May is too early for school bond

The earliest that Salado ISD voters could see a bond election for the construction of new athletic facilities at the Williams Dr. and FM 1670 campus is November.

While Salado ISD trustees took no formal action during their special session Jan. 19, the board consensus was that a May election is too early.

Each trustee spoke about the possible date for a bond issue and all seven seemed to agree that May is too early to try to put a package together that can pass muster with voters.

"The worst thing we could do is to have a bond issue fail," Board president Darrell Street said, "and have to come back to the voters with a smaller package that we do not wholeheartedly support."

"I do not know a lot about the needs," trustee Deborah Aldridge said.

Trustees were given a list of rough cost estimates by Fields and Associates Architects at their regular meeting Aug. 18. The board did not discuss those cost estimates at either the regular meeting or the special meeting.

Instead, discussion focused on a possible timeline for a bond election.

In addition to concerns of trustees about a short timeline, some trustees expressed concern about the academic/classroom facilities of the school. "I don't want to get ourselves painted into a corner," trustee Rodney Bell said, adding that he is concerned about the capacity and condition of the elementary school as well as about the possible need for added classrooms at the high school.

"My biggest concerns come with the elementary and where we are with our high school in terms of growth there," Bell said. "Before considering any kind of athletic facility, I want to know where we stand with those. I am the

first to be at the football field. I love the athletic program, but I can't justify it if we are looking at our academic needs.'

The cost estimates from Fields and Associate for the construction of athletic facilities at the new high school exceed \$11 million.

They are broken down as the following:

Football stadium with artificial turf. \$4.329.795. This includes 3,000 seat bleachers with 150 square foot press box and 4,500 sq. ft. concession stand/rest rooms. Does not include an elevator to press box or any chemical injection for the artificial turf, which would cost an additional \$96,250.

Football stadium with natural grass, \$3,798,230. Same qualifications as above except for chemical injection.

Field House, \$2,357,500, 11,500 sq. ft.

Multipurpose Building: \$1,616,857, 36,000 sq. ft. open room with artificial turf and minimal air conditioning/plumbing.

Baseballfield:\$787,000. Includes 600 seat bleachers, 100 sq. ft. press box.

Softball field: \$517,000. Includes 600 seat bleachers, 100 sq. ft. press box.

Baseball/softball concession stand: \$285,000. Includes 2,000 sq. ft. building with rest rooms/ concessions.

Eight tennis courts: \$691,000.

Visitor parking: \$506,000; asphalt 138,500 sq. ft.

Salado now golf-cart friendly

Salado is a friendly Village; to golf carts if not deer. Village aldermen on Jan. 14 approved an ordinance allowing golf carts to be driven on public streets. Later in the meeting, the board followed the recommendation of the planning and zoning commission concerning an amendment to prohibit spiked bars on metal fencing and require solid bars across the top.

The P&Z ercommended that the reject amending the current Zoning and Building code ordinances to prohibit spiked fencing. Voting in favor of keeping the codes the same were Jerry Johns, Gerry Reihsen and Ronnie Tynes. Voting against the motion was Richard Prater.

Kate Darnell spoke to aldermen during the public hearing on the item, asking them to amend the codes to prohibit spiked fences. "This will not affect any current fences," she said, "This would not require any retrofitting of current fences. This would only prohibit new fences of this type."

Darnell was among a group of residents who brought the issue before the board of aldermen last year. She said that she was assured "that this was not an issue, that this was a slam dunk. Instead, it has turned into a long drawnout process."

Alderman Stephen Peters made the motion to not amend the ordinance, receiving a second from Bryan Fritch. Peters and Fritch were joined by Susan Terry in voting in favor while Danney McCort and Carol Walls voted against the motion.



Death of a theory

Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab couldn't ignite the bomb in his underwear on Flight 253 on Christmas Day. All he managed to blow up was a worldview.

His failed attempt put paid to the notion that terrorism is the byproduct of a few, specific U.S. policies and of our image abroad. This view dominates the left and animates the Obama administration. It informs its drive to shutter Guantanamo Bay, to get out of Iraq and to cater to "international opinion." If we are only nice and likable enough, goes the theory, the Abdulmutallabs of the world will never be tempted to violent mayhem.

Only the young Nigerian didn't appear the least bit moved by President Barack Obama's commitment to close Gitmo in a year. He didn't seem to care that Khalid Sheikh Mohammed will get a civilian trial in New York. He didn't appear to be fazed at all by Obama's Cairo and U.N. speeches, or a year's worth of international goodwill gestures. He just wanted to destroy an airliner.

It shouldn't be hard to fathom why. Abdulmutallab was in the grip of a violent ideology with an existential hatred of the United States at its core, an ideology promoted by a global terrorist conspiracy under the loose rubric of al-Qaida. This is the essential fact that the left tends to minimize or deny.

Obama called Abdulmutallab an "isolated extremist" in his initial statement on the incident, and left the same impression about Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan, the terrorist of Fort Hood. How coincidental that we are beset by isolated extremists believing the same things and inspired by the same people -- in the cases of Abdulmutallab and Hasan, the radical Yemeni cleric Anwar al-Awlaki.

A totalist rejection of the United States, this ideology will never lack for particular reasons to hate us. For years, we were told that the Iraq War was al-

Qaida's best recruiting tool. Now, new recruiting tools are at hand. Hasan reportedly was disappointed that Obama stayed in Afghanistan. In taking responsibility for Abdulmutallab's attempted attack, Al-Qaeda in the Arabian Peninsula (AQAP) claimed it was in retaliation for a U.S.-sponsored strike against its leadership in Yemen

If we pull our troops from Afghanistan, they'll object to our missile strikes in Pakistan. If we stop the missile strikes, they'll object to our training of foreign militaries. If we stop that, they'll object that we have the temerity to maintain a blue-water navy. Nothing short of suicidal abdication will suffice.

The other great reputed recruiting tool was Gitmo. But what's worse -- holding terrorists in a facility condemned by the world's scolds, or releasing them to re-invigorate al-Qaida's franchise operations? The Wall Street Journal says 11 Gitmo returnees have joined the ranks of Yemeni militant groups, making the detention facility AQAP's farm team.

The administration is loath to admit that vacating Gitmo has itself proven a powerful tool for the terrorists. It can't give up its operating theory of terrorism, no matter how tattered. Instead of designating Abdulmutallab an enemy combatant and interrogating him, we have granted him all the protections our justice system provides a civil defendant. Whatever comes of this foolish act of generosity, we can be sure that the next Abdulmutallab will be singularly unimpressed.


munity volunteers paired with Salado ISD students. These Mentors commit to spend a minimum of two hours a month helping these students by being a positive role model and offering encouragement.



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

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
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Board extends Sup's contract

Salado ISD Trustees extended Superintendent Billy Wiggins contract by one year after conducting their annual appraisal of the superintedent in executive session Jan. 18. The superintendent's contract will continue through June 2013 after the board voted unanimously on the motion by Miriam Ervi and second by Kim Bird to extend Wiggins' contract by one year.

Trustees also conducted the annual public hearing on the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS), heard an enrollment and finance update, authorized the superintendent to enter into negotiations with Bell County about property on West Village Road, approved bids for construction projects, approved a class size waiver request and learned more about the Salado Mentors and the Watch DOGS programs in the school system.

No one spoke during the offical public hearing on the school district's AEIS Report for the 2008-09 school year.

Salado schools were

rated Academically Acceptable by the Texas Education Agency for 2008-09 school year. The district also received Gold Performance Acknowledgments for several areas: Attendance (2007-08),College-Ready Graduates (2008),Recommended High School Program (2008), Texas Success Initiative ELA, Texas Success Initiative Mathematics, Commended on Writing and Commended on Social Studies.

Salado schools exceeded the state average and Region 12 average on each subject of the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) Test.

In reading, 95 percent of all Salado students met the 2009 standard, while 91 percent of Texas students and 91 percent of Region 12 students met the standard.

In math, 93 percent of all Salado ISD students met the standard while 82 percent of the state and 81 percent in Region 12 met the standard.

In writing, 96 percent of Salado students met the standard compared to 93 percent in the state and 92 percent in Region 12.

In science, 87 percent of SISD students met the standard; 78 percent of Texas and 77 percent of Region 12 students met the standard.

In social students, 96 percent met the standard,

compared to 93 percent of State and Region 12 students met the standard.

In addition to the district's performance on the TAKS test, the AEIS includes information on staff, tax rate, teacher salaries, fund balance and expenditures per students.

The average years of experience of teachers in Salado schools is 13.2 vears compared to 11.2 years average in the state. Average years of experience within the Salado ISD is 4.6 years compared to 7.4 years within a district statewide.

Teaching salaries in Salado schools are lower than the state average. The salary for begining teachers is \$30,000 in Salado, compared to \$40,372 state average. For teachers with five or fewer years experience, the average Salado salary is \$33,328 compared to \$42,463 statewide. For teachers with 11-20 years experience, the average salary in Salado is \$43,300 compared to \$49,083 statewide. For teachers with more than 20 years experience, the average Salado salary is \$50,917 compared to \$57,325 statewide.

Salado's overall tax rate is \$1.318, while the average statewide tax rate is \$1.209. The SISD Maintenance and Operations tax rate is \$1.040, compared to \$1.052 statewide average. The debt service tax rate for Salado is \$0.278; the statewide average debt service tax rate is \$0.157.

The taxable value per student for Salado ISD is \$428,825, while the statewide average is \$363,600.



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Salado's fund balance of \$3.8 million is 37.3 percent of the total budget, more than double that of the statewide average of 18.8 percent of budgeted expenditures.

Revenue per student in Salado schools is \$10,196 for all funds, compared to \$9,739 per student average statewide. The district has an average of \$7,606 per student in operating expenditures, compared to the \$8,342 per student statewide expenditure.

In other business, Finance Manager Lyndal Cabaniss updated trustees on the district's finance.

Cabaniss told trustees that the latest finance picture for Salado ISD will include \$71,726 more in state funds than originally budgeted. This is due to an increase is the Average Daily Attendance in the district. Trustees budgeted on a 1 percent increase in ADA for the schools. As of December, the actual ADA has increased by closer to 3 percent. According to Cabaniss, the budget was built on a Refined ADA (RADA) of 1.255. The actual RADA is 1,277. Cabaniss said that the district is likely to received \$4.07 million in state funds, compared to the \$4 million budgeted last fall.

Trustees authorized Supt. Wiggins to enter into negotiations with Bell County for the transfer of property on West Village Road for the county's expansion project.

The county is acquiring additional right-of-way on the west side of West Village Road for the expansion of the road, which lies outside the Village of Salado boundaries.

Wiggins said that the strip of land that the county wants to acquire will not affect the school district. Rather, it will be a winning situation for the schools to have improvements to West Village Road, he said.

Trustees approved a class size waiver request to TEA for the first grade where two classes exceed the state standard by one student.

Trustees said that rearranging first graders midyear to meet the state standards would not be in the best interest of students. The district may consider adding a class section for next year.

"We are quickly approaching the time when we will have five sections in every grade," Supt. Wiggins said.

Trustees also approved bids for construction of a covered area for bus pickups and for rebuilding the roof at the Salado Junior High gymn.

In other business, trustees heard reports on the Salado Mentors program, which has 46 volunteers matched with Salado students and the Watch DOGS program at the elementary school which has dads, uncles, grandfathers and other father figures volunteering at least one day per semester to be on campus at the Elementary school.

Aldermen voted unanimously to follow the recommendation of the Zoning Board of Adjustment to allow a rear yard set back of 19 feet at 502 Mill Creek Dr. instead of the required 25 feet set back.

Aldermen -

Aldermen also amended the Contractor Registration ordinance to bring it into agreement with state law. Under the amended ordinance, plumbers will no longer have to pay a contractor registration fee. The other fees were increased in the following manner: General Contractor from \$60 to \$100 annually, Septic System Installation from \$30 to \$50 annually, Electrician from \$30 to \$50 annually; Air conditioning from \$30 to \$50 annually; Lawn irriga-

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tion from \$30 to \$50 annually; Home/geranl repair from \$30 to \$50 annually and Pool contractor from \$30 to \$50 annually. Lawn Service contractors will remain \$15 annually. The maximum fine for peforming contractual work within the Village of Salado and not registering with the Village is \$500 per offense per day.

Shavers & Christenson presented a clean bill of health for the Village during its annual financial audit. There were no findings or irregularities reported by the firm.





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

A local sailor is on board the USS Carl Vinson that has been ordered to Haiti following the 7.0 earthquake there that has left thousands dead and tens of thousands in terrible conditions.

Edward Martin Pyzik III, son of Barbra Pyzik and the late Edward Martin Pyzik II, was scheduled to arrive at port in San Diego California when the earthquake hit Haiti.

The Vinson was just off the shore of Newport News, Virginia when it was ordered for relief in Haiti. It headed at more than 30 knots to Mayport, Florida where it recieved aircraft and aid supplies for Haiti where it arrived Jan. 15.

The Vinson is a Nimitz class supercarrier. A nuclear-powered ship with a crew of more than 3,000,

the Vinson is the largest American vessel to reach Haiti since the powerful earthquake.

The arrival of the Vinson to San Diego was set for early April, but since the devastating earthquake in Haiti, it is unknown. Pyzik was promoted to E-2 just days before the deployment and is hopeful to have his E-3 and Airwarfare pin before returning to San Diego where he will be stationed until the next underway.

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

Art, like beauty, difficult to define

Having earned his first art award at age 10, Larry Prellop says he has been painting all his life. "I can hardly remember when I didn't want to be an artist," he told the Salado Rotary Club recently.

Owner of Prellop Fine Art Gallery for 15 years, he is a popular consultant with art groups, demonstrating the "God-given talent" he has developed in countless paintings now treasured by art lovers throughout the nation.

Admitting he was never a "starving artist" during the early years, he held down a day job, but painted in off-hours while his mother sold his pictures to fellow employees

in the Texas State Capital. A lucrative career devoted full-time to his art opened up when a gallery owner bought everything he had on hand and promised to buy more as he produced

In the next years Prellop's work was displayed and sold by numerous galleries throughout the U.S.

He frequently received commissions from individuals desiring a certain scene or subject.

Observing the special subjects artists adopt and become known for, he decided he would specialize in seascapes, reflecting his love for the Texas Coast where he enjoys the sport of fishing. While he will still paint a bluebonnet scene or other scenes on request, his current output is primarily seascapes.

"Difficult to define, art, like beauty, is in the eye of the beholder," he said. "Not everyone likes the same thing. Some prefer traditional scenes, others prefer abstracts. Art either moves you or it doesn't," he observed.

Modest in his assessment of his art, he said his popularity is the result of his taking seriously the advice an older artist once offered him. "Paint for the people" became and continues to be his philosophy.

Motivation is often a concern of professional artists, Prellop stated. Some say they must have an emotional inspiration or motivation to produce, thus reducing their output. "My motivation is my electric bill!" he said, drawing laughter from his audience.

While he has received prestigious awards, sold his works to numerous clients including Texas Governor Rick Perry, and enjoyed the praise of art critics, he says he is most proud of a certain work that continues to pay a royalty.

Several years ago, his art agent asked him to paint an ocean scene to be used as background for the well-known devotional "Footprints in the Sand."

After several efforts, he delivered the one he thought best. The agent agreed, and today in bookstores and gift shops everywhere are prints of this work in several sizes, from book marks to framed pictures

In Prellop's Salado gallery, his work, original and prints, are available along with other artists.

Contract Bridge

One occasionally hears the term "free finesse" applied to a seemingly helpful lead made by an opponent, but sometimes there is a question as to whether or not the finesse is really free. It is easy to misapply the term, which is exactly what declarer did in this deal where he unnecessarily went down one.

West led his singleton club against South's fivespade contract. Acting under the impression that he was getting a free finesse, declarer played dummy's jack and took East's queen with the

After drawing trumps, South led a club to the king, hoping to find the suit divided 3-3 so that he could later discard a diamond on dummy's fourth club. But when West failed to follow to the second club, there was no way declarer could avoid losing a club and two diamonds for down one.

It might seem that South is sure to fail whatever he does, but actually he can make the contract with proper play. He should play low from dummy on the club lead and take the eight with the ace.

Declarer should assume from the bidding, as well as the opening lead, that the eight of clubs is a singleton. No harm can come from making this assumption because if West has the queen of clubs, it can be trapped later on.

After ruffing two hearts in dummy and drawing trumps, South then plays the ace and another diamond. The defenders can now do no better than collect their two diamond tricks, after which they are stymied. If West winds up on lead, he must return a heart or a diamond, allowing dummy to ruff as South discards his club loser.

If East wins the third diamond, he must either yield a ruff-and-discard or lead a club into dummy's K-J. The so-called free finesse at trick one turns out to be an illu-



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

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

State of Texas

January 14, 2010 OPERATION OF GOLF CARTS on public streets

AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF SALADO, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE OPERATION OF GOLF CARTS WITHIN THE VILLAGE LIMITS OF THE VILLAGE AS PROVIDED IN THE tEXAS tRANS-PORTATION cODE, providing for enforcement, including a criminal fine not to exceed \$500 per violation, SEV-ERABILITY, and IMPOSING PENALTIES.

WHEREAS, the Village of Salado, Texas (hereinafter "Village") desires to declare the Village a golf-cart friendly community; and

the Legislature of the State of Texas has recently passed and enacted House Bill 2553 amending the Transportation Code to allow for the operation of golf carts within municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Village has reviewed the requirements and provisions of newly-enacted Transportation Code Section 551.404 relating to the use and operation of golf carts within municipalities, and determines such provisions to be desirable to the tourism, economic development, and quality of life of Village of Salado; and

WHEREAS, the Village has determined that necessary regulations, enforcement provisions and guidelines related to the use and operation of golf carts within the village limits of the Village will protect the safety, and welfare of its citizens and visitors to the Village; and

the Village has the authority to enact and impose necessary regulations and provisions related to the use and operation of golf carts within the municipality under Chapter 551 of the Transportation Code, and Chapter 51 of the Texas Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, being a general-law municipality, the Village has exclusive control over the highways, streets, and alleys of the municipality, pursuant to Texas Transportation Code § 311.002; and

WHEREAS, the Village has the authority to designate the streets within the village limits on which the operation and use of golf carts will be permitted.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the Village of Salado, Texas:

Section 1. Enactment provisions

A.Recitals: The foregoing recitals are adopted and incorporated herein for all purposes.

B.Popular Name: This ordinance shall commonly be referred to as the "Golf Cart Ordinance."

C.Scope: This Ordinance, and the rules or regulations enacted herein, shall apply in the Village Limits. This Ordinance applies to conduct on public streets, public street rights-of-way, public sidewalks, and public parks. D.Effective Date: This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication.

Section 4. Enforcement

A.Civil & Criminal Penalties

(1) The Village shall have the power to administer and enforce the provisions of this Ordinance as may be required by governing law. Any person violating any provision of this Ordinance is subject to suit for injunctive relief as well as prosecution for criminal violations.

(2) The Village Police Department shall have the power to have a Golf Cart towed to a Village-approved impound lot at the sole expense of the Golf Cart owner if the:

(a)Golf Cart is operated in violation of this Ordinance; and

(b)Golf Cart is not occupied by a person eligible by state law to operate the vehicle; and

(c)location of the Golf Cart in the public right-of-way at the time of towing poses a hindrance to the safe and orderly flow of traffic or a threat to public safety.

B.Criminal Prosecution

Any person violating any provision of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00). An offense under this Ordinance is a Class "C" misdemeanor. C.Civil Remedies

Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed as a waiver of the Village's right to bring a civil action to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance and to seek remedies as allowed by law.

PASSED & APPROVED on SECOND READING this, the 14th day of January, 2010, by a __5_ (ayes) to _0_ (nays) and 0 (abstentions) vote of the Board of Aldermen of Salado, Texas.



Human population and Bird Flu

Dear EarthTalk: How does growing human population, and its resultant landscape changes, affect the flight paths of migratory birds that might carry diseases?

-- Ronnie Washines, Toppenish, WA

As human population numbers grow, oceans

of people seem to spread out into every conceivable environment—even the forests and estuaries used for eons by migratory birds as nutrient-rich stopovers on their longer annual journeys between feeding areas and birthing grounds.

Of course, more human development means fewer habitats suitable for such birds of passage (and other wildlife) as we "pave paradise..." and put up parking lots. But tired and hungry birds may not have the wherewithal or instinctual coding to seek out alternative resting areas, so they make do with habitat crowded and compromised by human incursion. Close

proximity to avian life hasn't presented too big of a problem for people in the past, but new concerns about the spread of bird flu (the H5N1 virus) via infected migratory birds (which presumably infect local populations of domestic birds) does have some scientists worried that persistent human expansion could indirectly

lead to a disease pandemic of global proportions.

According to the World Organization (WHO), the role of migratory birds in spreading bird flu is not well understood, but we do know that wild waterfowl are a "natural reservoir" of mostly harmless H5 and H7 influenza A viruses. But recent research suggests that these viruses may be mutating into more "pathogenic" (disease producing) forms, such as H5N1 that can "jump the species barrier" and infect people and other animals. "Recent events make it likely that some migratory birds are now directly spreading the H5N1 virus in its highly pathogenic form," reports WHO, adding that further spread to new areas is expected. It is unlikely that the bird flu making headlines a few years ago (the H5N1 strain), could lead to a human pandemic. The vast majority who got sick had direct contact with infected birds.

It could be that the very sprawl that increases our chances of catching bird flu—by bringing us and our poultry farms into closer contact with disease-bearing migratory birds-will protect us in the end. Humans have greatly altered the landscape for agricultural and industrial purposes and in creating urban settlements, points out wildlife biologist Kevin Kenow of the U.S. Geological Survey's Upper Midwest Environmental Sciences Center. As such, it contains less of the kinds of habitat migrating birds prefer-wetlands, forests and prairies—and more of what adversely affects them, such as human development, urban and agricultural runoff, and other forms of habitat degradation. "Many migratory birds that once flourished are now absent in altered or degraded areas," he

savs.

Regardless of the risk, scientists have yet to develop a vaccine to protect against H5N1 in humans, but they are working on it. Those who remain concerned should always cook poultry to a temperature of at least 158 degrees Fahrenheit for 30 minutes (this heat kills the virus if it is present) and wash hands with soap and warm water frequently (always a good idea regardless). And look both ways before crossing the street: At present, at least, your chances of getting hit by a car are far greater than your chances of contracting bird flu.
