enough to rescue the monarchs remains to be seen.

Dear EarthTalk: How far along are we at developing algae-based and other higher yield sources of biofuels?

-- Jason McCabe, Tulsa, TN

A few years ago biofuels were all the rage. Environmental advocates to national security hawks alike were extolling the virtues of ethanol and biodiesel as a carbon-neutral bridge to our energy future. But the bubble burst when it became apparent that there wasn’t enough agricultural land in the U.S. or elsewhere to grow sufficient amounts of corn, palm and other crops to feed both people and their engines. To boot, the process of extracting and distributing biofuels has proven anything but carbon neutral. And with ever cheaper natural gas widely available now, paying a premium for ethanol or biodiesel seemed frivolous.

But a new generation of biofuels based on algae might just change all that. One of the major problems with biofuels that algae could solve is space, since algae can yield as much as 100 times more fuel per unit area than other so-called “second generation” biofuel crops (e.g. non-food crops or non-food waste parts of food crops). Federal researchers from the U.S. Department of Energy report that it would take only 15,000

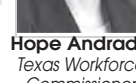

square miles—less than 1/7 the area now used to harvest all the corn across the country—to produce enough algae fuel to re-

place all of our petroleum fuel.

While burning algae-derived fuel in an engine or factory generates carbon dioxide (CO₂) emissions just like fossil fuels do, the algae itself requires CO₂ to photosynthesize—so overall no new CO₂ is added to the atmosphere. Furthermore, any CO₂ created through processing or refinement can be captured and re-directed to the growing algae beds. And unlike other biofuel feedstocks, algae production has minimal impact on freshwater supplies—especially when it can be undertaken in ocean waters or even wastewater.

At least three well-funded ventures are poised to ramp up production of commercially viable quantities of algae-derived crude oil over the next cou-

ple of years. California's Solazyme is building an algae fuel factory in Brazil in partnership with food processing giant Bunge and expects to manufacture 100,000 metric tons of fuel there each year. Solazyme is also retooling an Archer Daniels Midland factory in Clinton, Iowa to produce another 100,000 metric tons of algae fuel per year domestically.

Another company ready to make the leap into commercial scale production of algae fuel is Sapphire Energy, which operates a 2,200 acre algae farm in New Mexico where oil is harvested across 70 open ponds and refined on site. Sapphire—Bill Gates is a big investor—expects the facility, which goes online next year, to generate some 10,000 barrels of crude oil a day by 2018.

Yet a third player in the emerging algae fuel market is Synthetic Genomics, the brainchild of genomics guru Craig Venter, who beat the U.S. government in sequencing the human genome and at a fraction of the cost. The company, which last year purchased an 81-acre site in California's Imperial Valley to scale up and test its synthetic algae strains across 42 open ponds, plans to genetically modify algae to optimize its oil output. ExxonMobil signed a \$600 million development deal with the company to further the cutting edge research.
