



Tillerson Should Go

If Secretary of State Rex Tillerson resigned, how would anyone know?

He has become the nation's least influential top diplomat in recent memory. His relationship with the president of the United States is strained at best, he has no philosophy or signature initiative, he has barely staffed his own department, and he's alienated the foreign service. The former CEO of ExxonMobil has taken one of the power positions in the U.S. government and made it an afterthought.

Who knows the truth of the NBC story that he was close to quitting last summer over clashes with President Donald Trump? But Tillerson's strange press availabili-



derlings. Even a practiced and slick diplomat -- even Henry Kissinger; heck, even Cardinal Richelieu -- would find the circumstances trying. But Tillerson is at sea.

He's an accomplished man who ascended to the leadership of a quasi-state as CEO of ExxonMobil. As such, he had done plenty of work abroad. It was in business, though, not government. Unlike, say, James Mattis advising Trump on defense matters, this is not a professional guiding an amateur; it's another amateur trying to school an amateur. Is it any wonder that it hasn't gone well? American foreign policy, you want someone who is in sympathy with that goal.

Tillerson has been on the other side of Trump on big issues like the Paris climate accord and the Iran nuclear deal. There's no doubt that Trump's instincts need to be restrained and channeled. That's different from trying to frustrate them, which is bound to run afoul of Dean Acheson's maxim: "The most important aspect of the relationship between the president and the secretary of state is that they both understand who is president." Tillerson's diplomatic skills haven't yet been tested on anything important. At this point, he probably fails a threshold test: Can he reliably be thought to speak for the United States government? The former ExxonMobil chief might imagine himself indispensable as a "minder" of the president. Yet Trump is now surrounded by generals who no one doubts are responsible and influential. If Tillerson left, the government would operate as before -- except with a chance there'd be a secretary of state better suited to the role.

U.S. oil exports increase, but we are still net importer

The Markets The S&P 500 Stock In-

dex (SPX) ended the week at 2553.17, up 0.15% for the week, 2.21% for the month, almost 20% since this time last year, and 14% year-todate. The SPX trailing priceto-earnings ratio remains about where it was last year, meaning that the Index has risen almost solely because of a rise in corporate profits. The anecdotal evidence from news reports on the thoughts of investors and traders is that political and global news stories that once moved the market are now being largely ignored. Investors appear to have filtered out the "noise" of sometimes overdramatic announcements and instead focused on what matters, the "earnings" of publicly traded companies.

The U.S. 10-year Treasury note ended the week yielding 2.275%. Interest rates continue to run ahead of last year, but also remain down year-to-date as the expected increase in borrowing demand has not been realized Instead, the economy has continued to grow slowly but steadily in a largely uninterrupted trend since last year. Interest rates jumped immediately following the election, but have been gradually sagging back ever since.

Some of the larger banks reported earnings during the week and while all were solidly profitable, their earnings growth was decidedly muted. The absence of bond market volatility cut into their trading profits while the continuing low and declining interest rates limited their loan profitability.

West Texas Intermediate Crude oil rose 1.54% for the week to end at \$51.38, while gold rose 0.72%, closing at \$1,305.80. That puts gold up 2.42% for one year.



The Economy

U.S. oil exports have risen to almost 2 million barrels per day, two times the average export volume of a year ago, and is up 500,000 barrels per day from as recent as a couple of weeks ago. That puts the United States in the position of exporting almost the same oil volume as Kuwait. Oddly, U.S. oil is less expensive to produce than the oil in Southwest Asia (aka the Middle East).

We remain a net oil importer, but the largest import source for the U.S. is no longer desert nations on the other side of the world, but rather Canada. In another oddity of the oil markets, the biggest customer for our oil exports is also Canada. We import and refine oil from western Canada, and export to eastern Canada where the demand is greater. China is our second largest customer, now importing at a rate nearly nine times that of a year ago. If the oil exports to China were to continue to grow at the rate we have seen in the past year or two, our trade imbalance with China could disappear. Of course, there is no guarantee that would happen.

This increasing export trend appears likely to continue. U.S. oil production costs are falling and production continues to increase even as the world clamors for more of our oil.This issue remains quite simple: U.S. oil is as high quality as that of the Arab nations, but ours is both less expensive and closer to the users and thereby cheaper.

Growing Threats, Weakened Forces: A Hard Look at U.S. Military Strength

If you were asked to rate the readiness levels of the U.S. military, what would you say?

For this exercise, assume you have a scale with five choices: very weak, weak, marginal, strong and very strong. Think about each branch of the military. Where would it fall?

Perhaps you're thinking, "I'm not an expert, so I can't say for sure." So let me refer you to the latest report from The Heritage Foundation's Center for National Defense. The authors are, in fact, experts -- and their conclusions are sobering.

I'm referring to the 2018 Index of U.S. Military Strength. The editors take a hard, detailed look at all the facts, and using the scale

mentioned above, rate the Navy and the Air Force as "marginal" and the Army and Marines as "weak."


How is this possible, you may ask? It's simple. For years now, we've been asking our military to do more with less. They've taken on more work and more missions, all while enduring budget cuts that eat into their ability modernize and equip themselves properly.

Do that long enough, and even the best military in the world will start to feel the effects. It's not a question of dedication or determination.

Our soldiers are doing the best they can, and we should be proud of their professionalism. But if we don't meet them halfway with the monev they need to do all the work they're being asked to do, should we be surprised when we find them running on fumes?

"The common theme across the services," the Index editors write, "is one of force degradation resulting from many years of underinvestment, poor execution of modernization programs, and the negative effects of budget sequestration (cuts in funding) on readiness and capacity."

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



So how does one best judge the right size, strength and capability of our armed forces? The Index editors

used a formula long embraced by successive presidential administrations, Congresses, and Department of Defense staffs: the ability to handle two major wars at the same time.

This is why readiness issues rarely become apparent to the public -- until it's too late. It's like a household living paycheck to paycheck with no savings or line of credit. Everything seems okay until an emergency comes along.

And as the Index also demonstrates, such an emergency is hardly a remote possibility. The editors also assess the various threat levels to U.S. interests around the world (Asia, the Middle East, Europe) and find some troubling storm clouds on the horizon.

All of the six noted "threat actors" in the Index -- Russia, China, Iran, North Korea, and even as America's ability to terrorist groups in the Middle East and Afghanistan -- now rank "high" on the scale of threats to U.S. interests, with Russia coming close to being elevated to "severe" from its past score of "high."

Russia and China are the "most worrisome," the editors note. Both are modernizing and expanding their offensive military capabilities in ways that indicate it won't be long before they could pose a more serious threat than they already do.

And I hardly need to remind everyone of North Korea's nuclear ambitions. The latest tests by Kim Jong-un's bellicose regime clearly hint at North Korea's ability to reach targets in the United States and among its allies.

In short, the world is becoming more dangerous, counter that danger continues to degrade.

But it doesn't have to be this way. There's still time for Congress and the president to turn the ship before it hits an iceberg.

Yes, they have taken some positive steps recently to fund readiness more robustly. But they haven't overturned the Budget Control Act that caps defense spending. And they haven't yet shown a real commitment to fund the military at levels necessary to modernize aging equipment and make the military capable of meeting its many obligations.

President Reagan often spoke of "peace through strength." Our strength is clearly ebbing. Will peace soon follow?




Salado Jr. High Girls Cross Country team won the district meet in Marbles Falls Oct. 14 with a total of 25 points.

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after East ruffed low, you would overruff and simply concede a club to the ace to make the slam. You'd lose a trump trick but nothing else.

Note that if you had incorrectly led a trump at trick two, which many declarers might do, it would have cost you the slam. These declarers would no doubt be hoping that East had overcalled on only a five-card suit, or that West was dealt only one trump. Those who adopted this line of play would have had to pay a heavy price on the actual deal for having failed to take the maximum precautionary measures.

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

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The small spider that spins a giant web


It is a proven fact that there is a tendency for certain family members to "dominate the spotlight". Countless books have been written on the subject. This is true in animal families as well. One member of a larger family is easily the most noticeable, and as such, the other relatives live in virtual obscurity. Such is the case of a small spider known as the Hump-backed Orbweaver.

Hump-backed Orbwe-(Eustala anastera) avers occurs throughout the eastern two-thirds (2/3) of the United States, from the east coast westward to the Rocky Mountains. It can be observed in every ecological bio-zone in Texas, ranging from the more vegetated and humid areas of east Texas to the more sparsely veg-



etated, arid regions of western Texas. As expected with such a broad and diverse natural range, this unimposing spider is considered to be a habitat generalist, thriving in just about any environment.

Hump-backed Orbweavers are relatively diminutive arachnids with a body and carapace length of just over one-half (1/2) inch. As with all other members of the orbweaver family (Araneidae), males are smaller than females. Like other arachnids, this species has two body parts: the front body region that contains



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the eight eyes, eight legs and mouthparts (knows as the cephalothorax) and the abdomen. The carapace is typically gray with a smattering of black peppered along the sides. The abdomen is rather portly and can be quite variable in pattern and coloration. Typically, the rotund abdomen is darker in coloration and is decorated with lighter blotches and symmetrical lines of dull yellow. The underside of the plump abdomen is black and is often ornamented with four circular yellow spots. The black and gray legs are long and spindly, with fairly noticeable hairs and jointed structures. Particularly when compared to its more easily recognizable and therefore familiar kin the Yellow Garden Spider, the Hump-

By the same token, it can detect when a much larger animal (such as humans) comes in

contact with the web, and the spider will then react in a way as to avoid contact with a potential predator. It can be quite interesting to observe this behavior when you encounter an orbweaver. Take your finger (or a small stick if you are afraid of spiders!) and gently touch the web and watch the spider rush out in anticipation of a meal.

While many people who suffer from arachnophobia desire to remove this species from around their home, this harmless spider is actually quite beneficial as it feeds on flying pests such as flies and mosquitoes. So the next time you encounter this beneficial species, rather than killing it, how about just saying "Thank you"!


