A Look Back at 2017 in Salado

What a ride 2017 has been for Salado. From the second petition for disannexation to the completion of work on I-35 to the reopening of Stagecoach Inn restaurant to the facilities study laying the groundwork for a May bond election for Salado schools, 2017 has been marked by many highs.

It started with good news when Lilian Halabi won the Jan. 24 episode of Cake Wars. Halabi owns Lily's Cakes in Harker Heights. She and husband Sam also own La Rio Mansion in Belton, a large event venue and the Inn at Salado on Main St. Salado. She and assistant Samantha Adkins went to Los Angeles over the summer in 2016 for the competition that required Halabi to bake a Monopolythemed cake in a four-hour period. The episode was taped over the summer and Halabi and her family, including husband Sam, son Amir, 18 and daughters Sarah, 15 and Zeina, 10, and employees had to be mum about it until it aired on Jan. 24.

Barrow Brewing Co. was named the 2016 Business of the Year during the annual Salado Chamber of Commerce awards banquet on Jan. 26. During the banquet, Kaye and Frank Coachman were named Citizen of the Year, Jane Wilmer had her name added to the Salado Chamber of Commerce Hall of Fame and the Ambassador of the Year was Marjorie Hairston

At the same time, a petition calling for the disannexation of a large portion of Salado was circulating, this time with a metes and bounds description. The petition met the February deadline to call for a May election on the matter. The election was called after a group that calls itself FED UP gathered 77 signatures on a petition calling for the disannexation of an area of Salado and presented it to Mayor Skip Blancett Feb. 9.

At the same time that voters were discussing whether or not to disannex, they were voting to elect three aldermen from a field of seven candidates (only one of whom lived outside the disannexation area).

Also during the weeks leading up to the May election, the Village of Salado League (TML). He was city was without a city manager of any sort, as well as a police chief. The interim city manager David Miller left employment for another position. In February, mayor Skip Blancett announced that the Village would contract with Raymond Dale Brown to begin duties as interim city manager on Feb. 19. However, the Village opted not to bring in another interim as it was in the process of narrowing its candidates for the permanent position to begin work shortly. Having an interim for just a few weeks made little sense to the board of aldermen at that time.

Police chief Jack Hensley resigned his position as did police officer Sid Post in Feb-

With the filing date for the May election coming in February, Salado ISD and the Salado Public Library Board both canceled their election. Salado ISD canceled its May election as only three people applied to run for the board and were automatically elected to the board: incumbent Kim Bird, Troy Smith and Nate Self. The Salado Public Library Board of Directors canceled its election as only three people filed for election to the board: Patricia Rehm, Soo Kim-Delio and Bobbette

Candidates for the board of aldermen were David T. Williams (incumbent), Linda Reynolds, Michael McDougal (incumbent), Andy Jackson, Fred Brown (incumbent). Christopher Tramel and Judy Fields. Jackson, McDougal and Brown won election to the board

Aldermen voted on March 23 to hire Don Ferguson for Village Administrator. Ferguson was the City Administrator at the Village of Wimberley for the past 10 years, leaving there in a February agreement with the Wimberley city council.

As the city administrator in Wimberley, Ferguson coordinated the design and development of the \$3 million Blue Hole Regional Park project that was awarded the 2012 Municipal Excellence Award for Public Works for cities under 25,000 population by the Texas Municipal

administrator in Rollingwood in 2004-07 and was the assistant city manager in New Braunfels from 1996 to 2004. Prior to working in city administration, Ferguson was a news reporter and news director in radio for almost two decades.

At the same time, aldermen hired former Salado mayor Rick Ashe was hired as the Chief of Police for the Village of Salado.

Ashe has 36 years experience as a police officer, first in the U.S. Army, where he served in Germany 1981-1984. He was a police officer with the City of Woodway 1987-1990 serving as a patrol officer. Since 1990, he was employed by the Temple Police Department. Ashe retired from the Temple PD in April and began his new duties as the Chief of Police in

Salado in May. Ashe was named the Outstanding Peace Officer in Bell County in 1996. He was also named the Outstanding Police Officer in Temple in 1996. He was named a Master Peace Officer in 2005 and has numerous awards and commendations from the Temple Police Department. He was the President of the Texas Municipal Police Association in 1998.

Ashe was one of the first elected aldermen for the Village of Salado, serving from his election in 2000 until he ran for and was elected Mayor of Salado in 2004. He served as Mayor of Salado until 2008 and served on the Central Texas Council of Government executive board 2006-08.

Voters overwhelmingly rejected disannexation and returned two of three incumbents to the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen in a local race in which 44 percent of all registered voters cast ballots. Saladoans turned down the disannexation proposition 707 against to 116 for. In early voting, 595 cast ballots with 517 voting against and 75 voting for.

Andy Jackson led the field of seven candidates with 511 votes, followed by McDougal, 442, and Brown, 379. Also running for the board of aldermen were Williams,

219, Reynolds, 209, Fields, 190 and Tramel, 170.

Mayor Skip Blancett terminated Salado Chamber of Commerce and Tourism Bureau executive director Mary Poché's employment on May 9. Erin Klingmann was named the Interim Executive Director, Klingmann became the Executive Director before her resignation in the late Fall. The Village is currently in the process of hiring a new Executive Director. Just before the termination of Poché, the Tourism office relocated to south Main Street, where it is housed at the Salado Museum, along with the Salado Chamber of Commerce. The Village and Salado Chamber of Commerce terminated their contract for services this fall. The Chamber announced the hire of Ashley Bray this fall.

Village secretary Judy King resigned her position with the Village of Salado with her last day on the job being June 9. Cara McPartland is the new Village secre-

Kicking off the beginning of summer, the Village of Salado held a ribbon cutting to officially mark the end of construction on I-35 through the Village. The end of work comes two years beyond the contracted deadline with James Construction for the project. Work began in 2012 and was scheduled to complete in Spring 2015.

The completion of work on I-35 coincided with the re-opening of the historic Stagecoach Inn restaurant in June. The restaurant and motel had been closed for almost

New tax law could boost economy in the short term

The Markets

It looks like we will never find out what would happen if the new tax bill failed to become law, but we do know what happened on the day it did; the S&P 500 (SPX) dropped about one and a quarter points, and the Dow Jones Industrial Average (the Dow) dropped 28 points. For the week, apparently despite the new tax law, the SPX was up 0.28 percent to close at 2683.34 and the Dow was up 0.42 percent. With one week left in the year, the SPX is up 19.85 percent for the year and 3.11 percent for the trailing month. If history is any guide will be up more in the week to come. The final week of the year has an excellent upside history.


The passage of the tax bill did have a relatively significant effect on bond yields, with the U.S. 10-year treasury note yield rising from just above 2.35 percent on Monday to just under 2.5 percent by the close on Friday. Also on Friday, the price of bitcoin dropped about 25 percent in a single 24-hour period and was down more than 30 percent for the week. Gold rose 1.67 percent for the week on buying out of Spain following the Catalan (Spain) election of a majority independence legislature, signaling a possible breakup of the Spanish nation.

The Economy

The Commerce Department reported that orders for durable goods, items expected to last three or more years, rose 1.3 percent in November and is up 5.4 percent for the trailing 12 months. Digging deeper, new orders for nondefense capital goods, a benchmark measure of busi-

Separately, but confirming the overall direction of the economy, the rate of US home construction rose 3.4 percent from last November, according to the Census Bureau. Within that number, the single-family home starts rose 12 percent since this time last year. Since single-family homes constitute the largest economic multiplier in our economy, that too bodes well for the US economy in 2018.

The 800-pound gorilla in the (economic) room was the tax bill passed by Congress and signed into law on Friday by President Trump. Although it was touted as a tax simplification bill, from our reading it maintained at least as much complexity as its predecessor. What it did do was to lower taxes for just about every American. For business owners, it lowered taxes a lot! Corporate rates dropped to a maximum 21 percent, although a tax will now be levied on overseas earnings, diminishing the potential corporate earnings boost for 2018.

The elimination of any additional cost for bringing money home for Amermultinational ican-based

companies has a high potential. The Wall Street Journal did a survey to get a feel for how corporations would use the money. The list of uses included share buy-backs, mergers and acquisitions, debt reduction, and very importantly, investment in more automatization (robots). Just possibility, that last item may be the biggest effect.

Shorter-term, the new tax law has the potential to create a substantial boost for the stock market. Share buybacks decrease the number of shares outstanding while at the same time increasing earnings per share. Lower corporate rates add to those earnings. The last time we had a tax break that encouraged corporations to bring overseas money back to the US was in 1994, and may have been a major cause of the runaway bull market that started that year and ran until 2000.

Our advice is to remember that the tax cuts for individuals are temporary and will generally convert to a tax increase by 2027. The boost to the market and economy from the corporate money returning home will also be temporary, so recognize this as a short-term windfall that could well result in a market rise that may not be sustainable. We suggest that at least some of the windfall be used to ensure that you have a good savings position and are prepared for the downturn that will come later.

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Give Trump Credit Where It's Due

Republicans have tried, on and off, to open the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge for oil drilling since the 1980s. The effort has always engendered intense opposition and always been abandoned. A provision for drilling in ANWR is included in the Republican tax bill almost as an afterthought.

Republicans took a constitutional fight against Obamacare's individual mandate to the Supreme Court in 2012, and lost. They targeted it in their Obamacare repeal-and-replace bill earlier this year, and lost. They tried again with a last-ditch "skinny repeal" bill, and lost yet again. Repeal of the individual mandate also is included in the Republican tax bill.

As the year ends, President Donald Trump is compiling a solid record of accomplishment. Much of it is unilateral, dependent on extensive executive actions rolling back President Barack Obama's regulations, impressive judicial appointments and the successful fight against ISIS overseas. The tax bill is the significant legislative achievement that heretofore had been missing.

For much of the year, Trump's presidency had seemed to be sound and fury signifying not much besides the welcome ascension of Neil Gorsuch to the Supreme Court; now, it is sound and

fury signifying a discernible shift of American government to the right. It's hard to see how a conventional Republican president would have done much better, except if he had managed to get Obamacare repealed.

The tax cut is big -- \$1.5 trillion over 10 years, and even more if you account for the budgetary gimmicks -- and has changes that conservative economists have sought for decades, particularly the lower corporate rate (from 35 to 21 percent), the move to a territorial tax system (companies would only be taxed on their earnings in the U.S.), and the business expensing (companies can write off the full cost of new buildings and equipment).

The administration's deregulatory apparatus has been in full gear. The Environmental Protection Agency is unspooling the Waters of the United States and the Clean Power Plan, major Obama-era regulations. The Communications Federal Commission reversed net neutrality. The Education Department rescinded an Obama administration Title IX letter that pushed colleges into abandoning due process in sexual-assault cases.

administration rulings that occasioned fierce debates during his time in office have fallen by the wayside with barely a whimper. Obama blocked the Keystone pipeline. Trump greenlighted it without a fuss. Obama imposed a Health and Human Services mandate that feminists portrayed as the only obstacle between women and a "Handmaid's Tale" future. Trump reversed it, and contraception is still widely and easily available in America.

Three acts stand out --pulling out of the Paris accords, decertifying the Iran deal and declaring Jerusalem the capital of Israel. All three demonstrated an imperviousness to polite opinion that is one of Trump's signature

The president also began the process of ending DACA, the Obama amnesty for socalled DREAMers, and has re-established a baseline of immigration enforcement that has had an instant impact on illegal border cross-

None of this is to deny Trump's failings. His toxic persona could drive a Democratic wave in the 2018 midterms. Whatever next year brings, though, Republicans aren't leaving this one empty-handed.

Transfer students & Salado ISD

All seven of our school board members unanimously approved a policy change over a year ago (November 28, 2016) that effective January 1, 2017, we are no longer accepting new transfer students, with the following exceptions: children of employees, siblings of current transfer students, resident students that move out of the district, and children of active duty military and disabled veterans. Here are ten facts regarding transfer students and our

Fact #1 – Transfer students have been enrolled in our school district for at least 50

school district:

Fact #2 - Transfer students are enrolled in an overwhelming majority of school districts in Texas, including every school district in Bell County.

Fact #3 - We receive the same amount of annual funding for a student, regardless of whether or not that student

lives in our school district. Fact #4 - The additional expenses generated by our transfer students are far less than the over \$2 million in revenue we receive per year from these students. If we had to cut over \$2 million from our budget, it would negatively impact the education we provide to all of our students, as we would have to eliminate some curricular and extracurricular programs, reduce the number of teaching positions, and increase class

Fact #5 - We used to charge an annual fee for transfer students: \$750 for the first student in a family, \$350 for the second, and \$350 for the third (for a maximum of \$1,450 per family). These transfer fees caused our district to be "Chapter 41" (property wealthy/Robin Hood) and lose state funding. Chapter 41 status is determined by a district's taxable value per student and districts that charge transfer fees do not get to count their transfer students in their property value per student calculation. Four years ago we discontinued charging a transfer fee so we are no longer a Chapter 41 district. We are better off financially because the amount of state funding we would

lose would be greater than the amount of transfer fees we would collect. When we made that change four years ago, there were 350 districts in Texas that were Chapter 41 and only twelve of those 350 districts charged a transfer

Fact #6 - Transfer students have to re-apply every year. The three criteria that determine whether or not they are allowed to return the next school year are their behavior, attendance, and academics.

Fact #7 – Transfer students do not pay property taxes to our district. However, indirectly they do pay property taxes to our district. Families that own a home in another school district pay property taxes to that district. If they enroll their student in our school district instead of the one they live in, the state funding is reduced for that district and the state funding is increased for our school district. Thus, indirectly (through the state), they do pay property taxes to our district. The same concept applies to people that live in our school district, but rent a house or apartment. They do not property pay taxes directly to our school district, but indirectly (through their landlord) they do pay taxes to our school district.

Fact #8 – The majority of our enrollment growth has been from resident students that live in our school district. Of the additional 506 students our district has grown over the past five years, 410 of them (81 percent) are resident students and 96 of them (19 percent) are transfer students. Out of all 81 school districts in the Waco region (from Salado up to Hillsboro), our enrollment has increased the highest percentage (38 percent) in the last five years. The next four districts with the highest percentage increases are Academy 33 percent, Belton 17 percent, Midway 10 percent, and Killeen 6 percent. Only counting our

additional 410 resident students, our enrollment has still increased over 30 percent and we would have the second highest percentage increase out of all 81 school districts.

Fact #9 – As a result of no longer accepting new transfer students this past year (other than the few exceptions listed above), our number of transfer students lowered from 254 last year to 237 this year. Even though we have 17 less transfer students this year, we have 117 more resident students, for a net increase of 100 students this year. Templeton Demographics, a company that does enrollment projections for many districts across the state, including Belton, Academy, Jarrell, and Troy, projects our enrollment to continue to increase by over 100 resident students each year for at least the next ten years.

Fact #10 - The earliest possible time that we could open a new school would be August 2020. At that time the enrollment of only our resident students is projected to be 1,941, which is 87 students above our current enrollment of 1.854, including transfer students. Thus, our need for additional classrooms is based on our rapid increase in resident student enrollment and would exist regardless of whether or not we have transfer students enrolled in our school district.

In summary, our school board unanimously approved a change in school board policy on November 28, 2016 to discontinue accepting new transfer students, other than the few exceptions listed above. As a result of this policy change, our transfer student enrollment has declined and will continue to decline. Our resident student enrollment is increasing rapidly and we have a committee of parents, school district employees, and community members working on a long range facilities plan to provide classrooms and extra-curricular facilities to accommodate all of these students.

two years with renovation work delayed by the further delays of I-35 construction. In mid-June Stagecoach Inn unofficially opened by playing host to a banquet for 100 people gathered here for the 150th anniversary of the Salado Masonic Lodge. Work has begun on the renovation of the motel rooms. In the first phase of renovations, 40 rooms are expected to open in 2018.

Shortly after TxDOT finished work on I-35, it held the first public meeting in August for an improvement project for Main Street Salado.

The improvements would extend from Salado Plaza Drive to College Hill Drive.

This project would consist of constructing sidewalks, providing pavement striping for bicycles, installing lighting and replacing the culvert at Campbell Branch Creek.

The proposed improvements would also address parking, drainage and driveway access to adjacent properties. No new right of way would be required for this project.

In other infrastructure news for Salado, the Village got all of its permits for the construction of the sewer system and awarded bids for the collection system and wastewater plant construction this fall. Construction is slated to start in early January.

Salado could have an Airpark complete with privately-owned hangers and living quarters, if a proposal comes to fruition.

The Village is currently studying the feasibility of a proposal which would ultimately bring the acreage of the Airpark into the Village limits and ownership of the runways, taxi ways and flight operations building to the




Salado ISD has laid the groundwork for a major bond election in 2018. A facilities long range planning committee has met throughout the fall to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees in late January. The committee learned that the maximum amount the dis-

trict could call for a bond election is \$48 million. The committee has looked at estimates of 12 different projects including construction of new campuses and improvements of existing. This year, the district purchased just over 50 acres adjacent to its William Rd. high school campus.



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

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LoneStar eBikes and Salado combine to give 14 Bikes to local children

LoneStar eBikes celebrated Christmas in Salado by connecting bicycles with children that need them.

The Bikes for Kids program was started soon after LoneStar eBikes opened six months ago: however, as bikes started to be given to children in Bell County, word started to spread.

Salado and the surrounding communities have donated over 25 bikes, 15 helmets, 12 locks, parts and cash to help get bikes to kids that will use them.

Jay Ford, owner of Lone-Star eBikes, started "Bikes for Kids" because when he was a child, and his family did not have much money; people from his small city brought him some used toys that he played with for years.

LoneStar eBikes received help from Light House Ministries foster care program in Salado to get bikes to children who wanted them for Christmas.

"We have been giving bikes to kids for the past four months as we find children that need them, but we wanted to do something special for Christmas. Salado has been generous all along and we want them to know what a difference they have made, by sharing this story." Jay Ford mentions.

LoneStar eBikes opened in Salado in July 2017, and quickly realized that when customers bought an eBike they had no need for their regular bicycles. Customers donated their old bikes in order for LoneStar eBikes to fix them up and find good homes for them.

Residents of Salado heard about the opportunity to donate bikes and responded by donating even more bikes, helmets, locks, parts and

"People have been coming by almost every day with bikes and donations. We even had neighbors placing orders with Amazon to make sure we had locks and helmets for every bike." said Mary Ford, COO of LoneStar eBikes. "We even had people making sure they got the right size and color of helmets to match the child and bike. Salado and the surrounding communities have been extremely giving and loving to provide so much for the children that need bikes."

LoneStar eBikes provided parts, labor and tools to repair, clean and tune-up these bikes for kids; however, others donated their time and energy to help get bikes ready in time for Christmas.

"There is no way I could have prepped all of these bikes that are needed while also doing my other work. William Johnson and Johnny Strack donated dozens of hours of their time without pay to make sure the bikes were safe and ready before they were to be picked up," said Dan Martinez, VP of Technology for LoneStar eBikes.

Strack has worked very hard and independently while he is looking for a new job;

Johnson has been working after school at LoneStar eBikes as an intern to get experience and to help the other kids in community enjoy cycling like he does, according to Martinez. "William repairs bikes on his own at his home, and many of the bikes and parts donated were from his personal collection of over 30 bikes," Martinez said.

Nancy Martinez, the LoneStar eBikes Customer Service Manager, also rolled up her sleeves to clean and repair bikes to help them be ready in time.










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Kaden Smien tangles with an Academy defender during the Eagles' 3-0 win over the Bees.



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The deerlike Pronghorn is not antelope

Simply taking a drive on back roads throughout this great state can open endless opportunities for viewing wildlife that normally would be overlooked. When driving in the grasslands of the Panhandle or the Trans-Pecos, I always invite the occasion of viewing a small, distinctively curious mammal that once had a significantly larger range. That mammal is the Pronghorn.

Slow Cooking

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Pronghorns (known erroneously by many as Antelope) are hooved mammals that have a deerlike appearance about them. The coloration is two-toned with a brown, tan, or fawnlike back,

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neck and head interspaced with large patches of white on the belly, sides, and face. The tail and back end are also white. The chin, jaw and tip of the ears are black.

The Pronghorn is relatively small as adult males are typically just under 5 feet in total length (with a comparatively petite – 6 inch – tail) and a weight of just over 130 pounds. Females are somewhat smaller with a top weight of just under 90 pounds.

Male Pronghorn have horns that are spiked (hence the common name) and extend well past the tip of the ears. Females on the other hand have much shorter horns that are generally not "pronged".

The Pronghorn (Antilo-

capra americana) is the only remaining species in a family known as Antilocapridae; this family was once distributed throughout North America and was comprised of roughly 12 species. Until the past several decades, Pronghorn could be spotted throughout the western 34 of Texas on a fairly regular basis. At one point, its range in this state was anywhere

westward from a line that extends from Dallas southward through Austin to the lower Rio Grande Valley. Presently, its range is much more fragmented, with isolated pockets dispersed throughout the Panhandle and Trans-Pecos eco-regions. It is estimated that its numbers in Texas have dwindled from hundreds of thousands in its heyday to roughly 12,000 to-day.

This species of mammal primarily lives in herds and is truly a denizen of the plains. It prefers to live in areas of open grassland which enables it to utilize its keen sight and high-speed (up to 40 mph) to evade predators. Typically, areas of standing water are not common in these habitats, but the Pronghorn is so adapted to dwell in these areas that it can go long periods of time without drinking water. In fact, studies have shown that the Pronghorn has the ability to conserve and produce its own water.

The diet of the Pronghorn varies from season to season, but its favorites include flowers such as native daisies and other flowering plants, including varieties that are known to be poisonous to sheep and cattle. Juniper bark, broomweed and a few grass species are also consumed on a regular basis.

The breeding season generally lasts for approximately six weeks in the early fall with September being the month with the most active month. One energetic buck may entertain a harem upwards of a dozen does.

Gestation is usually around Seven months, and two small (six pound) young appear in May or June. The mothers will hide their helpless young, and return to them to nurse periodically throughout the day. At one week, the young will begin to walk on their own and nibble on vegetation and at one month, they will be able to graze independently. Sexual maturity is ordinarily reached at about one year in age.

Despite restocking programs instituted by the state, the population of the Pronghorn is steadily declining. Drought and competition with livestock appear to be the main culprits, as well as man's land use and fencing. This species is so peculiarly opposed to leaping over fences that even a three foot tall fence will often keep them contained. Many herds have been to the brink of starvation within a fenced area despite an abundance of food on the other side of the fence.

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Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar **Announces Tax Amnesty Program**

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today announced a temporary tax amnesty program giving certain delinquent taxpayers a chance to make their accounts compliant with state tax law without incurring penalties and interest on tax

The Texas Tax Amnesty Program will run from May 1 to June 29, 2018. The program applies to periods prior to Jan. 1, 2018, and only includes liabilities that have not been previously reported to the Comptroller.

Passed by the Texas Legislature in 2017, Senate Bill 1 requires the Comptroller of Public Accounts to establish a tax amnesty program to encourage voluntary reporting by: delinquent taxpayers who do not have a Texas Sales and Use Tax Permit, or are not registered for a tax or fee administered by the Comptroller's office; and taxpayers who have a permit, but may have underreported or owe additional taxes or

"Our tax amnesty program is the perfect opportunity for taxpayers to get in compliance," Hegar said. "Maybe you forgot to get a sales tax permit or you in-

advertently underreported taxes owed. If you qualify, there are no excuses necessary. You can participate in the coming tax amnesty program and make things right with the state of Texas and with your fellow taxpayers."

The Texas Tax Amnesty Program does not apply to periods currently under audit review, IFTA taxes, PUC Gross Receipts assessments. Local Motor Vehicle Tax and Unclaimed Property payments.
