Smokin Spokes slated April 7 benefits SVFD

The 16th Annual Smokin' Spokes Bike Ride, benefitting the Salado Volunteer Fire Department, will be held April 7 with the ride beginning at 8 a.m. at Salado Intermediate School. All routes will begin and end at Salado Intermediate School on Thomas Arnold.

As in previous years, a variety of routes will be available for riders to choose from, with each route differing in distance and overall difficulty.

Riders can pick from 15, 27, 57, 70, 85 and 102 mile rides. All routes will begin and end at Salado Intermediate. Most routes will take cyclists east to the Summer's Mill area, and also west to Stillhouse Hollow Lake.

There are rest stops designated with each route. "We placed most of our rest stops at very scenic locations," said Shane Berrier, Salado Volunteer Fire Department Chief. "One is on the shore of Stillhouse Hollow Lake; one is at the Overlook Park on top of the dam to Stillhouse Hollow; and one is at Summer's Mill."

Entry fee will be \$40 for pre-registration and \$45 for on-site registration. The first 300 pre-registered riders will be guaranteed a Smokin' Spokes T-Shirt. Pre-Register by April 1. Check-in begins at 6 a.m.

An Open Exchange of Ideas



Market slips 1.22% in first quarter; **S&P 500 still up 11.53% for year**

The Markets

The exchanges were closed for Good Friday, so Thursday, March 29 marked the end of 2018's first quarter for the markets. The S&P 500 Stock Index (SPX) finished the week down 2.82 percent at 2640.87 after rising 1.38 percent on the last day of the trading week. That left it down 1.22 percent for the first quarter but still up 11.53 percent for the 52-week year. The anecdotal evidence from traders and investors still suggests that the simmering trade-war rhetoric remains the drag on market values.

As potential economic growth tends to raise interest rates and potential slumps lower them, it is no surprise that the ten-year U.S. Treasury note continued to evidence a decline in yield, ending the week at 2.742 percent. That yield is 7 percent lower than the peak reached near the end of February. The dollar ended the quarter down about 2.8 percent from the beginning of the year. Conversely, the Euro is up about 3 percent against the dollar so far, this year and up over 15 percent since this time last year. West Texas Intermediate Crude Oil (WTI) has risen 8.56 percent this year and is up nearly 29 percent since the quarter end this time last year. Gold is up 1.1 percent this year and 4.81 percent for twelve months, closing out the quarter at \$1,329.10. The Economy

The Commerce Department announced that the Personal Consumption Expenditures Price Index (PCE), the inflation gauge preferred by the Federal Reserve, rose 0.20 percent in February and was up 1.8 percent for 12 months. The average monthly increase over the last five months suggests we are on track for a 12-month inflation rate of about 2.4 percent. As the Federal Reserve's target is

2 percent, the rise in prices could well lead to a more aggressive interest rate increase from the Fed this year. The increase in inflation rates is not surprising. American workers saw a 0.4 percent increase in disposable personal income in February following the tax cuts this year. Many American workers are taking home more money for doing the same work and the Treasury is borrowing the difference.

There are some counterintuitive results showing up in economic figures. Americans apparently are not spending the extra money from the tax cuts, electing rather to pay down existing debt or save the extra takehome pay. Despite much talk about the trillions of dollars American corporations were going to "repatriate", the dollar continues to decline. fore, one of the largest If trillions of dollars were being converted from other currencies to dollars to come home to America, the dollar would be rising. Instead, it has been falling. Tax revenues have slumped, again suggesting that corporations have managed to largely avoid much or most of the tax on overseas holdings.

The current market correction started with the tweets announcing steel and aluminum tariffs. While the proclaimed intent was to help the domestic steel and aluminum industries, Nucor (NEU) the largest domestic steel producer is down nearly 9 percent and US Steel (X) is down nearly 20 percent since the announcement. Across the board, domestic steel producers appear to be taking the biggest economic hits from the tariffs.

The tax cut was announced as a big boost for

economic growth both from the money predicted to come back to the U.S. and from increased consumer spending as the tax cut would increase take-home pay. Neither appears to have happened. The third economic boost from the tax cut was to have been increased corporate investment. Some of that appears to be occurring, but the sudden increase in steel and aluminum prices may have dampened that effect. Independent private analysts are forecasting that GDP growth in the first quarter of this year will come in at between 1.8 percent and 2.0 percent, far lower than last year's 2.6 percent total and the 2.9 percent growth rate of the fourth quarter in 2017 announced by the Commerce Department on March 28th.

As we have written beeconomic experiments in American history continues.

The results so far are mixed. Meanwhile, ignoring the ongoing drama out of Washington, the mainstream U.S. economy is continuing to drive forward with impressive momentum. The American labor force is many, many times larger today than it was in 1973, but last week's jobless claims report showed the lowest number in 45 years. That makes it the lowest percentage of the job force laid off in a week since records have been kept.

Our long-term forecasting skills are certainly not perfect but we anticipate a market recovery and reasonable growth this year. The economy drives the markets, not the other way around. The hangover looks more and more likely to come in late 2019 and hit full-on in 2020. Stay tuned.

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Students learn about stars, will talk to Space Station

In February 2017, four teachers from Salado Intermediate School (Corey Baird, Colleen Gilchrest, Darcy Madsen, and Laura Tomlin) attended the Space **Exploration Educators Con**ference (SEEC) at Johnson Space Center in Houston. They learned of an opportunity through ARISS, Amateur Radio on the International Space Station, in which students could have a live question and answer session with an astronaut aboard the ISS. A proposal, including a technical and education plan, was submitted in April 2017. By mid-June, ARISS announced that the Salado Intermediate School (SIS) was one of thirteen organizations in the United States that would make contact with the International Space Station in


the spring of 2018. During the summer of 2017, Colleen Gilchrest and Laura Tomlin were invited to Johnson Space Center for a week-long training at NASA's Network of States. The mission was to bring NASA educational resources to other teachers in our Resources and district. activities were shared with faculty and staff at SIS and Thomas Arnold Elementary School during fall in-service training.

To prepare students for contact with the International Space Station, SIS has incorporated NASA activities, lessons, and speakers into this year's curriculum. These activities have helped increase student awareness and understanding of NA-SA's space program. At the beginning of this school year, Steven Smith, NASA EPD Specialist, visited teachers and staff in our district to discuss the im-

Salado Intermediate School hosted a Science and Engineering Day last fall in which students rotated through a variety of stations. Although presenters were from many scientific fields, this year was focused on space and related technologies. An amateur radio operator explained how radio waves and satellites work. A local astronomer, Jeffrey McClure, shared photos he had taken of the stars and galaxies. Mr. Will Manning discussed his experience with satellite imagery while employed with NASA Goddard and the U.S. Army. KWTX Meteorologist Brian Germ explained the technology used to forecast and monitor weather. A spokesperson from the Mayborn Planetarium discussed planets and constellations.

Lane Flyers brought a glider plane to campus to explain aerodynamics. These and many other guests volunteered their time and resources to spend the day with our students.

Sixth grade science honors students also visited Space Center Houston last fall. Coincidentally, the International Space Station crossed the early morning sky as students were able to watch from the buses. While at Space Center Houston, Steven Smith, spoke to our group about the exhibits, including the Saturn V rocket. Frank Hughes, a former Apollo and Shuttle engineer, shared his experiences with our group. This same group of students was selected by NASA for a video conference with former astronauts and current directors of Johnson and Kennedy Space Centers, Dr. Ellen

Ochoa and Robert Cabana. A Star Party was held by SIS in December 2017 with

The Teenage Demagogues

All you needed to know about student activist David Hogg's speech at the "March for Our Lives" in LOWIV Washington, D.C., was that he affixed a price tag on the microphone to symbolize how much National Rifle Association money Sen. Marco Rubio took for the lives of students in Florida. The stunt wasn't out of place. Indeed, it perfectly encapsulated the braying spirit of the student gun-control advocacy in the wake of the Parkland, Florida, school shooting.

These young activists are making our public debate even more poisonous and less civil, and are doing it as teenagers. They are precocious that way.

The Stoneman Douglas students experienced a horrific trauma. No one can deny their grief or blame them for being impassioned. And allowance has to be made for the fact that they are teenagers, who universally believe that they know better than their hap-

less elders. Yet none of that excuses their scurrilous smears of the other side in the gun debate. The student activists presume that there is a ready solution to mass shootings that everyone knows, and the only reason why someone might not act on this universally accepted policy is malice or corrup-



tion. This makes the other side the equivalent of murderers.

In a video interview with The Outline, David Hogg said that the NRA and its supporters "want to keep killing our children." Not that they inadvertently enable people who carry out school shootings via misconceived policy, but they themselves kill children and want to keep doing it.

Lest he be misunderstood, Hogg added, "they could have blood from children spattered all over their faces and they wouldn't take action because they will still see those dollar signs."

In accusing their opponents of being bought off, the students deny the sincerity and legitimacy of supporters of gun rights. They treat the Second Amendment as an inkblot on the Constitution, and dismiss all counterarguments as transparent rationalizations. This juvenile view of the gun debate ignores Supreme Court jurisprudence, the genuine support of the NRA by millions of people and the serious, practical objections to gun-control proposals, and it removes

all possibility of a middle ground.

Tellingly, it is Marco Rubio who is the foremost object of the ire of the students, when he has been notably open and accommodating. He showed up at the CNN town hall to get abused, and has shown remarkable forbearance in handling political attacks that are shameless blood libels. He sponsored incremental school safety legislation that is becoming law, and for his trouble he is deemed a moral monster who doesn't care how many people have to die as long as he gets a few more campaign contributions.

Maybe all of this can be written off as the work of overenthusiastic, underinformed 17-year-olds. But the student activists aren't acting alone. They are promoted and praised by adults who should know better. Since the kids serve a useful purpose in promoting gun control, though, it is practically forbidden in much of the media to dissent from anything they say.

It was hard to believe that our public debate could get even more sophomoric. The student activists are here to say, Yes, it can.

ARISS representative, Ronny Risinger, will install required antennas and technology at Salado Intermediate on April 7. ARISS



via Amateur Radio between astronauts aboard the International Space Station and schools and communities around the world.

Amateur, or "Ham," Radio, is a popular service and hobby in which federally licensed participants operate communications equipment. There are over 700,000 licensed amateurs and nearly 2,300 ARRL-affiliated Amateur Radio clubs in the United States. Hams talk to each other across town, around the world, and even into space without the need for normal communications infrastructure, such as cell phone networks or the Internet. Amateur Radio is regularly used during natural disasters to help local emergency and served agencies (such as the Red Cross, Salvation Army,

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and state and local governments) respond when normal communications methods are disrupted.

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

WHEREAS, the Board hereby finds and determines that said election shall be held on a uniform election date established by Section 41.001(a), Texas Election Code, as amended, as required by Texas law; and

WHEREAS, the Board hereby finds and declares that the meeting at which this Order is considered is open to the public, and that the public notice of the time, place and purpose of the meeting was given, as required by Chapter 551, Texas Government Code, as amended; Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SALADO INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

Section 1. Findings. The statements contained in the preamble of this Order are true and correct and are hereby adopted as findings of fact and as a part of the operative provisions

Section 2. Election Ordered; Date; Proposition. An election (the "Election") shall be held for and within the District on Saturday, May 5, 2018 ("Election Day"), a uniform election date established by Section 41.001(a) of the Texas Election Code, as amended (the "Code"). At the Election the following proposition (the "Proposition") shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the District in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION

SHALL THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SALADO INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT (THE "DISTRICT") BE AUTHORIZED TO ISSUE AND SELL AT ANY PRICE OR PRICES THE BONDS OF THE DISTRICT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$49,400,000 FOR THE PURPOSES OF DESIGNING, CONSTRUCTING, RENOVATING, ACQUIRING, AND EQUIPPING SCHOOL FACILITIES, INCLUDING CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW CORRIDOR TO THOMAS ARNOLD ELEMENTARY, CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW MIDDLE SCHOOL, IMPROVEMENTS TO THE EXISTING ATHLETIC STADIUM, AND CONSTRUCTION OF NEW ATHLETIC FACILITIES, WHICH BONDS MAY BE ISSUED IN VARIOUS ISSUES OR

SERIES, SHALL MATURE SERIALLY OR OTHERWISE NOT MORE THAN 40 YEARS FROM THEIR DATE, AND SHALL BEAR INTEREST AT SUCH RATE OR RATES, NOT TO EXCEED THE MAXIMUM RATE NOW OR HEREAFTER AUTHORIZED BY LAW, AS SHALL BE DETERMINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE DISTRICT WITHIN THE DISCRETION OF THE BOARD AT THE TIME OF ISSUANCE; AND SHALL THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES BE AUTHORIZED TO LEVY AND PLEDGE, AND CAUSE TO BE IMPOSED, ASSESSED AND COLLECTED, ANNUAL AD VALOREM TAXES ON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN THE DISTRICT SUFFI-CIENT, WITHOUT LIMIT AS TO RATE OR AMOUNT, TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS AND THE COSTS OF ANY CREDIT AGREE-MENTS EXECUTED OR AUTHORIZED IN ANTICIPATION OF, IN RELATION TO, OR IN CONNECTION WITH THE BONDS; SAID BONDS TO BE ISSUED AND SAID TAXES TO BE LEVIED, PLEDGED, ASSESSED, AND COLLECTED UNDER THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS INCLUDING THE TEXAS **EDUCATION CODE?**

Section 3. Official Ballot. (a) Voting at the Election, and early voting therefor, shall be by the use of the lawfully approved voting systems and ballots.

(b) The preparation of the necessary equipment and the official ballots for the Election shall conform to the requirements of the Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the Proposition, which shall be set forth on the ballots substantially in the following form:

Section 4. Persons Qualified to Vote. All resident, qualified electors of the District shall be eligible to vote at the Election.

Such precincts and locations are listed on Exhibit A attached hereto, which is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof

purposes; provided, however, such precincts and locations may be changed if so directed by the Elections Administrator without further action of the District. The Early Voting Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to make such changes in polling locations as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Election. Each polling place shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. on the date of the Election.

- (c) Early voting by personal appearance shall be conducted on the days and during the hours set forth in Exhibit B.
- Applications for early voting by mail shall be submitted to the Early Voting Clerk during the time period and at the address set forth in Exhibit B. (d)
- Voting times and election officers may be changed if so directed by the Early Voting Clerk without further action of the District. The Early Voting Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to make such changes in voting hours and election officers as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Election.

Section 6. Notice of Election. Notice of the Election shall be given by: (i) publishing a substantial copy of this Order, in English and Spanish, one time not earlier than the thirtieth (30th) day nor later than the tenth (10th) day prior to the date set for the Election, in a newspaper published in the District, (ii) by posting a copy of this Order, in English and Spanish, on the bulletin board used for posting notices of meetings of the Board, not later than the twenty-first (21st) day prior to the date set for the Election and in at least three (3) public places in the boundaries of the District, not later than the twenty-first (21st) day prior to the date set for the Election and (iii) by posting a copy of this Order, in English and Spanish, on the District's website, prominently and together with the notice of the Election and the contents of the Proposition, not later than the twenty-first (21st) day prior to the date set for the Election through Election Day. Additionally, on Election Day and during early voting by personal appearance, this Order shall be posted in a prominent location at each polling place. Notice of the Election shall also be provided to the county clerk of Bell County, Texas and the Bell County voter registrar not later than the 60th day before the Election Day.

Section 7. Conduct of Election. The Election shall be held in accordance with the Code, except as modified by the Texas Education Code, and the Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended, including particularly Chapter 272 of the Code pertaining to bilingual requirements.

- As of the July 1, 2017, the first day of the District's current fiscal year, the aggregate principal amount outstanding of tax-supported debt of the District was \$18,570,000 and the aggregate amount of outstanding interest on such tax-supported debt was \$8,240,381. The District's ad valorem debt service tax rate for the current fiscal year is \$0.1838 per \$100 of assessed valuation of taxable property in the District. Market conditions, demographics and assessed valuations vary based upon a number of factors beyond the District's control, and therefore, the District cannot and does not guarantee a particular interest rate or tax rate associated with the bonds authorized by the Proposition. As such, the information contained in this paragraph is provided solely for illustrative purposes and does not establish any limitations or restrictions or create a contract with the voters. The District currently estimates that, if the Proposition were approved and the bonds proposed herein were authorized and issued in accordance with the District's currently project plan of finance, the District's maximum ad valorem debt service tax rate would be approximately \$0.50 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Section 9. Necessary Actions. The President of the Board, the Superintendent of the District, or any designee thereof, acting on behalf of the Board, is authorized to enter into agreements providing for the joining elections with other entities and, in consultation with the District's attorney and bond counsel, is hereby authorized and directed to take any and all actions necessary to comply with the provisions of the Code and the Federal Voting Rights Act in carrying out and conducting the Election, whether or not expressly authorized herein, including making changes or additions to polling places or procedures to the extent required or desirable or as may become necessary due to circumstances arising after the date of this Order.

Section 10. Severability. 

The Randy Rogers Band

The Randy Rogers Band will take the stage at Johnny's Outback on April 7. Tickets are available online at johnnyssteaksandbbq. com. They are \$20 in advance and \$25 at the door. Gates open at 6 p.m.

"You've just got to be true to yourself and you can't fool anybody," Randy Rogers says of the band's philosophy. "As a whole, our body of work is pretty consistent with our live show, and the band that plays on the record is the band that you go see."

The Texas-based band has kept its lineup intact since 2002, and the group has reached the Top 5 of Billboard's country albums chart with each of its last three studio releases, including 2016's "Nothing Shines Like Neon." The group recently completed a new album, set for mid-2018 release, at Nashville's historic RCA Studio A with GRAMMY-winning producer Dave Cobb (Chris Stapleton, Jason Isbell, Sturgill Simpson).

Over the course of a dozen releases and multiple major award nominations, Rogers and his band have gone from rowdy college-town bar group to one of the most successful, longest-running acts in the always burgeoning Texas music scene. A group that's regularly on the road 200 dates a year is booked deep into 2018 to play fan favorites like "Tequila Eyes,"
"Tonight's Not the Night," "Kiss Me in the Dark" and "In My Arms Instead" all across the country.

The music has evolved as they've soaked up life experience. "As men, we've all matured and lived a lot of life together," Rogers says. "We've had a few breakups happen to us. We've had babies. We've had life changes. I've been in this band 17 years so a lot has changed. I still listen to Merle Haggard every night. I mean that hasn't changed, but a lot has changed for us musically and privately. We all are in a good spot and we all are just as good friends as when we started."

Camaraderie and creativity have made Rogers and bandmates Geoffrey Hill (guitar), Johnny "Chops" Richardson (bass guitar), Brady Black (fiddle), Les Lawless (drums) and Todd Stewart (utility player) one of the top bands on the competitive Texas music scene.

A native of Cleburne, Texas, Rogers grew up addicted to traditional country music. "I wanted to be George Strait when I was in the sixth grade," he says. "I grew up listening to Willie Nelson and Merle Haggard, I've listened to them more than anybody else, my whole life. I always liked songs. I always wanted to find out who wrote the songs and what the songs were about."

Like many artists, Rogers got his start performing in church and then expanded to local venues. "I could write a song when I was pretty little, 11, 12 or 13," he says. "It's like a kid who could do calculus or some-

thing. It was just something that clicked in my brain for me. I went and finished college and got a degree in public relations and then started a band."

Since then the Randy Rogers Band has steadily built a following that has spilled beyond their native Texas.

"You come to a show, you know what you're going to get," Rogers says. "We've worked hard at making ourselves better on stage and we care about our live show. It's a way to come out and unwind, and we've stuck to

writing songs that are about real life, about breakups or divorces, falling in love or babies being born and, in the case of this record, even death, the ups and downs of life. People can relate. That's what country music is supposed to be. Our band has been around for a long time because there's no bullshit to us. We're not in it to be rich and famous. We're in it to make a living, provide for our families and do something that we all love. You can't fool people and we haven't ever tried. I think that's the key.







Famous hand

Contract Bridge

This deal, from the 1956 U.S.-Italy world championship match, became famous not because it was brilliantly played, but because it wasn't!

The American team gained 750 points when it bid and made a grand slam in diamonds while the Italians stopped in a small slam. Both declarers made all the tricks on identical lines of play, but the fact is that they each missed the correct way to try to score 13 tricks.

At both tables, declarer won the club lead with the ace and cashed five diamonds and five spades, leaving South with just the Q-10 of hearts. On

the last spade, West, who held the queen of clubs and K-8 of hearts, had to discard in front of dummy's A-9 of hearts and jack of clubs. Both Wests discarded a heart, and declarer won the last two tricks with the ace and queen of hearts.

This line of play succeeded only because West, who was marked with the queen of clubs, also had the king of hearts. However, a method of play was available that would have succeeded even if East had the king.

The best chance for 13 tricks is to win the club, ruff a club, cash the K-O of diamonds and ruff another club. Declarer then leads a spade to the jack and ruffs dummy's last club with the ace. A heart to the ace followed by the jack of trumps allows declarer to discard the heart ten and then run his spades to make seven.

The recommended play works whenever the diamonds break 3-2, a 68 percent probability. The approach adopted by both declarers wins only when West has the heart king, a 50 percent chance, and is still available if the diamonds divide 4-1.


At this level of competition, it is surprising that neither declarer found the line of play that offered the maximum chance of scoring 13 tricks. Even world-famous experts, it appears, have blind spots!





Reticulated Gecko

The Reticulated Gecko hunts like a cat

Wild About Texas

The Reticulated Gecko (Coleonyx reticulatus) is one of two species of geckos with eyelids that live in Texas, and it has the smallest area of distribution. It occurs in only two west Texas counties, the southern portions of Brewster and Presidio. However, within these two counties it can only be observed in very small, isolated populations and not throughout the entire counties. Outside of Texas, it has been recorded in two very displaced and isolated populations in northern Mexico; one population in eastern Durango while the other in central Coahuila.

The habitats that this extremely secretive lizard prefers are the canyons with

large boulders as well as cliffs with plentiful cracks and crevices. These habitats not only provide protection from predators, but from lethal daytime temperatures

> The Reticulated Gecko is an elongate lizard with long spindly legs and a long tail. This species is the largest eye-lidded gecko that inhabits this state (as well as the United States) with adults reaching a total length of just over six and one-half inches, although the average is roughly five inches. As with all species of this genus, the skin is thin, paper-like and is covered with small, granular scales. Like other reptiles, the skin is completely dry and not slimy at all.

> The background coloration on the body and tail of adults is rather pasty and

pink. There are numerous brown blotches of various sizes speckled on the back, sides, and tail. The belly is pattern-less and is buff in coloration. Juveniles look contrastingly different from the adults as the pink background coloration is marked with distinctive brown banding. As the lizard matures, this brown banding becomes broken up more or less into a reticulated pattern, hence the common name.

The head is also marked with numerous, randomly placed brown spots, and the elliptical pupils are quick to dilate when this animal becomes exposed to natural or artificial lighting.

Like other reptile species, the Reticulated Gecko is "cold-blooded", or ectothermic. This means that they do not generate heat from

the inside of their body, as mammals and birds do, but rather are dependent on outside sources for heating and cooling. They are completely nocturnal, only emerging from the depths of their hide-away after the sun has set. Even then, they are generally on the surface following summer rains when it comes up to hunt for food

or for love. This species of lizard has a generalized diet. Its preferred choice of food is small beetles, although it will also feed on other small invertebrates such as crickets, grasshoppers, and ants. During its nocturnal forays, it oftentimes stalks it prey much the same way that cats do. They will walk slowly toward the potential prey item, with one foot in front of the other, while arching their backs and slowly waving their tails until they make the quick lunge to grab the food item.

The Reticulated Gecko is oviparous, which is a fancy way of saying that it lays eggs. After emerging from the winter-long brumation period (reptiles do not hibernate in the true sense of the word), males will search out females to mate. Approximately a month after mating, the female will lay two eggs in the moisture retaining cracks and crevices that it calls home. The female will then leave the nest area to allow the eggs to incubate. After approximately two months of incubation, the brightly colored 2 inch long young emerge prepared to fend for and care for themselves.

When threatened, the tail of this species can be discarded from the body rather easily, spasming enough to distract a would-be predator while the animal itself escapes to safety. This process is known as autotomi-

Although its range in this state is rather diminutive, it is not rare where it occurs. However, mainly due to its minuscule range in Texas, this species has been protected from capture or harassment since the late 1970's by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.






