## Harvey evacuees land here, village gives to others

About 30 evacuees from Hurricane Harvey are expected to find lodging at the Holiday Inn-Express here in Salado this week.

Meanwhile a family of 10 were here earlier this week, but returned home to Port Lavaca on Aug. 30, according to Amber Preston-Dankert. Before they left, she asked for donations of milk, bread, coolers, gloves, trash bags, bleach and paper goods for the travelers.

First Baptist Church of Salado is housing half a dozen evacuees from the storm. The church family there is stepping up to meet their needs for clothes, personal items and the like.

At the same time, the community is helping those who stayed during the storm. Salado Masonic Lodge this week collected items to be delivered to the Ingleside, Aransas Pass and Port Aransas area early on Aug. 31.

Doug McNeese, a retired Army Colonel and past master of Salado Masonic Lodge, told his Lodge brothers that he was taking a trailer and truck to the coastal area and wanted to fill it with bottled water, diapers, hygiene products and disposable wipes. "I don't want to go down with an empty trailer," he said. He pulls out of Bell County early on Aug. 31, hopefully with a trailer full for those in need.

Salado Village Voice served as a collection location early this week as members of the Lodge were joined by members of the community in donating the muchneeded items to those who stayed through the storm.

While Hurricane Harvey caused a great deal of havoc in several counties of the state, he left Salado and Bell County pretty much alone, so far. Rains are still expected this week, but should not cause flooding in the area.

More than 50 counties in Texas were declared disaster areas in the wake of Harvey. Weakening from a Category 4 hurricane to a Tropical Storm, Harvey moved to neighboring Louisiana where he is causing flooding.

But nothing like the 40+ inches of rain that flooded Houston this week and left thousands without homes.

The 30 evacuees coming to Salado midweek are from the Houston area. It may be weeks or even months before they can return to their homes, if they even have homes left.

Bell County Expo Center is serving as an evacuee center as well. Donations for those evacuees should be delivered to Vista Community Church, 7051 Stonehollow in Temple. Vista will sort and deliver items to the emergency shelters that are set up across our community.

Helpful donations at this time include baby diapers, baby wipes, socks (adult and children), shoes (adult and children), new underwear (adult and children), clothing, feminine hygiene products, kids toothpaste, hand sanitizer, Chapstick, Kleenex, paper towels, toilet paper, coloring books/crayons for kids, books for kids, NEW stuffed animals with tags, body lotion, drawstring bags or totes for people to keep items together.

## Airpark with residences could be developed in Salado

Salado could have an Airpark complete with privatelyowned hangers and living quarters, if a proposal comes to fruition.

The Village is currently studying the feasibility of a proposal which would ultimately bring the acreage of the Airpark into the Village limits and ownership of the runways, taxi ways and flight operations building to the Village.

The airport will continue as a day-time only airport, unless the Federal Aviation Agency (FAA) and Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) determine that there is demand for it to serve as a lighted airport.

The flight patterns for the

Salado airport will remain the same, running north to south. Coachman said that the current flight pattern for the Skydive Temple is to veer west as soon as possible to mitigate noise over Salado proper.

The discussion of any kind of public-private partnership for the development of the Airpark, which could include more than 120 privately-

owned hangers sold by the municipal airports in towns private developer, are in its infancy, Coachman said.

municipal airports in towns such as Lago Vista and Cedar Park to consider whether the

Aldermen discussed it briefly during an Aug. 17 workshop session.

The Village is currently bringing data together to study the feasibility of the project before further negotiations.

The Village is looking at operations of other small

nunicipal airports in towns such as Lago Vista and Cedar Park to consider whether the Village would someday take over the ownership of the airport operations itself.

The Village is also in contact with TXDOT and FAA about funding sources for future improvements and expanded use of the airport property.

Data on the cost of oper-

ating a small municipal airport, the facility costs associated with an airport and the impact of improved property and the taxes they will generate has not been formulated in any way as of this time.

Coachman said that the feasibility study to be compiled by the Village should take 90 days to complete.

## Fish Fry benefits SVFD

You can support the Salado Volunteer Fire Department during its annual Fish Fry 5-7 p.m. Sept. 9 at the Salado Intermediate School. Tickets are \$12 for adults and \$6 for children.

The Fish Fry is one of three annual fund raisers the SVFD has each year. The Department also has a successful Smokin' Spokes in the spring and a Smokin Sneakers in the fall.

SVFD has one of the larger service areas in the County at more than 100 square miles. It also has more than 10 miles of Interstate in its service area.

The Salado Volunteer Fire Department was established in the mid 1960's and was one of the first volunteer fire departments organized in Bell County.

The department began operations with one 1950 pumper truck located by Salado Creek in a two-door

garage type building. At that time, the 911 Emergency System did not exist. Salado fire and emergency calls were telephoned to the local hotel, Stagecoach Inn. Firemen were telephoned at their homes or work to respond to calls for help. Some years later a siren was installed close to the fire station. When a call for help was made to the fire station, the entering call would activate the siren. When the volunteers heard the siren, they would respond to the emergency. Today Bell County has established a state of the art communication center that dispatches all fire, police, sheriff, and ambulance services.

In the mid-1980s, Station 1 was built along the north-bound access road.


In 2015, Station 2 was built on FM 2484 giving the SVFD quick access to north-

bound and southbound I-35. The SVFD is headed by

Fire Chief Shane Berrier.

## Yes, Work for Trump

Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin took the highly unusual step recently of publicly explaining why he won't resign.

He responded to Yale classmates who had written an impassioned open letter urging him to quit in protest over what they called (ridiculously overstating their case) President Donald Trump's "support of Nazism and white supremacy." There was no reason for Mnuchin -- a busy man and one of the most important economic officials on the planet -- to bother replying unless he feels a little defensive.

Charlottesville, the question of the propriety of serving in the Trump administration gained new salience. Rumors swirled that economic adviser Gary Cohn was on the verge of quitting in disgust, and liberal journalists called for all good men and women to jump ship. This is wrongheaded. It's much better for the country that as many responsible, talented people serve the Trump administration as possible.

Even if it isn't easy. Working for Trump means being willing to put up with the possibility of humiliation of the sort that loyalist Attorney General Jeff Sessions suffered at the president's hands. It means dancing around his outrageous state-

ments and pretending to work for a more normal president. And it means courting social disapproval.

This can't be what a high-flying financier and movie producer like Steve Mnuchin signed up for. But any Trump official who doesn't think he is being forced to violate his personal conscience should stick it out.

The presidency is an important institution, and whatever fantasies his enemies may have of a rapid ending to his tenure, Trump is president. He needs good advice and competent help. There are obviously limits to how much he can be controlled, but he is susceptible to advice. It's no accident that Trump hasn't withdrawn from NAFTA, pursued a trade war with China or kneecapped NATO.

Surely, many of those around Trump enjoy the thrill of notoriety and proximity to power, as is true in any White House, but a sense of duty weighs as well. "There are people inside the administration," Anthony Scaramucci said during his

turn as White House communications director, "that think it is their job to save America from this president." This puts it starkly and derisively, but no doubt accurately -- especially when it comes to the generals.

The portfolios of Secre-

tary of Defense James Mattis and national security adviser H.R. McMaster include the most consequential matters of state, and John Kelly is now running the White House as chief of staff. The administration's credibility depends in large part on the service of these men. It's comparable to the moral power that David Petraeus assumed in 2007 when George W. Bush subcontracted making the public case for the Iraq War to him. If any of the generals, particularly John Kelly, were to quit and lambaste Trump on the way out the door, it might have a debilitating effect on his presidency. That sounds alluring to Trump's critics. But crippled presidencies aren't good for the country, and Trump was duly elected. So the generals are right to stay and serve their country in this capacity. Someone has

# Bull market is one of longest running since records kept

Here is a glimpse of the markets and economy as of August 28, 2017.

#### The Markets

This bull market in equities (stocks) is now one of the longest running since records have been kept on such things. Some appear to be in fear that simply because it has run so long, it must be headed for a fall. At least historically, markets don't collapse just because they are a certain age. Rather, some element of the market or the economy has consistently been dramatically overpriced before the stock market takes a plunge. We see the broad market as fairly priced and having risen to where it is because of good earnings.

#### The U.S. Economy

With nearly all the companies in the S&P 500 now having reported second quarter earnings, it appears that those companies' profits are up about 12 percent from last year. Significantly, much, if not most, of that very pleasant gain in earnings, has come from the overseas subsidiaries of U.S. corporations. That rise reflects the ongoing recovery in the European Union and developing market countries around the world.

A very significant corner has finally been turned in the recovery from the "great recession." It appears that for the first time since 2007, all 45 countries tracked by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OCED) have turned in a positive growth rate for the last twelve months. More, 33 of them appear to be accelerating and are likely to produce an even better rate a year from now.

If you enjoy worrying about things, there are some things that could legitimately concern you, but maybe not.

Housing sales, both existing and new, fell 1.2% last month after falling in June. The problem appears to be that there are just not enough houses available for sale. Again, the reason appears to be that we need more workers than we have available. U.S. durable orders to manufacturers in the U.S. fell 6.8% from last month, but if you look beyond the bottom line, the purchasing managers' index was up, and once we exclude aircraft from the numbers, orders were up half a percent from last month.

There does continue to be a concern that either Congress or the President will trigger a government shutdown and a failure to pay all the bills due at the end of this month. Fitch has warned that if a shutdown is triggered, it will lower the U.S. credit rating, not a good thing.


#### Oi

The calmness in the oil markets as a hurricane clawed its way through the Gulf of Mexico is remarkable unless one understands the economic forces at work. A decade ago, a hurricane in the Gulf would have caused an oil price surge that could have disrupted the economy. Back then, U.S. oil production was concentrated in the Gulf and imports, which made up a much bigger portion of the market, had to mainly come into the Gulf of Mexico to reach us.

Today most U.S. oil comes from far inland as fracking has changed the economic landscape. Yes, refineries will need to shut down, and that may cause a temporary spike in petroleum product prices, and there may need to be some damage repair after the storm passes, but the days of a major wipe-out of U.S. oil production as off-shore rigs were wrecked is behind us.

The fact that American ingenuity and investors' money has made us far more secure than we were in the past may not make the evening news, but, at least in our opinion, it should!

A banner year enters the record books for Salado Legends! Inasmuch as this year was our 25th anniversary, we treated the season with a little more pizzazz than usual. The funds saved for sound improvements were well worth the six thousand dollars spent on the new body mics this year. The season was like a gigantic family reunion. Previous actors and crew members were invited back to attend one or more of our three performances and to be honored for their contributions to Salado Legends. More than 100 people who had previously participated in the drama returned to see the many changes that have occurred over the past twenty-five years. Mayor Skip Blancett welcomed over 839 show attendees (I say OVER to include the kids that sneak into the show each year). Mayor Blancett expertly led previous cast and crew in relating tales about their experiences in Legends and read the gracious letter from Texas Governor Greg Abbott congratulating Salado Legends on our 25th season. Additionally, Nancy Mackey and Susan Humiston presented the theater with an artfully constructed wagon wheel (Tablerock's Logo) that was placed on the concession building to commemorate the show's 25th anniversary.

As we have learned over time, folks come to the show from all over the state. The major cities are well-represented with Central Texas providing the lion's share of the attendance. This year a resident of Georgetown won the drawing of a gift certificate graciously provided by the Inn at Salado on Main Street. We always ask our attendees to complete a survey, and this year's response rate was approximately 25 percent or 210 folks. From their responses we learned that 12 rooms were rented in Salado during the three performances. Had 100% of

the attendees responded, we estimate that 48 rooms may have been rented during the season. An extrapolation of the total economic impact from this year's attendance, using the Institute of Outdoor Theater's algorithm, computes to \$249,852.

At intermission of the final show, scholarships were awarded to the 16 actor/crew members in the total amount of \$13,200. Some donors presented their awards personally; other awards were presented by Andy Anderson, Donnie Williams and Tablerock Board members. The students were happy for the college assistance, and the presenters were pleased to help. And to think that the scholarship program started in 1993 with a \$250 grant. 





Salado put the ball on the ground eight times against the Trojans last year as the offense struggled to get the ball from the center to the quarterback. Salado lost to Troy 15-3 in a contest that was marked by turnovers and penalties by a young offense.

Those drive-killing mistakes have been addressed in recent scrimmages as Salado began two-a-days early this month with a year of experience under their belt with the slot T offense.

The slot T -- when it hits -can be a devastating offense that takes advantage of timing and misdirection to keep defenses on their heels. But when it goes badly because of missed snaps, bobbled handoffs and jumpy linemen, it can get off the rails.

Salado has three starters returning to their backfield positions, including the All-District fullback Trey Sheppard, who carried the ball for 1,210 yards on 214 carries and 11 touchdowns. Aaron Torczysnki had 1,066 yards on 151 carries and seven touchdowns.

The quarterback and center duo of Hayden Haire and Willy Whigham (named first team All-District at center) will also bring experience to the slot T offense.

Overcoming the woes of its first game last year, Salado went on to a 7-5 winning season and a first round win in the playoffs, something that had not happened since Jeff Cheatham coached here.

Later that year, he and Randy Rogers released their live album "Watch This" with standards from their careers in the Texas music scene.



## The bidding tells the tale

#### Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Assume you're East, defending against four hearts reached in the manner shown. Partner leads a diamond, which you win with the ace, and you return a diamond to partner's king. Partner continues with the jack, and declarer ruffs.

South leads a low heart to dummy's jack, and it is at this point that the outcome hangs in the balance. If you take the ace, declarer makes the contract; if you duck, he goes down one.

Let's say you win the jack with the ace, as most players would do. If you return a diamond, declarer ruffs in dummy and scores the rest of the tricks; if you return anything else,

to West's two and must go down one. If South discards on the fourth diamond, he goes down that much sooner.

How can you tell that ducking the jack of hearts is the right play? Well, you can't be certain it will beat the contract, but all the evidence points in that direc-

The main clue lies in the bidding. South is unlikely to have six hearts, because he would be more inclined to rebid a six-card major suit at his second turn than name a minor suit.

Once you credit South with only five hearts -- which means West has four -- you are sure to beat the contract by refusing to win the first heart. (c) 2017 King Features Syn-





Blanchard's Cricket Frog

## This little frog makes big jumps

Animals utilize many different forms of adaptation to aid in their survival. Some species rely on camouflage for protection, some rely on speed, while others rely on behavior. However, there is a miniscule species that thrives along the shores of most permanent bodies of water that relies primarily on its size, or lack thereof, to aid in its protection. That species is the Cricket Frog.

Blanchard's Cricket Frog (Acris crepitans blanchardi) belongs to a frog family that has three representatives here in Texas, although it is the only one of its genera. This particular variety occurs throughout the eastern three quarters of this state, roughly east of the Pecos River. It inhabits almost any body of permanent water, regardless whether the source is natu-

ral or man-made. It prefers to live in the shallow, stagnant pools that often collect near the main body of water. In this habitat, it thrives amongst the lily pads and other plant mats, using these as hiding places. Outside of Texas it can be observed from western Oklahoma northward to the north central states of Nebraska and Iowa.

This small species can be quite variable in appearance. The ground color along the back can vary from different shades of brown and tan to olive-green. The markings along the dorsal area can be just as variably colored,

ranging from yellow, brown or green. These markings can be quite dark to almost invisible, and often appear as longitudinal lines. There is a diagnostic dark triangle that appears between the eyes on the top of the head. The back legs are long, and the feet are completely webbed save for the longest of the toes. The skin is warty, but contradictory to the old wives tale, one cannot get warts from touching this amphib-

Wild About Texas

As stated already, this species is rather minute. Adult females are slightly the larger sex, with mature individuals approaching one and one half inches in body length. Males are smaller, seldom exceeding one inch. This variety of true frog is one of the smallest, if not THE smallest, species of amphibian that occurs in this state.

Like other amphibians, Cricket Frogs live a dual life. Unlike many frog species that breed in the spring even when temperatures can

dip near freezing, this variety prefers to breed in mid summer while the temperatures are almost unbearably hot. Mature adult males will congregate along the banks of the shallow pools that they call home and will call for the attention of females. Their calling voice can be likened to the clicking of the balls of a pendulum, starting slow and climaxing at about three or four per second. Once a receptive female approaches, the male will clasp the female around the waist and externally fertilize up to two hundred eggs. This activity is known as amplexus. Once the eggs hatch, the fish-like tadpoles are primarily herbivorous, and over the period of just a few weeks, the tadpoles metamorph into small froglets, developing airbreathing lungs rather than gills, absorbing the tail, and

Cricket frogs are alert and shy, and can be extremely difficult to approach too closely. Many will rely on camouflage for protection, sitting perfectly still along the bank until a perceived predator gets too near. At this point, this tiny frog will scurry away with a series of erratic long jumps.




