From the funds it raises, Salado Education Foundation awarded \$22,000 in scholarships to graduating Salado High School seniors last year. The SEF also awarded \$10,000 in Innovative Teaching Grants to Salado ISD educators and another \$3,000 in mini grants to educators.

Buckley runs for Dist. 54 State Rep.

Dr. Brad Buckley invited Saladoans to a meet and greet at Johnny's Steaks and Barbe-que on Oct. 16. Dr. Buckley announced his candidacy for House District 54 on Sept. 26.

Dr. Buckley, a resident of Salado, took the opportunity to visit with his neighbors and share his love of Salado. He stated "Salado is capitalizing on its small-town values, the well-deserved reputation of its schools and the quality of life it offers those that choose to live here. Susan and I chose Salado more than a decade ago and if you send me to Austin, I'll fight for the community that we share."

Dr. Buckley, in discussing Salado's core as a village of artisans and business owners, said "Salado is back. This village is an example of the triumph of small business entrepreneurs and individuals that have staked their claim for a shot at the American dream. Our state government

Brad and Susan are most proud of their three children, Emily, Erin, and Bo, who have graduated from, currently attend, or plan to attend Texas A&M University.

Amendments on ballot for Nov. 7

On Nov. 7, voters will have a chance to consider seven constitutional amendments proposed by the 85th Legislature.

The proposed amendments cover a wide range of topics, including property taxes, raffles, home equity loan provisions, and more.

Early voting starts Oct. 23 and ends Nov. 3.

Amendments Proposed for the November 7, 2017 ballot by the 85th Legislature

HJR 21, Prop. 1: The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization for less than the market value of the residence homestead and harmonizing certain re-

lated provisions of the Texas Constitution.

SJR 60, Prop. 2: The constitutional amendment to establish a lower amount for expenses that can be charged to a borrower and removing certain financing expense limitations for a home equity loan, establishing certain authorized lenders to make a home equity loan, changing certain options for the refinancing of home equity loans, changing the threshold for an advance of a home equity line of credit, and allowing home equity loans on agricultural homesteads.

SJR 34, Prop. 3: The constitutional amendment limiting the service of certain officeholders appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate after the expiration of the person's term of office.

SJR 6, Prop. 4 The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to require a court to provide

notice to the attorney general of a challenge to the constitutionality of a state statute and authorizing the legislature to prescribe a waiting period before the court may enter a judgment holding the statute unconstitutional.

HJR 100, Prop. 5: The constitutional amendment on professional sports team charitable foundations conducting charitable raffles.

SJR 1, Prop. 6: The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a first responder who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty.

HJR 37, Prop. 7: The constitutional amendment relating to legislative authority to permit credit unions and other financial institutions to award prizes by lot to promote savings.

Adams will seek final term

Salado man has served as 169th District Judge for 17 years

Judge Gordon G. Adams of Salado announced this week his intent to file for re-election to the position of Judge of the 169th District Court.

Judge Adams, age 66, is a Republican and was appointed to the bench by then Governor George W. Bush in June 2000. The voters of Bell County elected Judge Adams to office five times since November 2000. Additionally, Adams has served as the Local Administrative Judge for the Bell County District Courts since December 2012.

"After more than 17 years as a District Judge, this will be the final time I seek re-election to the 169th District

Court. I am extremely proud of the work my staff and I have done to provide quality judicial services to the citizens of Bell County over the past 17 years. My Court Coordinator and Court Reporter are highly professional, and as a team, we strive to treat all citizens and attorneys with courtesy and respect. I will continue to work hard for the citizens of Bell County if re-elected."

Prior to becoming the 169th District Judge, Adams served for over eight years as Title IV-D Court Master for the Third Administrative Judicial Region where he presided over child support dockets in six counties.

Judge Adams presides over civil litigation and family law cases for Bell County. Over the past four years, he has disposed of more than 8,000 cases.

Judge Adams has over 41 years of experience as an attorney and judge. He is a member of the Texas Association of District Judges, the State Bar of Texas, and a life fellow of the Texas Bar Foundation. In addition, Judge Adams is a past president of the Bell County Young Lawyers Association and past director of the Bell-Lampasas-Mills Counties Bar Association and the Legal Aid Society of Central Texas. Adams currently serves as the Judicial

Advisor to the Board of Directors of the Bell County Bar Association. The Bell County Bar Association honored him as the 2005 Government Sector Lawyer of the Year. In 2017, the Killeen ISD Education Foundation recognized Adams as a Distinguished Alumni of Killeen ISD.

Judge Adams is a former mayor pro-tem of the City of Killeen and a past president of the Killeen Independent School District Board of Trustees. He is a past member of the Curriculum Committee for the Texas Center for the Judiciary in Austin.

Judge Adams earned a bachelor's degree from

Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos and a law degree from the University of Texas School of Law. He is married to Barbara Adams who retired as Chief of Staff for the Killeen ISD. The Adams have one son, Michael, who resides in Belton.

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Tillerson Should Go

If Secretary of State Rex Tillerson resigned, how would anyone know?

He has become the nation's least influential top diplomat in recent memory. His relationship with the president of the United States is strained at best, he has no philosophy or signature initiative, he has barely staffed his own department, and he's alienated the foreign service. The former CEO of ExxonMobil has taken one of the power positions in the U.S. government and made it an afterthought.

Who knows the truth of the NBC story that he was close to quitting last summer over clashes with President Donald Trump? But Tillerson's strange press availability swearing his loyalty to the president is not the sort of thing loyalists usually have to do.

The secretary of state dodged questions about whether he had, indeed, as NBC reported, called Trump a "moron" -- almost certainly the first time in U.S. history a Cabinet official has been asked about personally insulting the president he works for and apparently been unable, in good conscience, to deny it.

Tillerson doesn't have an easy job. He works for a mercurial and bombastic boss who has a well-developed skill for humiliating his un-

derlings. Even a practiced and slick diplomat -- even Henry Kissinger; heck, even Cardinal Richelieu -- would find the circumstances trying. But Tillerson is at sea.

He's an accomplished man who ascended to the leadership of a quasi-state as CEO of ExxonMobil. As such, he had done plenty of work abroad. It was in business, though, not government. Unlike, say, James Mattis advising Trump on defense matters, this is not a professional guiding an amateur; it's another amateur trying to school an amateur. Is it any wonder that it hasn't gone well?

In a nationalist administration, he is a man without a country. He doesn't have a constituency in the foreign-policy establishment, in the media, in Congress or in the bureaucracy.

Neither of the opposing dispensations in American foreign policy should feel vested in Tillerson. If you're a liberal internationalist who wants Trump checked, you'd prefer someone better suited to the task. If you're a Trumpist who wants Trump empowered to transform

American foreign policy, you want someone who is in sympathy with that goal.

Tillerson has been on the other side of Trump on big issues like the Paris climate accord and the Iran nuclear deal. There's no doubt that Trump's instincts need to be restrained and channeled. That's different from trying to frustrate them, which is bound to run afoul of Dean Acheson's maxim: "The most important aspect of the relationship between the president and the secretary of state is that they both understand who is president." Tillerson's diplomatic skills haven't yet been tested on anything important. At this point, he probably fails a threshold test: Can he reliably be thought to speak for the United States government?

The former ExxonMobil chief might imagine himself indispensable as a "minder" of the president. Yet Trump is now surrounded by generals who no one doubts are responsible and influential. If Tillerson left, the government would operate as before -- except with a chance there'd be a secretary of state better suited to the role.

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U.S. oil exports increase, but we are still net importer

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) ended the week at 2553.17, up 0.15% for the week, 2.21% for the month, almost 20% since this time last year, and 14% year-to-date. The SPX trailing price-to-earnings ratio remains about where it was last year, meaning that the Index has risen almost solely because of a rise in corporate profits. The anecdotal evidence from news reports on the thoughts of investors and traders is that political and global news stories that once moved the market are now being largely ignored. Investors appear to have filtered out the "noise" of sometimes overdramatic announcements and instead focused on what matters, the "earnings" of publicly traded companies.

The U.S. 10-year Treasury note ended the week yielding 2.275%. Interest rates continue to run ahead of last year, but also remain down year-to-date as the expected increase in borrowing demand has not been realized. Instead, the economy has continued to grow slowly but steadily in a largely uninterrupted trend since last year. Interest rates jumped immediately following the election, but have been gradually sagging back ever since.

Some of the larger banks reported earnings during the week and while all were solidly profitable, their earnings growth was decidedly muted. The absence of bond market volatility cut into their trading profits while the continuing low and declining interest rates limited their loan profitability.

West Texas Intermediate Crude oil rose 1.54% for the week to end at \$51.38, while gold rose 0.72%, closing at \$1,305.80. That puts gold up 2.42% for one year.

The Economy

U.S. oil exports have risen to almost 2 million barrels per day, two times the average export volume of a year ago, and is up 500,000 barrels per day from as recent as a couple of weeks ago. That puts the United States in the position of exporting almost the same oil volume as Kuwait. Oddly, U.S. oil is less expensive to produce than the oil in Southwest Asia (aka the Middle East).

We remain a net oil importer, but the largest import source for the U.S. is no longer desert nations on the other side of the world, but rather Canada. In another oddity of the oil markets, the biggest customer for our oil exports is also Canada. We import and refine oil from western Canada, and export to eastern Canada where the demand is greater. China is our second largest customer, now importing at a rate nearly nine times that of a year ago. If the oil exports to China were to continue to grow at the rate we have seen in the past year or two, our trade imbalance with China could disappear. Of course, there is no guarantee that would happen.

This increasing export trend appears likely to continue. U.S. oil production costs are falling and production continues to increase even as the world clamors for more of our oil. This issue remains quite simple: U.S. oil is as high quality as that of the Arab nations, but ours is both less expensive and closer to the users and thereby cheaper.

In other economic news,

U.S. retail sales rose 1.6% in September but the numbers don't look so rosy when examined more closely. If we take out the car sales jump from car purchases generated by hurricane insurance payments and the spike in oil prices caused by Harvey, the net is only a 0.5% increase. Still, if that continued for a year, it would equate to a 6% increase in consumer spending. Such an increase would add a lot to annual GDP numbers and may show up as a good addition to third and fourth quarter numbers this year.

The increase in consumer spending accompanied and may have been partly stimulated by an unexpected and rather dramatic rise in consumer confidence in the first two weeks of October. The University of Michigan's consumer sentiment index rose to 101.5 for the first weeks in October, up from 95.1 in September. The rise was largely credited to expectations of a tax cut and high employment numbers. The index is now up over 15% from where it was at this time last year.

As a further upbeat item, Social Security payments are scheduled for a 2% increase at the beginning of 2018. That follows years of little to no increases as inflation has been largely non-existent. This rise is a quirk, in that the official measurement of the Consumer Price Index from which Social Security adjustments are taken occurred just as fuel prices spiked following hurricane Harvey. That extra cost of fuel bumped the cost of living increase up to 2%.

Growing Threats, Weakened Forces: A Hard Look at U.S. Military Strength

If you were asked to rate the readiness levels of the U.S. military, what would you say?

For this exercise, assume you have a scale with five choices: very weak, weak, marginal, strong and very strong. Think about each branch of the military. Where would it fall?

Perhaps you're thinking, "I'm not an expert, so I can't say for sure." So let me refer you to the latest report from The Heritage Foundation's Center for National Defense. The authors are, in fact, experts -- and their conclusions are sobering.

I'm referring to the 2018 Index of U.S. Military Strength. The editors take a hard, detailed look at all the facts, and using the scale

mentioned above, rate the Navy and the Air Force as "marginal" and the Army and Marines as "weak."

How is this possible, you may ask? It's simple. For years now, we've been asking our military to do more with less. They've taken on more work and more missions, all while enduring budget cuts that eat into their ability to modernize and equip themselves properly.

Do that long enough, and even the best military in the world will start to feel the effects. It's not a question of dedication or determination.

Our soldiers are doing the best they can, and we should be proud of their professionalism. But if we don't meet them halfway with the money they need to do all the work they're being asked to do, should we be surprised when we find them running on fumes?

"The common theme across the services," the Index editors write, "is one of force degradation resulting from many years of under-investment, poor execution of modernization programs, and the negative effects of budget sequestration (cuts in funding) on readiness and capacity."

He attended Salado schools and graduated from Salado High School in May, 1945.

Bridges was a butcher at various grocery stores for over 20 years and retired from civil service on Fort Hood where he worked in Electronics and Calibrations for over 22 years.

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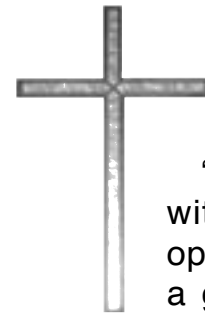

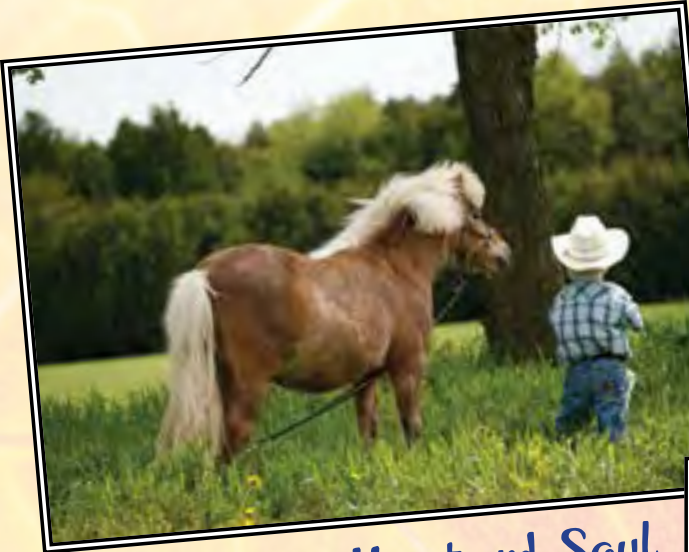
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Sebastian Welch, a junior at Salado High School is coordinating a Christmas for the Coast Toy Drive as part of his Eagle Scout Project.

So how does one best judge the right size, strength and capability of our armed forces? The Index editors

used a formula long embraced by successive presidential administrations, Congresses, and Department of Defense staffs: the ability to handle two major wars at the same time.

This is why readiness issues rarely become apparent to the public -- until it's too late. It's like a household living paycheck to paycheck with no savings or line of credit. Everything seems okay until an emergency comes along.

And as the Index also demonstrates, such an emergency is hardly a remote possibility. The editors also assess the various threat levels to U.S. interests around the world (Asia, the Middle East, Europe) and find some troubling storm clouds on the horizon.

All of the six noted "threat actors" in the Index -- Russia,

China, Iran, North Korea, and terrorist groups in the Middle East and Afghanistan -- now rank "high" on the scale of threats to U.S. interests, with Russia coming close to being elevated to "severe" from its past score of "high."

Russia and China are the "most worrisome," the editors note. Both are modernizing and expanding their offensive military capabilities in ways that indicate it won't be long before they could pose a more serious threat than they already do.

And I hardly need to remind everyone of North Korea's nuclear ambitions. The latest tests by Kim Jong-un's bellicose regime clearly hint at North Korea's ability to reach targets in the United States and among its allies.

In short, the world is becoming more dangerous,

even as America's ability to counter that danger continues to degrade.

But it doesn't have to be this way. There's still time for Congress and the president to turn the ship before it hits an iceberg.

Yes, they have taken some positive steps recently to fund readiness more robustly. But they haven't overturned the Budget Control Act that caps defense spending. And they haven't yet shown a real commitment to fund the military at levels necessary to modernize aging equipment and make the military capable of meeting its many obligations.

President Reagan often spoke of "peace through strength." Our strength is clearly ebbing. Will peace soon follow?

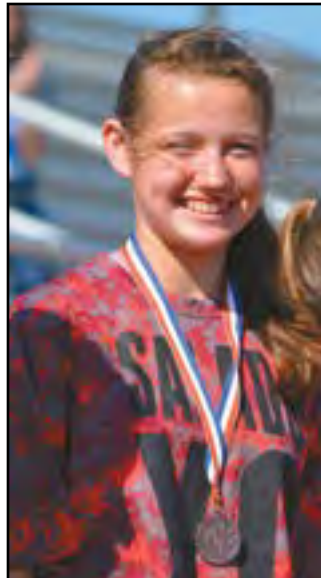

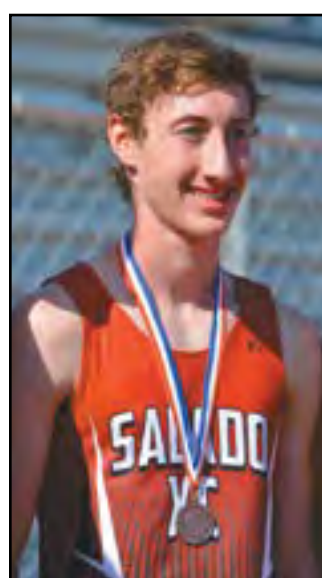

Show time

"Space Park 360: Infinity" is an immersive amusement park with its rides placed throughout the solar system. Designed to recreate the experience of amusement park thrill rides - roller coasters, pendulums, inverters and more, viewers will marvel at the scale of these monumental rides set on such amazing out-of-this-world locations and feel like they are being whipped along roller coaster rides around the sun, through Saturn's rings, around Earth and even on a distant exo-planet. Show time is Saturday at 7 p.m.

"The Cowboy Astronomer" features star legends and cowboy tales around the campfire told by Cowboy poet and humorist Baxter Black. Hear a variety of mythological stories, Native American star lore and other tales gathered over many years of watching and sharing the night sky. Look at constellations of several seasons then examine the relationship between the apparent colors and temperatures of stars and the life cycle of stars. Show time is Saturday at 8 p.m.

"Solar Superstorms" is narrated by Benedict Cumberbatch and is one of the most intensive efforts ever made to visualize the inner workings of the sun. The show takes viewers into the tangle of magnetic fields and superhot plasma that vent the sun's rage in dramatic flares, violent solar tornadoes and the largest eruptions in the solar system. Show time is Saturday at 9 p.m.

Also during October, the Mayborn Science Theater offers Laser Friday on Oct. 20 featuring three laser light shows starting at 7 p.m. with "Space Laser" - a mix of science- and space-themed pop songs. At 8 p.m. is "Laseropolis" - an eclectic mix of musical themes surveying pop, rock, alternative and oldies. And at 9 p.m. is "Laser Zeppelin" which features some of the greatest hits from the iconic rock and roll band, Led Zeppelin.

On Oct. 27-28 during the CTC Haunted House/Fall Carnival, four Halloween-themed laser shows will be shown. At 7 p.m. is "Fright Light" followed at 8 p.m. by "Laser Spooktacular," "Laser Halloween" at 9 p.m. and "Hallowscream" at 10 p.m.

On Oct. 21 is Warren's Star Tour at 7 p.m. Warren Hart, the theater's resident astronomer, takes the audience on a tour of the constellations, stars and other astral phenomena of the night sky.

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Gathering of Clans Nov. 10-12

The 56th Scottish Gathering and Highland Games will be held on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center, November 10-12. Heralding all things Scottish, this landmark event is the oldest Scottish festival in Texas and

has been sponsored continuously by the Salado Museum and College Park (formerly the Central Texas Area Museum) since 1961.

The three-day event includes the skirl of the bagpipes, the wearing of the tartan, tossing the caber, Highland dancing, Celtic music, men in kilts, shopping, food and fun. One of the event's main features is the Clan Village, the largest gathering of Scottish Clan tents in Texas where Clan members share information about Scottish history and genealogy.

The weekend begins on Friday evening Nov. 10 with the Calling of the Clans at 6 p.m. on the banks of Salado Creek off Royal Street just north of the Museum. This is a solemn torchlight ceremony that recreates the coming together of the ancient Scottish clans to fight with Robert the Bruce for Scotland's freedom in 1314 at Bannockburn. The ceremony is free and open to the public and is followed by a ticketed buffet supper and social at the mu-

seum.

"One of the Celtic music groups scheduled to perform during the weekend, Lonestar Stout, will perform Friday evening at Barrow Brewing Company," says Liz Patranella, spokesperson for the museum. "This will provide a rousing after-party for those attending the Social and a preview of things to come on Saturday."

The Civic Center grounds open 9 a.m. on Saturday, November 11. The official opening ceremonies begin at noon with the Bands and Clans Parade on Main Street followed by presentations and massed bagpipe bands on the grounds. The parade forms at South Pace Park Road and will move north on Main to the Civic Center grounds. Spectators are invited to stand along the route or bring lawn chairs to enjoy the parade.

The day's activities include Scottish athletics competitions, dancing and bagpiping competitions, live Celtic music, the Clan Village, Bonniest Knees and

Scottish shortbread contests, a Celtic marketplace, food vendors and more. The Texas Tattoo, with entertainment by bagpipe bands, musicians, singers and dancers, takes place on the grounds at 5 p.m. and is included in the ticket price.

The annual Tartan Dinner will be held Saturday evening at the newly renovated Stagecoach Inn. Reservations for the dinner are required and can be made through the museum office.

Sunday events begin at 9 a.m. November 12 with the Kirkin' o' the Tartan, a traditional devotional service in which family groups carry banners of their family tartans and ask blessings on the families. The day's activities include bagpipe band competition, a "Scottish Dress" pet contest and parade, live music, Clan tents, food and shopping.

Come party with the Scots the second weekend in November.

Assume you get to six clubs on the bidding shown and West leads a heart. Common sense tells you the slam is in danger because East overcalled with two hearts and there is a very good chance the bid was based on a six-card suit. If so, West's lead is a singleton, raising the possibility he may be able to ruff a heart if you lead a trump at trick two.

So you naturally start wondering what can be done about this threat. After you stew a while, you come up with what looks like a promising solution. You win the heart with the

pose of your last heart. Either way, you make the slam.

While East's holding the singleton club ace may appear to be a stroke of good luck, the fact is that this method of play would succeed even if East had the A-x or A-x-x of clubs. In either case, after East ruffed low, you would overruff and simply concede a club to the ace to make the slam. You'd lose a trump trick but nothing else.

Note that if you had incorrectly led a trump at trick two, which many declarers might do, it would have cost you the slam. These declarers would no doubt be hoping that East had overcalled on only a five-card suit, or that West was dealt only one trump. Those who adopted this line of play would have had to pay a heavy price on the actual deal for having failed to take the maximum precautionary measures.

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king, cash the ace of spades and lead a diamond to the king. Your plan is to discard the 7-4 of hearts on the K-Q of spades and then lead a trump.

You do get to discard one heart on the spade king, but when you next lead the queen, it turns out that East has no more spades. However, this does you no harm at all, since East has the singleton ace of clubs. Whatever East does -- whether he ruffs with the ace or discards on the spade queen -- you dis-

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The small spider that spins a giant web

It is a proven fact that there is a tendency for certain family members to "dominate the spotlight". Countless books have been written on the subject. This is true in animal families as well. One member of a larger family is easily the most noticeable, and as such, the other relatives live in virtual obscurity. Such is the case of a small spider known as the Hump-backed Orbweaver.

Hump-backed Orbweavers (*Eustala anastera*) occurs throughout the eastern two-thirds (2/3) of the United States, from the east coast westward to the Rocky Mountains. It can be observed in every ecological bio-zone in Texas, ranging from the more vegetated and humid areas of east Texas to the more sparsely veg-

etated, arid regions of western Texas. As expected with such a broad and diverse natural range, this unimposing spider is considered to be a habitat generalist, thriving in just about any environment.

Hump-backed Orbweavers are relatively diminutive arachnids with a body and carapace length of just over one-half (1/2) inch. As with all other members of the orbweaver family (*Araneidae*), males are smaller than females. Like other arachnids, this species has two body parts: the front body region that contains

the eight eyes, eight legs and mouthparts (known as the cephalothorax) and the abdomen. The carapace is typically gray with a smattering of black peppered along the sides. The abdomen is rather portly and can be quite variable in pattern and coloration. Typically, the rotund abdomen is darker in coloration and is decorated with lighter blotches and symmetrical lines of dull yellow. The underside of the plump abdomen is black and is often ornamented with four circular yellow spots. The black and gray legs are long and spindly, with fairly noticeable hairs and jointed structures. Particularly when compared to its more easily recognizable and therefore familiar kin the Yellow Garden Spider, the Hump-backed Orbweaver is rather unassuming.

Like most of the spiders of this family, the Hump-

backed Orbweaver constructs an intricate web that can extend from the ground up to nearly six feet. This elaborate web is more often than not spun in the shape of an orb, and the spider will frequently remain in the center, awaiting prey to

become ensnared. These prey items, once ensnared in the sticky web, are wrapped in a cocoon by the spider to be fed on at a later time. The primary food source for this spider is not moths and butterflies as one might suspect, but rather flies and other small, flying invertebrate creatures.

The Hump-backed Orbweaver, like most other members of this family, have very poor eyesight, despite the number of eyes. It relies primarily upon vibration to sense prey or potential threats. Centered in the complex web, it can detect when a prey item touches the trap by the vibrations that the potential meal makes. By the same token, it can detect when a much larger animal (such as humans) comes in

contact with the web, and the spider will then react in a way as to avoid contact with a potential predator. It can be quite interesting to observe this behavior when you encounter an orbweaver. Take your finger (or a small stick if you are afraid of spiders!) and gently touch the web and watch the spider rush out in anticipation of a meal.

While many people who suffer from arachnophobia desire to remove this species from around their home, this harmless spider is actually quite beneficial as it feeds on flying pests such as flies and mosquitoes. So the next time you encounter this beneficial species, rather than killing it, how about just saying "Thank you"!
