The Non Sequiturs of the Gun Debate

The mind boggles at the horror of Las Vegas, where Stephen Paddock perched himself in the 32nd floor of the Mandalay Bay hotel and sprayed bullets into a crowd of outdoor concertgoers in the worst mass shooting in American history.

If this slaughter of innocents were an act perpetrated by a foreign power, the U.S. military retaliation would immediately, and begin rightly so.

The impulse to act to stop the domestic massacres that have become a heartbreakingly metronomic feature of American life is laudable and understandable. "It's time," as Connecticut Sen. Chris Murphy said, giving voice to the sentiment, "for Congress to get off its a-- and do something.

The problem is that the "something," namely all the usual gun-control proposals, isn't well-suited to stopping mass shootings. But liberal politicians never let the inapplicability of their proposals stop them. The passion with which they advocate for new gun-control measures is inversely related to their prospective efficacy.

The go-to proposal is universal background checks, although the perpetrators of mass shootings usually haven't been adjudicated and therefore have passed background checks, as Paddock did in purchasing at least Rich Lowry



some of his guns. No enhanced background-check regime, no matter how vigorous, would have stopped him from purchasing guns.

Hillary Clinton immediately singled out so-called silencers, or suppressors, "The crowd fled at the sound of gunshots," Clinton tweeted. "Imagine the deaths if the shooter had a silencer, which the NRA wants to make it easier to get." This conjures an image of the killer shooting down people with a gun impossible to hear, a conception straight out of a James Bond movie.

In a piece on Republican-supported legislation to make suppressors easier to acquire. The Washington Post notes that one of the devices would lessen the sound of an AR-15 to 132 decibels, or comparable to "a gunshot or a jackhammer." In other words, a rifle still sounds like a gun even with a sup-

If Hillary cares so much about the issue, she might take 10 minutes to learn something about it, but gun-controllers tend to be low-information advocates. Confusion between semi-au-

tomatic weapons, which are common and fire once each time the trigger is pulled, and automatic weapons, which are rare and fire multiple times each time the trigger is pulled, is a persistent feature of the gun debate. Many gun-controllers don't know the difference and erroneously refer to, say, AR-15 rifles as machine guns or automatic weapons.

This is an area where Congress has already legislated, though. It is illegal to own an automatic weapon made after May 1, 1986, and difficult and expensive to own one made before that.

Finally, there are always calls to limit magazine sizes, although this wouldn't have stopped Paddock, either. It took the SWAT team more than an hour to breach his

The images from Las Vegas are sickening. There's the sound of gunfire truly worthy of a war zone as people scream and run and cower, with nowhere to go. This shouldn't happen in America; it shouldn't happen anywhere. But that doesn't mean that the off-the-shelf obsessions of gun-control advocates would do the slightest thing to stop it.

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How unemployment rate can drop with fewer people employed

The Markets The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) closed at 2549.33, up 1.19% for the week, 13.87% year-to-date, and 18.37% for 52 weeks (one year). The Index didn't close at a record, but it did Thursday and is up about 2% from its recent

crossing of the 2500 mark. The 10-year, benchmark U.S. Treasury note ended today yielding 2.366%, very close to where it started the week. The puzzling behavior of the exceptionally low interest rates and inflation we have and are experiencing continues. Gold prices dropped to \$1,277.70, down 0.38% for the week and down 5.43% for the last month. It remains at near break-even (not count-

ing transaction costs) for one

vear.

There were two employment statistic numbers reported from the Labor Department that sounded contradictory but were not. The unemployment rate for September dropped from 4.4% to 4.2% but the total number of persons employed declined by 33,000. The release included a note that the drop in total employment was very likely the result of Irma hitting Florida and Harvey smacking several places along the Texas coast.

So, how is it that the unemployment rate declined even though fewer people are working? The answer begins in the fact that the unemployment rate is derived from household surveys while the number of people employed is a total of what government organizations and a sample of larger companies report. The household survey is a large-scale sampling of the views of members of household members as to whether they believe they are employed, looking for work, willing, but not looking for work, or simply not looking. hurricane impact is that the people who are temporarily unemployed by the disasters are not looking for work as they expect to return to work when things are cleaned up.

Unemployment is the lowest since 2001, and that suggests that we are at or very near "full employment." Just about everyone who wants a job has one. Historically, somewhere around 4% of the working population is between jobs at any given moment as they move to a better job, a transition from one location to another, or are entering or leaving school. The drop in total employment was focused in food-service and drinking establishments. Simply put, following the hurricanes, restaurants, and bars are not doing much business in the affected ar-Not headlined in many

places was another economic statistic. The Institute for Supply Management's (ISM) Index of Manufacturing Activity climbed to 60.8, its highest reading since 2004. Any number above 50 indicates growth in that Index. The survey found "expanding business conditions, with new orders, production employment, order backlogs, and export orders all growing in September." The only reported negatives were fears of a shortage of component parts, raw material, and labor. The ISM additionally reported that non-manufacturing economic activity rose to the highest level since 2005. At the same time, the University of Michigan's survey of consumer sentiment indicated optimism and an expectation of rising inflation in 2018.

The day after the ISM

report, Autodata reported a 6.1% surge in automobile sales as pickups and sports utility vehicles sold faster than they were being manufactured. That surge in sales appears to be, at least in part, a result of the unprecedented number of automobiles destroyed in the hurricane-related flooding. An economic cash flow from insurance companies to car dealers is underway that will likely continue for a while. General Motors Co. saw a 12% rise in sales in September over the previous month while Ford reported a 10% rise and Toyota sales rose 15%.

Why is all this important? Final sales to members of the public, or as they are referred to economically, "consumers," represents about 70% of the economic activity in the U.S. When consumers are buying and optimistic about the future, we are likely to see good economic times ahead, and growing earnings for corporations. Those earnings are what drive the stock market, and more stock market value produces more wealth. The bottom line is that we have a healthy, growing economy with likely better times ahead. The only threats currently in sight are worker shortages and the potential for political disruption of imported materials needed to keep manufacturing go-

Stinnett Mill post 1930 (part 2) from Oct. 5

Stinnett Mill ground grain for over sixty years before closing its doors in the 1930s. The machinery for operating the mill that had been left intact when the mill closed was eventually removed and the building allowed to fall into ruins. The basement of the mill became a den for rattlesnakes and other creepy, crawly flea-bitten varmints.

Then after sitting abandoned in a ghostly eerie silence for 15 to 20 years, in 1945 the mill was given a new life and a new purpose. Ruth Berry Brown, the daughter of one of Salado's pioneer families, purchased the old mill to be used as her week-end home. She also wanted to preserve it as a monu-



letters. DON'T SPIT ON THE FLOOR! That was to guard against getting germs in the grist."

After purchasing the mill and making some changes to convert it into a home, Ruth Berry Brown, sold the mill to Forrest and Linda Gist circa 1968. After four years of working nights and weekends, the Gist family was able to move into the historic mill. The restoration work, however, continued for another ten years. During the restoration stage, Gist was careful to keep the authenticity and character of the original structure by using materials from old homes and buildings that were being torn down in the Salado, Taylor, and Waco areas.

After their purchase of the mill from Gist in 1992, David and Pat Mikulencak was another couple to call Stinnett Mill home. The couple reared

three children on the banks of the Salado while residing in the converted mill. Gist had done the first phase of the restoration that preserved the rustic appearance of the mill. During the 20 years the Mikulencaks lived in the mill, they completed the second phase of restoration by adding energy efficient features and a contemporary interior de-

David and Whitney Hill purchased the mill in 2010 and like the previous owners, they have worked to preserve the historic nature of the mill. And thus, Ruth Berry Brown's objective of preserving the mill as a monument to the history of the region has been met and Stinnett Mill lives on.



ment to the history of the region. With this in mind, she did considerable work restoring the building, including putting on a new roof. The original roof was made of shingles fashioned by hand with a froe.

When author A. T. Jackson came to Salado in the early 1970s to gather information for his book Mills of Yesteryear, he explored the grounds and the mill building and after a thorough inspection, he described Stinnett Mill as follows:

"An examination of the interior of the old mill building disclosed several features of interest. In the south end of the ground-level floor was a large fireplace, built of native limestone. In the south center of the first floor is a trap door came and enabled a workman to cut off the power. But to cut off the supply of water someone had to go to the dam, about nine hundred yards southwest of the building, to cut it off at the sluice by lowering the gate. When the mill was closed at night the machinery was disconnected in the building, but the water was permitted to run in the sluice.'

"Looking down the shaft beneath the cut-off, one sees a roughly circular excavation, about four feet across, dug through rocks and stony soil, leading to a depth of some thirty feet. In the bottom of this shaft, during the operation of the mill, was a turbine to furnish power for the mill. The water from the sluice entered the basea well-built archway. The water poured into the shaft, turned the turbine and then was pumped or flowed out of the sluice at the opposite side and started on its circuitous route for return to the

In his handwritten notes regarding his observations, Jackson wrote:


"Inside steps, leading from the first to second floor, had a message of sanitation and health precautions lettered on them. Near the top step and leading down, step by step, were lettered these words in black paint:

DON'T SPIT ON THE THAT MEANS FLOOR!

That the message might not be ignored, it was repeated



A fine declarer, besides playing his cards well, does everything he can to induce the defenders to make a mistake. Take this case where declarer combined both qualities to make a doubled contract that seemed doomed from the start.

West led a club, taken by dummy's ace, and South faced his first problem -- how to handle the spades so as to lose only one trump trick. (He also had two heart and two diamond losers to worry about.)

from dummy. East went up with the ace and played the diamond ace, hoping West had the king and could give him a ruff.

But when West produced the deuce on the ace, denying the king, East returned the king of clubs instead, ruffed by South. Declarer now made the key play when he led a low heart to the ace. West following suit with the seven and East the four. It was a very innocent-looking play that might have caught



But East was soon to learn why South had taken the ace so early in the proceedings.


Declarer next cashed the spade and diamond queens, preparing for the situation he hoped now existed. His efforts were amply rewarded when he led a heart from dummy, forcing East to win with the king. East had only clubs left and had to lead one, allowing South to dispose of his jack of hearts while ruffing in dummy. Declarer then claimed the rest to make four spades doubled.

Had South disclosed his intentions by drawing trumps and cashing the K-Q of diamonds before playing the ace of hearts, East might have jettisoned his king under the ace and thereby defeated the contract. Perhaps East should have done that anyway, but South's smooth-as-silk operation caught him completely by surprise.



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The Tiger Beetle is one of the fastest insects

The term "hiding in plain sight" is a term that is used to describe things that should stand out from other things where it is, but often goes overlooked. There is actually a beetle that is found in west Texas that fits this description perfectly, and that insect is the Tiger Beetle.

The species of Tiger Beetle (Cicindela lemniscata) that is found in this area can be observed from western Texas westward to the Pacific coast of California southward throughout Baja California. Taxonomically speaking, it comes from a large and diverse group of insects that can be seen world-wide, with the majority of the 2,000+ species living in the areas of the Far East and the tropical



areas of South America.

Tiger Beetles are, as the name implies, beetles, and beetles are insects, and like other members of this group, they have three body parts: the head, the thorax, and the abdomen. Each one of these body parts has a specific purpose, with the head being the area where the eyes and feeding appendages are, the thorax is where the legs and wings are attached, and the abdomen is where the majority of the internal organs are housed. Also like others in the insect group, the skeletal

structure is on the outside of their body. This structure is known as the exoskeleton. They have six legs, as well as two pairs of wings and two antennae.

This particular species of beetle is quite attractive and eye-catching as the exoskeleton can be various shades of metallic blue, green, or red. It is also known for its large, bulbous eyes that are almost disproportionate to the rest of this quarter-inch long insect. Its legs are long and spindly, and as such, its body is well off of the ground as it runs. The mandibles, or outer jaws, are also quite large and distinctive, as is the pair of long, thin antennae on the front of the head.

While allowing the animal to stand out against the habitat that it normally prefers, which is usually the sandy loam areas surrounding permanent bodies of water, particularly creeks, draws, and rivers, this brilliant color pattern actually aids in its protection as it gives the animal a cryptic appearance that allows them to go unnoticed until it moves.

Tiger Beetles are highly

predatorial, utilizing its ridiculous speed to overrun and its strong mandibles to overpower smaller insect prey. Some species have been clocked at just over five miles per hour, and in human terms, that is not too terribly fast. However, when the size and speed ratio is calculated to an equivalent amount for humans, it means that a man would be able to run at a video game like speed of over four hundred miles per hour! It is no wonder that this species is able to capture

even the "fastest" of smaller insects.

Even while in the larval stage this species is a ruthless predator. Tiger Beetle larvae live in shallow borrows in the sandy soil with their heads positioned near the opening of the burrow. As unsuspecting insects walk by, the larval stage of this beetle will jump out from the burrow and grab its prey with its jagged mandibles and begin to feed on the victim.

The Tiger Beetle is active

during the day, and many can be observed along the shorelines of local rivers and creeks during the spring, summer and fall. Once it perceives the slightest bit of danger, it will run in short bursts of speed to another spot, quickly blending in despite its bright coloration. Perhaps it disappears so quickly because the eye of the potential predator is still attempting to focus on the insect with the unreal burst of speed that just disap-

peared from plain sight.





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


