

requirements for automatic sprinkler system installation on Stagecoach project

Salado aldermen will consider at its Nov. 16 meeting the requirement set by the Salado fire chief and Bell County fire marshal for the Stagecoach Inn to have fire sprinklers throughout its renovation of motel rooms, lobby and meeting space.

Aldermen will consider

The board was initially set to discuss the item on Nov. 1, but canceled the meeting because it could gather together a quorum.

That item, and several others, will be discussed at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 16 at the Municipal Building, 317 Stagecoach Rd.

With this recent news that the Village of Salado will require installation of an automatic sprinkler system for the renovation of 48 motel rooms and a mixed use lobby and retail space at the Stagecoach Inn, future plans for the project are now on hold, according to the developer.

"While the proposed renovations to the Stagecoach Inn do not trigger the requirement for the installation of an automatic sprinkler system, the Village, under the 2009 Fire Code, does have the authority to mandate the installation of an automatic sprinkler system, underground water mains and fire hydrants if their absence represents a hazard to public safety and welfare," Village administrator Don Ferguson stated in a brief to aldermen for the

Fire Protection Consulting

Group conducted a review for automatic fire sprinklers and site fire protection on behalf of the Stagecoach Inn.

In that review, Temple R. Kennedy stated that "There are not any retroactive code provisions mandating the installation of an automatic sprinkler system within an existing Group R-1 occupancy (Transit Residential - hotel/motel) building or mixed Group M (retail in same building as motel lobby) and Group B occupancy building."

"Our research indicates that sprinkler systems, underground water mains, and fire hydrants are not mandated by the reviewed/referenced codes," Kennedy stated, "the fire code official is granted authority to mandate these systems/components at any time if he determines that their absence represents a distinct hazard to life or public welfare."

In other business, aldermen will consider a citizen survey concerning the white tail deer population. The board will also consider approval of a professional services agreement with Vanir Construction Services, Inc. for construction management services for the wastewater project.

Aldermen may also appoint a Tourism Advisory Board and a Wastewater Impact Fee advisory committee.

Aldermen may amend the itinerant vendors ordinance to modify the fees for mobile food trucks.

Recent economic growth may be based on assumptions of large tax cuts

The Markets

The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) ended the week down 0.21 percent, its first down week in the last two months, but remains up well over 1 percent for one month and 19.31 percent from a year ago. The Dow Jones Industrial Average has recently been up more than the SPX and, rationally, was down more, about 0.5 percent for the week. The U.S. bond market was closed on Friday in observance of Veterans' Day but ended the week with the 10-year T-note yielding 2.326 percent, a decline of 8.6 hundredths of a percent, but the yield remains 0.55 percent higher than a year ago. Gold was up very slightly, as was oil.


The Economy

While interest rates in the U.S. are still low, at least by the standards of the last 30 years, the German tenyear Bund currently yields 0.318 percent with the two and five-year Bunds still well in negative yield territory, yielding -0.76 percent and -0.33 percent per year respectively. While the European economies have generally improved, they remain on life-support with the European Central Bank still buying bonds on the open market to prop up the economy. On the other side of that coin, oil prices have gained more than 15 percent in the last two months as demand rises with growing economic activity across the globe. We in America are concerned about rising rates and questioning when the next downturn will be while the rest of the world is still anticipating the end of the last one. We have a lot going for us and a lot for which we should be thankful.

For anyone who missed it, the Senate Finance Committee revealed what the Republicans there had concluded was the answer to all their political and tax problems. It retains the assumption that adding an additional \$1.5 trillion to the federal debt over the next decade is a good idea but concluded that an immediate corporate tax cut would be too much. It also proposed the elimination of all deductions for homestead property taxes. Despite less in tax cuts and more removals of tax deductions, the Senate committee's proposal was (according to them) still missing about \$76 billion in revenue to comply with the recently passed budget resolution. If either version is to become law, it must find some more revenue (taxes) or reduce the tax reductions. Otherwise, the proposal will need a lot of Democrats to like it in order

Both proposals are complex and long, but there are a couple of things that are clear. First, both the House and the Senate versions increase the national debt from its current 77 percent of GDP to about 100 percent of GDP in ten years. The second thing worthy of note is that the two proposals are in opposition to each other in very significant areas. The word in the Senate was that the House proposal was a no-go and would not pass there. The Republicans in the House appear to have the same opinion about the Senate version. We are reminded of a long-ago quote from Pogo O'Possum, "We has met the enemy, and he is

Separately, the Street Journal survey of economists indicated that there is a 26 percent chance of the U.S. pulling out of the NAFTA treaty with Canada and Mexico and if we do so, there will be a marked slowing of the economy with the possibility of it causing a recession. Other than that risk, there was a consensus that the U.S. economy would continue to grow through 2018, with unemployment dropping to 3.9 percent by the end of next year.

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Two Very American Heroes in Texas

Before the Texas church shooter encountered any police officers, he was run off a highway and dead. He had been shot and chased by two private citizens who took it upon themselves to respond to a heinous crime when no one with a badge was anywhere to be found.

The church shooting in Sutherland Springs, Texas is another heartbreaking chapter in the country's epidemic of mass shootings. Devin Patrick Kelley shot and killed 26 people and wounded another 20, accounting for nearly everyone in the small church. The senseless cruelty is hard to fathom.

The response by the two bystanders who refused to stand by is something else entirely. It was a characteristically small-town American act of self-reliance that shows, no matter how tattered our civil society may be, it still produces people who will risk life and limb for others without hesitation, unbidden by anything other than their own sense of obligation.

When Stephen Willeford, 55, heard of the shooting, he left his house barefoot with his AR-15 and started exchanging fire with Kelley outside the church. An expert shot, Willeford hit

Kelley and reportedly aimed for the gaps on his body armor. When Kelley got in an SUV and sped off, Willeford jumped in Johnnie Langendorff's truck and told him to give chase.

Langendorff, 27, didn't ask any questions. He followed Kelley at 95 mph down the highway, until the perpetrator ran off the road. Willeford jump out of the truck and rested his rifle on top of Langendorff's hood and shouted for Kelley to "get out." The murderer apparently took his own life with a gunshot.

In his interviews, Langendorff, with a scraggly beard and a tattoo of a bull skull on his neck, invariably wears a cowboy hat. He is polite and matter of fact ("he said 'chase him' and so that's what I did -- I just chased him"), implying that anyone would have

This isn't true, although it is almost certainly more true in America's out-of-the-way places. Self-help is imperative in these areas because the alternative is no help, at

least not on a timely basis. Small towns might not even have a police department.

This gets to one of the root causes of America's gun culture: In swaths of the country, a gun isn't an optional extra layer of self-protection, but a necessary first defense. Rates of gun ownership are highest in remote, sparsely populated states like Alaska, Idaho, West Virginia and North Dakota. In a poll of Texans a few years ago, nearly half of the people said they or a family member owned a gun.

Any gun-control measure that is sweeping enough to make a dent in the country's gun stock and render gun ownership difficult enough to, at the margins, keep firearms out of the hands of psychopaths will inevitably affect law-abiding people as well. In places like rural Texas, that would rightly be considered a serious imposition. Without a gun, if something goes wrong, the only option is sitting and waiting for the authorities to show up.

And the likes of Stephen Willeford and Johnnie Langendorff, obviously, aren't the waiting kind.

Facilities: 10 areas of need

The fourth meeting for our long range facility planning committee was last Nov. 6.

The committee prioritized ten different areas of facility needs. The following is the order the committee ranked them (with #1 being the highest priority), along with a brief explanation:

#1 Safety & Security the safety of our students is our #1 priority and there are several facility related issues that can be addressed to increase safety and security, including students in portable classrooms and students having to travel between multiple buildings at the elementary school and junior high school (i.e., main building, kindergarten/1st grade wing, gym, cafeteria, portable buildings) throughout the school day

#2 Classroom Capacity our elementary school and intermediate school are already over capacity, our junior high school is projected to be over capacity by next year (2018-2019) and our high school is projected to be over capacity in three years (2020-2021)

#3 Athletics – our athletic facilities were built around 1980 when we were a 1A size district, we do not have any courts for our tennis team, and our spectator seating, lighting, and electrical capacity are all in need of upgrade

#4 Aging Facility Conditions - our elementary school was built in 1967 and our junior high school was built in 1979; there are many building systems including roofs and HVAC that are in need of replacement

#5 Parking/Traffic Congestion - the traffic congestion on Thomas Arnold Road will continue to worsen as our enrollment grows every year if we keep ten grade levels (pre-kindergarten through 8th grade) at those campuses; parking is inadequate for athletic events and other school

functions #6 Fine Arts & Band – our band and theater programs have outgrown our cafeterias for concerts and plays, the majority of the schools we compete against have performing arts auditoriums

#7 Technology - additional hardware and a faster internet connection would enable us to better prepare our students for the 21st Century

#8 Career & Technology in the last couple of years we have added computer science, welding, and health science

programs; we hope to be able to continue offering additional programs such as engineering to prepare our students for college and careers

#9 Ag/FFA - our ag barn was built around 1980 and has several building systems that are in need of replacement or repair

#10 Removing Portables this was ranked last because the committee didn't feel like removing the portable buildings is a high priority, however, if we are able to add classrooms through new construction and/or renovation then the portables could be used for storage instead of classrooms and it would also help with priorities the committee ranked higher (i.e., safety and security, classroom capacity, and parking/ traffic congestion)

While we will probably not be able to address all of these needs at this time due to financial constraints, the long range facilities planning committee will incorporate all of them into the long range plan that will be submitted to our school board in January.

Our next meeting will be Dec. 4 at 6:00 p.m. at the Salado ISD Administration Building/Civic Center, located at 601 North Main Street. All meetings are open to the public.

Bush administration a repa-

triation deal was extended to corporations including the multinational drug manufacturing cartel. Their tax rate was cut to 5.25 percent from about 30 percent. The "deal" was that the money would be used to create jobs, but the top fifteen companies reduced their U.S. employment by almost 30,000 jobs. Although more than 300 billion dollars were brought back, there was no evidence that the repatriated moneys increased U.S. employment. However, two things did increase dramatically - executive compensation and stock buybacks that enriched executives, companies and big stockholders. The drug cartel used the money to buy other drug companies, thereby consolidating the industry. This has been a huge factor in their monopolistic behavior leading to dramatic drug price increases.





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


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Shopping Map of Salado

The wingspan of most raptors is over 3 feet, and some have wingspans of 7 feet or more. But here in Texas, we happen to have a small raptor who, by very definition, contradicts the "everything is bigger in Texas" mantra, and
