# SISD trustees to mull random drug testing

Salado school trustees will consider at their April meeting whether to write a policy to perform random drug testing of students. Trustees discussed the topic at their March 15 meeting.

Superintendent Billy Wiggins told trustees that he was "not passionately for or passionately against" random testing of school students. He presented trustees with information that he had collected at the request of some of the board members. "If you want me to go further, there is a lot left for us to do," he said.

Among the information that Wiggins gave to trustees was a copy of the policy adopted by the Troy ISD when it implemented random testing of students involved in extra curricular activities.

Wiggins explained that the testing program would have to be of students who were either involved in extra curricular activities or drove vehicles to school. "These are both privileges," he said. Parents could also request to have their children's names added to the pool of students to be tested on a random basis.

Random student drug testing is relatively new to schools, after two Supreme Court cases upheld the constitutionality of the tests. A Substance Abuse Policy Research Program (SAPRP) nationwide study found that 14 percent of school districts had at least one of their high schools that conducted random drug testing in 2004-05. Of those that did, over 95 percent included athletes, 65 percent included students who participate in

extra curricular activities and 28 percent included all students.

Trustees expressed concern as well as support for the implementation of a random drug testing program of students in the high school.

Rodney Bell said that while he has a list of questions he wants answered before going forward, "I am pretty much for this." A chief concern of his is the district developing a standardized approach to the policy. He added that he was also a strong advocate of the policy that "if it is good enough for our kids, then it is good enough for our teachers."

Wiggins said that he knew of no statute or legal standard for including teachers in random drug testing and that he is "not familiar with any school district that does it." Killeen ISD maintains a random drug testing of both students in grades 7-12 who are involved in extra curricular activities and for "safety-sensitive" employees. "Safety-sensitive" positions, according to the KISD Policy, include those that involve the handling of potentially dangerous equipment or hazardous substances in an environment including a large number of chil-

Deborah Aldridge told fellow trustees that if the district implements a drug testing program, it should take other steps as well. Aldridge said that the National Institute of Drug Prevention "recommends that a school district never implement without quality curriculum and follow through."

Aldridge said that she had concerns about privacy, and evoked images of a

Miriam Ervi said that she would want to hear from teachers and administrators who would ultimately be responsible for enforcing the program. "A policy is good, but only as good as the people who have to implement it. I would like to hear from them. If they want it, why? If they don't want it, why?" she said.

Chris Seaton said he would favor the testing because it "is going to be a deterrent. It will have a minimal impact on budget. It gives a kid who is at a party where there are drugs a way out. He can say, 'No, I play sports and might get tested."

"If you're in for a penny, you're in for a pound,"
Trustee Jim Reed said.
"The first time you have false positive or other issue, we will need to have our policy and implementation in order. What happens to one student better happen to another."

He added that he would want to "hear from our staff first that it is worthwhile venture. They can tell us what it is going to take. From deterrence aspect, it is a good thing."

"I am for it," President Darrell Street said, "until someone shows me why I am wrong. Somewhere along the line, we have to do something about it."

"This is not a one shot solution to this problem," Kim Bird said. "This needs to be done with other things in mind." The district should have student education, staff education and parent education in place when implementing

### No elections in May

There will be no local elections in Salado in May, the first time in memory for most folks living here.

It is certainly the first time that all three governing entities in Salado -- Salado Independent

-- Salado Independent School District, Salado Public Library District and The Village of Salado -- have all canceled their elections.

Each board voted to do so in March after having just enough candidates file for vacancies on each ballot and waiting until the alloted time had passed for write-in candidates to file for election. Under Texas election codes, "write-in" candidates must now file for election.

Darrell Street and Chris Seaton will both be re-elected to the Salado ISD Board of Trustees for three year terms. It is the second straight term for Street and the third term for Seaton to be elected to the board.

Mayor Merle Stalcup will be re-elected to a two-year term. Aldermen Stephen Peters and Carol Walls will also be reelected to two-year terms on the board. All three are at the end of their first terms in their respective positions. Stalcup served as alderman previously to being elected mayor in 2008.

Dr. Robert Denton and Taylor Willingham will be re-elected to the Salado Library District board of directors. They will be joined by Bill Kinnison, who will begin his duties on the board in May. Dave Carr did not file for re-election to the board.



### A referendum on repeal

Barack Obama rose to prominence after his thunderously unifying message at the 2004 Democratic Convention. The theme of effacing the political and cultural differences between red and blue states carried him through the 2008 elec-

It turned out to be as unrepresentative a campaign as FDR running on balancing the budget in 1932 or George W. Bush touting a humble foreign policy in 2000. Obama, the erstwhile unifier, has set up a fierce ideological struggle over the direction of the country that will rage through 2010 and 2012: Will America make its peace with European-style social democracy, or will it continue to stand out among other advanced Western nations in its relatively robust economic freedom?

Health-care reform is a proxy war in this larger conflict of visions. Obama could have finessed the difference, with incremental steps toward greater government involvement in a health-care sector that is already only half-private. The short-term bragging points for Obama's reform -- keeping children on their parents' policies until age 26, minimizing the doughnut hole in the Medicare prescription-drug program, etc. -- would have passed the Senate with 65 or 70 votes.

But Obama wanted more. Liberals believe the history of progress is written with the extension of the social-welfare state. Bringing more people within its ambit fulfills the promise of America, just like the civil-rights laws of the 1960s. They would have betrayed themselves had they failed to pass a skein of new regulations and an entitlement program achieving universal coverage.

House Democrats acted in the spirit of self-sacrificing revolutionary vanguard. Isolated within the country, opposed by a bipartisan coalition, likely to sustain deep losses from their vote, Nancy Pelosi's 219 gambled that their audacious act would

change the country irrevocably.

Their bet is that American history is unidirectional -- once a system of government benefits is established, it can never be revoked. There are two problems with this otherwise-sensible wager: 1) The important benefits in ObamaCare won't be established until 2014, and Democrats have stirred up an intense, broad-based opposition well in advance; 2) Historic inevitability often goes awry.

Obama doesn't yet seem to realize that reality matters, and sets the standard by which his bill will be judged. "It makes Medicare stronger and more solvent," Obama said, in a typical offering of rhetorical sugar pills. "It will reduce our deficit by more than \$100 billion over the next decade, and more than \$1 trillion in the decade after that."

The fact is that it takes \$500 billion out of Medicare and applies it to the new program. The deficit figures are built on fairy-tale assumptions. The rest of the assurances made about the bill -- it will reduce premiums, cut costs and create jobs -- were desperate campaign-style promises made to get it over the finish line.

Obama said passage of the bill "proved that we are still a people capable of doing big things." He defines our greatness by how much we are willing to tax ourselves and to spend. Whether the country accepts that view, and the dreary future it suggests, will be adjudicated in November

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### Column discovers plan for I-35 to bypass Salado with six lane toll road; Tourism \$\$\$ protected

Information, gained from sources close to the State Highway Department, has disclosed that an alternate construction plan is being considered by highway officials that will not require expanding I-35 through Salado as discussed in the public meeting held by TxDot, March 11 at the Village Intermediate school.

Reason for the dramatic change in plans is due to opposition by a number of residents and business owners who voiced fear that the widening of I-35 and conversion to one-way frontage roads, on both sides of the proposed six lane highway, would virtually eliminate the ease that visitors enjoy when using the currently configured ingress-egress ramps.

#### TXDOT OFFICIALS "MUM"

Officials at both Austin and Bell County Highway Department headquarters declined to comment on the routing change, but detailed info-data gained from persons familiar with the altered roadway plan, indicated that initial drawings for a Salado "I-35 by-pass" (that had been previously shelved) were back on the front burner, complete with updated cost analyses and land acquisition procedures to be followed.

#### SALADO BYPASS DETAILS

According to those who have seen the surprising (and totally unexpected) schematics of the revised I-35 expansion plan, reported the following "specs" surrounding the new roadway that will completely bypass Salado: Starting at a point north of the Village, the interstate will be routed in a southerly direction just beyond the eastern boundary of Salado - until returning to I-35 several miles south of the Village.

The enhanced roadway would generally parallel the golf course and Mill Creek within a strip of land approximately 3.285 miles wide, in order to handle today's heavy traffic, plus increased usage expected in future years.

Salado's "alternate highway bypass plan" includes (for starters) a six lane roadway, with the remaining land set aside for a futuristic high speed railway and eventual placement of underground utility transmission lines.

There are no planned on-off ramps and of course no frontage roads - although some of the roadway (as it passes east of Mill Creek) will be elevated to provide necessary access to future building sites further east of the Village: Including light industries that prefer commercial and home sites near interstate roads and railways, to better handle incoming raw materials as well as shipping finished products

### SPAIN'S CINTRA INVOLVED?

There's also conjecture (slyly astir) in Austin that the well known Spanish road construction company - Cintra, is seriously being considered as the new Salado bypass's prime contractor. This column has not found a shred of evidence (as of this writing) that Governor Perry is involved in recommending the worldwide road builder, although the "Rickster" was a key player in helping Cintra win a number of State planning and construction contracts.



a policy like this.

Salado is not the only school to grapple with the issue of student drug testing. While small numbers of schools have implemented programs such as random drug testing, others have decided that it is not a worthwhile effort when balancing the problems and negatives associated with the program.

The Office of National Drug Control Policy advises schools to "tread carefully before implementing drug testing policies or programs... school administrators to seek the advice and input of attorneys, parents and teachers, as well as prevention and treatment professionals, according to Dr. Oscar G. Bukstein writing for Behavior Health Management in 2004.

ONDCP recommends policies that are not punitive, but focus on positive test results and mandate further evaluation or treatment. Expulsions or suspensions, according to the ONDCP, should be delivered only in cases of noncompliance with evaluation or treatment. "Drug testing should be only one component of a broader program, incuding prevention and treatment elements, designed to reduce student drug use," Bukstein wrote.

Athletes and students involved in extracurricular activities represent the lowest-risk youth for drug use and associated

problems, according to "Adolescents Bukstein: at highest risk will not be tested."

Also, random drug testing does not address the more prevalent problem of alcohol use by teenagers.

Rather than random drug testing of students least likely to develop drug problems, Bukstein recommended "a more considered form of student drug testing -- that for 'cause or suspicion."

The SAPRP study of schools with random drug testing of student athletes found no difference in the rates of marijuana or other illicit drug use by students in schools with drug testing program versus those without.

However, a small casecontrol pilot study of random drug testing of athletes found a significant decrease in past 30 day illict drug use by athletes attending an experimental school with a drug testing program compared to athletes attending a control school. That 2003 Goldberg study, however, found that athletes in the experimental school expressed more attitudes associated with increased drug use, which suggest that students exposed to drug testing may have higher risk of future drug use than peers in the control schools.

The topic is slated for the 6 p.m. April 19 school board meeting at the Salado Civic Center.

the queen, East would win with the ace and probably shift to a diamond. If West had the diamond ace, this would result in rapid defeat.

To defuse this threat, declarer played low from dummy at trick one! South reasoned that by allowing West to hold the lead, the king of diamonds would be protected from attack, after which making 10 tricks would pose no problem.

South's plan would have worked like a charm if East had been asleep at the switch. However, East viewed this Greek gift with grave suspicion. It was obvious that declarer had the missing four of hearts since South would automatically have covered the jack with the queen if he were void in the suit.

So East overtook the jack with the ace, even though this established dummy's K-Q as tricks, and shifted to the queen of diamonds to set the con-

East reasoned that South had not covered the jack of hearts because it was not in his best interests to have East on lead at trick two. But, thought East, if declarer didn't want him on lead, then it must be correct to take the lead.

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

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
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### State Rep. assesses his first Legislative session

Sent by the people of District 55 to the state Capital in November 2008 as a newly-elected, small business owner from Bell County, Ralph Sheffield has returned as a seasoned legislative veteran.

That was the assessment of his freshman year in the 81st Legislative session when he spoke to Salado Rotarians March 23. A record 7.609 bill and Constitutional Amendments were filed and for the second time since World War II the budget was reduced from the previous biennium, leaving the \$6.7 billion Rainy Day Fund in tact. "That means no increased taxes," he said. He added that Texas is one of few states in the nation with positive bal-

The trimmed down budget included \$8 million for the growing Texas A&M School of Medicine in Temple; over \$100 million funding for Texas' border security; \$1.2 billion increase in higher education funding; an addition of \$250 million in financial aid for 35,000 more college students; and \$35 million to address nursing shortage in Texas.

Sheffield noted bills which he co-authored, all addressing government efficiency, accountability and consumer protection.

In July 2009 the Legislature was called to take up business left unfinished during the Special Session called by Governor Perry. Top priority was to authorize \$2 billion in bonds al-

ready approved by voters for maintenance and construction of roads. "This has put I-35 on a faster track," Sheffield said.

Sheffield stressed the importance of the 2010

census. "It is possible that our area will receive an additional congressional seat," He explained, adding "We may see three or four congressional changes." Answering questions about the impact of the recent Health Care overhaul on Texas, Sheffield acknowledged that Texas will join at least 13 other states in a class action lawsuit against the Federal Government, claiming the law to be unconstitution-

Sheffield spoke of the importance of building good relations whether in business or politics. "I feel that my years as a business man in District 55 have enabled me to represent the best interests of our community as State Representative," he said.

Concluding his report, Sheffield invited calls and visits from his constituents regarding issues important to them and pledged to serve with "openness and honesty" as long as he is "privileged" to hold the office.



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



