Scottish Gathering, Highland Games this weekend at Salado Civic Center

The Scots will invade Salado for the 56th Scottish Gathering and Highland Games on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center, Nov. 10-

The Scottish Gathering is the oldest Scottish festival in

The weekend will kick off with Scottish singer and folklorist Ed Miller presenting a one-hour lecture in word and song, 1 p.m. Nov. 10 at the Salado Public Library, 1151 N. Main St. The lecture, Edinburgh and Glasgow in Song, Literature and Humor, is sponsored by the library in partnership with the Salado Museum and College Park. The event is free and open to the public.

Miller is a native of Edinburgh, Scotland, who came to Texas as a young man and has made Austin his home. He holds a graduate degree in Folklore and Geography from the University of Texas at Austin. In addition to having recorded nine CDs of Scottish songs, he is a teacher, speaker, lecturer, radio host and leader of historical tours of Scotland.

The three-day event includes the skirl of bagpipes, wearing of the tartan, tossing the caber, Highland dancing, Celtic entertainers, shopping, food and fun. One of the event's main features is the Clan Village, the largest gathering of Scottish Clan tents in Texas where members from 40 Scottish clans and societies will share information about Scottish history and genealogy.

The Calling of the Clans at 6 p.m. Nov. 10 on the banks of Salado Creek off Royal Street just north of the museum building is a solemn torchlight ceremony that re-creates the coming together of the ancient Scottish clans to fight with Robert the Bruce for Scotland's freedom in 1314 at Bannockburn. The ceremony is followed by a Welcome Social at the Mu-

The Civic Center grounds are open 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Nov. 11. The Bands and Clans Parade on Main Street is at noon followed by presentations and massed bagpipe bands on the grounds. The parade will start at North Pace Park Road and move north on Main Street to the Civic Center grounds.

The day's activities include Scottish athletics competition, Highland Dancing competition, bagpiping and drumming competitions, Bonniest Knees Contest, live Celtic music, a Celtic marketplace, local and Scottish food vendors and more. The day closes with the Texas Tattoo at 5 p.m. on the grounds at the entertainment tent.

The Tattoo includes performances by bagpipe bands, Highland dancers, and Celtic musicians. Entertainers for this year's Gathering are Scottish singer Ed Miller, Celtic band Lonestar Stout, Scottish button accordionist Hugh Morrison with singer Jed Marum, singing trio The DramBeauties, and singer Joe Romeo playing Scottish small pipes and Irish bou-

Sunday events (9 a.m.-3 p.m. Nov. 12) begin with the Kirkin' o' the Tartan, a traditional devotional service in which family groups carry banners of their family tartans and ask blessings on the families. The day's activities include bagpipe band competition, Clan tents, pet parade and contest, music, food, and shopping.

The Wee Scots Gift Shop will be open all three days in the Salado Museum building, located on South Main Street across from the historic Stagecoach Inn.

Mill Creek Country Club re-opens famous creek holes

The ownership group of Mill Creek Country Club marked the re-opening of the creek holes, turning the Robert Trent Jones Jr. course back to its original form, something lost in the devastating floods of 2008 and 2010.

Billy and Vicki Helm cut the ribbon to mark the reopening of those holes after a rehabilitation and rebuilding program of the creek holes that were destroyed by the flood in 2010.

The previous owner opted not to rebuild those holes and golfers for seven years have been playing a mixture of holes to reach a full round of

However, Helm and the new ownership group realized that the long-term health of the golf course required the reconstruction of those creek holes, especially the most fa-

mous ones Creek #1, holes 3, hole five of Creek #1, a fair-4 and 5, Creek #2, holes 7, 8 and 9 and Creek #3, holes 1, 2 and 3.

Salado Creek winds its way through the 27 holes them, proving a worthy challenge to even the most experienced golfers.

Despite the abundance of water surrounding the golf course, forced long-carrying shots are a rarity at Mill Creek, which tends to help the less aggressive players.

A pond between the fifth and ninth holes on the fairways of Creek #2 provides another opportunity to put a misplaced shot in the drink.

If you can avoid the water, players still face dozens of daunting sand traps that dot the fairways and protect the

way bunker on the tough par-4 hole, is perhaps the most intimidating of the bunkers.

Other must-avoids are tactically placed on Creek #2's and affects more than half of eighth hole, a high-lipped bunker that can cause trou-

To score well here at Mill Creek, you better know your way around a putter for these fast-running greens.

With all of these challenges, though, Mill Creek still proves to be manageable for less experienced golfers. The fairways offer large landing areas to counter some of the tough terrain.

Overall, Robert Trent Jones II designed the course to reward well-considered, well-executed shots, yet punishes mistakes.

"Being a golf architect is The behemoth trap on a bit like being a stagehand,"

Jones. Jr. said when the Creek #3 holes were opened in 2001. "We set the stage for the real drama."

The Jones name has been synonymous with the ultimate in golf design for 50 years. Robert Trent Jones II has designed more than 270 golf courses on four conti-

an overall mood or rhythm that engenders feelings of anticipation mixed with nostalgia in most players when they reflect on the course," he states in his biography on

Republicans unveil 400-page tax plan


The Markets

While the S&P 500 (SPX) only rose an anemic 0.26 percent last week to close at 2587.84, it remains up 1.51 percent for the month and over 24 percent from this time last year. The legitimate question has arisen in the minds of many, "Is that too much?" and "Are we in for a fall after such a gain?" The reality is that stock market is priced based on the ratio of corporate earnings to share prices, the price-to-earnings (P/E) ratio. That P/E ratio remains about at its historical average of 18 to 20 and has not risen significantly in the last year.

The compilation of stock prices we refer to as "the stock market" is usually presented as an index, like the S&P 500 or the Dow Jones Industrial Average. Professionals tend to view the price of the broad market based on the P/E ratio of the fictional share of, typically, the SPX. There are times when the P/E ratio is low, and we see the market as underpriced. Other times in history, the P/E ratio has risen to absurd heights of as much as 45 as it did in the "Dot-Com Boom" that ended in the year 2000. In short, the stock market is higher because the corporations represented by shares in that market have increased their profitability that much. The estimates vary, but about 40 percent of those earnings come from outside the United States, so as European and emerging markets countries continue their recovery earnings still have room to grow.

The ten-year U.S. Treasury remained about the

same as last week, but the broad bond market looks to us to be overpriced. Gold was down 0.35 percent for the week but is now down 4.13 percent from last year at \$1,270.20. U.S. Crude Oil was up 2.13 percent at \$55.70, which is unpleasant for gas prices, but great for oil producers and exports.

Employment Report

We had a lot happen in the economy last week, but the two big items were a near-record low 4.1 percent unemployment rate and a sweeping tax proposal presented by the chair of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Employers hired a seasonally adjusted 261,000 employees last month. In addition, the Labor Department reported that instead of losing 33,000 jobs, we gained 18,000 for the month. This is the lowest unemployment we have seen since the year 2000, but this time we are not in an overheated economy headed for a fall. As with the rise in corporate earnings, the global economic recovery and expansion is at least partly driving U.S. employment numbers. In the last major expansion of this length, the U.S. economy, while linked to the rest of the world, was not yet truly "global" in nature. In the two decades that have ensued, the globalization of our economic environment has accelerated. Much of what American companies

create and sell in the U.S. is either composed of parts from elsewhere or assembled in another country of parts manufactured here. More and more U.S. manufactured parts and products are also winding up being sold in other countries. Defining the country of origin for a finished product has become a percentage judgement call and can change depending on whether one is counting parts or dollar value!

A New Tax Proposal

The Republican leadership of the House Ways and Means Committee unveiled a new federal income tax proposal last week. It is a complex 400-page document that has a lot of small changes and a couple of big ones. Fundamentally, it is based on the concept that cutting taxes and thereby increasing the federal deficit by \$1.5 trillion over the next decade is a good idea, but at that point the tax breaks expire and taxes go back up. It chops the corporate maximum tax rate to 20 percent, and if it becomes law, will likely provide a substantial boost to corporate earnings. For individuals, families, and small businesses, some will see a relatively minor tax cut while others will see a small federal income tax increase. It is still just a proposal and will likely see some major changes. We will follow it and report.

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Trump is the GOP Mainstream

President Donald Trump and Sen. Jeff Flake turned out to be no contest. It wasn't Trump who was out of the GOP mainstream, but Flake. The Arizona senator supported Gang of Eight-style immigration reform, when immigration restriction is becoming a litmus-test issue in the party. He is a Goldwaterite, libertarian-inflected conservative, when the market for libertarianism within the party is limited and diminishing by the day.

He is frankly anti-Trump, when Trump owns the party. Many Republican voters are fully aware of the president's flaws, but they don't want to hear about them constantly from Republican officeholders.

Flake's criticisms of the president were honest, sincere and principled. If he's not a finalist for a Profile in Courage Award, the John F. Kennedy Library Foundation is falling down on the job. They also were malpractice. The most likely outcome was

They also were malpractice. The most likely outcome was to make it more difficult to defeat the Trumpite insurgent Kelli Ward in a primary next year, which one would have thought was a paramount political goal.

Worse, Flake apparently rendered himself unelectable. Perhaps he considered speaking out more import-

ant than serving, a personal choice that no one can gainsay. But if the party isn't going to be overrun by Trump sycophants, it will need working politicians who are willing and able to better navigate these waters.

There are a few, more sensible approaches in the Senate.

There's the Ben Sasse model -- speak your mind without fear or favor, knowing that you aren't facing a tough primary in a matter of months and, if you decide to run again, it won't be until 2020, when the mood might have shifted.

There's the Mitch McConnell model -- hold your cards as close to the vest as possible and try to keep things from running completely off the rails so the party's congressional majorities aren't destroyed.

There's the Lindsey Graham model -- criticize Trump when he's wrong and never abase yourself in his defense, but develop a relationship with the president to maximize your sway.

But it's a mistake to assume that Trump will somehow magically evaporate,

leaving everything in the party as it was before he showed up. At this point, a Trump failure will take down the party, too, and may deepen and intensify the Republican civil war rather

than end it. It's also a mistake to treat the Trump phenomenon as a fluke from which Republicans need learn no lessons. Establishment Republicans seem to believe Trump's rise says more about the inadequacies of their voters than about the inadequacies of their own, shopworn politics. The great advantage Trump has in Republican politics is that he's a Republican president, and partisanship is an awesome political force. So is the cult of personality that inheres in the presidency, augmented by Trump's celebrity. He has the right enemies, and his culture-war fights coupled with his traditional GOP legislative agenda offer something for everyone in the party, from the populists to the Chamber of Commerce.

All of this means that, until further notice, he occupies the commanding heights of the GOP. Full-frontal assaults may be bold and brave, but they will likely be ineffectual, if not wholly counterproductive.

What has TXDOT done for us?

Most citizens have heard but others are still asking, "What did the State do to help Salado get through and over a long period of construction?" One last time, the following is a recap.

1. After 2-Austin trips, Governor Abbott asked TX-DoT to assign 2-top officials to work directly with the Mayor, citizens, Street Committee and the Aldermen/Lady. Randy Hopmann and Terry McCoy, working with James Construction's Mike Killgore, President, and Rick Lewis, Project Engineer, and Salado's Street Committee, reduced the time-line by approximately 4-months.

2. The 8-foot asphalt aprons on Main Street were not in the original plans. Nor was street paving between the Church of Christ and Municipal Building.

3. The Main Street apron Bike markings and some

work on the North and South Salado Signs were not either.

4. When TXDoT received extra money, Salado put in a KTEMPO request for sidewalks and street-lights. The Mayor and Village Administrator represented the Village in meetings. Salado was selected for the sidewalk and lighting to begin in fiscal year 2019 (January-March). The approximate cost: 2-million dollars.

5. The sidewalks and lighting surveying: TXDoT.6. The concrete bridge

6. The concrete bridge by the green walking bridge: TXDoT. Scheduled for this

January and will be disabled accessible.

7. Congressman John Carter and Senator John Cornyn's assistance, invaluable. When "mission creep" occurred, Salado became priority

8. The Salado letters will be attached to the South-bound Sign. However, the lighted tree paid by private donations. Needed: about \$27,000.

Coston shares importance of records

person."

Bell County Clerk Shelley Coston referred to this line repeatedly in her Nov. 6 presentation to the Salado Historical Society.

Coston brought with her examples of some of the thousands of life records that are collected, organized and maintained by the County Clerk's office.

She told the group that the office of the County Clerk was created by the Texas Constitution.

"These are the records that carry you through your life, beginning with your birth," Coston said. Bell County maintains birth certificates from 1903 when they were mandated by state law. In 1951, the City of Temple "Decided that it would be the local registrar of records for the municipality," she explained. Temple birth certificates are maintained through the city since that date.

She explained that with advances in health care, people are living longer lives. Because of this, the Association of County Clerks is lobbying to have the period that birth certificates remain confidential extended. Currently, birth certificates

> "Right now, there are lots of people who are still living whose birth certificates are now a matter of public record," she said.

The County Clerk maintains juvenile criminal records. These remain confidential, Coston said.

The clerk's office also maintains the election results dating back to 1850.

In the election to secede from the Union, 46,153 Texans voted in favor of secession and 14,747 Texans voted against secession. In Bell County, 456 citizens voted for secession and 198 voted against.

The clerk's office also maintained military records.

The office also maintains marriage records going back to the founding of Bell County in 1850. "We have some very interesting marriage licenses that go back to 1904 and 1905 that were never claimed by the couple," she said, adding that those licenses are made available to the descendants of those marriages.

Death records are also maintained at the clerk's office, but remain confidential for 25 years.

The Bell County Clerk's office has been working to preserve many of its oldest record books. Coston explained the process of de-acidifying the books, at which time the documents are taken apart, scanned and de-acidified to prevent further damage to the paper records.

The cost per book is \$3,000 for those which are the most fragile and in need of the most work.

The Bell County Clerk's office has more than 9,000 record books in its collection before the office went digi-

Coston shared records of the inmates at the County Home, which was located between Temple and Belton near I-35. "These records are heartbreaking," she said, sharing some of the stories found in them of the age, cause of death and time spent in the indigent home. The County Home was open from the early 1920s to the 1960s, Coston said.

"These are the records that carry us from the beginning of our lives to the end," Coston said, adding that because of this, she does not underestimate the importance of her job.

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

The Eagles next series would be a five play drive with Aaron Torczynski scoring on a 51 yard run. A Walrath kick with 3:58 left in the first made the score 14-0.

The Rockets next drive took just two plays when Robinson's Isaiah Montgomery caught a 66 yard bomb from QB Mason Cooper. The kick failed.

Salado answered with a 15 play drive behind great blocking from the Eagles O-Line, chewing up the clock. Trey Sheppard would score from one yard out. A Walrath kick with 8:38 left in the second increasing Salado's lead to

Wesley Quinn, Wrook Brown and Caleb Self pinned Robinson deep in their territory on Walrath's kick off when they tackled Mathew Armes at the 5 yard line. The Rockets went 95 yards on 11 play. Cooper scored on a 7 yard quarterback draw. He added two points on a pass to Jace Walker, cutting the Salado lead to 21-14 to end the

Robinson kicked off the second half with an onside kick to surprise the Eagles and the Rockets Talian Habour would recover the football at the Eagles 49 yard line. Robinson's Cooper would call his own number on a quarterback draw play toward their left side for nine yards where Caleb Self laid the hammer on him, causing a fumble that Quade Brown recovered to give the Eagles the ball 1st and 10 at their 48 yard line.

After the turnover Salado took three plays to score, coming on a 56-yard pass from Haire to Torczynski with 10:24 left in the third. Walrath kicked the PAT for a 28-14 lead.



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Salado Masonic Lodge on Homes Tour

Salado Masonic Lodge #296 will be one of the stops on the Christmas Tour of Homes Dec. 1-3 in Salado.

Much of the history of Salado is linked to Salado Masonic Lodge #296. Many of the men who founded Salado were Masons.

The Masonic Lodge marked its 150th anniversary in June 2017.

The petitioners for Dispensation and Charter were: E. Sterling C. Robertson, Harvey Smith, W.A. Davis, O.T. Tyler, A. Rowland, Robert B. Halley, Jno. A. Tyler, F. A. Bigelow, N.R. Land, H.J. Chamberlain, W.R. Karnes, G.W. Wade, M.W. Adams, Jno T. Flint, Geo. W. McWhirter, Welborn Barton, Jas. Tinnin, A. Tinnin, and Jesse Raborn.

The Minutes of Salado Lodge were destroyed in a fire about 1883 and we are deprived of that source of information as to the early activities of the Lodge, after Dispensation.

We may safely assume, however, that education was one of the principal objectives of the Lodge and a matter stressed in its discussions and proceedings.

Thirty-three percent of the teachers and seventyseven percent of the Trustees of the College were Masons. The founders (of the College), most of whom have been found to be Masons, also made provision in the Deeds of purchase of lots to prohibit the sale of intoxicating beverages by the drink in Salado.

"It seems," writes Felda Shanklin, Salado historian, "that most all of those early Salado men were Masons."

The Charter for Salado Masonic Lodge was granted by the Grand Lodge of Texas on June 13, A.D. 1867, and was signed by Grand Master John R. Freitwell.

The first Grand Lodge Report of Salado Lodge after the granting of a Charter shows the following officers: E.S.C. Robertson, W.M.; Harvey Smith, S.W.; W.A. Davis, J.W.; O.T. Tyler, Treas.; W. Barton, Sec.; J.W. Tinnin, S.D.; I. Raborn, J.D.; R.B. Halley, Tiler. This report also shows a membership of 22 M.M. by affiliation, one Fellowcraft, five Enter Apprentices, and one Past Master.

On the back of a Grand Lodge, Report U. D., there is this notation: "The Lodge Room of Salado Lodge is the second story of a stone building twenty by forty feet." These figures are the same

wing of the Salado College building and there seems to be no doubt that the College and the Lodge were using the same building in those early days - an arrangement that is not surprising, since both had similar objectives and both had the same man, E. Sterling Robertson, as their highest official.

Later, Salado Lodge secured an interest in the title to the upper story of the Baptist Church in Salado, and for many years met in a Lodge room on the second floor of the church building. In a church rebuilding and enlargement program, the question came up as to how to dispose of the interest of the Lodge in the old building. This problem was solved by literally sawing off the upper half of the building and moving it to, and setting it up as a Lodge room a short donated to the Lodge by Bro. Charlton E. Johnson, Past Master of Salado Masonic Lodge.

The Lodge recently completed a project to put new siding on the building that was built in the 1870s.

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Clearwater UWCD hosts annual water symposium

Water Conservation District will be hosting its 17th Annual Bell County Water Symposium 8 a.m. Nov. 15 at Texas A&M Central Texas, 1001 Leadership Place, Killeen.

This year's theme is: "Water Planning for Texas, Now or Never."

This year's event will have two keynote addresses from key leaders in Texas. The first keynote address will be by Bech Bruun, Chairman of the Texas Wa-Development Board. Bruun has served as a Board member of the Texas Water Development Board since September 1, 2013. Governor Greg Abbott designated him chairman in June 2015.

Prior to his appointment to the Board, Bruun served on the senior staff of Governor Rick Perry's administration. Bruun has also worked as the government and customer relations manager for the Brazos River Authority. During the 81st Legislative Session, Bruun served as chief of staff to State Representative Todd Hunter (District 32) and as general counsel to the House Committee on Judiciary and Civil Jurisprudence.

Bruun currently is a gubernatorial appointee to the Western States Water Council and the Texas Environmental Flows Advisory Group. He also serves

The second key note

address will be by Lyle Larson, Chairman of the House Natural Resources Committee, Texas House of Representatives, District 122. The Natural Resources Committee addresses most of the water related legislation by the Texas House of Representatives. Rep. Larson served as San Antonio City Councilman, District 10 for 2 terms and as Bexar County Commissioner, Pct. 3 from 1997-2008. Chairman Larson currently chairs the House Natural Resources Committee; and is a member of the General Investigating and Ethics Committee, He has attained a reputation for being committed to working to secure Texas's water future. Over the course of the last 6 years, he has traveled across the state to meet with individuals involved in water policy and planning. Since 2011, Rep. Larson has visited 49 groundwater conservation districts, 12 river authorities, all large public utilities, and several other municipalities and water districts.

According to the Texas Water Development Board, about 7.2 million acre-feet of water currently stored in surface water reservoirs evaporates in an average year. While surface reservoirs continue to feature prominently in the recently adopted 2017 state water plan, many consider ASR to have several advantages over reservoirs that justify its expanded use. In addition to resisting water loss through evaporation, ASR does not involve the acquisition and flooding of land above ground, which can be expensive and result in destruction of wildlife habitat and private property.

In 2015, the 84th Legislature enacted HB 655 by Lyle Larson, which resulted in several changes to the way ASR is regulated. The bill specified how ASR facilities must account for the water they inject and recover and the role of groundwater conservation districts in such projects.

Clearwater UWCD embraced this bill as a critical strategy to help answer the regional question, "How can we meet the growing need for water in both Bell and Williamson Counties?'

This year's program will also include presentations from the staff and executive directors of both the Texas Water Conservation Association and the Texas Alliance of Groundwater Districts. Clearwater UWCD has been a proud member of both organizations since 2002.

The water symposium is open to the public free of charge.

Being geographically situated where it is, the state of Texas has a multitude of habitats, and as such, is home to a myriad of animals. Rarely will a certain species be distributed throughout this state; more often than not a species will just inhabit portions. One such lizard species bears the namesake of our great state in its common name, but in actuality

it thrives primarily south of the border, and that lizard is the Texas Alligator Lizard.

The Texas Alligator Lizard (Gerrhonotus infernalis) is the only one of its genus that calls Texas home. There

are other species, but they all reside far south of our manmade border. Observations of this subtly colored but pretty lizard are generally in a narrow swath that runs east-west from the Big Bend region eastward to just east of Austin. Elsewhere this lacertilian species can be seen include several Mexican states such as Nuevo Leon, Tamaulipas, Coahuila, San Luis Potosi and Queretaro.

The habitat that this slender lizard prefer are well drained rocky canyons that are littered with oaks and junipers, as well as rocky slopes and dry creekbeds.

Not particularly overbearing in coloration as adults, the Texas Alligator Lizard possess a background coloration running the gamut from yellowish, brown, tan, or even gray. On this background there are numerous narrow white and black crossbands.

But what this species lack in coloration it makes up in body shape and overall appearance. The body is quite elongated and there is a lateral fold that runs along each side. The legs are proportionally short and the head

is not noticeably separated from the body, and the slender tail, which is colored like the back, is long and about twice the length of the body. Despite the slenderness, this species is actually the second-longest species in the United States.

The name alligator lizard is derived from the fact that the scales on the back are thick and keeled, giving this slim lizard the appearance of an alligator.

Texas Alligator Lizards, like other lizard species, are "cold-blooded", or ectothermic. This means that it does not generate heat from the inside of their body, as mammals and birds do, but rather is dependent on outside sources for heating and

cooling. It is active during the early mornings and late afternoons from early April to October, and like many other reptile species it avoids the hottest part of the day by resting in shaded areas.

This species of lizard is an opportunistic carnivore, feeding primarily on small insects such as crickets, grasshoppers, and beetles, although small rodents and other lizards are consumed occasionally.

The Texas Alligator Lizard is oviparous, which is a fancy way of saying that it lays eggs. After emerging from the winter-long brumation period (reptiles do not hibernate in the true sense of the word), males will search out females to mate. During the breeding season, which is typically in early spring, males will attempt to mate with a suitable female, and after about a month follow-

ing a successful copulation, the female will begin to lay a clutch of up to 30 eggs. These eggs are laid in areas of high humidity, and typically will hatch in about eight weeks. The female will often remain in the nesting site for the duration of the incubation period. The four-inch long hatchlings are patterned similarly to the adults, although the contrast between background coloration and crossbands is much more noticeable. Like most other lizard species, the young are capable of fending for themselves immediately.

When not threatened, this lizard species is slow and methodical in its movements. However, when it feels threatened, the short legs are folded along the body and the lizard will move in an undulating motion much like a snake as it quickly darts for cover among the leaf litter.



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



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
