Primary Day is March 6

Early voting slow; last day to vote early is March 2

Through Feb. 26, 5,360 Bell County voters have cast ballots in the Republican Party Primary and 1,843 have cast ballots in the Democratic Party Primary. This is less than five percent of the total registered voters in the county.

Despite several contested local races in the Republican party primary and contested Democrat races at the state and national level, Bell County voters have pretty much shrugged their shoulders thus far in early voting.

It is difficult to tell if this will match the 16,710 Bell County voters who cast ballots in the March 2014 pri-

In 2014, just over 10 percent of the 161,716 registered voters in Bell County voted in the March primaries as 16,710 total ballots were cast in the county. This was despite heavily contested races at the state level in both parties. Both of the primaries in 2014 ended up in May run-offs. In the run-off elections, fewer than five percent of the registered voters in Bell County cast ballots: 6,058 Republicans cast ballots in run-offs in which incumbent David Dewhurst was unseated by Dan Patrick and Ken Paxton earned the Republican nod. Both were elected in the November general election. Just over 25 percent of Bell County registered voters cast ballots in the November 2014 general

The last day of in-person early voting in the political primaries is March 2 with the polls open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. March 1-2.

Local historians will learn more at potluck dinner Gault Site is one of richest archeological digs to be found

The Gault Site sits near the head of a small creek in a small wooded valley, just at the point where three springfed brooks come together to form a clear, cool, vigorous

It is one of the richest archeological finds and the research stemming from it is rewriting the ideas of how

the Americas were peopled. Bell County Commissioner Tim Brown serves on the Gault Site Archaeological Research Board of Directors. He will present a slide presentation and tell the story of the Gault Site, which is located in Bell and Williamson counties, during the Salado Historical Society annual Pot Luck Dinner, 6 p.m. March 5 at the Salado Church of Christ. Brown is an avocational archaeologist and currently serves as vicepresident of the Gault Site Research Archaeological Board of Directors.

The main course for the pot luck dinner will be Roasted Pork Tenderloin, and drinks will be provided

to bring their favorite side dish or dessert. There is no charge for the event and we are encouraging parents to bring their children.

The deep, well-watered soils of the stream valley provide habitat for huge hardwood trees - burr oaks, walnuts, pecans, ash, elm, bois d'arc, willow, cottonwood and several others. It has been known to archaeologists for at least 89 years. The property originally belonged to Henry and Jodie Gault (the archaeological site was named for them). The land was marginal for farming and Gault supplemented his meager income by scouting out archaeological sites for Alex Dienst, who later became the president of the Texas State Historical Association. He assisted J.E. Pierce, the first anthropologist at the University of Texas, and his crew, excavate his land for about eight weeks, and then he backfilled the site.

and guests are requested ship several times, but was the focus for a great deal of collecting and looting. Collectors worked with heavy machinery and large crews, and eventually a commercial pay-to-dig operation allowed collectors the opportunity to dig for treasures at \$2 per day (later \$25/day), which severely damaged the site.

Archaeologists at the University of Texas at Austin and the Texas Historical Commission kept an eve on the site, but they could not come to any agreement with the land owner regarding professional excavation. A brief excavation in 1991 determined that the site was irreparably damaged to a strata of about 9,000 years ago. However, the Paleoindian strata was intact and remained deep down below the surface.

The land changed ownership in 1998 and a group from UT were asked by the new owners to look at something they had exposed at

Allegation of inappropriate relationship between SISD staffer, student reported

An allegation of an inappropriate relationship between a Salado high school staff member and a high school student was reported to Salado ISD Superintendent Michael Novotny in the afternoon of Feb. 26. Dr. Novotny reported that the employment of the staff member, whose name has not been released due to an ongoing investigation by the Bell County Sheriff's Department, was terminated on Feb. 27.

"We immediately began an investigation in cooperation with the Salado Police Department, Child Protective Services, the Bell County Sheriff Department and the Texas Education Agency," Dr. Novotny stated. "I terminated the employment of the staff member allegedly involved so she is no longer an employee of the Salado Independent School District."

"These allegations are of

grave concern to us all. Texas laws, Board of Education policies and the Educator's Code of Ethics are all crystal clear on this matter," he stated. "Yet, despite this clarity, individuals sometimes use extremely poor judgment in carrying out their responsibilities to students, families and the community."

"I have no tolerance for staff members who commit these alleged transgressions," he stated. "Due to privacy rights, and to avoid interfering in an ongoing investigation, we are limited in the communication I can provide to families or staff members."

He asks that anyone with information regarding this investigation contact him at 254-947-6500 or the Bell County Sheriff's Office at 254-933-6700.

"In all cases, the safety and protection of our students is the highest priority," he stated.

We have a talented, smart and dedicated faculty working here in the Salado Independent School District. The commitment of our employees to the students and families in Salado is strong," he stated. "We are committed to taking swift and decisive action when it is warranted and work toward preventing any future transgressions."

This is the third time in the past six years in which allegations were made of an inappropriate relationship between a school staff member and a student have been

In 2013, former Salado ISD teacher Lisa Wagnon was placed on 10 years probation for Sexual Assault of a Child.

In 2014, former teacher and coach Marcos Rene Garcia received eight years deferred adjudication probation for having an improper relationship with a student.

Money supply is blood supply of economy

The Markets

The venerable S&P 500 Stock Index ended the week with a small but productive gain of 0.55 percent. The market bobbed around a bit but held its ground for the week following its 10 percent decline early in the month and then its recovery of about half that value by mid-month. It remains down 4.37 percent for one month, up 2.76 percent year-to-date and up a healthy 16 percent for one year. Gold declined 1.39 percent to \$1,330.80 for the week but remained up about 4.35 percent for one year. The 10-year US Treasury note closed out the week about where it started at a 2.87 percent yield after briefly rising to nearly 3 percent at mid-week. Oil continued its slow rise to \$63.57, up 3.33 percent for the week and 17.44 percent

for one year.

All the indicators, induding the iconic Conference Board's Index of Leading Economic Indicators, released on Feb. 22, point to an accelerating and healthy economy for at least the next six months. In the short to intermediate term, all lights are green and the economic engine is revving up! The Federal Reserve's January notes, released on the 21st, indicated that the Open Market Committee saw an increasing economic growth rate for the next year or more and planned to raise interest rates in response. Meanwhile, the Labor Department reported the lowest number of unemployment claims since 1973! New manufacturing orders are surging as are business capital expansion plans. Moody's Analytics though is forecasting that the outlook for 2019 is beginning to look like stormy

Market & Economic Update

Going back at least 250 years, the developed economies of the world have tended to have ten-year economic cycles. Around the years ending in "0," plus or minus a couple of years, there generally have been economic downturns, some severe and some less so. Those are followed by expansions such as the one we have seen since 2009. Towards the end of the typical ten-year cycle, the expansions have tended to "overheat", then stall into an economic "crash." Recently we have seen those "crashes" in 2000-2002 and in 2008-2009.

As a side note, from an investor's perspective, forecasting the exact time when such things happen is a is that the economy is runfool's game, so we advocate ning at near full capacity, holding a steady course. Market timing has the worst record of any investment strategy.

The various schools of economics often disagree on the finer points, but all are in complete accord that major moves in economic growth or decline center around the money supply and the velocity at which it moves around in the economy. Money supply in an economy can be compared with the blood supply in a human body. If blood pressure falls either from blood loss or insufficient circulatory impulse, the body declines and goes into shock. Alternatively, if blood pressure rises too much, organs start to fail in the longer term, and that can be devas-

One of the prime rea-

have central banks like the U.S. Federal Reserve Board ("the Fed"), is an attempt to cushion those sometimes devastating "booms" and "crashes." One of the prime missions of the Fed is to raise interest rates to reduce the money supply when the economy approaches full capacity and then to infuse money back into the economy during economic downturns. Ideally, the federal government would do the same, borrowing and spending in bad times then taxing and paying off the debt in good times. When all that happens in sync, historically, neither the expansion nor the downturn tends to be excessive.

The issue we face today but Congress and the President just created a law that added about two trillion dollars to the money supply, a percentage greater than any we have seen since World War II. Much of that newly created (borrowed) money will hit the economy this year and next. Economic theory warns that if a large amount of money is infused into an economy when it is already running hot, it will tend to overspeed, generate inflation and higher long-term interest rates, then stall out as it burns through its capacity.

What happens over the next few years will likely be prominent in economics textbooks for the next century as we charge into the future in a grand test of an economic theory, and some would say, imprudence.

This device takes six different measurements of a person's eyes and within a few seconds is able to determine if the person has a vision problem and how strong his or her eyes are. It screens for seven different conditions, including nearsightedness, farsightedness, and astigmatism.

The Russian Bot Hysteria

If only Joe McCarthy had lived to see this moment, when it is suddenly in vogue to attribute largescale events in American politics to the hand of Russia and to inveigh against domestic subversion.

Robert Mueller released an indictment of 13 Russians for crimes related to their social-media campaign to meddle in our internal affairs in the run-up to and aftermath of the 2016 election.

Mueller obviously isn't a McCarthyite, and can't be held responsible for the hysteria -- and hopeful expectations of an impeachment-level event -- that has built up around his work. His indictment is, as far as anyone can tell, rigorously factual. That's probably the point of it -- to create a record of an episode that we should want to know as much about as possible and prevent from ever happening again.

The Russia campaign was a shockingly cynical violation of our sovereignty. President Donald Trump would do himself and the country a favor by frankly denouncing it. But the scale of the operation shouldn't be exaggerated. In the context of a hugely expensive, obsessively covered, impossibly dramatic presidential election, the Russian contribution on social media was

piddling and often laugh-

The Russians wanted to boost Trump, but as a Facebook executive noted, most of their spending on Facebook ads came after the election. The larger goal was to sow discord, yet we had already primed ourselves for plenty of that.

Does anyone believe, absent Russian trolls on Twitter and Facebook, that we were headed to a placid election season involving an incendiary, mediagenic former reality TV star bent on blowing up the political establishment and a longtime pol who had stoked the enmity of Republicans for 30 years and was under FBI investigation?

If you read the Mueller indictment, you might think the Russians were everywhere, not only advertising on Facebook ("Trump is our only hope for a better future"; "Ohio Wants Hillary 4 Prison"), but organizing rallies around the country. But it's not clear these rallies even came off.

The Russians didn't do anything to us that we weren't doing to ourselves, although we were doing it

on a much larger, more potent scale. The Russians are just aping the arguments we are already having with one other, and the sewerish level of much of the discussion on social media.

The New York Times ran a report the other day on Russian bots, in the immediate aftermath of the Parkland school shooting, posting on Twitter about gun control. It's hard to believe that this is going to rip apart the American body politic when many perfectly respectable, red-blooded Americans themselves advocate for gun control, and often in the immediate aftermath of shootings.

In a better world, Trump would be less defensive about the Russian investigation, and his opposition would be less obsessively invested in it (at least until such time that it produces a genuine bombshell). We should seek to shut down Russian influence as much as possible, without losing perspective. We aren't divided because of Russia; we're divided because we have genuine, deeply held differences. The fault, to the extent there is one, isn't with the bots, but with ourselves.

the site. It turned out to be the lower jaw of a juvenile mammoth and some ancient horse bones surrounded by a large number of Clovis artifacts. A three year lease between the University and the landowners allowed the first extensive research excavations at Gault. Between 1999 and 2002 more than 1.4 million artifacts were recovered, about half of them of Clovis age,

More than 2,300 volunteers worked on the Gault site, ranging from school children to graduate students to retirees. A number of universities participated in the excavation.

In 2006 the Gault School was incorporated as a Texas non-profit in an attempt to work toward acquiring the site and furthering both research and educational goals. In February of 2007 that dream became a reality and both research and ed-

Three candidates have filed in the Republican Primary for Bell County Commissioner, precinct two: Tim Brown, incumbent, Brit Owen and Bobby Whitson.

We asked each of them for a short biography and to answer the following questions:

Question 1: Why are you seeking election now? What qualities do you have that make you the best choice for the position? (150 words or

Question 2: What do you see as the greatest challenge facing the Bell Co Commissioners in the next 10 years? How do you plan to address it through the commissioners court, if elected? (150 words)

Question 3: Faced with budget cuts or a tax increase, which would you prefer? If budget cuts, which departments? (100 words).



Precinct 2 Commissioner Tim Brown is currently serving in his sixth term on the Commissioners Court. Prior to taking office, he was an independent designer, builder and land use planner. He holds Bachelor of Environmental Design and Master of Science in Land Development degrees from Texas A&M University. Since taking office in 1995, he has been instrumental in strategic planning, project development and management for major capital projects for the county.

He is active in intergovernmental affairs and state policy development in several areas affecting local governments. He was appointed by Gov. George Bush the Texas Courthouse Preservation working group and to the Texas Historical Commission Oversight Committee for the Texas Courthouse Preservation Grant Program. He is recognized state wide as a leader in transportation policy. He was a charter member and twotime President of NASCO, the nation's premier corridor coalition. He chaired the TransTexas Corridor Citizens Advisory Committee, the TTC-35 Advisory Committee and the I-35 Advisory Committee for the State of Texas under Gov. Rick Perry. The plan developed by the latter committee served as a blueprint for major system improvements currently under construction.

He currently serves on the Board of Directors and Policy Committee of the Texas Conference of Urban Counties. He is a Past-President and current board member of the Central Texas Council of Governments. He is Past-President and current member of the Killeen-Temple Metropolitan Planning Organization. He is member of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee of the Hill Country Communitv Action association.

He serves on the Brazos G Regional Water Planning Group. He also leads the Edwards Aquifer Adaptive Management Coalition managing research directed toward groundwater and critical habitat protection in southern Bell County.

Tim and his wife, Lana, have two grown children.

Question 1: I'm seeking a final term because we have some unfinished goals. I'm in the lead on several ongoing initiatives that are vital to our region. Our collaborative research on our part of the Edwards aquifer is critical to Salado for several reasons, and that project is pretty much my baby. I have several regional transportation goals in the early planning stages. I'm restarting an effort to develop a regional flood control plan and we're rewriting our subdivision ordinances to place greater emphasis on storm water management. These are all complex undertakings and I want to see significant progress on all of them before I re-

I have the technical expertise and experience to deal with these kinds of initiatives and a proven ability to move complex projects like these forward.

Question 2: Quite simply, the demands of growth will drive everything. Our single biggest challenge will be to meet those demands and, at the same time, contain costs. The issues are not new - just bigger and more complicated. Counties are service providers and a growing population equals more consumers of those services - roads, public safety, criminal justice, etc. Our challenge is compounded by the fact that in recent years the state has passed an ever-increasing share of program responsibilities down to local governments without funding assistance.

There are no easy solutions but we will continue do what we have done with proven success - be proactive and creative in developing projects, finding ways to increase efficiency, and managing the business of the county with tight-fisted frugality.

Question 3: Given that simple choice, we'd probably do both. But it's really not a matter of preference. Our duties and responsibilities are mandated by state law and we'll do what we must to meet our constitutional responsibilities. Since we've pretty much set the benchmark for efficiency already, there really isn't much to cut without getting into to the basic services across the board. Austerity measures would first hit non-essential departments like Information Technologies and the Bell County Museum, and secondary efforts like our help centers, meals-on-wheels, the extension service, groundwater research, etc. After that, the effects would be felt in the quality of our roads, and response times for public safety, case completion rates for the courts, etc. That said, my goal is to keep fighting to get the job done with the resources



But South also had a decision to make at trick one, and he very smartly refused to win the first trick with the king, thereby gumming up the East-West defense. After the queen held, there was no way to stop South from scoring three spades, four diamonds, a heart and a club for a total of nine

Subsequent analysis revealed that if East had allowed dummy's ten to win the opening trick, retaining both his ace and queen, he would have fared much better. When West later gained the lead with the ace of clubs, his heart return would have sunk the contract.


In refusing to play either of his honors at trick one, East should conclude that defensive prospects are very poor unless he can run his hearts, and that this can occur only if West has another heart to lead. Once East credits West with a second heart, the play of the six or nine on the opening trick -requesting a later continuation -- is clearly correct.
