



Salado earns Keep Texas Beautiful award

Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB) announced the winners of the 2018 Governor's Community Achievement Awards (GCAA), one of the most prestigious annual environmental awards in Texas.

Salado learned on March 23 that it is one of the 10 communities in the state to win a Governor's Community Achievement Award. As a result, Keep Salado Beautiful will be the recipient of a \$90,000 landscaping grant, the award for communities of less than 3,000.

Nearby Nolanville was also an award recipient, of \$110,000 for communities of 3,001-5,500 residents.

The awards recognize the best grassroots environmental programs in the state, and are awarded in 10 different population categories. Every community in Texas is eligible to apply for a Governor's Community Achievement Award. A community's environmental program is judged on achievements in seven different areas: community leadership and coordination, education, public awareness, litter prevention and cleanup, litter law and illegal dumping enforcement, beautification and community improvement and solid waste management.

Keep Texas Beautiful and TxDOT first began working together in the late 1960s and have shared the common goals of making Texas

roadways more attractive and safe for motorists and encouraging tourism. Since 1985, KTB has partnered with TxDOT to support its anti-litter and beautification programs such as Don't mess with Texas Trash-Off and the Governor's Community Achievement Awards. The GCAA program has recognized outstanding communities for more than 50 years, with TxDOT providing landscape funding since 1986.

"We're so thrilled to have the opportunity to partner with TxDOT on the GCAA Awards. Congratulations to each of the award winners for being recognized for their hard work to beautify communities across Texas," said Suzanne Kho, Executive Director of Keep Texas Beautiful.

KTB will formally recognize and present the awards during its 51st Annual Conference in Georgetown scheduled for June 11-13, 2018.

The communities of Salado, Nolanville, Brady, Seabrook, Katy, Lake Jackson, Grapevine, Baytown, Abilene and Irving were selected by a panel of judges to share \$2 million divided by population category from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), to be used for landscaping projects along local rights-of-way within their communities.

April 5 is last day to register to vote for May 5 elections

The last day to register to vote in the May 5 local elections is April 5.

Early voting begins in the May 5 elections on April 23 and ends on May 1.

Salado ISD has called for a \$49.4 million bond election for the construction of a new middle school, safety corridors at Thomas Arnold elementary and improvements to existing and construction of new athletic facilities.

The local ballot will also have contested races for Mayor of the Village of Salado and Village of Salado Board of Aldermen.

Three candidates have filed for election as Mayor: David Williams, Linda Reynolds and Skip Blancett (incumbent).

Five candidates have filed for two positions on the Board of Aldermen: Judy Fields, Michael Coggin, Frank Coachman (incumbent), Chad Martin and Becky Butscher.

Early voting and election day voting will be at the Salado Civic Center on Main St.

Texas law requires the photo identification.

This requirement is effective immediately.

Here is a list of the acceptable forms of photo ID:

- Texas Driver License issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS)
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS
- Texas Personal Identification Card issued by DPS
- Texas Handgun License issued by DPS
- United States Military Identification Card containing the person's photograph
- United States Citizenship Certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States Passport (book or card)

With the exception of the U.S. Citizenship Certificate, which does not expire, for voters aged 18-69, the acceptable form of photo identification may be expired no more than four years before being presented for voter qualification at the polling place. For voters aged 70 or older, the acceptable form of photo identification may

be expired for any length of time if the identification is otherwise valid.

Election Identification Certificates are available from DPS driver license offices during regular business hours.

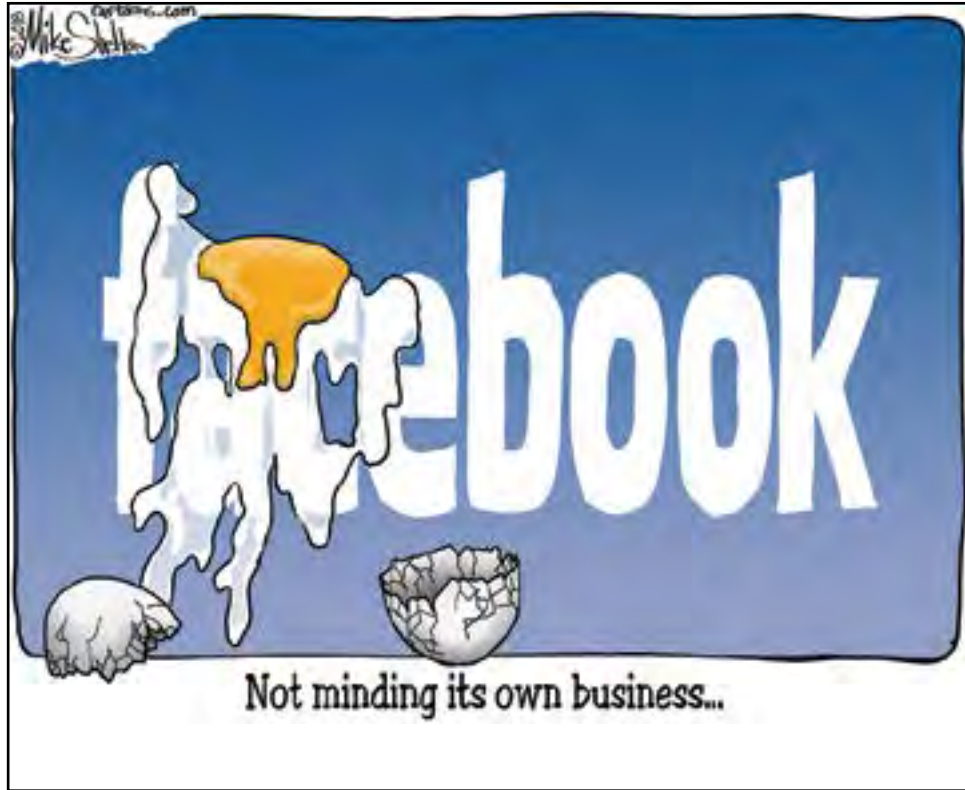
Here is a list of the supporting forms of ID that can be presented if the voter does not possess one of the forms of acceptable photo ID and cannot reasonably obtain one:

- copy or original of a government document that shows the voter's name and an address, including the voter's voter registration certificate;
- copy of or original current utility bill;
- copy of or original bank statement;
- copy of or original government check;
- copy of or original paycheck; or
- copy of or original of (a) a certified domestic (from a U.S. state or territory) birth certificate or (b) a document confirming birth admissible in a court of law which establishes the voter's identity (which may include a foreign birth document).

After presenting one of the forms of supporting ID listed above, the voter must execute a Reasonable Impediment Declaration.

Market drops 5.95% in one week

The Markets

The U.S. stock market, as represented by the S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) closed out the week at 2588.26, marking the worst weekly decline since January 2016, down 5.95 percent for the week. From its high on January 26, the SPX is now down 9.91 percent, putting it within less than a tenth of a percent of the commonly-held definition of a "correction." Shares of manufacturers, steelmakers, and aluminum producers led the decline with Century Aluminum down 19 percent for the week. United States Steel was down 13 percent and Caterpillar down another 5.6 percent.

The culprit in this week's decline was the potential effect of tariffs. It began with the President's announcement of tariffs on tens of billions of dollars' worth of Chinese imports followed by counter-tariffs on American exports to China. Ironically, the steel and aluminum industries, those industries supposedly for which the steel and aluminum tariffs were created, now appear to be the ones that may suffer the most in the developing trade war.

Meanwhile, the benchmark 10-year U.S. Treasury note yield declined to 2.815 percent, a decline of 0.141 points or about 5 percent from its recent high of 2.956 percent. The decline was widely credited to a perception that the tariffs would have a negative effect on economic growth. The dollar declined against world currencies by 0.66 percent while gold rose 2.52 percent to \$1,352.90 on dollar weakness and a flight to safety in the face of the potential trade wars.

The Economy

U.S. domestic factory durable goods orders rose in February 3.1 percent from January, the best gain in eight months and were up 9.1 percent since last February.

Business investment was up 1.8 percent to \$67.83 billion for the month, the highest level since 2014. The cause seems to be the new tax law that allows an immediate tax write-off for large commercial equipment purchases. There was a 2.7 percent increase in demand for American made primary metals in February, raising the total increase to 13.7 percent for the first two months of the year compared with last year.

The acceleration in the domestic industrial sectors of our economy was measured just before President Trump's announcement of steel and aluminum tariffs and should serve as a good benchmark for the tariffs' domestic economic effect. Comments by manufacturing executives since the tariff announcements suggest that the accelerating manufacturing growth could be slowed or even reversed by the metals tariffs and the emerging trade war. Take note: The combination of massive tax cuts, large increases in government spending, and trade tariffs constitutes a major experiment in macroeconomics. Over the next couple of years, we should see the results. Hopefully, we can learn from them.

The Federal Reserve Board announced another 0.25 percent rise in the interbank lending rate to a range between 1.5 percent and 1.75 percent. In its statement, the Fed reaffirmed its intent to continue to raise interest rates at a moderate pace to head off a spike in inflation. What was not said but widely understood was that a combination of a \$1.4 trillion tax cut and a separate \$1.3 trillion spending bill could easily overstimulate the economy during the next twelve to eighteen months and lead to a rise in inflation. The Fed's prime mission is to prevent things like that from happening, so it will need to take preemptive action by raising rates.

U.S. new home sales declined slightly in February, down 0.6 percent for the month with the median price of a new home up 9.7 percent from one year ago. The slowdown was generally presumed to be a result of the rise in 30-year mortgage rates to 4.45 percent. At the same time, existing home sales, which compose most of the home market, rose 3 percent in February. Existing home median values are up 5.9 percent from February of 2017.

Economists surveyed by the Wall Street Journal continue to expect solid economic growth this year but have lowered the annual total. They also concluded that the health of the American economy currently faces a major threat if the tariff and counter-tariff trade war continues to develop. In a worst-case scenario where the U.S. withdraws from the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) and a trade war with China escalates, the U.S. could lose 800,000 jobs and potentially enter a recession in 2019 or 2020. For the short-term, the survey reported a consensus that economic growth would continue in 2018. That view was confirmed by Thursday's release by the Conference Board of their Index of Leading Economic Indicators, all of which were positive. The Conference Board's director of economic forecasting stated that at least for the rest of 2018, a recession was extremely unlikely.

Here are some facts on growth, academics, finances in SISD

This week I am providing a few facts regarding our school district's academics, finances, and growth.

Academics

This school year our district earned the post-secondary readiness distinction from the Texas Education Agency. This award is based on the following nine criteria: State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) scores, graduation rate, graduation plan rate, percentage of graduates that are college ready, percentage of high school students that complete an advanced or dual-credit course, Advanced Placement (AP) exam scores, SAT and ACT test participation, SAT and ACT test performance, and the percentage of graduates that complete one or more coherent sequences of Career Technology Education (CTE) courses.

There are 1,216 school districts in Texas and we are one of only 58 districts (fewer than 5 percent) that received this recognition. Out of the 159 school districts in Central Texas (Austin/Waco regions) we are only of only six districts that received this recognition. We are the only school district to receive this recognition out of all twelve districts in Bell County.

Finances

Our school district received the highest (superior) rating and a perfect score of 100 on the Financial Integ-

erty Rating System of Texas (FIRST) rating. We have the lowest tax rate in our school district in the last 27 years (since the 1989-1990 school year). In the past years we have refinanced previous bonds four times and saved our taxpayers a total of \$3,138,337.

Growth

Our district's enrollment has increased from 1,348 to 1,854 students during the past five years. This is a 38 percent increase, which is the highest percentage increase of all 81 school districts in the Waco region. Of those 506 additional students, 410 of them (81 percent) are resident students that moved into the district, while 96 of them (19 percent) are out-of-district transfer students. Over a year ago (January 2017), we discontinued accepting new transfer students with the following three exceptions: children of employees, siblings of current transfer students, and children of

active duty military or disabled veterans. As a result, our transfer student enrollment decreased from 254 students last year to 237 students this year. In spite of this, our enrollment still increased by 100 students because we have 117 more resident students move into our district this year.

Our district's enrollment is projected to increase another 939 students during the next ten years. These enrollment projections are based on only resident student growth and a continuing decline in transfer students. If the May 5 bond election is approved, the new middle school would open in August 2020. By then, our enrollment is projected to increase by another 306 resident students.

Please remember that next Thursday, April 5, is the deadline to register in order to be eligible to vote in the May 5 Salado ISD bond election.



Don't Bork Gina Haspel

President Donald Trump's pick for CIA director is about to experience a good Borking.

No one doubts her professionalism, and she's been endorsed by Obama intelligence officials. Yet Gina Haspel's long career at the agency, including extensive work undercover in the field, is getting blotted out by her reported involvement in the CIA's black-site interrogation program, which has become a warrant to say anything about her.

Her critics assert she should be in jail, and The New York Times editorial page wrote about her nomination under the headline "Having a Torturer Lead the C.I.A."

Not to be outdone in demagogic attacks on anyone associated with our national security apparatus, Sen. Rand Paul calls Haspel "the head cheerleader for waterboarding," and claims she mocked a detainee for his drooling. The only problem is that this anecdote comes from a book by a contractor who worked with the CIA, James Mitchell, and it describes a man, not a woman, making the comment.

Factual accuracy aside, the attacks on Haspel are ahistorical in that they ignore the context of the CIA program, and unfair insofar as they portray her as a

remorselessly cruel prime mover behind it.

The interrogation program began when al-Qaida operative Abu Zubaydah was captured in March 2002. At the time, we believed another 9/11-style attack was imminent, and preventing it had an urgency fueled by raw memories of an event that was literally yesterday's news.

The interrogation program wasn't a rogue operation. The CIA repeatedly briefed select congressional leaders, especially the top Republicans and Democrats on the intelligence committees. It was approved at the highest level of the U.S. government, and the CIA sought, and got, explicit legal approval from the Department of Justice.

Haspel is connected in the press to the interrogations of Abu Zubaydah, although the CIA hasn't confirmed her participation and insists much of the reporting about her work in this period is erroneous.

But let's consider Zubaydah's case. He was not a detainee who had nothing to tell us, as he is often portrayed by critics of the CIA. Shortly after his capture, he identified Khalid Sheikh

Mohammed as the mastermind of 9/11.

The enhanced interrogations were brutal. Zubaydah was struck, placed in stress positions, confined in small boxes and repeatedly waterboarded. During one session, he became unresponsive. By any standard, this was extreme and right up to the legal line.

The CIA didn't learn of any planned attack in the U.S.; it did become confident that Zubaydah wasn't holding back anything. From his capture to his transfer to the Department of Defense on Sept. 5, 2006, information from him produced 766 intelligence reports.

In the cold light of day, we would have handled all of this differently. But this was a national failing, and at a time when we understandably believed we were in a race to prevent another atrocity on our shores. To punish Gina Haspel more than 15 years later for doing what her country asked her to do, and in response to what she was told were lawful orders, would be a travesty and a disgrace.

But so were the confirmation hearings of Robert Bork.

NAFTA supplies America with energy & power

The Trump Administration unveiled an agenda for “energy dominance” shortly after taking office, promising to curb the global influence of countries like Russia and China with American energy exports.

Whether or not the administration succeeds will depend a great deal on ongoing trade talks with Canada and Mexico. U.S. negotiators continue to negotiate terms to modernize the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), the trade pact between the U.S., Mexico, and Canada.

NAFTA has fostered a thriving North American energy market that currently supports millions of U.S. jobs and keeps costs down for American consumers. If negotiators agree to eliminate or weaken NAFTA’s Investor-State Dispute Settlement (ISDS), we would open the door for Chinese and Russian energy interests to exert their influence right here in North America.

That’s a national security outcome that no proponent of U.S. “energy dominance” would understand or support.

NAFTA eliminated tariffs on several oil and natural gas products between the United States, Canada, and Mexico. In so doing,

it has enabled each of our nations to benefit from one another’s considerable energy resources and technical capacities.

Consider America’s relationship with Mexico. The United States is a net importer of crude oil from Mexico. Yet much of that product is refined in American facilities and exported back to Mexico. In fact, Mexico receives roughly a fifth of all refined petroleum product exports from the United States.

Our southern neighbor is also a significant and growing importer of American natural gas, accounting for a whopping 60.2 percent of America’s natural gas exports. Meanwhile, Canada accounts for 61 percent of America’s crude oil exports and approximately a third of natural gas exports.

This economic relationship has been enormously beneficial for Americans. The U.S. Chamber of Commerce recently estimated that trade with Canada and Mexico supports nearly 14 million American jobs.

NAFTA has also helped to create a built-in advantage for the U.S. to access Mexico’s newly opened energy market. US companies won 15 percent of the 47 blocks awarded to foreign investors since 2015, while companies from Russia and China combined won 13 percent of these blocks.

This could change quickly if NAFTA falls apart. By 2030, America’s diminished role in Mexico’s energy economy could force that nation to rely more on investment from Russia and China.

That’s precisely what happened after America ceased to be the biggest investor in Venezuela’s oil sector. Within a few years, China and Russia had swooped in, loaning the nation \$60 billion to strengthen its energy industry.

In a post-NAFTA world, Mexico could easily shift to using funds from Russia and China to dramatically increase its own production and refining capacity, and making it less reliant on the United States as a result.


Fortunately, U.S. trade representatives can avoid that scenario by ensuring that NAFTA is not only preserved, but strengthened. Ideally, a renegotiated trade pact would maintain an open energy market between the United States, Mexico, and Canada by making NAFTA permanent and strengthening ISDS.

Today’s vibrant, integrated North American


energy market has served Americans well for years, while also keeping our nation’s global energy rivals at bay. Failing to preserve NAFTA would leave America less prosperous, less secure, and less influential around the world.

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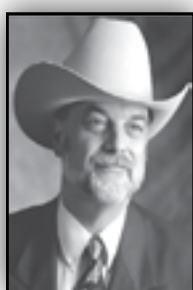

Salado followed with two more runs. Gonzalez and Oborski walked and scored on a single to center by Preston.

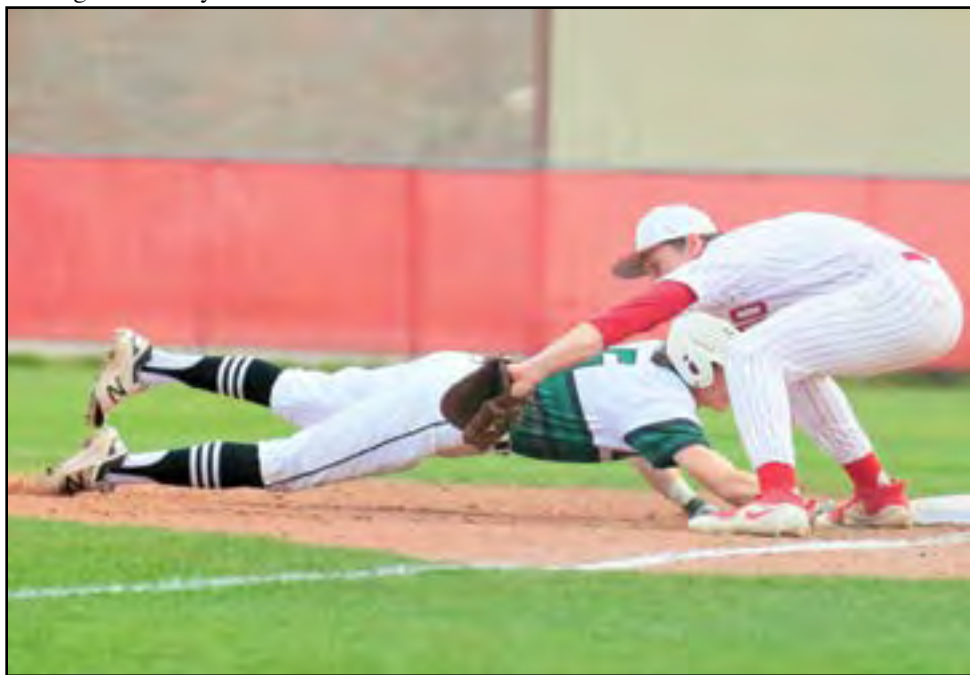
Salado led 10-3 going into their final frame. With one out in the sixth, Wilson

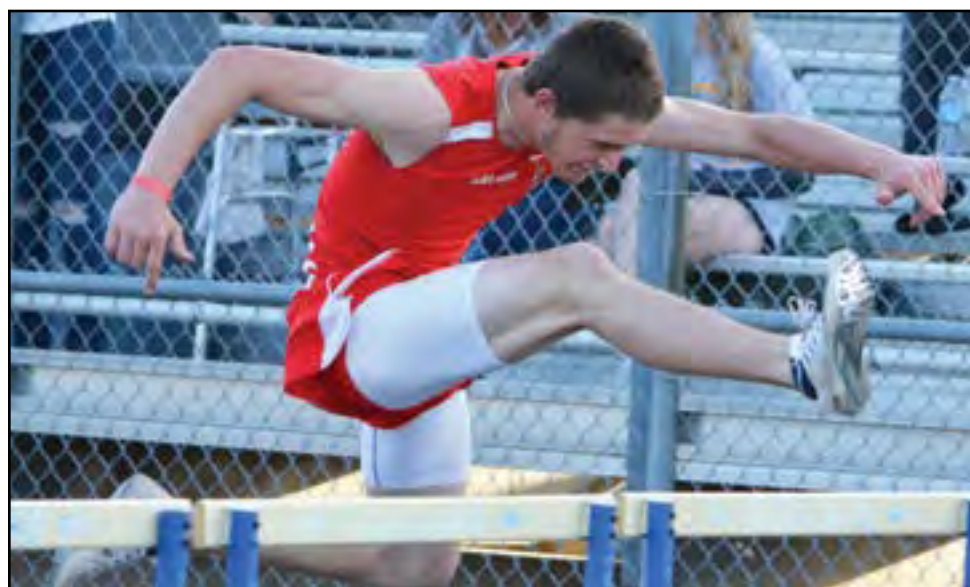

Assume you're in four spades and West cashes the A-K of hearts, then shifts to a trump.

You're bound to lose a diamond trick, come what may, but the danger is that you may lose two. Situations like this occur all the time, and must be dealt with on a case-by-case basis.

One thing you shouldn't do in this instance is to bank everything on East's having the king of diamonds. It certainly is tempting to finesse the queen, but that is something you should do only as a last resort.

West dealer.

First you should try to learn where the king is located. Accordingly, after winning the trump return, you lead the

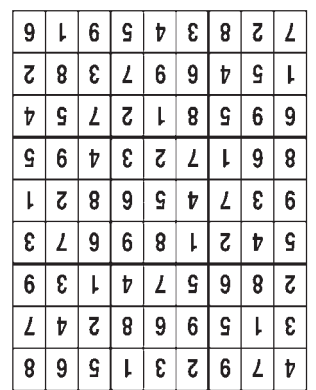
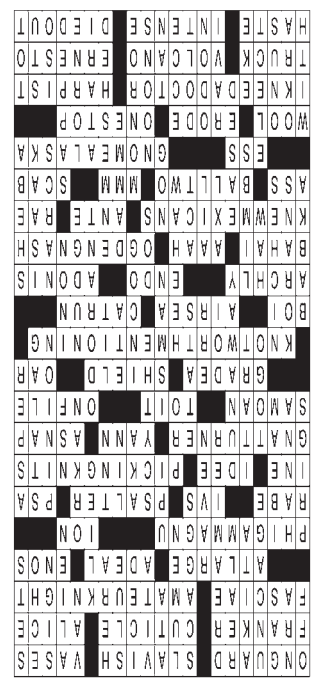
queen of clubs. When West follows low, you go up with the ace, making a mental note that East almost surely has the king since West presumably would have covered the queen if he could have.

Next you lead a club and ruff it. If East plays the king on this trick, which is likely, you have a much better picture of the hand than you had at the start. You still may be unable to make the contract, but at least you know West has the king of diamonds. This is because he opened the bidding as dealer and could scarcely have done so without the diamond king.

Your one hope now is that West was dealt the singleton or doubleton king. If he has three diamonds, you can kiss the hand goodbye. So, after another round of trumps, you cash the ace of diamonds, enter dummy with a trump and lead a diamond. Regardless of what East plays, you duck.

As it happens, West must win with the king, and you wind up making the contract.

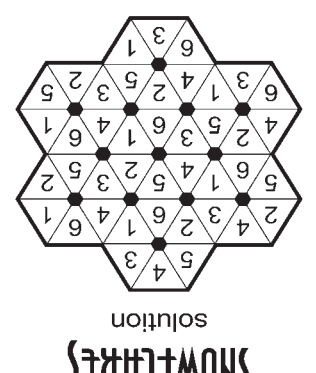

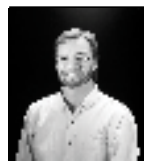

The Western Massasauga is the smallest of the rattlesnakes

Many people are astounded when they learn that Texas has 10 races of rattlesnake that call this state home, and many more are surprised to find out that we have one of the smallest varieties, albeit one with a funny name.

The Western Massasauga (*Sistrurus catenatus tergeminus*) has a wide-ranging, but exceptionally localized distribution. It naturally occurs from the extreme southeast corner of Nebraska eastward through northwestern Missouri southward to central Texas. Although it bears the common name of

“Western Massasauga”, this diminutive species would be better suited with the nomenclature of “Prairie Massasauga” due to the habitats that this grassland-dwelling species prefers. In fact, recent DNA studies have shown that this race may in fact be a separate species altogether, and that common name may actually change in the near future.

Compared to some of the more commonly observed and well-known rattlesnakes, the Western Massasauga is a true dwarf race. Most adults encountered are less than 20 inches in total length, including rattle, and although the record size was an individual that was just under 3 feet, this “giant” was more the exception than the rule. As such, this species of rattlesnake is one of the smallest that can be found within the confines of this state.

Western Massasaugas are not extravagantly colored animals to say the least. The background coloration varies from a light gray to a light tan, and along the spine are large, darker brown blotches that are clearly defined with an outline of white. Directly

below these blotches are similarly colored spots that are right above the belly scales. More often not there is a brown “smudge” on the sides that is in between the dorsal blotches and the side blotches. It also has a broad, dark line that extends from the eye to the corner of the mouth.

Like other rattlesnakes, the head of this species is distinctly wider than the neck, giving this animal the famous “diamond-shaped” head. The pupils are elliptical, and the rattle is quite tiny and is hard to hear unless one is fairly close to a specimen.

Generally speaking, this species of venomous serpent is surface-active only for a few weeks annually. The first emergence from brumation (not hibernation as the animal does not sleep through the winter, but rather just slows its heart rate and metabolism) usually takes place in late March to early April, depending on the temperatures and the rainfall amounts. It is during this time that it can be found diurnally, particularly in the mornings and late afternoons. Breeding ordinarily takes place

during this spring-time surface activity. Western Massasaugas are oviparous, which means they give birth to living young, and the 5 inch-long neonates (which number from 4 to 6) are typically born in late summer. Other than having a “button” on the end of the tail, they are exact replicas of the adults, and are fully capable of fending for themselves, including having fully functional fangs and venom apparatus. The only difference in the coloration between adults and juveniles is the young are adorned with a bright yellow tail.

The second activity period is during the late summer early fall when it is more nocturnal in its habits. Interestingly enough, this species is much less heat-tolerant than other rattlesnakes, and during the heat of the summer months, individuals will often remain underground for weeks at a time.

Like other pit-vipers, the Western Massasauga uses its venom to obtain its prey, which is primarily made up of lizards of various sizes. Adults will occasionally add small rodents and even toads to its diet.

Generally, Western Massasaugas appear to be more high-strung and temperamental than the more common Western Diamondback Rattler. However, I am aware of only a handful of envenomations, and none of these were life-threatening. That does not dilute the urgency of seeking medical attention if one is bitten of course.

Due to its limited surface activity, the risk of encountering a Western Massasauga is remarkably slim. If such an encounter occurs, remember that this animal, despite its harmful capability, is more afraid of you than you are of it and it would prefer to be left alone. The best course of action is to walk, don't run, in the opposite direction.

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The Invention of the American Backyard

Smithsonian Traveling Exhibit coming to Railroad and Heritage Museum

A new traveling exhibit at the Temple Railroad and Heritage Museum celebrates the perennial signs of summer: the smell of hot dogs on the grill, the sound of a mower on a Saturday afternoon, pool parties and get-togethers on the patio. The Smithsonian exhibit "Patios, Pools, & the Invention of the American Backyard" explores the historic shift from enjoying the outdoors on the front porch to creating an outdoor living space in the backyard. The new traveling exhibition will be on view in Temple through May 26.

Through rare photographs, historic drawings and period advertisements, "Patios, Pools, & the Invention of the American Backyard" explores the mid-century backyard of the 1950s from the rise of the suburbs and tract houses and the beauty of post-war garden design to the birth of the environmental movement. Drawing from the collections and research of the Smithsonian Gardens' Archives of American Gardens, the exhibition is organized for travel by the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service (SITES).

In the 1950s, America was a nation emerging from the shadow of World War II, searching for ways to enjoy its new-found peace and prosperity. Postwar trends such as the

baby boom, a growing middle class, the do-it-yourself concept and a dramatic rise in home ownership remade much of the U.S. and contributed to the development of the suburban backyard. The mid-century backyard became an extension of the house, a room designed for relaxing, recreation and entertaining. Private backyard pools were an affordable luxury for many, and the patio became the perfect place for a backyard grill and patio furniture made with new materials like plastic and aluminum.

Companies produced an increasing number of products designed to lessen the burden of yard work. Imported and hybrid grasses, herbicides and pesticides, automated sprinkler systems, chemical sprayers and newly affordable lawn mowers began to appear in sheds and garages around the nation. Many contemporary backyards still boast the pristine lawn, low-maintenance plantings, patios, outdoor furniture, grills and

play equipment that first emerged after World War II.

"Patios, Pools, & the Invention of the American Backyard" can be viewed with regular admission to the museum, Tuesday – Saturday, 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. and is part of the regular schedule of changing exhibits at the museum. 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Save money, time, water with irrigation repairs

DALLAS — A Texas A&M AgriLife Research water conservation horticulturist said home and business owners should repair and maintain sprinkler systems to save money and time while reducing wasted water resources.

“A lot of water-saving advice focuses on the indoors, but we know more water, especially in warmer months, can be saved by maintaining irrigation systems outside,” said Patrick Dickinson of Texas A&M AgriLife’s urban water program, known as Water University, in Dallas.

The message comes as part of Water University’s participation in the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency’s national Fix a Leak Week campaign, Dickinson said. The campaign encourages people to fix leaks as part of the EPA’s WaterSense initiative to label products, homes and programs that meet specific water efficiency standards.

Household leaks account for about 1 trillion gallons of potable water wasted each year, according to the EPA.

“We also know that in the warmer months, as much as 60 percent of all drinkable water used by a household is spent outside on lawns and landscapes,” Dickinson said. “So it’s critical to make sure those systems are free from leaks and running as efficiently

as possible.”

He recommended inspecting lawns for unexpected wet spots when the weather is dry.

“Look for water bubbling up from the ground or pooling and running over concrete,” he said. “Repair underground leaks by simply turning off your irrigation system controller, digging around the leaking section of pipe, cutting out the punctured section and joining the remaining ends with a cheap compression coupling from any hardware store.”

A new instructional video featuring Dickinson, Sprinkler Quick Fixes, available at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=_9WMPyZetGI, instructs viewers on three sprinkler system repairs for efficient irrigation. Tips include replacing a broken

sprinkler head, clearing clogged nozzles that lead to inefficient irrigation and adjusting spray streams to avoid watering sidewalks and other non-plant structures.

Dickinson also recommended ensuring all irrigation pipe and connections remain properly sealed and tightened according to manufacturer recommendations.

“It’s not hard to keep an irrigation system running efficiently,” he said. “But it does require a little time and attention. Luckily we have a whole week dedicated to just that.”

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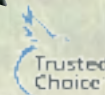
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22nd Annual ArtWorks Student Exhibit at the CAC
